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PROBABLE FATAL SHOOTING CASE

In a Hotel — Three Brothers
Wounded in a Row About
a Woman.

Montreal, March 31.—Attempting to avenge a fancied insult to a lady acquaintance of their brother, Edgar and Herbert Chapman were shot, probably fatally, in a room in the Savoy Hotel at four o'clock this morning, while Harold Chapman, the brother, lies in the hospital with a bullet in his knee.

Carl Hemmans, a player in the orchestra of the Enchantress Company with Kitty Gordon which finished its engagement in Montreal last night and left to-day for New York, is held charged with the shooting, and will plead self-defence.

Harold Chapman had a room in the Savoy Hotel, and early this morning a woman called to see him, saying she had heard he was sick. He was in his room asleep. The woman found the lock broken and started to mend it. The noise of her hammering awoke Harry Sanford, a player in the same company as Hemmans, who came out and asked the woman not to make so much noise. She desisted and went into Chapman's room and told him of her conversation with Sanford. Sanford, in the meantime, went into Hemmans' room for a talk. Chapman came to the door and saw Sanford entering Hemmans' room. He got up and dressed and then sent a message to his brothers who lived nearby, saying that he was in trouble. The messenger came back with some money, his brothers believing he meant financial difficulty. Harold Chapman then got a hack, drove up to his brothers' residence where they lived with their mother, and got them out of bed, bringing them down to the Savoy Hotel. The three men went to Chapman's room and removed their coats. Then they went to Hemmans' room where Sanford had been seen to enter by Harold Chapman. They broke down the door. Sanford had left the room for his own while Harold Chapman had gone out, but Hemmans was seen sitting on the side of the bed. As they entered some object broke the electric light, plunging the room in darkness. Shouting out threats, the three brothers rushed at Hemmans, whom Harold took to be the man who had had the conversation with the woman outside his door, and throwing him to the floor, started to beat him. Hemmans managed to struggle to his dress suit case on the top of which he had left a revolver, and opened fire in the darkness. All three brothers were hit.

When the hotel employees arrived on the scene they found the Chalmers helpless and Hemmans badly beaten.

The shooting was done with a 32-calibre revolver, with soft-nosed bullets. Edgar Chapman has a bullet in his lungs, while Herbert is wounded in the liver and chest. Neither are expected to recover.

To-day the anti-mortem statements of the wounded men were taken.

Edgar Chapman identified Hemmans, who is held by the police and offered to shake hands with him, saying: "You're not to blame at all, old man."

The woman in the case declares that she did not tell Chapman that Sanford's words were discourteous, merely saying that he had asked her not to make so much noise.

What story Harold Chapman could have told his brothers, who both have good reputations as steady workers at their trade as painters, to get them out of bed at dead of night to make an assault on a man they had never seen is unknown as yet.

Harold Chapman will be remembered as one of the ushers at the Orpheum who was present at the fatal card game last November when Chas. Ross shot and killed Bob Fitzsimmons, the ticket taker, during a quarrel over a bet.

DOMINION HOUSE READY TO CLOSE

All Business Completed—The
Grand Trunk and Mr. Hays
Roughly Handled.

(Special to the Chronicle.)

Ottawa, March 31.—Monday will find the Commons ready for prorogation, all business being done except part of concurrence. There really was not a full day's work and members filled in the time with talk until evening, when one important piece of business was transacted. This was handling of Grand Trunk legislation. The attitude taken by the Government and by the unanimous House was two-fold: The legislation before the House should be dealt with on its merits, namely, passed; the flow of capital into the country must not be checked; improvements of the transportation system of the country must not cease; it would be wrong to seek to control the Grand Trunk by indirect means. In doing so the Government and the whole House expressed most emphatic disapproval of and contempt for the course followed by the Grand Trunk and Mr. Hays. The plainest language was used in charging him with untruthfulness, and direct legislation to compel the railway to keep its promises to its employees was all but definitely announced. The language used by members was exceedingly severe. Some of the things said were:

Mr. Lancaster—He had nothing but contempt for Hays, who said first, that he was not intelligent enough to understand the agreement he had made; second, that he was not honest enough to keep it.

Mr. Murphy—"Said dealings could not exist between man and man, or between two great railway corporations."

Hon. Geo. P. Graham, former Minister of Railways—"I have no patience with a man in high or low life who won't keep an agreement." The action of the railway had been absolutely unfair and a direct violation of the agreement.

Major Currie, sponsor for the bill—Hays had lost his usefulness in this country. All classes in the community had lost all faith in him.

Mr. Borden agreed that the railway company had violated its agreements. Its conduct had not been such as to commend it to members of the House. It must have been exasperating to the late Government. It had been very exasperating to the present Government. It might be necessary to intervene decisively. But if this were done it should be by means of direct legislation, it should not be done indirectly.

At the opening of the House, Mr. White dealt with the Senate amendments to the Tariff Commission bill. Of two important amendments he accepted one which alters the term of commissioners' appointments from term of years to "during pleasure." He rejected the one which calls for special inquiry with a report whenever application is made for increase of duty. As regards the first change, he regarded it as undesirable, but he was willing to accept it. The second amendment was irrelevant and asked for nothing already covered, and by particularizing in reality weakened the force of the statute.

Mr. Pugsley attacked the supercession of Sir George Gibbon and conferees as members of the International Joint Waterways Commission.

Mr. Borden defended the action of the Government.

Then followed the Opposition's general complaint of all things in general. Mr. A. K. Maclean took an unfavorable view of everything the Government had done, was liberal in charges of broken promises, and settled down to a very sad study of the finances. He added together the estimates, guarantees, subsidies, probable expenditures and possible liabilities, and worked out a tale of \$205,000,000. In particular he attacked bitterly the Government's highway policy.

Mr. White rallied Mr. Maclean on the singular spectacle he presented as an advocate of economy and recalled his complaisance under the expenditures of the Laurier-Fielding era. He compared estimates of the past few years, dwelling on increases. In 1911 the increase over 1910 was \$22,000,000. In 1912 the increase over 1911 was \$24,000,000. In 1913 the increase over 1912 is \$10,000,000. "When I consider," said Mr. White, "that this party has been out of power for 15 years, that many constituencies have been deprived of public works for this reason, I can only say with Oliver that I am astonished at our own moderation."

