World News In Brief

San Antonio, Sept. 27.—(AP)—At least four persons are believed to have drowned in a flash flood which gripped San Antonio today after a down-pour of rain sent the San Antonio River and its city-wide tributaries surging out of their banks.

The rain, six inches of which had fallen by 4 o'clock this morning, has virtually flooded the entire city. Over an inch of rain fell within a 25-minute period. The storm broke at 8:30 o'clock last night.

Two men, police said, were swept away with their car when a bridge was washed out. Two children also were reported drowned this morning in the flood waters.

Ottawa, Sept. 27.—(C.P.)—The Defence Department today announced a two-phase peacetime training program for the Canadian Officers' Training Corps and said that Canadian universities with C.O.T.C. units now were accepting applications from "selected undergraduates."

The course, divided into theoretical and practical phases, is available to British subjects, aged 18 to 22, who are studying for a recognized degree and meet Canadian Army physical standards. Students are required to state their willingness to complete the entire training program and select the corps in which they desire a commission.

Regina, Sept. 27.—(C.P.)—Royal Canadian Mounted Police said last night the largest part of the \$39,000 stolen in a holdup of the Bank of Montreal at Nipawin, Sask., Sept. 14, was recovered yesterday buried on a farm 15 miles south of the scene of the robbery.

Peter Minosky, 24, was arrested Sunday near Shebo, Sask., about 100 miles north of here, and charged with armed robbery.

William Dixon, 23, Hamilton, and Stanley Kruchko, 20, Brantford, Ont., were earlier arrested in their home towns in connection with the holdup and sent to Prince Albert, Sask., to stand trial.

Police said the only money not recovered was a small amount spent by the men.

Nipawin is 20 miles north of Regina.

Teheran, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Premier Ahmed Qavam was reported today to have promised to look into the demands of Moslem leaders of Iran's Persian Gulf ports that these areas be accorded the semi-autonomy status earlier granted Azerbaijan Province in the north. The demands were made Wednesday in a 48-hour ultimatum to Qavam.

Meanwhile unrest among southern Iranian tribes was reported to have spread to the neighboring province of Kermanshah, with from 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 Kermanshah tribesmen united in serving demands upon the central government.

Violence also was reported among tribes in Ardakan, 112 miles northeast of the port of Bushire.

Brussels, Sept. 27.—(AP)—A royal spokesman declined to confirm or deny today reports that Regent Prince Charles of Belgium is engaged to Winston Churchill's daughter, Mary.

"Rumors have been spread several times," the spokesman said, "that the prince was engaged to a foreign princess or to the daughter of some foreign statesman, but in each of these circumstances it has always been the prince's policy neither to confirm nor deny these rumors."

Since Mr. Churchill and his daughter arrived in Belgium Wednesday they have been guests of the prince at the Chateau de Ciergnon in the Ardennes and it has been emphasized that the former British Prime Minister's visit was purely of a private nature.

E.T. Farmer Found Hurt On Roadside — Dies Of Injury

Possibility of foul play in connection with the death of 68-year-old Joseph Rouleau, St. Denis de Brompton, who was picked up bleeding profusely from a head wound, on the Bromptonville road at a late hour last night and died shortly after he was admitted to St. Vincent de Paul Hospital, is being investigated by Provincial Police Detective Steino Brasseur and R. E. Anderson.

The nature of the injury admitted of three possibilities according to police. The deceased was either the victim of a hit-and-run driver, was attacked by a footpad or stumbled and struck his forehead on a protrusion in the ground.

Byrnes Optimistic Peace Conference Will Wind Up Soon As Gag Rule Adopted

Urge Greater Unity Among Labor Groups

T.L.C. Convention Ends on Affiliation Note After Adopting Resolution Favoring National Council of Unions.

Windsor, Ont., Sept. 27.—(AP)—The 61st convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada concluded yesterday with delegates expressing desire for definite action toward greater unity in the ranks of organized labor.

That stand was taken in support of resolutions which directed Congress officers to take steps toward establishment of a national co-ordinating council on which representatives of all trade union centres in Canada would co-operate.

It came up again when the convention went on record favoring affiliation with the World Federation of Trade Unions. Previously the T.L.C., while endorsing the principle of the federation at its 1944 convention, had followed the example of the American Federation of Labor in staying outside the federation. The A.F.L. had explained its position was based on the belief the federation was Communist-dominated.

Percy R. Bengough, Ottawa, T.L.C. president, said the Canadian organization had been hesitant to affiliate because of the expense involved, but the affiliation fee now had been reduced and he felt sure the barrier of objections by some unions to affiliating with the W.F.T.U. would be removed.

The convention protested removal of the federal milk subsidy and decided to wire the Federal Government to this effect. "This means shifting the load from those best able to afford it onto the shoulders of those least able," commented Mr. Bengough.

The convention went on record seeking a 50 per cent increase in unemployment insurance, with payments effective from the first day and covering the entire period workers are out of a job. The congress executive was instructed to have a model Workmen's Compensation Act prepared, providing 100 per cent compensation starting from the time a workman is injured.

