CAUCHON IN WITH LARGE MAJORITY. THREE VOTES FINISH THE "GAGNIER ERA"

77 PER CENT OF VOTERS CAST BALLOTS. CAUCHON WINS IN ALL WARDS. PILON, MARCIL IN.

With 77 per cent of the eligible voters going to the polls last Monday, January 25th, Mr. Robert Cauchon, former Liberal M.P. and Mayor of Valleyfield from 1944 to 1948, was elected Mayor of this city for the second time in his career with an overwhelming majority of 831 votes.

As soon as the results from the 36 different polls throughout the city started coming in, shortly after 6 p.m., it became apparent that Maurice Perron, the opposing candidate, would not make the grade. Mr. Cauchon obtained a majority in every ward.

A much closer race was run between Delphis Gagnier, who was seeking re-election, and Charlemagne Pilon, in the Belleve East Ward. Mr. Pilon won with a total of three votes. Voting for Pilon were 630 electors and voting for Gagnier were 627. At time of writing Mr. Gagnier had stated he did not plan

a recount. This brings to an end Mr. Gagnier's career as alderman after having occupied a council seat for 19 years. His upset comes as a surprise to many people who felt it would almost be impossible to unseat Valleyfield's most infamous and controversial alderman who said "NO" to more things at council meeting than any other council-member.

In the Maisonneuve ward Albert Marcil, who was seeking re-election for his council seat, won easily over his opponent Antonio Asselin with 580 votes against 461.

Yesterday morning, Tuesday, Mayor Cauchon and all the aldermen were sworn in at a short ceremony at City Hall. Afterwards Mr. Cauchon personally interviewed and spoke to all the City Hall employees and asked them for their cooperation in bringing about a sound and efficient administration. In a short

speech in a jam packed conference room on the third floor at City Hall on Monday night, after his victory had been announced, Mr. Cauchon thanked the population for their show

of confidence and asked for cooperation and unity to help bring progress and welfare to Valleyfield.

For those who like figures and statistics we have the following information concerning voting by ward:

In Salaberry Ward 469 (70%) of eligible voters went to the polls. 238 voted for Cauchon, 231 for Perron (7 majority); Maisonneuve Ward 1001 (83%) voted. 571 for Cauchon, 430 Per-

NICHOLS CHEMICAL WORKER'S OUTSTANDING SAFETY RECORD

An outstanding safety record of almost half a million manhours worked without a disabling injury earned a special safety "Award of Merit" for employees of Valleyfield Works of Nichols Chemical Company, Limited.

The award, a bronze plaque, was presented to the Chemical Plant personnel on January 22nd by Nichols' United States affiliate, General Chemical Division, Allied Chemical Corp., which operates more than forty plants in this country and the United States.

The award is the first of a series of three which the parent company presents to employees for working a pre-established number of manhours without a disabling injury. Other awards,

for records of long duration, are the "Division Award" and the "President's Award".

The plaque was presented at a dinner-dance sponsored by Valleyfield Works Employees Association, at Tougas and Nicholson Hall. More than 235 employees and their wives attended.

The plaque was presented to W. R. Dickie, Works Superintendent, by George L. Hero of General Chemical's Safety Department. Mr. Dickie, in turn, presented it to J. P. Dupont, President Local 337, I. C. W. U., on behalf of the employees. Mr. J. R. Edmonds, Product Manager, New York Office, also congratulated employees on their excellent safety record.

Commemorative pens were presented to the employees, and aerosol perfume to their wives.

The local winter employment campaign committees are doing the proper thing in inviting the citizens of Valleyfield, Beauharnois and Chateauguay to also be critical of outmoded habit, custom and tradition and to carry out this winter all of those projects usually held over to the spring and summer. The creating of employment for workers in the winter months results in a saving in welfare costs to the community, which in the end is a saving for you.

More winter employment means more pay cheques — and a more prosperous community.

Next Monday night will be Mothers' March on Polio night in Montreal and in many other communities such as Chateauguay.

Thousands of mothers and co-workers will set out at 7 p.m. on Monday, Feb. 1, to call at homes in their neighbourhood as part of their campaign against

a crippling disease, poliomyelitis.

GERARD BRUCHESI REPORTS From Ottawa

(We are pleased to introduce the first of a series of regular reports on events and developments in Parliament at Ottawa written especially for the SUN by our Member of Parliament, Mr. Gerard Bruchesi — EDITOR).

About a week ago the new session of Parliament got underway and after a very colorful opening ceremony at which His Excellency, Governor General G.P. Vanier read the Speech from the Throne the Right Honourable John Diefenbaker and the leader of the opposition Lester B. Pearson prepared for the debate ahead, which will no doubt touch on many controversial issues. Much new legislation has been promised and will come up later in the session. One of the highlights will be the introduction of a Canadian Bill of Rights. It is expected that this will lead to a very controversial and interesting debate.