PREMIER MCBRIDE AND THE DIAMONDVALE DISASTER

Victoria, B.C., March 31.—Premier McBride has taken cognizance of the verdict returned by the coroner's jury which has been investigating at Merritt the circumstances attending the recent deplorable disaster at the mines of the Diamondvale Coal Co. near Nicola City. The jury in its finding held that the accident was occasioned by the neglect of prescribed precautions on the part of the company and further held an inspector of Merritt blamable in his not having posted or seen to the posting of certain notices which are called for by provisions of the Provincial Coal Mines Regulations Act. On Monday next the question of these charges will be taken up by the minister.

MAY BE A TIE-UP OF THE SUBWAY

In New York—Motor Engineers Organizing Into a Labor Union.

New York, March 30.—Trouble which, if it should come to a crisis might involve a complete tie-up of New York's subway and elevated system, was forecasted to-day when Warren S. Stone, grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, announced that the brotherhood was organizing the motor engineers of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company. According to Chief Stone, the officials of the company are opposed to having their employees affiliated with a labor union, but the organization of the engineers by the Brotherhood would nevertheless go on, he declared. He intimated also that higher wages and other concessions would be demanded. An additional round trip has been recently added to the engineers' schedule, he said, for which the men received no more money.

Mr. Stone to-night quoted President Shonts, of the Interborough Company, as saying: "I do not want to have to fight you, but the policy of the board of directors is against any man working on the Interborough being affiliated with a labor union."

"We will proceed to organize the Interborough nevertheless," asserted the engineers' leader, "and it remains to be seen whether the Interborough can discharge men faster than we can organize them."

BODY IDENTIFIED.

Montreal, Que., March 31.—The body found in the canal Friday has been identified as that of Thomas Andrew Alexander, a native of Ireland, who had been in Montreal less than a year.

Marks of violence were found on the head, but whether they had been caused by ice or whether they had been inflicted before death the morgue keepers were not able to say. No money was found in the victim's pockets. Coroner McMahon has requested Dr. D. D. McTaggart and Dr. C. A. Dugas to make an autopsy, and the inquest has been fixed for tomorrow morning.

CAPTAIN SCOTT IN THE ANT-ARCTIC

Will Remain There Another Winter — Was 150 Miles From Pole January 3.

Akaroa, New Zealand, Monday, April 1.—9.20 a.m.—The Terra Nova, Capt. Robert F. Scott's Polar exploration vessel, was sighted off this port this morning and anchored shortly after daybreak. She does not bring back Captain Scott and his party. The commander of the Terra Nova was entrusted with the following brief message from Capt. Scott, which the explorer sent back to his base at McMurdo Sound before the Terra Nova left there:

"I am remaining in the Ant-Arctic another winter in order to continue and complete my work."

The great news sent back to McMurdo Sound was that Captain Scott on January 3 had reached a point 150 miles from the South Pole and was still advancing.

It is clear that had Capt. Scott delayed the notification of his progress until he had actually reached the Pole the news could not have reached the Terra Nova before she was compelled to leave McMurdo Sound owing to the settling in of winter and the freezing of the Ross Sea.

All on board the Terra Nova are well. Great disappointments were felt when it became known that the Scott party had been left behind. The Terra Nova is expected to reach Lyttelton, New Zealand, on Wednesday.

London, March 31.—The long and impatiently awaited news of Captain Scott's Antarctic expedition has at last arrived, but will bring the keenest disappointment to the cherished hopes of all Englishmen that the British expedition might, after all, prove to be the first in the race for the South Pole.

On January 3, nearly three weeks after Amundsen hoisted the Norwegian flag at the Pole, Scott still had 150 miles to cover before attaining the object of his desire.

Since the news of Amundsen's successful attempt, Englishmen have built great hopes on Captain Scott's expedition, if not surpassing, the Norwegian's achievements. It was known that Scott had chosen the

longer route, and as Amundsen's experience proved the more difficult route, but, presuming that he was favored by the same exceptional weather conditions as Amundsen, few doubted his success.

Now comes the disappointing news that Scott is spending another winter in the Antarctic, and there will be further weary waiting before it can be known whether he even succeeded in reaching the Pole. According to some of Captain Scott's intimate friends here, however, no surprise need be felt at his decision to spend another winter in the South, this having been within the original scope of his intentions. They suggest that he may have learned of Amundsen's exploit, and thereupon determined to attempt a great journey across the ice barrier, returning from the side almost opposite to that from which he started his journey.

If this is so, the Terra Nova, probably received instructions to meet Scott at some fixed date at a point on the barrier opposite Graham Land, not far to the south of Cape Horn. It will be remembered that the German explorer, Lieutenant Filchner, is operating from that side and in that case possibly the two parties may meet.

EARTHQUAKE IN CUBA.

Santiago, Cuba, March 31.—An earthquake occurred here this morning. The shocks caused considerable alarm, but no serious damage.

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THE SENATE VOTES DOWN ITS LEADERS

Defeats Motions by Senator
Lougheed and Sir Richard
Cartwright.

Ottawa, March 31.—The Senate on Saturday showed what it can do when it takes the notion, for it voted down both its leaders.

Hon. Mr. Lougheed, who represents the Government, was the first to meet disfavor. He appealed from the statement of reasons why the Senate should insist upon its amendments to the Government's highways bill. The Senators went against him 29 to 9.

Then Sir Richard Cartwright gave his support to a motion by Senator Dandurand which would have killed the bill granting Prince Edward Island an increased allowance. The Senate turned this down by 16 to 12.

Senator Power reported for the subcommittee appointed to prepare reasons for the Senate insisting upon its amendments to the highways bill. It insisted upon striking out the clause which would empower the Minister of Railways to build a highway because it would violate the British North America Act and because it was undesirable that the Dominion should usurp the function of the provincial governments. Senator Lougheed, speaking for the Government, opposed the adoption of the report.

The report was adopted nevertheless by a vote of 29 to 9. In committee on the bill to aid in the construction of three bridges on the proposed St. John and Quebec Railway Hon. Mr. Lougheed stated the bridges would be expensive structures and he understood the million dollars guarantee of bonds would not build them.

Senator Daniel said that as the road would have the same standard as the Transcontinental it would be of expensive construction and would provide the connecting link between the Transcontinental and St. John.

"Why is there a separate company to construct the bridges?" Sir Richard Cartwright asked. "I understood it was because the bridges are to be toll bridges," replied Hon. Mr. Lougheed. Senator Thompson said the bridges would cost far more than a million dollars. The railroad was being built to correct the mistake made in adopting what was called the back route from the St. John river to Moncton.

