REASONS WHY ACCOUNTANT REFUSED TO PASS GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC ACCOUNTS SET FORTH IN OFFICIAL STATEMENTS

Company Declined to Supply Details as to How Large Sums of Money Were Expended in Connection With Preliminary Work--Large Amount is Unexplained--Mr. Shannon's Letters Gave Whole Scheme Away.

Special to the Montreal Star. Ottawa, March 11.--As the result of recent delving in the Public Accounts Committee of the House of Commons there may be an interesting investigation as to the manner in which the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company spent certain large sums of money in connection with the preliminary work of organizing and issuing bonds for 75 per cent of the costs up to a certain limit. The natural question under the circumstances is: How was the money spent?

And to those familiar with the prolonged fight which occurred in Parliament over this bill, this suggests a second, and equally interesting question: Was it spent in securing legislation? The following facts are submitted which readers are left to draw their own conclusions:

AGREEMENT WITH COMPANY. When the Government undertook the construction of the National Transcontinental Railway from Montreal to a point on the Pacific coast, it was agreed that that portion of the road between Winnipeg and Montreal should be constructed by the Government and leased to the G. T. P. Railway Company, while that portion of the road from Winnipeg west to the coast should be built by the company, the lowest cost of construction to be guaranteed to the extent of seventy-five per cent. of the cost of construction.

BOND ISSUE AND AUDIT. On the 1st of October, 1905, bonds were issued and sold to the extent of \$2,000,000 to cover the cost of construction of this western division. As these bonds were guaranteed by the Government, the proceeds of the sale remained under the control of the Government to be from time to time released as the company made expenditure and gave satisfactory proof of the same.

IN ORDER that the amount expended by the company might be established to the satisfaction of the Government, it had been provided by statute that accountants should from time to time inspect the books of the company and examine all vouchers and other documents and that all such papers should be open to inspection till the road was built.

THE INITIAL STATEMENT FROM THE COMPANY.

Operations were commenced on the western division of the G. T. P. not long after the passage of the act and by the 1st of July, 1906, a considerable expenditure had been incurred. When their claim amounted to about \$300,000, the G. T. P. Railway Company made their first demand upon the Government to audit the accounts and to release funds to the extent of their approved claim. Mr. Leonard Shannon, accountant of the Department of Railways and Canals, was appointed to audit the accounts of the company and to do the outside auditing of these accounts. About the 1st of October, 1905, the G. T. P. Railway Company presented a statement which purported to cover the total amount of expenditure made by the G. T. P. upon the Prairie and Mountain sections from its inception to the 31st of July, 1905. This statement aggregated \$262,237.73. Mr. Shannon carefully audited the statement. In his report, dated the 11th of October, 1905, he stated that the Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals, he says: "Pursuant to instructions I made an inspection last week of the books, vouchers, etc., of the G. T. P. Railway at Montreal. I submit herewith the various statements in detail, showing how the expenditure of \$262,237.73 is made up, and it will be noticed in this connection that there are two statements, one for legal expenses and the other for general expenses. I would draw attention to the item of proportion of preliminary expenses in the statement of the Prairie section, amounting to \$106,183. This being a portion of a voucher submitted to me for \$162,000 in round figures, but which sub-vouchers to the extent only of \$106,650 were shown me (an amount in excess of the proportion charged), but the details were insufficient to enable me to state whether they were a proper charge against the Prairie section or not."

THE COMPANY SUBMITS "EXPURGATED" EDITION

About the end of October the company submitted a second statement, an expurgated edition of the previous statement. Rather than give explanation as previously desired, they now abandoned a number of items included in the first list, but at the same time added a second time in the form of preliminary expenses many accounts already rejected. From this second statement Mr. Shannon threw out all accounts previously rejected. This time he kept a list of the items thus rejected. From the following extracts taken from this second statement the general character of the rejected items may be gathered. Expenses of officials to the Pacific coast, \$3,000. Regular salary of Rev. E. S. Roe, \$125 per month. C. M. Hayes' trip to England, \$1,132.94. W. H. Hayes' trip to England, \$1,665.91. London office salaries, \$760.42. London office salaries, \$590.95. Total, \$6,317.28. London office salaries, \$1,216.66. London Office Directors' fees, \$2,433.33. Total, \$14,865.66. Under legal expenses, there are among others, Sir A. Caron, \$1,000; Sir A. Caron, \$1,000; Sir A. Caron, \$1,000; H. P. McGeivray, a young Ottawa lawyer, figures in many places, totalling \$5,421. Chrysler and Bethune, legal expenses, \$5,911.49. An amount of \$46,520 for terminal lands payable to F. W. Morse and Peter Larson, also appears among the rejected items.

