

# City lists works plan for summer

Ten items are included in a partial list of public works, to be undertaken during the summer and fall, released recently by the City Manager's office. Cost of the projects will exceed \$140,000.00.

Largest expenditure, \$48,300.00, will finance the building of a sewer for the extension of St. Catherine St. between Victoria and Claremont Avenues.

Widening and repaving of Claremont Ave., from Western to Winchester Aves., will cost \$42,650.00. Another \$11,250.00 was voted to cover the cost of sidewalks for this job.

A new sidewalk on the south side of Sunnyside Ave., from Belvedere Rd. to Bellevue Ave., will require \$10,300.00.

At a cost of \$8,275.00, new sidewalk will be laid on selected portions of Anwoth Rd., and Cedar Ave.

Eight thousand six hundred and seventy dollars was voted for the repaving in three inch asphalt of Lansdowne Ave., north of Sherbrooke St. to the foot of the hill, Belmont Crescent throughout and the intersection at Sunnyside Ave. and Belvedere Rd.

It was recommended that \$1,775.00 be made available for the relocation of traffic lights at the intersection of Claremont and Western Aves.

Installation of traffic lights on Cote St. Antoine Rd. at Strathcona Ave. will cost another \$4,900.00.

A commitment of \$2,500.00 was made to cover the cost of installing traffic signs at various locations throughout the city.

Approved in principle, but awaiting final specifications and approved tenders, is the resurfacing of a number of streets with one and a half inch asphalt. It is expected that tenders will be called for these contracts on May 7 and that final approval will have been given by May 14.

Among the streets scheduled for this work are: Bruce Ave., throughout; Chesterfield Ave., throughout; Gordon Crescent, throughout; Anwoth Rd., the Crescent portion; Columbia Ave., throughout; Hallowell Street, Dorchester St. to the CPR; Ingleside Ave., throughout; Lansdowne Ave., St. Catherine St. to Western Ave.; Lansdowne Ridge; Metcalfe Ave., St. Catherine St. to Cote St. Antoine; N.D.G. Ave., Westmount Ave. to city limits; Park Place, throughout; Prince Albert Ave., Sherbrooke St. to Cote St. Antoine; Rosemount Ave., throughout; Rosemount Crescent, throughout; Roxborough Ave., throughout; Summit Crescent, Shorncliffe Ave. to north limits; Surrey Gardens, throughout; Upper Belmont, throughout; Upper Bellevue, including Summit Circle intersection; and Upper Lansdowne, throughout.

## Ethiopia described by visitor

A country near the equator where tweeds are worn in mid-summer and where the Emperor personally appoints all members of parliament, Ethiopia was revisited in a talk by Miss Mary Nutter of the British foreign service before the Current Events Club of Westmount Senior High this week.

A member of the British Embassy staff there from 1953 to 1956, Miss Nutter is a graduate of Westmount High and McGill University. She served in the diplomatic service in Washington, London and Paris before going to Ethiopia for the British Government.

She praised the marvelous weather in the tropical land, 8,000 feet above sea level, where the sun is always warm and the air is cool. She recounted the excursions she made to other embassies and listed the wild animals which were her neighbors—the hyena, crocodile and hippopotamus were a few.

The Ethiopians are mainly Coptic Christians with large trimmings of Hebrew in their religion. The various tribes have each their own language, the main one being Amharic.

In area, Ethiopia is approximately five times the size of Britain but large areas are unsettled. The people are, for the most part, uneducated though the Emperor is attempting to encourage education and a number of Canadian teachers are at work there.

The natives live in round mud huts called "tukuls" which are covered by thatched roofs, through the eaves of which the smoke filters at meal times. There are no chimneys.

A crowded question period followed her interesting and informative address.

Miss Nutter was introduced by Eddie Aronoff and thanked by Helaine Slater.



## Dozen accidents, 2 false alarms

Taken first to the Montreal General and then to Notre Dame Hospital, she was later reported to be in satisfactory condition. No bones broken, but bruises will, according to her mother, keep her in bed for three weeks.

The only other injury was also minor.

Apart from the danger and nuisance of the false alarms, the fire department was called out only on routine duties for anxious residents.

## Parking rules revised here

City officials announced this week that parking regulations on the west side of Prince Albert avenue from Western to the south end of the street have been revised. In the future, parking will be permitted for only two hour periods, as opposed to the previous four hour limit, between 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.

The move was taken after complaints from residents indicated that workers in the nearby commercial area were using the street for day-long parking, some of them even moving their cars a short distance at noon to pay lip service to the law.

### Secrecy sullies City Council

IN Britain's Parliament a bill is afoot to end secrecy in local municipal councils.

Closer to home, in Belleville, Ont., the twice-monthly regular City Council meetings are broadcast in full. The local radio station manager says the programs have been getting good audiences and very favorable comment.

Here in Westmount, City Council blindly continues its decades-old and indefensible custom of discussing the public's business in private, barring citizens from all but the mere formality of its regular meetings.

The Examiner has been harping for a long time on this matter, a cause worth championing.

It also was raised forcibly in late 1957 at a meeting of the Westmount Municipal Association, but a reluctant executive has only considered it.

Local government is the democratic process in its purest and closest-to-the-people form.

It should not be sullied by secrecy.

Citizens who care

should make it their business to be at the Municipal Association's annual meeting in Victoria Hall on May 8, and make their feelings heard.

### Strange are the adversity ways

Cutback in production at some local plants has brought about a strange result.

Officials of the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Centre are being told, in some places, that a clinic cannot be arranged because the firms can't afford to lose any time on the part of the men.

Times, they say, are too tough.

These same plants, though, if an accident occurs and a man is injured — expect the Red Cross to rush to the scene with the life-saving fluid.

Apparently they have not thought the thing through very clearly.

There is no substitute for whole blood — not even money.

It would appear that arrangements can always be made to allow for men, and women, to give a blood donation.

Let's hope those who gave this excuse will reconsider — and that the

## YOU SAY

Sir: Attendance of Hon. Wm. Eamilton, Canada's Postmaster General at the tenth anniversary of the only little democracy in the Middle East, is a reminder to Christians and Jews of the heroic sacrifices made by its splendid little people to retain their homeland and provide a refuge for their persecuted brethren in other lands.

Holy Writ predicted the return of the Jews to the land of their ancestors. By nature, peace-loving and democratic, they demonstrated that they can, if the occasion demands it, exhibit fighting qualities. The enraged Arabs who thought they could easily overcome the population learned to their cost and defeat that the aroused Jews would fight until death, rather than surrender to their cruel and persecuting neighbors. World Jewry has watched with admiration the untiring efforts of the leaders and people of the newborn state to make it habitable and prosperous.