Senator Costigan said he found that the line would never be built as far as Grand Falls and that the province would therefore find that it would not be operated by the Intercolonial, would not receive 40 per cent of the gross earnings of the road and would be called upon to pay the interest on the bonds guaranteed. The bill was given third reading.

Senator Dandurand, on motion for

third reading of the bill to increase by \$100,000 a year the subsidy of Prince Edward Island, said that the subsidies to the provinces were fixed by the British North America act. That was Imperial legislation. The provincial allowances had been changed only once and then only after a conference of the provinces who came to an agreement and the subsidies were increased by Imperial legislation which now prescribed what the subsidy of each province should be. That act declared the provisions for the subsidies were to be final and unalterable. No special reason had been given to show that the Dominion was in any way under an obligation to Prince Edward Island for this subsidy increase. He therefore moved an amendment adverse to the bill because it proposed to violate Imperial legislation and because no reason was given for making the increase.

Sir Richard Scott said that the Prince Edward Island subsidy had been twice increased by the Canadian Parliament. In 1887 it was increased by \$20,000 a year and in 1901 by \$30,000 a year. If the bill under consideration violated Imperial legislation it had been violated twice before.

Senator McMullen and Senator Cloran protested against the passage of the bill.

Senator Dandurand's amendment was declared lost by the following vote: Yeas: Senators Bostock, Jaffray, Sir Richard Cartwright, Dandurand, Kerr, Power, Derbyshire, Costigan, Watson, Belecourt and Cloran, 12.

Nays: Senators Lougheed, Macdonald (British Columbia), Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Daniel, Pope, Bell, Yeo, Fiset, Montplaisir, King, Ratz, Thompson, Prowse, Farrell, Edwards, Speaker Landry, 16.

On motion for third reading Sir Richard Cartwright said that in this bill, which was in direct violation of the pledges of Confederation, the Parliament of Canada was disgracing itself.

Senator Watson said that the present Government having come into office and finding a forty million dollar surplus waiting for it was now proceeding to divide it up in spite of the British North America act.

The bill was given third reading. The Senate adjourned until Monday morning, at which sitting it is expected that the business of the session will be completed.

NARROW ESCAPE OF A BLIND SENATOR

Waukesha, Wis., March 30.—Senator Gore, of Oklahoma, narrowly escaped death this afternoon when a crazed Pole, Charles Schomulla, attacked him with a club while the senator was speaking. The Pole was sitting near the stage and in the midst of the senator's speech suddenly leaped to the platform, drawing a club from under his overcoat as he jumped and swung instantly at the blind senator's head. One of the men on the stage, Judge P. C. Hamlin, was quicker than the maniac, however, and knocked Schomulla off the stage before his blow landed. The senator, who could not see his danger, was unaware of the incident until later.

400,000 MINERS SUSPEND WORK

In the Bituminous and Anthracite Fields of Ohio—Will
Last for a Few Weeks.

Indianapolis, Ind., March 31.—No anthracite or bituminous coal will be taken from the mines of the country to-morrow by union miners as a result of the suspension, which went into effect at midnight to-night, due to wage troubles. More than 400,000 miners, about 150,000 in the anthracite field and 250,000 in the bituminous, will take a vacation, which probably will last only a few weeks. Unlike strike conditions, the miners will leave pump men and others at work to protect the mines from flooding or other trouble due to a shut down of the plants.

The bituminous miners will be out only long enough for the wage agreement, reached in Cleveland, to be ratified by the miners by a referendum vote, as it is believed the agreement will be sanctioned by a large majority of the men. The suspension in the anthracite mines will be of longer duration, as no agreement has yet been reached between the miners and operators. After negotiations were broken off in New York on March 13, between the anthracite miners and operators, nothing was done toward getting together again until yesterday when both sides agreed to meet in Philadelphia on April 10 and re-open negotiations.

Ballots for the referendum vote by the bituminous miners, it is said, will be sent out from the National Miners' headquarters in this city as soon as the National President, John P. White, and the other officials return here from Cleveland. It will take more than two weeks to take the vote as not all of the locals meet every week. Then it will require some time to canvass the vote, so the bituminous miners are not expected to resume work under a month.

The suspension does not affect all of the mines in the south as the union is not so strong south of the Ohio River as it is in the northern states. The mines of Wyoming, Washington, Colorado and Montana also will not be affected because the union contracts in those districts do not expire April 1.

It is said the miners will lose \$1,000,000 every day they remain out and that the suspension will cause a loss in coal production to the country of nearly 42,000,000 tons a month.

ACCORDING TO THE VOTES NOW CAST

Majority of Miners Appear to Favor Returning to Work at Once.

London, March 30.—Although a week must elapse before many of the collieries are reopened, even if the miners' decision is favorable to a termination of the strike, indications afforded by the ballots thus far taken are that a large majority of the men will vote for resumption of work. This enables the country to face with comparative equanimity the prospect of a continuance for another week of the industrial dislocation.

With hardly any exception, the leaders of the miners are counselling the men to vote for a resumption, and although some districts are balloting contrary to this advice, the aggregate figures so far received show a great preponderance in favor of a settlement. The ballot in North Wales was completed this evening, and although the figures are withheld, it is known that an overwhelming majority are desirous of returning to work. The miners in the Forth of Dean district have adopted a resolution to return to work on April 1.

In Scotland, the ranks of the non-union workers have received large accessions, and from several collieries, which have reopened, a number of steamers in the Forth of Forth have succeeded in obtaining coal enough to leave port with their cargoes. But elsewhere many vessels are lying idle. At Cardiff, Barry and Penarth there are now more than 200 steamers laid up.

LATER DISPATCHES.

London, March 31.—The miners are taking far less interest in the ballot to end the strike than they did in the ballot which began it. Probably this is because the result is a foregone conclusion. In many districts only about half the men have recorded their votes. This indifference also accounts for the fact that Northumberland, Lancashire and some other districts are voting against a resumption, only the irreconcilables taking the trouble to vote.

However, the aggregate voting is largely for a return to work, and the indications are that many men will have taken up their tools again before the final result of the polling is declared. In not a few of the districts the men have already begun to reopen the roads and prepare the mines for a new start at the earliest moment. Several collieries in Warwickshire have been reopened, and probably 10,000 men will be working tomorrow in the pits.

As the crisis is now practically over, the King, who has up to the present declined to leave London, has decided to carry out his original plan to spend Easter at Sandringham with the Queen and the royal family. He probably will remain there until April 23.

