

BRUNEAU IS MAYORAL CHOICE

Electors Name 11 For Office

The Westmount Municipal Association, acting for taxpayers at large, has named candidates to fill eleven offices to become vacant in January.

At the Association's fall meeting Tuesday, Alderman A. Sydney Bruneau, QC, was nominated for the office of mayor. (Mayor James A. de Lalanne has announced he would not seek re-election.)

The six candidates named for aldermanic seats are: Frank E. H. Gates (seat No. 1) and Michael Garber, QC, (No. 2) both for a three year term; Hugh G. Seybold (No. 3) and J. C. Cushing, (No. 4) for a two-year term, and G. Ryan (No. 5) and Alfred Powis (No. 6) for a one-year term.

After careful consideration and seeking of advice of the Westmount School authorities, William P. Carr and A. Reid Tilley were nominated as candidates for Westmount School Commissioners, and Mrs. Dent Harrison and R. Panet-Raymond were nominated for Westmount Library Trustees. Term of office is three years.

Nominations officially close January 14, 1957, and if an election is necessary, it will be held January 21.

Candidates were named in accordance with last winter's amendment to the Westmount City charter which requires the entire council to retire in 1957 and another council inaugurated.

Another amendment provides the mayor's term of office be set at 2 years. In addition, a system of rotation has been introduced whereby two aldermen are to retire and two are to be elected every three years. This rotation scheme is expected to establish the continuity of experience which is the feature of the American Senate.

To get the system into operation, next month's election provides for a staggering of the aldermanic terms of office as outlined above. When elections for seats 3 and 4 are due in 1959, the plan will be operating as envisioned, with each alderman serving a full three-year term.

At the meeting, retiring mayor, James A. de Lalanne paid tribute to the city council and administrative staff for their cooperative spirit. He believed this successful harmony is directly attributable to the "excellent method of appointment." Recalling his ten year association with the Westmount Municipal group, he concluded, "This has been a very happy ten years."

Resident Pays 'Barbotte' Fine

A Westmount man appeared in Summary Trials Court, Tuesday to plead guilty to operating a barbotte game.

Simeon Taillefer of 90b Selby st., was "caught in the act" last summer, running a "barbotte" game in Ville Jacques Cartier. Twenty-seven others were found with Taillefer at 835 Taschereau Blvd. and joined the self-confessed keeper in admitting to their game-loving activities.

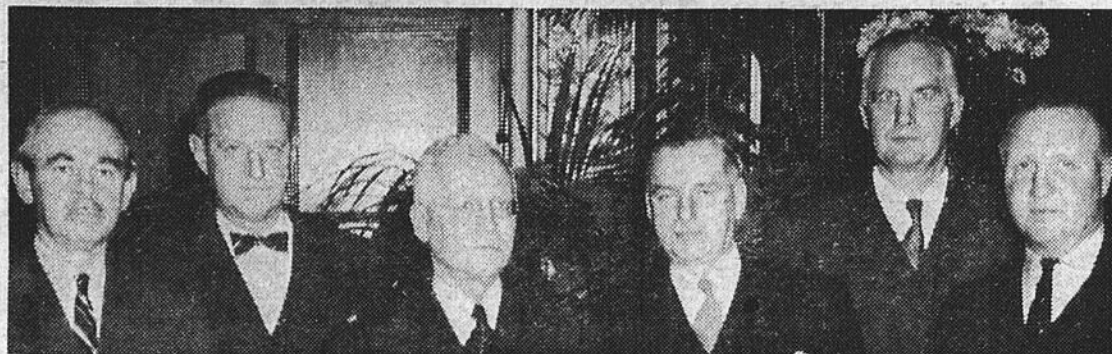
Taillefer was ordered to pay a \$200 fine or spend a month in jail. His cohorts were asked to decide between a \$25 fine and one month in jail.

Artificial Ice Rink Is Planned

Tenders are expected to be called shortly for construction of an artificial ice rink in Westmount Park, recreational chairman Geoffrey Merrill told members of Westmount Municipal Association Tuesday.

Mr. Merrill said the Association is lending its full support to the project which, it is hoped, will get underway in the Spring.

Plans call for a regulation ice-hockey surface, with the unique addition of one hundred feet of ice for free skating.

In his report on the activities of the Health and Welfare Committee, Dr. H. Graham Ross commented on a question which was posed concerning the fact Salk vaccine was available for children up to age 12 in Montreal, whereas Westmount restricted vaccine to age four. He said the restriction was due to a limited supply of the vaccine, and that a decision to restrict the age level was made on a per capita basis which applied to both Montreal and Westmount. One hundred percent of the children were inoculated in Westmount, while Montreal had a very poor turnout, and therefore raised the age level to 12 years.