Millions of dollars have been contributed to help in developing industries and giving the land new vigor. Canadians of all classes have given generously of their wealth to make possible the carrying out of the projects, the purpose of which is to create employment and make the nation half sustaining.

Several of Westmount's prominent citizens have taken a keen and continued interest in the new nation that came into being at the most opportune moment for the unfortunate victims of persecution, oppression and exile.

The statesmen of the chief democracies saluted the new state, aware that it was the only means to provide a house for the pitifully few who survived the gas chambers or the inhuman concentration camps.

The Jews in the democracies are loyal to the lands of their birth or adoption. They give of their best to these lands in appreciation of the rights, privileges and opportu-

nities open to them and those of other origins and religious affiliations.

The true Christian cannot but sympathize with the people who gave him the Saviour he worships. Israel is surrounded on all sides by implacable and irreconcilable enemies who want to liquidate it and its brave defenders. It devolves upon Christians of all denominations to openly express their sympathy for and support of Israel in its determined fight for survival. Its people have demonstrated a fortitude, courage, and enthusiasm without parallel in human history.

The Rt. Hon. John Diefenbaker sensed this when he called upon Chief Ra'bi Herschorn to pay his respects and remarked: "The Jews are loyal Canadians, but have a warm spot in their hearts for Israel."

What the leaders of the adjoining Arab states fear is the example and influence of Israel may have upon their illiterate and enslaved subjects.

There are millions of devout Christians who are convinced that the return of the oppressed Jews to the land of their forefathers is divinely ordained. It is perhaps fitting to quote in this connection the opinion of Sir Winston Churchill. It is contained in the book, "Of True Experience" being the autobiography of Sir Gerald Campbell. In a chat with Campbell he said: "Campbell, has it ever occurred to you that God never blessed nations that persecuted the Jews?"

I think that this is borne out by history in the fall and decadence of nations that persecuted and ill-treated their Jewish citizens. The most prosperous and powerful nations are those in which the Jews enjoy the same rights as their fellow citizens of differing racial origins.

One well-known Westmount citizen who has given unselfishly of his time and ability to help organizations and programs to aid Israel is one of Montreal's leading lawyers who is a member of Westmount's City Council. Alderman Michael Garber is staunchly Canadian, but finds time to render service to the people and land that gave us not

## Inventiveness of the British

WITH the flood of U.S. publications, radio and television news that sweeps across the great undefended border into Canada, we are prone to look upon the Americans as great inventors.

Almost every day we hear or read of some new wrinkle that the U.S. inventors have given to a waiting world.

Too often we forget that the British are great inventors today, and have been for the past 450 years.

Wherever we look, there is evidence of some invention, probably the result of the genius of the mind of a Britisher. For example, in the printing industry there is the first rotary press (1790), the photo negative (1800), and the telegraph (1837) but we forget things like television (1923), radar (1935) and the atomic power station (1956).

British inventors, down the years, have come up with things like the slide-rule, the sextant, the universal joint, the telescope, the chronometer, the spinning jenny, the electric lamp, the fire extinguisher, the electric dynamo, the steamboat, the steam locomotive, the electric clock, the compass, the microphone, the postage stamp, the steam turbine, the cinematograph, free-wheeling, air mail, jet engine, terylene, penicillin and food canning — many of which we think of as coming to us from the U.S.

## City manager gives report

General Manager Tom Hughes' report for the month of March was presented to Council Monday night. It included a list of the activities of the Police, Fire, Public Works, Health and Public Welfare Departments.

**Public Works:** The demolition of houses by Lajeunesse Demolition Inc., for the proposed extension of St. Catherine St. was completed on March 20th and the open foundations were filled in by the City forces.

### ARTIFICIAL ICE

All the remaining outside brick work and the roofing for the main rink, the public section of the club house, the heavy equipment, boiler, condenser and refrigerator rooms and the main entrance was completed at the Artificial Ice Rink. The electric conduit and light assembly was installed and the condenser was assembled.

Installation of insulating material in the inner walls was commenced. Cost of scavenging for the month was \$10,531.47.

### SPECIAL REPORT

In a section entitled "Special Report — Garbage Collection", Mr. Hughes reported the following:

"As a result of the start of a five-day week in accordance with the agreement between the City and the Manual Workers' Association, it was necessary to re-schedule the garbage collection in areas formerly having collections on Saturday morning. The previous summer schedules have been unsatisfactory to numerous citizens and complaints have been received. These complaints were due to a four and five day interval between collections in some areas of the City. The new programme now being carried out does away with these lengthy intervals by means of having garbage collection twice weekly, on Mondays and Thursdays, and Tuesdays and Fridays (a four-day operation). On Wednesdays, the only garbage collection service will be the customary special collections and the routine daily collections in commercial areas and special premises on the daily collection list."

"This change establishes for the citizens a schedule of garbage collection which will remain unchanged throughout the year."

"The personnel normally working on garbage collection on

Wednesdays will be used on other work such as sweeping, labor and general housekeeping throughout the City."

**Police:** A total of 90 accidents were reported, resulting in injuries to 19 persons. Of the total, 85 accidents were attributed to traffic. Ten of the injured persons were taken to hospital in patrol cars.

The average daily traffic accident figure for March was 2.7 as against 2.12 for March 1957.

**Fire:** There were 43 calls to this department, 10 for fires (none serious) and 33 miscellaneous. There were nine false alarms.

Inspection of 288 premises resulted in the issuance of 55 notices and 41 cautions.

**Public Welfare:** The general

hospitals and institutions applied under the Quebec Public Charities Act on behalf of 29 persons. Of those received in March and 15 cases outstanding, 16 cases 15 cases outstanding. The 15 cases were accepted, six were refused, and 23 investigations are continuing.

**Health:** There were 134 cases of communicable disease reported. Five vaccinations and 18 re-vaccinations were made. Twenty four triple toxoid (whooping cough, diphtheria, tetanus) injections were given. There were 93 first dose, 98 second dose and 314 third dose Salk Vaccine inoculations given.

The school health program continued with 21 medical examinations and 165 preliminary inspections being completed.

## West End Safety Council will train 30 teachers to become instructors

The West End Traffic Safety Council, a project of the N.D.G. Community Council, plans to have thirty teachers trained as High School Driver Education Instructors.

