ST. FRANCIS STREET PROJECT WAS WAGGLED THROUGH BY ALD. LANGIS

With Two Members of City Council Absent Last Evening, Finance Committee Chairman Succeeded in Having Motion Adopted Whereby Proposed Opening of St. Francis Street Is Included in City's Programme of Winter Unemployment Relief Work—Alderman Langis Refused to Have Public Meeting Called—Extra \$45,000 Will Be Required for Expropriation Costs.

TAKING advantage of the absence of two members of the City Council and the presence of Alderman Gelin, from whom he knew he would receive favorable support, Alderman L. R. Langis, chairman of the finance committee, managed to have a resolution adopted at last night's regular meeting of the City Council whereby the \$145,000 St. Francis street project was reinstated in the list of unemployment relief work which the city will undertake during the winter months.

This move on the part of Alderman Langis is in direct contradiction to the resolution adopted at a special meeting of the Council on Saturday night last, when, by a vote of five to four, it was decided to proceed with the programme of sewer and sidewalk work, but to abandon the opening of St. Francis street for the time being.

In re-introducing this matter Ald. Langis said that he was acting upon advice received from the city attorneys. He claimed that his action was perfectly legal and in conformity with the city charter.

If the finance chairman was acting legally, the rule of the Council that no motion be amended, repealed or modified at the first subsequent meeting of the Council, provided that notice of a motion to that effect be given immediately or be inserted in the order of the day of such meeting, and that said motion receive the affirmative vote of two-thirds of all members of the Council.

"If a motion to reconsider is not made at the sitting at which the resolution is proposed to repeal or modify has been adopted, or at the following sitting, fifteen days' notice thereof must then be given, and the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of the whole Council shall be required for the adoption of the same."

"The motion to reconsider shall be put and decided in the first place, before the repeal or amendment to the resolution is considered, and the adoption of such motion shall have the effect of restoring the question to the state in which it was previous to the vote."

When the Council met for its regular session last evening it was a source of satisfaction to Alderman Langis and the mayor to see that Alderman Fortier and Forest, who were absent, both of these aldermen had favored the postponement of the opening of the St. Francis street when the vote was taken on Saturday night. Alderman Gelin, who was absent on Saturday, was present last evening and was, no doubt, heartily welcomed by the finance chairman.

Realizing that there was no immediate need for pushing this matter through last night, and in view of the decision which the Council had passed only two nights previous, Alderman Bradley, Armistead and Edwards made a determined effort to stop the wild race which the finance chairman had started, and in which he was followed by Aldermen Morin, Gelin, Blais and Lacombe. Try as they did, reason as they would, Alderman Langis was not to be stopped. He wanted to get the St. Francis street project through at any cost.

Even the suggestion that the matter be left over until Tuesday of next week, and that in the meantime a public meeting be called to determine exactly what public opinion was on this important matter, meant nothing to Alderman Langis. He apparently cared little for the opinion of the citizens. He held the reins and he intended to drive his horses right into the fire, even if he but headed into tragedy.

Why Alderman Langis should be so determined to get this matter through is not hard to explain. It is well known that he is a property owner on St. Francis street, and that the value of his property will greatly increase once the street has been opened as now proposed.

Alderman Langis did not try to answer the questions which were put to him, nor to give sound reasons for his actions. All that he knew was that he had put a motion to the Council and as he was sure of getting it through he was going to have it voted upon.

In re-introducing his St. Francis street proposal, Alderman Langis tried to belittle some of the arguments which were brought forward at the meeting on Saturday night. However, his words bore little in the way of sound reasoning. He could see, or rather he tried to make his hearers believe that he saw, no objections to the St. Francis street project as already outlined. LLOYD GEORGE TO RESIGN AS LIBERAL CHIEF

Stated that Sir Herbert Samuel Will Probably Be Chosen as Leader at Party Caucus Tomorrow.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The prediction was made in political circles today, as the new parliament opened, that Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George would not seek re-election as chairman of the Liberal party, a post he has held since 1924.

He will take a long holiday to recuperate from his recent illness, it was said, and Sir Herbert Samuel will probably be chosen leader at the party caucus tomorrow.

Much interest was aroused by the report in political circles, and the suggestion was made that the famous Welshman may have decided not to sit with the Liberals in the House, but to take a place among the Opposition on the front bench, a location to which his position as Privy Councillor entitles him.

However, he has planned a trip to the Mediterranean and a vacation in Wales, to continue his recuperation from the effects of his recent illness and operation, and in the meantime he may not attend parliament sessions except to take the oath.

SELECTION OF NEW SPEAKER MAIN BUSINESS BEFORE BRITISH HOUSE

Actual Opening of Parliament and Reading of Speech from the Throne to Take Place Next Tuesday—Overwhelming Majority for National Government Led to Great Rush for Seats—Premier MacDonald Expected to Announce New Cabinet Shortly.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The new House of Commons, packed with an overwhelming majority for Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald's National Government, met for its first session this afternoon.

It was a routine meeting for the election of a speaker and other preliminary business, including the swearing in of new members. The King will open parliament formally next Tuesday.

LABOR PARTY MAINTAINS CONFIDENCE IN LEADER

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Parliamentary Labor Party, greatly depleted by the balloting in last Tuesday's election voted unabated confidence in Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson as its leader today and invited him to continue in that position.

George Lansbury was unanimously chosen chairman of the party and as such will be its floor leader in the House of Commons.

Mr. Henderson, who was defeated in the election, attended the meeting. He is recovering slowly from a cold which incapacitated him in the last days of the campaign.

BELIEVE PRIME MINISTER HAS COMPLETED CABINET

LONDON, Nov. 3.—Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald had lunch today at Buckingham Palace with the King and Queen and it was assumed that he submitted to His Majesty a list of the new cabinet.

MEMBERS CAMPED ALL NIGHT IN PARLIAMENTARY LIBRARY

LONDON, Nov. 3.—A drowsy vanguard of victors, somewhat the worse for camping in the Parliamentary library during the night, was the first evidence that a new regime took hold in Great Britain today with the opening of the new parliament elected last week.

The first comers appeared before midnight last night, although they had more than twelve hours to wait for the doors to open, and prepared to catch what sleep they could in the library in order to be first in the rush for seats when the doors opened.

Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald was looking toward a holiday. He will leave London tonight for his Scottish home at Lussiemouth to snatch a few days' rest, after the labors of his campaign and the subsequent cabinet-framing. There he will prepare for the real beginning

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 3.—The coast guard patrol boat Harriet Lane rammed and sunk an unidentified power boat of British registry off the Maine coast during the night. The power boat's crew of nine men were taken aboard the Harriet Lane and brought into port.

PROSPECTS FOR ARMS MEETING ARE FAVORABLE

Replies Received by League of Nations from Thirty-Seven Nations Taken as Indication of Hearty Co-operation for Arms Truce.

GENEVA, Nov. 3.—Officials of the League of Nations today are analyzing the replies of thirty-seven governments to the one year armaments holiday proposal. They believe that the move for an arms truce may properly be considered to have accomplished something valuable in preparing for next February's disarmament conference.

It is believed moreover that the truce holds great possibilities for the future in providing stabilization of the present arms situation.

Bulgaria sent its affirmative reply today raising the number of those received to thirty-seven. Rumania suggested that the truce agreement embody a provision for penalties in case of failure to fulfill its engagements.

BYE-ELECTIONS HOLDING KEY TO NEW HOUSE

Results of Vote in Five Congressional Districts Today Will Determine Whether Democrats Will Organize House.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 3.—Riding to the sway of balloting today in five Congressional districts is the Grand Jury, the domination of the House by Republicans.

From the results of these and other elections in a number of states, observers will seek to read political foreshadowings of events during the 1932 presidential campaign.

Of the five special elections called to fill vacancies in the House, the outcome in two usually Republican districts is considered doubtful. They are the first Ohio and eighth Michigan.

The Democrats, who have formed the House minority since 1918, have assailed the Hoover administration. Whatever the election results, they will be generally interpreted as the political sentiment toward the chief executive.

Should the Republicans return representatives from the three seats traditionally theirs, the most they could do would be to tie the Democrats at 216, as the Democrats have virtually been conceded victory in the other two districts which are normally in their column.

The present line-up gives the Democrats 214, Republicans 213. Farmer Labor, one vacancy severe, will be filled December 1st. It may be the decisive district, should today's elections go as in the past.

Today's session is held merely for the purpose of electing the Speaker, who today will be nominated by Sir George Courthope, Conservative, who has sat in the House for a quarter of a century, and seconded by Will Thorne, veteran Labor member.

Today's meeting is expected to be the last of the old emergency national cabinet will hold.

COURT OF KING'S BENCH OPENED THIS MORNING

Oath Administered to Members of Grand Jury—Quite a Number of Persons Anxious to Sit on Jury This Term.

