FIELD MARSHAL HAIG IS BATTERING AWAY IN THE YPRES SECTOR—SEVERAL VILLAGES TAKEN AND HUN LINE IS PENETRATED—OBJECTIVE OF ALLIES IS APPARENT — GERMANS COULD NOT STAY BRITISH ADVANCE — ANOTHER PEACE OFFER FROM CENTRAL POWERS IS EXPECTED.

The big fight is on again in Flanders, and the Germans are being hammered hard. Field Marshal Haig is battering away on the sector east and north-east of Ypres, while French troops have joined up with the British left wing to the south of Dixmude in an endeavor to bring that section of the line even with the sharp wedge that has been driven into the German front by Haig east of Broodseinde.

Launching their attacks simultaneously Tuesday morning both armies had been rewarded with goodly gains before nightfall, in addition to having inflicted heavy casualties on the Germans and taking many of their men prisoner. Prior to the announcement of the commencement of the attack there had been no intimation that the Frenchmen were ready for an advance. In fact it had been rather expected that even the British commander-in-chief would delay in taking the aggressive again for several days owing to the terrible condition of the ground he is in quest of—a veritable marsh owing to the heavy rains of Sunday and Monday.

With apparent ease the Frenchmen crossed the flooded Broenbeek and Jansbeek rivers and captured the villages of St. Jean De Maugelare and Veldhoek, together with numerous blockhouses and made prisoner of several hundred Germans. The advance of the French was over a front of more than a mile and a half and they penetrated the German line to a depth of one and a quarter miles.

Haig's principal offensive centred on the portions of the Passchendele-Gheluvelt ridge still held by the Germans, being directed eastward from Poelcapelle, which was captured, and north-eastward from Broodseinde toward Passchendele. The ultimate objective still being the Ostend-Lille road. Taken as a whole, the joint action makes more apparent the crowning desire of the Allies in this region—the forcing back of the Germans to points where their evacuation of Ostend and Zeebrugge, naval and submarine bases on the North Sea, will become necessary.

At several points Haig's advance was sharply contested by the Germans—particularly north of Broodseinde, the nearest approach to the railroad line and near the Polderhoek chateau. Nowhere, however, were the Germans able to stay the advance, except near the Polderhoek chateau, where the terrific fire of their machine guns momentarily forced the British to give ground. Later, the troops realigned themselves and the successful push went on again.

Aside from Flanders the operations in all the various theatres of the war are of minor character. Along the Aisne and Champagne front and on the left bank of the Meuse in the Verdun sector intensive artillery duels are still in progress between the French and Germans. In Champagne, the French have carried out a successful raid near the Butte de Tahure, and taken prisoners.

There is still considerable infantry and artillery activity between the Russians and Germans in the sector of the Riga front but neither side has made any attempt at an advance. Reciprocal bombardments are in progress between the Italians and Austrians on the Austro-Italian front and between the Entente forces and the Teutonic allies in Macedonia.

Another Austro-German peace offer which is to be based on the terms of no territorial aggrandizement, the surrender of Belgian and French territory, the renunciation of territorial acquisitions for money payments and no indemnity by either side in soon to be put forward, according to a prominent Berlin newspaper.

But political parties disclaim any knowledge of any arrangement for the appearance of Australian speakers in the approaching election.

CANADA KNOWS HOW TO HANDLE I.W.W. MEN.

Winnipeg, October 9.—Belief that prompt action on the part of the immigration officials alone prevented I. W. W. strife in Canada is strengthened by recent developments at Yorkton, where five members of that organization have been jailed.

All the men carried I. W. W. literature and badges, and were found to have entered Canada illegally, according to a communication filed with J. P. Bruce Walker, Commissioner of Immigration.

They will be deported from the country after serving one month in jail.

DOES NOT BELIEVE MONTREAL ON VERGE OF BANKRUPTCY

SIR LOMER GOUIN SAYS MONTREAL IS RICHEST CITY IN CANADA.

Montreal, Oct. 9.—"I do not believe that Montreal is bankrupt, or on the verge of bankruptcy; nor do I believe that you should spread such report broadcast. When Montreal is bankrupt, Canada will be bankrupt. Montreal is the richest city in Canada." Thus spoke Sir Lomer Gouin, Premier of the province of Quebec, in this city today, when waited upon by the Citizens Association with a request that the Premier take the government of Montreal out of the hands of Board of Control and City Council and appoint a commission of nineteen representative citizens, these, in turn, to appoint and have control of five managers of the city for a term of five years.

The Board of Trade recently decided to ask Premier Gouin to name a commission of five to govern this city for a limited time, say five years.

BIG POSITIONS ARE GIVEN AWAY

HON. FRANK COCHRANE NOMINATED CHAIRMAN OF CANADIAN NORTHERN.

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—Big positions in the gift of the government are being assigned to prominent politicians these days.

There is a steady stream of important appointments since dissolution. The appointment of Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways and Canals, to the chairmanship of the directorate of the Canadian Northern Railway under government ownership is expected immediately. Hon. W. J. Roche, Minister of the Interior, was appointed today as chairman of the Civil Service Commission. The other members are Clarence Jameson, ex-M.P., and Dr. M. G. LaRoche, Lt.-Col. Angus McLean, of Charlottetown, member for Queens in the late parliament, has been named Controller of the North West Mounted Police. The position which has been vacant for a long time was formerly held by Col. Fred White, C.M.G., who retired on superannuation. Sir George Perley, who is slated for the High Commissioner, will be officially named to it in a few days. Whether his position as Overseas Minister will be filled by Sir Edward Kemp, who has been tendered it, is still uncertain and dependent somewhat upon the shuffle which on general lines is in progress.

EXPLANATION OF
CLASS ONE LIMIT
MILITARY SERVICE COUNCIL
MAKES ANNOUNCEMENT TO
CLEAR UP CONFUSION.
Ottawa, Oct. 9.—To clear up confusion with regard to the limit of Class One, which is to be called on by proclamation for service under the Military Service Act, the 15th instant, the following announcement is made by the Military Service Council:
"For convenience, Class One is frequently spoken of as comprising unmarried men and widowers with out children between the ages of 20 and 34. It is to be noted, however, that under the provisions of the statute the method of fixing these two limits is different. As far as concerns the age of 20, the date of the proclamation governs. Any man who, on that date, has reached the age of twenty years, is within the class. With regard to the limit of 34 years, this is fixed by reference to the first of January, 1917. Any man who had not reached the age of 34 years before that date is within the class. It is to be noted also that, for the purposes of the Act, any man married after the 6th of July, 1917, is to be deemed to be unmarried."

