

Sudden storm breaks Townships heat wave

The week-long heat wave was finally broken yesterday by a storm which caused minor havoc around the Eastern Townships.

An East Angus weather station official stated temperatures dropped from 84 degrees to 70 degrees during the short but powerful disturbance.

He said the wind gusted up to 45 mph and that .37 inches of rain fell.

The storm came fast, struck hard and faded. But not before the Sherbrooke Police Department rushed patrol cars to the scene of two accidents, before Hydro men were dispatched to Sherbrooke's East and North Wards where power lines were down and other municipalities felt its effects.

Sherbrooke Hydro men were

busy after the storm in the East Ward.

A Hydro official said the office was deluged with 100 to 150 calls in about 10 minutes during the storm.

"It's funny", he said, "as soon as people find out their power is gone, they phone us".

He said much of the trouble was caused to primary lines which took a long time to repair.

A Sherbrooke Police Department official said two accidents occurred in the city during the storm, one on King West and one on the corner of Galt and Pacific Streets.

Ambulance and police car sirens whined as the cars raced through city streets.

A Fire Department official said a truck was sent to Olivier

Street in Sherbrooke but didn't know why. No one did.

Lightning struck the electrical wires in Magog, blacking out the Main Street East for about 30 minutes. There, a policeman said, the wind was very strong and it rained heavily.

In East Angus, wires were broken, a transformer was hit by lightning and the wind caused many tree branches to bend and break.

Electricity was cut off on Cookshire, York and Bernier Streets in this municipality during the storm.

Today cooler weather was forecast, with sun and cloudy periods.

One of the hardest hit areas by the strong winds, lightning and rain was the Bedford, Knowlton, Sutton and Cowans-

ville district.

In Knowlton, a tree was knocked over by the wind and landed on top of a car on Bridge Street in front of the bank.

The car, owned by John Grenier of Knowlton was a total loss. No one was hurt.

Trees were toppled on wires and the town went without electricity and the use of telephones after the storm.

In Sutton, there were no blackouts but the town experienced strong winds and heavy rain for 45 minutes.

The first town to feel the storm was Bedford which went without electricity for about an hour.

The storm blew into Bedford about 1:30 and left the town powerless between 1:30 and 2:30.

Hydroelectric project grows in bleak, craggy wilderness

CHURCHILL FALLS, Nfld. (CP) — A nerve centre for one of the world's largest hydroelectric projects is growing in the bleak and craggy wilderness of central Labrador.

Black spruce, caribou moss and shrubs are being pushed from the lake-speckled terrain to make way for the people engaged in the thousands of tasks connected with the \$900,000,000 development.

In the span of a year, an empty wasteland has grown into a temporary community of more than 1,500, and work has started on a permanent town. The community will swell to perhaps 7,000 during the peak of the project and settle down at 1,000 when work is completed.

Churchill Falls (Labrador) Corp. Ltd. plans to have the first two of 11 generators humming by 1972, with the remainder to be put gradually into operation.

When all 11 units are set in motion, by 1976, the total output of electric power will reach 5,225,000 kilowatts, or 7,000,000 horsepower.

But before this tremendous potential of the great water resources of Labrador can be harnessed, facilities must be provided for the men involved in the creation of what is un-

questionably North America's biggest civil engineering project.

BUSES MOVE IN

New workers are steadily arriving, landing by plane on a dirt runway near Twin Falls from where they are driven by bus to their destination.

They cross the 540-foot-high Brinco Bridge which spans the Churchill River, and have

their first glimpse of the falls — but only of the mist and spray. The falls themselves are half a mile or so away, and reachable only on foot or helicopter.

Where men a year ago bunked in a few mud-encrusted trailers, the new arrivals today set foot in a well-planned community complete with hot showers and running water. And they eat well.

A separate part of the community is reserved for families of the supervisory staff, and the number of families now on the site totals about 70.

The heart of the permanent community, near a lake and just west of the main construction camp, will be a town centre housing under one roof most public services and facilities, including a school, stores, recreation hall, auditorium-movie theatre, and a 21-room hotel.

Work on the permanent site began this spring, and the town centre is expected to be completed early in 1969, along with a first group of more than 100 permanent homes.

A permanent 12-bed hospital will be in operation early in 1969 to replace a temporary trailer hospital run by Dr. John Price, a native of Wales who gave up a surgical practice in St. John's, Nfld., and his nurse, Rosamond Watts, a graduate of Grace Hospital in St. John's.

A temporary school was opened in September, 1967, to provide educational facilities for the 60 school-age children, giving instruction in French to the few French speaking youngsters on the site.

And to round out the community, there is a two-man RCMP detachment, a fire department, a post office, a bank, telephone and telegraph outlets, barber shop, tavern and food store.

Most of the supplies are shipped 286 miles by rail from Sept-Isles, on the north shore of the St. Lawrence River, to Esker, where they are transferred to trucks and hauled the remaining 120 miles to Churchill Falls. Shipments also are made by aircraft.

A commissary serves the workers where they can purchase shirts, socks and underwear before heading for the numerous projects under way in various parts of the development.

Iraq coup latest of many

A military coup d'etat in Iraq follows a decade of turbulence which has seen a frequent change of political leaders since the army overthrew the monarchy in July, 1958.

The country has been troubled by fighting with Kurdish tribesmen in the north, border disputes with Iran, vacillating relations with U.A.R. President Nasser and, more recently, quarrels over rights in the vast Iraqi oilfields.

Army and air force units ousted Premier Abdel Karim Kassem in February, 1963, and he was executed a day later.

Field Marshal Abdel Salem Mohammed Aref became president, with a government of predominantly-Baathist party members. But in November, 1963, he rooted out Baathists (Arab Socialists) from key

posts. Air Force commander Brig-Gen. Abdel Aref Razzak, with other pro-Nasser officers, made an unsuccessful coup attempt against the president in September, 1965—only 10 days after Razzak became premier. Razzak fled to Cairo.

Aref was killed in a helicopter crash in April, 1966, and was succeeded by his brother, Abdel Rahman Aref, a career soldier. In June that year a new rising under Razzak was crushed.

Two months later Premier Abdel Rahman al-Bazzaz resigned, complaining his activities were restricted. He was succeeded by Najib Taleb who resigned in May, 1967.

Aref took over the premiership until handing it over to

Lt.-Gen. Taher Yahya after two months.

Several years of intermittent fighting by Kurdish tribesmen, who wanted a measure of autonomy, was resolved under Bazzaz's government.

Kurds represent about 2,000,000 of Iraq's 8,000,000 population.

