LETTS MAKE HEADWAY AGAINST BOLSHEVISTS Refuse Appeals In Mace, Trenholm, Brault And Labrie Cases

WHETHER NEXT DEMAND FOR SURRENDER OF THE EX-EMPEROR WILL BE DIRECTED TO THE HAGUE OR BERLIN IS THE PRINCIPAL SUBJECT NOW

A Meeting of the Premiers of Great Britain, France and Italy Will Be Held Before the Next Move is Made Regarding Former Emperor of Germany — Meeting Will Be Held in London — Refusal of Holland to Surrender William Has Been Given a Mixed Reception by the Newspapers in Paris.

ARIS, Jan. 24.—Conferences between the Premiers of Great Britain, France and Italy will be held before the next move in the proceedings to extradite former Emperor William from Holland is decided upon, according to information given the Associated Press by the French Foreign Office. In the reply to the Allies' demand, Holland declared that she is not bound by the peace treaty, to which she was not a party.

Whether the next demand for the surrender of the erstwhile Kaiser will be directed to The Hague or Berlin will be the main subject to be determined by the three Governments.

The next meeting of the Premiers of the three countries will be held in London, but as no date for this meeting has been fixed and the matter cannot be left pending a long time, the Foreign Offices expressed the opinion that the question will be settled through diplomatic channels between Rome, Paris and London.

FEARED PRESENCE OF EX-EMPEROR IN GERMANY WOULD SOLIDIFY THE MONARCHIST PARTY

It is understood that at least one premier is not averse to asking Berlin to call for the return of the ex-emperor to Germany, and then demanding that Germany deliver him over to the Allies, in accordance with the provisions of article 228 of the Treaty of Versailles.

Sentiment in official circles here is against such procedure, as there is no desire that the former emperor return to Germany. It is doubtful whether Germany would agree, and make representations to Holland, and it is also problematic whether she would deliver up the erstwhile sovereign in the event she should obtain possession of him. It is also feared the presence of Count Hohenzollern in Germany would solidify the monarchist party, which is reported to be gaining strength daily.

Although already discounted, the refusal of Holland to surrender the former German emperor has been given a mixed reception by the newspapers here. Writing in the Echo de Paris, "Perrinax" says he regards the punishment of Count Hohenzollern as a question of sentiment.

"All things considered," he continues, "the only thing remaining for us to do is to come to an understanding with Holland on the conditions surrounding the internment of the former emperor, in which some provision for Allied surveillance might be made. Undoubtedly, if William, to relieve Holland of embarrassment, decided to cross into Germany, the aspect of the question would change, but we are not there yet."

The Journal says the affair has become a purely political one, and it is for the Allied governments to examine the Dutch answer and decide upon the next course to take.

TRANSPORT POWHATTAN IS AGAIN ADRIFT

HALIFAX, Jan. 24.—The United States transport Powhattan is again adrift. At eleven o'clock this morning the hawser by which the C.G.S. Lady Laurier had been slowly but steadily towing the helpless American ship toward this port, parted, Captain Travis, master of the Lady Laurier, reported to the Marine Department.

AN EPIDEMIC OF TYPHUS RAGING NOW IN POLAND

Stated that Outside Assistance Must Be Secured in Order to Combat the Epidemic.

WARSAW, Jan. 24.—Inferior sanitary arrangements on the Russo-Polish frontier are said to be responsible for the alarming epidemic of typhus which is raging in Poland and the Baltic Provinces.

More than a million cases of disease have been reported to Red Cross officials.

Refugees from Russia cross the Polish border without being inspected by health authorities, it is said, and many of them are said to be suffering from typhus, or to be infested with vermin, which carry the disease.

Unless outside assistance is forthcoming, it is said, there is little hope of combating the epidemic.

VISITED QUEBEC IN INTEREST OF INCORPORATION

Bill of Incorporation of Town of Lennoxville Approved by Private Bills Committee, with Amendments.

Mayor Wm. Clarke, Mr. Hugh McFadden, chairman of the Water Committee, W. W. Baker, secretary-treasurer, and Councillor D. G. Harrison, of Lennoxville, with their attorney, Mr. F. S. Rugg, of Sherbrooke, returned last evening from Quebec, where they went to interview the Private Bills Committee relative to the incorporation of the town of Lennoxville.

The bill incorporating the town of Lennoxville was approved by the committee, with some amendments affecting Bishop's University, and the big developments carried out by Commander J. K. L. Ross at the new school.

An effort was made by the town lawyer to make the University pay special taxes for waterworks and other works, but this was opposed by the University on the grounds that the Federal law exempted educational institutions.

If this tax was imposed, the churches and other institutions would also have to be taxed.

The clause was defeated, while an amendment to the bill was adopted, which provides that the Ross property shall be valued for taxation purposes at \$55,000, and shall be subject to the payment of all ordinary municipal taxes but not to any special taxes.

The effort of the town to get permission to borrow \$75,000 for the extension of the waterworks system without submitting the bylaw for approval to the electors failed and the town must obtain sanction in the usual way from the ratepayers.

DEATH SENTENCE FOR RY. STRIKERS IN BULGARIA

Court Martial is Established to Try Men for Blowing Up Bridges.

SALONIKI, Jan. 24.—Several railroad strikers have been sentenced to death by Court Martial established for blowing up railway bridges in that country.

Bolshevik disorders are reported in advances from Sofia which say that at Boudnitza one communist and one soldier were killed. Several arrests have been made at that place.

QUEBEC, Jan. 24.—Pointing out that the expense of maintenance of "Spencerwood," the official residence of the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Quebec, had amounted to \$45,000 last year, Mr. Sauve, leader of the opposition in the Quebec Legislative assembly, criticised the expenditure in detail at yesterday's sitting and protested that it was made against the wishes of the Lieutenant Governor. Going into details, Mr. Sauve said that \$150 had been paid for a flower vase and that the maintenance of the edifice alone had cost \$11,000 in the year. He called the attention of the House to an expenditure of \$700 for carpet.

EX-EMPEROR NOT SURPRISED BY FORMAL REFUSAL OF THE DUTCH GOVERNMENT

AMERONGEN, Jan. 24.—Former Emperor William of Germany was not surprised by the formal refusal of the Dutch Government to comply with the Allied demand for his surrender, it was declared today at Bentinck Castle, where the ex-ruler makes his home. News of the decision was first communicated to the Castle by the Associated Press correspondent here.

A refusal of extradition had been expected from the first, the correspondent was told, but the Castle's residents had never been officially informed that such a decision had been or would be reached.

APPLICATIONS FOR APPEAL IN FIVE LOCAL CRIMINAL CASES ARE REFUSED BY MR. JUSTICE DESY

Messrs. C. C. Cabana and Jacob Nicol Make Application to Appeal Cases of Joseph and Emile Labrie, Francis Mace, Dr. Gilbert Trenholm and Sylva Brault, but None of Requests are Granted — Sunday Moving Picture Case This Afternoon.