The annual term of the Court of King's Bench for the District of St. Francis was inaugurated this morning with all the traditional pomp and ceremony attendant on such an occasion. Shortly after ten o'clock, His Lordship, Mr. Justice Charles D. White, wearing his customary robes and tricorn, ascended the Bench and Court Crier Denis Gaudin proclaimed the term open.

Sheriff C. E. Therrien was present, and on motion from Crown prosecutor Wilfrid Lazure, K.C., submitted the list of Grand Jurymen to Clerk of the Court J. V. Artois. Mr. Artois called the role of the twelve jurors, all being present as also were the four supplementary jurors.

John Copping, of Eaton Township, was named foreman of the jury, which is composed of Emerlie Picard, Weedon Village; Arthur Brown, Township of Compton; Elphège Gosselin, St. Raymond de Paroisse; George Halliday, Newport Township; Alma Comtois, Coaticook; Ben. Hoyer, Clifton Township; Eugene Boisvert, Melbourne Township; Joseph Couture, East Angus; Bernard Kellett, Windsor Township; Arthur Auclair, St. Joseph de Ham, and Alexander Anto, Coaticook. The four supplementary jurors are William Picard, St. Georges de Windsor; Frederick Joseph, Melbourne Township; Joseph Fortier, St. Isidore d'Auckland, and Harold McClary, Hatley Village.

It is understood that both Sheriff Therrien and Crown Prosecutor Lazure received numerous requests from persons who wished to be chosen. The good pay obtained by jurors is said to have been the basis of these requests, while the easy task performed by the Grand Jury when compared with the onerous burden assumed by the petit jurors was a further temptation.

An unanimous decision is not necessary to return a true bill or no bill," His Lordship declared. "If seven of you are in accord, you may make your decision known." However, the presiding judge continued, before you are able to return "no bill" you will have to examine all the witnesses named by the Crown, on the other hand, the evidence of all the witnesses were not necessary to return a true bill. No other witness than those on the back of the indictment could be called, Judge White concluded, unless by a written order from the Court.

The interpreter, George Beauchemin, and all the officials connected with the deliberations of the Grand Jury were sworn in and the accused who are out on bail awaiting trial were summoned before the Court. Eleven of these put in an appearance, defaults were two cases, while the Court was informed that the bench warrant issued for Alexandre Cloutier, accused of theft, had not yet been filled. Cloutier was scheduled to appear last term, but fled from the Court.

RUMORS OF RUSSIAN ACTIVITY ON BORDERS OF MANCHURIA PERSIST

Japanese Cabinet Yesterday Considered the Manchurian Situation, Giving Particular Attention to Unofficial Reports that China Had Entered into Secret Arrangements With Soviet Officials—Reply to China's Suggestions for Direct Negotiations Ready.

TOKYO, Nov. 3.—Chinese factional strife in Southern Manchuria complicated the Sino-Japanese controversy today. Chang Hsueh-Liang, young Chinese War Lord and Governor of Manchuria, whose palace at Mukden has been taken over by the Japanese, was reported in dispatches to have conquered troops of the dependent general Ling Yin-Ching near Panchanhsien.

Previously Nationalist Chinese troops had put down another separatist movement in Manchuria. Chang Hai-Peng, who sought to establish an independent government at Tsitsihar, was soundly defeated by troops of the absent Governor, Wan Fu-Lin.

Rumors of Russian military activity along the borders of northern Manchuria persisted, although

POPULATION OF VILLAGES IN E.T. HAS INCREASED

Statistics Reveal that Population in Villages of Eleven Counties Augmented 7,606 in Past Ten Years.

The population of the villages of the eleven counties of the Eastern Township, Nov. 1st, 1931, recorded an increase of 7,606 over the total ten years ago. This interesting comparison is revealed in a bulletin report issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics under instructions of the Minister of Trade and Commerce. The report covers all the villages of the Province of Quebec and affords remarkable contrasts in today's population as compared with that of a decade ago.

Asbestos showed the largest augmentation in population, increasing the number of residents by 100.37 per cent. This is the highest increase registered. In 1921, Asbestos had a population of 2,189 while the last census revealed 4,388 inhabitants. Lawrenceville and Cowansville come next as far as increases are concerned. The former village is increasing by 70.67 per cent, while the latter village's population was augmented by 70.57.

In the majority of the smaller centres, a decrease is noted. The trend of their residents has been toward the larger cities, with the result that their populations have been considerably depleted.

The percentage increases and decreases by counties is given below: Arthabaska: Princeville, 12.20 increase; Chateaufort, 8.95 increase; Warwick, 2.71 increase; Daveluyville, 10.64 decrease. In the majority of the smaller centres, a decrease is noted.

CONTESTATION FUND SOURCES STILL MYSTERY

Camille Houde Fails to Tell Court Where He Raised the Money to Provide for Contestation Deposits.

MONTREAL, Nov. 3.—Exactly where the money required to contest the election of Liberal members in the Eighteenth Legislature of the Province of Quebec came from is still a secret between Camille Houde ex-leader of the Conservative party and a few of his friends.

Mr. Houde was in the witness box for some time in connection with the case against Jos. Cohen, K.C., M.L.A. for St. Lawrence. Mr. Houde admitted providing the sixty thousand dollars necessary, and also admitted that the money was not his own, but that he had obtained it in other quarters. He had not been given this money as Opposition leader, however, but rather as an individual. Although Justice Boyer, who was hearing the case, offered to permit a question as to where Mr. Houde got the money, the Liberal party lawyers refused to ask it.

Mr. Camille Van Wassenhove, the principal petitioner in the case, when called to the stand, declared that he made up his mind to contest the election of Mr. Cohen on election night. He had considerable property and was prepared to pay his own costs. He was not sure whether he would have to reimburse his lawyer for the deposit made with the petition, as the matter of expenses was to be settled after the trial.

Charles Boucher, the second petitioner, supported the statements of Van Wassenhove before the hearing adjourned.

PREMIER APPROVES POPPY DAY.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 3.—Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister, has given his endorsement to the poppy day campaign to be carried out throughout Canada.

FORMER MECHANIC IS NOW HEAD OF STATE IN MEXICO

Col. Roberto Fierro, Noted Flier, Inducted into Office by Chihuahua Legislature.

EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 3.—A former garage mechanic is the new governor of Chihuahua, one of the most important states in Mexico. He is Col. Roberto Fierro, thirty-six, noted flier, who was inducted into office yesterday by the Chihuahua Legislature, succeeding Andres Ortiz.

Ortiz resigned as a result of a fierce political struggle between himself and Luis Leon, a former governor.

Only a few years ago Fierro was a mechanic in a small garage in El Paso, on whose streets he played as a child. He learned about motorgs there.

PREMIER LAVAL CONGRATULATED BY FOLLOWERS

Two-Hour Report Which He Gave on Washington Deliberations Met With Hearty Approval of Cabinet Ministers.

PARIS, Nov. 3.—Premier Pierre Laval received the congratulations of his Cabinet today at the end of a two hour session during which he reported in detail on his conference with President Hoover.

The results of the trip to Washington, said a communique issued when the meeting ended, "demonstrated in particularly useful fashion the necessity of the amicable and confident co-operation of France and the United States."

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NEW QUEBEC LEGISLATURE OPENED WITH ALL PROVERBIAL CEREMONY

Only Two Changes Noticed in Cabinet of Hon. Mr. Taschereau Which Faced House Today—Hon. C. J. Arcand, First Minister of Labor, and Hon. George Bryson, Member Without Portfolio—Government Commands Overwhelming Majority in Assembly.

QUEBEC, Nov. 3.—The first session of the Eighteenth Quebec Legislature opened here today. The House is composed of ninety newly elected members, seventy-nine Liberals and eleven Conservatives.

ACTUAL DAMAGE BY EARTHQUAKE UNDETERMINED

Disrupted Communications Prevented Reception of Definite Reports as to Loss of Life and Property in Japanese Islands Yesterday.

TOKYO, Nov. 3.—Conflicting reports of an earthquake which shook Kyushu, southernmost island of the Japanese chain, were received here today, estimates of casualties ranging from a few to one thousand.

Disrupted communications prevented the reception of definite reports as to the loss in life and property.

Three successive quakes disturbed the residents of Kyushu and adjacent Shikoku Island yesterday. The shocks were several hours apart, the first occurring early in the morning, the second about 4 p.m. and the third at 7:59 p.m.

The meteorological observatory here placed the epicentre of the quakes in the sea off Miyazaki Prefecture, Kyushu.

Despatches to the newspapers Jiji Shimpo and Hicho Shunbun placed the casualties at one thousand and stated two hundred houses collapsed, while the newspaper Asahi was informed only a few were killed and about a dozen houses toppled.

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Wet Weather, Which Is Causing Millions of Bushels of French and German Wheat to Sprout, Eliminating Some of World Surplus—Russian Export Organizations Trying to Secure Cancellations of Some of Their Futures Commitments in Great Britain.

BERLIN, Nov. 3.—Wet weather, which is causing millions of bushels of French and German wheat to sprout in the stock, is eliminating some of the world surplus which depressed markets during the spring and summer.