PROCLAMATION UNDER
MILITARY SERVICE ACT.
Ottawa, Oct. 9.—On October 13th a proclamation will be issued notifying all men in Class I, under the Military Service Act, that within a specified time they are either to report for military service or to file a claim for exemption. This class includes those who have attained the age of 20 years and those who were born not earlier than the year 1893, and are unmarried or are widowers but have no children. A delay of three or four weeks will be granted to enable men to claim exemption if they so desire, and it

IRISH CONVENTION.

One striking point in connection with the Irish situation was the decision to keep the discussions of the Irish Convention private. For many years Ireland has suffered from speechifying, and when speeches led to trouble, speeches were required to remove the trouble. So accustomed had the Irish become to the "talk" system that it was freely predicted at the commencement that the Irish convention would drop ashamedly over a cliff of silence in a very short space of time, but the very opposite has happened. The doubts and fears, the open fears and the silent contempt have changed to quiet respect and subdued hope, and on each occasion when from out the regent "dome of silence" there issues the official bulletin of the day's proceeding, the fact becomes more apparent that Irishmen can discuss satisfactorily matters affecting their own interests. If proof were required of the salutary effect of the convention's silent progress, it is to be found in the Sinn Fein camp.

Several of the prominent released prisoners have been quietly rearrested on charges of seditious speeches or of drilling in defiance of the Realm Act. In two cases the sentences were two years and 18 months imprisonment, without hard labor, respectively. Mr. McDonagh, the rebel leader, was recently arrested on a charge of having delivered a seditious speech. Mr. John McNeill, one of the leaders of the Sinn Fein movement, who is reputed to have seriously affected the extent of the rebellion at the last moment, and who was regarded by many as a traitor to the Sinn Fein movement, has now come forward with a contribution to an English paper, the English Review, in connection with Sinn Fein ideals, and that the red revolution policy has been seriously reduced by the silent convention, is evident from the editor's foreword. "Readers will now see that there is nothing 'treasonable' in the aspirations of Sinn Fein, and that the way of reconciliation and construction lies in the spirit of the age. "Professor de Valera has not been much in evidence of late, and when last heard of preferred to leave a statement of policy until the situation appeared suitable for a policy to be considered with a view to putting it into effect. With the rapidly growing impression that the convention will produce a scheme of dominion government to which Ulster will consent, the absence of any necessity for red revolution or an independent Irish republic becomes apparent, and it does not appear that Sinn Fein has anything to offer in the way of an alternative. It looks therefore as if the policy of hatred of England has shot its bolt, and that its victims will be ready to accept what the convention offers.

Regarding the seizure of arms the general feeling in national circles appears to be one of antagonism and nervousness, while in other circles there is a faint flicker of hope that at last the premium on disloyalty is being withdrawn. There are all sorts of rumors afloat to the effect that large bodies of troops are being sent to Ireland, that many armored motor cars are there, that conscription is to be enforced, and many other probably fanciful stories. That the talk of conscription is however, not regarded as entirely fanciful, is clear from a leader in the Freeman's Journal, which speaks of a campaign of the die-hard press in favor of conscription in Ireland, and says that if trouble arose in Ireland the conscriptionists would gladly seize the opportunity. It then says that trouble may be manufactured by a provocative administration or by its agents. It sees in the seizure of arms an attempt to worry constitutional nationalists into antagonism and revolt. The Journal does not lose the opportunity of pointing the moral for those who are engaged in an effort to destroy the Irish party, and who, by their acts and speeches, are only assisting in the conscriptionists' plans. The Irish Nation says that prior to the outbreak in 1798, provocative tactics were pursued by the then executive authorities, until the Irish people were goaded into rebellion, and were then crushed into subjection in the most atrocious manner. "The lessons of the past should be heeded," says this paper, "and the nation should keep calm, even if greater provocation is given. Go ahead quietly and calmly with the work of the organization and keep cool."

The Irish convention has announced on several occasions that it has devoted itself to the consideration of system of self-government based on the dominion scheme, and

as there are no official reports of disturbances, it may be assumed that the trend of thought is in the direction of such a settlement. The trend of opinion outside the convention is, at any rate, in this direction. The Dundalk Democrat believes that such a scheme would sweep the country, despite the Republican froth. Colonel Lynch, M.P., states that the dominion scheme would satisfy the aspirations of all but the most extreme section, meaning the people who talk of rebellion, etc.

FIRE LOSSES.

The fire losses in the United States and Canada during the month of August, 1917, as compiled from the carefully kept records of the Journal of Commerce and Commercial Bulletin of New York, aggregated \$21,751,100 as compared with \$16,148,050 in July and \$10,745,000 in August of last year. The heavy August record was in a considerable way due to the excessive oil fires in the Southwest and the large munition plant loss in Canada. The losses for the first eight months of 1917 therefore reached a total of \$180,515,875, as compared with \$169,535,220 for the same months of 1916, and \$111,464,900 in 1915. The following table gives a comparison of the losses by months for the first eight months of this year with those of 1916:

CANADA'S FINANCES.

The Minister of Finance has issued a statement of the finances of the Dominion for the first half of the fiscal year which ended on Sept. 30. He considers it very satisfactory. Receipts from all sources show an increase, over the corresponding period last year, of \$24,000,000, while payment on ordinary and capital account, including increased interest and pension charges are \$1,800,000 less than last year. The net result apart from war expenditure shows an improvement of \$25,000,000 over the first half of the year 1916-17. During the six months under review the surplus of revenue over capital and ordinary expenditure amounted to \$65,000,000, which was devoted to war expenditure.

PEACE AND MATERIALITY.

Peace and materiality are antithetical. To suppose that peace can be found in matter is to mistake the very nature of the latter. Peace, it is obvious, is an abstract mental condition. Matter is either a subjective condition of the human mind, or is the expression of some force of energy existing independently of that mind. Indeed, according to the theory of pure materialism, mind is something existing in and dependent on matter. In any case, then, if one or another of the conflicting explanations of human philosophy is to be accepted, a man's peace of mind is at the mercy of matter. For, even if the teaching of the Idealist is accepted, a material or mortal mind, which weaves the flux of matter, has itself woven a condition of struggle in which peace is inconceivable.