Resolutions were also adopted seeking introduction of a comprehensive social insurance scheme, and the removal of wartime restrictions on the sale of beer.

Woman Is Injured In Car Collision

Shawinigan Falls, Que., Sept. 27.—(AP)—One woman was seriously injured in an accident involving an automobile and two trucks on the Shawinigan Falls-Three Rivers highway at Mont-Carmel Wednesday night.

Mrs. Ovide Guillemette of Bellevue, Que., suffered a probable fracture of both legs and a serious back injury and was taken to hospital at St. Therese, Que., where her condition is described as serious.

Theophile Lord of Almaville-en-Bas, Que., collided with an oncoming truck driven by Theophile Goulet of Shawinigan Falls when his vision was impaired by the glare of the headlights of the truck. Lord lost control of his vehicle and then collided with an automobile that had been travelling behind Goulet's truck.

Mrs. Alexandre Ayotte of Shawinigan Falls suffered minor injuries while the other occupants of the vehicles were uninjured.

Foreign Ministers Now Confronted With Most Difficult Task, Treaty With Germany—Demand Northern Epirus Be Transferred from Albania to Greece Dropped by Latter Country.

Paris, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The stage was set today for a quick finish to the Paris Peace Conference, with an agreement reached to limit further speechmaking and one troublesome issue wiped off the agenda by Greek withdrawal of claims for Northern Epirus.

"For the first time," State Secretary Byrnes told a press conference last night, "I see a possibility of winding up the Peace Conference."

By October 5, all commissions are scheduled to present their reports on the drafts of peace treaties to the full 21-power plenary session, which, in turn, is slated to finish its work by October 15. The conference has been in session since July 29.

After that, the Council of Foreign Ministers of the Big Four will take the conference's amendments and proposals and try to formulate the final treaties for Bulgaria, Finland, Hungary, Italy and Romania.

Mr. Byrnes was optimistic when he discussed the situation with newspapermen, in the first formal pronouncement he has made since the controversial speech by Henry A. Wallace September 12 criticizing United States foreign policy.

Discussing the chain of tense events which followed the Wallace speech, Mr. Byrnes said President Truman's statement of support for current American foreign policy had given "assurance to the world" of the stability of that policy.

"The fact is," he continued, "that the policy is a bi-partisan policy, and because it is supported by Democrats and Republicans, it is assurance to the world that regardless of which party is in power, the United States is going to stand by the policy we (Truman) have followed and is following today."

He presided yesterday at the first conference plenary session in nearly a month, during which the delegates agreed without discussion to "rule" designed to restrict speechmakers both in the commission and in the plenary sessions.

During the same session, amid a scene of gavel-banging, bell-ringing and multi-lingual confusion, the delegates were informed that Greece had withdrawn her demand that Northern Epirus be transferred from Albania to Greece.

Confronting the Foreign Ministers now is the question of a treaty with Germany—the most difficult of the lot thus far. Mr. Byrnes said the date for beginning work on that pact has been set for the latter half of November, in New York.

Peace Commission Commissions must progress today. The principle of at least 75 per cent compensation for allied properties in defeated nations, already adopted for Italy, was virtually established for the other four treaties by the Balkan-Finnish Economic Commission. The United States was defeated, 9-4, in a motion for 25 per cent compensation for business interests and property damaged or destroyed during the war. The Slavic bloc constituted the principal opposition. The United States abstained in the vote, which came during a discussion of the Romanian treaty.

As in the Italian Economic Commission, Britain and Greece reserved the right to ask the plenary session for full compensation, a principle which was defeated in both commissions by a tie vote, with the United States, Russia and the Slav states on one side and

A negotiating conference late yesterday failed to produce tangible results and representatives of the company and of the Independent Association of Employees of the Duquesne Light Company broke off without arranging a new meeting.

Mayor David L. Lawrence speedily summoned the conferees to his office where, after a session which lasted until after midnight, an agreement to resume contract negotiations today was reached.

The union, asking a 20 per cent pay raise and other benefits, rejected a company offer which would have given them five per cent. The union's demand would boost average base rates from \$1.18 to \$1.41. The union also, for the second time, rejected a company proposal to submit the dispute to arbitration.

School Welcomes Catholic Children

Ottawa, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Charles H. Hulse, chairman of the Ottawa Public School Board, said yesterday the 96 Roman Catholic children in the city's Wartime Housing Area on Merivale Road in southwest Ottawa would be "welcomed" to attend the new public school being built there.

On Wednesday Separate School Board chairman E. V. McCarthy said that, because of an inequitable municipal tax system, Catholic children in that area could not be provided with a separate school.

Mr. Hulse said the Catholic children would be welcomed because the public schools are for the use of all denominations.

C.C.L. Group Tries To Ban Red Officers

C.C.F. Is Re-Endorsed as "Political Arm of Labor"—Conclusion of Sixth Labor Rally Scheduled for Tonight.

Toronto, Sept. 27.—(AP)—More than 750 delegates to the sixth regular convention of the Canadian Congress of Labor today bused themselves with some 100 resolutions to be considered before the convention ends tonight.