SITTING today in the Court of King's Bench, Mr. Justice Alfred Desy refused the applications made by Messrs. C. C. Cabana and Jacob Nicol, for an appeal in the cases of Joseph and Emile Labrie, Francis Mace, Dr. Gilbert A. Trenholm, and Sylva Brault.

In the first two cases it will be remembered that the two Labrie brothers were sentenced respectively, to life and twenty-five years' imprisonment, in connection with the killing of Charles E. Chase, in Stoke township, last February. Both were convicted of manslaughter by the jury. The younger, Emile, was recommended to the clemency of the Court.

Mr. Cabana, on behalf of the brothers, appealed the case, the severity of the sentences having aroused considerable public feeling. His application was refused, the Court stating that the sentences were left to the discretion of the presiding judge. Mr. Cabana states that he will take the case to the Attorney-General.

In the case of Francis Mace, the application for appeal was based on the claim that two separate charges were stated in the indictment, which was not allowable in a murder case. Mr. Cabana alleged that the indictment had accused Francis Mace of "unlawfully killing Emile Morin, thereby committing murder." The "unlawful killing," he said, was equivalent to manslaughter, while a charge of murder was also contained.

The Court reminded Mr. Cabana that the jury had been told, before bringing in a verdict, that the charge, according to the indictment, was manslaughter and could be nothing else. The application was accordingly dismissed.

In the Sylva Brault case, Mr. Jacob Nicol, K.C., claimed that the case had been drawn from the jury. The Court denied this, and the record was read, showing that the jury had given a verdict, and that all Judge Desy had done was to tell the jury that, in his

opinion, as presiding judge, and, therefore, in charge of all legal points in the case, the evidence was insufficient.

The case of Dr. Gilbert Trenholm was then brought up by Mr. Nicol, who claimed the same ground as in the Brault case, but here also the application was refused, the Court holding that the lack of evidence permitted him withdrawing the case from the jury. In none of the cases, however, are the attorneys prevented from appealing to the Attorney-General.

This afternoon, the appeal in the case of the Lord's Day Alliance against Rodolphe Vallee, which is the test case to determine whether the motion picture houses in Sherbrooke be allowed to stay open on Sunday, will come up. Mr. N. K. Lafamme, K.C., having arrived in town to represent the defence.

The case is being watched with more than social interest as the decision will probably affect the picture house in cities all over the Province.

THE POLISH AND LETTISH TROOPS ARE STILL PURSUING ENEMY— BOLSHEVIK LOSSES ARE HEAVY

In an Effort to Save the Situation North of Dvina, the Bolsheviks Delivered a General Attack, but Notwithstanding the Enemy's Superior Numbers the Attack was Repulsed with Heavy Losses, According to Statement Issued Today.

(Associated Press Despatch)
WARSAW, Jan. 24.—A communication issued by the headquarters staff today says: On the Lithuanian-Ruthenian front Polish and Lettish troops continue to pursue the enemy eastward. The enemy also is in retreat on the rest of the front. Wishing to save the situation north of Dvina, the Bolsheviks delivered a general attack in the sector next to General Lasockis' along the Dvina and south of Polok. Notwithstanding the enemy's superior numbers, the attack was repulsed with heavy losses.

A local success of the Bolsheviks in the region of Lake Voron was annulled by a courageous counter attack by Polish reserves. The enemy retreated eastward along the whole section. In the Polesie section the Bolsheviks attacked anew. In the Strygowlow region they also attacked, taking prisoners, machine guns and other booty.

On the Volhynian front the Polish troops raided Roman and destroyed a camp, taking prisoners and machine guns.

In the west, Polish troops have occupied several towns and have been given hospitality by the population. The German inhabitants of these places remain calm.

ASSUMES CONTROL OF CHINESE EASTERN RAILWAY.

HARBIN, Jan. 24.—Following the assumption by General Semenov of authority over the territory under his control, Lieutenant General Horvath, Vice President and General Manager of the Chinese Eastern Railway, issued the following proclamation to the Russian population along the railway: "On account of the interruption of communication between the Supreme ruler and the Central Government, I consider myself forced, pending a renewal of contact, to assume full power over the railway zone. At the same time, I would call the attention of the population to the fact that according to the treaty with China, the Sovereign rights of this territory belong to China and that the satisfactory working of the railway as a Russian enterprise on foreign territory can be attained only by the maintenance of friendly relations between the Russians and Chinese people."

SUGGESTS GENERAL CURRIE AS UNIONIST PARTY LEADER.

OTTAWA, ONT., Jan. 24.—In an interview with the Journal, the selection of General Sir Arthur Currie as the leader of the unionist party was advocated by General Hector Odlum, C.B., D.S.O., C.M.G., of Vancouver, who was in Ottawa yesterday to see members of the Government in regard to improved plans for the settlement of the British Columbia soldiers.

START REORGANIZATION OF MILITIA.

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 24.—The initial phase of the reorganization of the Canadian Militia has been entered upon, in an order proposing to organize and train in the coming year, fifty field batteries and fifteen heavy or light batteries.

AN EARTHQUAKE SHOCK IS FELT AT VANCOUVER

Was Most Severe Shock that Vancouver Has Ever Experienced—No Damage is Reported.

(Canadian Associated Press.)

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 24.—One of the most severe earthquake shocks that ever visited this vicinity shook the city shortly after eleven o'clock last night. Excited people rushed out of the buildings, but up to present no damage has been reported beyond telephones being put out of commission.

Victoria reported the same shock almost at the moment it occurred here, and a little later reports came from Nanaimo, that the shock has been felt there. Some Vancouver people thought there had been an explosion in the Nanaimo Coal Mines.

The quake commenced approximately at eleven fifteen o'clock and lasted about five seconds. The motion was lateral, several distant side-to-side vibrations occurring, apparently in an east and west direction. The shock was felt most severely in high buildings, a few bricks falling from the top of small chimneys.

SEVERAL WINDOWS WERE BROKEN.

SEATTLE, Jan. 24.—Three distinct earthquake shocks were felt here at eleven o'clock last night. The tremors extended through Washington and British Columbia.

At Bellingham, Washington, windows were broken and brick walls cracked. No damage was reported in Seattle.

Miss Mary Boy, from Lovell, Mass., was here this week, called home by the death of her father, Mr. John Boy.

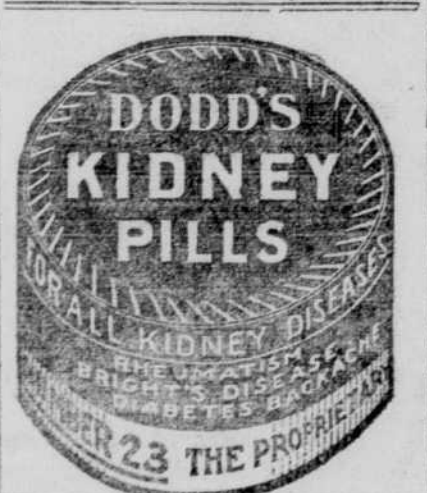

BUTTER DAIRY AT KINGSCROFT HOLDS MEETING

Annual Report of Amount Manufactured and Average Cost was Given by Secretary.