Under an agreement in June, 1966, fighting in the mountain-

ous north came to an end with Kurdish acceptance of a government plan which, while recognizing Kurdish nationalism, provided for tribal development within a united Iraq.

But the Kurds have expressed dissatisfaction with the rate of implementation of the development plan and have recently shown signs of unrest.

Two of the three Kurdish ministers in the Iraqi cabinet resigned last month.

Quebec parks are a vacationers paradise

MONTREAL (CP) — Whether tourist or native, Quebec's widespread provincial parks and reserves offer the opportunity for family camping outings and excellent fishing.

These areas of more than 25,000 square miles were set aside to preserve large virgin spaces for future generations. All the beauties of nature in a wilderness setting have been left intact with only the necessary access roads and services intruding into the parks.

Mount Orford Park in the Eastern Townships has camping facilities.

Mont Tremblant Park, 100 miles north of the city in the Laurentian Mountains, is becoming increasingly popular as a recreational spot for usually smog-bound Montrealers. Here, families can pitch a tent or park their trailers around the many lakes that dot the area.

Picturesque rivers provide excellent beach spots and

swimming, picnicking, boating and fishing are all available for campers.

There are no lodges, restaurants or gas stations in Mont Tremblant Park, so the camper or fisherman becomes self-reliant within its confines. Speckled trout, northern pike and dore or walleye, with a few bass, are the main species inhabiting the lakes and streams.

La Verendrye Park, Quebec's largest reserve, is situated in the western and northern part of the province, more than 200 miles north of here on the highway leading to the Abitibi region.

The largest lakes and rivers of this park form the headwaters of the Ottawa River. The park is well equipped with lodges, restaurants and all services and choice fishing for northern pike, dore and grey trout is readily available.

Chibougamau and Mistassini Parks are usually thought of together and are the prov-

ince's most northern reserves. They are 500 miles north of Montreal and are the least known, but possibly the most interesting to sportsmen.

The terrain is relatively flat and is streaked with large lakes and long rivers. The lakes of the Chibougamau Park form the headwaters of the Lac St. Jean and Saguenay River, draining south. The Mistassini Park waters drain north in the Rupert River to James Bay.

This entire region has preserved its primitive beauty and is a paradise for those who enjoy canoeing, being the route used by the early fur traders travelling from the St. Lawrence River to James Bay.

Fishing is rated as excellent for northern pike, lake trout, dore and speckled trout.

Laurentide Park, 50 miles north of Quebec City, encompasses an area of 4,000 square miles. This is a mountainous area, sometimes rolling,

sometimes steep and rugged with peaks reaching an average height of 2,500 feet.

It is streaked with many raging rivers and streams and is dotted with thousands of lakes. The park offers the visitor some of the best inns and pavilions in Quebec's park system.

Camping grounds close to lakes and rivers are spread out along the main highway. Fishing in this park is for speckled trout only.

The Gaspesien Park is where the sea and the mountains meet, as the St. Lawrence River flows into the Atlantic Ocean. It is 800 miles north and east of Montreal. Its rugged peaks offer a challenge to mountain climbers and rare alpine plants abound for the collector.

Inns and cabins and camp grounds are located in choice settings, while for the fisherman, speckled trout, sea trout and Atlantic salmon offer a challenge.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Today's hand is an old timer with a new twist. Seven diamonds is a reasonable contract, except for one thing. There is no real play for it because declarer has two clubs in each hand and can only discard three hearts on dummy's top spades.

On the other hand, most declarers will make the contract against any lead but a spade by cashing two clubs and all the trumps. East and West are each likely to guard spades and will have to discard down to one heart each in order to do so.

Of course, if South bids hearts along the way, West may count up and decide that his partner will hold at least four spades, whereupon West will throw spades early.

The new twist is supplied by British writer Victor Mollo. South is a very bad, but very lucky, player who reached seven diamonds as shown in the box.

He carefully won the first club with dummy's queen and led a diamond to his ace. When East showed out, de-

clarer, who couldn't count very well, decided to go back to dummy with the ace of clubs to finesse the diamonds. He was so intent on this that he led dummy's jack of diamonds.

At this point, there was no way to get to dummy for the three top spades. An ordinary poor player would realize this and play ace and one heart to get out for down one but Mollo's man was built of sterner stuff. He wouldn't lose a trick until he had to and he ran out all his trumps. East threw one spade early but West did not discard a spade. Eventually, declarer played his ace of hearts and was about to concede down several when he discovered that all his small hearts were good and he made his grand slam!

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Assizes next stop for woman accused of bad cheque involvement

Judge Benoit Turmel yesterday ordered Christine Helm, alias Ruth H. Church, 33, of Greenfield Park, Que., to appear at the next session of assizes. Her preliminary hearing concluded yesterday in court of sessions. Bail was set at \$2,500 or \$5,000 property value.

She is accused of obtaining \$100 from the New Sherbrooke Hotel under false pretenses, obtaining \$300 from the Bank of Nova Scotia on Wellington South under false pretenses and having in her possession seven false American Express travellers' cheques worth \$700 to be used to commit forgery.

All the charges involved forged American travellers' cheques.

Crown Prosecutor Stanlet Steinman called four witnesses to the stand, one of them, Jean-Paul Pelletier of the Sherbrooke Police Department, who is an expert on false documents and negotiable bonds.

He testified he looked at the cheques and found some faults. A real American Express travellers' cheque is made with three different types of printings, he stated.

The false cheques were printed by just two.

Defence lawyer Jean Cormier asked no questions.

The next witness was Claude Patenaude, an assistant accountant at the Bank of Nova Scotia who testified he was asked to cash change three \$100 travellers' cheques by a woman on July 11.

The three cheques, he said he found out later, were false so he called the police.

He said he noticed the color and paper of the false cheques were different from the real cheques.

Captain Roland Gaboriault of the Sherbrooke Police Department said he was called to the bank by the assistant accountant to check on a woman who had tried to cash the false cheques.

He stated she had no identification papers so he asked her name and address.

He said he returned to the office to verify the name and address and learned they did not exist.

He had the woman arrested at 6 p.m. by Lt. Raymond Bonneau.

Arthur Garinther, manager of the Sherbrooke Hotel, testified he gave the same woman 10 \$10 bills for a \$100 American Express travellers' cheque which he later learned to be forged.

Bail was set after both Mr. Cormier and Mr. Steinman presented pro and con arguments. Mr. Cormier describing his client as not being dangerous and Mr. Steinman, pleading she had a long record, asked for the high bail.