MANY CLAIMS ABANDONED. All the above, together with many more, the total amounts aggregating \$100,000, were rejected by the auditor from the second or substituted statement of the G. T. P. covering the period from the commencement to June 30, 1905. It is apparent, from the fact that accounts amounting to \$162,000 were rejected from the first or original statement, and from the fact that accounts totalling \$74,026.61 were rejected from the second or expurgated statement presented by the G. T. P., that the company must have abandoned their pretensions to about \$38,000 of claims. Probably this includes the \$5,000 item mentioned in Mr. Shannon's first report as representing an amount for which the company declined to produce any vouchers whatever.

At the examination Mr. Shannon was asked: "As a matter of fact, the company were endeavoring to charge in these preliminary accounts the expenses of every character in connection with the preliminary inauguration of the company?" Mr. Shannon rather described how a considerable number of accounts were presented to him from time to time by Mr. Wainwright and by others, for which they would give no vouchers. There were a good many more of such accounts in the first statement than in the second.

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VACANCIES ON BENCH AND SENATE FILLED

Mr. A. G. Cross Called to Bench, Mr. Desaulles to the Senate.

Ottawa, March 11.--Mr. G. C. Desaulles of Haileybury has been appointed to the Senate vacancy caused by the death of Sir William Thompson. The appointment was made at the Cabinet meeting on Friday. Mr. A. G. Cross, K.C., of Montreal, was appointed to succeed Judge Hall in the court of Appeals for the province of Quebec. Senator George-Charles Desaulles is the son of the late Hon. Jean Desaulles.

WAS MONEY SPENT IN SECURING LEGISLATION?

If the list quoted above of rejected accounts was an expurgated edition of the original list, what must the original list have contained? There is probably here in the item \$162,000, what it cost the promoters of the G. T. P. by way of expenses in obtaining legislation and in launching the railway scheme. As this amount could not be charged upon the ordinary cost of passing a bill and as it seems hardly credible that this amount could have been legitimately expended in the manner in which it is set out, it is suggested that this alleged expenditure on the part of the company be thoroughly investigated.

IN REFERENCE to this sum of \$162,000 which was disallowed, the following observations are pertinent: (1) This amount had obviously been paid out by the G. T. P. Company in cash before they asked to be reimbursed out of the proceeds of the bonds.

(2) In the opinion of the G. T. P. Company this amount was all connected with and regarded as rightly chargeable to the G. T. P. scheme.

(3) If it could not be charged upon "cost of construction" it must have been expended prior to commencement of construction, that is for preliminary expenses.

(4) These preliminary expenses included disbursements made by the promoters to get their bill through Parliament.

(5) As the sum of \$162,000 for preliminary expenses is abnormally high and the G. T. P. Company refused to give the account proper explanations, the natural conclusion is that the money was not all expended by the company in a way that they would care to have known.

(6) It is in the public interest that the sum of \$162,000 was expended by the G. T. P. in this manner, and that the company should demonstrate whether or not this money, in whole or in part, was legitimately expended.

STOYLY IN A TURTLE. The financial aspect of the matter can be summarized as follows: What Shannon allowed, October 11, 1905: Prairie section, \$436,074.14; Mountain section, \$6,935.39; Interest on bonds, \$23,290.00; Interest on bonds, \$15,591.29; Total, \$541,890.82. Less a voucher submitted, but the details insufficient, \$62,000.00; Total, \$479,890.82.

What Schreiber passed, October 12, 1905: Prairie section, \$436,074.14; Mountain section, \$6,935.39; Interest on bonds, \$23,290.00; Interest on bonds, \$15,591.29; Total, \$541,890.82. Difference, \$162,000.