The Market Council, which it was said that from 30,000,000 to 50,000,000 bushels would be unfit for milling because of the weather, and would have to be used for fodder.

The same sources said Russian export organizations are trying to secure cancellations of some of their future commitments in Great Britain, and that Russian wheat exports dropped 2,000,000 bushels last week under the week preceding—a fifty per cent decline. An official at the Soviet embassy said the country's wheat supply is sufficient for home needs, with some for export.

Some statisticians compared Germany's present cereal crops with the poor years of 1924-25 and 1926-27. Whether these factors will result in the purchase of wheat from Canada or whether orders will go to Argentina, United States or elsewhere, cannot now be determined, grain authorities said.

Private advices reaching consular officials said Russian crops were poor in Siberia and the Ukraine, with a fair harvest in the Volga valley, and that a considerable portion of the Soviet spring campaign is un-matured. Officials said the present world crop is not far in excess of world needs.

HEAVY LOSSES REPORTED IN RUSSIA OWING TO DROUGHT

MOSCOW, Nov. 3.—In spite of heavy losses due to drought, Russia's grain crops this year will at least equal those of last year, Vyacheslav Molotov, president of the Council of People's Commissars told an anti-drought conference here today.

The showing, he said, was made possibly by the collective farms and the state farm development. Famine among millions of people such as used to follow dry years, he said, are now unknown in Russia, due to Socialist reconstruction.

In spite of the loss of several hundred million bushels of grain this year, he said, the country already has harvested more than last year and the government has no doubt the plan to exceed last year's crops will be realized. The winter sowing, he said, exceeds that of 1930, and the spring sowing in 1932 is expected to be more than in 1931.

The conference was urged to study drought problems, and every worker who aids in the fight against dry (Continued on Page 7).

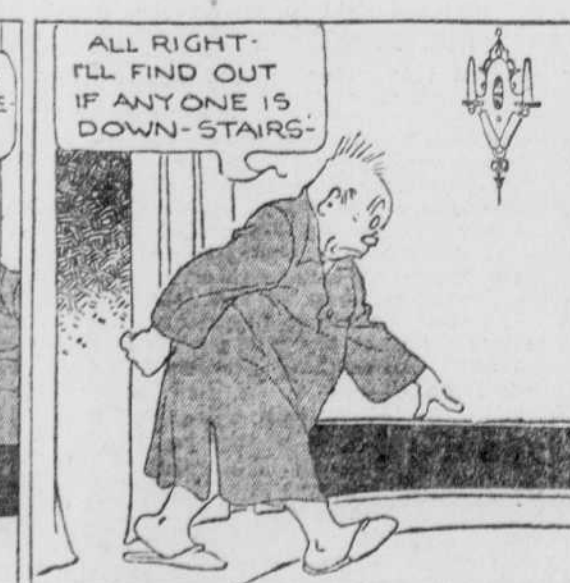

His Son Manly Tells About Jack Miner's Bird Sanctuary

Jack miner has a son, and because he was such a sturdy child as he lay in his cradle his father called him "Manly," and so he was christened "Manly F. Miner." He is his father's private secretary now, and possibly his business manager and correspondent as well. In a recent letter Manly says:

"Dear Mr. Wood,—We have had so many letters from readers of the Sherbrooke Record that I am going to send you half-a-dozen more recent articles written by Dad. But I will myself tell you a wonderful tale of the "Canada Goose." Here is the story by Manly F. Miner, and is an interpretation of Jack Miner and his bird sanctuary which Jack himself would be too diffident to tell:

MANLY F. MINER, Kingsville, Ontario."

Much ink has been used by various writers and authors describing the origin and history of the Jack Miner Bird Sanctuary, but none the big achievement there has been scarcely mentioned, namely, the catching and tagging of the Canada Goose to study its route of migration in both spring and fall, and to find where it nests and raises its young during the summer months.

It was in 1902 and 1903 that Jack Miner conceived the idea of establishing a bird sanctuary, the first of its kind in Canada, if not on the continent. Not until 1904 was work on the sanctuary actually started, and excavations made for ponds, several wing-tipped live decoy geese placed on same, and corn spread plentifully around the banks. Ducks and geese, in a short time, found this to be a place of safety. Both the conservationists and shooters were back of the Jack Miner scheme, because the Sanctuary, taking nothing from the shooters, constantly builds up the hunters' chances a mile away, the bird haven attracting many birds to the community.

At the same time the birds became wise enough, when shot at from the property where they were unprotected, to fly back to their safety zone and haven of rest.

Eventually the birds commenced to congregate on the Sanctuary in large numbers. Jack Miner had no desire to shoot, but was anxious to study and find out where these feathered creatures spent each season of the year. On August 5, 1909, he caught a duck and wrapped around its leg a piece of aluminum, on which was stamped his post office address. This was the first time Jack Miner had done such a thing and, incidentally, this record is probably the first of its kind on the continent.

Thus not only is Jack Miner's Sanctuary the first of its kind in North America, but he is the pioneer in tagging ducks.

A few months later—January 14, 1910—the duck which had the honor of bearing the first tag was killed by W. E. Bray, of Anderson, in South Carolina.

Naturally, great enthusiasm was caused and the problem then confronting the owner of the Sanctuary was how to build nets and other contrivances to catch the ducks without injuring them, in order that they might be tagged. He had no books or plans to which he could refer, for there was nothing of the kind in existence. So, after attracting the birds to the Sanctuary, it fell to the lot of Jack Miner to invent a contrivance for catching the ducks. This he accomplished after many months of work, the result being that today there are hundreds and hundreds of ducks flying to and fro across the continent wearing his tags. Nearly every mail brings reports to the Sanctuary from hunters of North America of the killing of tagged birds.

By 1914 Jack Miner had learned where ducks, Mourning Doves and Robins, spend each season of the year. His next ambition was to catch and tag Canada Geese, the wildest of wild birds and practically the largest migratory waterfowl on the continent. He soon found that catching Canada Geese was a very different undertaking compared with catching ducks.

The geese, at this time, were coming to the Sanctuary by the hundreds for food and protection—where

neither rich nor poor could enter with a gun; but to catch one of these birds for tagging purposes was another thing. They would not go near the "net" he had arranged for catching ducks. So, after a year's constant study, he contrived a method of having two ponds with a canal connecting them covered with net work and a trapdoor at both ends.

It was in 1915 that he caught his first wild Canada Goose and placed an aluminum on its leg, giving the post office address of the owner of the Sanctuary.

Jack Miner is by no means a religious fanatic, but he believes in the simple teachings of Christ and, being anxious to make his tagging system complete and fascinating, a short verse of Scripture, such as "Have faith in God," "God is able," and so forth, is stamped on one side of his tag. In this way every person who gets one of his tagged birds gets a verse of Scripture, which has more than doubled the interest of his tagging system.

In the spring of 1915 and just before the geese migrated for parts unknown in the North, he caught and tagged his first Canada Goose, and liberated it again with the big flock from which it had been taken.

Interest was aroused in the community as to who would kill it, and where. No one had ever caught one before for tagging purposes; no one knew where they nested. All that was known was that they went north and the settler in the most northern point in Canada always reported that "they went still farther north."

However, weeks and months rolled by, and, to the surprise of everyone, early in October of the same year, Jack Miner received a letter from the Hudson Bay Company at Moose Factory, dated August 19, 1916, containing this tag. The goose had been killed by an Indian in unexplored territory in the Hudson Bay District.

With real enthusiasm, Jack Miner began to work on the improvement of his goose trap in order to catch geese by the hundreds. The next year it proved to be a decided success. Many more geese were tagged and, later on in the season, word was received from different points along the east side of Hudson Bay and James Bay, and as far as Baffin Land of tagged geese being shot.

On one occasion the Reverend W. C. Walton, an Anglican missionary, who had spent between twenty and thirty years among the Indians and Eskimos and had never been out to civilization, came by canoe from Hudson Bay to Cochrane. Taking the train there, he in due course arrived at Kingsville and the Sanctuary. With him he brought a pocketful of tags, each which bore a passage of Scripture and Jack Miner's post office address. He had collected these from the Indians and Eskimos all the way from the factory, at James Bay, along the east coast of Hudson Bay and as far north as Baffin Land. The natives had brought them to him for interpretation of the verse of Scripture.

Through these tags, this devoted Christian missionary, together with the Hudson Bay fur dealers and the agents of the Hudson Fur Company, who have also co-operated to a great extent in collecting them from the natives, a lot of valuable information as to why these birds nest around the shores and islands of Hudson Bay and Baffin Land, instead of along the rivers and streams, has been revealed to the world.

The geese arrived in that vicinity around the latter part of April and the first part of May. The rivers and all fresh water are all frozen over at that season of the year, but the Hudson Bay is open up by the incoming ocean current and the geese prefer to nest where there is open water.

