

COULD HAVE SAVED SCOTT

Stated That Friction Exists Among the Members of the Expedition

ALLEGED THAT RESCUE PARTY COULD HAVE GONE ABOUT SEARCH MORE VIGOROUSLY.

Christchurch, N.Z., Feb. 15.—Intense bitterness of feeling prevails among a section of the surviving members of the late Captain Robert F. Scott's Antarctic expedition over the failure of the rescue party to push south vigorously on their march to the relief of the explorers, who had been to the South Pole. The belief is expressed that Captain Scott, Dr. Edward A. Wilson and Lt. H. R. Bowers, the last three to die, could have been saved if this had been done. The relations between Commander Edward R. G. R. Evans and Dr. E. L. Atkinson are said to be strained. Some of the survivors state that petty officer Evans became insane, owing to the privations he had undergone, and was occasionally very violent. He declined to help pull a sledge, and his condition became so serious that he had to be carried. Captain Scott's reference in his notes to an unaccountable shortage of fuel at the depots, surprises the supporting parties, who deny that they made any undue use of it.

MANY PERILS AND HARDSHIPS.

London, Feb. 15.—(Special)—In lengthy despatches from Christchurch Commander Evans narrates the adventures of the northern and western parties of the Scott expedition, showing that they underwent many perils and hardships. Commander Evans says that Lieutenant V. L. A. Campbell and his party were always under the impression that the Terra Nova had picked up Captain Scott and his comrades up. Both parties were engaged in scientific research. They found fossils tending to prove that South America and Australia were at one time connected through the Antarctic Continent, and that twice during the history of the world the Antarctic had a temperate climate. The various parties made valuable scientific observations and collections of fossils, igneous rocks and other specimens, and even the southern party, which lacked a geologist, made collections with excellent judgment.

DENIAL FROM COMMANDER EVANS.

Christchurch, N.Z., February 15.—Commander E. R. G. R. Evans, now in command of the Scott expedition, denied categorically and indignantly yesterday the statements cabled about his break with Surgeon Atkinson. Commander Evans says that Petty Officer Evans was not insane and that the relief parties did all that was possible to rescue Captain Scott and the members of his party. In a prepared statement, which is signed by the six officers, and which Commander Evans is sending to London, the Commander exonerates Dr. Atkinson from all blame, but he declines to confirm his statements by the diaries or to allow Dr. Atkinson to be interviewed.

BODIES OF EXPLORERS.

Christchurch, N.Z., February 15.—Commander Evans, when questioned yesterday as to the suggestion that the bodies of Captain Scott and his comrades should be recovered, said: "The best people to judge are those who served under Captain Scott. Had we been in the same place as the victims we should have wished our bodies to remain at rest where we had given our best efforts in the cause we so earnestly believed in." Commander Evans will remain in New Zealand until the arrival of the widow of Captain Scott. The members of the British Antarctic expedition oppose the suggestion that the Terra Nova should be chartered, with Sir Ernest H. Shackleton in command, for the purpose of bringing back the bodies of Captain Scott and his comrades for burial in St. Paul's Cathedral.

FIVE OFFICERS WERE DROWNED

Went Down With Ship After Collision During Fog

NESSEL FOUNDERED THERE AFTER BEING CUT DOWN BY GERMAN STEAMER.

Hamburg, Germany, Feb. 15.—(Special)—Five officers of the Stettin ship Christiania were drowned when their vessel sank after being cut down yesterday evening by the German steamer Galata, during a dense fog off Borkum. The Christiania foundered three minutes after the collision. The sailors and stokers, nineteen in number, escaped.

NO THIRD PARTY AT PRESENT

Grain Growers of West Give up the Proposal For Time Being

FARMERS WANT TO KNOW THE GROUND BEFORE EMBARKING ON SUCH A SCHEME.

Saskatoon, Sask., Feb. 15.—(Special)—The meeting of grain growers, called to discuss the question of forming a third party, decided against such a step at the present time.

The press were denied admission, but a delegate gave out the above information and said: "The farmers mean to know their ground before they launch any third party." About fifty members attended the meeting.

ICE SHIP TO PATROL ATLANTIC

British Government Has Completed Arrangements for Work

WHALE SCOTIA WILL WATCH THE BREAKING UP OF THE ICE.

London, Feb. 15.—(Special)—The Government announces that it has completed arrangements for an ice ship to patrol the Atlantic off the Newfoundland banks and warn liners of the presence of bergs.

The whaler Scotia, which was formerly used in the Scottish Antarctic expedition, will leave Dundee at the end of February and will be stationed off the eastern coast of North America, going northward to watch the breaking up of the ice and report its movements at the wireless stations at Newfoundland and Labrador. Three scientists aboard the vessel will make oceanographical and meteorological observations as well as movement of bergs.

STORMY SCENE IN COMMONS

Premier, Leader of Opposition, Rogers and Oliver Take Part in Discussion

ARTICLE IN REGINA LEADER ATTACKING MINISTER LED TO SCENE.

Ottawa, Feb. 15.—The excitement over the vote closing the naval debate last night in no way cooled the ardor of members, and the House was treated yesterday afternoon to a scene which at times became stormy and tempestuous and needed all the control that Speaker Sproule was able to exercise. It was a singular spectacle in which Premier Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Robert Rogers and Hon. Frank Oliver were chief participants. It all arose on a question of privilege raised by Mr. Rogers, when he called the attention of the House to an article that had appeared in the Regina Leader on Feb. 7th, the article in question attacking the minister in respect of a homestead grant near Prince Albert, Sask., upon which a question had been raised recently in the House. The inference made by the article was that a man named Donaldson, who happened to be a Conservative, had been given inside information that the land was open for homesteading, although almost within the limits of Prince Albert.

IN FAVOUR OF TAX ON FOOD

Lord Selbourne Regrets Stand Taken by Bonar Law

ENGLAND MUST GRANT RECIPROCITY WITH THE OVERSEAS DOMINIONS.

London, Feb. 15.—Lord Selbourne, speaking at a Liverpool meeting last night, declared, despite Bonar Law's decision, that he still believed in food taxes. As a loyal Unionist he accepted his leader's policy, but he regretted that policy.

He foresaw that if England did not meet the Overseas Dominions by granting reciprocity the time would come when they would make a reciprocal bargain with Germany or some other foreign country.

"The question arises," he said, "as to whose markets were the dominions to be in the future." He did not want to see the birthright of England given over to foreigners simply because they could not make their minds up on readjusted food taxes, which were all that had been suggested by the Unionists.

FIGHTING CONTINUES

Mexican Federals and Rebels Continue Battle in Streets of Capital

REPORT THAT MADERO HAD RESIGNED BELIEVED TO BE STRATEGICAL MOVE

Mexico City, Feb. 15.—(Special)—The rebel guns in arsenal have been in spasmodic action during greater part of the night, occasionally developing very galling fire which provoked vigorous reply from the Federal artillery.

MADERO MAY NOT RESIGN
The incessant bombardment of the National Palace and of the Federal positions and of fierce reply of Federals are construed as an indication that President Madero has not decided to resign.

