Richard Nixon wins in nip and tuck fight

NEW YORK (AP) — The American Broadcasting Co. declared Richard M. Nixon the winner of the presidential race at 8:20 a.m. EST today by giving Illinois to the former vice-president. It said Illinois' 26 votes gave Nixon 287 electoral votes, with 270 needed for election.

Heavy voting in Tuesday's election produced a marathon stalemate that threatened to delay a decision until Dec. 16 and perhaps until the new 91st Congress—still under Democratic party control—could tackle the deadlock Jan. 6.

For Nixon, 55, the former vice-president, it was a rerun in many respects of his paper-thin loss in 1960 to John F. Kennedy. The results in the major states of Illinois, California and Ohio controlled the outcome.

The magic number required to put either man over the top was 270 of the 538 Electoral College votes. George Wallace's third-party, running strongest in the South, played a big part in

the long impasse.

Nixon, who had watched Vice-President Humphrey come with a rush in the final days, had a lead in the vital Electoral College totals, but not enough Americans voting for a presi-

dent actually choose slates of persons by state who comprise the college. These slates normally support the candidate getting the most votes in each state.

In cut-and-dried presidential contests, the electors meet in

state capitals Dec. 16 as a formality.

But twice before, the last time 144 years ago, no decision could be reached and the House of Representatives had to make the decision.

Voting had been heavy in most areas, normally a good sign for the Democrats who outnumber Republicans on the basis of registered party memberships.

The turnout was expected to surpass the record 71,000,000 who voted in 1964.

In comparison with the indecisive three-way presidential contest, the selection of the 91st Congress ran relatively smoothly—and for an eighth consecutive time produced Democratic party control.

Thirty-four of the 100 Senate seats were refilled. Republicans, needing a net gain of 14 seats, made some yards but fell far short of a bare majority of 51.

All 435 House of Representative seats were renewed for

two-year terms and the Democrats, who now have held control in 34 of the last 38 years, turned back Republican challenges.

HARDLY MADE A DENT

The Republicans needed a net gain of 30 seats for a bare ruling edge of 218 and hardly made a dent.

In the event the House of Representatives had to pick a presidential winner, Humphrey was expected to count on support from 26 of the 50 state delegations—each with one vote—for victory.

The threat of an indecisive election that Congress must solve had been spawned months ago as George Wallace began putting together his American Independent Party.

Nixon's early campaign lead, nourished by Humphrey's late start and the party discord displayed at the chaotic Chicago Democratic nominating convention, had eased the prospect somewhat.

House leader urges Cardinal to resign

QUEBEC (CP) — Education Minister Jean-Paul Cardinal was urged Tuesday to follow the example of Alain Peyrefitte, former French education minister, and resign his cabinet post.

The invitation came from Pierre Laporte, house leader of the Liberal Opposition, who said Mr. Cardinal "has done nothing worthwhile so far" to solve the education crisis in Quebec.

Mr. Laporte told the legislature's education committee that Mr. Peyrefitte resigned following the French student riots of last May, and President de Gaulle called a general election on the issue.

"The Quebec government also will come to this before too long, in spite of itself," he said.

"We have the feeling of living on a volcano."

Mr. Laporte said thousands of

students are facing the loss of an entire school year because of "the administrative scandal" in the huge Chambly regional high school in his riding.

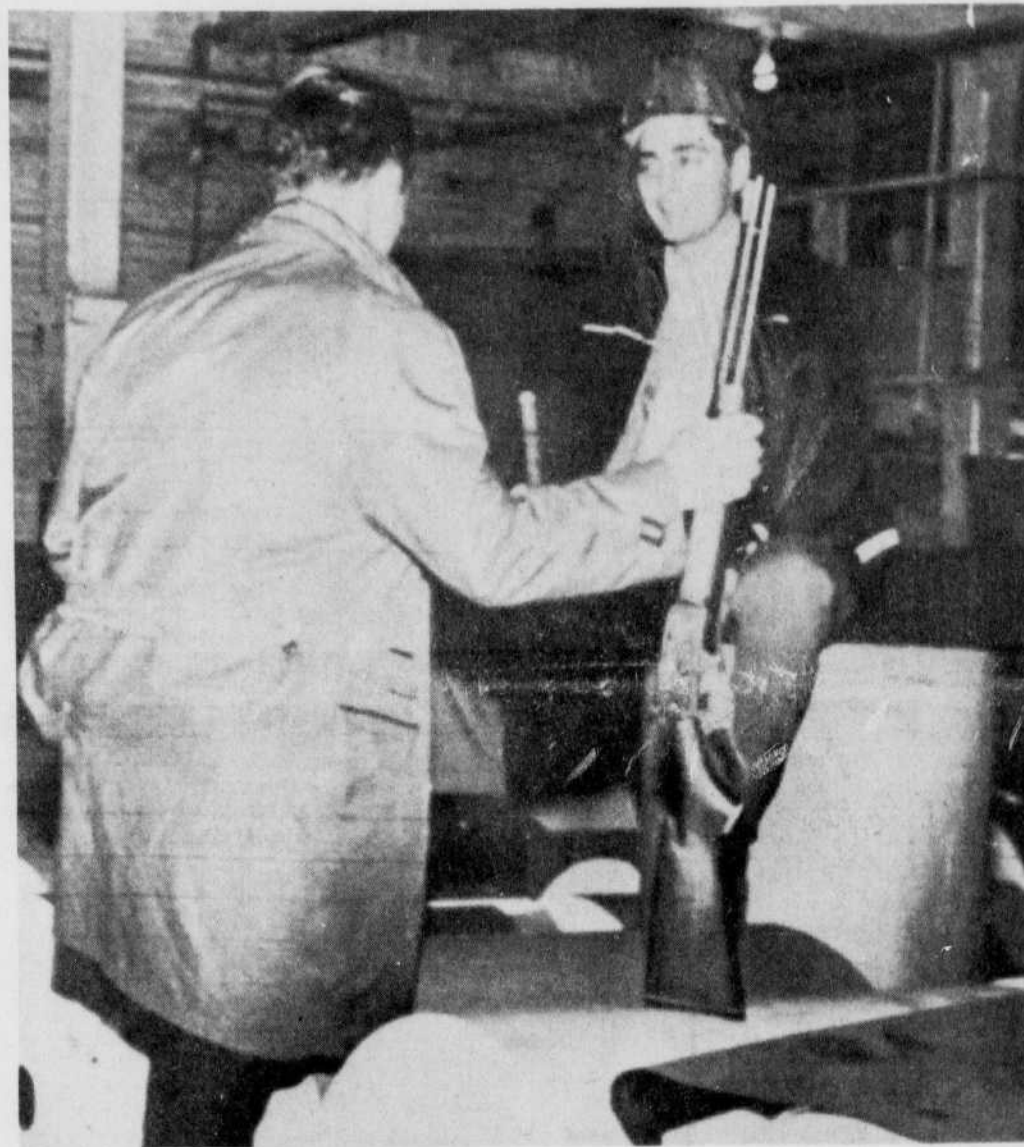
He urged the minister to answer the vital questions being asked by students, teachers and parents, and to explain and justify the Chambly situation.

"Unless he does these two things, I believe he has no alternative but to imitate his French colleague, Mr. Alain Peyrefitte, and submit his resignation."

Mr. Cardinal said the Quebec school crisis is not comparable to the one in France.

"The school crisis here has been the calmest and shortest in any Western country."

The education minister said he will continue his reply next Tuesday when the education committee sits again.

Bellemare hopes for 'good news' as Domtar workers march outside

QUEBEC (CP) — While 200 men outside demanded "justice for the workers," Labor Minister Maurice Bellemare told the legislature Tuesday he hopes for "good news" that will help resolve the strike against Domtar Pulp and Paper Ltd. plants in the Eastern Townships.

Mr. Bellemare said conciliator Real Mireault met both union and management representatives Tuesday in the wake of the armed take-over of the Windsor, Que. mill that ended Monday.

"I hope I will be able to bring the House good news about the resumption of talks with a view

to establishing grounds for agreement," Mr. Bellemare said.

It was later announced that conciliator Real Mireault of the labor department had received instructions to try to get Domtar and union negotiators back to the bargaining table.

The demonstrators from the Windsor and East Angus mills, among 1,200 on strike since July 18 for higher wages, demonstrated quietly with placards.

'THOUGHT MEANS JUST'

Mr. Bellemare said occupation of the mill by about 150 men, some armed with rifles, was "a means which they

thought was just."

The labor department was "still ready to hear both parties" despite last Friday's break in negotiations over what Domtar called "intimidation of security personnel and plant foremen" by strikers.

The company would resume talks when the union—the National Union of Pulp and Paper Workers—"decides to respect law and order."

In Montreal Tuesday night, Domtar said in a statement the Windsor mill's occupation was "regrettable" and "damage to the mill is extensive." No estimate was given.

The union, an affiliate of the Confederation of National Trade Unions which bargains for the workers, called the strike to back demands for a 35-cent hourly increase over two years.

The men were earning an average of \$2.96 an hour in their previous contract and rejected a draft agreement reached in October which would have provided a 30-cent hourly increase over three years.

First transplant

MOSCOW (Reuters) — The first Soviet human heart transplant operation was carried out in Leningrad Monday, the defence ministry newspaper Red Star reports.

The newspaper says the operation was performed by a group of military surgeons on a 25-year-old woman. It did not say who was the donor of the new heart.

Ministers go home with lots to ponder about

OTTAWA (CP) — Finance Minister Edgar Benson has sent his provincial counterparts away empty handed but with plenty of ponder about future tax-sharing deals in the six weeks before they meet again.