The tagging system has also revealed where they spend their winters. Each tag bears a date and it has been proven that very few geese which visit the Sanctuary in the fall visit the following spring, as practically all geese bearing fall tags are killed in the middle states, along the east of the Mississippi River and towards the Gulf of Mexico, while geese which are tagged in the spring winter along the Atlantic coast, mostly around Currituck Sound. CHANGES ANNOUNCED IN SASKATCHEWAN CABINET

Hon. M. A. Macpherson Succeeds Hon. H. McConnell as Provincial Treasurer—Latter Takes Over Municipal Affairs

REGINA, Nov. 2.—Hon. Howard McConnell, K.C., Provincial Treasurer and Minister of Municipal Affairs in the Saskatchewan Government, has been relieved of the Treasury post, and Hon. M. A. Macpherson, K.C., Attorney-General, will assume the portfolio in addition to his present office.

This announcement was made following a Cabinet meeting, by Premier J. T. M. Anderson. Decision was reached in council to advise His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor of the change and Hon. M. A. Macpherson will be sworn in as Provincial Treasurer early this week.

Heavy responsibilities placed upon the Minister of Municipal Affairs due to the difficult times facing many of the municipalities of the province was given by the Premier as the reason for the change. It was pointed out that it would be to the advantage of the municipalities that the minister in charge of the department should devote his whole time to municipal business.

Indication that the Natural Resources portfolio would shortly be transferred to another member of the Cabinet was also made by the Premier. It was indicated, however, that the change would not be made until the hearing of the commission on alienations of resources since 1905.

Rumor to the effect that Hon. A. C. Stewart, K.C., Minister of Highways, was in line for this post was prevalent at the legislative buildings. The portfolio is at present held by the Premier, who is also President of the Executive and Minister of Education.

The Master taught that in giving we are twice blessed, and to give to that which is worthy is to give to the donor more pleasure than that which he gives can possibly achieve.

THE GOOD MAKER PROUDLY AFFIXES HIS NAME.

I bought a pair of braces the other day, and when they were brought home they had neither the name of the manufacturer or the date of the making affixed to them, and rubber is a peculiarly time-killing quality fabric.

When Britain made her fame as a "Nation of Shopkeepers," though Napoleon meant manufacturers as well as traders, the name of each town in England was made famous for its quality in certain commodities. Woe betide the maker who besmirched the fame of his town by making inferior things, for each man must keep inviolate the name of his burgh.

Nottingham was famous for its laces. Cutlery with the name Sheffield stamped on it was superior.

Cottons from the Manchester or Lancashire district were good.

Woollens from Yorkshire, or "West of England" were better than the rest.

Ships from the Clyde were the pride of the ocean.

Birmingham was the seat of talented artificers in jewellery, but it lost caste and became "Brummagers."

Because of the fame which came to a town other manufacturers came to that district, not alone for prestige, but for centralizing service.

With Lancashire as the cotton county and Yorkshire as the woollen-weaving center, these counties became the pivot of their respective industries, and around the towns came all the tributary and complementary industries. It was economic that they should and it further fortified the specializing of industry.

So that, to compete, other countries had to subsidize their industries with a tariff, otherwise their manufacturers could not meet English goods on either a quality or a price basis.

The United States made the error in tariff-making of placing a work-both-ways subsidy on woollens. They charged a percentage duty on the price value, and a specific duty on the weight. The consequence was that all American cloth became lighter in weight, too light, almost tawdry. This brought on the winter epidemic of colds and the dread consumption.

When a manufacturer does not put his name on the article he makes he has a reason. Usually it is because his customers have made so many demands for replacements, that he thinks to avoid the claims against him and the loss of prestige by evading responsibility. Seeing his own viewpoint only and lacking the knowledge of how to make quality goods he thinks the claimants are trying to cheat him, so he leaves the door wide open to cheat his customers on quality.

A VACATION WHICH WE VIEW WITH ENVY.

After two years of conducting a daily newspaper and writing the editorials each consecutive day for the period the Editor envies his friend, George E. Ewing, manager of the Sherbrooke branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, who has just been granted a full two months' furlough by the Directors in recognition of his long and continuous service with the Bank. So closely has Mr. Ewing devoted himself to the affairs of the bank that his usual robust health had become slightly impaired. The managers at the head office were quick to accede to his request for a brief rest. His friends in the city and in the Eastern Townships will be glad to know that it is only a rest period, and join in the hope that the New Year will again see him at the helm.

Those who have followed Mr. Ewing's banking career, so often referred to in the historical "Thirty Years Ago," may even recall the recital of his entry into the bank from his home town of Richmond, of his experience in the broadening West, and of his upward climb to his present position in one of the leading manufacturing centers of Canada, where he sits each day in the traditional home and atmosphere of the old Eastern Townships Bank, and where he is ever ready to see and to solve the fiscal problems of his customers.

During Mr. Ewing's leave of absence Clinton E. Soles, presently manager of the bank at Rock Island, will occupy his chair. Mr. Soles is a first cousin of C. E. Soles, Postmaster of Sherbrooke, whose office is next door to the bank.

So we stay home to enjoy the life and the play, hoping to get an occasional half holiday on the farm.

IDEALS OF THE CANADA SENATE MUST BE PRESERVED.

That Senator Tobin was vindicated and hooliganism rebuked in the Richmond County elections was a foregone conclusion.

But one idea which we have always advocated

stands out in the evidence. Senators should never appear on public election platforms during a contest. They belong to the Upper House, which is a sort of court of review of the proceedings in the Lower House, except when the Senate is packed with too many members subservient or self-seeking. Presumably it is below the dignity of a Senator to mount a platform, and thus permit himself to be assailed by every vile-thinking person in the audience.

Canadian public assemblies are usually orderly. The listeners average a high order of courtesy, but the hooligan and the loud-voiced heckler are certain to creep in at some meetings.

Senator Tobin had been but recently called to the Senate, after thirty years of continuous service as a member, and his zeal as a politician persisted beyond the time when he should retire and preserve his new dignity as a statesman. Yet no one knowing his ardent temperament will hold that against him.

We are taught in school to look upon the Upper House as a gathering of solons, of wise and dignified men who may be kindly advisors to their old comrades, and may confer with them on tactics and policies, but they are above the broils of party strife. These are axioms, not maxims.

It is only recently that we have had to arise and chant the need for purging the Senate of its shame in other respects, and we do wish that the younger men shall hold in high regard this dignified body. Those who besmirch it must be removed, even if they be hardy enough to await impeachment.

BURIED IN THE TUNNEL.

Engineers pronounced the St. Francis street tunnel extension as both impractical and visionary. To the lay mind it looked foolish, but the projectors stubbornly adhered to their proposal to foist it upon the city as the "Bobbin plant cut-off."

Neither the Provincial nor the Federal Government will contribute a cent towards the building of what might be termed an expropriation job. Born in secret session, cradled in deep water, the whole project was so fishy that it smelt.

L. R. Langis, the chairman of finance, is interested in several pieces of property along the right-of-way on the muddy and often flooded street which it is proposed to join up with Wellington street by tunnel and canal. It might appeal to those who dabble in real estate, but every alderman who voted for it signs his ticket for private life.

Along the route of the proposed tunnel extension are these property-owners, with assessed value:

To expropriate certain pieces of these properties will cost in the neighbourhood of \$43,000, for other lots than the short-sighted projectors see would have to be purchased. There would be a permit necessary from the Railway Commission to undermine the tracks.

Behind this attempted raid on the Treasury are men who estimated the cost of the Westbury power plant at \$250,000. When it is repaired and rebuilt the Westbury power dam will cost \$600,000.

The estimated cost of this hurried bobbin plant tunnel is stated as \$145,000. It would cost twice that before it could be finished.

The Dominion Government has served notice to all Canada that there will not be grants or any portion of the unemployment fund given to such projects as this. So that the city had been burdened with a \$300,000 tunnel to the fish market and the Liquor Commission where an high-level viaduct would have cost the city but \$133,000.

There were no property appropriations in the high-level project, but some city aldermen prefer the under-pass—always. This time they lie buried in it.

DAMAGE ACTION IS THREATENED AGAINST CITY

Local Citizen Informs Civic Authorities of His Intention to Institute \$8,000 Damage Action Unless Nuisances of Incinerator Plant Remedied Within Fifteen Days.

The City of Sherbrooke is now faced with the possibility of an \$8,000 damage action as the result of the smoke, dust and odor emanating from the recently constructed incinerator.

Mr. Edwin Ducker, a resident of the Brompton Road, has decided that he is not going to suffer any longer. He has repeatedly complained to the civic authorities of the unsatisfactory conditions resulting from the operation of the incinerator, but has received no consideration. He has now decided to take action and the aldermen were notified of his intentions in a letter from his attorneys presented to the Council last evening.

Mr. Ducker is allowing the city fifteen days in which to remedy present conditions. If at the expiration of that time nothing has been done, legal procedure will be instituted.