It is thought that report of his retirement from office may have been nothing more than strategical move on part of Government forces.

FORCES FACE EACH OTHER
Mexico City, Feb. 15.—(Special)—Hostile forces this morning faced each other in virtually same positions in centre of Mexican capital as they have held all through week of fierce street fighting.

REPORTED RESIGNATION.
Mexico City, Feb. 15.—(Special)—The resignation of Francisco I. Madero from the presidency is believed to be in the hands of the Mexican Congress. It was authoritatively stated that Madero agreed to resign, if the Senate so wished. The Senate was called into session about eight o'clock last night for the purpose of taking action on this important phase of the situation.

C. V. RAILWAY TO REBUILD SHOPS

Waterloo Town Council Will Give Water to Company at Low Rate

BY-LAW PASSED SEPARATING CORPORATION FROM COUNTY FOR MUNICIPAL PURPOSES.

Waterloo, Feb. 15.—(Special)—At the last regular meeting of the Town Council the following were present: Jas. Davidson, Mayor; A. Cote, promotor; Councillors W. N. Call, E. W. Phelps, P. A. Trudeau and W. E. Hills.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read by the assistant Sec.-Treas., Mr. J. A. Perras, and accepted. A resolution was passed to sell the corporation's surplus water to the Central Vermont Railway Co. for a term of ten years at \$1 per 100,000 gallons for the first 1,000,000 gallons and at 20 cents per 1,000 gallons for any used above that amount. The company will have to rebuild its shops in Waterloo, to pay the same amount of wages and employ the same number of men as they did before the shops were destroyed.

A by-law was also passed separating the corporation of the Town of Waterloo from the County of Sherbrooke for municipal purposes.

A resolution was passed forbidding the blocking of the streets by parties moving buildings. Tenders will be advertised for to provide for the filling up of the Stevens bridge on both sides in order to have an arch of only about 33 feet, and to make general repairs on the bridge.

CAPT SCOTT'S ESTATE WAS PLEDGED

Large Portion of Fortune For Expense of Expedition

LORD CURZON SAYS STEPS SHOULD BE TAKEN TO RELIEVE ESTATE.

London, February 15.—Lord Curzon of Kedleston, in a letter regarding the various funds started in connection with the Scott disaster, says that before the question of providing a memorial is considered nearly \$150,000 will be needed to meet the outstanding liabilities incurred by the expedition and to relieve the estate of Captain Scott, who pledged a large portion of his own and Mrs. Scott's fortune to the expenses of the venture.

It will be necessary, also, to provide for the adequate publication of the scientific results so laboriously collected and tabulated by Captain Scott up to almost the last hour of his life.

Lord Curzon suggests that the memorial should take the form of a hall, to be called "The Scott Memorial Hall," and that it should be dedicated to the propagation of the science to which Captain Scott and his companions yielded their lives.

GOOD ROADS IN SUTTON VILLAGE

Municipal Council to Approach Government for a Loan

WILL THAT AN INSPECTOR BE SENT TO CONFER WITH THE COUNCIL ON MATTER.

Sutton, Feb. 15.—(Special)—At an adjourned meeting of the village council held when there were present Mayor E. B. Greeley and Councillors C. M. Boright, J. H. Smith, L. E. Dyer and Sec.-Treas. C. U. R. Tarte.

It was decided that the council was in favor of macadamizing and graveling the different roads of this municipality called Main street, Maple street, Pleasant street, Academy street, Western avenue, Pine street, Pearl street, Depot street, Mountain street and Mills avenue. For that purpose this council thinks it advisable to take advantage of the offer of the Government of the province of Quebec of help and loan under "The Good Roads Act of 1912," where the minister of good roads will be requested to delegate an inspector to the end of conferring with this council as to the proper manner of making said roads and streets and the specifications of the work to be made therein, the whole to be embodied in a by-law to be passed as soon as possible. The secretary-treasurer was instructed to forward a copy of the resolution at once to the minister of good roads at Quebec. The council then adjourned to meet again on March 3rd.

CONSOLIDATION OF SCHOOLS

Two Buildings Will Be Closed in the Glen Sutton Neighbourhood

MOVE WAS DECIDED UPON AT LARGE AND REPRESENTATIVE MEETING OF RATEPAYERS.

Sutton, Feb. 15.—(Special)—A public meeting was called at Glen Sutton on Tuesday to discuss the advisability of consolidating the three Glen Sutton schools, with the object of bringing No. 11, known as the Brook School, which is located near the cemetery, and No. 18, known as the Millmore School, into the Glen School No. 10, and making the one school take the place of the three. The object in wishing to do this is, of course, to curtail expense. At present No. 18 has only five scholars and No. 11 has but eight, while the and commodious onemum mmm mmm Glen School building, which is large and commodious, has from 30 to 35 scholars.

Commissioners J. C. Reid, chairman; Henry Allan and Chas. M. Jones were present. Chairman Reid introduced Mr. J. C. Sutherland, of the Educational Department, Quebec, who came to lay the facts of the situation before the people of the Glen section.

Rev. E. M. Taylor, M.A., inspector of schools, was also present for the same purpose. There was a large turnout, showing the great interest felt in the matter under discussion. Upwards of sixty of the leading citizens of the Glen section, including quite a number of ladies, gathered to hear the pros and cons of the matter. Mr. Sutherland and Mr. Taylor inquired into the facts of the case with minute details. Rev. W. H. Nicholson, pastor of the Glen Sutton Church, also spoke, warmly commending the proposed consolidation of the three schools.

At the end it was decided by a vote of the whole audience, except two, to close schools 11 and 18 for a period of two years, thus consolidating the three schools temporarily at least, though it is generally believed that once tried under existing conditions that the people will not wish to go back to the expense of keeping open the two schools to be closed. However, chairman Reid explained that the school buildings in Nos. 11 and 18 would be properly closed and carefully cared for in case it should be deemed wise to again open them after the two years of consolidation is tried out. It is felt that with the aid of the people through the Glen valley in sympathy with the commissioners that the matter is bound to work out to the satisfaction of those having the good of the school work at heart in that section of the town. After the matter had been fully explained and the many questions put by the Glen citizens answered, all seemed to think that the move now being made was a very proper one.

The school in No. 18 was opened 48 years ago this year, the schoolhouse having been started the year before. Mr. Furnace Courser was the contractor for the building, and he is one of the few good old Glen pioneers that still survive to see these changes go on. The late Wm. Locke was the "master builder" of the first school building on that site, and the late Belinda Westover, of Sutton, later Mrs. James Laflair, of Sutton, taught the first school. The Brook School dates back considerably earlier.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

Addresses Yesterday Afternoon and Evening Were Very Instructive

WILL HAVE A MARKED INFLUENCE ON LIFE AND WORK OF SCHOOLS IN DISTRICT.