East Angus residents foresee dim future

EAST ANGUS — East Angus townfolk and proprietors see a dim future for the town should the Domtar Pulp and Kraft Paper Ltd. strike continue for any length of time.

Those primarily affected by the walkout are the service stations and the grocery stores, while the smaller establishments such as restaurants are only feeling a slight, if not insignificant, pinch.

One service station attendant told the Record that it was his last day at work. "There's just no more work for me to do here", he said. The gas station refused to accept credit even

though the demands for it were continually increasing.

Another gas station owner saw a particularly black future as he pondered his plunge after only two days of striking. "Business is really slack now. Imagine what it'll be like if the strike goes on as long as a month".

The owner of a small restaurant took the whole thing rather light-heartedly. "No, my business isn't suffering at all. People will always continue to come here. It's the bigger places that are really going to be hit".

He continued, "I haven't even considered giving credit. I have

to pay cash for my goods so what's the point of letting people off without paying me cash".

The owner of one of the town's largest grocery stores pointed out his good fortune as compared to his competitor's poor luck. "My store happens to be in the residential section of town where the bosses and office workers live. These men have two months wages guaranteed for them. So my business will still operate at a relatively brisk pace".

But, he continued, "the other

grocery stores across the river where the striking mill workers live are going to have the hard time. The men there just are not going to have enough money".

Yet all agreed that all would suffer should the strike drag on for any length of time.

On the other hand, few were willing to express an opinion on the justice of the strike. Nobody wanted to take sides. One lady, however, felt that the strikers had been premature in walking off their jobs.

"They didn't give the com-

pany time to consider another offer," she said, "But that's just my opinion and I don't really know that much about it". Most of her information came from other people, she said.

The East Angus strikers are not nearly as jumpy as their counterparts in Windsor. A mood of relaxation prevails along the picket lines as compared to the Windsor strikers' belligerent attitude to all on-lookers.

The situation in Windsor doesn't appear much rosier, according to Mayor Lewis Craig. "This strike could well

have a very bad effect on the whole community", he said.

Mr. Craig went on to say that up to now, he hadn't really "felt the pulse of the community" and its reaction to the strike, so it was difficult to comment intelligently at this point.

In the course of a telephone interview, Mr. Craig assured the Record that if the situation didn't improve soon, he would take "certain steps" to alleviate the problem. Exactly what those steps would be he declined to say.

Assailant fined \$200

aging private property on July 3. They received suspended sentences, were ordered to post \$300 bonds to keep the peace for two years and to pay for the damages. They appeared in court of sessions July 4 and Cusseau pleaded guilty to all charges but Ducharme pleaded guilty to only three.

Yesterday he changed his plea from not guilty to guilty on the other two charges.

They went on a drinking spree July 3 and then caused \$90 damages to the property of the City of Magog; \$54 damage to the property of Garage Belanger; \$338 damage to the property of the Progres - Chronique, a Magog newspaper; \$20 to the property of Henri-Louis Cliche; and \$30 damage to the property of Ernest Benoit, all of Magog.

Judge Turmel suspended the sentences of Yvan Gosselin, 18, and Denis Beaudette, 18, both of Bromptonville, when they appeared for sentencing yesterday on a charge of breaking and entering with theft.

They pleaded guilty to the charge on July 15.

They broke into the Immaculate Mary Convent in Bromptonville on July 11 and stole a tape recorder, two tape cartridges, a transistor radio and four record players, altogether worth \$500.

Farm Safety Week aims to cut accident toll

Farming continues to rank the third most hazardous occupation in Canada, with only mining and the construction industry having higher accident rates.

If the present trend continues, one member out of every fourth farm family will be involved in an accident in the next 12 months.

Of the more than 100,000 accidents yearly, approximately 30,000 will result in permanent injury and 2,200 in death.

To focus attention on the many accident hazards found on the farm and in the rural community, the coming week has been set aside as Farm Safety Week, sponsored by the National Safety League of Canada and the Canadian Highway Safety Council.

In an effort to reduce this tragic loss, the co-sponsors are seeking the co-operation of all persons and groups serving or allied with agriculture to intensify efforts to curtail farm accidents, emphasizing the fact that farm safety is a family affair involving every day hazards in living, working and playing.

In industry, the sponsors point out, there are safety engineers, but on the farm, the entire family must work together to eliminate hazards and forestall careless acts.

Every farm family is urged to take advantage of Farm Safety Week to work out a safety plan for the farm—the home, buildings, fields, machinery, chemicals and all other aspects of farm life.

By making the plan work, the farm population will reap happiness and satisfaction.

Peace in woodlands

It is peaceful in the woodlands. Summer heat broods over the countryside and in the quietness one can feel the steady purposefulness of time. Among the hardwoods there is shadowed coolness. Not here the pressing heat that sears the grasses on thin-soiled open uplands; here the canopy of leaves gives coolness and moisture.

Great boles of oaks and maples lift arching branches that remind one of cathedral aisles. Slender shafts of sun strike through openings and the golden rays paint a picture on the faded leaf carpet. If one sits quietly for a time, he may see a mother partridge lead a brood of beady-eyed chicks across an opening; chickadees may come around to inspect the intruder, and perhaps a young crow tries its quavering voice.

Perhaps the quietest spot is among the evergreens where the branches of pines, hemlocks and spruces play a haunting cello melody when a breeze passes by. The ground is soft and spongy with a brown needle carpet above rich humus. The air is fragrant and bracing, and in the quietness of the grove the snapping of a twig beneath one's feet sounds strangely loud.

A woodland on a summer's day is a refuge from the cacophony of the marketplace. Among friendly trees a man can catch up with his thoughts and see his trail more clearly. This is an age of the spectacular; it is an era of blatant noise. But he who will find a refuge for a time in a brooding woodland.

It's about time someone said something constructive about hippies; at least, they don't contribute to a city's water shortage.

July 20, 1968 . . .

The British colony of British Columbia joined Confederation 97 years ago today—in 1871—and became a self-governing province. There had been exploration and settlement in the area for less than 100 years and only in 1849 did the British government take an interest in the colony, to resist United States claims on

Hudson's Bay Co. territories. Gold rushes in 1858 and 1860 brought thousands of settlers but the colony was always on the verge of bankruptcy. One of the conditions for joining was the construction of the CPR.

1875—Sir Francis Bond Head died.

1903—Pope Leo XIII died.

First World War

Fifty years ago today—in 1918—German forces retired over the Marne River with a loss of 20,000 prisoners and 400 guns in the battle to date. American troops shared in an advance on the Western Front; the White Star liner Justicia was torpedoed and sunk in Irish waters after a long struggle with German submarines.