The incinerator was another project which was hurried through the City Council. The aldermen were given repeated warning by the Record that only the best type of incinerator would give satisfaction, but they preferred to act in their usual manner, disregarding all outside advice and assistance. The result has been that the incinerator has proven anything but satisfactory and the city forced to spend a considerable amount of money from time to time in making improvements.

The following is the letter which Mr. Ducker's attorneys submitted to the City Council last evening.

"We have received instructions from Mr. Edwin Ducker to call the city's attention to the great inconvenience and severe damages suffered by him as the result of the operation by the City of Sherbrooke of its incinerating plant and dump on the Brompton Road.

"Mr. Ducker is the proprietor of an adjoining property, commonly known as the 'Rack-a-Rock' property, from which, prior to the installation by the City of the incinerating plant, and the moving northward of its dump was bringing to our client a good revenue. Since the dump has

been removed northward Mr. Ducker has had to suffer severely from the rats which infest the city's property, and the surrounding properties, attracted by the garbage which has been thrown in the dump. His property has further had to suffer from the smoke, odor and dust emanating from the incinerating plant.

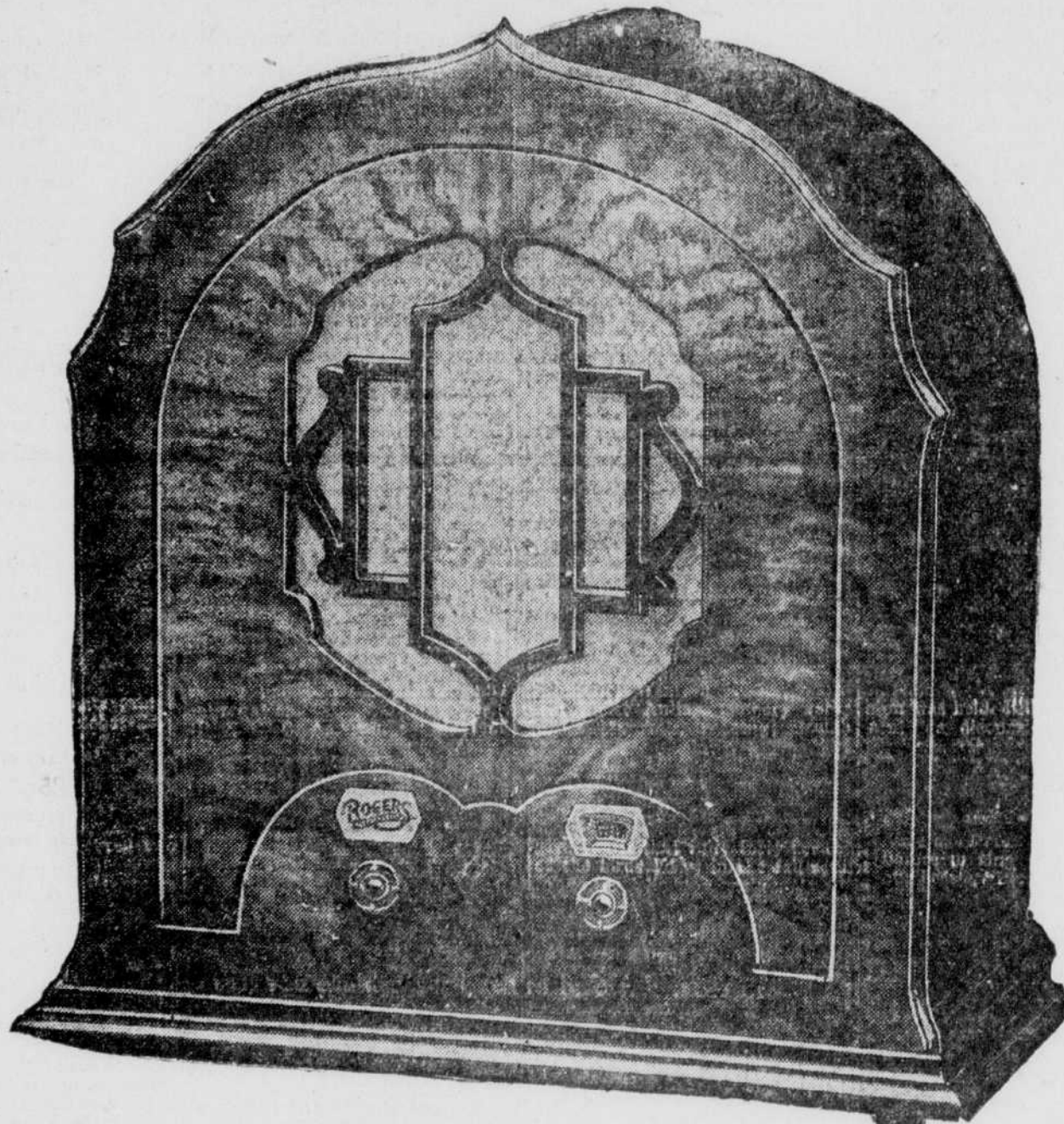
"Furthermore, the city, without any permission from our client, has taken upon itself to use the property of our client as a right of way from the highway to this dump.

"Our client has further to complain of the smoke, dust and odor which emanates from the city's asphalt plant, which is adjoining the incinerating plant.

"Our client has several times reported this state of things to the city's representative, but nothing has been done to improve the situation, which is now aggravated to a point where our client's property has become valueless, and thereby he has suffered damages to the extent of \$8,000 for which he holds the city responsible.

"Unless a settlement is reached within fifteen days of the foregoing, an action will be instituted by our client to recover these damages."

FREE DRAWING CLASSES ARE WELL ATTENDED

Ambitious Young Men, Anxious to Prepare Themselves for Further Endeavors Along Engineering or Architectural Lines, Receive Competent Teaching.

A young girl is sitting at an easel, and a skillful hand moves rapidly across a white sheet, leaving behind shadowy lines. The crayon flashes quickly, and those shadowy lines materialize into definite shape, distinguishable in a few moments as a chalk replica of a large bust that is resting majestically on a table nearby. Or perhaps the girl is adding the finishing touches to an already recognizable portrait, glancing from her work toward the object she is depicting and shading, without hesitation. She is absorbed in her art, and does not notice one's approach as one enters the large room. Perhaps she looks up, smiles uninterestedly and returns to her work. The room is spacious. Easels stand everywhere and a large number of students, including boys and girls, are at work. One, in his teens, is experiencing difficulty in attaching a resemblance with his crayon to the object he is sketching—an apple, it may be, a conical figure, or merely a square block of wood. Others are adept at their work, and sketch rapidly with visible talent.

The above is a typical scene that greets a person upon visiting the free hand drawing class held Monday and Wednesday evenings in the Griffith Building. It is one of three classes conducted by the Provincial Government and open free to all persons interested in drawing, whether free hand, mechanical or architectural.

The mechanical and architectural classes were inaugurated in 1894, under the supervision of Messrs. Robert Wyatt and C. J. Digby, respectively. They have been conducted every year in Sherbrooke since that date, and always attracted a large number of ambitious young men anxious to learn the use of telescope and compass, in order to prepare themselves for further endeavors along engineering or architectural lines.

The architectural division, which is in charge of Mr. Denis Tremblay, has thirty-one pupils this year. These range in age from fifteen to twenty-seven years. There are thirty-two students registered in the mechanical drawing section, which is conducted by Messrs. L. P. Jones and J. P. Dubuc. The oldest is thirty-eight and the youngest pupil is fifteen. Twice a week members of this class give up evenings and work assiduously under shaded lamps, manipulating their drawing instruments and learning accuracy in execution, including the most minute details.

The instructors are genial men, capable in their work and anxious to help their pupils as much as they possibly can. "We have good classes this year," said Mr. Jones last evening to a Record representative who visited the establishment and was favorably impressed with what he saw. "Of course, the year has just started and many of the boys have had no experience in drawing. Our attendance is fairly good. It is a shame, however, that more young men do not avail themselves of this opportunity offered them. It is never too late to begin. The training they receive is a worthwhile recompense for the time they devote to the work." At the end of three years' training, the instructor explained, a pupil is able to read blueprints and sketch intelligently.

Mrs. Theodore Sagala, an affable lady who has a keen interest in her work, supervises the free hand drawing department. She has a class of thirty-seven pupils this year. A truly competent teacher, as the results of past years have shown, she evinces as deep an interest in the efforts of the pupils as they themselves.

"There are some remarkable talents here," she said with enthusiasm. "These boys and girls are clever, and produce some meritorious work. It is a wonderful art. Of course, it is impossible for these pupils to paint in oils, and they are obliged to work with crayons. But training in free hand drawing has many advantages." Mrs. Sagala explained that it was customary to have exhibitions of the work of the three divisions every year, but this was abandoned two years ago. She regretted this very much, as these exhibitions had always served to encourage the pupils.