In a condition of perfect mental harmony there cannot, of course, be any such manifestation as war. But in that stage of relative human harmony which a man enters upon, as he battles out of material night into spiritual day, he comes face to face with conditions with respect to which he must take his stand. Neutrality toward evil is a scientific impossibility. In such circumstances, the man who understands something of Principle must take his stand in the ranks of those whose course is nearest to Principle. Those who judge merely as the world judges will take sides, of course, in accordance with their attachment to or detachment from matter. Such wars, in the state of the world's spiritual progress, are inevitable. The thoroughgoing materialist is bound to take up arms, as the only way, he understands, of gaining his object. The Idealist is bound to oppose him with the sword, for the simple reason that he knows no better way of preventing the triumph of unrestrained evil. Of course, if enough people understood Jesus' teaching, their perception of the unreality of matter would make strife of every kind impossible. But Jesus himself did not pretend that the gaining of spiritual peace was to be achieved without his own struggle—the struggle with the senses. "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid."

How does the world give peace? Any one who has ever considered the

question must know. Through that very case in the senses which makes matter doubly real, and so rivets the belief of materiality, with all its inherent inharmonies, more than ever firmly upon its victim. This was not Jesus' way. He took his disciples from their homes. He made them strangers, so to speak, to their kindred. He made them outcasts whom the world was willing to despise and persecute. But he taught them how to prove the nothingness of these very trials; how to heal the sick and raise the dead; how to become fishers of men instead of fishermen. That was the peace which Jesus gave to them. The peace of Spirit which no suggestion of matter could disturb. War was to go out of their consciousness, even out of that of the turbulent Peter, because materiality, the father of all inharmonies, had been destroyed. And there was to reign instead, "the peace of God, which passeth all understanding."

TRADES UNION CONGRESS IS HELD AT BERNE.

No English Nor French Delegates Present — Send Letter Protesting German Methods.

Berne, Switzerland (Friday) — Neither English nor French trade unionists are attending the conference of the International Federation of Trade Unions now in session here. The object of the conference was to discuss matters affecting trade unions, but a somewhat stormy scene was provoked by a letter read to the conference from the English Federation of Trade Unions, announcing its refusal to sit in conference with Germans, while German armies remained in occupied territories. As a justification for this attitude, it was declared that Germany provoked this war for conquest, and stress was laid on submarine warfare, sinking of hospital ships and other German war methods which were described as breaches of the Hague Convention. Great indignation was expressed by German delegates like Herr Bauer, member of the general committee of German Trade Unions, who declared Germany today was only defending her own soil. The conference, after a prolonged discussion has declared itself unable to allocate the responsibility of the peoples and governments for the present war, and its consequences, whilst in regard to the proposal for transferring the international center of trade unions from Berlin to some neutral state, it was agreed to leave this question to another conference, but to confirm Amsterdam as provisional headquarters of the secretary of the federation. The proposal for transfer was supported by the Swiss delegates.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be, a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties: Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties: Reside six months in each of three years after earning the homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

BRITISH ADVANCE
NEARLY TWO MILES
IN NEW BIG DRIVECOMPLETE CAPTURE OF POEL
CAPELLE—OVER 1,000 PRISONERS TAKEN.

London, Oct. 9.—The British troops have effected the complete capture of Poelcapelle and have advanced nearly two miles to the north-west of that village in their drive in Flanders today. According to the report from Field Marshal Haig tonight the British operations were very successful. All objectives have been gained and the number of prisoners already exceeds 1,000.

The text of the communication follows:

"A heavy rain fell mostly during the afternoon and evening of yesterday, causing the ground to become soggy and very difficult for the passage of troops.

"Notwithstanding the stormy weather and the waterlogged condition of the ground our troops succeeded in launching an attack at 8:30 o'clock this morning, in conjunction with the French on our left, with very successful results.

"The front of the attack extended from a point south-east of Broodseinde to St. Janneke, one mile to the north-east of Bixschotte. On the extreme right the Australian troops moved forward over the crest of the ridge east and north-east of Broodseinde securing them their objectives.

"On the right center a third line territorial division comprising Manchester, East Lancashire and Lancashire Fusilier regiments advanced one mile northward along the ridge in the direction of Passchendaele, capturing all its objectives under the most trying and difficult circumstances with great determination and gallantry.

"In the centre between the main ridge and Poelcapelle a considerable advance was made, which includes the capture of many fortified farms and concentrated redoubts.

"On the left centre we have completed the capture of Poelcapelle.

"On the extreme left of the British attack, English, Welsh and Irish troops and the Guards have taken all their objectives and gained the outskirts of the forest of Houtholst, nearly two miles north-north-west of Poelcapelle.

"On our left flank the French crossed the Broenbeck stream, which is in flood, and also gained the outskirts of the forest of Houtholst, capturing all their objectives.

"More than a thousand prisoners already have passed into the collection stations."

"Aviation: The weather was even more unfavorable for flying on Monday than on the previous days. Much work was done, however, in aerial reconnaissance and some artillery work was carried out. Two enemy machines were driven down out of control. Ground targets also were attacked with machine gun fire. Two of our airplanes are missing."

RECRUITING FIGURES
FOR CAN. FORCES.

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—An interesting statement giving figures for recruiting and wastage in the Canadian expeditionary forces during the eight months from January to August, inclusive, has just been issued by the Militia Department. The statement, which is a detailed one, shows that in the eight months a total of 49,176 men enlisted in the C. E. F., of which number 12,431 joined the ranks of the infantry. During the same period the wastage of men from various causes totalled 91,804, leaving a net loss to the C. E. F. for the eight months of 42,628 men.

LAURIER RECEIVES
TORONTO LIBERALSHE IS FEELING THE POLITICAL
PULSE OF RURAL ONTARIO.

Toronto, Oct. 9.—Seated in a room of the King Edward Hotel, Sir Wilfrid Laurier is today feeling the political pulse of rural Ontario. That is really all that can be said about his visit; that is the full sum and substance of its significance—at least on the surface.

The Liberal chief passed through the rotunda of the hotel, crowded with little broken groups of talking Liberals, shortly before 11 o'clock and entered his room. A pilgrimage immediately began from the rotunda to the second floor, Liberal candidates from all over the province being admitted to the presence of their leader.

One fact does seem clear, namely, that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, if he ever had any intention of resigning, and this is denied by the corridor haunters, has now given up any such idea. One prominent and well-informed Liberal told the Star today that he was not going to resign.

"It would not be merely a Liberal calamity; it would be a national calamity if Sir Wilfrid Laurier withdrew," remarked another enthusiastic follower.

Of union government and the effect Laurier's decision to remain as leader will have on the negotiations, no one will speak.

