THE LUMP-JAW IN CATTLE.

CONDEMNED FOR EXPORT BUT SOLD IN MONTREAL.

The City Medical Health Officer Says That the Selling of the Meat of the Diseased Animals is Dangerous to Public Health.

Dr. Laberge, the City Medical Health Officer and the staff of the city health department, were busy this morning investigating a report that a number of cattle received in Montreal from the West for export had been stopped here because suffering from lump-jaw and sold to local butchers.

Dr. Laberge stated that lump jaw or actinobacillosis is a very contagious disease, more or less prevalent in the herds of several parts of this continent.

The condemned animals are disposed of in some manner and the presumption is that the meat finds its way to the stalls of some of the local butchers.

DR. M'CAIGHAN'S VIEWS. Doctor McEachern, Chief Inspector of Live Stock for the Dominion, said that he was aware that a number of cattle affected with lump-jaw were being stopped in Montreal.

The President, in opening the meeting briefly reviewed the history of the institution since its incorporation in 1869. He referred in feeling terms to the great work of that president of the institution, Mr. Charles Alexander, and spoke highly of the lady superintendent, Mrs. Ashcroft, who had been there since 1881.

Rev. J. Edgar Hill read the report of the examinations held on May 7. Special reference was made to the efforts of the lady superintendent to keep the pupils in touch with the outside world.

THE LIP-READING AND ARTICULATION was very wonderful, and illustrated the triumph of scientific skill over bodily infirmity, in that it showed such training in lip-reading, and in the use of the vocal barrier, hitherto regarded as insuperable, of incurable dumbness. A separate reference was made to the work of the workshops, printing and shoemaking that would do credit to skilled labor.

An interesting program in which the pupils took part, was then entered upon, and showed the marvelous manner in which those afflicted with loss of speech and hearing can be taught. An interesting feature was the singing, by means of signs, of "Rock of Ages," by one of the lady pupils. Another special point was the drawing on the blackboard of the position of the tongue in different words, the senior pupils articulating the sentences quite correctly in each case.

After closing addresses by Messrs. Mackay, Thomas and Alexander and the Rev. J. Edgar Hill, tea was served by Mrs. Ashcroft and a pleasant half hour was spent in looking over the building.
