MIDNIGHT REPORTS.

ANGLO-NIAGARAGUAN DISPUTE.

ENGLAND'S BLOCKADE OF PORTS. NICARAGUA WILL PAY THE INDEMNITY.

UNITED STATES' POSSIBLE ACTION. LONDON, April 30--Managua, Nicaragua, advises state that President Zelaya and his cabinet have asked the British minister before the British Legation in Managua to demand \$250,000 "consent money" demanded by Great Britain in London within 15 days, but ask as a further condition that the British ships be first taken out of the harbor of Corinto.

The British minister has refused to do so, and is strongly insisted upon, on account of the condition of the feeling in the country, which otherwise might cause compliance with the ultimatum even in its modified form proposed. Great Britain's answer to the request has not yet been given.

The Graphic, in an editorial on the Nicaraguan dispute says: "Nicaragua is in no way deserving of British consideration. She has insulted and defied us and has intrigued to the detriment of our interests."

WASHINGTON, April 30--The Salvadorian Minister to England and France, Mr. Medina, who also acts as a friend to Nicaragua, has been notified of Nicaragua's willingness to compromise the difficulty with Great Britain as outlined in the despatches from Managua.

LONDON, April 30--Queen Victoria arrived at Sherborne, Dorset, on Monday evening.

A Parliamentary election was held in the east division of Leeds to-day, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Lawrence Lane. The result of the poll was as follows: F. R. Lenty (Gladstonian), 2,999; J. Danvers Power (Conservative), 2,888.

In the House of Commons to-day, Mr. Shaw-Lefevre, President of the Local Government Board, introduced a bill providing for the abolition of plural voting and for the holding of all elections on the same day.

The Dutch brigantine "Arcton" was towed into Gibraltar to-day. She reports that on the afternoon of April 28, while becalmed off the Rif coast, a party of Moroccan Arabs landed and shot and killed members of the crew and seriously wounded the captain and mate.

After massacring the crew, the pirates carried off the provisions and cargo of the vessel. There is a feeling of indignation among the friends and relatives of Miss Emily Hall at Halifax, on account of the death of her father, on the failure of the authorities in Detroit, Mich., to take more active measures in the case of the abduction of her daughter.

Bellevue, N.Y., April 30--The police here have been notified of the presence of a man who is believed to be the murderer of the late John D. Rockefeller. The man is believed to be in the city of New York.

NEW YORK, April 30--The Herald's Managerial Committee has today announced that it has received official advice from the Government that the British warships "Wild Swan" and "Satellite" have been ordered to leave the coast of Nicaragua.

THE TALK OF THE DAY.

We observe that some of the Liberal newspapers are repeating the old story that Sir CHARLES HERBERT UPPER intends getting Mr. FIELDING, Premier of Nova Scotia, created Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, and Mr. A. G. BLAIR, Premier of New Brunswick, translated to the Chief Justiceship of that Province, in order to get rid of two prominent Liberals, who have had their eyes on Ottawa, for some time. Now, as a matter of fact, does anybody in his sober senses believe that two of the best plums in the gift of the Government, could or would, be disposed of, in this way? Would the rank and file of the Conservative party allow such a scheme to go through, even if the Government wished it? A Lieutenant-Governorship and a Chief Justiceship are not picked up every day, and though the Conservatives are generally very generous, they do not give to their life-long political adversaries, the best that is going. Mr. FIELDING and Mr. BLAIR are two very able men. They are the leaders of their party in the two chief Maritime Provinces of the Dominion. In time, one may become the Lieutenant-Governor of his native Province, and the other, the Chief Justice of his native Province, but it will be a Liberal Government which will appoint them. The Minister of Justice has too much horse sense to risk an encounter with his New Brunswick and Nova Scotia supporters, as to propose any such suicidal measure, as the granting to two of his bitterest opponents, the two best positions in the gift of the Government, of which he is a distinguished member. Promotions for Messrs. FIELDING and BLAIR, must come from their political friends.

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DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

OTTAWA, April 30.—Hon. Thomas McCreedy was introduced in the House this afternoon by Messrs. Taylor and Frechette, and was greeted with loud applause from the benches on the Government side. Mr. Davies called attention to the Newfoundland negotiations and wanted to know whether the Newfoundland Government had made a demand for a loan of \$1,000,000. Canada upon fish exported from the Island, and whether Canada was in any way bound by that matter. He did not wish to enquire for any details, but merely desired to know whether the provisional terms agreed upon contained that stipulation. He said that the Government organs had semi-officially announced that the Newfoundland delegates had demanded that this bounty be paid, though they did not say whether the demand had been complied with. The inference, he contended, was that it had not, and he stood that the people of Newfoundland were pressing this upon the Government of the Island as one reason for accepting Confederation. A point of order was raised, however, was that the Newfoundland Government did not contemplate submitting the terms of the union to the people of the Island, but proposed to carry the proposition in the Legislature. If this was the case, it was impossible to say whether it might be contended that the terms of union agreed upon did not contain anything relative to the point at all. That was what he wanted to know, as he thought such terms should be inserted or not in the opinion of the House should be expressed in no uncertain way. One Premier had been legislated into the Dominion in this unconstitutional manner and he thought it was the duty of the Parliament to have another Nova Scotia difficulty to contend with. The reason given why the question should not be submitted to the people of the Island, that there was not a sufficient number in the treasury to pay for an election, was childish. He read an extract from a despatch from St. John's, published in the Montreal Gazette, in which it was stated that an election was held in the Island within three weeks there would not be time to inform the electors of the advantages of union with Canada, if the election was not held. He contended that regarding the question and saturated with old notions and prejudices which would prevent them from realizing a desperate financial condition of the Island, and that if union was not effected, and that such an important question, therefore, should not be submitted to a decision to be made by a tribunal, which was utterly unprepared to do so. He contended that the despatch, which he read, would speak for every member of the House in saying that the proposal should be utterly rejected. If Nova Scotia leaders were not to come in of their own free will and were not to be offered an opportunity of passing judgment on the terms of union, then, he said, it would be an evil day for Canada. The country could not afford to repeat the experiment tried once in Nova Scotia, that is, that the experiment of a deep-rooted feeling of opposition to Confederation which had never been removed. Hon. Mr. Foster expressed astonishment that Mr. Davies should present a question on this subject upon the floor of a newspaper report. There was nothing in the despatch quoted to indicate that the Newfoundland Government was in any way responsible for the statements made or that anything regarding the proposed terms of union had been disclosed.