After lunching at the Ontario Club today, Sir Wilfrid Laurier this afternoon continued to receive candidates and delegations of leading Liberal executive heads, including one from North York and another from London. Among the candidates who conferred with him today were: A. B. McCoig, Chatham; William German, Welland; Dr. J. P. Rankin, Stratford; Thomas McMillan, Seaford; George S. Gillivray, London; J. M. Ross, Lucan; Fred. Hogg, North Ontario; M. S. Spell, South Oxford; J. M. Hazlewood, North Wellington; W. C. Kennedy, Windsor; W. G. Charlton, Aylmer; William Tolmie, East Elgin; Adam Thompson, Galt; and W. D. Gregory, Halton.

Others who came to pay their respects were: C. M. Bowman, M.P.; D. B. White and D. S. Pratt, Midland; H. B. McGowan; Alex. Smith, Ottawa, chief Liberal organizer; Geo. Thomas, Henry Lally, Bracebridge; W. S. Ormishaw, Uxbridge; F. L. Fowke, ex-M.P.P., Ottawa, and a number of Toronto men including P. C. Kirkes, C. W. Kerr, W. P. Orr, Alderman MacGuire, Alderman Ramaden and many others.

Hon. George P. Graham and F. F. Pardee, Chief Liberal Whip, are still in the city.

HUN PEACE MOVE.

Amsterdam, October 9.—Chancellor Michaelis, in an address to the Reichstag main committee yesterday, as reported in Berlin despatches, replied to the charge that officials had undertaken propaganda for the new Fatherland party, which is carrying on a movement in favor of a "German peace." The Chancellor laid down the principle, which applies to Prussian officials as well as those connected with the Imperial government, that all are free in their present opinion and are permitted to belong to any party so long as the Empire is not endangered thereby.

In their present activities, officials should observe reticence so that the public may not lose faith in their impartiality. To force or induce subordinates to adopt an attitude in favor of any party, the Chancellor continued, would be to abuse official positions. This will not be permitted. The Chancellor said, and obedience to this principle will be enforced in cases brought to his attention.

As regards the army, the Chancellor said, all the propaganda will be excluded. After the Chancellor's speech the committee adopted a supplementary budget for the office of Vice-Chancellor, only the Social Democrats voting against it. The session was attended by Vice-Chancellor Helfferich, Foreign Secretary Kuhlmann, and Vice-Admiral von Capelle, Minister of the Navy.

ONCE HOME IN
ELEVEN YEARS.

Toronto, Oct. 9.—After a brief visit to his home in Toronto, Lieut-Col. Garnet W. Denison, son of Col. G. T. Denison, Police Magistrate, left last evening to return to the battle front. He had forty-two days leave of absence and this was his first visit to his home in eleven years, during all of which time he has been on service in the Imperial Army.

FOR BATTERY.

In the Woman's Home Companion C. H. Claudy, the automobile expert, says:

"There is only one kind of water to use in a storage battery; that is distilled water. No other water of any character will do. The animal and vegetable matter, as well as mineral, which is in all other water is very injurious to a storage battery. Only distilled water, which can be bought from druggists in bottles, should ever be used to replace water evaporated from a storage battery."

HAWAII WOMEN
AND SUFFRAGEQUESTION RAISED OF HOW
MEASURE EXTENDING THE
FRANCHISE WOULD BE RE-
GARDED EITHER BY PEOPLE
OR THE LEGISLATURE.

Honolulu Hawaii, Oct. 8.—Now that the United States Senate has passed Senator Shafroth's bill authorizing the Hawaiian Legislature to grant suffrage to women property owners and those who are otherwise equally qualified with the male population to vote at the polls in Hawaiian territorial elections, the question arises as to how such a measure will be looked upon by the women of Hawaii, and how it would be dealt with in the territorial Legislature.

Whether the women of Hawaii are ready for the vote, and whether they want it or not, is another question and, at the present time, is a matter of conjecture. When the news of the passage of Senator Shafroth's bill reached Honolulu, the opinion that any bill which gives suffrage only to those women who hold property would be quickly turned down in the territorial Legislature, was immediately and emphatically expressed by members of the Legislature who were in close touch with woman suffrage legislation during the 1917 session. But it must be remembered, they point out, that Senator Shafroth's bill also authorizes the Hawaiian Legislature to submit to the people of the Territory by a plebiscite vote the question of unrestricted suffrage.

The question of suffrage for the women of Hawaii is one that has been discussed in the islands for years, and no apparent headway ever has been made, until just lately, toward obtaining the vote for them. As it is plainly shown, Senator Shafroth's bill now leaves the matter entirely in the hands of the Legislature; or on the other hand, the Legislature may have the power to submit the question to the people and let them vote on it one way or another.

The women of Honolulu, or the women of any of the other islands of the group, have never made any demonstration in favor of the suffrage, nor have they made any out-and-out demand upon the Legislature. It is true that many suffrage measures have been fathered in the Hawaiian Legislature, but nothing of any importance has come of them. There has never been any real indication that the women of Hawaii want the vote. While they might welcome it to some extent, still they have never openly sought it. Woman suffrage parades, with marchers and taunting banners, are unknown in Hawaii.

But there is little doubt that, in the next Legislature, some measure will be introduced based on the provisions of the Shafroth bill.

SULTAN OF EGYPT
REPORTED DEAD.

London, Oct. 10.—The Daily Telegraph says it learns the Sultan of Egypt died at noon Tuesday.

Hussein Kemal, was chosen by Great Britain in 1914 to succeed his uncle, Abbas Hilmi as ruler of Egypt simultaneously with the proclamation of a British protectorate. His father was Khedive from 1865 to 1879.

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—The Board of Selection today appointed the Ottawa members of the exemption tribunals to serve with those recently nominated by Judge MacTavish.

INQUIRY INTO
BACON PRICESCHAIRMAN OF COMMISSION
ON WAR PROFITS MAKES
STATEMENT.

Toronto, Oct. 9.—G. F. Henderson, K.C., chairman of the Commission on War Profits in bacon and other food products, in an interview on the progress of the inquiry, said:

"We intend to renew the investigation on Thursday and we hope to complete it at least by next Monday night, but the nature of the process is such that we may find ourselves facing questions which would require further investigation. We are determined that the investigation shall be as thorough as it is impartial."

"We are dealing with the Davies Company first, but we expect that the principles will be so far settled in the course of that inquiry that the Matthews-Blackwell part of it will be attended with less difficulty. I should like to say that both companies have furnished every facility for a thorough investigation."