Second World War

Twenty-five years ago today—in 1943—a great Russian offensive opened along a 450-mile front, extending from the Orel sector to the Mius River; American forces captured Enna, a Sicilian road centre, just ahead of Canadians who, in their first real action against German troops, gave the Panzer Grenadiers a thrashing and drove them back; Lt. Col. Bruce Sutcliffe of Trenton, Ont., commander of the Hastings and Prince Edward Regiment, was killed by shellfire.

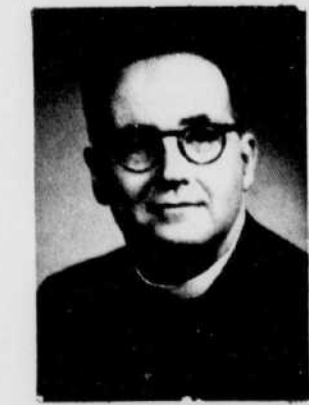
Perspectives and Prejudices

Those who preach sermons must re-examine practice of craft

A friend of mine, an astute young minister, has lamented that the sermon as an instrument of Christian faith seems increasingly archaic and irrelevant. We ministers sometimes tell ourselves that people do not care about sermons and that a parish minister is wasting valuable time if he spends more than just a couple of hours a week knocking together a sermon or thawing some other preacher's deep-frozen product (lots of these readily available in books and journals) and adding a little of his personal sauce. Or he can just get up and preach—and then blame the Holy Spirit for it!

Paul Althaus, an influential German theologian, gave today's preachers a sharp rap across the knuckles when he said that people today are not tired of preaching but that they are tired of our preaching. The history of the Church demonstrates that strength and vitality in the Church are always tied to strength and vitality in preaching. A competent pulpit is always a cause and a concomitant of renewal in the Church. The Roman Catholic Church is showing awareness of this in its current efforts to rehabilitate the sermon.

We who have accepted the responsibility of preaching must re-examine our practice of our craft. We do deserve much of the criticism that is thrown at us. We often come to our pulpits inadequately prepared. We readily succumb to

a theological college can corrupt almost anyone's prose style).

The alarming truth is that most ministers today are simply too busy to prepare adequate sermons. Some preachers, men of exceptional talent and fluency, may not require long hours of preparation, but we ordinary journeymen preachers who our people mightily thin gruel if we do not spend long hours preparing to preach. I

suggest that nine out of ten preachers are defrauding their people and dishonouring their Lord when they go into their pulpits with less than fifteen hours of preparation behind them.

But it isn't all the minister's fault. You pew-sitters must accept much of the blame for inadequate preaching today. You sometimes apply pressures on your preacher to make him water down the Gospel and add extraneous sweetness. A preacher doing his job faithfully will sometimes have to jar the self-esteeming sensitivities of his people, jostle their cherished prejudices, prod their sluggish consciences. (A magazine cartoon shows a minister shaking hands with a woman at a church-door, and saying to her, "Well, frankly, if you liked the sermon it didn't achieve its purpose.")

Church members should recognize that sermon-preparation must be given a high priority among the duties of their minister. After a minister has met a decent number of the demands that are made on him and tries to take an active interest in all those things that his people insist he take an interest in, he often has neither the time nor the energy for the proper preparation of sermons. If you keep your minister busy busy busy on administrative and pastoral and community tasks you shouldn't be surprised when his sermonic pump starts to suck mud.

A new device which would have low weight and be able to withstand pressure high speed will bring has been requested by several agencies. So the establishment has the problem of creating a working device to meet these needs.

OTTAWA — (TNS) — "In reviewing the international scene, ministers examined the situation created by the recent (East German) measures affecting the access routes to Berlin . . . Member governments do not recognize the German Democratic Republic. They consider that its actions, having no juridical basis, cannot create international rights nor consecrate the divi-

sion of Germany against the will of its people. The (Occupation) Powers remain responsible for Berlin and Germany as a whole, pending a peaceful settlement . . . (which must) overcome the division of Germany."

These are excerpts from the communique issued by NATO foreign ministers in Reykjavik two weeks ago.

The larger issue

Why do the Western Powers, when discussing the Berlin problem among themselves and with the Soviets continue to insist on linking the fate of the divided city with the larger issue of German reunification? To many people who continue to regard Germany as an incorrigible troublemaker this is a puzzling question. Wouldn't it be safer for everyone concerned, they ask, to keep Germany permanently divided and give up Berlin?

Communist propaganda has been doing its utmost since the Berlin blockade, two decades ago, to nourish this view, which is by no means confined to direct victims of Nazi aggression. And indeed the memory of two world wars makes it impossible to shrug off the possibility of resurgence of militant nationalism in Germany. Then why tempt fate with insistence on German reunification?

The answer is that there is far greater danger to European security and world peace, imperfect as it is, in a divided Germany than there would be if the country were reunited.

The main argument behind this reasoning is that an artificial division of a highly developed nation of over 70 million people in the heart of Europe cannot be perpetuated beyond a certain limit of endurance without driving that nation into some desperate action. The spectre of permanent partition, of which the Berlin problem is an inseparable part, cannot but provide fuel for militant nationalism.

At the end of World War II, the victorious powers had far-reaching plans for stripping Germany of its huge industrial capacity and thus making it impossible for the country to re-arm and threaten peace ever again. Such plans, if at all practicable, would have required permanent east-west harmony for carrying out and maintaining an effective demilitarization policy. A start in this direction was made in the first postwar years when whole industrial complexes in all the occupation zones were dismantled and shipped to various European countries as part-payment for damages caused by Nazi occupation.

But it soon became apparent that this practice made little sense, as German industrial workers, deprived of work, had to be fed at the expense of the victors. Even the Soviet Union, which was very thorough in the dismantling policy, gradually abandoned the practice, restored some of the ruined industries and started building new ones in order to extract reparations in manufactured goods. With the steady worsening of east-west relations in the late 1940s and the subsequent Soviet decision to create a new German Army, the process of rebuilding German industrial might swung into high gear on both sides of the dividing line.

While the Communists could not match the "economic miracle" of the federal republic and had to build the Berlin wall to stop a mass exodus westward, their methods of ruthless exploitation of labor turned East Germany into an industrially indispensable satellite of Moscow.

The prospect of production in both parts of Germany, coupled with rearmament, inevitably enhanced German nationalistic feelings. The result is that the Germans, once again, have substantial forces which could conceivably trigger a major conflict.