The Birmingham corporation will start tomorrow in shutting off the gas supply between noon and eight o'clock in the evening, to the dismay of the shopkeepers, who are loudly protesting against this action.

TREASURY STATEMENT OF GREAT BRITAIN

London, March 30.—The Treasury statement for the fiscal year was issued tonight. It shows: Revenue 185,090,286 pounds (\$925,451,430); expenditure, 178,545,100 pounds (\$892,725,700). The revenue is 18,760,302 pounds less than the previous year, when, owing largely to the late collection of the preceding year's property and income tax, the increase in receipts amounted to 72,154,132 pounds.

ANNIVERSARY SERVICES IN TWO CHURCHES

Galt, Ont., March 31.—Anniversary services were held to-day in Knox Church, Galt's largest house of worship, and the church was packed at both services. The anniversary marks Rev. R. E. Knowles' fifteenth year as both services and referred to the expansion of the church. He preached at excellent progress and history of the church. To-day was also the anniversary of the opening of the new Sunday school building and this afternoon a special service was held in the Sunday school.

The congregation of the Ainslie Street Methodist Church to-day celebrated its anniversary. The Rev. W. H. Hincks, D. D., of Toronto, president of the Toronto Conference, preached at both services. The congregation raised \$2,000 to pay off the church debt.

BANQUET OF CANADIAN SOCIETY

Philadelphia, March 31.—H. H. Stevens, M.P. for Vancouver, was the principal speaker at the banquet of the Canadian Society which took place at the Orpheus Club last night. He spoke on "British Columbia's Attractions and Advantages" and drew a flattering picture of conditions in the Coast province. Thomas Martindale, the big game hunter of Philadelphia, whose stamping ground is British Columbia, presided during the dinner, and gave way to W. Atlee Burpee, a former resident of St. John, N.B., who acted as toastmaster. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, ex-Minister of Labor, who addressed the Academy of Political Science yesterday on the Canadian method of applying conciliation to industrial disputes, was expected to attend the Canadian banquet, but at the last moment found it impossible to be present.

NANKING IS QUIET NO LOOTING THERE

Quiet Also Prevails at Soo-Chow—Looting There Was Quickly Suppressed.

Nanking, April 1.—The report from Peking that looting was being carried out at Nanking is absolutely without foundation. The city is perfectly quiet and the War Office reports that quiet also prevails at Soo-Chow. One pawnshop was burned in that town and one coolie was killed. The looting by a small body of mutineers there was quickly suppressed.

Premier Tang Shao Yi, ex-President Sun Yat Sen and other leaders of the Republican movement, during the course of interviews to-day, declared that pessimistic reports were unwarranted. Uneasiness in the foreign settlements in Shanghai and elsewhere, they admitted, was natural perhaps, but notwithstanding the financial difficulties caused by the delay through the withdrawal of the support of the Four Powers group, they were quite confident that no serious outbreak would occur anywhere.

They deplored the insistence of foreigners in penetrating again into the interior until complete order was restored, which the Premier said would probably be within three months. They asserted that there was no chance of approval of any loan which would grant a monopoly to a group or groups of financiers, and said that China was determined to open the door to competition, and that they had received ample assurance of support.

The plans for restoring order include the establishment of four spheres—Nanking, under control of Hwang Hsui; Peking, under Yuan Shi Kai; Wu Chang, under General Li Yuen Heng; Kwantung, under Dr. Sun Yat Sen.

Dr. Sun says that he will proceed to Canton after visiting General Li, and bend every energy unofficially to restoring order, educating the people of China and developing the country's resources. There is every appearance of harmony between President Yuan Shi Kai and Dr. Sun and their followers. The coalition cabinet is regarded as a complete success. Premier Tang Shao Yi has temporarily assumed the portfolio of communications, until the Assembly approves the nomination of Liang Ju-Hao. The members of the Assembly and the various departments will probably move to Peking at the end of the week.

CONFIRMATION SERVICES IN LUTHERAN CHURCHES

Berlin, Ont., March 31.—Confirmation services were held in three Lutheran churches here to-day, over 100 candidates being admitted to church membership. Forty-nine were confirmed in St. Peter's Church, 23 in St. Paul's Church and 37 in St. Matthew's Church.

GRUESOME APRIL FOOL JOKE IN TORONTO

Toronto, Ont., March 31.—An April fool joke, with a gruesome sense of humor, called up the newspaper offices and police stations at midnight and stated that several persons had been killed in a railway wreck at York, five miles east of Toronto. A hurried investigation revealed the hoax.

INDEPENDENT LABOR PARTY ARE RADICAL.

Toronto, March 31.—After wrangling for three hours at a meeting on Saturday evening, the Independent Labor party of Canada added to its already famous platform of public ownership, single tax and woman's suffrage, the radical plank of collective ownership by the people of all means of production, distribution, communication, transportation and exchange.

JURY IN SUGAR CASE FAIL TO AGREE

New York, March 31.—The jury in the case of John E. Parsons, Washington B. Thomas, George H. Frazier and Arthur Denner, charged with violating the criminal clause of the Sherman anti-trust law while directors of the American Sugar Refining Company, reported a disagreement in the United States District Court shortly before 1:30 o'clock this morning. The defendants were charged with conspiracy in restraint of trade in closing the Pennsylvania Sugar Refining Company plant.

The jurors were out from noon yesterday. It was reported that they stood 8 to 4 for acquittal, but one juror who said he favored acquittal, stated that he was in the minority.

UNVEILED MEMORIAL TO HER FATHER.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 31.—Before a distinguished audience, composed largely of members of the medical profession of this and other cities, Mrs. Florence L. Barton unveiled yesterday a memorial to her father, Dr. Crawford Williamson Long at the medical laboratories of the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Long was the discoverer of the adaptability of ether to use as an anesthetic for operations. The memorial, a medallion of gilt bronze, is the work of Dr. R. Tait Mackenzie, formerly of McGill University, Montreal, who is now at the head of the Department of Physical Culture of the University of Pennsylvania. It represents Dr. Long as a young man administering ether to a patient through the use of a cloth instead of the more modern method of a cone. Addresses were delivered by Dr. J. W. White, Dr. J. Chambers, of this city, and Dr. James J. Walsh, of Fordham University, New York.

THE TWO COURT HOUSE ASSASSINS

Still at Large Are Closely Pressed, and Likely to Be Captured Shortly.