Dr. Loren Campbell, BSc MA, DED, of New York University Teachers College, will conduct the teacher training course. On completion of the course, the teachers will be qualified, as Certified Driver Education Instructors, — according to standards set up by Safety Organizations and Insurance Companies in the U.S. and Canada — to give Driver Education courses to high school students throughout Quebec.

The Driver Education course, which will be made available to high school pupils, does not merely teach the mechanics of driving a car. Its effectiveness lies in its positive approach toward developing safe, sane driving habits. The course is psychologically geared to the high school age group. Because the adolescent reacts unfavorably to negative words like "don't" and "never" — a positive approach is used at all times. During the run of the course, the students find their outlook and attitudes toward reckless driving changing. Visiting traffic courts and auto grave-yards, and seeing movies of other teen-agers speeding and

joyriding with disastrous results, hammers home the fact that reckless driving is sheer stupidity. They learn to feel pride in using mature judgment behind the wheel.

# House still stands as century ago

"That grandfather clock is more than 150 years old, and was here when my father bought this house in 1906," Mrs. S. Earl, one of the present occupants of No. 168 Cote St. Antoine Road, told The Examiner this week.

The building is one of the remaining houses on the site that was once known as Metcalfe Terrace.

Sometime between 1829 and 1847 Captain Moses Judah Hays built four similar houses along Cote St. Antoine Road, and called them "Metcalfe Terrace". He obtained the land from the Gentlemen of the Seminary of St. Sulpice about 1839. The payment owing to the Seminary as a result of this transaction was commuted in 1853 — but the

lump sum representing the commutation writing off owing to the Seminary was not paid for several years after that.

It appears that the houses were occupied by the aides-de-camp of Lord Metcalfe, who was Governor General of Canada, between 1832 and 1845. Until Lord Metcalfe's time, the official residence of each Governor General

of Canada was the Chateau de Ramezay, then known as Government House. But this building became old and badly in need of repair, and the residence known as Monklands was procured. Lord Metcalfe was the first Governor General of Canada to occupy this home. It is said that he sometimes stopped at Metcalfe Terrace on his way home from conducting Government Affairs

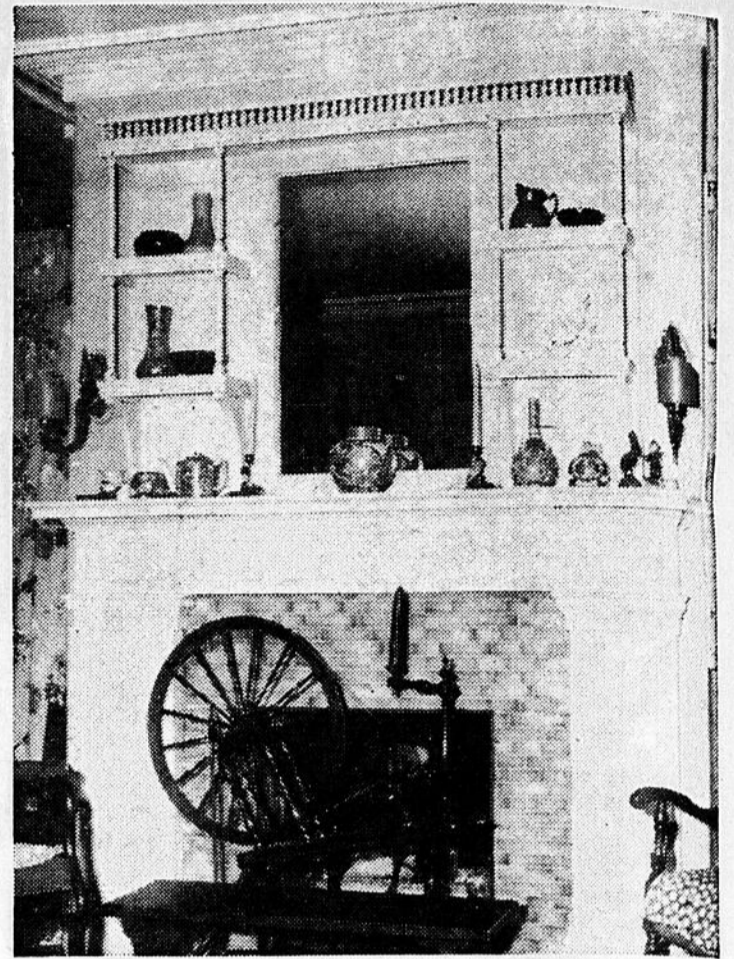
at the Chateau Ramezay, and night.

Through the last 90 years, since the purchase of Monklands by the Congregation of Notre Dame, the history of Monklands has been that of an international girls' school. But the history of its earlier time when it was the official residence of the Queen's Representatives has never been forgotten. It is probable that every Governor General of Canada since that time, has visited the old mansion, which is now the centre building of the convent known as Villa Maria, and they were happy to be able to come to the very building which their predecessors had known as their Canadian home a century ago.

From an old Montreal directory, we know that Captain Moses Judah Hays was living in one of the houses at Metcalfe Terrace during the year 1847.

In October he hypothecated the land and four houses to a Dame Catherine Hays, and in 1850 sold the same to her. It seems as though there was some relationship between Captain Hays and Dame Catherine Hays since Captain Hays is known to have been owner of the Montreal Water Works in the 1850's, and Dame Catherine Hays is spoken of as co-proprietor of the water works, at the time when she sold her share of the utility to the Corporation of the City of Montreal. She also sold the land and property known as No. 2 Metcalfe Terrace, in 1857. This is the structure now known as No. 168 Cote St. Antoine Road. The new owner was Dame Irenah Andrews, who in turn sold it to a Mrs. Kerr. It was during this time that a new story was added, giving this building the appearance of a tea caddy. This makes No. 178 Cote St. Antoine Road the only structure which most nearly resembles its original appearance.

In 1906 the house was sold to Mr. T. H. Wardleworth. "It appears that the present gardens

ed with care, and it still retains the appearance and the atmosphere of a home of the early Victorian period. The house has 11 rooms, with a flower conservatory at the back. In one of the bedrooms is a bed which was brought from England by Mrs. Wardleworth. At the head and foot ends of this bed, are hearts cut into the woodwork, in a manner typical of the time.

The parlor is separated from the dining room by a fireplace which stands in the middle of the two rooms, and dominates the house. It is unique in that it has an opening into each room, with baskets for coal or logs. The victorian style of ornamental wood-

work at the top of the entrance to the parlor is matched only by the same kind of decorative work on the parlor side of the fireplace.