(Special to The Record.) KINGSCROFT, Jan. 24.—At a meeting held by the patrons of this dairy, on the 21st of January, the secretary gave the annual report of operation for the closing year. The report reads as follows:

From April 8 to December 31, 1919, 55,924 lbs. of cream were conveyed to this dairy. The total amount contained 26,737.52 lbs. of butter fat, producing 31,143 1-2 lbs. of butter, of which 29,480 lbs. were sent to Montreal and 1,663 1-2 lbs. were sold to patrons.

The 31,143 1-2 lbs. of butter yielded the sum of \$17,386.74, of which \$1,245.74 were expended for fabrication, \$183.35 for shipping butter, and the remainder \$15,937.79, was respectively divided between the patrons.

The average price of butter was \$5.827 per lb. The average price of butter fat to the dairy, \$5.027 per lb. The average price of butter fat to patrons was \$5.631 cents per lb. The average test of cream was 31.1 p.c.

Making and shipping butter cost to patrons, \$4.58 per lb. Price of butter fat charged to patrons was \$5.33 per lb. The average price of cream per lb. was \$2.14.

Out of 100 lbs. of butter fat, 116.47 lbs. of butter have been made. 2.75 lbs. of cream have been required to make 1 lb. of butter. The making of butter cost to the dairy \$667.85. The expense for carrying cream was \$381.75. The price charged to patrons for carrying cream gave \$80.88.

REMAINS OF LATE MR. DAUPHINAIS LAID TO REST.

The funeral took place yesterday at St. Michael's Cathedral, from the home of his brother, Mr. Edmond Dauphinais, Aberdeen Avenue, of Mr. Emile Dauphinais, who passed away at the Military Hospital in Boston, Mass., in his thirty-third year. A large number of old friends, and class mates of deceased were in the long cortege to the sacred edifice, where the solemn service was sung by Rev. H. A. Simard, Rector, assisted by Rev. Abbe Bellemare and Rev. Nils St. Laurent, as deacon and sub-deacon. The musical portion of the service was rendered by the choir, Mr. L. E. Codere, being at the organ.

The principal mourners were the three brothers of deceased, Messrs. Edmond Dauphinais, Hubert Dauphinais, Sherbrooke, and Cyrille Dauphinais, Gosham, N. E.; Mr. Alfred Biron and Mr. A. Biron, cousins. The bearers were Messrs. Biron, Desjarlais, Raoul Codere and George Masse, and Mr. P. Beaudry, acted as director. Interment was made in the family lot in the Roman Catholic cemetery.

The late Mr. Dauphinais was the youngest son of the late Edward Dauphinais, and was educated at the St. Charles Seminary. For a number of years he was on the large staff of Codere and Sons & Co. A few years ago he went to Springfield, Mass., where he had relatives, and when the United States entered the war was drafted in a Massachusetts Regiment. From his good knowledge of French and English, he was made interpreter, and rendered valuable service. He returned to America in January last, suffering from illness, though at times he seemed to rally. He was under treatment at the hospital, but his strength gradually declined till the end.

He is survived by his mother, the three brothers mentioned, and three others who are all in the United States, and three sisters, Mrs. Deming, who was with him at the time of his death; Mrs. J. Martineau and Mrs. R. David, of Montreal. Many tokens of sympathy in the shape of floral offerings, masses and spiritual bouquets were received by the family.

NEW U.S. CONSUL HERE TELLS OF HIS EXPERIENCES

Started in Sweden, and of Late Years Has Been in Dublin, Ireland.

Mr. Edward L. Adams, United States Consul, who has recently been appointed to Sherbrooke, was born at Clarence, near Buffalo, New York, and was educated at the Brockport High School, and the University of Rochester. After engaging in journalistic work for a number of years, Mr. Adams was appointed Consul-General, and Secretary of the Legation at Stockholm, Sweden, and spent seven years in that beautiful city, with its picturesque surroundings, splendid buildings, and well kept streets.

In fact, so much attention is paid to cleanliness, that the entire city, when Mr. Adams first went there, was swept by hand twice every twenty-four hours.

The Swedes are in many respects, a remarkable people, the upper classes being highly educated, and possessing wonderful linguistic ability. They speak nearly every language of Europe, including their own, and that of the other Northern races, Finnish, Russian, and so forth, with French, German and English as well. In Stockholm, there was a large English Society, of which Mr. Adams was President, an English Church, and the long winters, where snow falls to the depth of five or six feet, are greatly enjoyed, skating and ski-jumping being carried on unceasingly. Naturally his position gave Mr. Adams and his family great opportunities of meeting distinguished and representative people of various countries, and their stay in Stockholm is one of their pleasantest recollections.

Was Appointed at Dublin.

In 1909, Mr. Adams was appointed Consul at Dublin, Ireland, and held that responsible post for some years. Of his experiences in the famous Irish Capital, Mr. Adams will say nothing, but that they were of the most vivid nature, especially the Rebellion, and the events which followed, are readily imagined. During the war, until the United States joined the Allies, the U. S. Consul distributed relief to the families of the Germans, Austrians and Hungarians, whose heads had been interned, and who had to be supported by their own don. This work was done once a week, and weekly reports made, entailing considerable work. Many pitiful and distressing cases were met with, the aged and the young suffering alike. Later these people were sent to their own countries. When the Leinster was sunk by a submarine, after sailing for England, Mr. and Mrs. Adams were living at a hotel in Kingston, the port of Dublin, close to the sea, and with a strong glass could have witnessed the disaster. As it was, hundreds of the rescued passengers, who had been floating about in life boats, or struggling in the water, were brought to shore, and were cared for by the residents at the hotels, and private houses, the scenes being heart-rending beyond description. It will be remembered that in this trouble German outrage, Lieut. Donald Gwyn, M.C., a young Canadian of the finest type, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cyril Gwyn, of Sherbrooke, lost his life.

Mr. Adams, who is a member of the American Red Cross Society, and Mr. Adams, who was chairman of the Women's Care Committee of the Red Cross in Dublin, did much relief work. Mrs. Adams receiving a testimonial letter of thanks, signed by Queen Alexandra.

Mr. and Mrs. Adams sailed by the S.S. Cedric, for New York, and spent a few weeks with friends at Elmira, N. Y., and other plans, before coming to Sherbrooke, where they expect to find much needed rest and peace, after ten years in one of the storm-centres of Europe.

Mr. and Mrs. Adams have two daughters in Brooklyn, N. Y., and their son, Edward L. Adams, Jr., is attached to the Consulate in Dublin.