This danger is much greater while Germany remains divided into two armed camps and while East Germans continue to be shot trying to scale the Berlin wall, for the artificial partition provides the nationalists with a legitimate cause for agitation and militant action.

The prospect of a powerful reunited Germany is certainly not a happy one, for without an east-west agreement on a strictly enforced demilitarization of central Europe no one can guarantee that some future internal change (like the one in 1933) will not turn it once again into a menace to its neighbors. But a continually divided Germany clearly presents an even greater danger, as the new tension over Berlin, the recent student riots and Von Thadden's political gains attest.

Unification would keep the nation busy evening up the differences in economic, social and political development in the two parts of the country over the past 20 years. It would also pull the rug from under the feet of despairing and therefore aggressive nationalism.

A gamble

So while Western insistence on German unification may be a gamble in the given circumstances, it is a considerably less dangerous one than continued partition, which the Kremlin tries to "legalize" in order to convince not only its restive satellites that their attempts to loosen the Soviet grip have pretty narrow limits, but also to impress on frustrated German nationalists that their best prospect of reunification lies in deserting NATO and making a deal with the "socialist bloc."

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News in brief

Won't step in

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister Trudeau said Friday he hopes the national postal strike can be settled without the intervention of Parliament.

He told reporters he wants to see the strike "settled quickly through negotiations," but gave no indication how long the government would wait before summoning Parliament.

The prime minister's attitude appeared to be one of patience and of respect for the right of public servants to strike. But it seems probable that if another week passes without signs of settlement, the cabinet will again give serious consideration to a special session of Parliament.

Urges courage

PRAGUE (AP) — Alexander Dubcek, Czechoslovakia's liberal Communist party chief, called on his country Friday to show "courage and determination" in fighting a Soviet-backed attempt to oust his government with inside pressure from Czechoslovak hardliners and the armed 35,000 militia they control.

Flying north

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister Trudeau is to make a week-long flying tour of the Canadian North, his office announced Friday.

Mr. Trudeau is to leave Ottawa Sunday, July 21, at 6 p.m. EDT, and to return the evening of Sunday, July 28.

He will cover about 7,500 miles during the trip, starting with a flight to Whitehorse in the Yukon Territory, heading eastward across the Northwest Territories and popping into far-northern Quebec and Labrador before returning to Ottawa.

Digging in

SAIGON (AP) — Thousands of troops guarding Saigon looked for terrorist attacks and a possible rocket barrage Friday on the eve of what the Vietnamese call "Shame Day," the 14th anniversary of the 1964 Geneva agreement that split North and South Vietnam.

A senior U.S. officer said intelligence reported the enemy might launch a small-scale ground assault and shelling, although there is no imminent threat of a long-anticipated major offensive.

Health good

MONTREAL (CP) — George Gaetan Paris, 49-year-old suburban electrical designer from nearby Laval, continues in excellent health three weeks after receiving a new heart at the Montreal Heart Institute.

Dr. Gilles LePage, one of the doctors who performed the operation on Canada's second heart transplant, told a news conference Friday that Mr. Paris had not shown further disturbances of his heart rhythm since July 12.

Booze oasis

HAWKESBURY, Ont. (CP) — Quebecers are flocking in increasing numbers to this liquor oasis near the Ontario-Quebec boundary as a result of the Quebec Liquor Board strike, entering its 24th day today.

The liquor store in this town halfway between Montreal and Ottawa has bulged with between 75 and 100 customers at a time in efforts to replace empty liquor cabinets in Quebec homes, especially in the Montreal area.

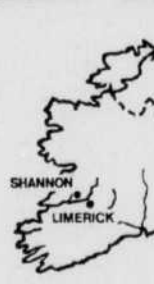

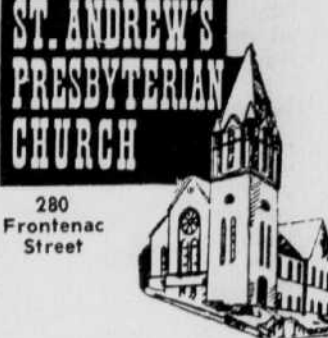

by Daniel N. Fader, Ph.D.

How to Get the Most Reluctant Reader to Read, Read, Read!



One of the most unusual books
on education in a long time

HOOKED ON BOOKS: PROGRAM AND PROOF, by Daniel N. Fader & Elton B. McNeil, Longmans Canada Limited, \$7.50 — 263 Pages.

"HOOKED ON BOOKS" is one of the most informative and unusual books on education to come along for some time. It has two authors. It is written by Daniel N. Fader, Ph.D., who is an assistant professor of English at the University of Michigan and by Elton B. McNeil, Ph.D., a professor of psychology at the same university. Both these men are dedicated teachers who have become deeply involved in the education and training of underprivileged adolescents in penal institutions and the poor public schools.

The content of the book is eloquently foretold in the opening chapter. "The poorest man in the world is the man limited to his own experience, the man who does not read. This book is about every child who may become such a man." The theme of the section written by author Fader emphasizes strongly the necessity of "English in every Classroom." I earnestly urge all teachers to read this book. What a concept — to have English, the speaking, writing and reading of it, taught by all teachers in all subjects! Doctor Fader's program for teaching English was tried at the Maxey Boys Training School at Whitmore Lake, Michigan, at the Garnet-Patterson Junior High School in Washington, D. C. and is now in use in some form in thirty-seven states and in three foreign countries.

Doctor Fader writes that En-

glish in every Classroom is an approach to learning based on the dual concepts of Saturation and Diffusion. The concept of Saturation purposes to surround the student with newspapers, magazines and paperback books in order to induce him to literacy and Diffusion refers to the responsibility of every teacher in every classroom to make literacy attractive to him. He stresses the need for each boy to own a paperback dictionary and he tells of several incidents showing the tremendous and unbelievable importance of this. He says, with wry humor, that most fourteen to sixteen year olds spend the first few weeks looking up all the unmentionable words, but then, sensing the power that even limited knowledge can give them, begin to resort to their dictionaries at every opportunity. His great plea is to teach all boys and girls to read, to make books available to them and to present them in their most attractive form. He pays tribute to the wise and wonderful generosity of men like Ivan Ludington of the Ludington News Service Company of Detroit who flooded the schools with his newspapers and paperbound books. Ludington Rooms have been established in schools where parents and pupils are invited to come to read together.