On the mantle may be seen a tea set of Canton Lowestoft china; a chelsea dog; tall candlesticks trimmed with wood and silver, which are at least 100 years old; and on the wall a steel helmet with matching shield and hatchet. Before leaving that afternoon, I even noticed a graceful spinning wheel. There seemed to be a variety of objects to appease the appetite of any connoisseur of the unusual. A visit to this home is like a trip back to early Canada.

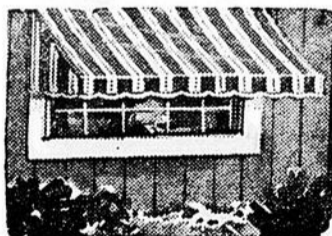

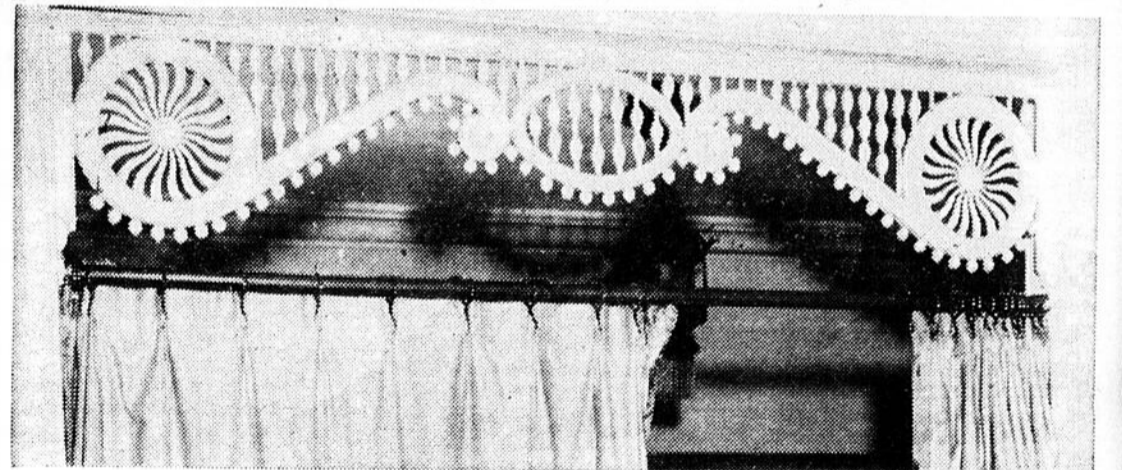

of these old houses were once used as small farms. Old pear and apple trees still stood until about 1932, when the sleet storm that autumn caused them to wither," went on Mrs. Earl. A driveway leading to the stable ran down the side of the house known as No. 168.

"One of the small basement rooms at No. 168, is still known as the saddle room. Until about 1915 a small cow shed stood where the present garden is now located," continued Mrs. Earl.

The house known as No. 1 Metcalfe Terrace which was destroyed later by fire, was the first Town Office of Westmount.

The present occupants of No. 168 Cote St. Antoine Road are: two sisters, Miss Una Wardleworth, and Mrs. S. Earl; her husband Mr. S. Earl; and one brother, Mr. T. Wardleworth. They enjoy the full use of the building which has been preserv-

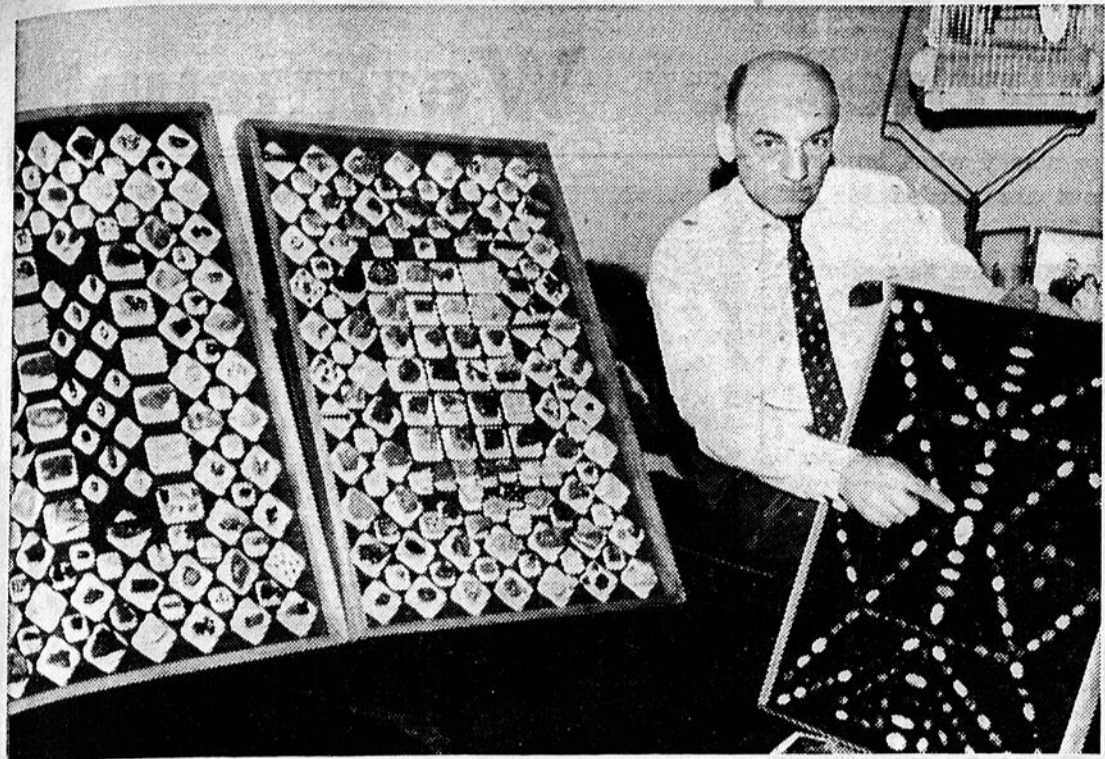

## Gem exhibit here tonight

The Montreal Gem and Mineral Club is having an exhibition of gems and minerals at Victoria Hall, Westmount, tonight, at 8.15. This is the first club exhibition to be held in the Province of Quebec to be open to the general public. Some of the items to be exhibited were shown on TV Saturday, on the program "Double-talk", when Richard Gwyn Britton, president of the association, gave a demonstration.

More than 700 specimens will be displayed on 5 panels of about 2 feet by 3 feet in size; a table top machine to cut rocks which is known as a Junior Gem cutting machine; a coffee table with hand inlaid top showing mellow colors of rust, green, cream and brown; and some specimens loaned\* from the University of Montreal especially for the exhibition.