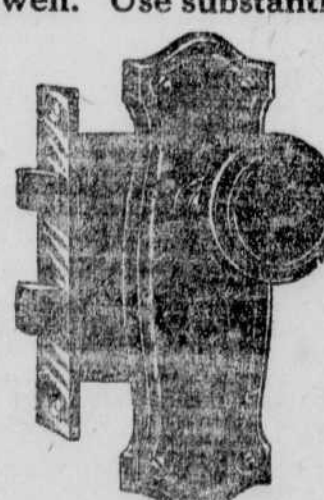

SUPPLEMENTAL SCHOOL WORK.

The very substantial increase in
 local interest in gymnasium work, par-
 ticularly in the schools, encourages
 one to look forward to the gradual
 absorption into routine school work of
 several important branches of educa-
 tion commonly regarded as outside
 actual school study. Cooking, sewing,
 manual work, folk dancing and gymnas-
 tics work, are finding their places in
 the school activities of many of the
 larger centres. To this list, in time,
 will be added music, which should be
 included in its primary grades of in-
 struction, in the child's curriculum.

Knowledge of all these subjects is
 of great usefulness to any child. One
 might almost place them before sev-
 eral subjects now included in a child's
 plan of study. The use made by the
 child of a knowledge of cooking, sew-
 ing, and manual work, would be very
 considerable, and probably in impor-
 tant in mature life might supersede
 nearly all other study.

All of these changes and additions
 must take time. Earlier generations
 have worshipped "book learning." Practical instruction in the perform-
 ance of common duties was regarded
 as outside the province of the school
 teacher. But present generations are
 progressing toward an appreciation of
 real education. It is not enough to
 have a smattering of knowledge.
 Knowledge must be of a useful, prac-
 ticable kind, applicable to daily life,
 increasing its comfort and therefore
 its beauty.

Slowly this commendable change in
 educational ideals is extending to the
 schools. Often one teacher is respon-
 sible for a new ideal in a school's
 work. But however slowly the forward
 move, in our city or section, the trend
 is in the right direction. Educational
 methods are the result of years of ac-
 cepted customs and cannot easily be
 broken down.

THE FORT ST. FRANCIS CONTRO- VERSY.

The suggestion has been made in the
 United States that an embargo be
 placed on coal shipped from the United
 States into Canada in retaliation for
 the embargo placed on newsprint from
 Fort St. Francis mills to the former
 country.

For a considerable period the people
 of Winnipeg have been deprived of
 newspapers, to their inconvenience and
 business loss, because the mills at Fort
 St. Francis refused to send shipments
 to the Winnipeg newspaper publishing
 companies. The paper controller, Mr.
 Pringle, finally interfered, asked the
 assistance of the N.W.T. police, and
 ordered the Fort St. Francis Mills to
 make a shipment to Winnipeg. Then
 Mr. Pringle, the controller, resigned.

Still the Fort St. Francis Mills held
 out in their refusal, and the Govern-
 ment, further to force their shipment
 to the Canadian purchasers of paper
 in Winnipeg, placed an embargo on all
 their newsprint to be shipped to the
 United States. At this the Fort St.
 Francis complied with the order and
 the delayed shipments were forthwith
 despatched.

The difficulty arises from the fact
 that famine prices prevail for paper
 and American papers which are with-
 out supply, in some cases, are offering
 prices double the general market price.
 In the case of the Fort St. Francis
 Mill, the manufacturers refused to
 recognize the Government order that
 Canadian papers must be supplied.

The newsprint situation has never
 been so serious before. The demand
 exceeds the supply. A big jump was
 made in the Canadian price the first
 of the year and others are in prospect.
 Many predict that the days of low-
 priced newspapers are numbered for
 papers will eventually be obliged to
 pass these costs on or close down.

FRILIC ARCHITECTURE.

FOOD PROBLEM AND CHILD WELFARE.

Editor Daily Record:
 Dear Sir—Will you allow me,
 through the columns of your paper,
 to express my opinion, which I feel
 sure, is the opinion of many others
 regarding the condition of food prices
 relative to child welfare. A modern
 writer calls the present period "this
 startling epoch," and in reference to
 the price of food, no expression could
 be more appropriate in describing the
 present situation. We hear on all
 sides, "child welfare," "better health
 principles," "improvements in this and
 that," any yet we sit back twiddling
 our thumbs and chanting, "Isn't it
 tur-re-bul!" while the children "on
 whom rests the future of our Domini-
 on" are being denied the life and
 health-giving food with which nature
 has so lavishly endowed this fair
 count.

I refer especially to the lack of
 milk, butter, eggs, all of which are
 necessary in providing nutritious food
 for children. We know that there are
 hundreds of children who seldom
 have butter, never have an egg for
 breakfast, hardly ever a cup of milk,
 and apples, a rare luxury, while sugar
 and cocoa are also joining the ranks
 of the unobtainable. Shame on all
 of us who are letting this go on! We
 know that the health standard of
 our youth must be raised if we
 are to have a healthy race, but how
 can it be done with the present cost
 of ordinary foods? "More produc-
 tion" is shouted from the house-
 tops (the professors' houses.) Sup-
 pose we answer back, "Less con-
 sumption." They tell us milk and
 eggs are scarce; well, it doesn't
 look like it when we go into an
 ice cream parlor, "egg phos-
 phate" is always forthcoming;
 and there is no noticeable shortage
 of sugar or cocoa in a confectionery
 store, and the game goes merrily
 on. All these articles, with the ad-
 dition of fruit, all so dear to the
 hearts of children, are attractively
 displayed in our shop windows, but
 are beyond their reach, yet they
 are wise enough to know that food
 is being hoarded and kept from
 them by high prices.

Wonder if profiteers have chil-
 dren? If they do, they would
 probably be like the little girl who
 exclaimed, as she came tripping out:
 "Mama says I may have all the candy
 I want, if it does cost more." We
 know that this feeling of security is
 not in the minds of children alone,
 yet there are more that do not feel
 secure, and they are the ones that
 are going to make or mar this coun-
 try.

They say hunger breeds Bolshev-
 ism. We can easily believe that
 Bolshevism is being bred in many
 a home, and many a child's heart
 because parents know that the
 food needed to make the little
 bodies grow, and the minds develop,
 is being denied them; and the chil-
 dren know that there are lots of
 good things to eat, but that they
 can't have them.

Substitutes are forced upon many
 because they seem to fill the vac-
 uancies—egg powders, margarine,
 kielbas—all are very well as substi-
 tutes, but they cannot take the
 place in true food value of the ar-
 ticles they substitute. Nutritious
 food is absolutely necessary
 in this climate, perhaps even
 more than in some other, and
 if the children of today do not have
 it, then the next generation pays
 the debt. Our next generation will
 be a fine one, won't it; brought up
 on substitutes and cheap foods?