Dr. Ross also commented on a protest lodged by some citizens concerning the Municipal Association's support of the Montreal plan to fluoridation of drinking water. He said the electorate is not qualified to make a decision on this matter because it concerns public health and is of necessity a question to be decided upon on a scientific basis.

The Health and Welfare chairman also mentioned health services were established at the Louis Braille School for the blind and at the Institute Pedagogique.

Frank D. Cobbett, Traffic and Circulation chairman, paid tribute to the Westmount Chief of Police and his department for the kind co-operation shown in dealing with traffic problems and complaints lodged by citizens.

He said we can't, as much as we would wish to, stop the growth of the area and of ensuing traffic problems. According to provincial law, every community must allow traffic when there is no alternative route.

Commenting on the complaints which often blame the city for losses in real estate values, Mr. Cobbett said:

"We can't blame anybody for a natural trend. The picnic is over for the demand of high value property."

Concrete steps have been taken, he noted, concerning Landsdowne Avenue. The MTC is being approached to limit the use of the road to Glen buses only.

This proved so well suited to the occasion and was so warmly received that this mediaeval Nativity Play will again be presented this year.

It should be noted that this year's production is entirely new and that a different selection of Christmas carols will precede this year's performances.

Nightly performances will start on Sunday at 8.30 p.m. and will be repeated until Wednesday.

The Everyman Players is a group founded in the Church of the Messiah in 1933 by the late George Brewer. Their first production was "Everyman" which gave this group its name. Yearly productions followed to the outbreak of war, and were resumed in 1953 with "The Sleep of Prisoners" and in 1954 with "A Man's House".

Last year, under the direction of Don McGill, they joined the Church Choir in a revival of the Nativity Plays of Mediaeval England. Such mystery plays developed around such centres as York, Chester, Coventry, Wakefield, etc.; they represented an attempt by "amateur groups" of the local guilds to portray stories of the Bible. The most significant aspect of these plays is that they were presented in the English language and that they reflect the impact of the stories of the bible on the layman of that time — and his attitude towards them.

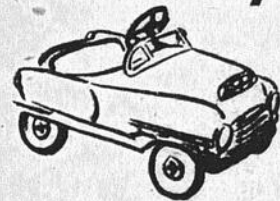

The Coming

- II -

The centuries of preparation for the Coming of Christ were also centuries of revelation in which God made Himself known by deed and word to His people. For God is a God who acts and speaks — no idol of wood or stone or metal; no imaginary being dwelling only in the thought of men; but One who has chosen one particular family that through it He may make Himself known to all men.

The acting and the speaking are both forms of self-revelation. God, of course, spoke through prophets and psalmists, but He also acted through kings and warriors, and no less through holy and humble men who have left no record behind them except in the growing knowledge of God. His words and works were committed to memory and then to writing by still other men, and instructions were given that they were to be handed on from generation to generation. These records became the most precious possession of God's people and the object of attack by His enemies.

The first concern of the Jews when they came back from Captivity was to re-establish the worship; the second was to read and codify the Law; then the writings of the prophets were carefully gathered and preserved and studied. The scribes made new copies with love and care; the scholars studied and interpreted; the reading of the Law and the Prophets became a central part of the Synagogue worship. For when it became difficult to attend the Temple regularly the Synagogue — the House of Instruction — to a very large extent satisfied the religious needs of the people. We can see how well known the Scriptures were in Our Lord's day. He quoted widely from them and the people were at home in the quotations. They had become the People of the Book.

The enemies of the Jews recognized the part that the Scriptures played in their lives. When Antiochus Epiphanes tried to destroy Judaism in 167 B.C. he gave orders that the Scriptures were to be destroyed. Those Scriptures were the very foundation of the religion. It was the comfort inspired by the Scriptures that gave hope to men.

Those Scriptures still belong to us as Christians and they have had new Scriptures added to them. The Old were one of the means of preparation for the Coming of Christ; the Old and the New together still serve the same purpose. There is to be a time when the world as we

know it will come to an end; when the Saviour whom we know will return in power and great glory to claim His own; in the meantime there may well be times of tribulation, and it is from these same Scriptures that we can draw comfort and hope as we wait.

This is the place to say a word about the place of the Bible in our own lives but I am going to emphasize only one aspect of it — the tremendous work done by the Bible Societies which translate and edit and print and distribute the Scriptures in the languages of the many races of the world; and of societies like the Gideons who see to placing the Scriptures in schools, in hotels and other strategic places. Those societies ask and deserve the help and support of all Christian men.