Among the items to be displayed are: Moonstone and rubies from India, Serpentine from Canada, Morganite from Brazil, Turquoise from Mexico, Spinal from Ceylon, Chrysoberyl and Alexandrite from Russia — which changes color to green in the daylight, Cauliflower rock from California, Gold from Ontario, Silver from Germany, a panel of fluorescent mineral which glow in colors of red, blue, pink, green deep blue, and yellow, under an ultra-violet lamp — (these minerals come from Franklyn, New Jersey); Tiger Eye from Africa, Agate from Mexico, Canadian

Moonstone from Notre Dame de la Salette, Que, Amazonite from Wakefield, Ont.; Perthite from Perth, Ont. (this mineral was called by this name by Dr. Wilson who first found some there), and Sodalite from Bancroft, Ont.

The Montreal Gem and Mineral Club was inaugurated last year upon the suggestion of Miss Stevenson, of the Redpath Museum, after she saw some of the collection of minerals and gems that belong to Mr. Britton, 141 Irvine avenue, Westmount. He wrote to "Rocks and Minerals Magazine" to see if he could interest subscribers to become members. He received seven replies, and seven weeks later, the

first meeting was held in Westmount, and included geologists, carpenters, silversmiths, painters, engineers, etc. The president of the association is Richard Gwyn Britton; vice president Sam Ronson; H. Gehrig, Secretary Treasurer; G. Rybnicek, Auditor; E. Windisch, Technical Advisor; H. Raemer, Publicity; and Donald Hogarth, Consultant. The latter is a graduate of the University of Toronto in Engineering, and is presently writing his thesis for his Ph.D. Degree at McGill University. He is residing at the Westmount Place Apartments, 201 Metcalfe avenue.

# The Anglican churches of Westmount

The sound of hammering, the smell of fresh paint, the noise of moving furniture accompanied Reverend Kenneth B. Keefe, rector of St. Matthias Church as he showed the improvements and changes that were being made.

"Over there", he pointed toward the north wall of the Parish Hall, "as many partitions as there are windows, will be made in order to separate the Sunday School children into different age groups. These partitions will allow more privacy; and

they can be folded and stood at one end of the hall when the classes are over."

Another large room was being painted a sunny yellow. "This is the meeting room for the Association of Women" he said, "the senior all-embracing group in the church. Their aims are primarily concerned with maintenance of hall; etc. There is one yearly meeting to which all the other groups are invited. They also give a fashion show, bridge tea and their function is to bring women of the congregation together socially. They also

raise money when improvements are needed for the hall."

Mr. Keefe has been rector of St. Matthias Church for two years. A graduate of the Anglican Theological College, at UBC, he was a padre in the Canadian Army Overseas. Assistant at Christ Church Cathedral in Montreal, and St. Michael's Church in Sillery, Que., he is also padre of the Royal Montreal Regiment.

Assistant to the Rector is Rev. E. P. A. Timmons a native of Dublin, Ireland, and a graduate of the Anglican Theological College in Saskatoon.

St. Matthias Church was first built in 1873. At that time it was a small frame building. By 1935 the original building had been replaced by a stately gray stone church, with an imposing rectory beside it.

There are several organizations for the members of the congregation. The Women's Auxiliary does missionary work primarily from coast to coast, and in the west; supports missionaries overseas; and studies missions by concentrating on one country in the world at a time as a yearly project. The Little Helpers of the Women's Auxiliary is a group made up of toddlers; the Junior Auxiliary ranges ages 8-12. They study some aspect of the church missionary work, and take care of the Children's Corner in the Church proper. The Chancel Guild is responsible for the care of the altar, clean communion vessels, linens, etc. The Social Service Club helps needy families, aged people, and provides comforts where needed. The AYPG Group, ages 13 to 18, has as its aims: work, worship, fellowship and edification. The Servers Guild, assist at communion two by two. There are no Parish Boundaries, and some members come from outside the City of Westmount.

One of the regular fund raising projects is to provide money for one or two bursaries a year, for the support of theological students at the Montreal Diocese and Theological College in Montreal.

The choirmaster and organist is Arnold Bellis. The senior choir is made up of adults; the boys choir is made up of 24 boys ages 8-13. They wear red caps during the service. The Sunday School children attend service in the church proper part time.

"The colors of the Royal Montreal Regiment in the chancel of this church were presented by HRH Prince Arthur of Connaught at Unter Esbach, Germany, on January 4th, 1919. After 32 years of service with the regiment, laid up here to rest on the 31st of October, 1951," is the inscription on one plaque on the West wall of the church.

Nearby is another plaque with the following: "Gordon Wallace Scott, CA, MLC was a warden of St. Matthias Church, who lost his life at sea through enemy action on Dec. 14, 1940, while proceeding to England on a war mission for the Government of Canada." ## ST. STEPHEN'S

St. Stephen's Church originally stood on Dalhousie street, and was erected in 1844. The cornerstone was laid by Lord Metcalfe, who was then Governor-General of Canada. A second St. Stephen's Church was built on St. Paul and Inspector streets,

after the first one was ravaged by fire and floods. It was completed and consecrated and occupied in 1884. To avoid a crisis otherwise inevitable, after repeated floods, St. Stephen's had to move again. The site on Dorchester and Atwater avenue was chosen, and the building was completed and open for worship on April 17th, 1898. It was known as St. Stephen's Chapel, for the time being. Later St. Stephen's Chapel became known as the Parish Church of