Most of the resolutions—about 175 already have been discussed—were expected to be adopted in routine fashion.

Possibility of a last-minute controversy was seen, however, in constitutional amendment submitted by the London (Ont.) Labor Council. The Council asks addition of these words: "No person who is known to be a member of the Communist or Labor-Progressive Party shall be eligible to serve as a member of the executive committee or the executive council of the congress."

The most contentious item on the congress agenda—political action—was written into the resolution which, in effect, re-endorses the C.C.F. as "the political arm of labor."

C.C.L. delegates made that endorsement in 1943 and 1944. At the present convention, the congress seemed split into C.C.F., Labor-Progressive and non-partisan groups. But the resolution was adopted by an estimated 5-1 vote.

The decision came late yesterday afternoon after more than seven hours' debate. Opening the discussion Wednesday, C. S. Jackson, United Electrical Workers, Toronto, claimed the C. C. L. had no political action program, despite its P. A. Committee.

As the controversy warmed yesterday, several speakers called the issue clearly a rivalry between C.C.F. and L.P.P.

The vote was taken soon after a blunt, to-the-point speech by C.C.L. secretary Pat Conroy, who was greeted with prolonged applause.

He charged "sabotage by those speaking for the amendment" and named L.P.P. sympathizers as the saboteurs.

"Despite my efforts to make it (the political action program) work, it was sabotaged from beginning to end . . . I see it—and I'm taking the gloves off now—the issue is whether the L.P.P. is going to dominate the C.C.L. or whether (the C.C.L.) is to remain in the hands of the membership."

The L.P.P. stand was outlined by numerous delegates.

George Harris, United Electrical Workers, Toronto, said the C.C.F. insisted on giving the congress a policy the affiliates refused to accept. He charged J. E. McGuire of Ottawa with "red-baiting" and an attempt for "dishonest approach to the issue" to divide the C.C.L. into L.P.P. and C.C.F. groups.

"If we tie ourselves to any one political party we make practical day-to-day political action impossible," he said.

Probe Explosion At Island Plant

Victoria, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Company officials and police today continued investigation into explosion at the nearby James Island plant of Canadian Industries Limited which yesterday killed three workers and destroyed a \$50,000 gelatine cartridge house.

Sgt. C. C. Jacklin of the British Columbia Provincial Police, said human fragments recovered from the blast area did not fill a wooden box 15 by 20 inches.

W. S. Thatcher, works manager, said the cause of explosion may not be known for days. There was no trace left of the building other than a smoke-blackened crater but no fire resulted.

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Soviet Approval Of Report Speeds Atomic Discussion

Lake Success, N.Y., Sept. 27.—(AP)—Encouraged by a last-minute Russian decision which made possible a unanimous vote on a sub-committee report, the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission today prepared to re-open the whole broad question of international control of the atom bomb.

The first actual step in setting machinery going will be taken next Wednesday when the No. 2 (political) committee receives the much-discussed report which won blanket approval yesterday in the commission's scientific committee.

This move was expected to lead to early sessions of the commission itself.

The 12-power commission, still standing apart on the United States and Russian plans, has been in recess since July, when it asked the scientists to draft a report on the technical aspects of the question. For the last three weeks the com-

Ottawa Squatters Still Entrenched

Ottawa, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Uneasy over rumors of action to get them out, Ottawa's squatting veterans still occupied six buildings here today while their leaders planned their personal defence against charges of forcible entry and obstructing police.

Jointly charged yesterday, the Veterans' Housing League's leader, E. F. Hanratty, and his legal advisor, George Bleakney, had their cases adjourned until October 4. Later, Bleakney announced they would elect trial by judge and jury and he would act as defence counsel for both.

The charges marked the first legal counter-attack against the squatting activities of the last three weeks during which buildings controlled by the army, navy and City of Ottawa have been occupied by some 200 persons.

Hanratty, diminutive former R.C.A.F. air observer, had a hectic day yesterday. He spent a few hours in jail and then moved his wife, small son, and belongings into the sixth building to be occupied by the veterans at a vacant barracks at Lansdowne Park next to the one occupied by nine families last Tuesday night.

There were persistent rumors that naval authorities would attempt to clear the building occupied by 11 families at H.M.C.S. Carleton, naval training station beside Dow's Lake in southwest Ottawa, but no confirmation could be obtained.

Public Forced To Cast Vote In Australia

Penalized for Failure to Exercise Franchise—Quiet Campaign Culminates in Elections Tomorrow.

Sydney, Australia, Sept. 27.—(AP)—A quiet campaign contested largely on domestic issues drew to a close tonight as Australians prepared to vote—under penalty of fine for non-exercise of franchise—in tomorrow's general election.

Seeking return to office is the Labor Party, headed by Prime Minister Chifley, which held a commanding total of 49 seats in the last House of Representatives. Two opposition parties—the Liberals under Robert G. Menzies and the Country Party led by Arthur Fadden—have joined forces in an attempt to oust the Government.