Hillsville, Va., March 31.—The coroner of the law is tightening about the two court house assassins who remain at large.

Empty handed but close on the trail, the posses returned to town for a short time to-day, and went off in the mountains again, confident that with every exit guarded it is only a matter of hours when Sidney Allen and Wesley Edwards will be taken. They are the only ones not now in jail of the eight indicted for the court house murders. Detective Tom Felts has arranged for a pack of blood hounds from the state prison farm. He believes he would have taken the two men yesterday had the dogs been with him. Yesterday Edwards and Allen found the posses so close that they fled their refuge without their blankets or food.

Down on the south side of the mountain near Buzzard's Roost there is a cave from which the outlaws fled yesterday, leaving tracks that told of their long leaps of hurried flight. The ground was moist and the posse confused their trail with that of two other outlaws—presumably a moonshiner and an escaped murderer from North Carolina, who are known to be in the mountains.

ALL-STAR N.H.A. TEAM ARRIVE IN VANCOUVER.

Vancouver, B.C., March 31.—The All-Stars N.H.A. hockey team which will play against the Pacific Coast League All-Stars in a series of three games here next week, arrived in the city this morning. The players are all in good shape and confident they will make a clean sweep of the series. They will hold a workout at the local arena to-morrow. The first game will be played here on Tuesday. Manager Frank Patrick is also getting his players into excellent condition with workouts daily the past week. "We are going to show the easterners they are playing against the best team they ever tackled," he said.

FIFTY MEXICAN SOLDIERS KILLED

While Guarding a Train — Were Attacked by Zapatistas in Ambush.

Mexico City, March 30.—Nearly an entire squad of 50 soldiers, guarding a passenger train, which was proceeding from Mexico City to Cuernavaca with a number of passengers, were killed by Zapatistas 50 miles south of here to-day.

The train returned to-night with 15 of the dead, including the engineer. The other bodies were left on the field. The passenger train was pulled back to the capital by a freight train.

A force of 250 Zapatistas fired from behind rocks for an hour and a half. It is believed that they sustained small losses. The captain of the squad and six soldiers, all wounded, have also returned.

It is believed that no Americans were injured although there were several on the train, but they escaped injury by lying on the floor.

COMMITTED SUICIDE IN A CEMETERY.

Holland Landing, Ont., March 11.—William Sloan, aged 45, committed suicide last night in the English church cemetery by taking poison. He was a pensioner of the Spanish-American war, and was dispenser in the drug department of the Soldiers' Home at Washington for 10 years. He left Washington last week for a vacation. He was subject to melancholia, and has made unsuccessful attempts on his life before.

ONE OF AUTOMOBILE BANDITS CAPTURED

Paris, March 30.—The Minister of Justice, M. Brand, announced tonight that one of the automobile bandits had been arrested at Berek-Sur-Mer. The name of the bandit is Soudy, and he is alleged to be one of the robbers who killed a chauffeur at Villeneuve-St. Georges on March 25, held up a bank at Chantilly and killed two of the employees and wounded another, and escaped with \$8,000.

BOY SHOT DEAD BY A COMPANION

Who Subsequently Falls in a Dead Faint—The Shooting Accidental.

Montreal, March 31.—Leaving Art Demontigny a corpse on the railway track with his jaw shattered by a charge from a shotgun, and their companion, Arthur Fabre, in a dead faint, grasping the gun which he had in his hand when it was accidentally discharged, three brothers named Richer, aged 14, 15 and 17 years respectively, ran in terror from the "Y" between the Canadian Pacific Railway and Grand Trunk Railway tracks on the Lachine bank to St. Pierre aux Liens to tell their family of the tragedy which had overtaken their hunting excursion yesterday afternoon.

From the version of the affair, furnished Chief of Police Robert, of Lachine, by the Richer brothers, Fabre picked up the shotgun, ignorant of the fact that it was loaded, and discharged the piece, the bullets entering the jaw of Demontigny and shattering the inside of his head. He died at once, and Fabre dropped to the snow in a faint.

Arthur Fabre, in whose hands the shotgun was when it was discharged, also resides in St. Pierre aux Liens, an dis 16 years of age. He was in no condition yesterday to make any statement of what took place, being at home under the care of doctors.

\$150 FOR FENIAN RAID VETERANS OF 1866-70.

Blenheim, Ont., March 31.—The news that Hon. Col. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, is financing a grant of \$150 to every veteran of '66 and '70 in the Fenian raids is being received with considerable interest here, as there are a large number who will come in for the money. Among those who claim to be entitled to the money are several prominent men. Some of the veterans went to the front and some did not see active service so that the matter as to how many here will receive the \$150 is as yet uncertain.

OBITUARY.

Another of Quebec's old and respected landmarks has passed away in the person of Mrs. John Flanagan, widow of the late John Flanagan, in his lifetime one of Quebec's prominent lumber merchants over a half century ago. Deceased, who has been a resident of St. Ursule street, this city, for many years, was the daughter of the late Dr. J. Arthur O'Connor, in his lifetime a practising physician at Hamilton, Ont., where Mrs. Flanagan was born. She was also stepister of the late Mr. Hugh Devlin, in his lifetime largely identified with the lumber trade, and likewise connected with some of the oldest Irish Catholic families who settled in Canada and this city in the early part of the eighteenth century. Mrs. Flanagan was an accomplished lady of means, devoted the whole time of her widowhood to deeds of charity and good works. She was a devoted mother and an earnest friend of the poor. As a life long member of St. Patrick's Church congregation, she took a deep interest in the old and friendless poor and orphans of St. Bridget's Asylum, and was one of the most indefatigable promoters and workers in connection with the annual bazaar held in the interest of that worthy institution. She died as she lived, a good Christian woman, who was widely known for her gentle disposition and goodness of heart, and the esteem in which she was held is exemplified by the numerous spiritual bouquets bestowed from the good sisters and orphans of St. Bridget's Asylum and her many friends. Deceased, leaves three children to mourn her loss, one son, Mr. John R. Flanagan, who resides in the Province of Alberta, and two daughters, who have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement. The funeral will take place on Tuesday morning to St. Patrick's Church, and thence to St. Patrick's Cemetery.

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Latest Sporting News

'VARSITY RACE WAS DECLARED OFF

Boats of Oxford and Cambridge Crews Waterlogged—Will Race Today.