The two-day federal-provincial finance conference agreed, as expected, to leave personal income tax collection in federal hands, with distribution of the provincial shares as at present.

The conference disagreed on the revenue from Mr. Benson's new, two-per-cent income tax being reserved for the federal treasury instead of being shared.

The ministers suspended judgment on a federal plan to turn over some shared-cost welfare programs completely to the provinces along with a bigger piece of tax revenue.

Provincial ministers left Tuesday night unhappy about federal taxing and welfare policies, but with general willingness to consider seriously the federal plan to withdraw from welfare and hand more revenue to the provinces, on the pattern of present Ottawa-Quebec arrangements.

Quebec and Ontario in particular are angry because Mr. Benson bluntly refused to apply the same compensation-for-opting-out formula to medical care.

Mr. Benson took a contrary view, saying Mr. Bennett "tried to convince me he was a better bookkeeper than I am," but failed.

WILL STUDY NEEDS

As a start towards trying to clear up some pressing differences, the ministers decided to reactivate their 1966 tax structure committee to assess needs in preparation for meetings on tax sharing Dec. 19, and next year.

The federal and provincial ministers also will exchange ideas by correspondence on how to deal with what Mr. Benson called "the spiralling costs of post-secondary education," a field in which the federal treasury helps with capital expenses.

In combination with a parallel meeting of health ministers, the closed conference agreed to set up a committee to study cost-trimming in health-service grants.

Mr. Benson attached some cash figures to his slightly-revised renewal of a 1966 offer to reimburse the provinces for taking over full responsibility for hospital insurance, provincial

pension supplements and national health grants.

He said these programs now cost the federal treasury \$1.-215,000,000 a year. The provinces would get the same amount under his hand-over formula—\$835,000,000 in additional percentage of total income-tax revenue, \$95,000,000 in equalization grants to raise the take for poorer provinces and "adjustments" of \$285,000,000.

Ontario and Quebec had said that their citizens should be ex-

empt from the new two-per-cent tax or reimbursed, arguing that the so-called social development tax is meant to meet federal costs for a medical care program neither one has joined.

Mr. Benson insists the new tax is for general welfare costs, not just medical care.

Quebec Premier Jean-Jacques Bertrand said Mr. Benson's refusal to exempt Quebec from the tax was "genuine domineering federalism."

Munro must explain why delegates left angry

OTTAWA (CP) — Provincial health ministers went home bristling Tuesday, leaving federal Health Minister John Munro to explain why they are angry.

Explain he did at an hour-long news conference after the two-day federal-provincial health conference behind closed doors.

He distributed a 1,500-word communique that announced sweeping federal withdrawals from a number of shared-cost health programs—and reported in several instances provincial disapproval of the moves.

The conference was called to, among other things, clarify participation in and soaring costs of the national medical care insurance program. However, the program's future was left more uncertain than ever.

Left unclear were these points: Will the federal government opt out of direct participation in the insurance scheme within five years as allowed by the operative legislation? Which provinces will participate in the scheme?

Mr. Munro said there is concern in several provinces that the federal government is pressing them to participate while withdrawing itself. "We're going ahead," he said.

Asked later to square this with Prime Minister Trudeau's statement Monday in the Commons that his government would exercise its option to get out—while giving the provinces additional tax compensation—Mr. Munro said: "That is not my understanding."

J. Donovan Ross, Alberta health minister, told reporters

that if the federal government is so concerned about a national insurance program "they'd better take over the whole damn thing and run it themselves."

Quebec Health Minister Jean-Paul Cloutier took a different tack. He said he would like to ask Mr. Trudeau: "What prevents you from withdrawing immediately? Why wait five years? Medical care is a provincial responsibility."

R. R. Loffmark, British Columbia health services minister, said he was left with the impression the federal government will force implementation of medical care insurance.

"It seems to me that medicare cannot become an effective national program without the co-operation of Ontario and Quebec and of the medical professions in those provinces."

Mr. Munro gave this rundown on the status of participation in the scheme:

Saskatchewan and British Columbia are already in; Nova Scotia and Manitoba have announced they will join; New Brunswick, Alberta and Newfoundland are "giving consideration" to joining; Ontario and Quebec had not stated their position; and Prince Edward Island's position "is quite unclear."

One achievement of the conference was a decision to create a high-level federal-provincial committee to discuss and pool information and recommend to health ministers ways and means to maintain the cost of health services "at a reasonable level."

Lifted curfew is seen as an agreement with Palestine

AMMAN (AP) — The government lifted a curfew over Amman at midnight Tuesday night amid indications that Jordanian King Hussein had reached an agreement with rebellious Palestinian commandos.

Palestinian guerrilla sources in Damascus, Syria, reported an agreement had been reached during a meeting between Hussein and leaders of four commando groups in Jordan. They said the commando leaders telephoned the news from the royal palace in Amman, but there was no official Jordanian confirmation.

Machine-gun bursts sounded in scattered sections of this capital city Tuesday night, but they

were believed to be warning shots for curfew violators.

The government had lifted the curfew earlier in the day, then reimposed it and later called it off again.

Outside Amman, a fire broke out near a camp housing Palestinian refugees. It was believed to have been connected with the two-day confrontation between Hussein and the dissident guerrillas.

Widespread fighting broke out Monday between some Palestinian commandos using Jordan as a base for forays against Israel and the Jordanian army.

17 KILLED

Unofficial reports said 17 persons were killed and 40 wounded

but diplomatic reports placed the number at more than 25 killed and about 70 wounded on both sides.

In Damascus, Syria, representatives of guerrilla groups operating in Jordan said that a bloody showdown between Hussein's army and the commandos was inevitable.

One representative asserted that the situation in Amman was explosive and the country was "teetering on the brink of civil war."

Amman authorities said they had arrested the ringleaders of the Victory Phalanges, a splinter guerrilla group accused of setting off Monday's fighting, and the army continued to round up suspected elements.

News in brief

Delay vote

CHICAGO (AP) — Illinois' vote in the presidential election was delayed early today after an attempt to mechanically relay the vote from a computer centre in St. Louis failed.

The St. Louis operation was responsible for counting the ballots cast for president, Senate, governor and House of Representatives.

The computer operation failed late Tuesday night and after a standby computer could not tally the vote correctly, an attempt was made to send the returns mechanically.

Figures were being expedited through the computers again and returns were expected shortly.

A monopoly?

MONTREAL (CP) — Milk handling should become a municipal monopoly to avoid the expensive middleman, the Quebec branch of the Consumers Association of Canada was told Tuesday.

Max Saltsman (NDP—Waterloo) said the middleman method of marketing milk in which the farmer, dairy and distributor are all involved in getting the product to the consumer is "illogical and expensive."

If milk became a product of the municipality, there would be one central receiving and clearing house for the product.

Standards would be equal and consumers would not be confused by advertising.

Grits repulsed again

QUEBEC (CP) — The Liberal Opposition was repulsed again Tuesday in its attempts to find out what the government plans to do about the Chambly Transport strike, which has deprived 10 Montreal suburbs of bus service since Sept. 13.

Pierre Laporte, Liberal house leader, asked whether Municipal Affairs Minister Robert Lussier had any solutions to offer following his recent meeting with mayors of the affected suburbs.

Mr. Lussier replied that a committee has been studying the problem for some time.

The minister said Monday he would not intervene in the dispute, but the government would introduce legislation soon enabling municipalities to subsidize private transportation companies.

This would permit the Montreal suburbs on the south shore of the St. Lawrence River to assist Chambly Transport Co., which has said it cannot afford to pay drivers a \$1.25 increase to their present hourly pay of \$2.25.

Will continue

VATICAN CITY (CP) — Paul-Emile Cardinal Leger says he plans to continue working with the lepers of Cameroon and will extend his missionary work into other African countries as well.

The former Roman Catholic archbishop of Montreal, who left Canada a year ago to work among African lepers, said he plans to open another dispensary to serve Cameroon's 2,000 lepers.

Home and school apathy revealed

A crowd of about 45 turned out Monday night at Sherbrooke High School to hear Robert Beale, leader of the St. Leonard's school parents group in suburban Montreal speak about the situation there.

45 people that are interested than 100 who don't give a damn."

He left it to the members to pose questions from the floor.

"What's wrong with your home and school association?" asked a man sitting near the front. "Has it served its purpose?"

"I really don't know what's

the matter," replied Mr. Morris. "I'd hate to think that home and school has served its purpose."

Miss Marguerite Knapp, the vice-president of the Provincial Association of Protestant Teachers representing the off-island branches and president of the Eastern Townships Association of teachers suggested that per-

haps individual participation would be the key.

Miss Knapp who teaches at Lennoxville described the home and school there as a going concern for 10 years.

Bachand 737 to 632 votes. Former mayor J. Maurice Beauchemin retired prior to the election.