The meetings in connection with the Sunday School Convention were continued yesterday afternoon and evening in the Sunday School Hall of the Methodist Church, under the presidency of Rev. W. T. G. Brown. There was a very large attendance at each session, many impressive and inspiring addresses were delivered, and the Convention will doubtless have a marked influence upon the life and work of the schools throughout the district.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The proceedings commenced with a service of prayer and praise conducted by Rev. I. W. Pierce, Waterville, who also gave a short address. "We no longer exalted the man who is exempt from the duties of life and washed his hands clean from its responsibilities, but we do exalt the man for whom the world seeks because of his power to be of service in our midst," said Mr. Pierce. "Our capacity and willingness to serve make us worthy. Let us be thankful for the opportunities of service and not try to get away from the responsibilities that devolve upon us."

REV. E. M. FULLER.

An address on "Teacher Training" was given by Mr. Fuller. The requirements of a teacher were not only piety, devotion, and a good knowledge of the Scriptures, but the important thing was whether a person could teach. When love and skill were united they could expect a masterpiece. Where there was a love for children that expressed itself so that the children discovered it, there was hidden talent that only needs to be brought out and trained. There were thousands of good teachers who were simply not known.

They should teach for salvation and train for service. We insisted in the public schools on the teacher having diplomas. There should not be any less insistence in the spiritual training of our young people. For the encouragement of the untrained teacher he would recommend that they take a course of training; they could have a "teacher training department" in the Sunday School, and a "teachers' training class" in the community. If they were to do their work well, they must make themselves skilful by knowledge. If any man lacked wisdom let him ask of God, but if he lacked knowledge let him dig for it.

REV. WM. MACMILLAN.

Mr. MacMillan followed with an address on "The Opportunities and Responsibilities which the Sabbath School Offers." He said in part: "We were proud of the opportunities we had as citizens of the country and citizens of our town. We boasted of the opportunities of Canada and we believed in this respect we were even more favored than the people of other countries, but there was another side to the question of opportunity which we were not always ready to admit and that was that every opportunity brought with it its own responsibility. The two were inseparably linked together. They were under an obligation to live the Christian life whether they recognized the obligation or not. It was claimed that obligation was a matter of education. Ignorance was sometimes pleaded, but ignorance would not relieve us of our moral obligations. It was only through the channels and avenues of service that it was possible to have life in its truest and broadest sense. The pathway of life was a pathway of service. The Sabbath School offered opportunities for self improvement and growth in grace and its work could give us visions that no other line of service could. The seed sown in faith often times under discouraging circumstances, would bring forth a harvest where it was least expected. There was a glorious secret only known to the Sunday School workers. Our great glory was not a selfish enjoyment but an unselfish service. The Sabbath School held forth the opportunity of moulding lives and shaping ideals that may not fade away until the end of days. Divine things were real and material things were unreal; the end of life was the building of character and not gain. The spirit of commercialism was eating its way into every department of life, and was one of the most subtle enemies of the Church. The Sabbath School provided the opportunity of meeting the encroachment of modern commercialism. When the children realized that there was something better than making money, that the Bible was true, and that sin would be punished and good rewarded, that they should do right for its own sake and not for any reward, then they would have sown the seed that would bring a harvest. There were little buds of humanity in the School that under proper training and instruction would become an honor to the Church. No Church was hopeless which had a flourishing Sabbath School."

PRINCIPAL TRUEMAN, M.A.

"The Lesson, The Teacher, and the Pupil," was the subject of Principal Trueman's address. "We must believe in our boys and girls," said the speaker. The Sunday School teacher must be the confidant of his scholars. Boys expressed themselves in different ways under different circumstances.

LOOK AFTER SAFETY OF MEN.

Cowansville, Feb. 15.—(Special)—The five shops will be closed down for the next week on account of the boiler giving out. The boiler has been giving more or less trouble for the past month, but this morning when the men came to work they were informed that the shops would be closed down until the new boiler, which is being installed, was in commission as the management did not consider it safe to steam up again, the condition of the old boiler being much worse since yesterday. The close down affects between 90 and 100 men.

FINGER CUT OFF.

East Bolton, Feb. 15.—(Special)—Mr. H. A. Evans had the third finger on his left hand cut off while sawing wood at Mr. Ezra Ball's in the machine operated by Bowker & Evans. The drag saw machine, which is driven by a gasoline engine, power being transmitted by large friction pulleys which disengage to stop the saw, were found to be slipping and Mr. Evans was applying rosin to increase the friction when in some way his elbow got caught in the driving belt throwing his hand into the clutch of the driving friction of the pulleys, terribly lacerating the third finger and crushing the bone. Mr. Bowker, who was operating the clutch brake lever at the time of the accident, stopped at once, but too late to prevent the accident.

FUNERAL OF THE LATE HENRY HULBURD.

Cowansville, Feb. 15.—(Special)—The funeral of the late Henry Hulburd of Cowansville, formerly of East Farnham, took place at the Union church, East Farnham, where a large number gathered to pay their last respect to the deceased; the service was interred at the Riverside cemetery. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. A. W. Main of Montreal, the bearers were Messrs. Percy and Wm. Hawk, F. Ellison and Martin Collins. By the death of Mr. Hulburd the Eastern Townships loses one of its oldest and most respected citizens. Mr. Hulburd was born at Colchester, Vermont, in 1823, but when only eight years old, owing to the death of his father, he came to Canada to live with his uncle in the Township of Dunham, and after a few years moved to the Township of East Farnham, where he lived until a few years ago, when he came to Cowansville to reside with his son. He was several times councillor and school commissioner, and also trustee of the Union Church at East Farnham, and always took a great interest in public matters.

In 1844 he married Elizabeth Short, of Brigham, who predeceased him. They had a family of six sons and two daughters, of whom four sons, George, Frank, Heman and W. "Chauncey," survive to mourn him.

THE LATE GEORGE BALDWIN

CLEVELAND.

George B. Cleveland, who died in Saskatchewan, Sask., Dec. 25th, 1912, was the fourth son of the late Wm. Cleveland and his wife, Sarah Baldwin, of Barnston, Que. He was born March 17th, 1846, and spent his boyhood and early manhood on the Cleveland farm at Barnston, later owned by Mrs. Sarah Burdard. The buildings of this well known homestead were destroyed by fire some years ago. Interested in and associated with the business, political and religious life of the community, Mr. Cleveland was widely and well known and thoroughly trusted as a man of integrity in business affairs and in all the relations of life. During the last ten years he suffered from impaired health, from valvular trouble of the heart. During that time most of his financial interests were transferred to the western provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan, mostly to the city of Saskatoon, Sask., and were greatly increased by the remarkable growth of that western city.

