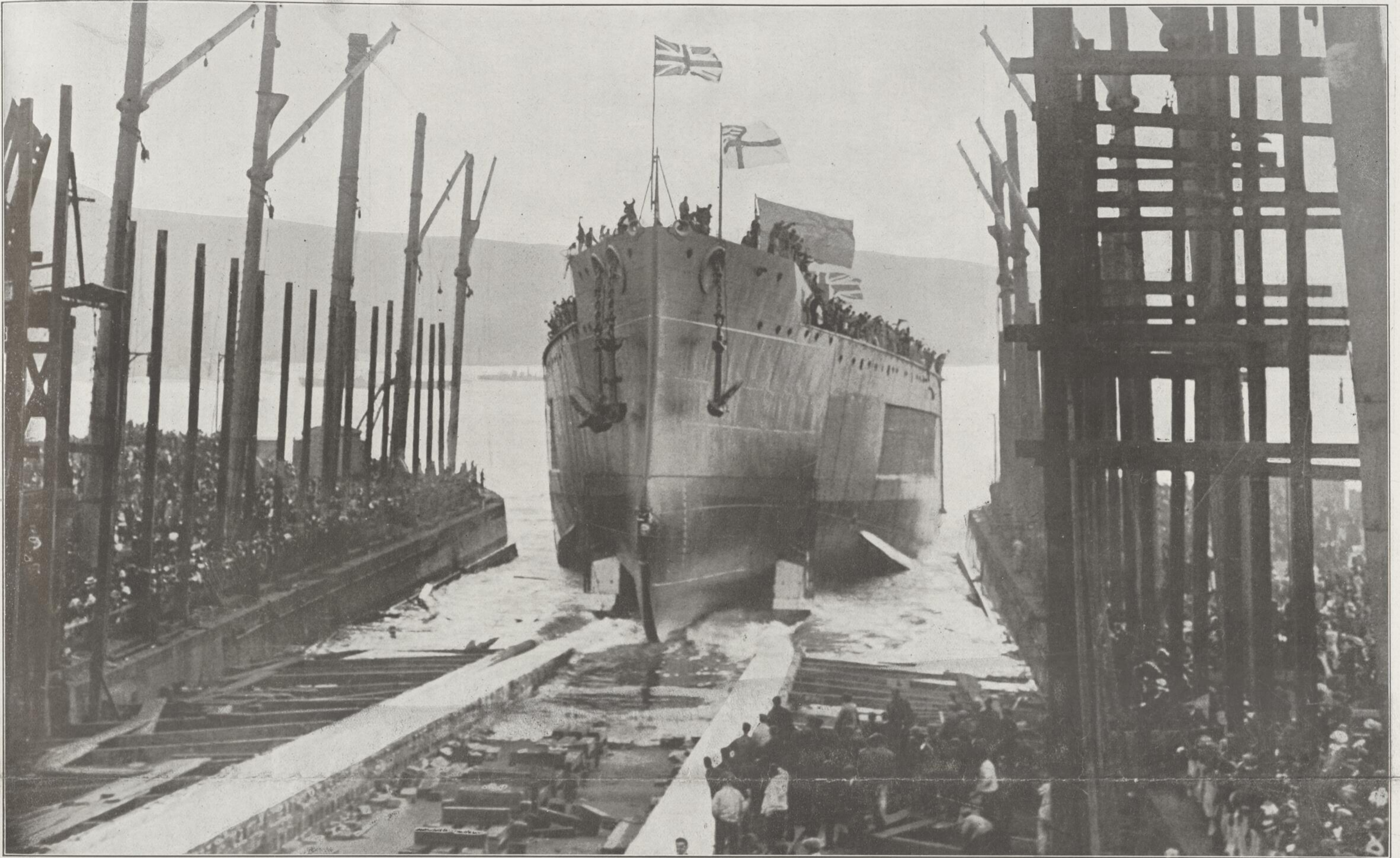

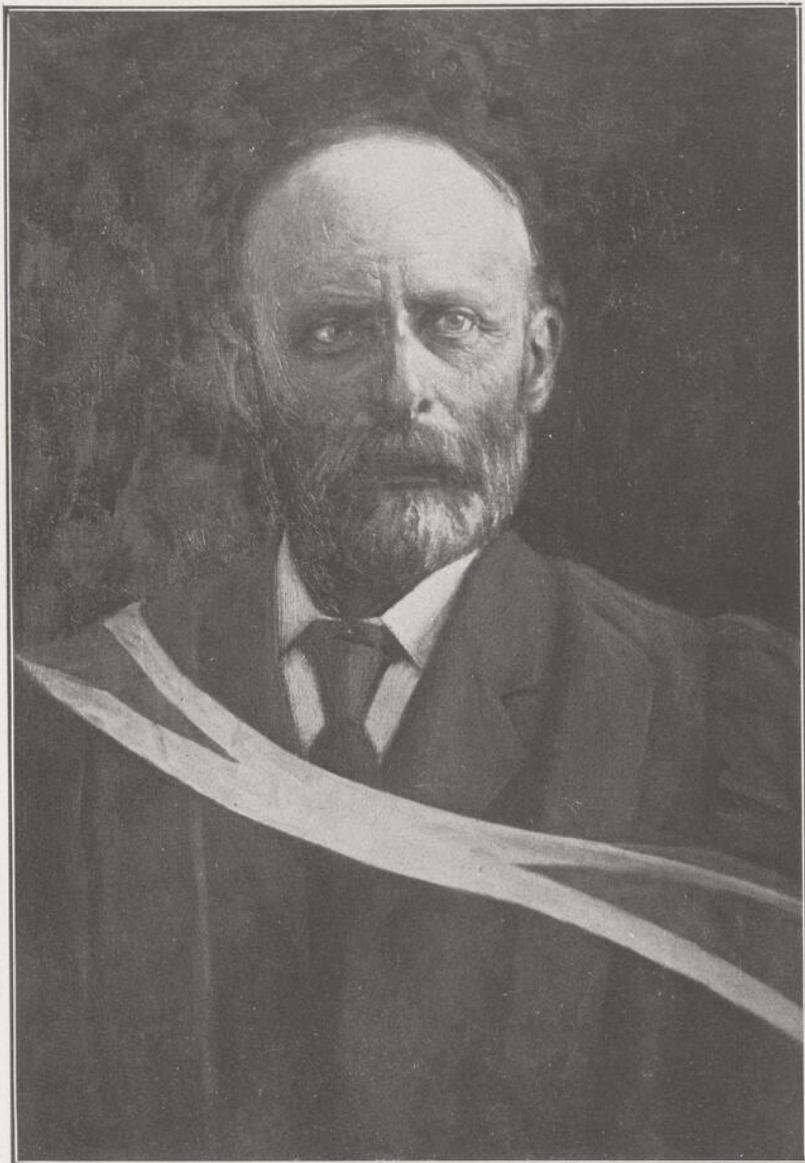
THE WORLD'S MOST POWERFUL FIGHTING MACHINE—The launch of H.M.S. Collingwood at Devonport. This interesting ceremony took place in the presence of 20,000 spectators, the christening being performed by Mrs. Asquith, wife of the British Prime Minister. The vessel took the water in fine style, amid salvos of artillery from the warships in the harbor, music from military bands, and cheers from the crowd. Colonial wine was used at the christening. The Collingwood, which was laid down in February last, is the sixth battleship of the Dreadnought type now afloat, but is larger and more heavily armed and better protected than the Dreadnought, and, when completed, will be the most powerful warship afloat. ## Pageant of English Authors Was the Great Feature of This Year's Lord Mayor's Show in London