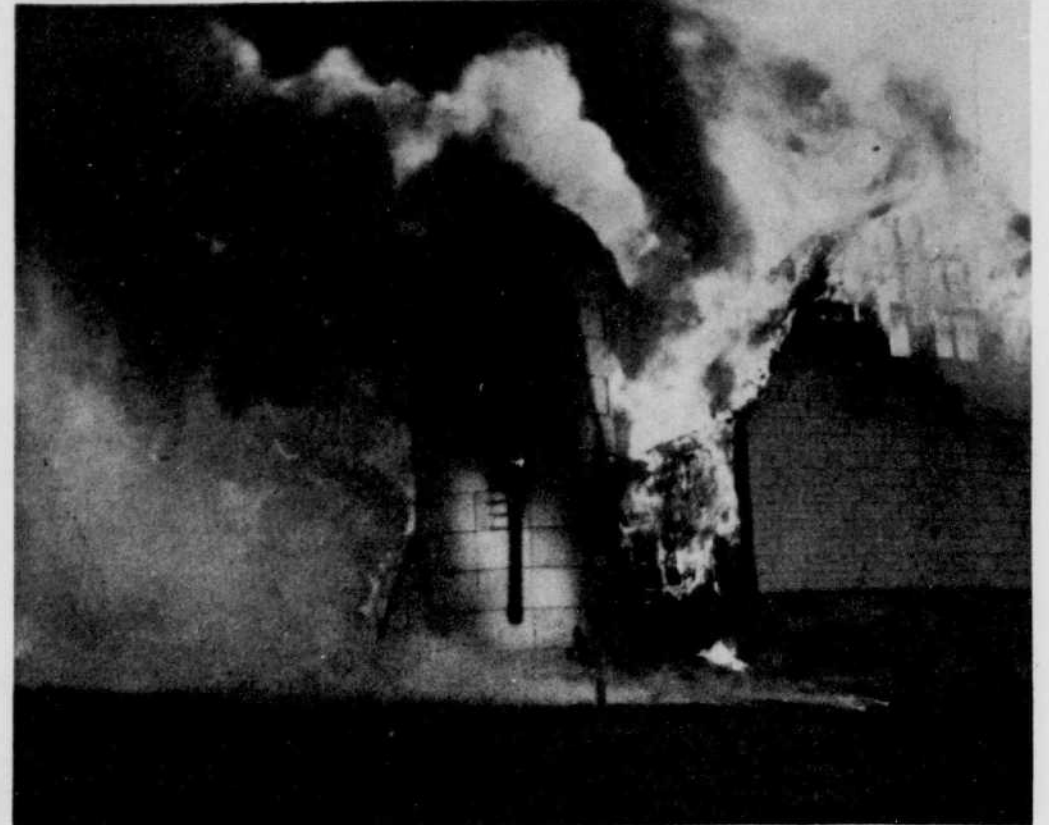
Alderman Armand Larivee

Derby Line barn is levelled in fire with heavy losses

DERBY LINE — (Special) — Fire levelled the large dairy barn on the farm of Robert Smith on the Derby Line-Holland Road about mid morning on Monday, Nov. 4.

The fire was first noticed by Mr. Smith's hired man, Arthur Howard, who sounded the alarm. Neighbors and the Derby Line fire department quickly responded to the call for help and some 70 head of cattle which had been in the barn a week were released and driven out of the burning structure. A bull and a calf perished in the blaze.

Also burned in the 152-foot-long barn were the corn blower and the season's crop of hay, which included several tons.

The Derby Line fire department was assisted by the Rock Island fire department. Both used the water from their pumper tanks on the fire trucks. Fortunately the wind was in the west. A south or east wind would have endangered the house.

Just 20 years ago a barn on the same site was destroyed by fire. It was owned by Mr. Smith then. The farm was formerly owned by Henry Demick.

When asked if he would rebuild again, Mr. Smith shook his head and replied, "One can't make that quick a decision." There is some insurance to cover the loss.

Ben Blais, fire chief, Derby Line, said the cause of the fire is unknown, but he definitely ruled out spontaneous combustion. According to the new fire laws, the fire investigation is under the Vermont State police department.

The stock is being sold by a Commission Sale. The loss is estimated at several thousand dollars.

CGEP student gets three months

Sessions Court Judge Benoit Turmel sentenced Richard Ladouceur, 19, 1092 Grosvenor Street, to three months imprisonment. Ladouceur pleaded guilty to charges of breaking and entering Wilfrid Dallaire's home at 1460 Dominion Street, December 26, 1967, when \$2,926.95 in assorted merchandise was stolen, at the residence of Dr. Andre Trudel, 1282 Dominion Street, on the same date, when \$1,000 in assorted household effects were stolen, at the home of Claude Cote, 1235 Dominion Street, on the same date when \$430 in household wares were stolen, and to having broken and entered at the home of Emile Bruneau, 636 Ontario Street, February 10, 1968, with the intent of committing a crime.

Defence Lawyer Albert Gobeil told the bench that Ladouceur had not materially gained from the robberies, but had been led into the crimes, and acted mainly as a watchman.

Mr. Gobeil doubted that his CGEP client had netted over \$75 in goods or cash.

Mr. Gobeil told Judge Turmel that Ladouceur was rehabilitable, and that his parents and brothers and sisters have been the subjects of derision since his arrest. Mr. Gobeil suggested that the accused be given a light sentence in order that he might complete his scholastic year.

Crown Prosecutor Andre Langlais said that the accused had been most cooperative with the police, and that he subscribed to the remarks of the defence. Mr. Langlais suggested that the minimum term that could be reasonably imposed would be three months.

Judge Turmel, noting that Ladouceur had spent six weeks in detention, sentenced him to three months from Monday to be served concurrently in each case.

Marc Madore, 20, and Michel Madore, 19, both of 578 11th Street, Thetford Mines, were sentenced to six and four months imprisonment respectively by Sessions Court Judge Benoit Turmel. The brothers were charged with evading legal custody, theft of firearms, and automobile thefts on October 28.

They evaded legal custody by escaping from the Thetford Jail, stole a .22 calibre rifle, the property of the East Angus Municipal Police, and a vehicle that belonged to Dieudonne Cliche of

Weedon. They were not represented. Michel Cote acted for the Crown.

Gerard Gobeil, 29, 100 Court Street, Sherbrooke, pleaded guilty to four charges of breaking and entering and theft, one of making a false declaration to induce the police in error, and one of breaking and entering with intent to commit a crime.

All the breaking and entering charges were in schools, and Crown Prosecutor Andre Langlais suggested that sentence be deferred to November 14. Gobeil was remanded to cells pending sentence.

Judge Benoit Turmel acquitted Roger Larouche, 23, 280 Labrecque Street, Arvida, on a charge of automobile theft, at Stratford, October 10.

Judge Turmel said it was "a classic case of joy-riding," after hearing testimony from the victims, Yvon Morissette, 24, of Disraeli, and that of the accused.

Mr. Larouche was represented by Jean Cormier, the Crown by Mr. Michel Cote.

The Danville Hotel was found guilty in absentia, of a charge under the liquor act. Judge Turmel fined hotel owner Robert Leblanc \$500 and costs, in default 90 days, and ordered the hotel's liquor license suspended for one month. This was the second infraction under the liquor act within a calendar year.

October warm sunnier than last year

October this year was warmer than the previous year.

According to figures released by the Lennoxville Research Station, the average temperature for October in the ET was 49 degrees, two degrees up from the same month.

The average maximum temperature for the month was 58 degrees, again two degrees up from last year's 56, while the average minimum temperature for the month was 40 as compared to 38 last year.

And the sun shone more this year in October than in the previous year. Total number of sunshine hours for the month was 143.7 as compared to 109.6 last year. In 1963 which recorded the highest monthly sunshine for October, it was 205.9 hours and the lowest was in 1917 with 81.1 hours.

Rainfall for October totalled 2.81 inches as compared to 4.09 inches of last year. The highest monthly rainfall was in 1919 when a total of 6.63 inches of rain fell on the ET area. And the lowest was in 1963 with .63 inches of rain.

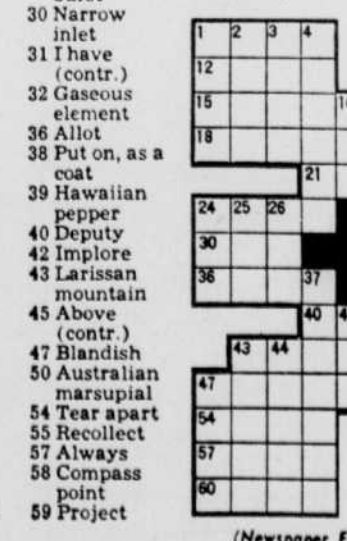

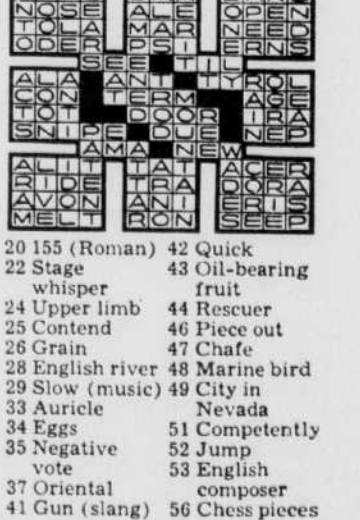

Rotary Fellow studying here sees Canadian culture as link

Bernard Badoux, the Rotary Foundation Fellow, who is studying at the University of Sherbrooke, addressed the Sherbrooke Rotary Club last night at the New Sherbrooke Hotel.

Mr. Badoux compared certain aspects of North American living, as opposed to that of his native country, France. Mr. Badoux's conclusions were that Canada lies somewhere between the North American and European cultures.

Mr. Badoux said that "he was amazed at the proximity of high rise buildings near the old quarter of Montreal, and the old quarter reminded him of certain arrondissements in Paris."

Mr. Badoux outlined some humorous events in Montreal, he was riding on an MTC bus, realized that he was lost, and asked the driver for directions, "I couldn't understand what he was saying," said Mr. Badoux, "so I asked him to speak French to me." He replied, "I am speaking French. We then spoke English and the situation was cleared up."