His funeral was held from his late residence, 610 6th Avenue, Saskatoon, to the city cemetery, and was largely attended. Rev. C. W. 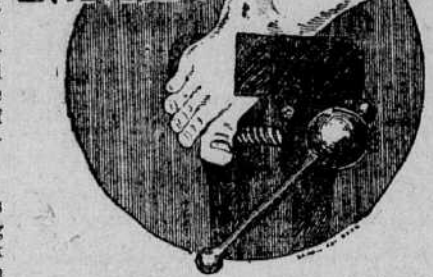

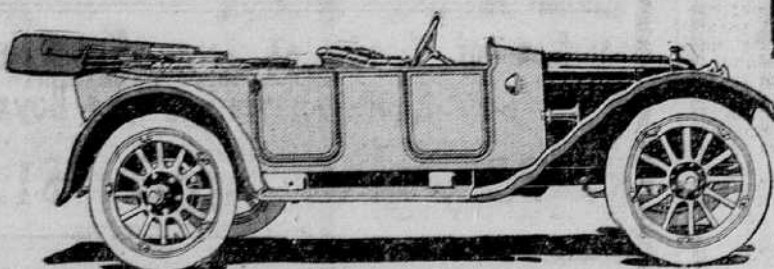

With an intimate knowledge of the possibilities of his instrument is his realization of its limitations and he devises an infinite variety of effects with an immaculate taste which never exaggerates.

The first part of the programme consisted of selections from the works of Sir Edward Elgar, whose fame as the foremost English writer, and one of the greatest composers of the day, is firmly established.

The "Sonata in G. Major" written for the organ was followed by "Chanson du Matin," "Surreum Corda" and "Salut d'Amour," all charming melodies, the latter one of the most popular of Elgar's compositions.

"Military March," "Pomp and Circumstance" is full of vigour and enthusiasm and introduces the famous song "Land of Hope and Glory," first sung by Madame Clara Butt, the greatest of English contraltos, who is now in Montreal.

The splendid overture to "Rienzi," (Richard Wagner) which opened the second part of the programme was followed by the air, "Star of Eve" from Tannhauser, sung in the opera by Walfram to the Saintly Elizabeth.

"Eisa's Bridal Procession" (Lohengrin) was exquisitely played and the rendering of the next number, a selection from Wagner's mystical opera "Parsifal" was faultless.

The closing number the Overture to Tannhauser has among its themes the famous "Chant of Pilgrims" bursting forth in a perfect torrent of sound at the climax of this remarkable production.

The Overture was in aid of the Choir fund.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

(Continued from Page 1)

One important thing was to know how a boy spent his leisure and what kind of companions he had. We must get hold of lonesome boys and find them suitable companions. They had to present to the boys and girls the things in the Scripture that appealed to them. They must have absolute faith in the students and be willing to sacrifice themselves for the students' sake. A teacher should be familiar with the geography of the Bible and know the history of the people chiefly mentioned in it, and must understand the missionary work of the Apostles. Some teacher receive faulty teaching and a bad memory caused them to mix up words with disastrous results. He recommended teachers to use the blackboard, to teach scholars to spell correctly, and use pictures and maps. A good school room was also essential. The genuineness of religion appealed to boys and they wanted a hero with grit, and Jesus Christ filled the bill. The last words of God were not spoken to the human race when St. John wrote Revelations. We could learn the Divine love through the life and work of a man like Livingstone just as much as through one of the heroes in the Old Testament. The time had come when we must accept the graded course of lessons. The time would come when we had a regular curriculum in Sunday Schools, as well as in day schools. The teachers must know when it was time to stop the lesson. It was a mistake to attempt to fill a space when one had not material to fill it. Better let the work be short and sharp. Teachers must be well informed, and must be constantly studying. A successful teacher must make his conduct square with his profession. Generally speaking, boys hated falsehood and naturally told the truth. Teachers must be honorable in their daily life and fond of young people and ready to make sacrifices for them. They must have boundless vision. They must have faith to believe no good work was ever lost and should put forth an intelligent consecrated effort.

REV. W. A. BROWN.

Mr. Brown, International Sunday School Worker, of Chicago, followed. He said the aim of the Missionary Department of the International Sunday School was the Christianization of North America and the evangelization of the world. Their plan of work was the organization of Missionary committees in every Sunday School. The points were adequate missionary instruction, definite missionary prayer, systematic missionary giving, practical missionary activities, and enlisting missionary recruits. The Anglo Saxon race was one of the outstanding achievements of the missionary enterprise. There were 27 books in the New Testament by eight writers and every one was written by a missionary. Every letter was written either to a foreign missionary church or to a convert of the missionary enterprise. If it had not been for the missionary enterprise there would have been no Bible. Only the foreign missionary could write an everlasting Gospel. Of the twelve apostles eleven became foreign missionaries and the other one became a traitor. The speaker's arguments were forcibly driven home in a striking and original manner.

Greetings from the Montreal Convention were delivered by Rev. John G. Fulcher, General Secretary Provincial Sunday School Union, and by Judge Leet, President of the Union. The latter also offered some very useful and valuable suggestions for the formation of a local organization.

An interesting paper on the early Sunday Schools in Stanstead County was given by Mrs. Morrill, who also showed some of the school books used at that time.

In the evening addresses were given by Revs. W. A. Brown and John G. Fulcher. The following resolutions were submitted by the Resolution Committee and unanimously adopted: This Convention that the Sunday Schools in the County of Sherbrooke be and are hereby organized into an Association to be known as The Sherbrooke County Sunday School Association in affiliation with the Sunday School Union of the Province of Quebec.

Resolved, "That the officers of this Association be as follows: President—Rev. W.T.G. Brown. Vice-Presidents—The Ministers resident in the County of Sherbrooke. Secretary—Rev. I. Norman.

"That the Executive Committee be composed of the officers of the Association together with the Sunday School Superintendents of the County."

Resolved: "That the thanks of this Convention be given to the speakers who have so helpfully addressed this Convention, also to the Press and to those who have so kindly opened their homes to the delegates."

Resolved: "That the heartfelt thanks of this Convention be extended to the Church which has so generously opened the doors of their new Sunday School Hall, for the sessions of this gathering and that we also commend to the consideration of the churches within the bounds of this Convention the example of progressiveness shown in the erection and equipment of a building so well adapted to the needs of the Twentieth Century methods in Sunday School work."

BULLETINS FROM TEMPERANCE WAR

Mr. W. H. Lambly Gave Statistics of Licenses in Canada

TELLS HOW THE CAUSE IS ADVANCING THROUGHOUT THE WORLD.

Inverness, Feb. 15.—(Special)—The Christian Endeavour Society met in the Methodist Church on Wednesday evening and there was a large attendance considering the bitter cold night. Mr. W. H. Lambly, the President, led the meeting. The subject was "Bulletins from the Temperance War" and Mr. Lambly gave a number of facts and figures which may be interesting to the Record Readers.

There are 17 Counties in the Province of Quebec in which no licenses are issued. There are 767 Municipalities in which no licenses are issued. To a delegation of license holders seeking privileges the Prime Minister said that his Government was a Partisan of temperance and he has proved it to be so. He gave the early closing Law preventing the saloon for several hours each day of carrying on its work and when a few weeks ago a Judge in Quebec deprived a majority of electors the right to successfully oppose the issue of a license Sir. Lomer Gouin immediately introduced and passed a Law preventing such a manifest injustice being done again. But notwithstanding the splendid advance we have made in Quebec there are still over 2000 people engaged in the lawful sale of intoxicants and the fight is to wipe out this business and bring the remaining 271 Municipalities under the blessings of prohibition.