There are study guides for various books and plays with accompanying questions and lesson plans. There are lists of available paperbacks and the prices are given. The power of progressive reading is demonstrated over and over again. Doctor Fader tells of one boy who

approached his school librarian, a copy of Hawthorne's "The Scarlet Letter" in his hand and asked, "Ain't this the one about the whore?" When the librarian admitted that he was more or less correct, he happily walked off, pocketing his treasure. The sequel is that on the following Monday he reappeared before her with two sheets of words, all previously unknown to him, now accompanied by precise definitions obtained from his pocket dictionary!

The second part of this valuable book is written by Elton B. McNeil. He calls his section, "Hooked On Research". Doctor McNeil selected a "control group" at the W. J. Maxey Boys' Training School. The boys ranged in age from twelve to seventeen years with fewer whites than negro boys. All these boys were similarly immersed in the toils of the law, all burdened by similar social histories and were characterized by their rejection of everything that school represents. He presents in his chapters the events that took place when these boys, books, newspapers, magazines and teachers were placed in continual contact. There are catalogues of tests and measures taken to show the attitude of the boy toward classrooms, teachers and towards himself.

A salute to the brilliant and dedicated men who have written this book and to all their generous and gifted helpers!

Doctor McNeil says their middle-class slogan is, "To the Stars Through Bolts and Bars".

Book should be read as a whole

EVERYDAY FAITH, by Karl Rahner, Palm Publishers, 217 pages, \$4.95.

EVERYDAY FAITH is a book of meditations written by Father Karl Rahner, a priest of the Roman Catholic Church. Father Rahner relates the Gospel Message to the Seasons and major Feasts of the Christian Church Year.

In the first section of the book he centers his meditations around The Year of the Lord: Advent, Christmas, The New Year, and Easter. The emphasis in this section is on personal piety.

I must admit that I found the meditations of The Year of the Lord quite disappointing. They do not come up to the claim on the dust jacket that they are related to the needs and aspirations of the ordinary Christian. The ordinary Christian in today's world expects each Season in the Church

Year to speak to his economic, social and psychological need. This emphasis is lacking in Rahner's meditations.

However, when the writer deals with The Love of God and the Neighbor, in the second section of his book, his meditations become more relevant to the modern man's needs. For instance, he writes that only where and to the extent that, a man has a genuine, loving and really heartfelt relationship with his fellow-men, does he find God and can he convince other men, that this reality which we call God exists.

The section on the Feast Days is excellent. There is a fine explanation of the Feast Day of Mary's Immaculate Conception. There is a Chapter on why the Catholics honor St. Joseph, and a chapter on the life of Thomas Aquinas. Non-Roman Catholics will

find all this very informative. EVERYDAY FAITH is the kind of book that should be read as a whole. The meditation on The First Commandment leaves one with the impression that all he has to do is to love God and everything else will take care of itself.

But when one reads The New Single Precept of Love he is told that if he is to become a messenger of God he must do one thing: love his neighbor, in his life, in care for him, in patience, in tolerance, in forgiveness.

This does not mean to imply that there is contradiction here, but that each meditation is incomplete. This, to me, is the weakness of the book. To get the message the reader will have to read it from cover to cover.

Opens character's life for readers

I AM MARY DUNNE by Brian Moore; McClelland and Stewart; 217 pp.; \$4.95.

As my wife would be the first to admit, she is not and never has been the exotic type that invites a perfectly strange man to proposition her on a New York street corner. If one were to, and in the words of the man used to Mary Dunne in Brian Moore's novel, my wife would holler for me, expect me to retrieve her honor by a manly display of fisticuffs and then hold the culprit while she washed out his mouth with soap and water.

Mary Dunne was not so old-fashioned and she was more experienced but she was upset enough to dash into the midst of New York traffic with little concern for her safety. Mary Dunne was already in a state bordering on hysteria, a state that lasts throughout the novel which covers the period of one day, with flash-backs — very cleverly done — so that Mary Dunne - Phelan - Bell - Lavery's whole life is laid open to the reader.

Granted that I am an adventure-biography reader by preference, it seemed to me this type of story, biographical in one sense and by a man from a woman's viewpoint, should be interesting but I soon found myself losing patience with Mary Dunne. Her first marriage had floundered mainly on the rocks of youthful, sexual inexperience but she had already had relations with Bell before either his divorce or hers, and that marriage went to pieces on sexual unfulfillment more than for any other reason.

She was able, during the latter part of the second marriage, to fly from Montreal to New York frequently to spend an hour or two with the man who was to become her third husband, while husband number two thought she was safely at a movie or out for lunch.

Her marriage with Terence Lavery, the third husband, is satisfactory in every way but Mary keeps on floundering around in a morass of self-pity and guilt.

However, I began to realize what Brian Moore was driving at and to understand that the things that aggravated me in Mary Dunne were the very things that made her what she was and so made the story. There is considerable erotic exposure, intended perhaps to titillate women readers — certainly not men — and the so-called erotic sexual words have so long been used as "cuss" words by the illiterate that they are scarcely noticeable.

Papa's yarns were useful

MY HEART'S IN THE HEATHER by Seon Manley; Longman's; 188 pages; \$5.25.

The author, Seon Manley and her sister Gogo were raised in the Scottish-American colony of New York City by their American-born grandmother and Scottish-born grandfather.

When she was a child the yarns her grandfather, whom they called Papa, told of his "old Country" always found a ready listener in Seon. She wished she too, had an "old Country" to brag about as many of the youngsters in the neighborhood did.

It is the story of the author's early and adolescent years — a school play, a New York Sunday, a trip to Molly Pitcher's Well. But in my opinion almost every incident is stretched far beyond the interest point. The book crawls on until Papa returns to Scotland for a visit which turns out to be a let-down as the reader might expect.

Few characters in the book come to life and despite the jacket's claim of the author's "gift of laughter that permeates the pages of MY HEART'S IN THE HEATHER" I found little real humor.

Still the author's books must sell. She has many books to her credit as well as some written in collaboration with her sister Gogo and two with her husband.

Music on Records

BEETHOVEN: THE FOUR LEONORE OVERTURES. George Szell conducting the Cleveland Orchestra. Columbia stereo MS 7068; mono ML 6468.

On one record we have all four attempts of Beethoven to introduce the drama of his single opera, "Fidelio". The conjunction is a unique opportunity to enter the creative realm of a genius and pursue with him the struggles and doubts and persistence gone through to achieve the realization of his vision. The theme of the opera is the correction of injustice; Florestan, the hero, is unjustly thrown into prison; through the fidelity of his wife, Leonora, he is finally liberated. Love and freedom — a theme not removed from our own age. The Leonore Overture No. 1 is an early draft. Beethoven was dissatisfied with it. For the opening of the opera in 1805, Beethoven wrote a second summation conveying the poetic essence of the drama. In his third prologue, he retreated (if such a word can be used in connection with Beethoven) into a summation of the dramatic action. Both are symphonies in little. As Roman Holland says in his book, "Beethoven the Creator", both are "too gigantic": They crush the earlier scenes.... The final recasting by Beethoven, known as the "Fidelio" overture, is half the length of the others. Should the choice go, as Schumann said it should, to Number 2?