It has been said that women have
 as great, if not a greater share in
 the reconstruction of our country
 than in the late war. If so, then
 it is not woman's part to make a
 great effort to adjust matters in a
 way that will mean victory for the
 Canadian child.

Pleading or complaining has
 not, nor will not, do any good.
 There seems to be only one way,
 and that is to boycott. This is a
 measure not popular to house-
 wives, nor to the ones who look to
 them for a well-appointed table,
 but a "happy medium" could be
 found if women would join hands
 and say, "We will pledge ourselves
 to get along with less of these
 foods until there is enough to bring
 the price down to within the reach
 of the majority of children as our
 bit towards giving the children of
 today a chance to be healthy and
 fair-minded men and women of to-
 morrow, and our share in the slay-
 ing of Bolshevism."

ANNUAL MEETING OF NORTH HATLEY FARMERS' CLUB

Interesting Report by President
 Reviews Work of Association in
 the Past—Other News.

NORTH HATLEY, Jan. 24.—(Spec-
 ial)—The annual meeting of the
 Farmers' Club was held on Wednes-
 day evening and good attendance.
 The financial report showed over
 \$200 paid by the Club for improve-
 ment in live stock, crop competition,
 cattle judging contest, etc. The re-
 ports showed the society to be in a
 good, healthy condition.

The election of officers resulted as
 follows: Mr. J. B. Reed, President;
 Robert Smith, Vice-President; W. Ty-
 ler, Sect. Treas.; the remaining names
 on the Board of Directors are as fol-
 lows: Mr. Fred Connor, Mr. Eugene
 Coates, Mr. A. S. Auger and Mr. J.
 L. Dean.

The President gave a report, of
 which is here given:
 "In February last year, Mr. Robert
 Smith and a few other farmers in this
 locality decided that North Hatley
 would be a good center to start a
 Farmers' Club, that we might take
 advantage of the generous offers made
 by the Department at Quebec to as-
 sist and encourage farmers through
 Clubs of this nature in an educative
 way as well as financially.

"After securing a sufficient num-
 ber of names and a permit to form a
 Club, a meeting was called on April
 19th, and Mr. W. G. MacDougall,
 Demonstrator from Lennoxville, who
 had the authority to form such an or-
 ganization was invited and started us
 off on the right road, giving some in-
 formation and good advice. On April
 26th, a second meeting was called to
 elect seven directors which were as
 follows: Robert Smith, Simon Mc-
 Ginn, Fred Connor, Eugene Coates,
 Leroy Bean, A. S. Auger and J. B.
 Reed.

J. B. Reed, President; Robert Smith,
 Vice Pres.; Wm. F. Tyler, Sect. and
 Treas.; W. E. LeBaron, Auditor.
 "The first papers were sent to
 Quebec with 50 names on the list but
 this number has gradually increased
 until now we have a membership of
 87 of the best farmers in the district
 banded together for the purpose of
 furthering their own interests.

"The first work taken up was with
 regard to improving our live stock
 and Mr. Simon McGinn, Manager of
 St. Charles Jersey Farm, offered the
 Club the use of their valuable Jer-
 sey bull free of charge which was
 much appreciated by those who wish-
 ed to improve their Jersey cattle.

Soon G. M. Reed had purchased a well
 bred Durham Bull and N. E. Dean al-
 so purchased a registered Holstein
 bull, both of these were from good
 milking strains and should be a great
 help to the dairy industry in a few
 years when their calves mature to
 milking cows. It is to be hoped the
 members will take full advantage of
 using these bulls where ever it is
 possible.

"T. V. Reed bought a first prize
 Chester Boar which had won highest
 honors in his class at Canada's Great
 Eastern Exhibition last Fall. Your
 President has a first prize Oxford
 Ram. All of the above stock are for
 the use of the farmers belonging to
 the North Hatley Farmers' Club. So
 much for a beginning to improve our
 herds and flocks.

The chair produced a copy of a
 farm account book edited by the Con-
 servation Commission, Ottawa, which
 was very nicely and conveniently
 compiled to make it a simple and
 easy matter to keep records of farm
 stock and yearly statements of re-
 sults obtained and financial standing.
 These books were free. The secretary
 was asked to get a copy for each of
 the members which it is hoped are
 being filled out that you may know
 your business better and in this way
 become more interested in your work.
 It will put you in a position to actual-
 ly know exactly how much profit
 there is in each line of business and
 what your farm expenses are, and
 what your net gain is each year. Some
 may say I have not the time to do this
 book work, but it will surely pay you

GAMES VS. TEXT-BOOKS.

(Peterborough Examiner.)
 The statement of Dr. Noble, Chair-

 day and all other Clubs around us

"Dr. J. H. Grisdale, Federal Deputy
 Minister of Agriculture, Professor E.
 S. Archibald, Director of the Domini-
 on Experimental Farms, Mr. Eugene
 Baldwin, from Coaticook, one of the
 largest and most wealthy farmers in
 the County, Mr. C. E. Wilson, from

 able speakers addressed the gather-

 Some 15 young men entered and judg-
 ed by score card the beautiful pure
 bred Jersey cattle from off this
 farm. The Jersey Association offered
 \$25.00 in prizes and the boys worked
 with a will to win. Much interest was
 taken by even the senior farmers as
 it was an educator of the highest or-
 der to learn to know a good cow when
 you see one by being able to judge in-
 telligently by her physical make-up.
 Professor Archibald gave a good
 lecture on the judging of cattle which
 will be remembered by the boys as
 long as they live. Your Secretary has
 given you the cash and prize given in
 the races, etc. The picnic as a whole
 was far beyond anything anyone had
 expected when we talked of getting it
 up, as it was a great success.

"On October 7th, the Club held a
 Box Social and dance in the Town
 Hall. A fine supper, good music and
 dancing, with a short speech from Mr.
 Samuel Jardine made up the pro-
 gramme for the evening, which was
 much enjoyed by all, especially the
 young people.

"At one of our regular meetings
 the question of holding a crop com-
 petition was discussed. It was thought
 this would encourage our members to
 take better care of their crops and
 three prizes were offered on each of
 the following crops: Wheat, oats,
 corn or fodder, turnips, mangels and
 also on vegetable gardens. The club
 made a good choice when they select-
 ed Mr. Samuel Jardine as judge, one
 of our ablest and best farmers es-
 pecially along the line of hoe crops,
 he having a wide experience at this
 work. 14 members entered their crops.
 Mr. Jardine looked them all over care-
 fully and placed the awards as near
 right as it was possible to have been
 done and to the satisfaction of all
 for which he was made honorary mem-
 ber in appreciation of his services in
 this connection. He gave several of
 the farmers good sound advice with
 regard to more careful cultivation, etc.

"It is hoped if another competition
 is held more will join in and enter
 their crops, and in this way get in
 touch with their neighbor and learn
 to raise better crops or be able to
 show him how to improve on his pre-
 sent methods as the case may be, and
 in this way help each to get larger
 and better yields from our acres.