Putney, England, March 30.—The annual rowing contest between eight-oared crews representing the Oxford and Cambridge Universities was started this morning at Putney Bridge and declared no race by the umpires in consequence of both the shells becoming water logged and sinking. The race is to be rowed again Monday.

Oxford was robbed of what would have been an easy win by rough weather, which caused the swamping of both of the boats. The Cambridge shell was the first to go under water a little over a mile from the start. The boat commenced to ship water soon after the signal was given to start.

The Oxford crew managed to get as far as Chiswick Eyt, about three-quarters of the distance, when the boat had so much water on board that the crew had to stop rowing. Unlike the Cambridge men, however, the Dark Blues, after towing their boat on shore and emptying out the water, re-embarked and finished the course.

Oxford took the lead in the race almost from the start. The Light Blues appeared nervous and besides over a mile from the start, they were choppy waves, they shipped more water from their oars. By the time they reached Harrods Stores, a little over a mile from the start, they were compelled to abandon their boat, which was sinking.

The majority of the crew succeeded in swimming ashore, and the remainder were picked up by the umpire's boat.

The Oxford crew, by hugging the shore, kept out of the roughest water until they reached Chiswick Eyt. There the coach ordered them to bail their shell, but they were unable to do so, or misunderstood the order. Instead of bailing they went ashore, which is a clear breach of the rules of the race, and the umpire decision that the contest was "no race" was a foregone conclusion.

The official time for the whole course from Putney to Morlake is given at 29 minutes 38 seconds, but the Oxford crew had already occupied 18 minutes when their boat was swamped.

The presidents of the Oxford and Cambridge Boat Clubs have decided that the race shall be rowed again on Monday, April 1.

Fifty-three years ago something similar to what happened today took place in the Oxford-Cambridge race.

CON JONES SIGNS UP ANOTHER PLAYER

Vancouver, March 30.—President Jones, of the Vancouver Lacrosse Club, announces that he has come to terms with another of his players, Dot Phelon, the diminutive little home player, who showed up well on the team towards the end of last season, signed up yesterday with Jones' agent, who is now in the east. Phelon will be here in about ten days and will immediately get into harness along with the rest of the players signed. Phelon is the youngest member on the line up of the world's champions and is due for a good season.

GOULDING, OF TORONTO, WON WALKING MATCH

New York, March 30.—George H. Goulding, of the Central track and field team of Toronto, Ont., established a new world's amateur walking record for four miles, indoors, at the Twenty-third Regiment Armory to-night. The track was eight laps to the mile and Goulding covered the four miles in 28 minutes 40.15 seconds, smashing the old mark of 29 minutes 40.45 made by T. H. Armstrong 25 years ago. In accomplishing this feat Goulding made several new intermediate records. He was walking against a relay of four opponents, each of whom walked a mile. He beat them, and all the judges agreed that his walking was perfectly fair heel and toe work.

CLOSE OF THE NATIONAL BOWLING TOURNAMENT

Patterson, N. J., March 30.—The sixth annual tournament of the National Bowling Association, which has been in progress for three weeks with nearly 2,000 competitors, ended to-night with two world's records to its credit, and an interesting competition throughout. It was declared the most successful tournament in the history of the association. The Grand Central, of Rochester, with the world's record total of 2,997 for three games, won the five-men team championship. The members of the record-making team were Larry Sutton, Major Tysler, Ward Vaughn, Otto Kalusch and Frank Britten (Toronto) was fifth, with 2,873.

Charles Johnson and Mortimer Lindsey, of the Elm City Club, of New Haven, Conn., won the doubles championship with 1,301, 54 points short of the record, and Leo Lucke, of Brooklyn, captured the individual championship with a total of 699, six pins short of the record. In the doubles, Lamoureux and Labelle, of Montreal, were tenth with 1,203.

Mortimer Lindsey, of New Haven, won the all-around championship with a world's record for nine games. His average was 253.4-9.

NEW PRESIDENT SNOWSHOE UNION

A. D. Descelles Was Elected at Annual Meeting Held on Saturday Evening.

There was a spirited contest for the office of President of the Canadian Snowshoe Union, the annual meeting of which took place at the City Hall on Saturday evening. Two candidates were in the field, Messrs. Cabana, of Sherbrooke, and A. D. Descelles, of Montreal, the latter winning out. The meeting was a largely attended one, some thirty clubs being represented.

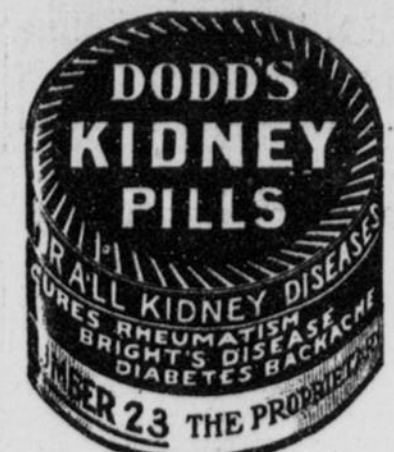

 the soft coal strike in this country was
 also settled by an advance in wages of
 5 cents per ton and decreased hours.
 The anthracite operators, it is said,
 will settle their dispute with the min-
 ers by granting a 10 per cent increase
 in wages. As this reports comes from
 good sources, we believe the coal
 stocks will benefit. Matters look more
 hopeful in the labor outlook. The
 United States Steel Corporation has
 advanced rates on structural steel \$2
 per ton. Throughout the first hour
 there was little feature to the trading,
 but later under the lead of Reading
 the market became strong. Reading
 gained 2 1/2 points, Amalgamated Cop-
 per 1/2, Lehigh Valley 3/4. Interbor-
 ough securities were rather heavy, the
 preferred losing 1/2. Consolidated Gas
 gained 1/2, but we are told to expect
 no increase in the dividend rate for
 three months, at least. The war talk
 in the morning papers was quieted by
 statements from Washington that
 there was no truth in the reports of
 the invasion of Mexico to restore order.
 The business situation is con-
 stantly improving, some steel com-
 panies report big business up to Sep-
 tember. Many copper companies are
 sold out, 60 to 90 days ahead. The

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made to any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry including the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre.

COL. ROOSEVELT SPEAKS IN DETROIT

The Railroad Rate Bill and Lorimer Case Furnished Themes for His Speech.

Detroit, Mich., March 30.—The issue between Theodore Roosevelt and the present national administration was emphasized by a speech which the former President delivered here tonight. The railroad rate bill passed by the present Congress and the Lorimer case furnished the themes for his speech. With his visit to Detroit, which he reached after an all-day ride from the West, Col. Roosevelt's campaign tour of the Central States virtually came to an end, as he expects to make no stop on the return trip to New York.