OUTSTANDING FACTS IN SHANNON EVIDENCE.

A condensation of Mr. Shannon's evidence reveals the following outstanding facts: (1) As accountant of the Railway Department he examined the accounts in connection with the cost of construction of the Western Division of the National Transcontinental, i.e. the Grand Trunk Pacific. He was under the instructions of the Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals.

(2) The company presented its first statement of sums expended up to June 30, 1905, in September of that year. This statement showed a very large number of items which were not a part of the company's accounts and which the G. T. P. Company endeavored to have charged to the western division.

(3) Owing to these objections this first statement was withdrawn by the company with the consent of the Deputy Minister, and a new statement in October, 1905. He took exception to a great many items because the company would not give him any information.

(4) When the second or substituted statement for the first period was submitted, Mr. Shannon again struck out many items. A list of these items is continued on page fifteen.

LORD PENRHYN DEAD.

Special to The Montreal Star. London, March 11.--Lord Penrhyn, whose dispute with his employees at the Bethesda slate quarries brought him into great prominence, is dead. The quarries struck and Lord Penrhyn refused to grant the men's demands, shut down the quarries and refused to recognize them except on his own terms.

FUNERAL OF "BUD" MCCURT WAS LARGELY ATTENDED.

Cornwall, Ont., March 11.--Over 2,000 citizens of Cornwall attended the funeral of the late "Bud" McCurt, who took place this morning, to St. Columban's church, and cemetery. The cortege extended from the house to the church and was headed by over 100 members of the Cornwall lacrosse and hockey clubs, with a band, Messrs. Bavin and Slater, of the Ottawa Victoria, were present. Among the flowery tributes were from the Montreal Shamrocks and Ottawa Victoria. Rev. Vicar-General Corbet officiated at the funeral mass.

STUDENT PRANKS PROVE SERIOUS

Two McGill Men in Hospital With Eyes Injured by Liquid Ammonia.

Expansion from the university may have caused a row in the McGill Union building, in which two Science freshmen were severely and painfully injured in the eyes. The meeting of the students' Committee is to be held, probably to-morrow, and at this meeting drastic action will likely be taken to punish the Sophomore of Sophomore, who participated in the trouble.

Two students, Rutherford and Kenney, Science 10, are now in the Royal Victoria Hospital, where they had been taken when it was found that they had been victims of the Sophomore prank.

The Freshmen of the Science Faculty had decided to give a smoke in the Union, and when this was learned by the Sophomores of the same faculty they decided to break up the smoker. The affair was being smothered since the opening of the first term under the stigma of defeat in the annual rush at the hands of the Freshies. For a long time revenge had been in contemplation and finally this opportunity offered. The plan was well laid. First the wires leading from a pole in the lane and running into an iron conduit, which was being used for the purpose of the building, were cut. This plunged the house into darkness. Under cover of the confusion, some Sophomore, whether it was Rutherford or Kenney, whether there was but one, is not now known. The assailant when he reached the entrance of the room in which the affair was being smothered, threw a bottle in. The bottle contained ammonia. It landed at a sofa on which were seated Rutherford and Kenney. The bottle struck one in the chest and the liquid splashed into the eyes of both students. When order was secured later it was found that both were suffering painful injury. They were removed to the Royal Victoria Hospital, where they have since remained.

At the hospital to-day it was said that both students are getting along and that they will be able to leave in a few days will suffice to relieve them from their present unpleasant predicament. No serious permanent injury to the eyes of either student is anticipated.

The second year has condemned the action of the members of the class who participated in the fracas and efforts are being made to learn the identity of those concerned.

The speaker, in a speech of hearty commendation of the army's work, the General's evening address was on the text: "Ye have sinned against the Lord, 'To sure your sin will find you out.'"