"A subject which bids fair to be of
 even greater importance than any
 thing the Club has taken up yet is
 Cow Testing.

"Mr. Joseph Pelland, from Coati-
 cook, butter and cheese inspector for
 this part of the Townships was in-
 vited over to one of our meetings
 recently and gave a free and full dis-
 cussion on the subject of cow testing.
 The farmer gets blank form milk
 sheets, buys a small spring scale, a
 bottle for each cow and takes a sam-
 ple of each cow's milk and butter pro-
 duced by each cow is sent to the
 farmer at the end of the year. In this
 way you know what each individual
 cow is doing for you and gives you a
 chance to weed out the low producers
 and replace them with better stock.
 Following this course not one but
 hundreds of farmers have been able
 to double their profits and yield from
 the same number of cows in less than
 5 years.

"Would it not pay us all to weed
 out the boarders from our herd and
 feed the good cows better, keep only
 as many cows as we can carry com-
 fortably with plenty of feed to make
 them produce to the limit so that we
 would be pleased to show our neigh-
 bor our pay cheque or have him come
 in to see our stock.

"Not care to tell what a lot of stock
 our farm will carry but how well we
 have kept them and what results we
 have obtained. A few of our members
 deserve credit for having started this
 work of cow testing sometime ago, but
 now let the balance of us line up and
 try it out. You can see by figures given
 by your Secretary and in the free
 work of testing, etc., that our Govern-
 ment are willing to help those who
 help themselves. Why should not every
 member of this Club come out to every
 meeting and help to make this Club
 the banner club in the province and at
 the same time take advantage of
 these generous offers as well as pro-
 moting the interest of such a worthy
 organization and not leave it all to a
 few to carry out for them.

"I feel sure if we move cautiously,
 and not spread out too far, but make
 this club a source of education and all
 join heartily in the work, much good
 can be accomplished, and I am sure
 you will agree with me in saying we
 have made a good beginning. We have
 tried at every meeting to have some-
 thing going on that would be of in-
 terest to you in the way of outside
 speakers or matters of business of
 some importance to discuss which
 would take up all our time. Our Club
 deserves to thank Mr. Edwin Ducker
 for his coming up from Sherbrooke to
 one of our meetings and making an
 interesting address in regard to the
 farmers getting together for their
 own good and discussing such sub-
 jects as are of vital interest to them-
 selves. Mr. Samuel Jardine has also
 put himself out to come over to sev-
 eral of our meetings and always has
 something good and helpful to tell
 us.

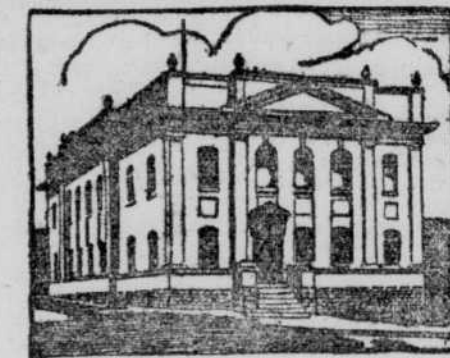

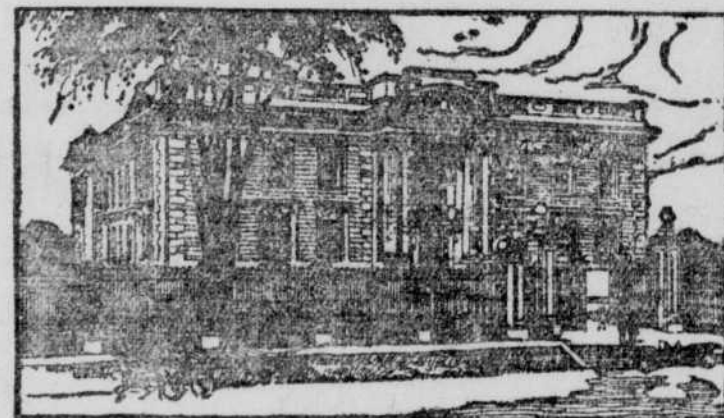


Third Home of the Mutual of Canada

No. 1 Ward, 2 candidates—1, Arthur Beliveau, 2 Victor Morriset.

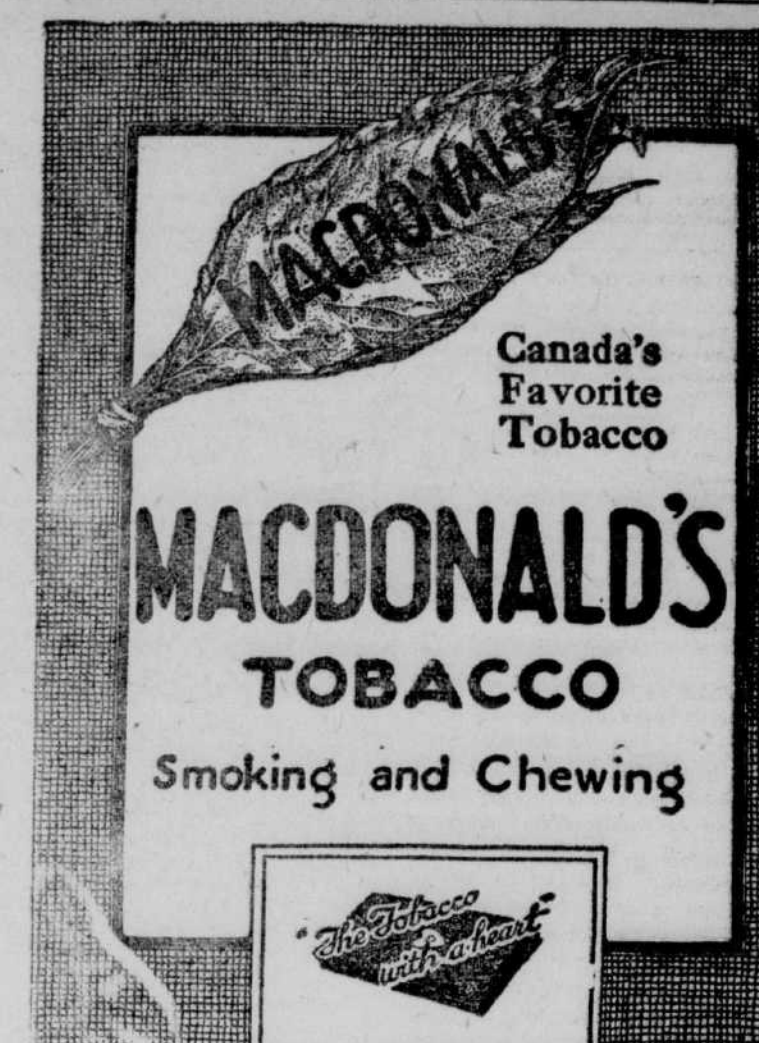

"You're very rude," remarked Fanny, turning away.