Colonel Roosevelt said that the railroad rate bill, as submitted to Congress by the administration, "was a thoroughly mischievous and improper measure." The progressive senators, he said, reconstructed the bill "against the violent opposition of the reactionaries who supported the administration," retaining as the one essential feature of the original bill the provision for a commerce court. This court, he said, has worked badly.

Passing to the Lorimer case, Colonel Roosevelt declared that the vote of the Senate committee this week recommending that the Illinois senator be allowed to retain his seat illustrated the working "in actual practice of the President's theory of government of the people by what he calls 'a representative part of the people.'"

The Roosevelt meeting here tonight was held in the Light Guard Armory, which was crowded.

On the trip from Chicago this afternoon Colonel Roosevelt made a number of speeches from the train. The crowds which gathered at the railway stations as he passed through Michigan were the largest which have assembled to hear the colonel's two-minute talks from the rear platform during his present trip. In these speeches he discussed the Presidential primary, and praised Governor Osborn for his work for such a measure.

Because of the great crowd at the Armory, Colonel Roosevelt addressed an overflow crowd from the balcony of the Cadillac Hotel.

At Ann Arbor the students at the University of Michigan were on hand and gave the colonel an uproarious greeting.

Colonel Roosevelt went from the mass meeting to the train for the trip to New York. He expects to reach home late to-morrow for a short rest before starting on his Southern tour next week.

CHARGES OF FORGERY AGAINST SCHOOL INSPECTOR

Orangeville, Ont., March 31.—Five charges of forgery against former Public School Inspector Nathaniel Gordon were investigated before Magistrate Pattullo yesterday. The alleged offences consisted in raising vouchers for postage stamps purchased, the amounts being trifling. Mr. Gordon was suspended by the County Council last fall, and later dismissed with the concurrence of the Educational Department. E. F. B. Johnson, K. C., counsel for Mr. Gordon, endeavored to show that a committee of the County Council had been willing to compound a felony in endeavoring to induce Mr. Gordon to give a check for \$2,000 to secure delay in the action of the Council. Mr. Johnson announced his intention of bringing the matter before the Attorney General. The case was adjourned for a week. Mr. Gordon had been an inspector for 30 years.

ELEVATOR BURNED IN MORDEN, MANITOBA.

Morden, Man., March 31.—As a result of a fire here yesterday the Ogilvie elevator and flour and feed warehouse are a complete loss. The manager stated there was only about 3,000 bushels of wheat in the elevator which was also destroyed with the building. The contents of the warehouse were practically all saved. Peter Rempell's pool room and bowling alley building is a total loss. About half the contents were saved. Mr. Rempell's loss will be about \$3,500 with \$2,000 insurance with the Royal Insurance Company. N. Kormai, general storekeeper, whose store adjoins the pool room, suffered damage amounting to \$500. The origin of the fire which destroyed the pool room is unknown. The elevator, which was situated about 400 feet south of the pool room, is believed to have caught fire from sparks from the latter building.

GRADERS STRIKE IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Vancouver, B. C., March 30.—Following an agitation for higher pay and shorter hours, an agitation, which has been quietly going on for some weeks, among Industrial Workers of the World men engaged in construction camps on the Canadian Northern between Pope and Kamloops, a strike was declared today.

Of five thousand men at work, it was stated that nearly 4,000 are out. It was further stated that most of these are heading for Vancouver to carry on the agitation.

First men to lay down pick and shovel were those engaged by subcontractors Benson & Nelson, which firm has a large camp at Lytton. The men along the line have been getting from \$2.50 to \$3.25 for ten hours. Their demand is for a minimum of \$3.00 for a nine-hour day. This the sub-contractors will not grant.

Meetings are being held in camps from Hope to Kamloops. Now it is said there is a stampede for Vancouver, where the men hope to continue the agitation.

PRESIDENT MADERO TO ACT WITH VIGOR

Against the Rebels in Mexico —Will Replenish His Army With Recruits.

Washington, March 30.—President Madero, of Mexico, has decided upon a vigorous campaign against the rebels and the American Government has consented to permit the shipment from the United States of arms and ammunition for his soldiers. These important developments in the complicated Mexican situation were learned here to-day.

It is the intention of President Madero to replenish his diminished army with fresh recruits, throwing them around the strongholds of the rebels. The serious problem of arming them has been simplified by a decision of the United States authorizing, by special permission in each case, the Mexican Government to purchase munitions of war here and ship them across the border. Under this policy, three consignments of arms and ammunition already have gone into Mexico.

The joint resolution of Congress, under which President Taft's recent proclamation forbidding the exportation of munitions of war was issued, authorized the President to make exceptions in his discretion. The attitude of President Taft, as explained by officials here, is to permit the Mexican Government to buy whatever it pleases in this country. This is no violation of neutrality, it is stated, as the belligerency of the revolutionists has not been recognized. Extreme precautions will be taken to prevent war supplies consigned to the Mexican Government from falling into the hands of the rebels who are denied the privilege of receiving such materials under the President's proclamation.

FIRE ON FRENCH LINER.

St. Nazaire, France, March 31.—An outbreak of fire to-day in the bunkers of the new French Line La France, was gotten under control quickly and did slight damage. The sailing of the steamer on April 20 on her maiden voyage will not be affected.

FRENCH PROTECTORATE OVER MOROCCO SIGNED

Paris, March 31.—The treaty establishing a French protectorate over Morocco has been signed by the Sultan, according to a despatch from Fez. The treaty contains ten articles, some of which are identical with the terms of the Bardo treaty of 1881, which assured to France the right to occupy the position which the French military authorities might deem necessary to the maintenance of order in Tunis.

FRANCE'S REPLY TO SPAIN REGARDING MOROCCO

Madrid, March 31.—The French Ambassador, M. Geoffroy, to-day handed to the Spanish Foreign Minister, Senor Prieto, France's answer to the last Spanish note defining a portion of the Spanish zone in Morocco. Although the strictest secrecy has been observed as to the contents of the communication, it is understood that France's reply is a decided step towards an arrangement of the differences which have arisen in the negotiations.