THE LORD MAYOR'S SHOW PASSING THE LAW COURTS, LONDON, ON NOVEMBER 9—This interesting pageant was this year carried out with such a wealth of ceremonial and outward pomp and display, that its immediate predecessors were quite eclipsed in glory by it. An hour's pause at the Law Courts enabled the new Lord Mayor to go through the time-honored ceremony of being presented to the Lord Chief Justice and the Judges of the King's Bench Division. Each judge wore a robe of scarlet, with ermine collar, and had a square, flat, black cap poised on his full-bottomed wig. Perhaps the feature of the Show, however, was the historical pageant in which the members of the British Press, as well as the Poets and Musicians, from Chaucer's to Milton's times, passed in review before the assembled crowds, the latter in some places being twenty deep. 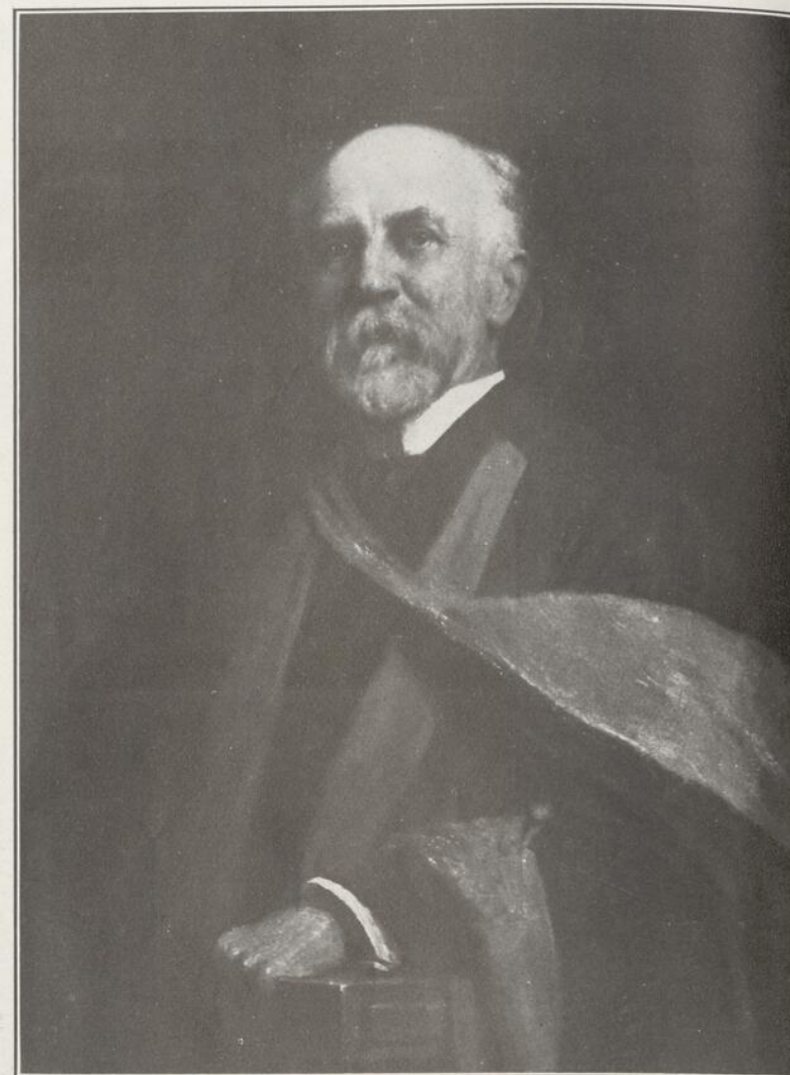
# Electrification of the St. Clair Tunnel Makes Great Step in Advance; Famous McGill Professors

GEORGE H. PELLETIER, of Montreal, who was recently presented with the Royal Humane Society's bronze medal for a gallant attempt to save a child from drowning.