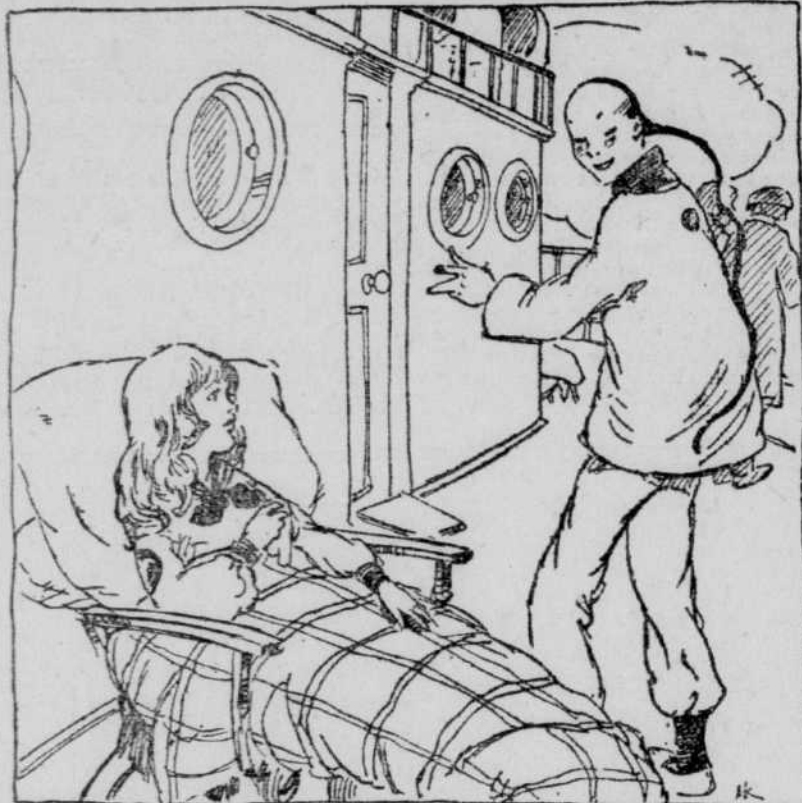
"Take 'em. Chew 'em," Jimmy urged pattering after her and holding out his hand, but Fanny never turned her head.

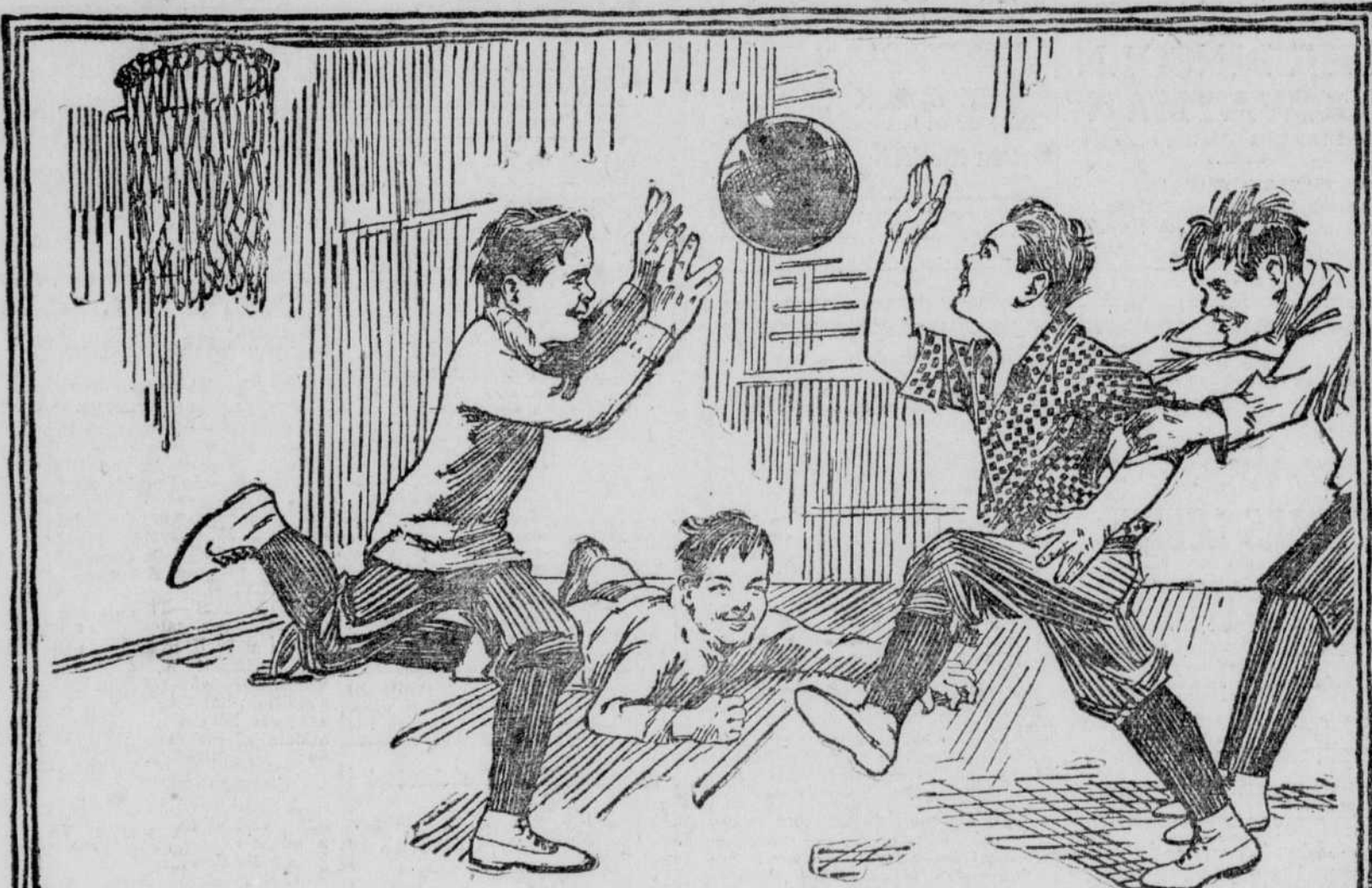

Into a measuring cup pour Three tablespoonful vegetable oil, One and one-half tablespoonful of either white vinegar or lemon juice as preferred.

One-half teaspoonful salt. One-half teaspoonful paprika. Mix together well with a spoon and then dip over the dishes of salad.

FINANCIAL and MARKET NEWS**DROP IN EGGS CONTINUES ON UNEVENTFUL MARKET.**

A continued drop in the price of eggs, which after rising to the unprecedented rate of one dollar per dozen some four weeks ago, have steadily decreased ever since, was the feature of an otherwise uneventful market yesterday. Eggs sold for 80 cents per dozen for the very best new-laid qualities, while other varieties ranged down to 65 cents, a drop of five cents a dozen over last week.