In Ontario there are 410 Municipalities under prohibition, but 340 are still under license. In 1912 there were 178 places in which the license party might have brought on repeal votes but they dared to bring on repeal votes in only 15 municipalities, and they signally failed in every case to repeal the local option By-Law. Seventy-eight bars were closed by the vote of the 6th of January last and in 15 contests to repeal brought on by the liquor they gained only one. The three fifths requirement has defeated prohibition in 118 Municipalities, and has imposed 404 licenses on people who have voted them out by good and in many cases large majorities. Take Peterboro as an example. On the 6th of January last there was a majority of 476 in favor of local option and yet local option was defeated by the three fifths, and fifteen licenses are kept open for three years.

Alberta, by a ridiculous technical objection local option in 15 municipalities has been put back for a year, but the fight is on.

Saskatchewan.—The same technical objection has prevented any attempt to secure local option during the past year.

Manitoba.—There are 71 Municipalities under prohibition.

New Brunswick.—Nine of the fifteen Counties and two Cities are under prohibition and in seven other Municipalities no licenses are issued and the people are seeking provincial prohibition.

Prince Edward Island is under prohibition for many years.

Nova Scotia is all under prohibition except the City of Halifax.

Newfoundland, has a very strict License Law. The hours of sale are from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m., the shortest hours for the sale of liquor of any Nation on earth. There are 58 licenses in the whole Colony and 54 of these are in the City of St. John's.

Canteens have been abolished in all the Militia Camps in the Dominion. Thanks to the good sense and backbone and sterling righteousness of Col. the Honorable Sam Hughes, the Minister of Militia.

IN THE UNITED STATES.

State wide prohibition by constitutional amendment is in force in nine States and in all the other States, large areas are under prohibition by local option or otherwise. The population under prohibition is over forty-six millions and the population under license is under forty-four millions. So the whole land is going dry.

Finland voted prohibition in 1908 but the weak and foolish Czar vetoed the law. But it will come back in spite of the Czar.

Norway, half of the cities and towns are under prohibition.

Iceland has constitutional prohibition.

In Scotland, Ireland and Wales Sunday prohibition is now in force.

Germany.—The Kaiser has ranged himself on the side of prohibition and has even advised his soldiers to join the Good Templars.

And so prohibition is marching on to win the day in all lands.

The Beast, in the lesson Rev. 13, 1-8 well represents the liquor traffic. Upon his head the name Blasphemy. He blasphemes God and his tabernacle, and makes war with the saints. A perfect representation of the Saloon. Out of the Saloon come more crimes and blasphemies than all other places on earth and the saloon makes war on the Church, on the Ministers, on all good men and all good principles.

What is the awful load we voluntarily carry? In Montreal 1061 grog shops licenses and possibly as many more unlicensed, and the Christian people permit it.

In the United States they spend \$12,000,000 on foreign missions, \$250,000,000 on all churches and religious and \$2,500,000,000 per year on intoxicants and the Christian people permit it. Yet we claim to be Christian Nations. A man cannot be a Christian who votes for license and a Nation cannot be Christian which legalizes the saloon. The word Christian means Christlike. How can a man be

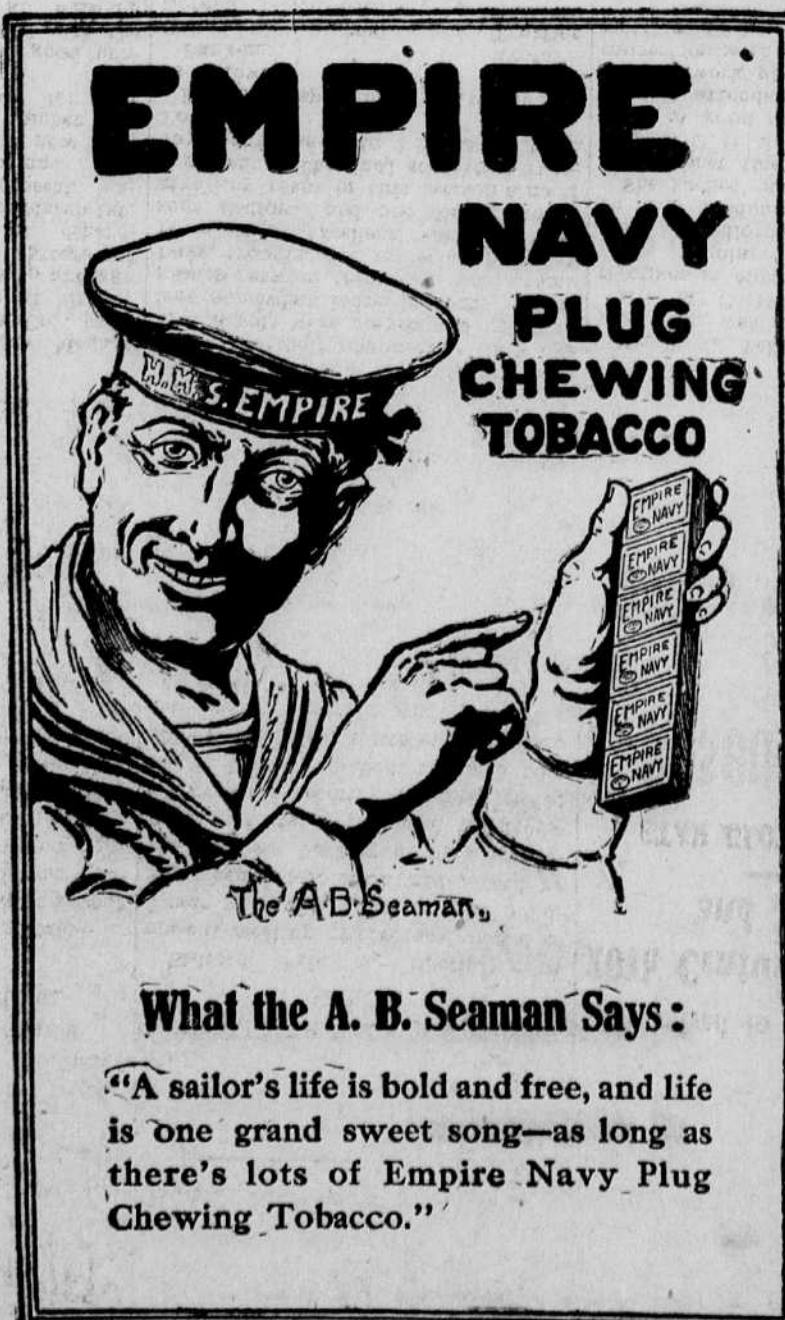

THE ONLOOKER COMMENTS

Immigration Handicap

The representatives of the Eastern Townships in the Old Country are discovering that there is competition in the immigration business as well as in other lines of work. There is first competition as between the agents of Canada and Australia. The Island Dominion is offering some very special inducements to direct the tide to the South Sea. The Dominion Government is meeting this and is offering a special bonus of one pound sterling to booking agents for farm laborers and domestics sent to Canada. Then there enters the competition between the special agents of the various Canadian provinces and particularly with the agents of Ontario. That province is carrying on a special propaganda on a large scale and offering on her own account a pound bonus and assisted passage. Thus the booking agent sending a farm laborer to Ontario will get the Dominion bonus of one pound and the Ontario bonus of one pound and the immigrant himself will have his passage money, or part of it, advanced. It was currently reported that \$4,000 had been placed in the Quebec estimates for the purposes of assisted passage but this does not appear to have been the case and no money is available for these purposes. This makes the work of the Eastern Townships agents difficult and under this handicap they will not be able to accomplish the largest results. Reports which have come to hand, however, indicate that they are securing a considerable number of desirable people. Besides, this is the first year of this larger campaign. It

will prepare the way for better results next year. If the Provincial Government authorities will continue their hearty co-operation, both the immigration and repatriation campaigns proposed by the Eastern Townships Associated Boards of Trade can be made successful. With ample farm and other labor in the Eastern Townships the province will recover its financial outlay many times over in increased crops and added wealth of soil.