In the previous House, elected in 1943, Mr. Menzies, a former Prime Minister, counted 15 members and Mr. Fadden, also a former Prime Minister, 10. The remaining seat in the 75-member House was held by an independent.

Also to be filled Saturday are 19 seats in the elective, 35-seat Senate. Normally half the body is elected every three years—maximum life of an Australian Parliament—for six-year terms, insuring a constant number of experienced Senators. This year the death of Minister Richard Keane left an additional vacancy. Labor men hold the 17 seats which will not be contested and thus seem assured of a majority in the Upper House. The 19 contested seats were held in the last Senate by 11 Liberals, four Labor men, three Country Party members and an Independent.

Major issues of the campaign concern internal economy.

There are 233 nominees for the 75 House Seats which break down by parties as follows: Labor 74; Liberals 60; Country 26; Service-men's Party — a newly-formed group—18; Communist — a party which never has held a seat—14; Independent Labor—led by colorful 70-year-old John Lang—11; Protestant People's Party, six; Five parties have entered one candidate apiece and there are 19 Independents. There are no acclamations.

Under the preferential voting system, Australians will mark their ballots by numbering "1" after their first choice, "2" after their second, and so on. In a closely-contested division the outcome may not be known until after several tallies of the ballots, progressively taking into account second, third, fourth and fifth choices to establish the requisite over-all majority for one candidate.

Although in several constituencies both Liberal and Labor candidates will be in the running it will not constitute a split in the opposition vote since under the preferential system party preferences may be exchanged when one candidate falls behind his running-mate.

The compulsory voting law is expected to draw out a record 4,500,000 electors. Fines range from \$2 (\$6.40) for failure to mark a ballot, although one may be excused from voting for a number of reasons.

Polls will close in 68 of the 75 divisions at 8 p.m. (6 a.m. E.D.T.) when counting will begin, continuing until midnight. If the overall tally is close, the fate of Mr. Chifley's government may not be known until after counting resumes at 5:30 p.m. Sunday (2:30 a.m. E.S.T.) or perhaps for several days thereafter.

King George II Leaves By Plane To Resume Throne Of Greece Amid Civil Strife

London, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Aboard a private plane flying the Greek royal colors, King George II of Greece left England this morning to resume the throne of the strife-torn land from which advancing German armies drove him five years ago.

The Greek Government has made elaborate plans to welcome the 56-year-old, Danish-descended monarch tomorrow morning when he returns from the second exile of his reign, which began in 1922.

Strict police precautions have been arranged to guard him upon his return, coming amid fierce border fighting and civil strife in northern Greece which Premier Constantin Tsaldaris said Wednesday had reached the magnitude of war.

King George, summoned back to his throne by a better than two to one margin in a Sept. 1 plebiscite, was attired in a uniform of commander-in-chief of the Greek Army as he stroled across the flying field toward his plane.

The plane, carrying King George and a seven-man entourage, took off at 8:05 a.m. (3:05 a.m. E.D.T.), and an official spokesman later said the ship would land on Greek territory this evening, but he would not say exactly where.

Earlier, dispatches from Athens said King George was expected to arrive at an airport on the Peloponnese and continue his journey to Piraeus, port of Athens, on a destroyer.

The spokesman said King George would broadcast a message to the Greek people tomorrow night.

King George, one of Europe's dwindling group of monarchs, first acceded to the Greek throne in 1922, but abdicated the next

year when a republic was proclaimed. He was recalled in 1935 upon restoration of the monarchy and ruled until the German armies drove him out.

Before he came to the throne, the Allies had barred him from the crown in 1917 because they feared his reported German leanings, but he came to power when his brother Alexander died.

The tall, immaculate monarch showed no signs of emotion.

Plans for the monarch's departure had been closely guarded since the royalists won the plebiscite restoring him to his throne.

Col. R. Levidas, master of the royal household, said King George would probably issue a statement later, thanking Britain for the hospitality extended since he came here from Cairo, where he maintained his headquarters for the first years of the war after the German invasion forced him to leave his country in 1941.

Truman Firm Farm Strike On Retaining Settlement Meat Ceilings Up To Ottawa

President Insists Keeping Commodity Under O.P.A. Despite Party Discord and Forthcoming Elections.

Washington, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Despite rising party discord in the midst of the United States Congressional election campaign, President Truman stood firm today for keeping meat under Office of Price Administration ceilings—

with no boost in prices.

The President made this clear by setting forth his own views on the surging clamor over empty American meat counters.

Emphasizing that he regards the situation as a shortage and not a "famine," Mr. Truman brushed aside demands of some Democratic leaders for a 60-day suspension of meat ceilings. That period would extend beyond the November elections.

In doing so, the President predicted there will be more and a better grade of meat available "in the near future." He said he saw no need for a special session of Congress to deal with the situation.

Mr. Truman blamed the "extraordinarily large" slaughter of cattle and hogs during the July-August lapse of ceilings for the current lack of meat.

He also laid a share of the blame squarely at the door of Congress, declaring in his press conference statement yesterday:

"If, as I had urged upon the Congress, the price control legislation had been re-enacted in the early spring, many of these difficulties would have been avoided."