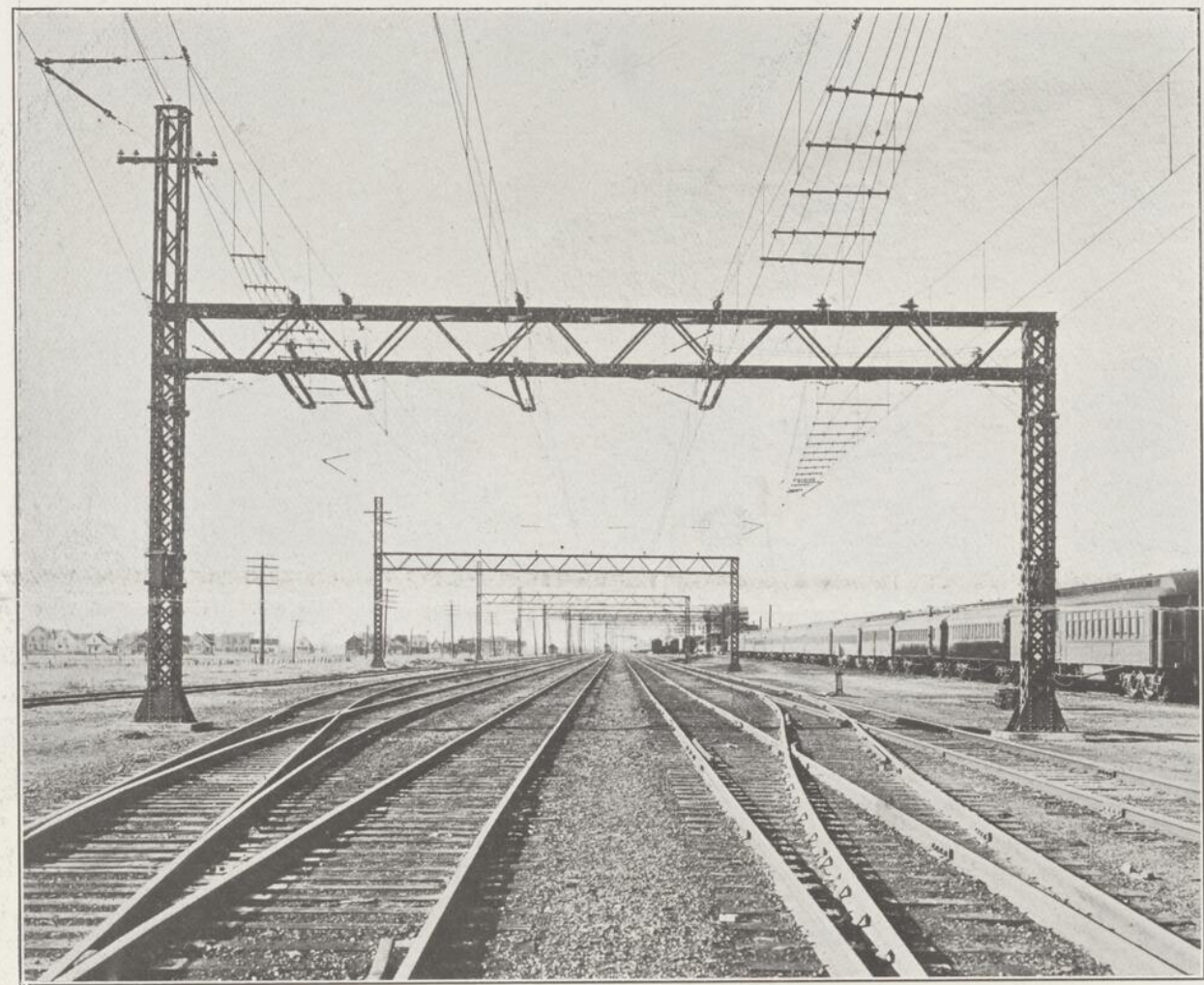
man, Geo. Henri Pelletier, a student in Bishop's College, Lennoxville, was presented by the Recorder with the bronze medal of the Royal Canadian Humane Society, for conspicuous bravery.

Young Pelletier had shown his heroism in attempting to save a child from drowning in Lake St. Louis in September last. While out on the lake with a friend, he heard the screams of a woman in a boat, and on enquiry found that her child had fallen out into the lake. Mr. Pelletier at once dived into the 12 feet of water, and on a second attempt brought the body to the sur-

face. Unfortunately life was extinct; but this in no way detracts from the gallant act of the young man. Master Pelletier is son of Mr. H. A. Pelletier, supply agent of the R. & O. Navigation Company.

