THE CITY AND FORTRESS OF METZ.

The city and fortress of Metz have been made famous by the war between France and Prussia. Metz is, or was, a fortified city of France, the capital of the province of the Moselle. It is situated at the confluence of the rivers Sello and Moselle, and distant 245 miles east by north from Paris.

CHRONOLOGY OF THE MILITARY OPERATIONS AT METZ.

August 7.—Prussian army advancing on France were reported to be at St. Avold, twenty-eight kilometers distant from Metz. August 10.—The Prussians have advanced within ten miles of Metz and taken position. August 12.—Marshal Bismarck commissioned the King of Prussia to visit Metz on the Rhine.

THE DETHRONEMENT OF THE POPE.

In the midst of steps and slaughter, it seems probable still, that the important event for history, not of this year simply, but of this half century, is the dethronement of the Pope, by the vote of his own subjects, on the 2nd of October. Pious have been driven from Rome by arms before now; but a verdict, almost unanimous, of the people of Rome, and its neighborly, that they would rather be governed by the King of Italy in their temporal affairs than by the Holy Father, is in the present state of public law, a verdict passed on the whole system of ecclesiastical government far more severe than any defeat in battle.

It was an odd ceremony in Liverpool yesterday—very this is so called nineteenth century—to see an odd figure of speech, in an age of oddities. There are odd fellows, and odd women who are not fellows; there are prize baby shows, which are a sort of exhibition of human odds and ends; but all free of this ilk are surely eclipsed by the very odd affair which took place on Sunday last. It was the wedding of a policeman's wife, not of the handsome policeman's wife, but of the handsome policeman's wife's beauty. The "beauty" was the wife of a policeman, and was only by proxy—by ownership in the second degree, with all the usual incidents in that kind of property which a married woman may legally have and hold independently of her husband.

A DOUBLE CHILD.

A correspondent of the Cincinnati Commercial at Mount Gilead, Ohio, writes: "I notice in this morning's Commercial that a lady at Morrow was recently delivered of a double child, which was born at the beautiful I wish to inform you that I think there is a slight mistake in regard to the matter. It should be Morrow county, instead of Morrow town, and the child is still alive, or was this morning, for I have had a conversation with the father of the child. The wife of Mr. James Finley, of Pagetown, in the southern part of the county, gave birth, Wednesday morning 12th inst., to a remarkable monozygosity in the form of a double child. It is a healthy, well-formed female child, with the perfect head, arms, and short abdomen of another child attached to its back. It has the appearance of a child with head, neck, arms and breast on each side. It has perfect legs projecting from one side of the body, and from the other a deformed double leg. The hands, arms, &c., are about the size of those of a medium sized child. They are better looking than the average of the double child. The eyes on one side are black and the other on the other. One child requires more sustenance than the other. If the weaker is crying and fretful, by nursing the stronger child the former will go to sleep. It appears that each child has a separate stomach, but bowels in common. The above are the facts in regard to this remarkable freak of nature, which I think that the Morrow county child and her mother are entitled to understand that a gentleman in Cardington, in this county, has offered ten thousand dollars for it. Hundreds of people are calling to see it every day. Mr. Finley is a respectable, well-to-do farmer, and served three years in the army in the Ninety-sixth Ohio volunteer infantry.

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