Franco May Have To Settle With UN For Germany's Aid

Madrid, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Generalissimo Franco's government soon may find itself in the paradoxical position of settling with the United Nations, including Russia, for the money and arms Germany provided to establish it in power.

In this situation, the United Nations might be recognized as trustees for Italy and Germany and would collect Spain's debt to those countries. On the other hand, however, Spain may present counter-claims against Italy and Germany on the strength of the volunteer Blue Division which fought in Russia and possible other items of supply.

German and Italian aid to Franco began soon after his rising of July 18, 1936, against the Spanish Republic. The Soviet Government, and volunteers from France, Brit-

ain, the United States and many parts of Europe, fought in vain to save the republic.

Mussolini's bill for aiding Franco came to 5,000,000,000 lire, or \$250,000,000. Spain paid 300,000,000 lire — \$15,000,000 — between 1939 and 1945. Last December, Spain signed a 10-year agreement with the post-war Italian Government, fixing the balance due Italy at \$50,000,000 because of the drop in the value of the lire.

Hitler's bill never has been published, but informed sources estimate it at 400,000,000 lire, or \$20,000,000. It is estimated that Spain paid off \$120,000,000 by shipping much-needed goods to Germany during the war.

Provincial Milk Boards Have Announced Increase In Price

A quart of milk delivered to the doorstep is going to cost Canadians anywhere from 1 1/2 cents to three cents more from now on, as a result of decisions by the various provincial milk boards following the end of the Federal subsidy of 55 cents a hundredweight to producers.
In Ontario and Quebec the price is up three cents. It's two cents higher in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia. It's 1 1/2 cents higher in Manitoba. The ninth province, Prince Edward Island, hasn't yet announced a decision.
In most sections of Ontario the new price will be 16 cents a quart. The price is between 14 and 15 cents in Nova Scotia and British Columbia. It's 15 1/2 cents in most of Quebec and 15 cents in New Brunswick, 14 cents in Manitoba and Alberta and 13 cents in Saskatchewan.

The increase was promptly opposed by Mayor Stanley Lewis, of Ottawa, and Mayor Robert Saunders, of Toronto. The former said he had sent a telegram to Ontario Municipal Minister Dunbar to register Ottawa's "very strong protest" and Mayor Saunders declared the Ontario Milk Board "flouted the will of the Ontario Legislature" in authorizing the increase.
R. F. Lick, secretary of the Ontario Milk Producers' Association, said "there still will be no surplus of receipts over operating costs on the farms."

Prices Board officials in Toronto said the Ontario increase of three cents would have no effect on restaurant prices, and no changes without appeal would be allowed in price of milk sold by the glass or in price of other dairy products sold at restaurants.
The Quebec Dairy Commission announced a three-cent-a-quart increase on the main markets of the Province, with a corresponding increase on other markets, effective October 1st. This will bring the price to 15 1/2 cents a quart in

Montreal and Quebec City.
Dr. L. A. Donovan, chairman of the New Brunswick Dairy Products Commission, announced a two-cent increase—from 13 to 15 cents—effective October 1st, and officials of the Nova Scotia Public Utilities Board announced that milk will retail at 14 cents per quart in all areas controlled by the Board, with exception of Halifax and Sydney. The price in Halifax will be 15 cents and in Sydney 16.

The Nova Scotia Board said the "interim" price was set pending investigation of the price structure. Though no definite action was taken in Prince Edward Island, it was said the price would likely increase to 14 cents a quart. A meeting was held at Charlottetown a few days ago and a decision made to ask for adoption of this price by the milk board.