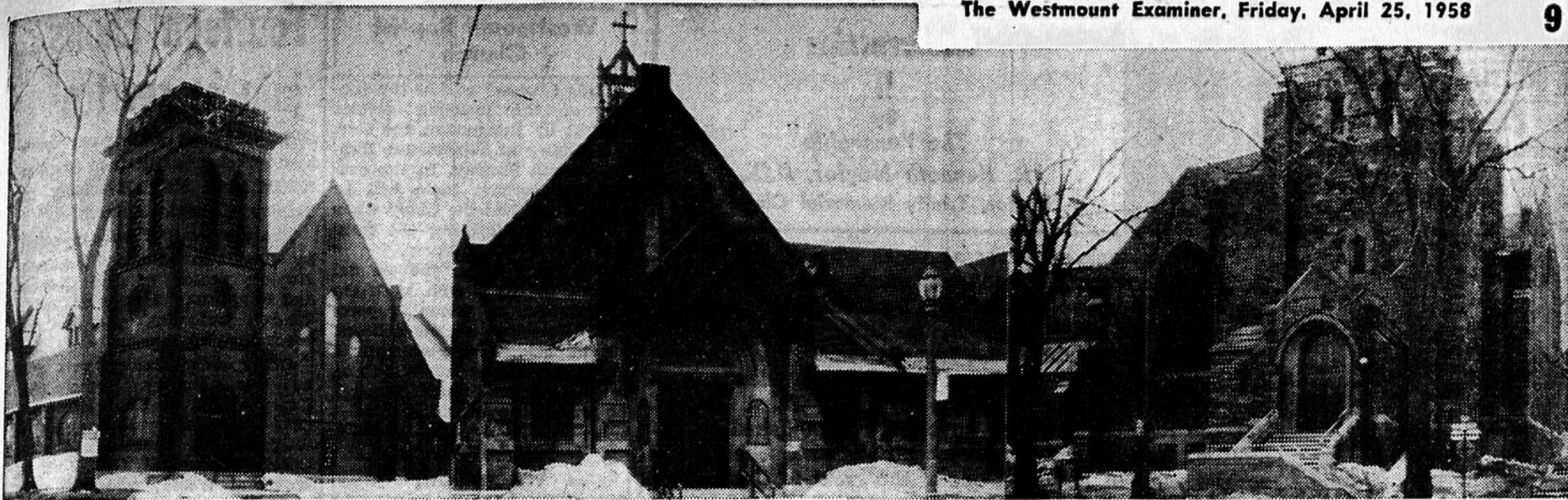

St. Stephen. When it became necessary to enlarge the chapel, the present site on Dorchester street was chosen, and the building was completed in 1903. Rev. Archibald T. Love, MA is the present Rector of St. Stephen's. A graduate of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, he became rector in the autumn of 1943. The 21st of September, 1958, will have marked the completion of his fifty years in the ministry. He is well known for

his organizational activities and raising of funds for missionary work, and for the needy. St. Stephen's Church celebrated its 100th anniversary in 1948. The list of names on its Honor Roll is long, many of its former members having given their lives in World War I and World War II.

In the octave of All Saints the new Church bell was erected in 1946 in memory of Gordon and Isabel Brock. It is more than 200 years old, and was cast in the Causard foundries at Colmar, Alsace. As it was then blessed and baptized, there could be no repetition of this, and it was erected here with special prayer. —V.R.

**ADVENT CHURCH**

The parish of the Advent is located at the corner of Wood avenue and Western avenue, in Westmount. This was the second building, erected in 1892. Five years later, a new organ was installed, and was used for the first time in the fall of that year. In 1913 the Rectory at 4175 Western avenue was bought, and three years later the Parish Hall was built.

Two of the outstanding Rectors of the Church of the Advent were Rev. Alexander John Foull, who became the First Bishop of Kootenay, in 1915; and Rev. Frederick Patrick Clark, who in 1948, became the Third Bishop of Kootenay. The present Rector is Rev. Alexander Mellor. He is a graduate of Lichfield Theological College, England. He spent 10 years in Trinidad; and 8 years in Barbados, B.W.I. He came to Westmount 5 years ago. Mr. E. Brown is the choirmaster and organist.

**Mrs. Sylva Lamothe re-elected head of Provincial Hospital Auxiliaries**

"The real vocation of woman and her happiness is marriage, maternity and home life. The problem is to reconcile these factors according to the rhythm of modern living" said Mrs. A. L. Ballestrazzi, secretary of the Women's Division of The Montreal Chamber of Commerce in an address Monday to the delegates at the sixth annual convention of the Province of Quebec Association of Hospital Auxiliaries held at St. Justine Hospital.

"Women actively engaged in business have serious and acute problems to cope with," said Mrs. Ballestrazzi. "Where a man is allowed to rest once his day's work is done, a woman's day is

never through. The moment she steps out of the office, she is taken up by her duties as a mother and as wife which are more important to society than her professional career."

Mrs. Ballestrazzi likened the work of hospital auxiliaries to a life insurance policy to the women who volunteer their time to them.

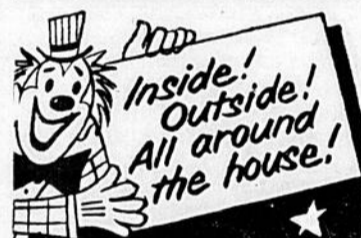
Mrs. Sylva Lamothe, who was re-elected president, reported that the 43 affiliated auxiliaries which make up the Province of Quebec Association of Hospital Auxiliaries grouped 18,176 members who last year gave \$357,276 to the hospitals of the Province. She said, her job included writing 803 letters in French and English. "Our province is large and our auxiliaries are scattered from north to south and from east to west. The association, is not, at present, in a financial position to send the president or any member of the Council to visit the auxiliaries." Consequently, reported the president, contact is made through correspondence.

For financial reasons the association was unable to give a bursary to a student nurse in the past year. But Mrs. Lamothe urged affiliate associations to give one to their respective school of nursing. "By prompting such a scholarship we feel that each auxiliary would render a great service to her hospital."

Associated with Mrs. Lamothe on the new executive are vice-presidents: Mrs. J. B. Handfield, Mrs. Ralph Boutin, Mrs. M. H. Lacoste, Mrs. M. G. Ibbotson and Mrs. Bernard Lande.

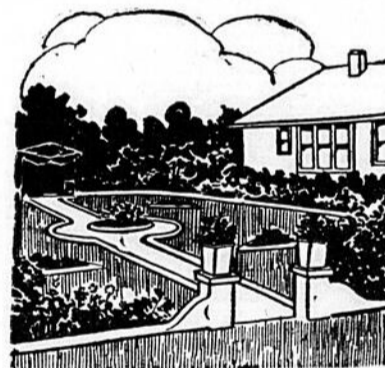

**Resurrection**

II

We must ask ourselves at times why the Church of the first generation placed so much emphasis on the Resurrection and so little on the Incarnation. I think the answer is that most people in the first generation were unaware of the facts of the Incarnation. It was a family known to a small circle of family and friends, and recorded by the authors of the First and Third Gospels. But the Resurrection was an event accomplished in the light of the day, in the very centre of the political and religious life of Israel, at one of the great festivals when the population of Jerusalem was multiplied tenfold. As St. Paul said to Agrippa: "This thing was not done in a corner."