Asked as to whether any general practical result would follow from the investigation or whether the price of bacon, for instance, would be affected, Mr. Henderson said:

"We are instructed by the Government to recommend a standard system of keeping accounts for cold storage companies, but our present duty is to make a report on the main issue and not to delay the report till we are prepared to make further recommendations."

"As to the possible reduction in the price of bacon, that is a matter with which this commission has no concern. If it should appear that the profits have been excessive one would expect that the tendency would be to a reduction of prices. The report, however, will speak for itself, and any business man will be able to judge for himself whether the summary which the commission will make, is accurate."

EMBARGO ON COAL
TO CANADA LIFTED

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—Mr. C. A. Magrath, Dominion Fuel Controller, has received word from Washington, confirming the report that the embargo on coal being shipped to Canada, has been lifted. The embargo was placed by Washington to facilitate the shipping of coal to the western states where there was said to be a shortage. Representations were made to Washington by Mr. Magrath and the news of the lifting of the embargo has been received with satisfaction in official circles here.

BAILING OUT A CANOE.

What To Do In Still Water or Rough Water When the Craft is Swamped.

In reasonably still waters one man or boy can bail out an upset canoe. There are two good methods—rocking it out and shoving it out. In the first swim around to the stern of the canoe and get out the water inside, rocking from side to side so that it flops out at each reverse. As soon as enough is out to give her a good freeboard get aboard over her stern and dash out the rest with your hands.

Shoving the water out also depends on the momentum of a body of water. Swim astern and, grasping the stern breasthook, give her a smart pull toward you. The water will slop out in a torrent over her bows. Then shove away from you with all your strength, and the water will come rushing aft and slop out over her stern. Keep this up until about half emptied, says a writer in Boys' Life, then get aboard her stern and dash out the rest with your hands.

I do not believe that a single man or boy can bail out a swamped canoe in a heavy blow. Stick to her, for she is your only hope, and get overboard all the heavy duffle. If the water is not too cold get out some twine or fish line and buoy mark rifles, axes, etc., by lowering them to the bottom and tying a floating duffle bag at the surface anchored by the gun. This leaves the canoe free. Right her and get into her still afloat.

Watch your chance to get water out and do so at every opportunity. Sooner or later she will drift ashore and if you feel yourself getting numb rest your head on bow or stern breast hook and keep quiet. If the water is cold act quickly. Heave out all duffle, right the canoe and get in and bail steadily. You may beat out the waves and at least will keep exercising while you drift to the shore.

SOLDIERS GO ON STAGE.

Every military hospital has its quartette, its comedian, and its cut-up as surely as a prep school, but the success of the "Shrapnel Dodgers," a quintette at the Spadina Military Hospital in Toronto has proved so great that they will go on a tour of the vaudeville houses in the Northern States, including Detroit and Chicago in their circuit.

They opened with a skit, songs, and musical numbers by Sergt. Blake on an ingenious home-made instrument, a tin box with one string, at a big vaudeville house in Toronto last week. All the men are discharged convalescents from the Spadina hospital.

Judgments By Prothonotary, Chief Justice, Etc.

Judgments by the Prothonotary: Perreault and al. vs. Laflamme.—Judgment against defendant for \$317.03, interest and costs. Beaulieu vs. Heirs Beaulieu, and Masse, T. S.—Judgment against the garnishee according to his declaration, with costs against defendants. Judgment by Hon. Chief Justice Lemieux: Savard vs. McNeil.—Judgment as prayed.

Judgments by Hon. Justice Malouin: Chalmers vs. Baron.—Action for \$100.00. The parties in this case being in partnership as proprietors of automobiles, the partnership being dissolved in July last, defendant admitting to be indebted to plaintiff for an amount of \$475.00, which he promised to pay him at different dates. Plaintiff further alleged that a sum of \$100.00 is still due to him by defendant in his plea, defendant alleges that he is not in default to pay plaintiff, because the drafts signed by him have never been presented or accepted. Judgment against defendant for \$100.00, with interest and costs.

Vachon vs. Plourde. Plaintiff claimed \$159.75 for a loan made to defendant in July, 1914; defendant pleaded that the note on which he was the endorser has never been protested at its maturity and that he owes nothing to plaintiff. Action dismissed with costs. Lamontagne vs. Clement et al. Lamontagne, esqualite, mis en cause. Plaintiff based his demand against the defendant and the mis en cause esqualite, upon the last will and testament of the late Francois Xavier Maximilien Clement, manufacturer, of the city of Quebec, dated the 20th May, 1915, claiming \$1,734.85 for his remuneration and payment as testamentary executor of the Clement at the rate of \$10.00 a week, the estate being valued at the sum of \$87,000.00. The defendants, esqualite, pleaded a general denial. Action maintained and judgment against the defendants and mis en cause, esqualite, for \$1,362.50, with interest and costs.

ATTEMPT TO ABDUCT
A SISTER OF CHARITY
Kingston, Ont., Oct. 9.—On Saturday a writ was issued in the Supreme Court of Ontario. The plaintiff is Sister Mary Basil. The defendants are Archbishop Spratt, Mother Francis Regis, the Sisters of Charity, of the House of Providence, Dr. Daniel Phelan, Police Constable Naylor, Sister Mary Vincent, Sister Mary Magdalene and Sister Mary Alice.

The plaintiff has for twenty-nine years been Sister of Charity of the House of Providence. She claims that in September, 1916, her room at St. Mary's-On-The-Lake was broken into by Police Constable Naylor and that assisted by three Sisters an attempt was made to abduct her to the province of Quebec.

The issue of the writ has caused quite a sensation in legal circles.

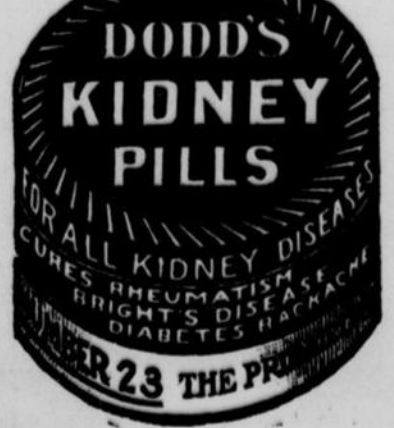

CONSTRUCTION LAW THE CHRONICLE "ADS" QUITE A PROBLEM FOR PROMPT RESULTS

BULKY DOCUMENT WAS
AMENDED BY THE BY-LAW
COMMITTEE LAST NIGHT.

There was a conflict of interests at the meeting of the Police and By-Law Committee last night when the Construction by-law, a bulky measure which comprises 156 clauses, was under study.