The drawings in this division were exceptionally interesting. Mrs. Sagala was quick to point out the mer-

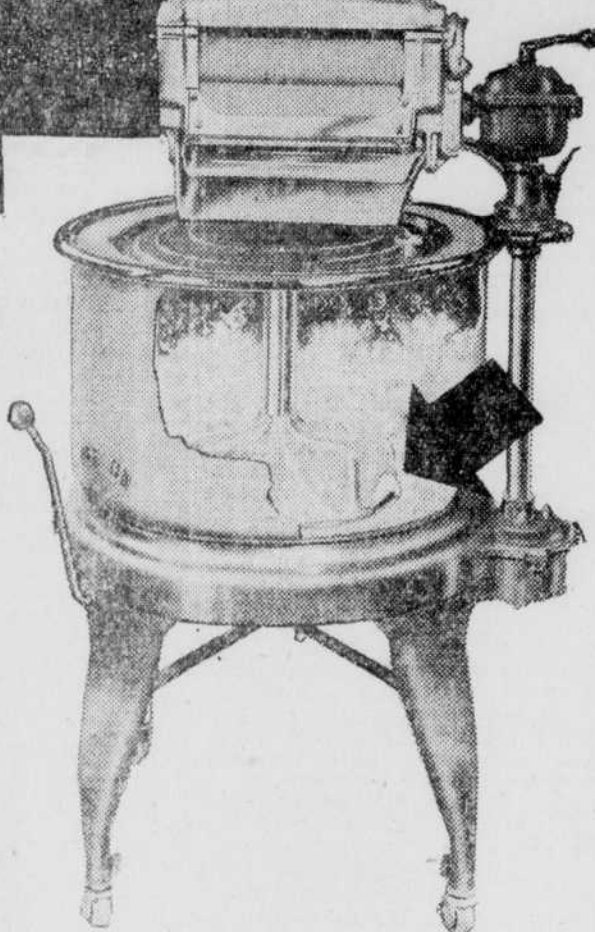

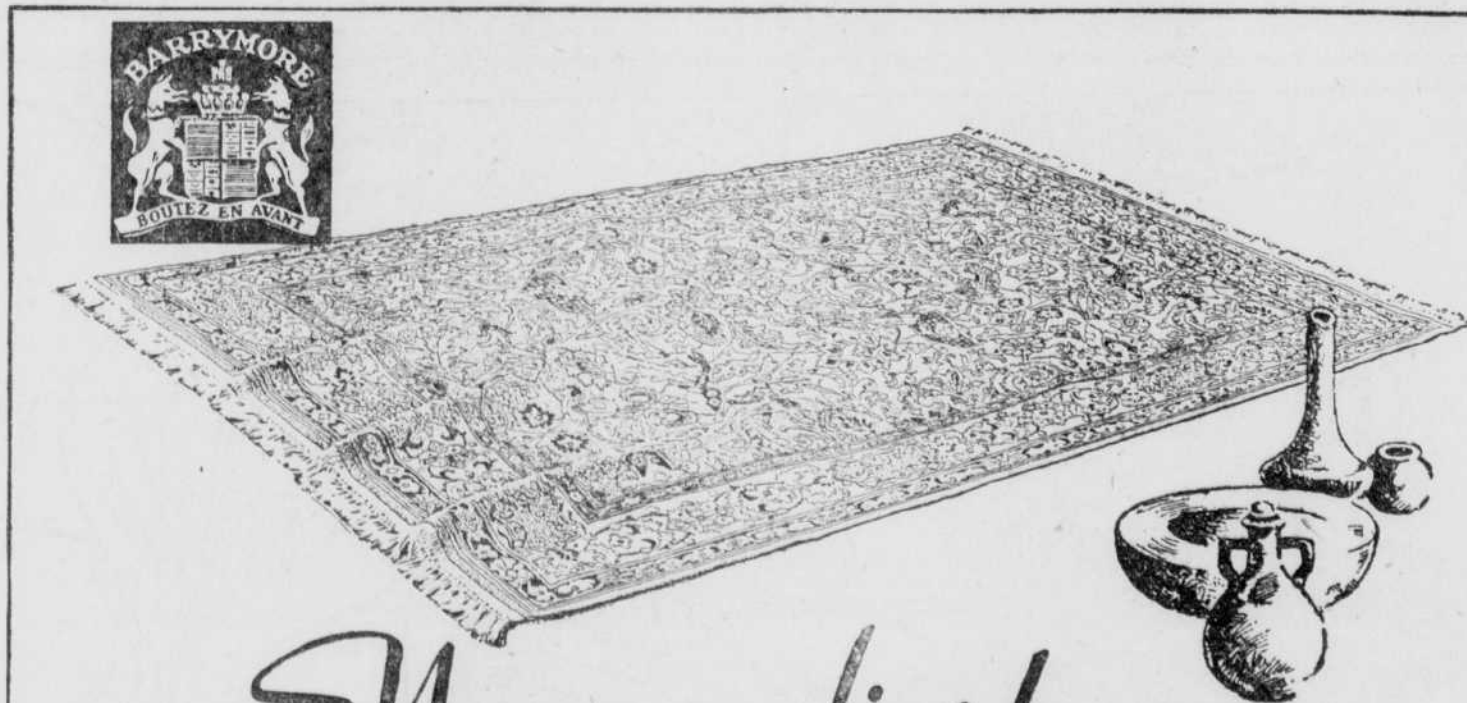

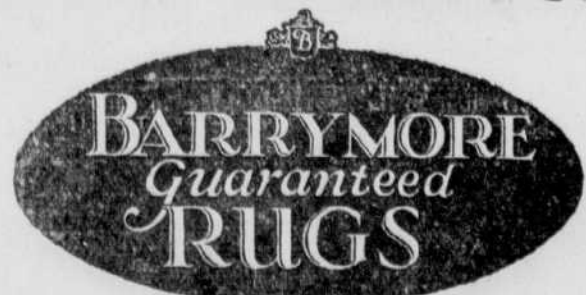

INQUIRY INTO NAVY REPORT INAUGURATED

Chisen Committee Plan for Placing on Trial Disputed Statements by William H. Gardiner, President of Navy League.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 3. — On the hastily convened bench of a five man court, President Hoover's contention that the spokesman of a big navy group spoke falsely and should apologize.

So swiftly did the President act, after receiving a membership list of the Navy League late yesterday, that not until today could the chosen committee lay plans for placing on trial disputed statements by William H. Gardiner, President of the League.

The five men named are Assistant Secretary Jahnke of the Navy, John Hayes Hammond, retired mining engineer, and Eliot Wadsworth, General, the President's emergency relief committee, all of whom were listed as members of the Navy League. The two non-league members are Under Secretary Castle of the State Department and Admiral Hugh Rodman, retired.

Their inquiry, a statement from the White House said, must be "solely into the assertions of fact" made by Gardiner, and not into his "opinions or conclusions."

The League president had accused Mr. Hoover of "gross and intentional ignorance of why navies are maintained." The League pamphlet, under his name, contained other blistering statements, too, which could be classified as opinions or conclusions.

The Navy League leader claimed directly, for instance, that President Hoover and Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald in 1929 reached agreements that never have "been divulged in their entirety," and that the administration refused to allow an executive session of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to view the full records of negotiations prior to the London Naval Conference.

These statements have been labeled a "tissue of falsehoods" by Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson.

Gardiner hinted also that the proposed Foreign Minister, Giovanni Giolitti, for a one year arms holiday actually was inspired by the Hoover administration, and that if the United States accepts the proposal "it does so knowing that its action specifically serves British and Japanese interests."

What action the Navy League itself will take in the matter probably will remain unsettled until Thursday.

Country and Dairy Produce Prices

MONTREAL, Nov. 3. — Montreal's butter market edged slightly further away from an export level yesterday. For the last few months, for the first time in years, local butter prices have been controlled by what could be obtained in England for the surplus production. Already over 150,000 boxes, or over 8,400,000 lbs., have been exported overseas this season. Now, with the season of lower production steadily approaching, and with prices available from British importers down on account of the reduced pound sterling value; and moreover with the prospects of exporting butter to the United States suddenly faded out because of a substantial drop in the U.S. States market in recent weeks, Montreal trading is almost entirely again a domestic matter. Last week only 2,007 boxes of butter went to the United Kingdom. Local requirements are around 10,000 boxes a week. Most dealers yesterday were asking 21c per lb. for carlots of Eastern Townships No. 1 pasteurized butter. Buyers were not disposed to pay more than 20c, and the market was generally quoted 20c to 21c per lb. Over the cable, on the basis of yesterday's sterling value, only 19 1/2c could be obtained, and no business would be done at that

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK MARKET

MASSEY HARRIS CONTINUED TO LEAD TRADING

Strength in Agricultural Implements Spread to Other Stocks at Opening of Montreal Stock Exchange.

MONTREAL, Nov. 3. — Massey Harris continued to hold the interest of traders as the Montreal Stock Exchange resumed trading this morning and still under the optimistic influence of the rise in wheat the stock sold up 3-5 to 6 at the opening.