Further, there would have been no object in telling the facts of the Incarnation until more were thoroughly seized of the facts of the Death and the Resurrection, and of the implication of those facts. When they had become aware that God had intervened in human history in raising Jesus of Nazareth from the dead, then men would ask: "But who is Jesus of Nazareth?" Then would be told the simple story of the Incarnation and it would be seen that the Life was all of one piece and all directly from God.

In the meantime the concern

of the proclaimers of the Good News was with the immediately past event and its place in the purpose of God. It was God's will that His Son should die for the sins of man, and that He should rise again for their justification. It is the second clause that gives force to the first. Without the Resurrection the Death has the same value as the death of Socrates, or the death of the countless men who have died for their righteousness. The Resurrection, however, is different; nothing like it ever happened before; and it becomes the evidence that this Death has power to take away the sin; and then with the abolition of the sin

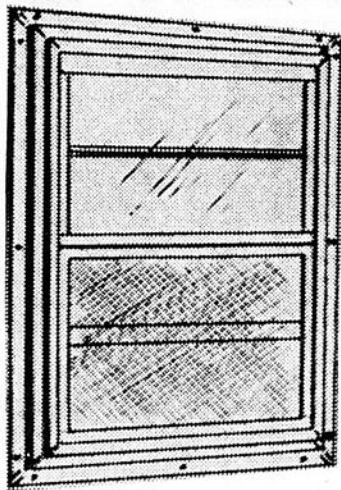

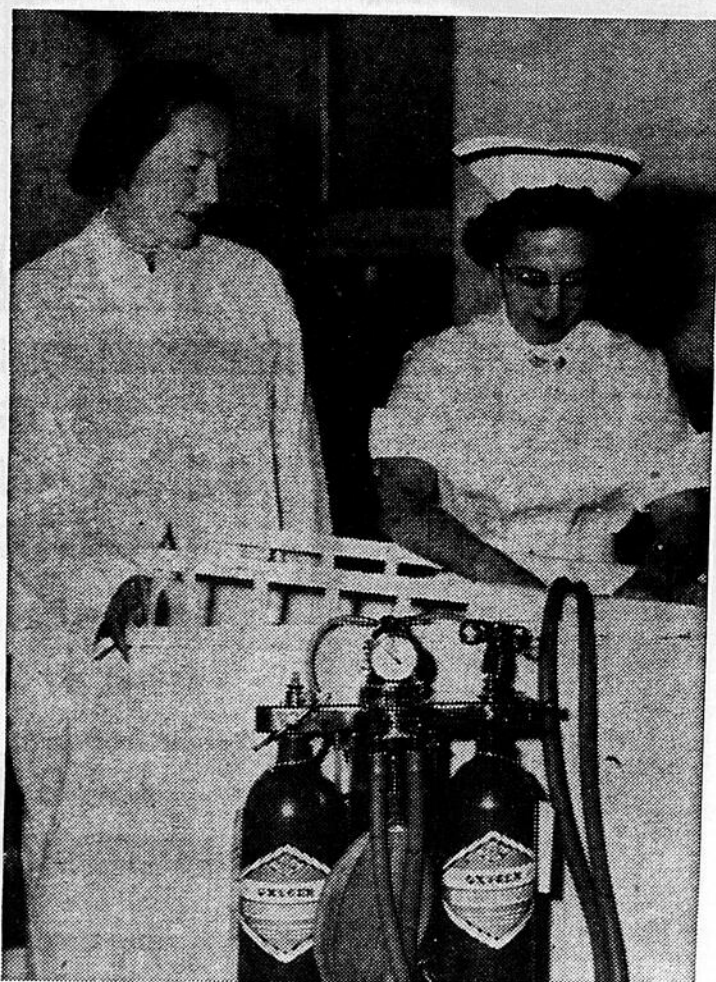

## 'Scarboro Night', April 25, will help missions in far-away lands

On Friday evening, April 25, at St. Kevin's Hall, 5600 Cote des Neiges road, the Montreal Unit of the Scarboro Lay Missionary League will hold its Annual Bridge Party in aid of the Scarboro Foreign Mission Society, a wholly Canadian organization whose first Bishop, Most Reverend Kenneth R. Turner, is a Montrealer. Priests of the Society are located in the Philippines, and in Japan, as well as in South America and in the Islands of the Caribbean.

"Scarboro Night" is always well-attended by willing Montrealers who are proud to support the work of fellow Canadians, laboring so far from home. This is a pattern of service and support that has its roots in the early days of Canada, when committees in France supported the work of the missionaries in New

France. As every student of Canadian history knows, it was the record of their work sent back to France which became the famous "Jesuit Relations", on which practically all early Canadian history is based.

Subscribers to the small magazine "Scarboro" cannot but be impressed with the historic tradition acting in reverse, as they read the tales sent back to Canada of the countries, people and customs reported by Scarboro missionaries.

From Port Mourant in British Guiana, for instance, Father Joseph Moriarty writes that he is the manager of a school for "some of the cutest children that God ever created", ranging in color from black to white, who are quite apt to arrive at school with the family cow in tow, or a pet baby alligator, to be admired by all. A more serious statement is that another name for Port Mourant is "Little Moscow", because it is the birthplace of Jagan and one of the centres of Communism in B.G.

Also in British Guiana is the remote mission up the river Siparuta where the Amerindians, in thatched huts on the river bank, live chiefly by logging.

There are tales of secret places in Haiti where, in spite of the

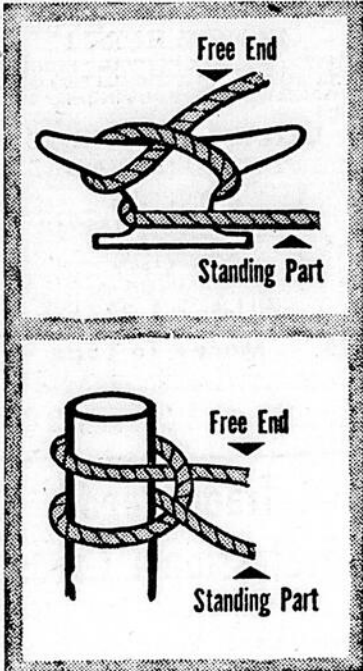

**ROPES AND KNOTS**  
Every sportsman should know something about ropes and knots, especially if he expects to do any boating this coming summer.

There are three kinds of ropes used by boatmen — manilla, cotton and nylon. Manilla, strong and low-priced, is used more on the bigger boats; nylon, twice as strong as manilla, is

also a "big boat" rope. A nylon line suitable in strength for an average boat is too small for comfortable handling. Your best bet is good cotton rope — and get enough to make ties at both ends of the boat. If you use a cotton rope for tying down while trailer travelling, be sure

to check it every few miles — it's very stretchy!