A delegation of working men appeared before the committee and objected to being restricted to the use of asbestos. They wanted an equal liberty to employ tin as an incombustible to cover wood.

The committee informed them that the by-law had been drawn up in conformity with a provincial law and that the City had to abide by the ruling of the higher authority.

After the laborer came Hon. P. Paradis, M.L.C., and Mr. Lucien Cannon, who objected to the wording of certain clauses and suggested certain amendments to permit the use of incombustible materials (Asbestos) in clauses where only brick or stone were specified.

The by-law has to run the gauntlet before the City Council and may yet undergo a number of changes before it secures final reading by the parent body.

JUDGMENT AGAIN FAVORS THE CITY

DECISION OF JUDGE DORION
IN FAFARD CASE UPHELD
BY SUPREME COURT.

A very important judgment in favor of the City of Quebec has just been rendered by the Supreme Court of Canada. The case, is a long standing one, is that of Miss Victoria Fafard against the City of Quebec.

In the month of June 1915, Miss Fafard was injured when the automobile in which she was riding went over the cliff on Cote de la Negresse. The plaintiff's contention was that the wooden railing was not sufficient to guard against danger and that there should have been a stone wall. The City disputed the need of such a wall claiming that the wooden railing gave ample warning and protection.

Miss Fafard's action claiming \$2,500 was dismissed by Hon. Judge Dorion in the Superior Court. The case was next taken before the Court of Appeal which also dismissed the action by 3 to 2. The judgment of Hon. Judge Dorion and the Court of Appeal is now upheld by the Supreme Court.

GIANTS-WHITE SOX

GAME ON TODAY

In The World of Sport

YESTERDAY'S RESULTS

AT LEXINGTON, KY.

GIANTS AND WHITE SOX HOPE TO RESUME STRUGGLE AGAIN THIS AFTERNOON

Rain Caused Postponement of Yesterday's Game—Fifteen Thousand People Were Already in the Stands When Game Was Called Off—Expect Fine Weather Will Prevail Today.

New York, October 9.—Heavy rain which began shortly before noon, caused a postponement until tomorrow of the third world series game scheduled for today between the Chicago White Sox and the New York Giants. Rain fell during the night and early morning, but there was every prospect that the game would be played, until the beginning of the heavy downpour which lasted all afternoon. The forecast for tomorrow is fair and warm. The rain today was accompanied by a decided drop in temperature.

There was evidence that the game would have been attended by a capacity crowd for fully fifteen thousand spectators were in the Polo Grounds stands when the official announcement of the postponement was made. The lines in front of the gates extended for several blocks when the ticket boxes were opened early in the forenoon and the men and boys, many of whom had stood in line all night, filed into the grounds.

As usual, every ticket sold had a rain check attached which would be good only for the third game of the series. Many of these found their way into the hands of speculators. In most cases the rain checks were sold at a profit to the holders.

When the first squall blew up, the diamond was uncovered and the playing surface hard and fast, but so quickly did the rain fall that the base paths were heavy before the ground-keeper and his helpers could spread the waterproof mats. Tonight there are every indication that the opening game here would be played under much the same conditions as prevailed last Saturday at Chicago.

Under the ruling of the National Commission, the teams must remain in this city until two legal games have been played. If the clubs are able to resume their struggle here tomorrow and the Giants win one or both contests, the combinations will return to Chicago for a single game there next Saturday, instead of Friday as originally scheduled. If a sixth game is necessary to decide the series, the teams will leave Chicago on Saturday night and take up the play again at the Polo Grounds the following Monday.

Many close followers of baseball, and the Giants adherents in particular, expressed the opinion that delay of a day or two would improve the chances of the National League representatives. It was figured that the White Sox, because of their double-victory, had got the jump on the Giants and that a break in the succession of games would afford the New York players a chance to steady down and show to better advantage. The New York fans are pulling hard for their favorites to win the two straight games on the home grounds.

Many of them contend that if this does happen, the Nationals will go to the front and win the series. The postponement proved a severe disappointment to thousands of baseball enthusiasts who had come from distant points to witness the battle. Almost every city and town throughout the New England and Middle Atlantic States was represented by delegations, large and small.

Many had arranged to be absent from their business for but one day and there was a rush of telegrams and long distance telephone calls as soon as it was definitely known that the National Commission had decided to delay the opening game here until tomorrow.

There was quite rejoicing among the hotel proprietors and theatre managements, however, for the postponement means an additional harvest of currency from the fans who were obliged to add another day to their stay in this city if they wished to see the contest.

Rooms at all the hotels throughout the central belt of Manhattan Island were at a premium long before night-fall and many fans tramped miles in the rain, bags in hand, before they were able to get accommodations. There was also a rush for theatre tickets and the box offices were soon sold out, leaving the visitors to the mercy of the ticket speculators who quickly raised the price of their pasteboards, forcing the more economical of the fans to the moving picture places.

The postponement also furnished a new topic of discussion for all those directly and indirectly interested in the world's series.

Weather reports were in great demand and there were many allusions to the famous 1911 series between the New York Nationals and the Philadelphia Americans. Close followers of baseball and world series play in general, recalled that during the contest of that year there was lapse of a full six days between the third and fourth games. Heavy and continuous rain caused the Commission to repeatedly call off the scheduled game until many fans, tired of delay, sold their tickets to the speculators for a fraction of their face value and returned to their home towns. Since that date the series has been played

BACELLI WINS HOTLY CONTESTED AND BEST FEATURE ON CARD.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 9.—Four good races were decided at the Grand Circuit meeting here today, the 2:06 trot, won by Bacelli, being the most hotly contested and decidedly the best race on the card. It took six heats for Bacelli to win, but in so doing the world's record for a six heat race, made last week by Ima Jay in the Transylvania, was broken. The 2:06 pace also took six heats before Helen Chimes was proclaimed the winner. The \$3,000 Dinner Stakes and \$2,000 Cumberland were easy for Miss Bertha Dillon and Little Frank D., respectively.

Mr. A. B. Cox won the second of the sweepstakes for wealthy breeders trotted here annually when Miss Bertha Dillon won the \$5,000 Dinner Stakes. His two-year-old Nella Dillon won the Breeders' Stake valued at \$6,000 for two-year-olds last Saturday. Little Frank D. was a handy winner of the 2:05 Cumberland event. The Savoy from the Cox stable was his main contender.

THREW MORE BALLS THAN WHITE SOX HURLERS IN SUNDAY'S GAME.