The experiences of this year's work on behalf of Eastern Townships immigration will be valuable in planning next year's campaign.

Wanted, an Eastern Townships Historian.

There have been written in days gone by a number of very valuable local histories. They deal, however, for the most part, with the early events of certain counties. Much valuable matter has been published in the newspapers and which has never been put into permanent form. Other valuable records rest in the archives at Ottawa and Quebec and have never been given publication.

The task of assembling all these published and unpublished fragments of Eastern Townships history and bringing the best of the whole into one comprehensive volume remains yet to be undertaken. Many descendants of old pioneers would be glad to support such a work.

There is perhaps no man better qualified to undertake it than Dr. John Hayes of Richmond. Dr. Hayes already has a large collection of East-

ern Townships data. The public have read his contributions to the press with great interest. Local historical research is to him somewhat of a hobby and it requires some such personal interest in the work to lead a man to undertake a task which is bound to be somewhat arduous and which does not promise great financial returns.

The pioneers of the Townships deserve a "last word" history, a final comprehensive record of their undertakings and achievements. Their descendants would welcome such a work. They would, there is reason to believe, give hearty support to the local historian who would undertake it.

South Pole Tragedy.

The loss of Captain Scott and several of his brave companions adds another to the sacrifices made on behalf of polar exploration.

Both north and south the extremities of the earth, within their fortresses of ice for centuries defied the attacks of civilization. Both have been temporarily conquered only to be immediately abandoned, the cheerless, barren, inhospitable waste holding no attraction to man beyond the satisfaction of a task accomplished.

It is possible now that the two goals have been reached and at the sacrifice of many valuable lives, that men may be content to leave to their solitude the barren lands of the north and the south which were never intended for habitation.

Y.M.C.A. Concert Course.

Unfortunately for the Y. M. C. A. which financed the venture, and unfortunate for the public who would otherwise have derived pleasure and benefit from the entertainments provided, is the fact that the Concerts under the auspices of the Association have not been better patronized. Acting in good faith, and with the commendable idea of improving high class entertainments at the lowest possible cost, the Young Men's Christian Association made arrangements for several concerts to be given in the Association's Auditorium. Three of the series of five have already been given, and each one was worthy of a far larger audience than was present.

As a result of the failure of the public to attend the Association is faced with a deficit of about \$250 on the course. Two concerts still remain, however, and in justice to the men who have given of their time and means to give Sherbrooke high class Lyceum productions it is hoped the public will respond and by attending the remaining concerts that are delightful and instructive.

KING GEORGE'S KEYS

King George is not bothered with that bugbear of most men, a pocket bunch of keys. The only key which his Majesty carries about is one which opens the private writing desk in the library of each of the Royal residences, the several desks being all fitted with an identical lock. The key in question is quite a tiny one, and is attached to the end of the King's watch-chain, and worn in the waistcoat pocket.

His Majesty's private keys are kept in the writing desk in the King's own room wherever he may be staying. There are only eight in the bunch. One locks or unlocks the bureau in the writing-room at Buckingham Palace, containing a number of the late King Edward's private papers; another gives access to a safe in which are kept books and documents relating to the most important private affairs of the Royal family; whilst a third opens the fireproof case containing the King's unique collection of postage stamps, the finest in the world.

No one ever handles these keys except his Majesty himself or his trusty private secretaries, Lord Knollys and Lord Stamfordham.

A KING'S GOLD WATCH

Time-Piece Still Treasured Which Murat Gave to Russian Soldier

In an obituary of a Colonel Tchernozouboff in a Russian provincial paper an extraordinary story is related in which is bound up a romantic episode.

Among the colonel's effects was a gold watch, on the case of which was the inscription: "Elkone to Joachim. Ne m'oublie pas!"

Upon this "Do-not-forget-me" watch hung a tale of the great war. In 1812 the colonel was a simple Cossack, in a regiment engaged in harrying the French retreat; while Murat was King of Naples, and in command of the French cavalry. It was on the eve of Borodino, and Murat, galloping ahead of his squadron, was cut off and surrounded. It looked as though he was doomed.

The range was short and the Cossacks were about to fire, when Tchernozouboff intervened. "Present arms!" he cried chivalrously. "Hurrah for the King of the Brave!" Murat had time to put spurs to his horse, and ride away.

As the King rode off he took out his gold watch, gave it as a souvenir to the Cossack who had saved him, Platoff, the Hetman of the Cossacks, admiring Tchernozouboff's chivalry, gave him his commission, and made him his aide-de-camp.

The watch was thereafter treasured as an heirloom in the Tchernozouboff family, though they received an offer of no less than 20,000 roubles for it.

A MAN OF TITLES

The Duke of Atholl is about the most titled nobleman in the United Kingdom. He possesses no less than nineteen, and in addition is co-heir to five other baronies. The Duke's principal seat is Blair Atholl, Scotland. In Gaelic the word Atholl means "plain of the pleasant land," and the word well describes the surrounding country. The family is an ancient one, and cherishes many old customs, chief of which is that whenever the Sovereign visits Blair Atholl, the Duke of Atholl must present to him on bended knee a white rose.

The Duke is head of a corps termed the Atholl Highlanders, which consists of 230 clansmen. It is a relic of feudal times, when bodyguards were common and the Dukes of Atholl are privileged to maintain this corps at the present day.

The present Duke served in the Scots Fusilier Guards, and attained the rank of captain. He is now Hon. Colonel of the Black Watch, and Lord-Lieutenant of the County of Perth, having occupied the latter position since 1878. The Duke is one of the largest landowners in Great Britain, and lords it over 202,000 acres. There is no question as to the succession, for the Duke has a family of three sons and three daughters.

Golf Balls for Fireworks

A fire broke out at midnight in the Kilmacoll, Scotland, Golf Club House. A crowd of spectators gathered to view the spectacle, which was rendered more brilliant by the incessant explosion of rubber core balls, which rose into the air in globes of flame of a variety of colors.

The Wearing of the Kilt

At a meeting held in Edinburgh, steps were taken for the formation in Edinburgh of a branch of the Kilt Society, a body for the encouragement and the perpetuation of the use of Highland dress. Speakers, in support of the proposal, said there was evidence of a widespread movement in the direction of making the Scottish costume more generally popular.