Cockshutt Plow kept pace gaining 3-4 at 7-3, this morning. Canada Cement was up 1-8 at 3-3-4. Brazil, Interneve resumed trading this morning and still under the optimistic influence of the rise in wheat the stock sold up 3-5 to 6 at the opening.

Among the gold stocks the weekly average prices behaved as follows: Hollinger mounted from \$5.76 to \$5.87; Kirkland Lake from \$14.80 to \$15.70 and five cents, Lake Shore from \$27.46 to \$28.74. Labrie, accused of theft; Pierre Bolduc, accused of false pretences; Alphonse Gaillet, accused of manslaughter; and Xavier Vanasse, accused of indecent assault. Those remained until November 5th were: Eugene Gagnon, accused of perjury; J. D. Bisson, accused of theft of an automobile and of false pretences; J. L. Simard, accused of indecent assault; Leo Brouil, accused of criminal assault; and John Sinnott, accused of forcible entry.

Pierre, alias Albert St. Pierre, Vesina Dube and J. Adelaire Dube, of Hereford, received their first breath of fresh air this morning since they were incarcerated in the local jail in December following the preliminary hearing into the fatal shooting of Rene Malloy, of Norton Mills, Me., who was killed on November 11th last in a feud near the border. The three men are co-accused of the murder of the young American youth and, although they did not appear in Court, they were in an ante-room with the remainder of the prisoners who were awaiting trial. Both St. Pierre and the Dube brothers appeared little the worse for their long term behind the bars. St. Pierre still was quite as debonair as when he appeared before Corcoran, Eschard and Magistrate Lemay. The brothers, however, seemed to be more serious than usual. In the prisoners' chamber with the accused murderers were Albert Fredette, accused of a statutory offence; George E. Toed, accused of five charges of false pretences; John McVernan, accused of seduction; Frank Allen and Napoleon Laroche, accused of illegal entry of firearms into Canada and of theft; and Joseph Lanni and James Latimer, accused of carrying instruments for housebreaking. George Etienne Adam, accused of seduction, is at present in St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary, but application has been made to transfer the accused to this city.

In marked contrast to the ceremony which accompanied the opening of the Court room for the trial of the big court room. For years this same condition has existed despite repeated efforts on the part of Sheriff Therrien to have the authorities give the entire Court House a thorough house cleaning. MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 3. — Police were faced with what they regarded as a case of murder when the body of Mrs. Charles Lapointe, 57, was found in her home yesterday with a bullet wound in the head. A rifle was lying nearby.

The motive of the crime, if crime it was, did not readily appear.

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DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 3. — Detroit is electing a mayor and some fifty-five lesser officers today, and unless the political experts have misled the public pulse more than half of the city's half million registered voters will have participated before the polls close.

GRAINS ROSE AFRESH AT CHICAGO THIS MORNING

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 3. — Grains rose afresh early today after an irregular start. With trading on a big scale, Liverpool reported lack of wheat offerings either from Russia or other countries. New advances were in the face of reiterated official denials of assertions that Russia had withdrawn from the world market as an exporter. 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MINING STOCKS STRENGTHENED IN PAST WEEK

Weighted Index Number of Twenty Canadian Mining Issues Jumped from 61.0 to 63.0.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 3. — The weighted index number of twenty mining stocks computed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on the base 1926 equals 100, was 63.0 for the week ending October 29th, as compared with 61.0 for the previous week.

Eleven gold stocks rose from 62.1 to 63.9, four gold-copper stocks from 60.5 to 63.5, and five silver and miscellaneous stocks fell from 29.3 to 28.4.

Among the gold stocks the weekly average prices behaved as follows: Hollinger mounted from \$5.76 to \$5.87; Kirkland Lake from \$14.80 to \$15.70 and five cents, Lake Shore from \$27.46 to \$28.74. McIntyre from \$18.61 to \$19.47. Pemier from forty-nine cents to fifty-nine cents. Vipond Consolidated from fifty-four cents to fifty-eight cents and Wright-Hughes from \$2.81 to \$2.94. Tech Hughes dropped from \$5.79 to \$5.64.

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MANY U. S. MARKETS ARE CLOSED TODAY.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3. — Many United States markets are closed today because of the elections.

Wall Street was closed, as were stock exchanges in St. Louis, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Boston, Cleveland, Detroit and Louisville, Ky.

Exchanges in Chicago, Baltimore, Kansas City and cities west of there remained open, while commodity markets in some cities where stock exchanges closed did business.

NEW PROPOSAL SUBMITTED TO CITY COUNCIL

Owing to Continued Operating Loss of Sherbrooke Street Railway Company, Suggestion Is Made that City Lend a Helping Hand.

Owing to the continued financial loss under which the Sherbrooke Railway and Power Company has been operating, the suggestion has been made by Mr. H. E. Pawson, assistant commercial manager, that the city enter into partnership with the Southern Canada Power, operators of the Sherbrooke street railway, whereby the company's actual cash operating loss would be subsidized by the city.

Mr. Pawson submitted his proposal in a letter which was presented to the City Council last evening. As each alderman was given a copy of this letter there was no discussion on the matter.

Strange as it may seem, Alderman L. R. Langis actually requested that this letter be published in the press, an unusual demand from one who is so much given to secret meetings at the City Hall and to the transaction of the citizens' business behind closed doors. The letter reads as follows:

His Worship the Mayor and Aldermen,
Corporation of City of Sherbrooke,
Sherbrooke, Que.
Gentlemen:

"Following upon the most considerate attention which you gave me personally on Tuesday evening last, and at your expressed request, we are pleased to herewith confirm the substance of my remarks, as expressed before you, in connection with the various matters pertaining to the operation of the street railway in your city.

"As is fully realized, we feel, by your Council, the loss from the operation of this branch of the Sherbrooke Railway and Power Company, Limited, have been anything but satisfactory ever since the inauguration of this service, in spite of the fact that we have every reason to feel, and we think it is generally accepted, that we are furnishing an excellent service from every point of view for a city of the size of Sherbrooke, and throughout our occupation of the streets of your city the company has spared no effort to maintain this service at the highest possible standard.

"The total losses sustained by the operations of this street railway system over the period of years, which have expired since its inception, now amount to enormous figures, which losses in the past have always been borne and paid for by the Southern Canada Power Company.

"The operating loss sustained over the twelve months period ending September 30th, last, for the combined tramway and bus system operating within your city, that is to say not including that incurred by the busses running outside the city, amounts to, in round figures, the sum of \$22,000, and it is emphasized that this is an actual operating loss, that is to say that we have paid in cash for wages and material the sum of \$22,000 more than we have taken in in gross earnings.

"It is felt that this has not been fair to the shareholders of the Southern Canada Power Company and for some time past, the directors of the Southern Canada Power Company have been paying more than usual attention to this phase of our operations which has resulted in their coming to a decision that this condition of affairs can no longer be tolerated and, at the present time, the only reason why we are continuing to operate this street railway system is because we hesitate to throw out of employment some seventy men, some of whom have been with the company a considerable number of years, under present conditions.

"Upon looking up our records, it is found that during the past twelve months we have had a total of some seventy odd men employed steadily, including the office staff, and to whom the sum of \$80,000 has been paid in wages; from this point of view, therefore, you will readily recognize that the street railway, as such, constitutes the equivalent of a substantial industry in your city. Over and above this, the company has also paid in taxes to your municipality, during the past thirteen years, an amount of \$61,000, an average of something like \$4,700 per annum which, by the way, does not include any of the relatively large sums of money which have been paid by the company in the past for snow removal, street maintenance and other causes.

"The company, at no time in its history, has ever earned railway revenue to pay any return whatever to the bond holders and, of course, it has not been possible to make any provision whatever for depreciation.

"On reviewing the foregoing, it is apparent that we have come to the point where it is absolutely necessary for us to solicit your consideration for our position and with a view to asking you to come into partnership with us in bearing some portion of this burden for the future.

"That the operation of busses in place of street cars is not the answer to this question is evidenced by the results obtained from the experimental installation of these vehicles which we placed in your city some two years ago.

"Our street cars have been costing us in the past some 15c to 19c per car mile and are capable of carrying thirty-four passengers seated and thirty-six or more standing. Our busses have been costing us from 20c to 23c per bus mile and are capable of carrying twenty-one passengers. From this you will readily recognize that it costs more than three times as much to transport a passenger in your city by bus than it does by street car, and in view of the recognized fact that the ultimate consumer pays all bills, it is obvious

TEMPERATURE LAST MONTH AT A HIGH MARK

Although Average Temperature Was Highest for Seventeen Years, Sunshine and Rainfall Were Below Standing Records.

In the seventeen years that records have been kept at the Lennoxville Experimental Farm, never has been as warm an October been experienced as the past month. The average temperature for the past thirty-one days was 48.22 degrees, compared with an average of 45.85 degrees last year and a seventeen year average of 42.25. Although the mercury remained at a high mark for the month, it did not make any individual daily records. The highest point reached was on October 4th, when eighty was recorded compared with eighty-three on October 5, 1926. On the other hand, the thermometer did not sink to any unusually low levels. On October 10th it dropped to twenty-two degrees, while the low for October 31, 1925, was thirteen degrees was recorded.