Needless to say, the superb setting forth of the problem on this fascinating record by Szell and his Cleveland Orchestra makes the solution all the harder.

HANDEL: CONCERTI GROSSI OP. 6, NUMBERS 5 IN D MAJOR; 10 IN D MINOR; AND 12 IN B MINOR. The Berlin Philharmonic under Herbert von Karajan, with the conductor at the Continuo. Deutsche Grammophon stereo 13912.

To come to the Concerti Grossi of Handel is to leave all such perplexing problems as Beethoven re-writing himself four times in the Leonore Overtures, and to enter an earlier period which was all formal staidness and well worked-out architecture. Listening to this record is to step into another world — a world which sounds completely lost to us; one with apparently all the answers, with thoughts and emotions tied neatly, as it were, with conclusive little bows.

"Concerto" in Handel's day meant simply a composition in which several performers combined to play together "in concert", a smaller body of strings heard in alternation and contrast with a larger — a concerted effort to entertain an audience. And Karajan and his players eminently succeed in doing so on this record. There is no quibbling about their concerted effort. A lovely record.

VIVALDI: FOUR CONCERTOS FOR OBOE AND STRINGS. The New York Sinfonietta conducted by Max Goberman. Odyssey stereo 32 160214.

More early music without any insoluble problems — tender, gay, vital, and easy to listen to — this time employing a "hero" among the musicians assembled in concert: the oboe. Three different artists appear with their oboes on this record, and I for one could not rank them.

Stamp collectors are reminded that the hot, humid summer days can do a great deal of damage to unprotected mint stamps. Stamp albums should not be piled on shelves or in boxes. There is a minimum of difficulty when collectors take a few precautions and use common sense.

The use of glassine envelopes for mint plate blocks is recommended. A collector recently brought some Canadian plate blocks to show the writer and they were stuck together, this is the reason for this warning.

A five-cent commemorative stamp to be released by the Canada Post Office on September 4 will mark the 100th anniversary of the year in which Henri Bourassa was born. Postmaster General Jean-Pierre Côté announced. Bourassa, a politician and journalist, was one of the nation's most colorful public figures during the latter half of the 19th century and the early 1900's.

The new issue, 24mm. x 30mm. and vertical in format, has been produced by a combination of steel engraving and lithography. It provides an engraved portrait of Bourassa, in black, before a background area which is a lithographic

miniature of a page from the French-language newspaper, Le Devoir.

The Montreal publication was founded by Bourassa in 1910. Below the portrait, Henri Bourassa extends the full width of the stamp; the name is surmounted to the left by the denominative "5" and to the right by "1868" and "1962", the dates arranged in two lines.

"Canada" and "Postes Postage", also arranged in two lines, occupy an area at the extreme upper right. Wording in each instance is printed in red by lithography; the background newspaper page has been produced by the same process with red superimposed on a light yellow base. The full issue of 24,000,000 stamps will be printed by the designers, the Canadian Bank Note Company Limited, Ottawa.

Customary First Day Cover Service will be provided by the Postmaster, Ottawa, 2, Ontario.