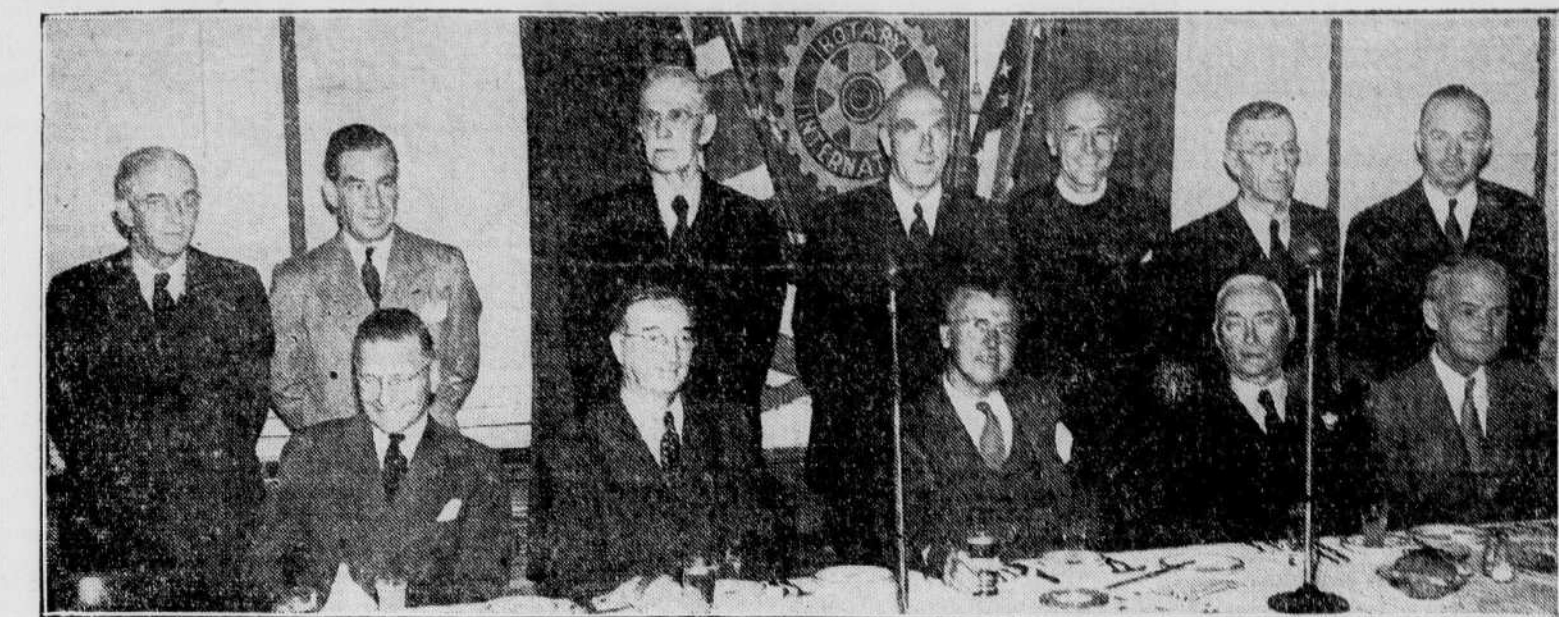
WELL KNOWN LENNOXVILLE CITIZEN DIES

A prominent resident of Lennoxville for over half a century, William John Herbert McKindsey, passed away at his home here yesterday in his 87th year. He was the proprietor of the McKindsey Drug Store which he operated until four years ago. He had been in failing health since that time.

Importance Of Hospital Drive Stressed At Dinner Attended By Chairmen For E.T. District

A complimentary dinner tendered by the management of the New Sherbrooke Hotel last night brought together out-of-town chairmen in the forthcoming Sherbrooke Hospital campaign for the first time since the organization committee began selecting leaders in outside communities some weeks ago.

Rev. Fred Williams, rector of Trinity United Church, delivered the main address and in his remarks urged that "there should be no differentiation between Sherbrooke and the outside . . . but rather the enterprise should be a collective job with persons in all sections of the Eastern Townships aware of the oneness of the object and to be approached with a collective mind, a collective mentality and a collective mood." Rev. Mr. Williams stated that a great deal of the success of the drive depended on the spirit with which the individual chairmen entered the work and said that "the task measures us as we measure it."

ASSAULT COUNT AGAINST TRIO IS DISMISSED

Contradictory evidence in an assault case, in which three Magog residents were accused of injuring a bartender in a tavern brawl, yesterday brought an acquittal for three men, Gilbert Lavoie, Paul-Aime Picard and Gaston Picard, in a judgment handed down by Judge Anatole Gaudet.

The alleged victim, Lucien Raymond, claimed that during the night of August 18 last while he and Lavoie were engaged in a tussle approximately forty patrons of the bar formed a circle around the two men and that during the course of the brawl he had been struck several blows by the Picard brothers. However, in handing down the judgment, Magistrate Gaudet pointed to contradictory evidence stating that while the plaintiff had presented several witnesses claiming certain evidence, this in turn was denied by a number of defense witnesses.

"I have no reason to accept the evidence of proof of the plaintiff over that of the defense and therefore under these circumstances I believe it is my duty to free the accused under the benefit of the doubt," the Magistrate said.

ing operations with the facilities we have on hand, but I assure you that these are far from modern and definitely not in keeping with what one would expect in a community combining the population of the City of Sherbrooke and its outside areas."

Mr. Munster stated that the sale of the old hospital would realize \$250,000 in addition to a Provincial Government loan of \$380,000. The campaign is aiming at \$500,000 to bring the total to \$1,230,000, which amount will be required for the construction of a new 150-bed hospital at the top of Portland Avenue.

"This is not an ordinary campaign," he said, "it requires a very broad conception of the real needs and most liberal contributions far greater than have been previously donated to any worthy project," the speaker stated.

Mr. Munster pointed to the formation of a voluntary committee headed by prominent French-speaking citizens to solicit among the French-speaking elements. He paid high tribute to Gedeon Nadeau, chairman of this committee for the work he has already put into the organization of the campaign and added that "co-operation such as this has special significance whose value cannot be calculated."

"We have the enviable reputation of doing things well in the Townships," he continued, "and I suggest that the accomplishment of our task starts with the canvassers in Sherbrooke and outside communities, but that the success of the drive rests with the citizens at large."