FREDERICK WOMAN GRANTED DIVORCE

Marriage Tie Formed in 1889 Was Severed by Judge Gregory's Decision. Special to The Montreal Star. Fredericton, N.B., March 11.--Mrs. Ida Lottimer was on Saturday granted absolute divorce by Justice Gregory from her husband, Robert A. Lottimer, who has, according to testimony given, been leading the life of a bigamist for twelve years in New York. A wedding in which the divorce and one of the province's leading merchants are to be principals, will take place shortly. It is said. In September, 1889, Robert A. Lottimer, then interested in a prosperous boot and shoe business here, was married to Miss Ida Barker, whom he had known since childhood. The ceremony was performed by Rev. A. J. Mowatt, now living in Montreal, and the young couple lived together several years. Then came a quarrel over attending a Sunday school picnic and Lottimer left his young wife and went to New York. A few months later a daughter was born to the deserted wife, and she started dressmaking for a living. Mrs. Lottimer visited New York and there found her husband living with Mrs. Lottimer No. 2 at No. 240 Eighth avenue, in a dingy two-room tenement, with two children. These facts were offered in evidence and on the grounds of adultery and desertion, the divorce was granted.

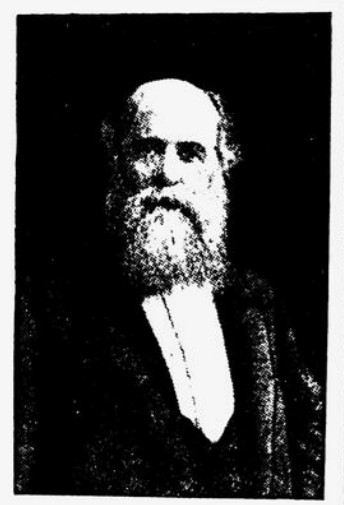

HEAD OF ZION DIED IN SHILOH HOUSE

Extraordinary Career of John Alexander Dowie Closed.

DESERTED BY FOLLOWERS Few Former Adherents Clung to Him to the Last—Even Family Left Him.

Chicago, March 11.—John Alexander Dowie died Saturday morning at Shiloh House, Zion City, Ohio. There are no more adherents of his sect, and only John D. H. Harris, a former adherent, remains.

John Alexander Dowie was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, May 22, 1818. In 1836 his parents removed to Australia, where for seven years the youth was work in a business house. He then returned to Scotland, where he had been estranged, that he would attend the funeral.

After ten years in Melbourne Dowie decided to remove to America, where his association had branches. Dowie landed in San Francisco in 1858. He needed money and had just the way to come along and get the money in his hand.

ZION CITY FOUNDED The Christian Catholic Church in Zion City was formally organized in February, 1860. Dowie becoming general overseer of the church. A year later the population was 10,000. Dowie, in the Antislavery movement, announced that he was "Eljah, the Restorer, spoken of in Malachi.

Eighteen months ago Dowie began the promotion of a second Zion City in Mexico. However, his health failed and he went to Jamaica shortly for his health. While there he suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he never recovered.

The funeral will take place at Mount Olivet Cemetery, near Zion City, Ohio, on March 11. ENGLAND REFORMS HER BUSINESS WAYS The Guildhall Address of the Prince of Wales is Now Bearing Fruit.

New York, March 11.—A special cable to the Herald from London states: "Wake up, England!" The new history and of reforming phrase with which the Prince of Wales started at the Guildhall on his return from his great tour through the continent, which caused even the puny school-boys to light up with enthusiasm, and which is now being taken up by the beginning of the inscription of his "reform" scheme, is now having its effect. A wave of reform is being sent out from the continent, and the country has a chance of being reformed every day in the leading commercial houses and industrial concerns of London.

And at this very time the Grand Trunk Pacific people were trying to get past the Cabinet and through Parliament the most gigantic financial measure of recent times.

Mr. D. Lloyd-George's speech. To the Editor of the Montreal Star:—In reading the Mr. Hon. David Lloyd-George's speech on tariff reform published in the Times of February 22nd and reproduced in the Star, I was considerably surprised at some of his references and statements.

He admitted that the Canadian preference was undoubtedly a good measure for England; but that it was also an equally good provision for Canada. To support the right honorable gentleman quoted figures indicating the general expansion of trade between the two countries, arguing thereby that Canadian participation would have been hindered through the measure.