Starved His Beagles

Frederick Henderson, Master of the Berwick Foot Beagles, was fined \$125 with the alternative of three months' imprisonment, at Berwick, for starving nine beagles.

An inspector found two dead and the skin of another which had apparently been devoured by six others who were in the last stages of emaciation, showing that the dogs had not been fed for weeks.

Bank Clerk's Downfall

Henry Ribton, a clerk in the Bank of Ireland branch, Sligo, pleaded guilty at the Connaught Assizes to the forgery of three promissory notes and was sentenced to twelve months' imprisonment. His lawyer said prisoner was well connected, and his relatives intended sending him to Canada to retrieve his fortunes. His downfall was due to betting. In passing sentence his lordship said the bank had lost over \$3,000 through the prisoner, and all that money had been pocketed by the betting fraternity.

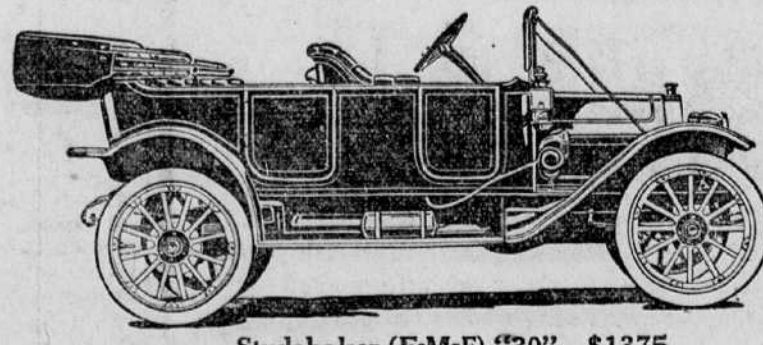

Market Column

DAIRY PRODUCE

BUTTER IS NOT EXPECTED TO GO HIGHER.

Montreal, Feb. 15.—A feature in the butter situation this week is the fact that country holders are enquiring as to whether it is advisable to sell now or wait for a future market. From enquiries made within the past few days it appears that dealers holding butter have not much faith in higher prices, nor do they look for any further decline for fine to finest creamery. The sale is reported of nearly 400 tubs of finest creamery at 28½c, which is the only sale of importance reported this week. Some holders are selling their finest goods to grocers at 29c to 30c in small lots. The range of winter made goods is from 24c to 26c, which figures are not so bad for fodder butter.
The question was asked on Change what Vancouver was doing with her New Zealand butter. 70,000 packages of which, it is said, arrived there within the last three months or thereabouts. A portion of this butter cost 11½d f. o. b. New Zealand, equal to about 26½c or 27c laid down in Vancouver. The June creamery previously held here for the Coast has been ordered to be shipped and we believe has gone forward.
The market presents a strange contrast to that of a year ago, when a good active business was experienced all round with sales of car lots of finest held creamery at 33½c. At the same time dairy butter sold at 29c in round lots.

CHEESE MARKET STEADY.
Montreal, Feb. 15.—The market holds about steady but with no show of activity, cable offers in most instances being not quite up to the ideas of holders. There has been some business, however, on the basis of 12½c to 12½c for Western, a lot of 250 boxes bringing 12½c. Some holders of finest September goods refuse to accept less than 13c, which one holder says will be made before the present month is out.

COUNTRY PRODUCE

PRICE OF EGGS ADVANCE.
Montreal, Feb. 15.—The cold weather during the past week has had the effect of stiffening up the egg market and curtailed the receipts of new laid eggs, prices therefore went up 3c to 3½c for this grade in a wholesale way. There is no question of doubt but that there are plenty of eggs in store, but the consumption for the Lenten season has been very good and stocks have been considerably reduced. Round lots of sets are held at 20c and 21c. There has been quite a demand for No. 1 grade for confectionary purposes at 18c in round lots.

POTATO MARKET QUIET.
Montreal, Feb. 15.—The market is well supplied with potatoes. Several cars of Green Mountains were purchased this week at 70c on track.

DRESSED HOGS FIRM.
Montreal, Feb. 15.—The market for live hogs has been a little stronger owing to light receipts. Packers are paying \$9.25 to \$9.50 per 100 lbs. weighed off cars for choice stock. Dressed hogs are firmer, selling at \$13.25 to \$13.50. Country dressed hogs are worth \$12.25 to \$12.75 per hundred pounds.

THE GRAIN TRADE

MARKET SHOWED A QUIET FEELING DURING WEEK.
Montreal, Feb. 15.—Corn: The market is quiet and lower, old No. 3 Yellow being quoted at 51c and new No. 3 yellow at 50c to 51c.
Oats: The market is quiet, No. 2 C. W. in car lots in store are quoted at 41c, extra No. 1 feed at 40c. No business reported in local oats.
Peas: The market is quiet. No. 2 are quoted at \$1.30. Boiling peas, \$2.35 to \$2.65 per bushel, as to quality. There are buyers of No. 2 at \$1.30 but no offerings. Buyers of boilers at \$2.60 to \$2.65 for choice; but none offered.
Barley: The demand for malting barley is nearly over and we quote 73c to 76c nominally. Feed barley 52c to 54c.
Rye: Exports last week were 25,544. At Western points quotations are 60c to 65c.
Buckwheat: Prices remain nominal at 55c to 58c.
Malt: The market is steady at 92½c to 95c. A lot was sold at 92½c for Eastern shipment.
Hops: The market remains firm. Canadian hops are nominal and quoted at 23c to 24c. B.C. hops 22c to 23c f. o. b. at the Coast. Kent Golden are quoted at 47c; Kent Ordinary 36c to 37c; Bavarian 37c; Bohemian 38c to 39c.
Seeds: The market continues steady and prices are quoted in the West as follows: No. 1 Alsike is quoted at \$11.50 to \$12 per bushel; No. 2 do \$10.50 to \$11; No. 3 do, \$9.50 to \$10; No. 1 timothy \$1.90 to \$2.25 per bushel; No. 2 do \$1.25 to \$1.60. Flax seed \$1.10 to \$1.25. Red Clover seed No. 3 \$7.20.

HAY AND STRAW
LIMITED DEMAND FOR HAY.
Montreal, Feb. 15.—There is still a large quantity of hay on this market for which there is only a limited demand. There is an easy feeling in the trade, but there has been no change in prices. The exports are light, but there is quite a quantity of hay waiting shipment at both Portland and St. John. The advices from the English markets do not report any particular change in prices, but it is said that there is an easier feeling in the Liverpool market, due no doubt to the embargo being taken off Irish hay. Cables from England report prices nearly nominal as follows:
Liverpool 95s to 97s 6d; London 92s 6d to 95s; Bristol 80s. Manchester 100s; Glasgow 90s to 100s as to grade.
It is reported that the embargo on Irish hay was lifted on the first inst. We quote prices more or less nominal as follows:
No. 1 quality \$14.00 to \$14.50; No. 2 extra \$13.00 to \$13.50; No. 2 ordinary \$12.00; No. 3 hay \$10.00 to \$11.00; Clover, as to grade \$10.00 to \$11.00.