In a more serious vein, Mr. Badoux told of some of the

reasons that created the student and labor unrest in France last May. Mr. Badoux said, "The educational system in France is identical to the one founded in 1791, and a small group of students showed their displeasure when they were not permitted to have a hand in co-administration. They are not trained to use their knowledge after they graduate, and are employed."

"The solution is either the creation of more employment, or a reduction in the number of students at the university level," said Mr. Badoux. "And courses must be directed towards giving students adequate training for employment."

Mr. Badoux said, "That similar problems effect workers, and this was the reason that the French economy nearly ground to a halt during the May strikes."

Mr. Badoux attributed president de Gaulle's adamant stand on refusing Britain entry into the Common Market to the fact that Britain originally turned down the opportunity of joining, and when they did apply, they were not willing to give priority to European goods, while they were still willing to accord priorities to Commonwealth goods."

Mr. Badoux said that he was most impressed with the patience of Americans visiting the

White House, as they wander slowly through the ten rooms that are open for public inspection. "Nobody can visit the Champs Elysees in the same fashion, as it is not open for public inspection."

Scientific valuation for taxation equality

One of the first requirements for equitable taxation of properties contained in wide areas such as those embraced in the regional school boards is that the municipalities concerned adopt a system of scientific valuation.

When the valuation of properties within a municipality is made on a scientific basis, injustices between properties inside the community are removed but there is a logical base upon which to build a regional tax structure.

By ordering the preparation of the town valuation roll by a firm of experts in this field, the Lennoxville councillors are taking an important step towards justice for not only the municipal taxpayers but for those who will be paying taxes to the regional board when the new school comes into operation.

Whether the roll is based on 50, 70 or 100 per cent of the real valuation is a comparative detail, either in the municipal or educational field.

The town councils can adjust their mill rate to assure the proprietor pays no more on a 100 per cent valuation than he does on 70 per cent.

And provincial legislation requires that the valuation rolls of the municipalities in a school region be adjusted upward or downward to make the actual tax rate uniform.

Thus a municipality valuing at 60 per cent will be subject to a surcharge of 25 per cent if the regional board decides on a 75 per cent valuation rate and those calling for full valuation will receive a corresponding credit.

Night court benefits

In calling for the reform of the court system in Quebec which he describes as being 100 years old and not geared to the needs of the present day, Premier Jean-Jacques Bertrand has challenged the judges and the lawyers to press hard for an updating of the legal practises in this province.

But responsibility for some of the changes he suggests lies with the Premier himself as head of the provincial administration, especially the commendable proposal to establish night courts to speed up the administration of justice.

The establishment of night courts could be effected by the passage of legislation to this end or perhaps more simply by an order-in-council directing that certain judges be assigned to night duty.

Night courts have been established in many United States cities and are proving valuable in the disposal of minor cases, especially those involving the payment of a small fine.

Under existing practise an individual prepared to plead guilty to a routine offence if arrested during the night must either spend the night in the cells or provide bail and appear in court at a later date.

In many cases this involves the accused in the loss of a day's pay which may exceed the fine and costs imposed for the offence.

Similarly the provincial government could take the lead in improving the system of legal aid for low income groups by increasing the nominal amount now made available for this purpose and by eliminating much of the red tape which adds to the cost of all legal proceedings.

For instance, why could not many summonses and writs be despatched by registered mail instead of personal delivery by bailiffs?

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He's even tougher than 'no softie' Dief

OTTAWA—Whether you were for or against him on his position in the aid-for-Biafra issue, you must give Prime Minister Trudeau this: his was a firm, solid-as-a-rock stand. And he has budged not an inch.

The pressure was immense. Bringing it to bear, day after day, was the Opposition, united for once, in a Conservative-New Democratic front.

But also turning on the heat were numerous, though by no means all Canadian churchmen, student activists, some academics and such odd sorts as the Montreal grandmother who fasted for a week and slept in the cold stone portico of the East Block.

As together they turned the screws on the prime minister, he began feeling some pain, and in what he was to immediately

admit was a fit of temper, he called some of them "bleeding hearts," and "pious Canadians," and "world-savers."

He even suggested — and you could almost hear the silent cheers of the great majority of non-activist Canadians — that if it came to "world-saving," there were places here at home where it might be a good idea to begin.

Then in that confrontation at Halifax with Dalhousie University students picketing for Biafra, he tartly told them "put your money where your mouth is, and join the Red Cross."

This is a new, tough kind of prime minister, infinitely tougher than Lester Pearson who always found it so easy to knuckle under to pressure and say yes, and tougher even than John Diefenbaker who was no softie.

After standing off the students, the taxpayers gave it to him — the way he wanted to hear it — at the Halifax "talk-in," with a series of questions as to why there had to be all that worrying about Biafra. Why let it take up so much time and attention of the government, they asked him, when there was no lack of things to worry about here at home, including poverty and deprivation, and if not actually starvation, then certainly hunger, among pensioners, Indians, Eskimos and other "have-nots."

But the way things are, with the activists getting most of the attention, he really didn't get to hear much from those who couldn't get all that excited and who definitely opposed a New Democratic suggestion that not only food but arms be sent to Biafra.

The way it is with the activists was clearly demonstrated in the three-hour student "sit-in" in External Affairs Minister Sharp's House of Commons office and their three-day "camp-out" around the Centennial Flame on Parliament Hill.

The students' leader, Toronto University undergrad Irving Weisdorf, spelled it out.

He appeared at the doors of the Press Gallery to announce that "protesters" had taken over Mitchell Sharp's office, were sitting there on the floor and would remain, fasting, for three days.

They were, of course, subsequently carried out, very gently, and deposited under the Peace Tower, to spend the balance of the 72-hour fast huddled around the Centennial Flame.

But to hear it "the way it is,"

as he put it, from Irving Weisdorf.

If it wasn't for press, radio and television, it was suggested directly to him, he and the students would "just go away." "You're so right baby," he laughed. "But you're captive. You and your cameras and microphones and notebooks. You can't ignore us. Like it or not, you're going to have to put us on page one in every paper across the country and onto the national TV news. And that's the way it is baby, and you know it, right?"

Right he was. He was only saying — for different reasons — what had been said here at an Ottawa press conference by Dr. Eugen Gertenmaier, president of the West German Bundestag.

"Danny the Red," reported Dr. Gertenmaier, the student

activist who disrupted German cities and shut down Paris with the strike at the Sorbonne would have been "nothing but a punk kid if it hadn't been for television making an international figure of him."

Perhaps that was in the prime minister's mind. "Danny the Red" and those students — for Biafra, when he remarked that it was essential for the survival of government-by-Parliament that politicians "communicate" directly — and so, more effectively — with the taxpayers.

For to let the role of "communication" go by default exclusively to press, radio and television — especially TV — would be to open the way for "something cold, mass democracy and mob rule," he warned.

Some call him naive

Thant is in good stead with powers

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—Critics have called him naive, unobjective and meddlesome. They have called him everything from Communist emissary to Washington's political broker.

U Thant shrugs it all off as a part of the game. As he begins his eighth year as United Nations secretary-general, the 59-year-old Burmese diplomat seems convinced that he has the support of a great majority of the 125 countries in the organization and that today's critics may be tomorrow's boosters.

This seems to be borne out by the praise he received during the round of policy declarations heard during October in the General Assembly. His supporters far outnumbered those who found fault with him.

Thant is more fortunate than his two predecessors, Trygve Lie and Dag Hammarskjöld, in that he still enjoys good relations with the four big powers. The Russians broke with both Lie and Hammarskjöld, preventing them from serving as a bridge between East and West.

Most of the criticism of Thant has come from private citizens and the press, although he has on occasion been taken to task by high government officials.

When he began his second term Nov. 3, 1966, there was some doubt that Thant would serve out its five years. He accepted re-election reluctantly after announcing he would not be available. One factor was an understanding that he had the right to speak his mind on world problems.

It now seems almost certain he will remain until his term ends in 1971 and thus become

the first man to serve in the post 10 years. He told a recent visitor that at present he has no plans to quit.

Thant believes that as secretary-general he can play a useful role in bringing peace to Southeast Asia and the Middle East and in trying to restore the East-West detente damaged by the Soviet military intervention in Czechoslovakia.

Another factor is his improved health. He has recovered from an ulcer attack which at one time forced him to curtail activities.

