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Charter Night Is Observed By Sherbrooke Kiwanis Club

A Kiwanis Club "should be built at the corner of Fellowship and Service streets, with the front entrance on Fellowship street but the largest frontage on Service street," Kenneth F. Greenaway, of Guelph, Ont., governor of the Ontario-Quebec-Maritime district, said last night when the Sherbrooke Kiwanis Club held its charter night.

Before a dinner gathering of close to 300 Kiwanians and their guests who crowded the main dining room and Mayfair Room at the New Sherbrooke Hotel, Governor Greenaway presented the local club with its charter, admitting it formally into membership in Kiwanis International. Newman T. Hunter, president of the Sherbrooke club, accepted the charter on behalf of his fellow members.

Governor Greenaway was the principal speaker at the banquet which was featured, too, by the presentation of flags, banners and other articles necessary to the operation of the club. These gifts came from other Kiwanis clubs in Quebec, Ontario and Vermont.

Taking as his theme the club motto, "We Build," Governor Greenaway set forth the tenets upon which Kiwanis is based, starting with the foundation which, he said, was faith.

Sincerity of belief and of purpose was sought in Kiwanians, he said, and members should be men who "have faith in each other, faith in what they are doing and faith in Kiwanis."

The first story to the Kiwanis Club was goodness — the simple goodness that makes a son say to his father, "You are a good man."

Knowledge was the next story, the district governor said. Members should know about the organization they had joined and they should know too about the needs of their community.

Self-control was the story which went up next on the Kiwanis house.

"There are rules of the games that must be followed," said Governor Greenaway. "And we must help others to learn self-control as well as practicing it ourselves."

Stradfastness, godliness and brotherhood were further stories on this house and the top story was love.

"It is not size for a Kiwanian to talk about love," the governor said. "We must have love for humanity, for things that are noble and right, for our family, our country and our God."

On conclusion of his address, Governor Greenaway presented the local club with its charter and gave the Granby club a ribbon for its banner to signify it had sponsored the Sherbrooke club.

Annual Wales Home Reception Held Yesterday At Melbourne

B. N. Holtham K.C., was the guest speaker at the annual reception of the Wales Home in Melbourne yesterday. Subject of his address was "Books."

Mr. Holtham told the value of books, especially first editions. "Some first edition books are worth thousands," he said.

A large number of friends and residents of the Home attended the reception.

A well arranged musical program was presented with Miss M. A. Forbes, Lennoxville, and F. J. Sangster, Sherbrooke, as soloists accompanied by Mrs. B. A. Bell, of Lennoxville, at the piano.

Miss Forbes rendered four selections, "Homing, Drink To Me Only with Thine Eyes, When I Have Sung My Songs and Annie Laurie."

Mr. Sangster sang "Blow The Man Down, Joshua Fit de Battle of Jerico and Wi a Hundred Pipers."

K. G. Nourse, chairman for the day, and president of the Home introduced the artists who were thanked by Len M. Thomas, first vice-president of the Home. Invocation was by Rev. R. C. Tait, of Sherbrooke.

The Wales Home, a home for aged Protestants, was founded, and incorporated by Act of the Quebec Legislature, in 1920. It originated through the will of the late Horace Pettis Wales, who bequeathed his residence and farm, and the residue of his estate, to the Protestant ministers of Melbourne and Richmond for the purpose of founding a home for Protestant old people.

The farm bequeathed by Mr. Wales for the purpose of the home consists of 162 acres of land situated along the St. Francis River. The view from those windows of the Home facing towards the river is one of rare beauty. The farm is worked as a dairy farm and, in addition, supplies the Home with milk, cream and vegetables.

At the annual meeting in June 1939, the announcement was made that Miss Helen Norton, of Coaticook, and Harry A. Norton, of Ayer's Cliff, would jointly erect and equip at their own expense a fireproof addition to the Home to be known as the "Norton Memorial" in memory of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Norton.

The new wing, about 140 feet long and 40 feet wide, adjoins the older building at the south-east end.

The directors of the Home have high hopes that another wing will be built soon.

ABBOTT CASE AGAIN IS POSTPONED

The case of Charles Abbott, of North Hatley, scheduled to appear in Court of Sessions this morning on charges of murder and attempted suicide, was adjourned until Thursday next, Abbott, who is undergoing treatment for head wounds which the Provincial Police claim were self-inflicted, did not make a personal appearance.