Another Bill of vital importance to all Canadians will allow the amendment of the Ca-

nadian Constitution without approval by the British Parliament. This will be a milestone in Canadian history and will require a great deal of discussion and consultation between all Provincial Governments.

A promise which was made by Mr. Diefenbaker during the last two electoral campaigns will also be carried out. This concerns the creation of a Royal Commission, similar to one which was very successful in the United States, which will make a very thorough investigation into every governmental department. The duty of this commission will be to make recommendations regarding the efficiency of the various departments and ways and means by which operations can be made more economical.

As the session continues, I will keep passing along detailed information on these and any other bills of interest to my constituents. The session so far, has busied itself mainly with the reply to the Speech from the Throne.

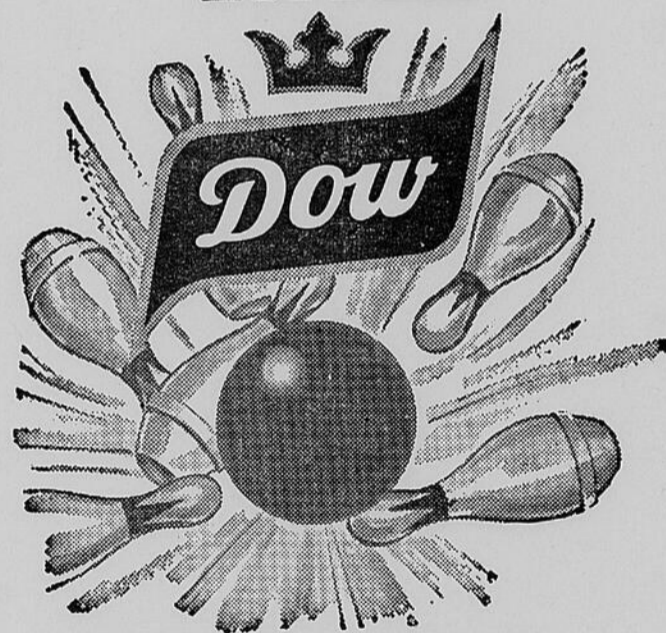

(From page 2) ne that will aid the diagnosis of heart conditions for the Mont-

real Children's Hospital; a gift of six wheelchairs for the School for Crippled Children; sundry items for the Alexandra Hospital including sterilizers, tables, ward- robes, chairs for polio patients and an emergency Aspirator; and a Centrifuge, required to make frozen plasma for the treatment of haemophiliacs, at a cost of \$2,000, for the Red Cross Blood Donor Service. These are just a few of the items which Quebec Juniors are planning to supply with funds raised in energetic drives now synonymous with their efforts.

As their own special contribution to World Refugee Year, Canadian, Junior Red Cross, is launching in February a vast national appeal for \$150,000 to give assistance to needy refugee children throughout the world. Under this scheme, an attempt is being made to tackle the problem of rehabilitation of 40 million refugees from Korea to Central Europe. Over 4 million of these refugees are children under the age of sixteen.

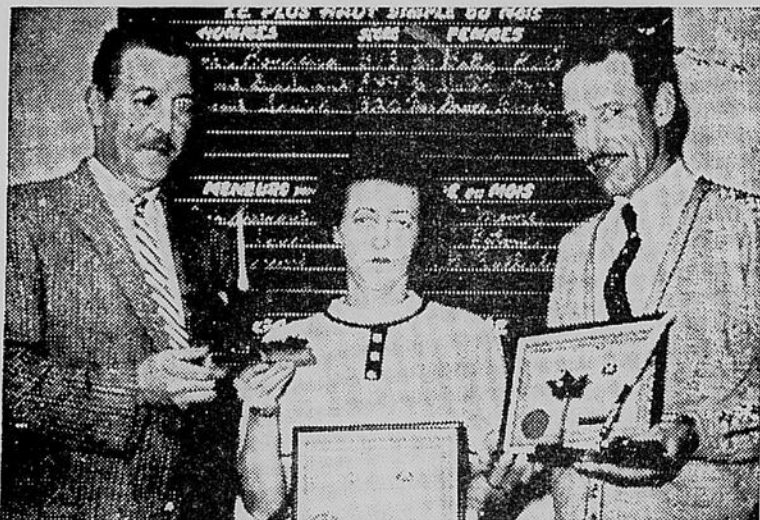
Another way in which Quebec Juniors are helping members of their community, with particular

attention to the sick, needy and handicapped, is in the case of cerebral palsied victims of disease. In school workshops, Junior Red Cross members manufacture Crab crutches, number and peg boards, pedal footholders, dressing aids such as button, buckle and zipper boards, kindergarten chairs with arms, Laurentian chairs on platforms, stringing and tumbling blocks. They are guided by skilled instructors who not only teach the Juniors an important handicraft, but also encourage a sense of responsibility to the community.