The total sunshine for the past month was 142.2 hours, well over the seventeen year average of 125.7 hours. Last year the total sunshine reached 151.6 hours, while the sun shone longest in October 1924, when it made its appearance for 194.3 hours. October 1917 saw the shortest appearance of sun, 81.1 hours.

The amount of rainfall last month was well below normal, totalling 2.39 inches compared with an average of 3.81 inches. Last year precipitation totalled 1.40 inches. October, 1910, was the dampest month with 6.63 inches, while in October, 1924, only one inch fell. October 1917 had the greatest precipitation for one day during the past month, with .48 inches. On October 24, 1923, about 2.25 inches of rain fell.

that an installation of busses in your city would not be economic.

"As to what means you will ultimately take to solve this problem lies in your own hands but as one which might lend itself to serious consideration we would like to advance the idea that you virtually come into partnership with us in this unfortunate situation, under an arrangement whereby our actual cash operating loss would be subsidized by the city, and although this may sound like a rather drastic remedy yet, on looking into the facts of the situation perhaps it is not so bad as it appears at first sight. As previously stated, the total operating cash loss sustained last year amounted to approximately \$22,000.

"The Sherbrooke Railway and Power Company during the past twelve months supplied the street railway with electrical energy for the purpose of operating it which, at the rate of 1c a K.W.H., amounted to a little over \$15,000 and which energy could have been sold by us by distribution over the system of the Southern Canada Power Company at a considerably better average price.

"The City of Sherbrooke has, from figures which have been generally published, a considerable surplus of power available for sale and as a subsidy, therefore to the street railway we would suggest that for the future the city undertake to supply the energy necessary for the operation of this system to which end we would be willing to provide all the motor generator equipment now provided in our power house in your city for this purpose.

"On last year's basis, there would still remain then a debit balance of approximately \$7,000.00 per annum to be provided for or in other words, approximately \$20 per day, which it is suggested that the city should provide for and pay us out of general funds.

"That this service is of vital necessity in the lives of many of the Sherbrooke people is evidenced by the fact that during the past few years the combined bus and railway systems have been carrying approximately a million and a half passengers per year or, in other words over four thousand passengers a day and it is quite evident from these figures that, had the operations of the street railway to be closed down permanently, considerable hardship would be involved.

"With the winter season approaching, this hardship would be increased, although we do not by any means expect that you will come to an instant decision in this matter, might we press for your immediate consideration with a view to coming to an amicable arrangement under which it will be possible for us to continue this service in your city with as little delay as possible, bearing in mind that it is far from the company's wish to take any arbitrary stand in the matter, nor do we wish by any means to have the context of this communication interpreted in the light of an ultimatum. At the same time the situation is definitely such that the shareholders of the Southern Canada Power Company cannot continue much longer or indefinitely to carry this excessive burden for your city.

"In closing, we would like to add that if there is any further information which you would like to have in this matter we will be only too pleased to furnish it upon request and place the records of operation of the street railway system before you and, at the same time, I would like to take this opportunity of expressing on behalf of the company and myself personally my very sincere thanks for the patient and considerate hearing which you gave me on Tuesday evening last.

"It is understood, of course, that the suggested arrangement would be at all times at the pleasure of the city, subject to amendment at any time to meet conditions as may be then found to be existing, or to discontinuance altogether if deemed advisable.

POOR FAMILIES TO BE ASSISTED BY CHURCHES

Problem of Providing Aid During Coming Winter to Families in Need Discussed Yesterday Afternoon.

The weighty problem of providing assistance during the coming winter to families suffering from lack of employment and helpless in the face of the cold weather that is approaching was discussed by the ministers of local Protestant churches and representatives of the Catholic clergy at a meeting held at the City Hall yesterday afternoon.

A relief plan proposed by the St. Vincent de Paul Society, which includes all Catholic parishes of the city, was closely studied, and met with the approval of the Protestant ministers, who decided to draw up a similar scheme of operation, working in conjunction with the Catholic group.

The St. Vincent de Paul Society's plan called for the formation of a federation to collect donations from manufacturers and merchants of the city, and also to act as an information bureau for the different parishes. After each parish has spent the money collected among its parishioners, it shall, if necessary, apply at the office of the federation, and the latter will grant to the said parish according to its needs, a portion of the donations and special collections it has made.

Except in special cases, it is further proposed, relief shall be given in the nature of food. This shall be distributed by a central store for which the city will furnish a locale and an employee. It is also proposed, in order to avoid abuses, that the demands for food and payment of rent be subject to recommendation. Each parish will make a thorough inquiry of the demands made, and an account will be kept of each person receiving relief.

The plan also suggested that every Saturday the city furnish each division with a complete list of salaries paid, wood furnished, etc., in order that the society shall know the exact standing of every person requesting relief.

NEW TAX RATE ANNOUNCED AT LENNOXVILLE

Special Realty Tax of Two Mills Abolished by Resolution of the Lennoxville Town Council.

Lennoxville property owners will find their tax bills for the coming year considerably smaller as the result of the action of the Town Council in abolishing a special two mill tax that has been in force for the past few years. The taxation by-law, which was given formal approval at the regular meeting held last evening, provides for a thirteen mill rate on town property and a seven and one half mill rate on farm lands. In addition, both the two per cent tenant and a two dollar poll tax were also imposed. These assessments were the same as last year.

Considerable discussion took place on the report of the waterworks committee which recommended the purchase of additional property at the Levine Springs for the purpose of improving the water supply of the town. Following a detailed study of conditions at the springs, the resolution was defeated.

The tender for the removal of garbage for the coming winter submitted by A. Rodell was accepted.

"Science and Christianity", as illustrated in the life of the great scientist and Christian, Michael Faraday, was Mr. Matthews' theme at the evening service. BISHOP'S ARTS DEGREE MEETS WITH APPROVAL

Students from Local University May Now Proceed to Arts Degree at Oxford University in Two Years

The Arts degree of the University of Bishop's College has been approved by the Hebdomadal Council, as entitling the holder to senior standing at Oxford should he wish to go there. Word to this effect has just been received by the local university. That the Bishop's degree will now be recognized by Oxford, as well as by the leading universities in the United States and Canada, is the source of much pride and satisfaction to the university.

Senior standing means that the student may proceed to his Arts degree at Oxford in two years. Bishop's University was listed, along with many other universities in overseas Dominions, as being approved by the University of Oxford for the purpose of senior standing, until 1922. The approval was apparently then withdrawn, partly due to the findings of the Royal Commission and partly because of the unprecedented number who sought admission to Oxford following the war.

None of the universities, so far as known here, was informed of Oxford's action. It was only two years ago that Dr. A. M. McGreer, principal of Bishop's, discovered that it was necessary for any university wishing to have its degree approved to make formal application for such approval to the university. This was done, and along with the application were sent statements of the academic qualifications of the members of the faculty, a set of examination papers and the university calendar. News which has just been received from Oxford states that the committee of the Hebdomadal Council which

deals with overseas universities were unanimous in the opinion that a completely satisfactory case had been established. The result is that, notwithstanding the excessive demands for admission to Oxford colleges, graduates of Bishop's University will, in the future, have no difficulty in being admitted and will be able to take an Oxford degree in two years.

It is not generally known that when a graduate of any overseas university goes to Oxford he enters as an undergraduate and is obliged to observe all regulations governing undergraduates. The Oxford and Cambridge honors degrees are of a higher standard than those of any other university in the world. For this reason many undergraduates of other universities enter as undergraduates and read for the B.A. degree there. Rhodes Scholars, who are generally graduates of their own universities before entering Oxford, go up as undergraduates.

In submitting Bishop's application to Oxford, Dr. McGreer pointed out the following, among other particulars:

"Bishop's University, Lennoxville, was incorporated by Royal Charter in the year 1852, and at present confers degrees in the Faculty of Arts, Divinity and Music. Unlike the majority of colonial universities, Bishop's has from the first been strictly residential in character; its limited numbers are in the main due to the firm policy of the corporation to increase the student body only as funds for the necessary residential buildings become available. Since 1922 buildings to accommodate between forty and fifty additional undergraduates, together with the necessary lecture rooms, have been acquired or erected.

"With one exception, the nine successive principals of the university have been graduates of Oxford or Cambridge, and one of them, the Rev. J. P. Whitney (principal 1900-1905) is now Dixie Professor of Ecclesiastical History at Cambridge. A large proportion of the teaching staff have always been graduates of Oxford and Cambridge. Of the present staff the professor of classics and the lecturer in English are graduates of Lincoln College, Oxford; the professors of history and mathematics and the dean of divinity are graduates of Cambridge; all of them with high honors in their respective subjects."