**MAKING FAST**  
The illustrations show the correct way of making a line fast to a cleat, and to a pile. When using a cleat, the half hitch which completes the fastening should be taken with the free part of the line. The line can then be cast off without taking up slack on what is known as the standing part.

The clove hitch is one of the surest ties for mooring your boat, and always looks very nautical, its two loops may be dropped over the top of a pile or timber instead of being wound around, and the knot brought up snug by pulling on the standing end of the line.

The illustrations here are self explanatory — but should you have trouble practising these knots, the nearest Scout or Cub will show you how.

**ANCHOR LINE**  
Weekend skippers should make sure they have plenty of line attached to their anchor. In moderate weather, a safe ratio of anchor line to depth of water is six-to-one. In other words, if you anchor in ten feet of water, sixty feet of line is the proper length. Mind you, if your boat is fairly light, and there's little wind or current, half that will do. Not overnight, though, or if the boat is left unattended.

**ROPE CARE**  
Few things look more sloppy than a rope or line whose ends have been allowed to unravel or fray into "cows" tails. Ends should always be protected by back-splicing or whipping. Back splicing is a bit tricky, if you've never done it before, but whipping is simply binding about an inch of the rope near the end with a fine cord. Ideal for this purpose is a spare piece of neavy fish line.

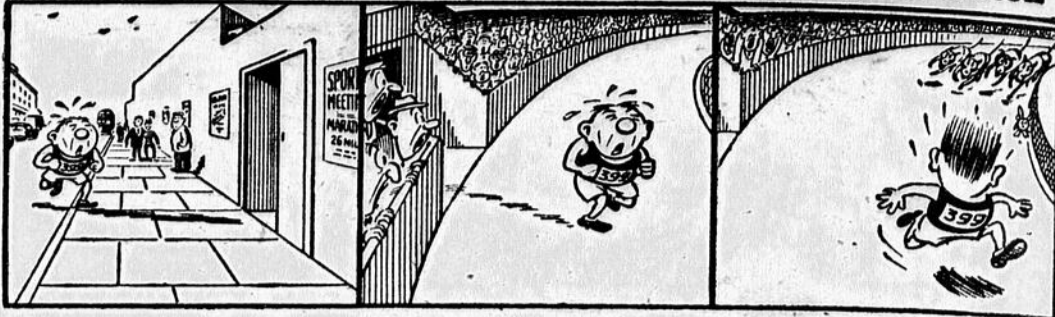
Canadian fencers are to meet here May 17-18 for the combined Canadian championships and British Empire Games trials.

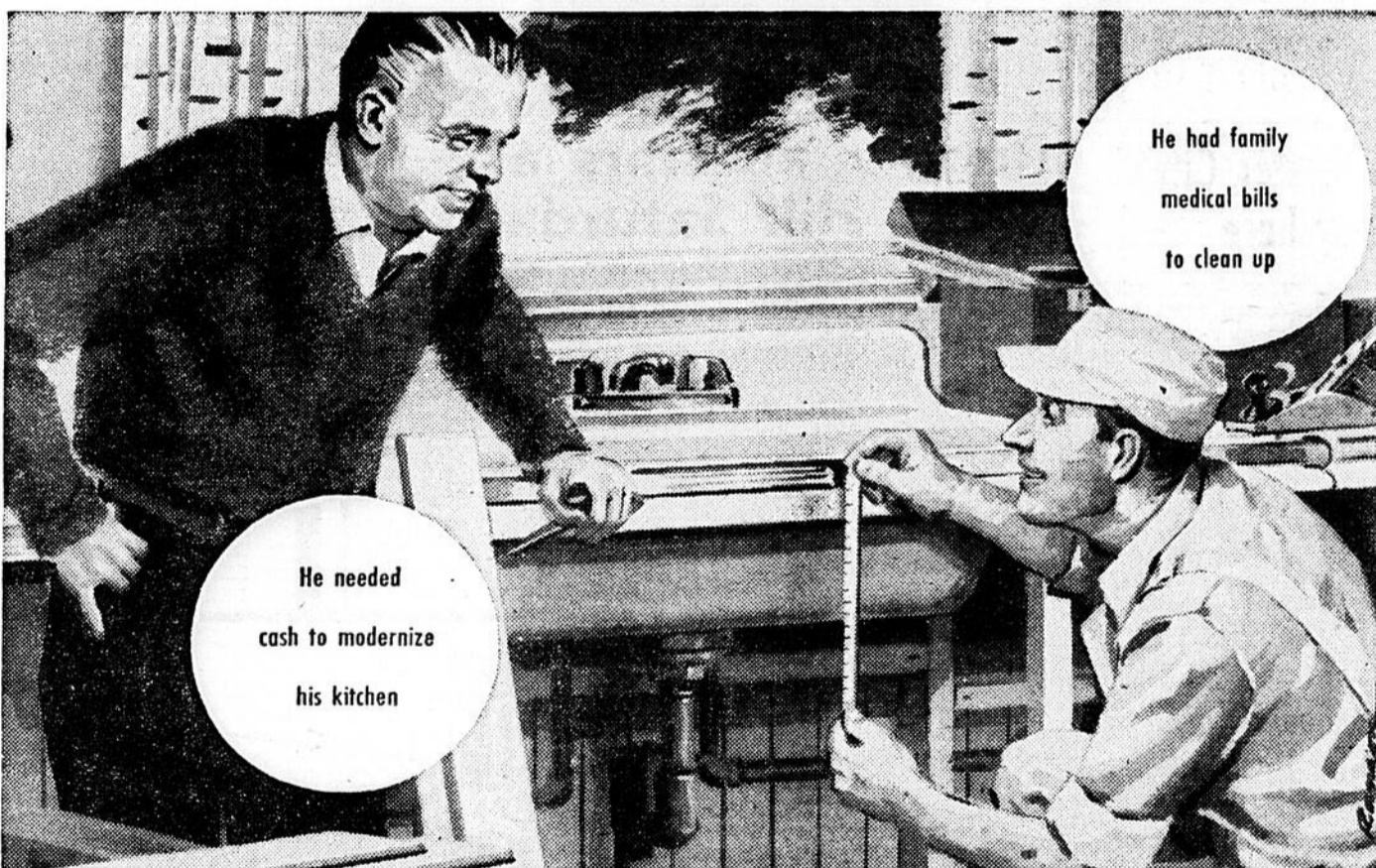