CUSTOMS RECEIPTS AT MONTREAL

Montreal, Que., March 31.—Receipts at the Custom House for the fiscal year just closed amounted to \$19,952,789, against \$18,327,193 for the previous year. Every month showed an increase over the corresponding month of 1910-1911. The receipts for March, 1912, were \$1,881,847, against \$1,825,217 in March, 1911, although there was one working day less this March than last. The March revenue at the Inland Revenue Office this year was \$747,638, against \$643,869 in March, 1911.

PRECAUTIONS AGAINST SMALLPOX OUTBREAK

Montreal, Que., March 31.—The Health Department is taking great precautions against an outbreak of smallpox in this city with the opening of navigation when the longshoremen return to Montreal from the lumber and railway camps throughout the province in districts where smallpox has been epidemic.

Dr. Louis Laberge, Medical Health Officer, has written to the heads of the transportation and steamship companies, reminding them of the by-law which fixes on the employers the responsibility of having employees vaccinated.

SAD DEATH OF A YOUNG ENGLISH GIRL

Winnipeg, Man., March 31.—The year-old English girl who had been mysteriously disappearing from the home of Grace Brice, the twenty-four-year-old woman, since Friday afternoon, has been cleared up by the discovery of her body in the scrub of a South End subdivision. She was subject to melancholia, and doubtless wandered away and fell a victim to exposure in the unusual storm of Friday night. There will be no inquest. Deceased came with her family from Herne Bay, England, 18 months ago and has acted as organist of Maryland Methodist Church.

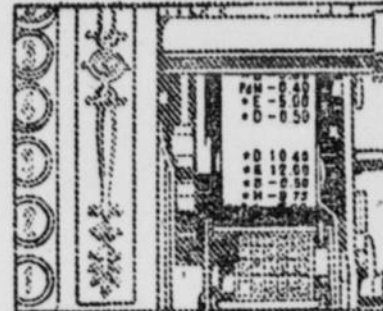

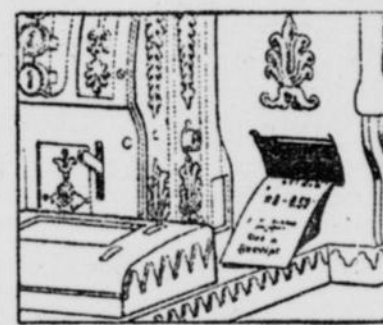

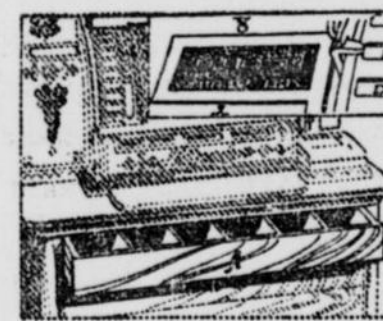

QUEBEC CURLING CLUB DINNER

Successful and Enjoyable
Event on Saturday Night—
Presentation of Prizes.

As usual, the annual dinner of the Quebec Curling Club was a most pleasant and enjoyable event. The gathering on Saturday night was a large one, and it was a typical curlers' assembly, good-fellowship reigning supreme. Mr. Arch. Miller, president, presided with rare tact and ability, the vice chair being occupied by Mr. T. J. Delany, vice president. The menu was a sumptuous one, and it was done full justice to by the guests. After the good things provided had disappeared with commendable celerity, Mr. Miller called the assembly to order, and proposed the toast of "His Majesty the King," which was received in the usual loyal manner.

Then cigars were lit and song, speech and sentiment followed in rapid succession, the evening passing almost too quickly. The speeches were all good, while the music was greatly appreciated, all of the performers acquitting themselves with great effect.

The toast of the Canadian Branch of the Royal Caledonia Curling Club was proposed in appropriate terms by the chairman, and was responded to by Mr. Edwin Pope, one of the oldest and most highly esteemed members of the Quebec club, in the unavoidable absence of Dr. Finnie. It was a brotherly game, which made people better acquainted with each other, and taught them that no matter from what race they came they could and should unite to promote the interests and the progress of the country.

Rev. S. T. Martin, chaplain of the club, spoke of the rest and recreation which the game afforded. The busy business man felt better after a little turn on the ice, and many difficulties which oft seem insurmountable were brushed away when he returned to his task. The reverend gentleman also enlarged upon the fellowship which the game promoted.

He alluded to the speech of Mr. Langlais, which, he said, he had followed with deep interest, and his remarks were those of a broad-minded man, and although he spoke only unofficially for the city might yet be found a good man for mayor.

PRESIDENT TAFT HITTING BACK

At Roosevelt — Styles Him a Noisy Reformer Who Represents the People.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 30.—At the Ohio Society dinner President Taft spoke of the recall of judges, defended the Constitution, said that his administration had been progressive and pointed out some of the reasons why he thought it was progressive. In speaking of the recall of judges, the President said: "I am here to express my gratitude for the demonstration given by this country that all the surface talking and lecturing does not represent the opinion of the people. We are conservative people, ready for progress on a conservative basis."

Mr. Taft spoke of "noisy reformers" who make plans for reform without having worked out a scheme that had any basis.

The President replied indirectly to the question raised by some of his political opponents "shall the people rule?" He said that he himself had been elected President by only 8 per cent of the total population of the United States. Unless adult women and children and others who did not now possess suffrage were given the right to vote, he said this is about as near as we can ever come to popular government.

In a brief speech before the American Academy of Political and Social Science, Mr. Taft touched on the anti-trust law, and spoke of the plan for placing corporations under national supervision. He said he was in favor of enforcing the Sherman law just like any other law.

Mr. Taft said that when he became President he looked around and appointed a lawyer attorney general, who in turn looked around and organized a legal staff, which, while not seeking headlines in the newspapers, "began suits for the enforcement of the law."

GREAT HOME RULE MEETING IN DUBLIN

Many Thousands of People Present, With One Hundred Bands.

Dublin, March 31.—Many thousands of residents and others who arrived on special trains attended a great Home Rule demonstration here today. Four big platforms had been erected on O'Connell street, from which the speakers addressed the crowds. Also the buildings in the vicinity were decorated. A hundred bands anticipated, and the principal corporations, except that of Belfast, attended in state.

Green flags with the words "We Want Home Rule" were displayed everywhere. John E. Redmond, leader of the Irish parliamentary party; William Redmond, M. P. for East Clare; John Dillon, M. P. for East Mayo; Joseph Devlin, M. P. for Belfast, and John J. Clancy, M. P. for the north division of Dublin, were among the speakers.

John Redmond predicted that a Home Rule Parliament would be established on College Green sooner than the most sanguine there expected.