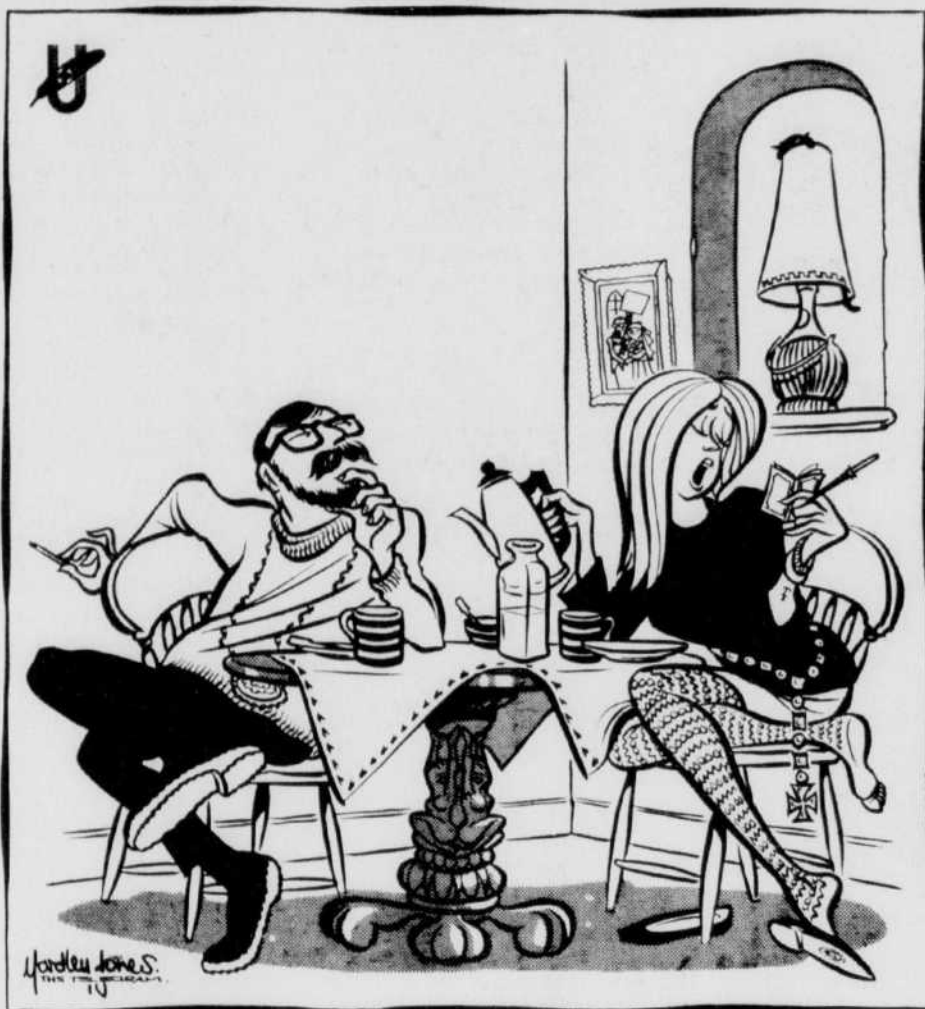
The former journalist-teacher regards himself as a sort of international gadfly who must reflect "the conscience of humanity." He believes that anyone who assumes such a role and speaks out bluntly on controversial matters has to expect a certain amount of hostile reaction.

For months Thant was criticized widely in the United States for his repeated appeals for an unconditional halt of the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam. At one point George W. Ball, former U.S. ambassador at the United Nations, called Thant's bomb-halt proposal naive.

On the Nationalist Chinese island of Formosa, the China News accused him of siding with Hanoi.

The Peking People's Daily, on the other hand, once called Thant "Washington's political broker." The secretary-general also was attacked severely by Hanoi officials last June after he called "barbarous" the rocket attacks against cities in South Vietnam.

Conflicting pressures

King Hussein perches on one of world's shakiest thrones

Rocked by conflicting pressures and passions, King Hussein of Jordan sits on one of the world's shakiest thrones, the future of his diminished Hashemite kingdom weakened by a costly war and an elusive peace.

The government in Amman announced that an attempted uprising by a rebellious unit of Palestine guerrillas Monday had been crushed.

While many Western commentators periodically predict his downfall, the slightly-built, 33-year-old monarch still manages to survive, partly through luck and partly through an ear keenly attuned to traps and treachery.

At one time a bullet which killed his grandfather ricocheted off a medal on Hussein's chest. Another time, Hussein, who suffers from sinus trouble, decided not to use a certain phial of nose drops. The phial later was found to contain acid.

But while Hussein has managed to avert disaster in the past, his current predicament is extremely critical. Of all the Arab leaders, he probably has suffered the most through the six-day Arab-Israeli war of 1967.

Aside from the shattering impact of the war on his military forces, Hussein lost the lucrative west bank of the Jordan River and he is unlikely to get this region back until there is a signed peace with the Israelis or another war with a more favorable outcome for the Arabs.

Hussein appeared at times to be more amenable to the idea of a negotiated peace than other Arab leaders, including a response to the much-pressed Israeli demand for full Arab recognition of the Jewish state. But he was stopped by deep opposi-

tion in his own camp along with opposition from other Arab states.

The situation was complicated by the fact that Arab extremists, with or without Hussein's full support, have based large-scale guerrilla operations in the Jordan Valley, directing forays which have aroused Israeli tempers and retaliation.

SUPPORT RESTRAINED
Part of the reason for Monday's short-lived uprising is that Hussein may not have been overly enthusiastic about these guerrilla operations.

But he seems to have no alternative to giving them at least

token support. If he took unilateral action to sign a peace treaty with Israel, the repercussions in the Arab world, including his own country, would be so explosive that his reign would come to a quick and bitter end. Reports from Amman suggest the split between loyalists and extremists has spread into Hussein's army and cabinet.

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Benevolent Brome sovereignty partisans hold whimsical query

KNOWLTON — (Staff) — The whimsical organizers of the Principality of Brome have stalled their proposed meeting of November 10, from 3 to 5 p.m. The organizers felt that they should grant provincial Opposition Leader Jean Lesage every opportunity to outline his party's policies regarding the language problem without any interference.

This is one of the proposed actions that will indicate the benevolence of the Principality towards lending every spokesman an equal opportunity to voice his opinions at public meetings.

The Principality assumes that all men have the right to free speech within the boundaries of the proposed principality. They do, however, object to being subjected to propaganda that will be televised by the future Quebec television network.

The Principality will request recognition from the Central Government following its formation, and will request that they lend electronic assistance in blacking out any transmissions from the clandestine provincial radio and television outlets.

The provisional group realizes that all adults should have the right to have their children educated under any system of their choice. To avert any rash

actions, such as St. Leonard, there will be but one system of education that will be more than ample in qualifying students for entry in any recognized Canadian university. Parents who feel that they must deviate from the system will be allowed to establish their own system, at their own cost, but the final output must measure up to the Principality's standards.

The Principality expects to establish casinos, a stock market, and provide a duty-free port immediately following its foundation. The revenues from the casino will be used to provide full pensions for all citizens above the age of 65, at the rate of 1,000 scruples per month.

There will be no transportation charges within the Principality of recipients of the old age pension. All hospitalization, medical and surgical costs will be borne by the government.

Assuming the central government concurs, there will be a free interchange of mail, with Canadian postage accepted for out-of-Principality mailing, and local mailing will be handled by a new and exotic series of stamps that are being designed by the Principality. Mail

will be forwarded to Canada via air service, local service will be provided by public transport.

The Principality hopes that its citizens will remain eligible for authentic Canadian passports, and will provide a thorough security clearance on all applicants.

A skilled team of musicians and lyricists are creating a suitable National Anthem. They have been instructed to maintain the warlike overtones of Men of Harlech, while inducing the loving tones of the Italian National Anthem. The latter's overriding length is to be avoided at all costs.

One of the first steps envisaged by the Principality is the immediate nationalization of Hydro facilities. There is a possibility that they will also take over telephonic communications, although this may be deferred to a more auspicious time.

Two of the major tasks that the proposing committee will face at the November 10 meeting are the naming of a member to the UN, as well as the appointment of an ambassador to Ulan Bator. The planning committee feel that the Principality should have a voice in international affairs, as well as

having a reporting centre in Asia.

The planning committee hope that all residents of Brome, as well as ex-residents and friends will turn out for the November 10 meeting, at the Lakeview House, 5 p.m.

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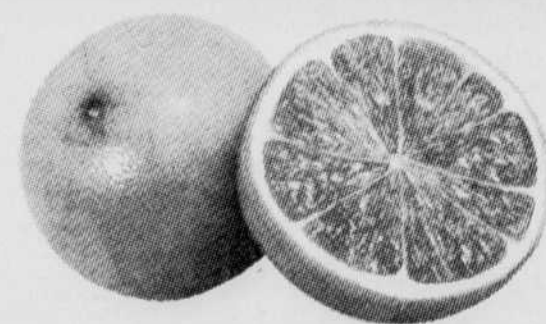

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Walk 'n walk away those tension blues

MONTREAL — "Don't live with your tension, walk it off," says C. K. Herz, president of the National Council for Walking.

One of the most widespread complaints facing modern society: Tension.

It produces headaches, backaches and sleepless nights, resulting in inefficiency at work, irritability at home and often deep depression.

Many sufferers believe that tranquilizers, anti-depressant, pep-up and sleeping pills are the answer to the problem. While they do provide relief for a while they are not a complete cure.

Due to the continuous tension caused by traffic, telephones, competition, high pressure work, crowding in streets and public transport, it is among the city dwellers where the rate of stress appears highest. Mr. Herz pointed out that in many

cases, a short brisk walk, if made a habit, could help, to draw off tension before the more unpleasant aspects, such as extreme irritability and depression set in.

People who do walk, frequently confine their activity to when the weather is mild and pleasant. Now that November is here with the chill of winter in the air, many take to the indoors, emerging on foot only when absolutely necessary.

Those who do this deprive themselves of the enchantment of mist and fog, the crispness of the cold air, the invigorating influence of a high wind. They miss the stimulation and feeling of well-being which often results from a walk under these conditions, Council claims.

Christmas is but weeks away, and this is not always a happy time for everyone. It is a known fact in medical circles that tension often starts to build up as early as November, accompanied by increasing depression as the year draws to a close.

This is not the time to sit and brood, according to the Council. It recommends that those with a tendency towards Christmas Misery start a regular habit of going out for a walk now, regardless of the weather. Clothing loose enough for freedom of movement but warm enough for comfort, and footwear which provides for an easy gait and gives sufficient protection against the cold, plus the will to get out into the fresh air is all that is required. "Walking is an antidote to tension, stress and depression", stated Mr. Herz. "It stimulates an awareness of things outside of your own blue mood and helps you to think out your own problems and put them in proper perspective."