Chicago, Oct. 7.—The analysis of the balls pitched in Sunday's game showed that Faber threw two balls less than Cicotte did in Saturday's game, while the four New York pitchers were forced to pitch forty-four more balls than Sallee threw on the opening day. The totals were: Faber, 99; the four New York pitchers, 130.

The New York pitchers were called upon to pitch a total of 69 balls in the second, fourth and sixth innings, while the inning that proved hardest in point of work by Faber was the second, when he had a total of 17. His three most difficult innings only totalled 46. The compilation shows that Perritt handled the ball more than any of the three other Giant pitchers, while Tesreau, working in only one inning, had the least charged to him.

Perritt, however, has the honor among the Giant quartette of pitching the least number of balls in an inning, having only eight in the fifth and a like number in the seventh. Faber carried off the premier honors of the day in this respect when he retired the visitors on six thrown balls in the sixth inning. Faber equalled Perritt's figures of 8 in the fifth, and again retired the side in the ninth with 8 pitched balls.

Shipping News

LONGSHOREMEN QUIT
WORK IN NEW YORK

GREEDINESS ALLEGED BY
COMPANY - SEVERAL IN-
CREASES RECENTLY

New York, October 9.—Just as the
North River waterfront had settled
down after the strike on the Chelsea
piers, because a foreman did not quit
the longshoremen, trouble was started
again last night by 1,000 men em-
ployed on piers 36, 37 and 43, oper-
ated by the Clyde and Mallory
steamship lines who struck for more
pay.

The longshoremen are getting 40
cents an hour, 60 cents for overtime,
and 65 cents for Sunday and holiday
work. They have demanded 45
cents, 65 cents and 85 cents, longer
time for meals and a nine-hour in-
stead of a ten-hour day. The man-
agement refused the demand and the
men walked out.

H. H. Raymond, president of the
Clyde and Mallory lines, said that the
longshoremen had violated their con-
tract, which did not expire until
December 31 next. He added that the
men had been well treated in the
matter of wages, and that their
strike was not only unfair, but un-
patriotic, as the steamships were en-
gaged in Government work.

"Here is a summary of wages paid
by our lines to the men on the piers,"
Mr. Raymond continued, "which will
give some idea of the increases they
have received in the last two years.
In 1915 they got 30 cents an hour
and 35 cents for overtime and holi-
days. In the fall of that year the
rate was raised to 32 cents, 40 cents
and 45 cents for Sunday and holi-
days. In 1916 the longshoremen
signed an agreement at 35 cents, 50
cents and 65 cents, which we in-
creased voluntarily to 40 cents, 60
cents and 65 cents. The more wages they
get, the more they demand, and now
it has got to the point where we
must make a stand."

Superintendent on the piers along
the North River said that men who
could not sign their name were mak-
ing from 60 to \$75 a week working
on ships, and that such incomes had
turned their heads. It would be well,
it was suggested, for Liberty bond
salesmen to come down to the piers
on Saturdays when the longshore-
men are paid and get some of their
money.

The strike had not spread to At-
lantic lines at the Chelsea piers, but
leaders of the strikers threatened to
call out 6,000 longshoremen if the
Mallory and Clyde lines did not set-
tle.

COAL VESSELS.

The steam barge Parker arrived in
port yesterday with a consignment
of coal. The barge McKee left here
yesterday for Sydney after discharg-
ing a cargo of coal.

SCHOONER RENAUD

NOT LOST IN STORM.

A local paper last evening publish-
ed a report to the effect that the
schooner Renaud had been lost in a
snow storm some days ago along the
North Shore. This schooner, which
is chartered by Mr. James Holliday,
arrived in port safely yesterday af-
ternoon in charge of Captain Peize.
Mr. Holliday was a passenger on the
vessel which is in fine trim and en-
countered adverse weather condi-
tions at the end of last week.

NEWS OF SINKING
OF VESSELS RECEIVED

An Atlantic Port, Oct. 9.—News of
the destruction of the Norwegian
steamship, Majoren, by a German
submarine off the Irish coast on
September 3, was brought here to-
day by survivors, passengers on a
British vessel. The Majoren, of 4-
300 tons gross, left Philadelphia in
August with iron for Glasgow. The
twenty-eight members of the crew
were rescued by a patrol vessel
thirty-six hours after they took to
small boats.

U. S. WON'T RELEASE
DUTCH SHIP IN PORT.

Washington, October 9.—The ex-
ports administrative board, it was
said yesterday, has decided not to
grant license for the release of the
Dutch ship Nieuw Amsterdam now
in an American port loaded with
foods for the Committee. For the
Relief of Belgium, as no assurances
have been given that the vessel will
return to the jurisdiction of the Uni-
ted States.

This means that the neutral ton-
nage, even though it is not bound
for neutral countries continuous to
Germany, must meet the conditions
of the government that it will not
seek to "disappear" if licenses are to
be issued.

TWO OF CREW OF
SHIP SUNK ARRIVE.

An Atlantic Port, Oct. 9.—Two of
the crew of the British schooner
George Ewart sunk in collision with
an unknown steamer in a stern,
Sept. 10, off the coast of Spain,
reached here yesterday on a steamer
from Mediterranean ports. The
Ewart from St. Johns, Nfld., for
Gibraltar with a cargo of dried fish,
had been reported sunk by a subma-
rine, but the men arriving said their
ship had been badly damaged in col-
lision and sunk.

SURVIVORS OF TORMEDED
STEAMSHIPS ARE LANDED.

An Atlantic Port, October 9.—
With forty-one members of the il-
l-fated steamship Wilmore, torpedoed
by a German submarine in European
waters sometime ago, an American
steamship has arrived here today.

It is stated that the vessel sighted
several submarines while traversing
the war zone and her naval gunners
shelled the undersea craft with the
result that after a few attempts at
effective work they scattered and
withdrew.

FOUGHT TWO U-BOATS
FOR HALF AN HOUR.

Baltimore Boy Writes Home of the
Experience of a Convoyed
Vessel.

Baltimore, Oct. 8.—A fight at sea
with a German submarine, which
continued more than a half hour, is
described by August J. Zilonka, a
Baltimore boy, in a letter to his
former employer, Charles W. Lentz,
Vice President and sales manager of
the Frederick W. Lippis Company.
In his letter Zilonka writes:

"We left on Sunday morning, Aug.
10. . . . Passing through the war
zone was passed several lifeboats
turned over. One had three dead
bodies stretched across it.
"One thing we can be thankful for,
we missed a mine about the size of
a football. It was just as we were
about to enter the mine field that we
saw from the air a U-boat. For this cer-
tainly would have happened if it were
at night. British destroyers met us
and convoyed us as far as where we
met a United States and a French
patrol boat.