Abbott was detained July 11 when the body of his wife was found in their farmhouse near North Hatley with several bullet wounds around the heart. Abbott, in an unconscious condition, was also in the room with a bullet wound in the head. He was taken to the Montreal Neurological Institute for treatment.

The charges of murder and attempted suicide were laid on instructions of the Attorney-General after a Coroner's Jury had rendered a verdict exonerating Abbott from blame in connection with the death of his wife owing to lack of evidence.

AIR CADETS TO GO ON TWO-WEEK SUMMER CAMP

Some fifty Air Cadets from Sherbrooke's 67 (Rotary) Squadron, Royal Canadian Air Cadets, will leave early Saturday morning to spend two weeks on a summer camp at the RCAF station of Alby, Ontario.

The detachment will be under the command of Flying-Officer Charles Kench, M.B.E., squadron adjutant, and will leave Sherbrooke by train at 5:05 a.m., D.S.T., arriving at the air station that night.

Instructions have been issued to all the Cadets making the trip concerning the equipment and clothing they will need for the two-week period, pointing out that summer khaki shirt and trousers will be issued at the camp.

Of special importance to the air-minded youngsters, all between the ages of fourteen and nineteen, are the arrangements for flying while on the station. Waivers signed by the boys' parents are necessary before they can be flown in service aircraft, and an order signed by the commanding officer emphasizes this "No Waiver-No Fly" condition for all Cadets.

Between six and seven hundred Air Cadets from Ontario and Quebec squadrons will attend the two week camp, which will feature a full program of sports activities, flying and familiarization with service procedure.

The Doctor Says

PLASTIC SURGERY GETTING BETTER BUT DON'T EXPECT ANY MIRACLES

During the first world war, plastic surgery developed rapidly. The disfiguring injuries caused by battle resulted in the development of ingenious special surgical methods, both to restore function and repair disfigurement.



Many different methods were used, such as taking a cartilage from the ribs to use in rebuilding a nose or ear.

Often Takes Years
During and since World War II, progress in plastic surgery has continued at an ever-increasing pace. There are thousands of cases on record in which the nose has been changed from a repellent sight into a respectable feature. Ears, lips and many other portions of the anatomy have also been rebuilt by plastic surgery.

Many of these operations require periods of months or even years to complete, and involve several separate operations. Patience on the part of both surgeon and patient is, therefore, necessary.

Not all attempts to repair or reconstruct are successful. Someone who has to undergo plastic surgery should not expect a miracle. Amazing results are common, but the person who is considering plastic surgery should listen carefully to what the surgeon has to say concerning the probable results.

As greater experience is gathered in this field, greater skill will be offered to the patient needing this type of treatment. Pioneers in this field have every reason to be proud of their accomplishments.

Q—How dangerous is a shadow on the lung in a seven-year-old child?

A—The answer to this question lies in what has caused the shadow, and how large it is. If produced, treated, early tuberculosis in children generally responds well.

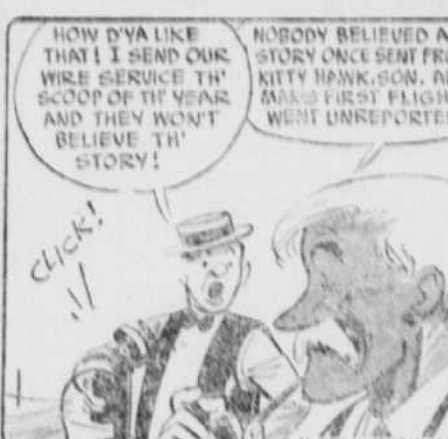

VELVET Chocolate Cake

- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 1/3 cup cocoa
- 1/2 cup boiling water
- 2 cups sifted Velvet Flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 cup shortening (part butter)
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 3/4 cup buttermilk or sour milk

Mix the 1/3 cup sugar and cocoa; add boiling water, and boil two minutes, stirring until smooth; set aside to cool. Preheat oven to 325°F. Grease cake tin, preferably 9 x 9 x 2 inches. Measure sifted Velvet Flour into sifter placed over waxed paper; add salt and soda and sift together twice. Cream shortening until fluffy; add flavorings and gradually add the 1 cup sugar, beating until creamy; add beaten eggs, and beat again until light and creamy; add cooled cocoa syrup and beat again. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with the buttermilk or sour milk, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Mix just until blended—do not beat after flour has been added. Turn into prepared cake tin and bake in a rather slow oven, 325°F., about 1 hour. Let stand 5 minutes; turn out. Frost when cold.