In the meat market, there was almost no change, beef roast remaining low, at 21 or 22 cents per pound, while pork showed a slight downward tendency. Butter and cheese showed no change, while a few vegetables on the market were selling practically without change, at the prices of last week, potatoes remaining at \$2.00 a bushel.

EGGS.—The market during the past week has been somewhat irregular, new-laid having ranged between 85c. and 90c., but today some dealers are offering freely at 85c. The severely cold weather had a stiffening effect on prices at the beginning of the week, but sufficient fresh stock arrived from nearby points the last day or two to satisfy the demand. We are turning into the season when production increase independent of weather conditions and lower prices may shortly be expected for fresh new-laid. There is said to be ample storage stock to meet all demands, prices of which are easier, owing to offerings of American stock. A lot of fresh gathered eggs from the Huntington district was offered at 72c. f.o.b. We quote new-laid 85c., select 62c. to 68c., and No. 1 storage 53c. to 54c.

POULTRY.—Now that most of the old stock left over from the holidays have been worked off at the lower prices recently quoted, stocks of fresh killed poultry are now offered on the market at former high prices, good to choice turkeys being quoted at 53c. to 55c., geese at 32c., and ducks 42c. Small fowl 28c. to 30c., heavy 32c. to 34c., milk fed chickens 43c. to 44c., and ordinary fed chickens, 39c. to 40c.

BEANS.—A fairly good movement is reported in beans, the chief demand being for handpicked, which are not as plentiful as they were a short time since. The sale of a car of Ontario handpicked was reported at the beginning of the week at \$5.00 per bushel delivered here, and we quote jobbing lots at \$5.25. Five pound pickers are quoted at \$3.75 to \$4.00 per bushel. One lot of poor grade was reported sold at \$2.50.

POTATOES.—The market is firmer and higher, sales of car lots being quoted at \$3.75 to \$3.90 as to quality, and condition. A car of choice Quebec whites was received in splendid condition; but they were in a refrigerator car heated with a stove in the middle of the car, and one at each end. Of course, there was no trouble in selling this car. In this severe weather care must be taken or the potatoes will freeze. Car lots of Quebec whites have sold at \$3.75 and \$3.80, and we quote \$3.75 to \$3.90 in car lots, and at 31c. to 33c. for smaller lots.

MAPLE PRODUCTS.—There is a good demand for syrup, which sells at \$1.90 to \$2.00 per 8½ lb. tins, and \$2.25 to \$2.50 in 13 lb. tins. In bulk syrup is quoted at \$1.85 to \$1.90 per gallon as to quality. Maple sugar is quiet and steady at 25c. to 26c. in car lots, and at 31c. to 33c. for smaller lots.

ONEY.—The market is quiet. White clover strained in 30 to 60 lb. tins is quoted at 21c. to 22c., and white clover in comb at 25c. to 27c. Buckwheat honey is quoted at 18c. to 20c.

MANY SPEAKERS HEARD THIS WEEK AT RICHMOND

"Forward Movement" Campaign

On Wednesday evening St. Anne's Episcopal Church was well filled to hear Canon Scott, of Quebec. The speaker took his text from the miracle of Jesus, when he turned the water into wine at the wedding feast at Cana of Galilee, showing that God always follows the efforts of men with his miraculous power. Speaking of the "Forward Movement" in general, the speaker passed to the programme of the Church of England in the movement. The speaker said he was proud to belong to the church that had done so well in the war and had enlisted a larger proportion than any other church. Now that they had done their part in war, it remained for the church to do her part equally as well in the great peace propaganda that is before the Christian people. The financial objective of the Church of England is \$2,500,000, and this sum can be easily raised, provided the churchmen enter into the spirit of the movement. The great call at present for the church to keep up her mission work at home among the unchurched people of the Canadian West should be an incentive that would appeal to every local member of the Church of England.

On Thursday afternoon conferences were held in the different churches. A goodly number assembled in the Methodist Church at 3 o'clock. Addresses were given by the visiting ministers, including Revs. J. Pinel, of Danville; Thos. Knowles, of Ulverton, and T. P. Perry, of Sherbrooke. Supper was served to the delegates at the Ladies Aid, at 6 o'clock. At the Presbyterian Church the women of the W.M.S. were addressed by Mrs. Mahon, of Montreal, on the women's work in the "Forward Movement."

WILL REFUSE TO AGREE TO ANY MODIFICATIONS

The Peace Treaty Situation Has
Been Greatly Complicated as
Result of Latest Announcement.

(Associated Press Despatch)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Notice
was served on Senator Lodge, yesterday
by the irreconcilable Republican
Senators that they will refuse to support
him in any compromise agreement
which modifies the League of Nations covenant.
Coming when the unofficial bi-partisan
conferences of Republicans and
Democrats called to work out compromise
reservations was said to be approaching
an agreement, the action of the
"irreconcilables" complicated the
peace treaty situation to such an extent
that last night nobody who has
watched the fight would care to predict
just what may happen in the next
few days.

COMPENSATION BOARD IS SHORN OF ITS POWER

Manitoba Measure is Violation of
British North America Act, Decides Court.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 24.—According
to a decision rendered by Chief Justice
Matters yesterday in the King's
Bench, the Manitoba workmen's compensation
for injuries act is ultra vires of the Provincial Legislature,
and the compensation board is shorn of its power as a political body.

The decision is based upon the holding
that the appointment of the board is a direct violation of the British
North America Act.

QUEBEC TO TAKE ACTION AGAINST STREET RY. CO.

FUR INDUSTRY INCREASING IN THE TOWNSHIPS

A Large Amount of Raw Furs Has
Been Brought to This City This
Season.

Sherbrooke is becoming a very im-
portant fur-trading centre, under the
existing high prices that are being
paid for all kinds of fur.
A local fur merchant estimates that
not less than \$150,000 is paid for raw
furs brought to Sherbrooke by East-
ern Townships trappers, with a prob-
able total in the Eastern Townships
representing at least \$300,000 a year.

Many people will be surprised to
know that in this old-settled section
of the country so large a return from
fur-bearing animals is possible.
Prices that are being paid for raw
furs at present are as follows: Fox,
25; mink, \$20; skunk, \$3.50 to \$6;
weasel, \$1 to \$1.25; coon, \$5 to \$10;
fisher, \$100; wildcat, \$8 to \$12; bea-
ver, \$15 to \$30; muskrat, \$3 to \$3.25.
It will be noted that the fisher is
the most valuable fur in this part of
the country, the number of which is
naturally small, though about a dozen
have been brought to Sherbrooke this
season.
The muskrat, which formerly
brought 25c a skin, is now around
\$3, and represents the largest revenue
to the Eastern Townships trapper. A
good many beaver are caught still in
the Megantic section, and quite a
number of bear and wildcat skins
have been brought to Sherbrooke this
year.