At a meeting of the Dunedin Association in the Freemason's Hall, Edinburgh, Sheriff Guy delivered an address on "A Scottish Poet's Corner." He referred to the suggestions made by Mr. William Chambers in his history of St. Giles' that a poet's corner should be set aside in St. Giles' Cathedral similar to that in Westminster Abbey, and advocated that the proposal be carried out.
Lady Chairman for Parish Council
Considerable competition took place at a meeting of the Paisley Parish Council in connection with the appointment of a chairman. No fewer than seven candidates were nominated, and the final vote, which was between Miss Jane Bell and Mr. James Caruth, resulted in the former being returned by fifteen votes to nine.
Widow's 101st Birthday
Stirling possesses a centenarian in Elizabeth Ferguson, a widow, who has celebrated her 101st birthday. She belongs to Linlithgow, but has lived most of her life in Stirling. She has five of a family, three still being alive. Mrs. Ferguson has been confined to bed for some years, but is wonderfully alert in her faculties, and takes an interest in all going on around her.
Twelve-Year Old Hero
A twelve-year-old boy named John Loughran, living at Ship Terrace, Dumbarton, Scotland, was presented with a Royal Humane Society's certificate, and a silver watch and cheque for £25 from the Carnegie Hero Fund trustees, in recognition of his bravery in rescuing a father and his four-year-old daughter from drowning in the River Leven. Loughran had been instrumental in saving four lives previously in Belfast and one in Port Glasgow.

News and Newslets From Great Britain

Golf Caddies' Future

Middlesex Educational Authority agreed to contribute \$300 towards the cost of classes in market gardening and carpentry for caddies at Hanger Hill and Stanmore golf links.

Memorial to King Edward

A memorial bust of King Edward by Sir George Frampton, R.A., was unveiled at Bolton, Lancashire, by the mayor. A nurses' home, to cost \$55,000, is also part of the memorial scheme.

Crack Shot at Eighty-two

Mr. James Tyler, of Aveley, Essex, who is eighty-two years of age, was challenged to shoot two rabbits out of three. Accepting the challenge with alacrity the old man bowled over his three and hit a fourth.

Poor Sells Some Estates

About 1,171 acres of Lord Cottenham's Ridley estates in Cheshire, including some of the best dairy farms in the county, were sold at Crewe. The total realised by the sale was \$279,450.

"Peculiar People" Reunite

After twenty years' separation the two sections of the Peculiar People sect of rural and metropolitan Essex, the Harrodites and the Tansleyites, have sunk their differences and become reunited.

Blind Without Knowing It

During the hearing of a workman's compensation claim at Southport, Mr. Edgar Stephenson said he knew of a man being blind from birth in one eye without knowing it for forty years. He was very much surprised when he found he could not see with one of his eyes.

Tombstone as Weather Prophet

Upton, near Peterborough, one of the smallest parishes in England, numbering only fourteen houses, possesses a mysterious tombstone of black marble, which emits a damp ooze in patches when it is about to rain. It is regarded in the village as an infallible barometer.

Spoil Sport from London Town

A Hertfordshire pack of beagles was following a hare near Hertford, and the hounds were within fifty yards of their quarry, when a London sportsman shot the animal and called gleefully to the followers, "I have shot your hare," as the hunters turned sorrowfully homewards.

Blackbird with Gold Ring

William Best, a farmer living near Ballyconnell, Ireland, shot a blackbird, which had a gold ring on one of its legs. The ring bore some initials which were un decipherable. It is believed that the bird was a pet, and that the ring was placed on its leg for the purpose of identification.

Peril of Neglected Teeth

Septic pneumonia, caused by abscesses in the sockets of his teeth, was described at a Westminster inquest as the cause of death of Arthur John Cheesman, a butcher. The coroner commented on the danger of neglecting teeth, and said disease of the teeth sockets had been found to account for many hitherto mysterious blood complaints.

Poachers Fire at Magistrate

Mr. John Shiel, justice of the peace, was fired at by poachers, whom he found shooting at Carnlough, on the borders of the counties of Roscommon and Galway, Ireland. Mr. Shiel discovered four men with guns and dogs. He called on them to stop, but they ran off, and he gave chase. Four shots were fired, some of the shot piercing the magistrate's clothes.

Cook's Son and Duke's Son

Sir James Sievwright, of Tulliallan, opened a bazaar in the Drill Hall, Lochelly, Scotland, on behalf of the Lochelly Curling Club and Tennis Club. Quaint Ceremony in Buddhist Temple Near Tokio

A five days' festival was held in Japan in celebration of the anniversary of the death of Keizaru Daishu, the founder of the Soto sect, one of the most important offshoots of Buddhism in Japan. The sect, which claims to be the most profound of all sects, aims entirely at salvation by the elimination of self.

On the last day of the festival was performed the rare ceremony of "amondo." In the Sojji Temple 700 priests assembled and the Lord Abbot, wearing a gorgeous dress and carrying a short thick stick, presided over the supreme ceremony.
Before him knelt 150 priests, who desired promotion in the sect. The first priest approached and, bending his head before the Lord Abbot, submitted to him the question which had resulted from his period of meditation, "What would be the color of the maple leaves in the mountains?"

Up went the right arm of the Lord Abbot. Down came the stick on the shoulders of the candidate. "My son, their color would be redder than the tints of the flowers in Mar." Up again went the arm, down again came the stick and the candidate retired.

The second candidate then advanced and bowed before the Lord Abbot. "What," he said in a piping voice, "should we do to escape the heat of summer and the cold in winter?" Down came the stick with a smart crack. "Go where there is neither heat nor cold, neither summer nor winter."

In rapid succession the other candidates followed, the beating with the stick being regarded as a test whether candidates were capable of undergoing hardships in the cause of Buddha.

KING GEORGE AND BIBLE

General Booth Anticipates Splendid Results From Royal Example

General Bramwell Booth, in an interview published in the "War Cry," refers to the King's promise to Queen Alexandra in 1881 that he would read a chapter of the Bible daily, and to the fact that he has ever since adhered to his promise.

stitute recently. The gas to be analyzed is placed in a tube and the pressure almost to the vanishing point. An electric discharge is sent through the tube, and by delicate magnetic and electrical devices the paths of the particles of the different gases are separated, each gas being made to write its own tale on a photographic plate.

In his investigations the lecturer got two lines on his photographs which corresponded to no known constituents of the atmosphere. The gas obtained from the heavier constituents of "liquid air," if an element, promises to introduce a disturbing element into chemical science, for if the periodic law is accepted, as chemists accept it, no provision is made for any such body.

The second gas, provisionally spoken of as X3, is obtained in very small but apparently undiminished quantity by bombarding metal with electric rays under very slow atmospheric pressure. Sir J. J. Thomson has been able to secure only a cubic millimetre of it in two months, and at present can express no opinion upon its exact nature. It is interesting to learn that the source from which he obtained it best was from a piece of lead several hundred years old from the roof of Trinity College