He advises getting off the bus, subway or out of the car some distance from your place of work and walking the rest of the way. He also advocates a walk after the evening meal.

Try pineapple bombe for excitement

As everyone knows, Christmas desserts should be a bit exciting, colorful and very good to eat.

As for excitement, what could be better than an ice cream bombe?

CHRISTMAS PINEAPPLE BOMBE

1 (1-pound, 4½-ounce) can crushed pineapple
3 cups miniature marshmallows
1 teaspoon vanilla
½ teaspoon almond extract

1½ teaspoon salt
½ cup chopped toasted pecans
2 quarts vanilla ice cream

Combine undrained pineapple with marshmallows, flavorings and salt. Cook, stirring occasionally, over low heat until marshmallows melt. Remove from heat. Cool. Add nuts and chill. Line bottom and sides of chilled 7-cup mixing bowl with two-thirds of ice cream. Spoon pineapple mixture into

Directors rap Quebec

MONTREAL (CP) — Six directors of the Syndicat des professeurs de l'état du Québec, among 13 who served brief jail terms for violating an injunction, levelled some heavy criticism Tuesday at Quebec's penal system.

Twelve directors of SPEQ, a teachers' union, were released Saturday and another was set free Monday after serving most of their 20-day terms for ignoring a back-to-work injunction during a 1966 teachers' strike.

The six told a news conference Tuesday they did not receive special treatment in the Quebec City jail, where terms for 12 of them began Oct. 18 and that of the 13th started Oct. 19.

"I am really ashamed of being a citizen of Quebec when it has such a deplorable penal system," said Claude le Lorimer, SPEQ's president.

"Although we were imprisoned under civil law and did not acquire a criminal record, we believe we were more badly treated than those imprisoned under the penal code."

HELD NEAR 'HOLE'
Mr. de Lorimer said the teachers were incarcerated "a few feet away" from the solitary confinement section which prisoners call "the hole."

"That's where we lived in three damp and dark rectangular vaults... clothed in the humiliating garb of the prisoner. We were confined to these

cells so as not to be in contact with the other prisoners. And apparently for this reason we were refused permission to walk in the interior courtyard of the prison."

Only after "strong protest" were they "allowed to go out for one hour." But other prisoners were permitted "three hours out in the open air."

The teachers told reporters the penal system is arbitrary—that visiting time to other prisoners was reduced to 10 minutes from 30 because jail officials said the teachers needed the visiting room.

But the teachers said they had only five minutes on Sundays for visits from relatives and friends.

Aftermath

MONTREAL (CP) — The courtroom aftermath of Montreal's St. Jean Baptiste Day riot last June 24 continued Tuesday when 14 persons were each fined \$50 and costs for disturbing a public assembly.

The 14 were charged originally with participating in a riot, but were allowed to plead guilty to the lesser charge—a misdemeanor rather than a criminal infraction, which would not give them a criminal record.

Suicide

MONTREAL (CP) — Arthur Pinsonneault, 41, Quebec's sixth-most-wanted criminal committed suicide Monday while trying to escape police who wanted to question him concerning a traffic offence.

Pinsonneault died in hospital here Monday noon after he shot himself. He was carrying two revolvers—one his own and one taken from a city policeman who had stopped him for driving through a stop sign.

Pinsonneault was wanted for a \$4,000 armed robbery of savings bonds at St. Severin de Proulxville, 30 miles north of Trois Rivières, last May 17.

The shooting took place in the Cote des Neiges area of the city after police forced Pinsonneault and another man to get out of the car they were riding in.

The soft-spoken mother of three, who has moved her children to Montreal from their former home in Pouch Cove, Nfld., said her husband has been sick for a long time "but I never lost faith."

Rob a train

MONTREAL (CP) — Three armed and masked men robbed a Canadian National Railway train of two mailbags Tuesday night only minutes after Brinks Express Co. guards delivered them to the train.

Safety booth

MONTREAL (CP) — The epidemic of bank holdups in the Montreal area has forced the Provincial Bank of Canada to do something about it—invent a cashier's safety booth.

Raymond Primeau, general manager of the bank, unveiled the armored plate and bullet-proof glass booth at a news conference Tuesday.

"Thugs singling out the cashier's safety-booth for the big hit will have to show an awful lot of patience and ingenuity because firearms just won't do it, he said. Time is something they can ill afford."

Faith pays off

MONTREAL (CP) — A wife's faith paid off for Jerome Jordan, who underwent emergency surgery nine days ago and who received a kidney last Sunday while Canada's 10th heart transplant operation was in progress.

"I knew he wasn't going to die; I just knew it," Mrs. Jordan said in an interview Tuesday.

Thetford urban renewal plan announced

THETFORD MINES — An urban renewal program for the city of Thetford Mines, to cost over 6.25 million dollars and to be completed within an estimated five years, is announced by Mayor Laurent Turcotte and Asbestos Corporation.

The program calls for the re-development of three entire residential sections of Thetford Mines and their re-location in areas remote from open pit Asbestos mining operations.

Involving the re-location of 365 private homes as well as the demolition of 356 houses, Académie St. Maurice and Ecole de Youville Schools and St. Maurice Church, the project is to be undertaken under the terms of the Quebec Housing Act.

Under agreement, the federal and provincial governments would jointly undertake to pay 75 per cent of the total cost of the project.

The balance is to be met by the city of Thetford Mines, to pay a 10 per cent share, and Asbestos Corp. Ltd., which will

provide 15 per cent of the total project cost, or a share not exceeding 1.2 million dollars.

Under provisions of the Quebec Housing Act, the acquisition, demolition and re-location work is expected first to get underway in St. Maurice Parish in the near future.

The need for urban renewal has been created by the proximity of the three residential sections to open pit mining operations.

In particular, re-location of St. Maurice section will be required if Asbestos Corp. is to continue to mine its King Beaver Open Pit safely and maintain full employment at that mine and mill.

An exhaustive study conducted in 1967 by the provincial government's bureau d'études municipales et régionales recommended that those sections of the city which had been isolated by mining operations or were likely to be affected by future mining should be relocated away from the mine areas.

Asbestos Corp. officials state

they are extremely satisfied with Mayor Laurent Turcotte's announcement to proceed immediately with the urban renewal program for the St. Maurice parish.

According to a company spokesman, "Even though our participation in the project is still subject to intergovernmental formalities being completed to the satisfaction of all concern-

ed, we are delighted to take part in such a bold and imaginative solution for Thetford's urban renewal needs, hitherto met on a piecemeal basis.

"From our standpoint as a mining company and as an employer, we are convinced the course which the city of Thetford Mines has chosen is the correct one."

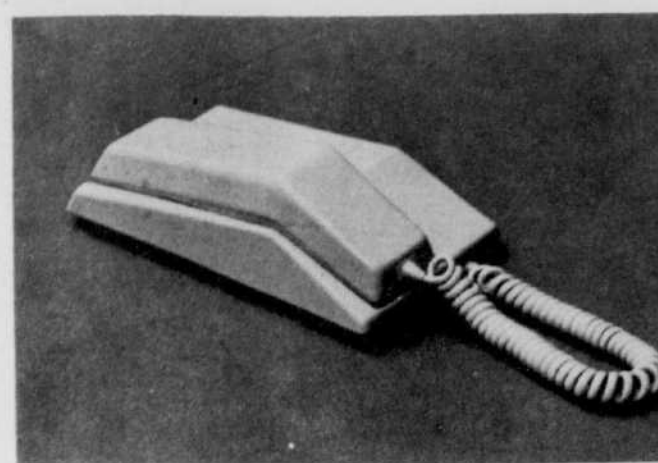

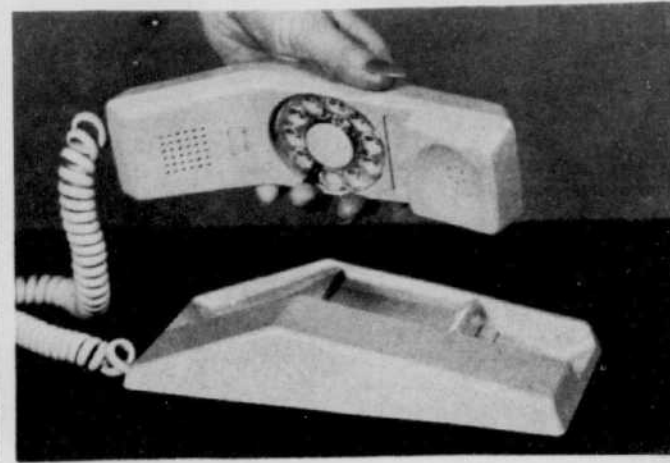

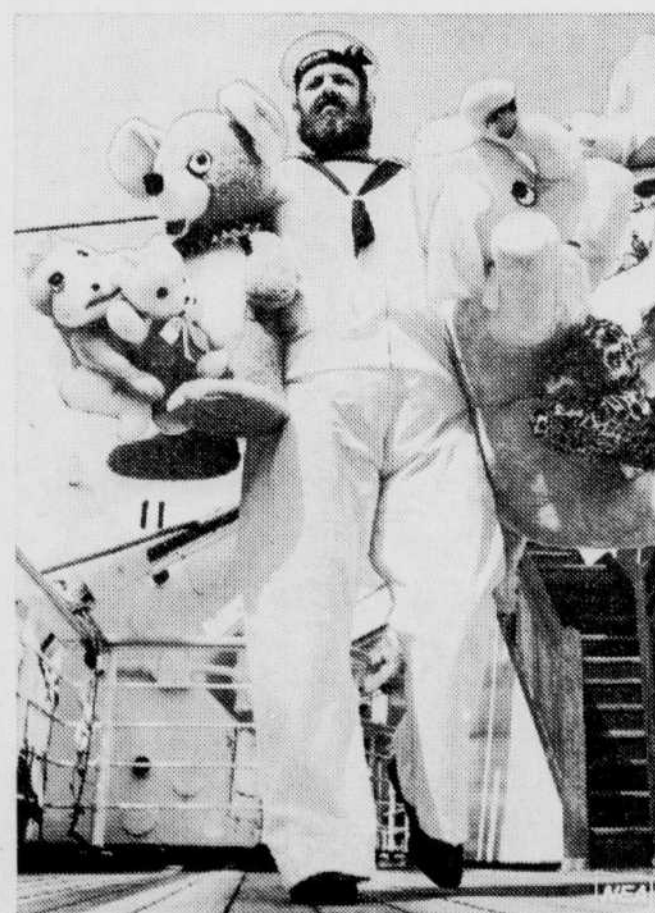

Personal hovercraft produced

Fond of novelties, North America has been introduced to a new sport which may quickly become one of the most popular with fun-seeking sportsmen.