Other speakers of the evening, Hon. Senator Jacob Nolin, joint-honorary chairman, stated that the Sherbrooke Hospital was "definitely in need of a new location where a larger institution could be built to accommodate the increasing number of patients" and he also said that the present equipment at this institution would not in a short time be adequate for the proper care of patients.

He called to his listeners to back the campaign with vigor and during their solicitation, to point out the numerous needs of that institution.

School boards included in the Central Board of Compton County are: Bulwer, Bury, Compton Parish, Compton Village, Cookshire, East Angus, Island Brook, Lingwick, Sawyerville Village, Marlboro (Wolfe County), Westbury, Scotts-town; Agnes and Megantic in Frontenac County. The inclusion of Agnes and Megantic was not originally contemplated, but the board expressed the desire for membership. The following boards were excluded at their request: Clifton East, Eaton, Hereford.

Shurtleff K.C. for Stanstead County and Mr. Scowen for Compton County: "I recommend that changes be made in the representation of the Central School Boards in accordance with Article 7 of the Act 8 George VI, Chapter 15, so that the representations will be as follows, the changes to come into effect after receiving the approval of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council

AUTO SOLD AT AUCTION BASIS OF COURT SUIT

Life of a passenger automobile today is full of uncertainties, in many cases upsets and almost invariably of changes of ownership, but the most adventurous vehicle would find it difficult to keep up with the variegated career of the 1932 sedan which was the bone of contention in a Superior Court action presented to Mr. Justice Duranceau this morning.

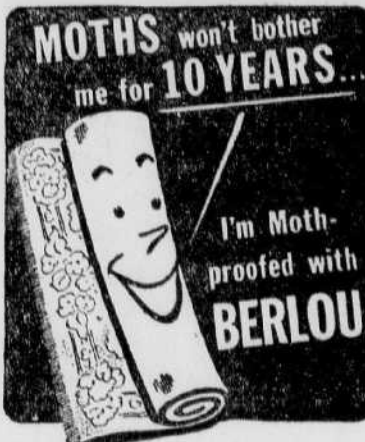
Stolen early in 1943, the car went through a hectic three-week period of smuggling across the U.S. border until the thieves were apprehended with a quantity of illegal cigarettes by Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

The car was then impounded and held until February 11th, 1944. On that date, after it had been widely advertised but still remained unclaimed, the sedan was sold at auction to Paul Leblanc. In April of the same year it was purchased by Ernest Lapointe, who in turn sold it in June to Romeo Gaudreau, Chamberland and Bros. were the next buyers and they disposed of the vehicle to Emile Roberge, defendant in the court case.

The owner from whom the automobile had been originally stolen, Philippe Thibault, recognized the car while in Sherbrooke recently and entered claim. He insists that he has the right to title in the car and asks the court to uphold his contention.

Roberge claims the vehicle is legally his and also asks the court to declare him the owner.

Hearing will continue, Paul Brazeau is lawyer for plaintiff.



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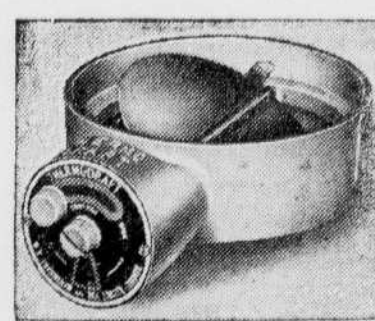

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ANTHONY EDEN EXPRESSES HIS VIEWS

The discussion and arguments caused by the speech of former United States Commerce Secretary Henry A. Wallace served to overshadow an equally important but less provocative address by Anthony Eden, one-time Foreign Secretary of Great Britain, on the question of relations between the Western powers and Russia. This seasoned British diplomat does not come out with an urge for Russian appeasement nor for the bowing down to Stalin. Rather in the following words he calls for a restraint of language in the present disquieting situation:

"It is not so much that I see in this state of affairs an imminent threat of war. That is not the immediate danger. But anyone who reads the reports of the Paris Conference can judge for himself how the vehemence and antagonism have grown with every passing week. In an atmosphere such as that every incident is magnified and every suspicion becomes a sinister fact."

Presenting "constructive contributions" as to the ways of halting deterioration of the international atmosphere, Mr. Eden urged restraint first of language, second of suspicion and third of ideological intervention. Referring specifically to Great Britain, he continued:

"If our Soviet allies are building their foreign policy on any other premises than our friendship, as I fear that they now are, then they are building on a false reading of facts."

This is the solid aim of Western diplomacy today—to convince the Russians that we wish them no harm, that they can maintain their own system of government and economics at home without fear of interference from outside. But it must also be emphasized upon them that Great Britain, Canada and the United States also seek this privilege. There are only two hundred United States citizens in Russia today, probably fewer Britons and decidedly only a handful of Canadians. Certainly these cannot be charged with carrying on any extensive espionage or subversive campaign. However, throughout the world, Russian agents by the thousands are active, as recent events in Canada have proven. This certainly does not lead to trust and good fellowship so vital to the preservation of peace.