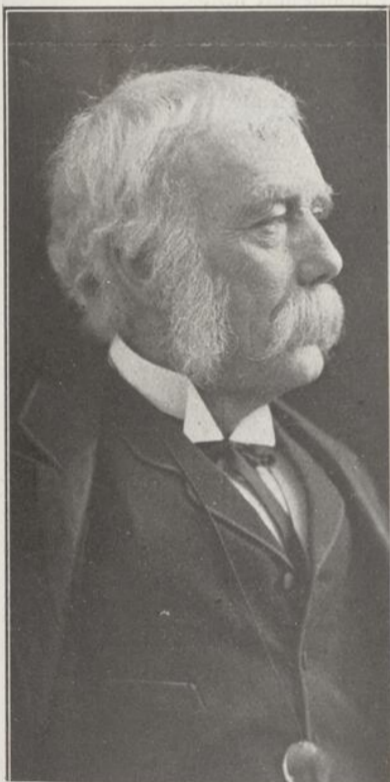

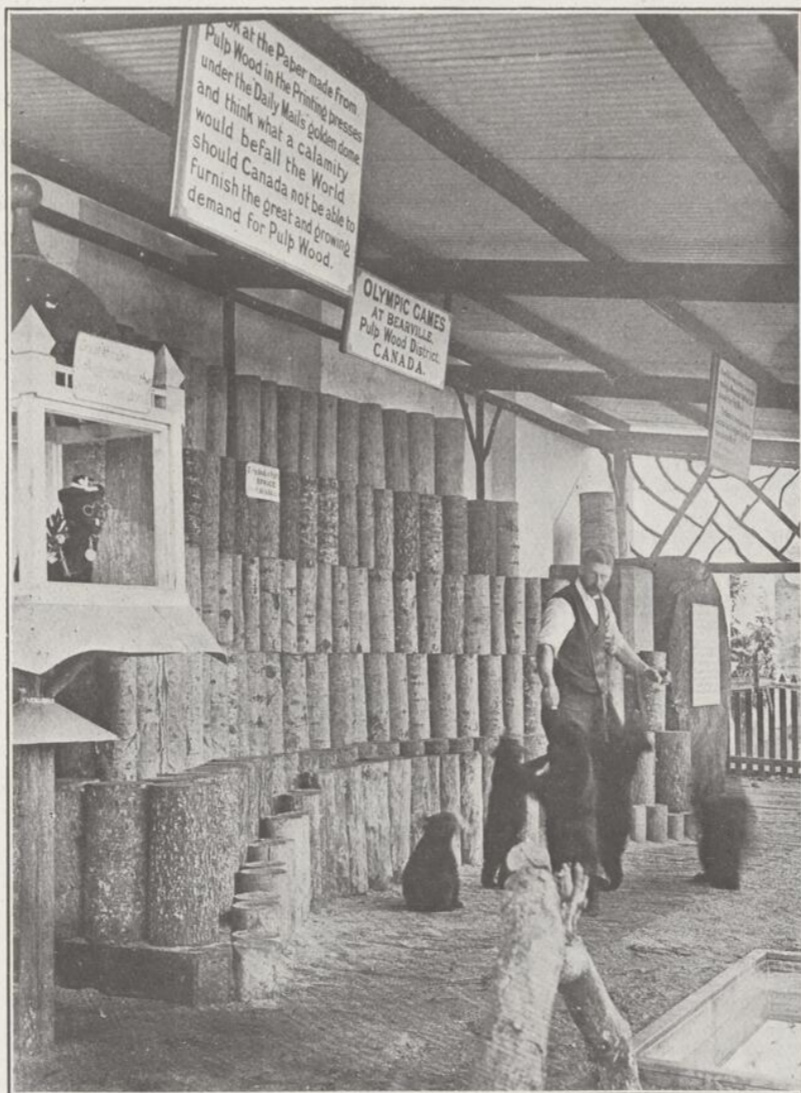

VISIBLE MUSIC.

By causing a small mirror to oscillate in accord with the movements of the diaphragm of a phonograph, a Mr. Bowron is stated to have contrived the means of exhibiting to an audience a visible representation of a piece of music to which they are listening. A beam of light reflected from the oscillating mirror, and from another mirror which rotates uniformly, is thrown upon a screen, where it appears as a luminous curve, varying in correspondence with the sounds. The instrument is called an acoustic oscillograph.

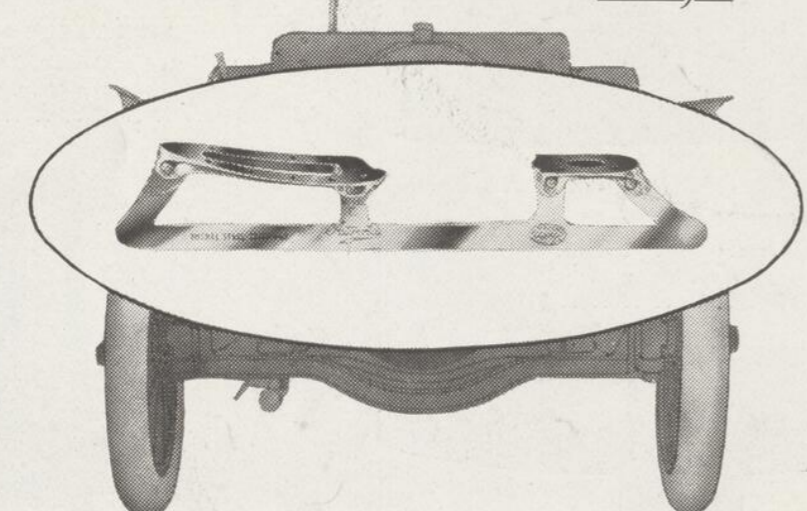