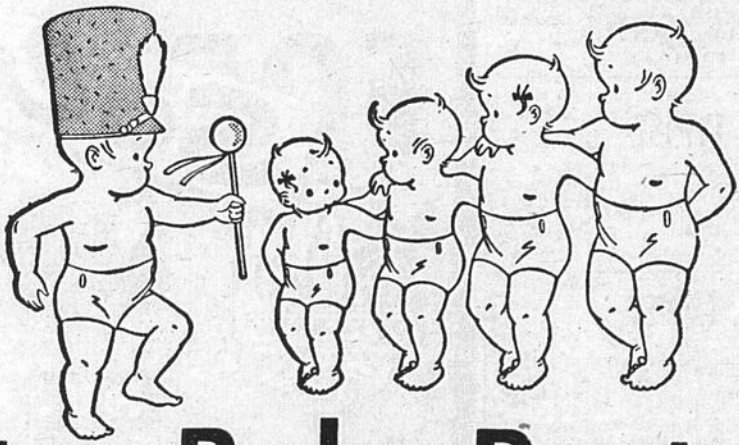

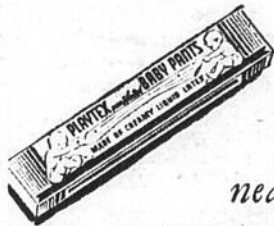

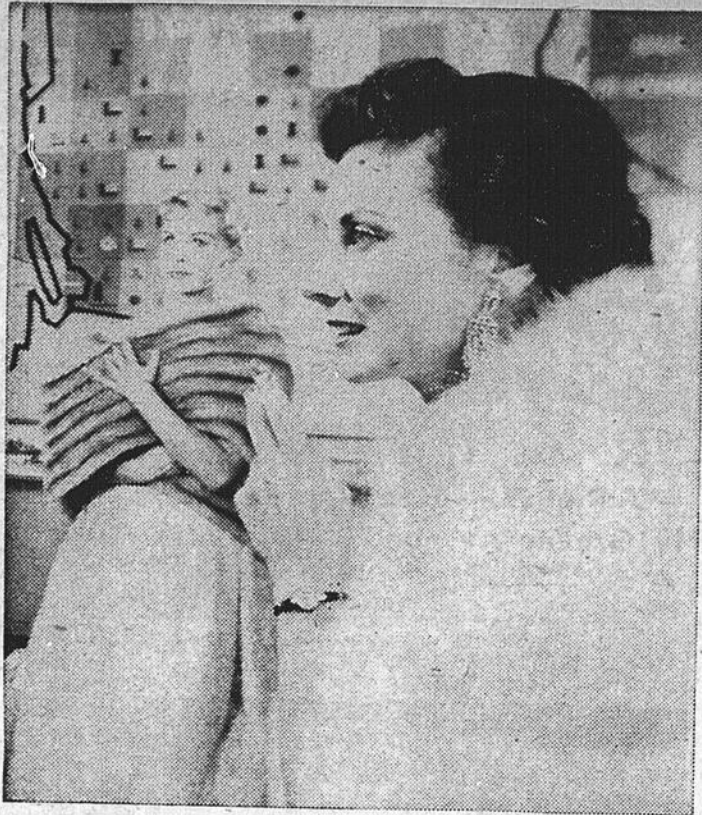

This is also true of shopping for groceries, Mrs. Armstrong said. Although food parcels are popular and welcome gifts, the Committee is hoping for food vouchers or cash to give families so that they can select their own. The social workers who know the families realize that there is a high degree of personal pride involved in accepting help, and try to respect the feelings of the recipient, she said. One impoverished old lady shyly asked last year if the food parcel could be delivered after dark. She could not face the fact that her neighbours would see it coming.

People who for one reason or another are not able to do their own shopping receive gifts in kind and this again is decided by the Family Welfare worker who knows the individual best.

"We want to make sure that everybody has a Merry Christmas," Mrs. Armstrong said. "The Christmas spirit is contagious and we are hoping that it will be strong enough this year for us to succeed."

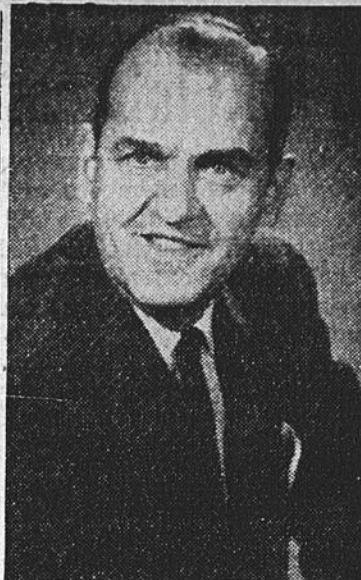



Speaker Tells Zenana Crusaders Results Of Gospel In Far East

The monthly meeting of the Zenana Crusaders was held recently at the home of Mrs. G. B. Dorey when Mr. A. J. Dain, General Secretary of the Zenana Bible and Medical Mission, of London, England, was the guest speaker.