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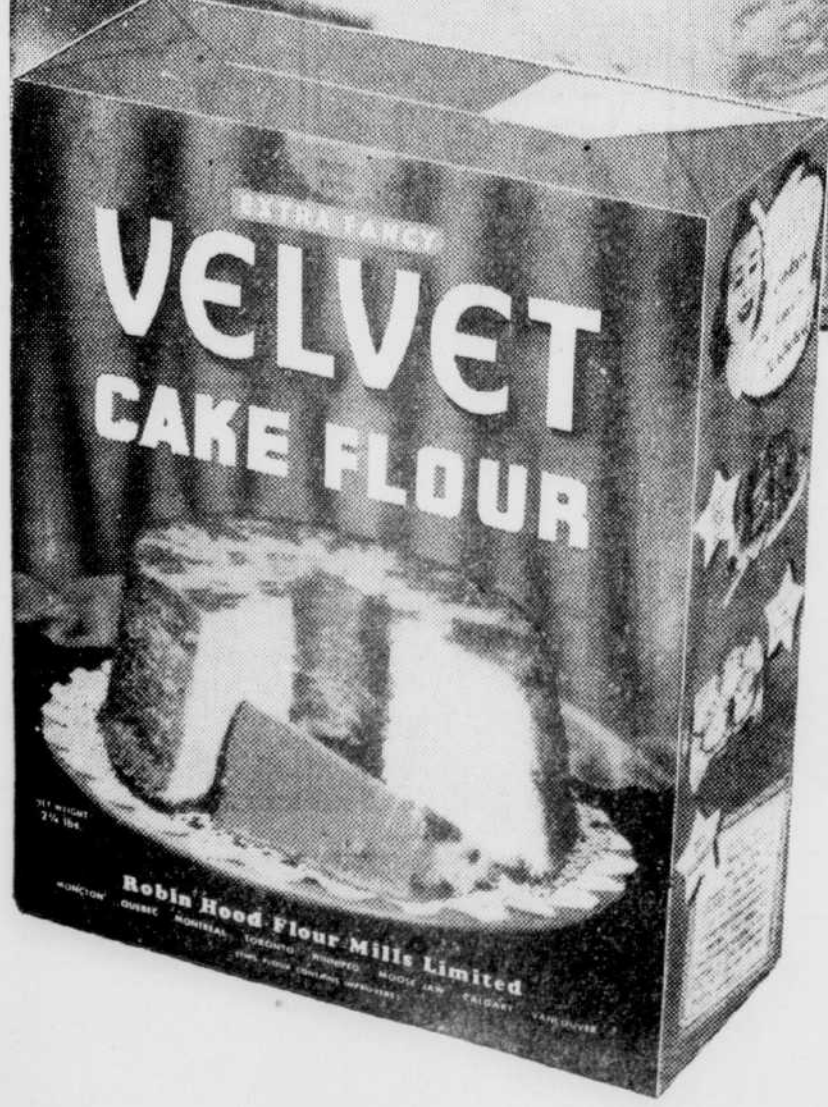
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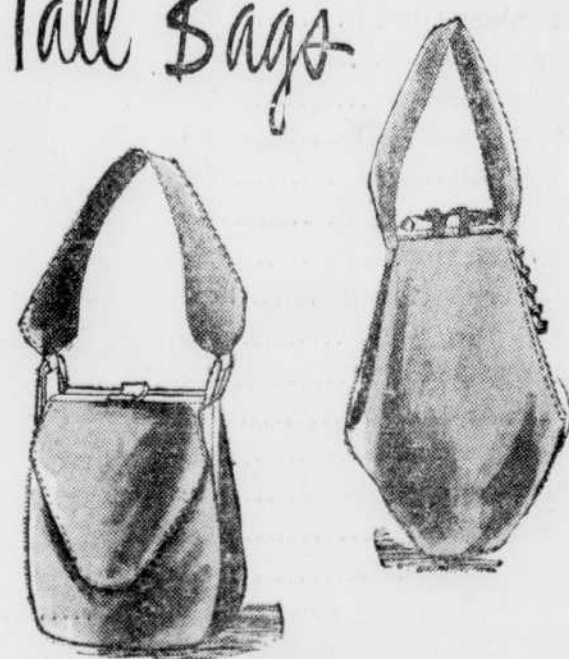


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