"The British ships and destroyers
then left us and headed for Liver-
pool, while we made the run for
port. That was the night of Sept. 5.
It was a fine moonlight night, one
which I will never forget, as we re-
ceived messages almost all night of
submarine positions.

"The hours went by like days, and
at exactly 7:10 A.M. we had a bat-
tle with two U-boats, which lasted
about thirty-five minutes. We were
firing steadily, and at one time, by
zigzagging, were almost hit by a
shell from one of our own ships. The
two wireless men manned the ma-
chine gun, while our senior operator
was stationed at the key.

"We fired about 300 shots, but finally
had to stop on account of the
positions of the other ships. I still
have several shells as a remembrance
of our battle which I will never for-
get.
"Reports combined from all our
ships state that one U-boat was sunk
while trying to make a dive."

Closing Letters By the Can. Press

(By Canadian Press).
New York, Oct. 9.—Short selling and liquidation, the latter probably predominating, again exerted their unfavorable influence over the stock market today, causing various issues to decline to new minimums for the current movement. In several noteworthy instances these quotations also represented lowest levels of recent years.
Apart from the increasing bearishness of a large trading element, nothing tangible developed to explain the further reaction. Vague peace rumors were without effect except to add to the confusion already existing in conservative circles.
Seasoned stocks offered some resistance to pressure, United States Steel and Union Pacific rallying briskly on the temporary improvement manifested at mid-day, but losing ground again on the wider and more extensive offerings of the last hour.
United States Steel recovered 1 1/2 points to 106 3/8 and Union Pacific 1 1/2, but both went down at the end. Steel fell to 104 5/8, or within a point of its lowest price of recent months, and closed at 105 1/8, off 5/8 on the day.
Utilities, oils, tobaccos and a few other specialties which seem to be in speculative disfavor at this time, suffered the greatest losses. People's Gas added seven points to yesterday's decline of five, Ohio Gas lost 5 3/4, Texas Company yielded 8 points and United Cigar Stores over 3 points. Coppers, distilling issues and minor rails embraced the other heavy stocks at reversals of 1 to 3 points. Final prices showed no appreciable improvement. Total sales amounted to 740,000 shares.
Promise of easier money was fulfilled, both call and time rates again relaxing, the latter only for the shorter periods.
Bonds were heavy, Liberty 3 1/2's repeating their recent minimum of 99.82 though rising later to 99.74. Total sales, par value, aggregated \$4,180,000.
United States Bonds old issues unchanged on call.

New York, Oct. 9.—The market yesterday after its final plunge looked rather attractive to many and the feeling this morning that there would be support and prices worked better.
Around 104 steel seemed to get support but in other places the market was woefully weak and distressing and continuous liquidation was in evidence. Prices are so low that it seems as if the liquidation must soon be over, or at least temporarily halted but one man selling weakens other accounts and brings about new liquidation and so it goes on seemingly without end.
Unless we have been dwelling in a fools paradise during the past three years, the market ought to be a good purchase for investors but no one can tell how low this great wave of liquidation may carry prices.

New York, Oct. 9.—The market underwent one of its characteristic quick reversals of form in the early afternoon giving rise to talk of bear raids. No amount of talk about bear raiding of course will explain a prolonged and extended decline in stocks. The public utilities again took their turn at softness and further losses were made in some of the copper stocks. The motors alone were firm. The day's losses were somewhat increased during the last hour and the list as a whole closed distinctly below Monday's final prices. The general comment on market was that it was weak, whereas a matter of fact it was merely disappointing. Some liquidation continues but not in anything like the volume of past two weeks. Sales 757,000.

Chicago, October 9.—Corn.—The October Government crop report—A careful study of the Government report on corn leads to the feeling that later estimates of the crop will have to be increased if the truth in regard to this immense crop is to be approximated. No one who has travelled over the corn belt will question the Government's figures on acreage, but local reporters for the Government are apparently as much inclined to be pessimistic on the yield of corn as they were early on the yield of oats.

New York—No change of market conditions from that which have characterized recent sessions, generally speaking, was shown in the stock market today. Prices opened at an irregular level, with recessions in the majority of issues and a lower price tendency indicated. Quoted values were seen within more or less narrow limits practically throughout four of the five hours of business, and at no time within that period did the list, as a whole, develop uniformity of trend. During the last hour a selling movement set in which had all the earmarks of a bear drive, with possibly some liquidation, which carried prices down to a point where new low levels in a number of stocks were established. Dealings continue to originate very largely with professional circles, with no apparent increase in transactions for public account over that credited for sometime past.
We still regard the stock market as a two sided trading affair for quick profits only.

TOO MUCH MEAT AS BAS AS TOO LITTLE.
"Too much meat is as bad for the body as too little," we are told in the Woman's Home Companion. "During the digestion of meats, fish and eggs, acids are formed. In order to prevent the accumulation of too much of this acid in the system it is necessary to eat also fresh vegetables and fruits, which have properties that neutralize the acids formed by the meat. This is one reason why meat and potatoes are usually served together. It is safer to have too little meat than to eat too little fruit and too few vegetables."

BY-LAW NO. 270a.
Concerning the Weighing of Coal.
(Drawn up in the French Language)
At a meeting of the Municipal Council of the City of Quebec, held at the City Hall, in the said City of Quebec, on the twenty-first day of September, one thousand nine hundred and seventeen, (1917), in conformity to law, and in virtue of a by-law passed by this Council, pursuant thereto, and after the due observance of all the formalities prescribed by the statute in such case made and provided, at which meeting were present the absolute majority of the members composing the Council of the City of Quebec, that is to say: His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen Bedard, Bertrand, Bois, Collier, Dussault, St. L., Gauvin, Glode, Lantier, Lockwell, Madden, Martin, Paquet, (J.C.); Paquet, (St. S.); Pettigrew, Theriault, Verret.
It is ordered and enacted by the Municipal Council of the City of Quebec, and the said Council do hereby ordain and enact as follows:
1. Article 4, of By-law No. 270 passed by this Council on the 18th December, 1915 is abrogated and replaced by the following:
4. Every person purchasing coal in this City, may at his expense, after the salesman shall have delivered said coal, have it weighed or measured at any of the public and weighing and measuring offices, so as to establish the weight or measure.
It shall be also advisable to the City of Quebec, by an official appointed to that end, have weighed or measured, at his expense, at any of the said weighing or measuring offices, every load of coal passing on a street in the City limits, so as to establish the weight or measure.