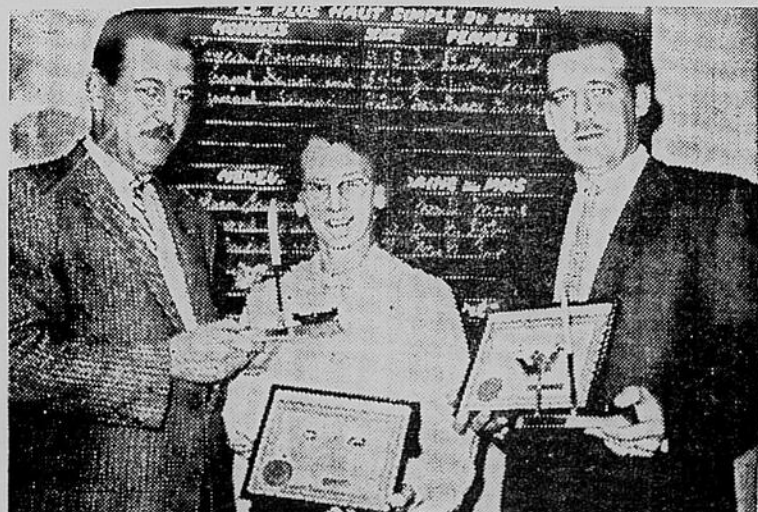

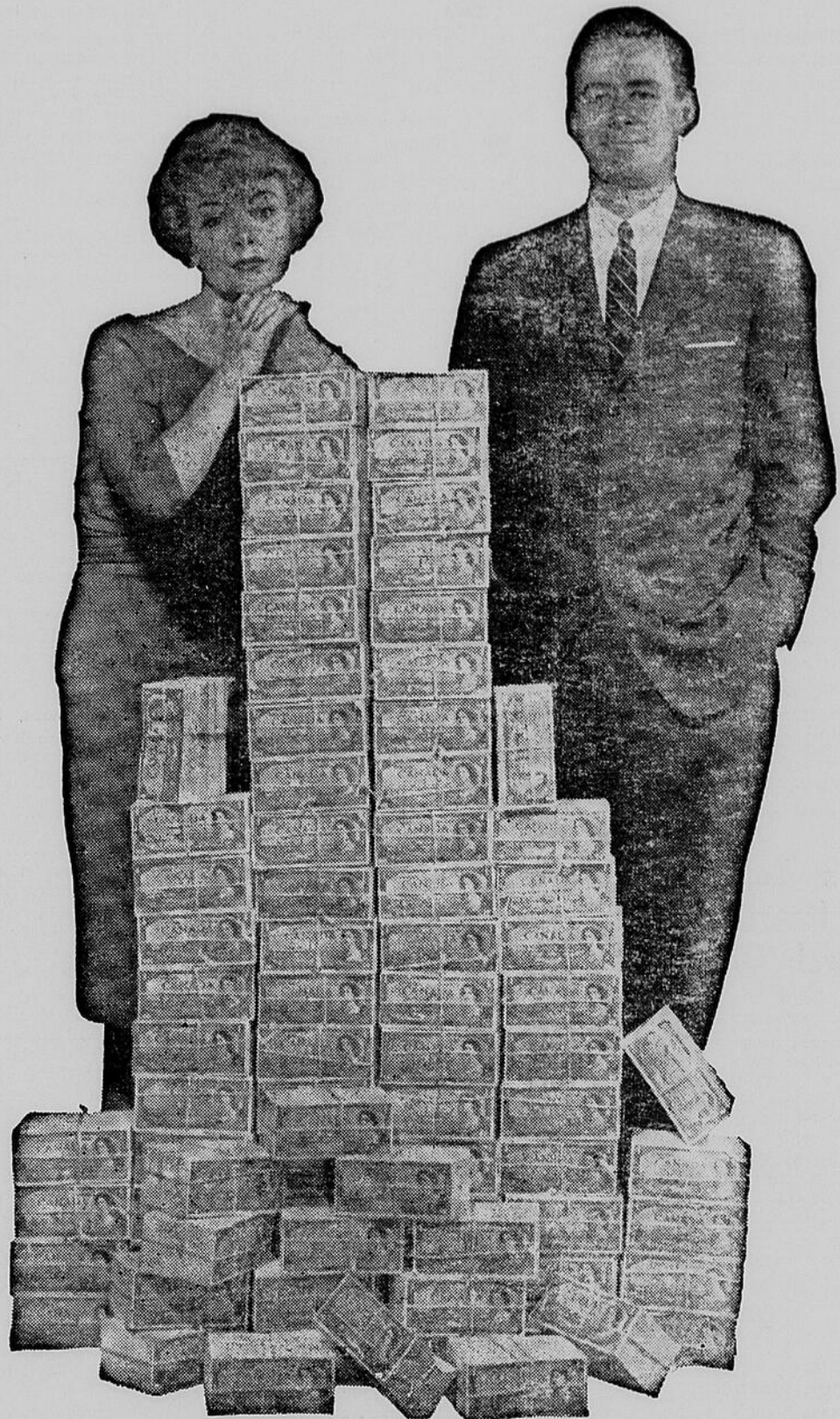