The sport will be known as Aerodoo and will consist of a new-type of travel in a two-seater hovercraft.

The vehicle got its world premiere demonstration on the Richelieu River by its inventor, George Armitage, who travelled here especially for the occasion from Great Britain.

Equipped with a plastic shell, the hovercraft will be sold at popular prices and its Canadian distributors expect that it will quickly become a favorite with all.

Very light, since it only weighs 500 pounds, the machine, which travels on a cushion of air, can reach speeds of up to 50 m.p.h. Easy to handle, it also possesses the undeniable advantage of other sporting vehicles of the land, water and snow, since it can be used during any season.

Mr. Armitage, its inventor, explained during the demonstration for the press, that the vehicle was the first hovercraft of its type manufactured for the North American market.

The Montreal firm of Aerodoo Inc., has acquired the exclusive distribution rights in America.

Hovercrafts, introduced to Expo visitors last year are the latest thing in the field of land and water transportation, have become popular with several countries in Europe since their commercialization a few years ago.

The two-seat model, is smaller in size than the ones which appeared at Man and His World but it has been designed for a specific market — that of fun-seeking sportsmen.

The Quebec manager of the distributing company, J. M. Belley, predicted that this new type of hovercraft would soon surpass the snowmobiles as well as motorboats since it offers in a single unit the characteristics of the two and since it also has the additional advantage of being able to be used during all seasons.

"Several companies have already been in touch with us to distribute our hovercraft," added Mr. Belley who announced that the all-season hovercraft will be available for the market by next January.

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THE DOCTOR SAYS



Medical Care Costs Continue Their Rise

By WAYNE G. BRANDSTADT, M.D.

In these times of creeping inflation, many persons are complaining about the cost of medical care. Let's take a minute to examine the facts and the reasons for the increases. In 1940, a complete medical workup (initial history, physical examination and simple laboratory tests) by your doctor cost \$25. A surgeon charged about \$500 for a major operation that required an average of eight days in the hospital and the loss of three or four weeks from work.

Today the charge for an initial workup is still \$25. The preoperative care, operative technique and postoperative care have improved to the point where, although the same operation that formerly cost \$500 now costs about \$525, only three days in the hospital and a week away from work are required.

Although the doctor's living expenses, office rent and equipment now cost him far more than he did 28 years ago and although the stamps to mail out his bills cost twice what they cost 10 years ago, he has absorbed these costs and has raised his fees, if at all, far less than any other group.

Why, then are medical costs rising? One reason is that technological advances in the broad field of medicine are expensive. A \$75,000 apparatus that costs \$25,000 to install can detect a tumor the size of a pea. Without this equipment it would not be diagnosed until it had become as large as a lemon. Granted this test is costly, it is also lifesaving and represents greatly improved service to you as a patient.

The other chief reason for

increased costs has to do with hospital care. Hospitals are usually nonprofit organizations and can't absorb increases in their operating costs—they must be passed on to you or the hospital must close its doors. Medicare was introduced to help relieve this burden on persons who are over 65. Persons who are not yet eligible for Medicare should avail themselves of one of the voluntary health insurance plans that are offered.

Q—What is meant by hypercholesterolemia and hypothyroidism?

A—Hypercholesterolemia is an abnormally high blood level of cholesterol. Hypothyroidism is a deficiency of thyroid secretion.

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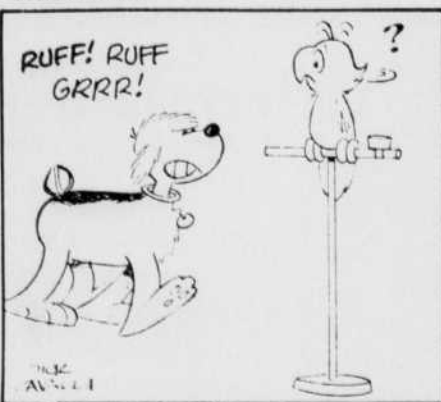

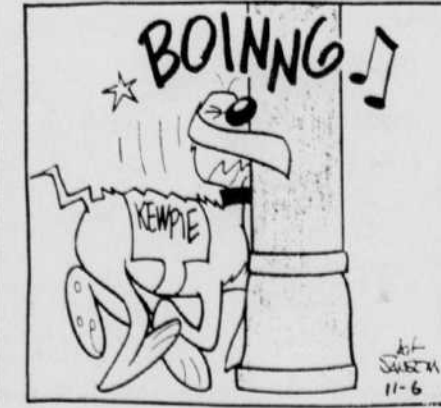
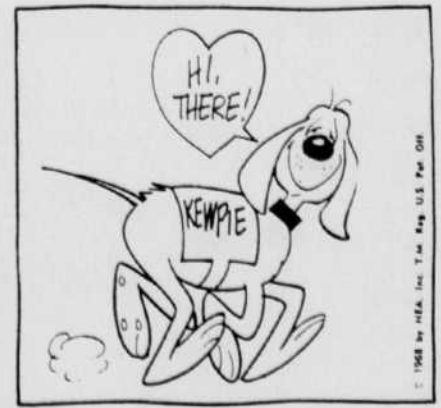

"We are learning to control the means of destruction. We will destroy the cities so long as they are not in our hands for that is the only language in which to talk to our oppressors."

In those words, Peter Molotsi, a South African nationalist representing the Pan Africanist Congress, summed up the means to his organizations' end during an address at the Bishop's University Centennial Theatre.

"As I speak to you now," he said, "our young people are out in the woods and in the trenches. They are ragged and in tatters; they have given up careers and everything else. They live only to restore the human dignity of the African people."

What Mr. Molotsi and the members of the Pan Africanist Congress are dedicated to is the destruction of the policy of

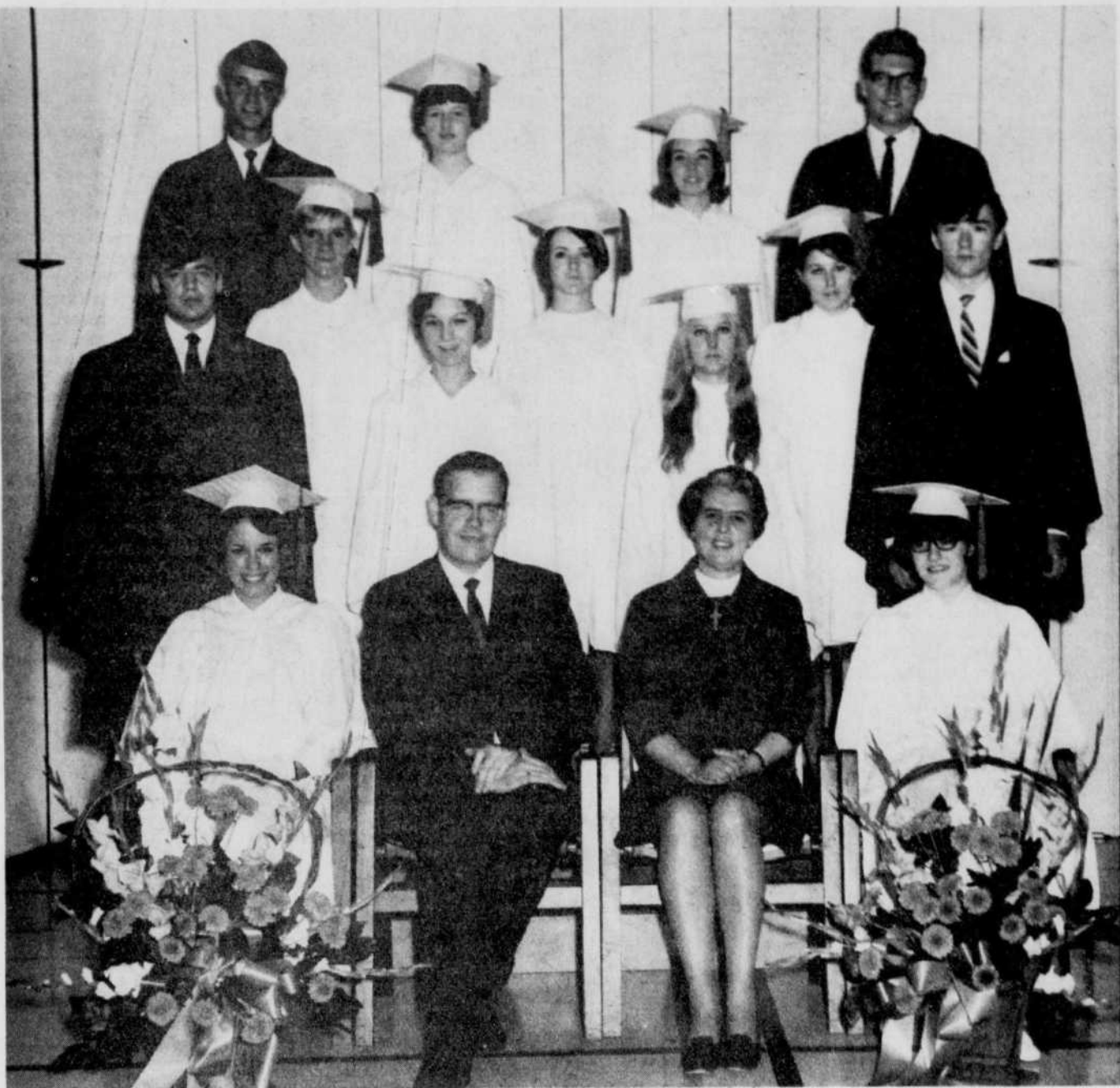
Unfortunately, the teach-in had to continue and hence the defence of the South African government's apartheid policy went unspoken.