"Of the eight missionaries at present en route to India, Pakistan and Nepal, under the Z.B.M.M., four are from Canada," said Mr. Dain. "They are Dr. and Mrs. Edward B. Fish and Rev. Eric and Mrs. Lowe, with their children." Dr. Fish is a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgery (Canada), while the Rev. Eric Lowe is a graduate of Emanuel Theological College, Saskatoon and until recently was in charge of the Anglican Mission at Loon Lake, Saskatchewan. Both Mrs. Fish and Mrs. Lowe are graduate nurses. Dr. Fish will be on the staff of Ludhiana Christian Medical College and Rev. Mr. Lowe will be Rector of St. Andrew's Church, Lahore, Pakistan.

Mr. Dain vividly impressed upon his listeners, with the aid of colored slides, the tremendous impact the Christian Gospel is making on the people of India and Nepal, a small country just to the north, not only through the medium of direct evangelism but through the ministry of healing, for many wonderful cures have been affected by Christian doctors and nurses in cases which would otherwise have been completely hopeless.

Nepal, the speaker pointed out, for centuries had been elected to the Christian Gospel but under the new government Christian missionaries may now enter and bring spiritual as well as physical and mental healing to the people of that unhappy country, and they are well received.

There is a constant need for Christian workers in those countries Mr. Dain concluded. He stated that they were particularly anxious to have a Canadian Christian teacher for a mission school high up in the Himalayan Mountains.

The speaker was introduced by the Rev. Mr. Timmons, assistant rector of St. Matthias Church, and was thanked by Miss Dorothy Coles.

Navy, McGill Win In Ball

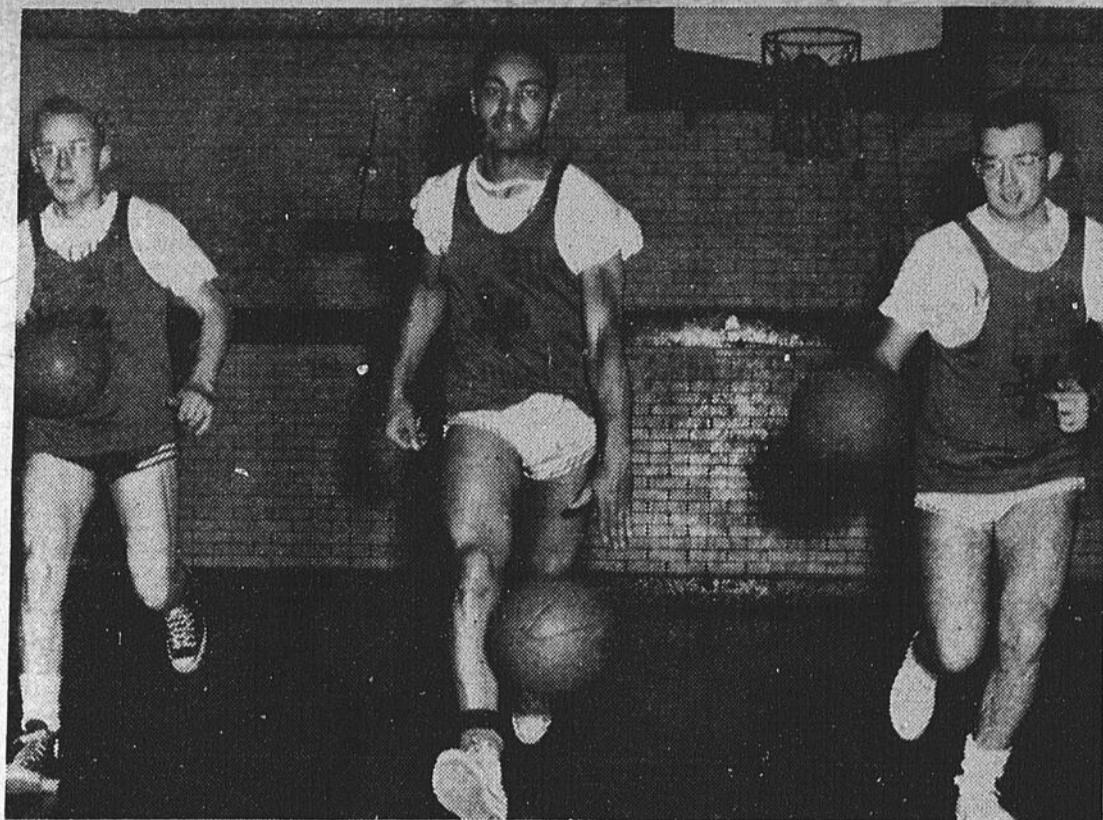
McGill COTC rolled to an 8-1 victory over 17th Hussars to take over sole possession of first place in the Officers' Section of the Military Fastball League.