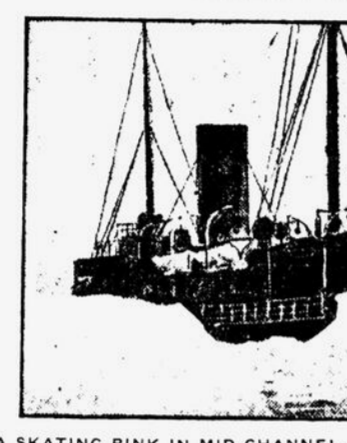

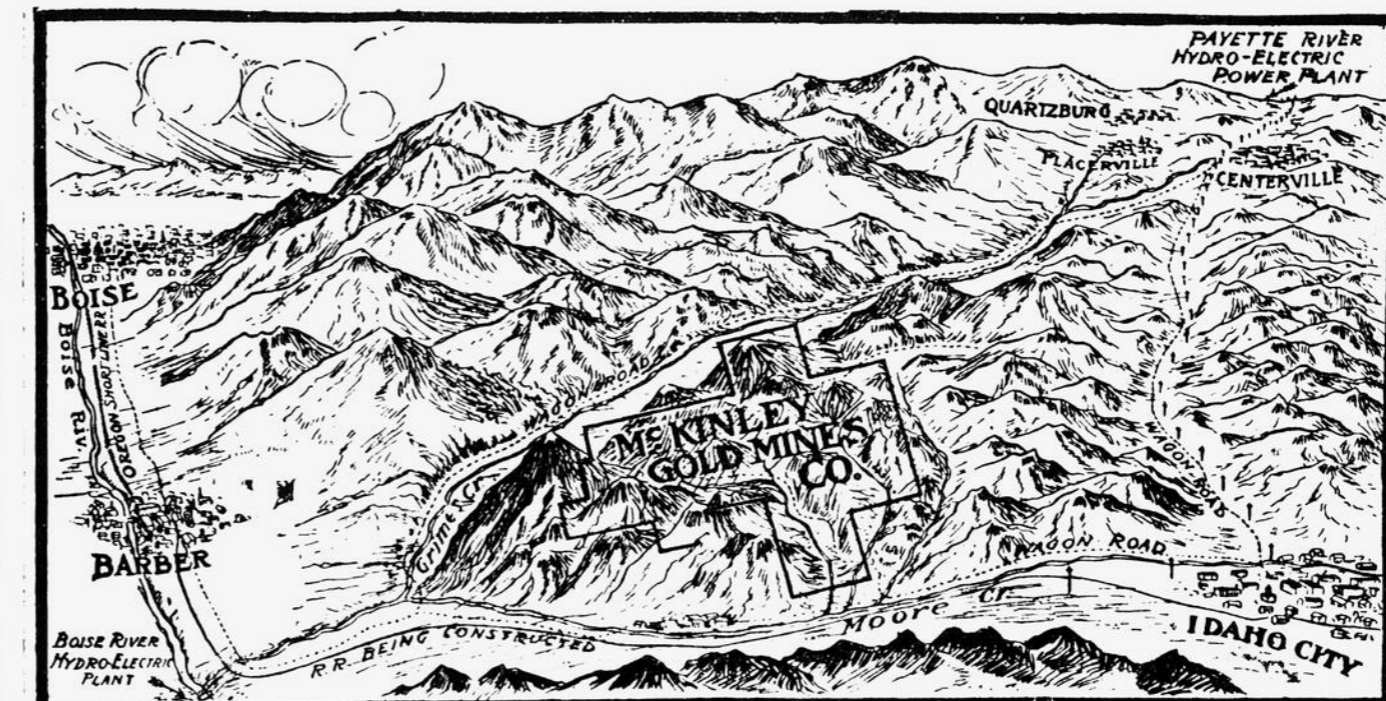

TO PERPETUATE OUR HANDICRAFTS

Canadian Handicrafts Guild Exhibition Interesting Object Lesson on Arts Peculiar to Dominion.

In seeking to put before the public their true aim and object, in reviving those arts and crafts peculiar to various races inhabiting the Dominion, which had threatened to disappear and in order to encourage the best of our Canadian artists and handicrafts men are conducting an exhibition in the Art Gallery of various handicrafts, intended to illustrate not only the artistic and industrial character of the hand-made articles, and the practical purposes to which they may be applied, but as well the best work in the line of the more important articles, which are being encouraged to spend leisure moments in the weaving of homespun, rugs and hangings, wood carving, lacemaking and so on to their great industrial advantage, as people are now sufficiently alive to the artistic superiority of the hand-made article to be willing purchasers.