Three Quebecers setting merry HOCKEY pace with Flyers, meet Bruins

Philadelphia Flyers are building a powerful defensive weapon in the National Hockey League with the help of three French-speaking Canadians from the American League.

Jean Guy Gendron, 34, Andre Lacroix, 23, and Simon Nolet, 26, are turning into one of the most formidable lines in the league's Western Division and proved during the weekend that they aren't too worried about the Eastern Division, either.

Sparked by Gendron, Lacroix and Nolet, the Flyers defeated both Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens in back-to-back games.

Coach Keith Allen puts the victories down to positional hockey and the lightning-like reflexes of his French line. In 10 games, Gendron, Nolet and Lacroix have accounted for six goals between them and Philadelphia now is only a point away from the lead in the West.

But scoring goals is old hat for the three. Together they combined for 114 goals last season with Quebec Aces of the AHL. Nolet was the leader with 44 and Lacroix scored 41 and then added six for the Flyers when he joined the NHL club at the end of the season.

DOESN'T SPARE THEM
Lacroix centres the line with Gendron on the left and Nolet at right wing. And Allen doesn't hesitate to use them—they played nearly 30 minutes as a line against Toronto Saturday night.

Gendron is the journeyman. He played with New York Rangers from 1955 to 1958, was traded to Boston Bruins where he stayed until 1961, moved back to the Rangers and then joined Quebec Aces in 1964.

He stayed in Quebec until this season, but Allen had the answer ready when asked why a player of Gendron's experience spent such a long time in the AHL.

"Golf," he said with a grin. "I am a golf pro at Rimouski, Que. Last year I asked Philadelphia general manager (Bud) Poile for permission to report late to training camp. He turned down my request and told me to report on time or suffer the consequences."

"I couldn't let the golf people down and my loyalty cost me a year's NHL salary and pension. It was tough to take, but I proved that I was a man of my word. This time, I make sure I come to camp on time."

Philadelphia, bolstered by two weekend victories over Eastern clubs, will try it again tonight against the Bruins in Boston. The Flyers have eight points and are only a point away from first-place St. Louis Blues.

LEAFS PLAY STARS
In other games tonight, Toronto Maple Leafs are in Minnesota against the North Stars, New York Rangers journey to Los Angeles to take on the Kings, Detroit Red Wings visit the

Black Hawks in Chicago and St. Louis is at Pittsburgh against the Penguins.

Thursday, Pittsburgh travels to Montreal, Minnesota is at Detroit and St. Louis meets the Flyers in Philadelphia.

Meanwhile, the word around the league is that manager-coach Punch Imlach is less than happy with his Toronto Maple Leafs. He got some bad defensive lapses from veterans in Saturday's loss to Philadelphia and intimated Tuesday that he is scouting around for some fresh blood.

He was in Rochester scouting defenceman Jim McKenny and also hinted that he is considering recruiting two Vancouver players—Ted Taylor and Brian Hextall.

The Leafs are bogged down in fifth place in the Eastern Division, with nine points, six back of the first-place Canadiens. But Toronto has played only eight games compared with Montreal's 10.

Another fifth-place club, Los Angeles Kings, also is having its problems.

With one player ill and another injured, coach Red Kelly announced he is switching center Gordon Labossiere to right wing for tonight's game.

Lowell MacDonald, in bed with a virus, and Real Lemieux, recovering from a sprained ankle, are the usual right wingers for the Western Division club.

Denny McLain top hurler in America

NEW YORK (AP) — Detroit's Denny McLain, 31-game winner who last week won the Cy Young award as the American League's best pitcher, Tuesday was unanimously named the league's Most Valuable Player.

McLain, who led the Tigers to their first pennant in 23 years, is the first American League pitcher to win both awards. Don Newcombe of Brooklyn Dodgers and Sandy Koufax of Los Angeles Dodgers won both awards in the National League in one year, Newcombe in 1956 and Koufax in 1963.

The 24-year-old right-hander also is the first AL pitcher to win the MVP award by a unani-

mous vote, the first AL pitcher to win it at all since Philadelphia's Bobby Shantz in 1952 and the first Tiger to receive the award since Hal Newhouse, also a pitcher, in 1944 and 1945.

McLain, who also was named the Cy Young winner unanimously, was placed first on every ballot by the 20 members of the voting committee of the Baseball Writers Association of America.

Bill Freehan, McLain's battery mate, was runner-up in the voting, the only other player who was named on all 20 ballots cast by two writers in each league city.

You don't often find yourself with a part score of 20. The bidding seldom stops at one club or one diamond.

When you do have 20 on your side of the ledger, you don't have to pay much attention to it except to bear in mind that three in a major or four in a minor will now give you game.

The advantage of a 4-4 fit in a suit is enough so that the Stayman Convention is in general expert use to find this fit in a major suit after a no-trump opening, but under normal conditions you prefer three no-trump to five-odd in a minor with one of those 4-4 fits.

With 20 on score it becomes common sense to look for minor-suit games since you only need 10 tricks.

South's three-club call represented a common-sense effort to do just that. He had a normal no-trump opening with only 16 high card points, which included three aces and a king. He wanted to go on after his partner raised him to two. At the same time he was looking at a 3-4-2-4 hand pattern and instead of bidding three no-trump, he bid three clubs to suggest a club instead of no-trump contract.

North raised to four clubs and South had no trouble making that contract. He simply timed his play so that he could make a total of six tricks with his trumps. He won the spade lead and played ace and one heart. Later he was able to trump his other two hearts in dummy.

The best South can do at no-trump is to make eight tricks. Of course, the defense might slip and give him a ninth, but it is better to have a sure thing going for you.

Other distinguished guests included Bro. Frank Smith, D.D.G.P. of Encampment District No. 3.

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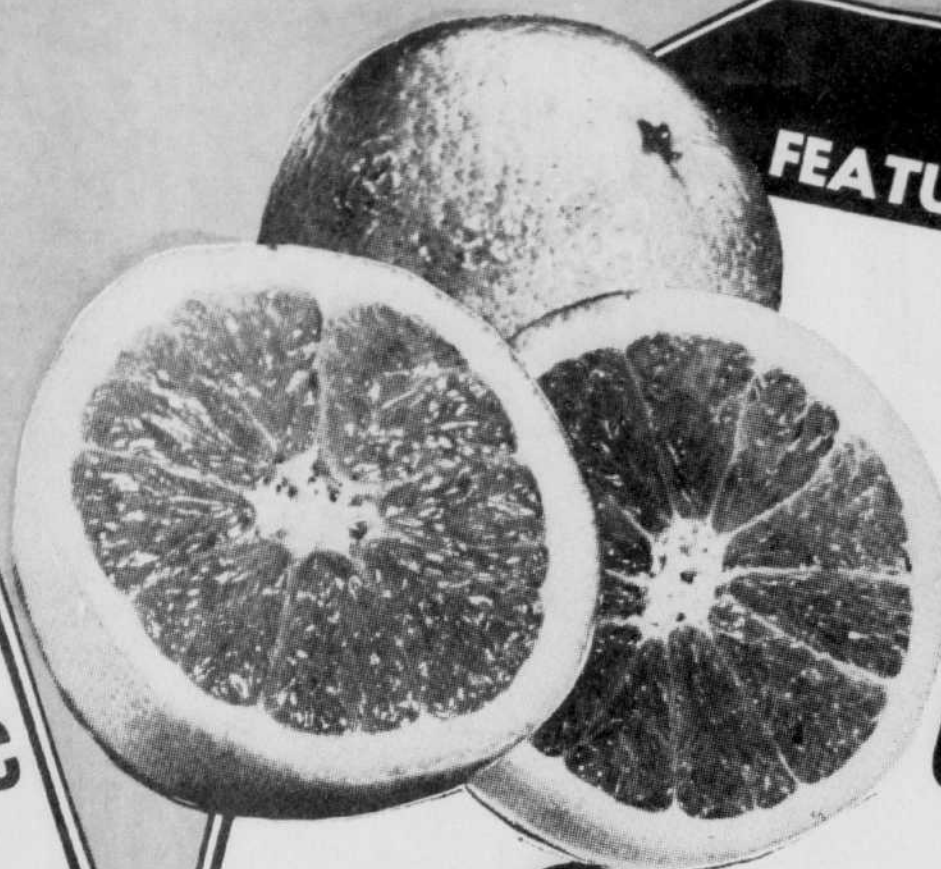