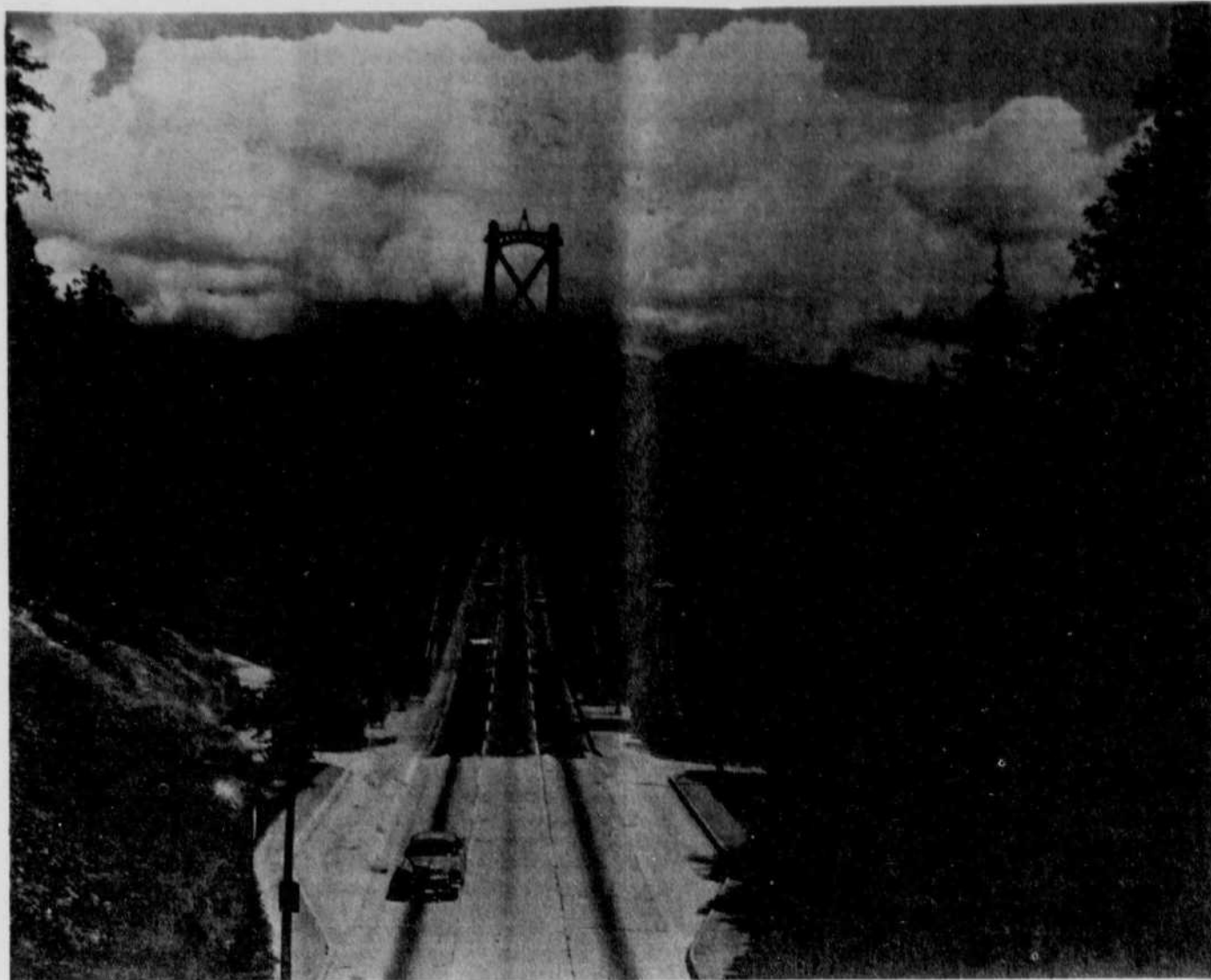

SHAVING STROKES

by Frank Beard



22-Slices, Hooks

Once the ball has left the clubhead, we're concerned with the way it's heading. It can go absolutely straight, a physical improbability; it can slice to the right; it can hook to the left.

The slice results basically from hitting across the ball, the inside-out swing discussed in the lesson on impact and downswing. The route of the swing takes the clubhead from the outside and cuts it across the ball to the inside, imparting a slicing or revolving motion which spins the ball to the right.

It can be caused by improper turn on the backswing, by bad body movement—if you move laterally going back instead of turning, resulting in a sway instead of a turn, with improper weight shift. These things have to be checked individually. Basically, it's from taking the club back improperly. The amateur has an inner fear he won't get the ball airborne, which makes him want to cut

the ball to help it up. When they have a tight lie, even your good players cut at the ball to loft it.

The hook, on the other hand, is both an endorsement and detraction of golf ability. Most of the playing pros fight a hook rather than a slice. Being a hooker denotes some proficiency—generally. For a guy who's reached an advanced stage of golf—and by advanced, I mean breaking 80 consistently—the hook generally traces to improper grip. The left hand gets stronger and moves over to the right side of the club.

I say generally, because my own brand of duck hook comes also from improper body movement. I'll come back through my swing on the right side, which lets the hands fly through the ball too quickly.

Remember when..

Cliff Lumsden of Toronto won the Atlantic City, N.J., 25-mile swim by only half a stroke over Tom Park of California, a former Hamiltonian, 12 years ago today—in 1956—in nine hours 51 minutes. This was 1-5 of a second faster than Park, who had twice beaten Lumsden before. The Torontonian won again in 1959.

Sherbrooke Alouettes are ready for what may be the most important weekend series of the season. The Als travel to Granby tonight to meet the Cards twice over the weekend.

The first game will be played tonight with the second tilt scheduled for tomorrow afternoon. Sherbrooke will be back home tomorrow night to play host to Thetford.

In other Provincial League weekend action, tonight Drummondville Royals play hosts to the Quebec Indians while Lachine travels to Thetford. Tomorrow afternoon the Miners meet the Royals in Drummondville. Tomorrow night Granby will be in the Capital City to meet the Indians and the Royals go against the Braves in Plessisville.

For the locals the two-game series means life or death at the present if they hope to regain top spot in the Provincial League standings. Granby could possibly take a commanding three-game lead over the rest of the circuit if the Cards take the series.

Pounding hard on the door to first place in the standings are the Drummondville Royals. The Royals upset Granby Thursday night 5-1 and have been winning consistently for the past three weeks.

Sherbrooke has a tough weekend in that Thetford, although removed from top spot because of an ineligible player, have kept their spirits high and remain hard to beat even now. Rumors from Thetford (rumors believed true by Miners' fans) is that the Miners are out to try and grab fourth spot and a play-off berth. Seeing they have over 35 games left, there's a good possibility.

The Als started their season like storm-troopers, taking an early season lead in the standings. Thetford then made a move and remained solidly atop the league until the hassle over an ineligible player.

As a result of the hassle Sherbrooke was catapulted into first place, a game and a half ahead of Granby. Then Plessisville was nabbed with an ineligible player also and suddenly the Alouettes were a game and a half behind the Cards.

In previous encounters between the Cards and the Als in Sherbrooke, each team has picked up a victory. On June 15, the Als trounced the Granby crew 18-3 and then one week ago the Cards returned to avenge this loss. The Cards whipped Sherbrooke 6-0 this time.

Slightly back in the standings are Quebec and Drummondville. The way the Royals are playing presently, the race for first place could develop into a very tight struggle. Both Lachine and Plessisville are out of the running right now.

For Sherbrooke the biggest surprise of late is Antonio de Leon who has hit very well in the past few games. In the

twinnbill against Quebec Thursday evening, de Leon picked up three singles and a double. Other sluggers doing well for the Als are Felipe who belted a homer and three singles, the three one-baggers playing a huge role in the 6-2 win for Sherbrooke in the second game.

Over the weekend, Sierra, Williams and Chaviano are scheduled to work on the mound for Sherbrooke. Chaviano continues to lead Sherbrooke hurlers with a 7-2 season mark and a 2.38 earned run average. In his last outing Granby blanked the Als' righthander 6-0 in Sherbrooke this past Sunday. Sierra picked up the victory in the 18-3 win over Granby June 15.

Williams has yet to see action against the Cards. His current record is 1-1. His loss came against the Miners in his first outing three weeks ago.

England's famous Aintree track may survive closure

LONDON (CP) — One of the great cliff-hangers of British sport—whether Aintree racetrack and the Grand National horse race will survive—soon may be resolved.

Race fans have lost count of the number of times during recent years that northern England's most famous course has been threatened with closure.

Owner Mrs. Mirabel Topham, 77, fought a protracted legal battle to get permission to sell the Liverpool track for construction of a housing project.

Now the British government has stepped in with an offer of money to help the city of Liverpool buy the land and preserve it for horse racing and other sports.

First run at the suburban track in 1839, the National has long been the premier event of the jumping season.

In recent years attendances

for Aintree's other meets have dropped and the track has to exist largely on the proceeds from the National.

LEGAL FIGHT DEVELOPS

Mrs. Topham bought the track from Lord Sefton in 1949, although the Topham family had leased it from him since 1929.

Her proposal to cut her financial losses and sell out to a property company led to uproar in racing circles.

The sale was blocked initially but eventually Mrs. Topham in a prolonged court case won permission for the transaction.

Meantime, various schemes to save the track or transfer the National elsewhere were suggested. Most promising was the idea put forward by Liverpool City Corporation to buy the land at market price and set up a huge sports and recreation centre on the 268-acre site.