In the handicrafts cottage, arranged in the centre of the large gallery, the Guild is presenting a new feature in the craftsman's furniture, with which the various rooms of the cottage are furnished, of these rooms a dining-room, living-room, smoking den and bedroom. It is difficult to say which is the more having the white enamel furniture and rug and chairs, in which the predominant shade is pastels, the last named presents an extremely dainty appearance. In the dining room the furniture is stained forest green, made after the mission pattern, with rug and hangings of red homespun. Mr. Paul Beau has a beautiful collection of lacemaking brass, iron and copper, while the Yukon collection of carved ivory, beads and bead bags, wood carvings, waders for mats, etc., is also attracting a great deal of attention. Some very lovely stenciled designs, selected by Miss Violet Irwin, and a number of very handsome pieces of hand-painted china by Mr. P. McLeod and Miss Hagar.

The original postage of the Guild, Michael Masse, who is now maintaining himself by his basket work, has a special exhibit of baskets in all sizes. Side by side with the lacemaking display are some very handsome costumes made by some of our leading tailors and modistes, demonstrating the practical use of the homespun material. There are also on display a collection of native work from the Shetland Islands, including shawls, gloves, jerseys, caps, etc., of Shetland wool, in a most artistic manner.

The exhibition is under the patronage of their Excellencies Earl and Countess Grey, will close on the 14th—Saturday next.

Anderson, who has been working for a farmer for some time, made no attempt to escape, though he refused to admit the charge of theft, on which he will be taken back to England. It is alleged that Anderson, while employed by the bank at Manchester, stole a sum of £1,000. Before the theft was detected Anderson left the employ of the bank and came to Canada, coming straight to Winnipeg last August, and putting up at the Imperial Hotel, where he stayed for about a month, when he returned to the Old Country until about six weeks ago, when he came back and engaged to work for a farmer near Dominion City. The provincial police authorities were notified shortly after Anderson's first departure from England, and a search was made for him, but without success, but on his second arrival here the police had better luck.

Valuable Farm Stock Destroyed. Special to The Montreal Star. Fredericton, N.B., March 11.—Two teams of heavy draught horses, a valuable driving horse, 13 head of cattle, and four hogs were roasted to death in an early morning fire at 65-67-69 St. John's farm at Crook's Point, ten miles from here. MADE STRONG PLEA FOR CHURCH UNITY

Time Ripe for Union Movement, Said Rev. Dr. Symonds in Sunday Evening Sermon.

"Some Advantages of the Unity of the Church," was the subject chosen by the Rev. Dr. Symonds for his evening sermon at Christ Church Cathedral yesterday. A subject which it was found that he was capable of saying much in favor of. The doctor chose for his text Philipians 1, 27, which speaks of basing one's religion upon the Gospel of Christ, standing fast in one spirit and with one mind striving together for the faith of the gospel, it being from this last clause that he drew the arguments in favor of his subject.

"The time is ripe for unity," said he. "The opportunity now presented may very quickly pass, never to return. With our North West rapidly filling with a varied population, it is of the highest importance that the unifying power of religion should be brought to bear upon that vast territory. If this union could be accomplished, such a church as the world has not yet seen might come into existence there, to be a source of an speakable blessing to Canada and an object lesson to the world."

NAVY NOT TO BE WEAKENED.

First Lord Tweedmouth Makes Important Statement on Naval Policy.

London, March 11.—First Lord of the Admiralty, Lord Tweedmouth delivered a speech at Oxford, in which he referred to the fact that the Government was receiving considerable obloquy from the untruthful statements regarding its action in the matter of The Hague Peace Conference. The Government, he said, did not pretend to weaken its naval power, believing that, whatever the cost, the British navy must be kept sufficient for its purposes. "We should go to The Hague," he said, "fully determined, and if the other powers do not meet us, they must take the responsibility."

WORKMAN KILLED IN STEEL PLANT.