THE MILK SUBSIDY DISCONTINUED

The decision of the Dominion Government to stand by its earlier ruling to discontinue the subsidy of 55 cents per 100 pounds on milk delivered by producers to fluid milk distributors and of 23 cents per 100 pounds on milk delivered to processing plants would be fully justified if it were part of a well-defined plan to free the general economy of the country from the restrictions imposed by price controls and subsidizing of production. Subsidies to maintain an artificially low price to the consumers can only be justified in exceptional circumstances and as a temporary measure designed to meet special conditions, but as a permanent policy they tend to deceive both the producer and the consumer. The subsidies can only come from taxes imposed upon the people as a whole and for the most part represent an additional cost to the producer and consumer, multiplied substantially to maintain the bureaucracy needed to collect the taxes and to supervise the distribution of the payments.

However, in the present case, the removal of the milk subsidy does not comprise part of an over-all program. Government controls and commissions are interfering with the basic law of supply and demand, often fixing prices below the level of economic production and seeking to compensate the producer by payments from the national exchequer. The Government has shown no inclination to withdraw these controls on other lines with the result that the price structure will continue out of line.

Increased consumer prices for milk are bound to result from the termination of the subsidies with a consequent jump in the cost of living to the average person. The decision to withdraw the subsidy provides a further strain on the whole system and an increase in the retail price of milk is bound to result in a demand for wage increases on the part of the workers and for widening profits for the individual business man to meet the higher living costs. It will be interesting to see just how the whole system will stand up under the added pressure. Already it is suffering from severe strain and a blow-up might well occur at any time.

THE FUTURE ROLE OF THE SUBMARINE

Admiral Nimitz, United States fleet commander, apparently is a strong believer in the part the submarine will play in future wars, a view that is supported by the Navy Department which has revealed that the United States is going in for submarines in a big way. This is something of a departure for the United States navy has always been a battleship fighting force, with air-plane carriers added during the Second Great War. Admiral Nimitz emphasizes that the United States will not abandon the use of heavy craft, but that submarines will be more important than ever before.

The undersea craft of the future will be able to control pilotless aircraft or send guided missiles to the shores of enemy countries. Jet engines may be common on submarines of the future, which will be larger and faster than any existing undersea craft, and they will have longer range.

The Germans made broad progress in submarine warfare between the two world wars and the United States, in the words of Admiral Nimitz does "not intend to get burned again," and plans to have one of the largest and most modern undersea fleets in the world.

REECE SAYS GOP WILL GET GOVERNMENT OUT OF YOUR HAIR

This is the first of two exclusive interviews with the national chairman of the major parties concerning November election campaigns and prospects. Views of Democratic Chairman Robert E. Hannagan will be given in a column to follow.

"The federal government has gotten in the people's hair," says Republican National Committee Chairman B. Carroll Reece of Tennessee. What the Republican Party proposes to do about it after the November elections, the chairman implies, is to take the government—meaning the Democratic administration—out of the people's hair.

Chairman Reece has been doing a good bit of travelling during the summer, making speeches and sounding out public opinion.

"The annoyance of the people against the Democratic administration," he says, "is principally symbolized by their opposition to government controls. They were willing to put up with these controls during the war. But now the war has been over a year and they want to get rid of controls."

Today, says Reece, there is plenty of lumber, building materials, and money—but no housing. There is plenty of cotton—but no sheets or shirts. Plenty of cattle—but no meat.

Prices are not the principal cause of complaint, Reece continues. People have the money with which to buy, he says, but government controls cause artificial shortages.

CONTROLS CONSTITUTE BASIC CAMPAIGN ISSUE

"What voters fear," says the Republican chairman, "is that these controls, imposed by the Democratic administration, will become permanent." That, to him, is the fundamental issue of the campaign.

Reece cites a recent Gallup poll which indicated that 46 per cent of the people believed the Democratic administration was heading towards a totalitarian government. In 10 states in the Northeastern quarter of the country, a majority of the people expressed this opinion.

To Chairman Reece, this state of mind can be attributed to the general belief that there is an alliance between the Democratic Party and the radical elements of the country symbolized by the CIO Political Action Committee.

"This is an alliance," says Reece, "which the Democratic administration has tried to renounce but can't. Any renunciation," he says, "must come from the other side. And it hasn't come."

The Republican chairman admits that in recent years his party has shouted against radicalism and gotten no place for its trouble. But today, he declares, all the irritations against the Democratic administration controls at home are directly related in the voters' minds to the kicking-around which Americans are receiving all over the world from Joe Stalin and the communists.

"The result is a deep concern developing among the American voters," says Reece. "It amounts almost to a patriotic fever."

REECE EXPECTS A GOP SWEEP IN NOVEMBER

In several of his recent speeches, Reece has characterized this feeling as national concern over "the four C's of Control, Confusion, Corruption and Communism." He predicts that reaction against them will result in a Republican sweep in November.

The recent Wallace speech is cited as an example of "the communist influence." Disclosures of the Mead Committee are cited as "indistinguishable from corruption." Deficit spending is cited as contributing to general confusion and as evidence that the Democratic administration does not want to balance the federal budget because to do so would mean that controls would have to be given up.

"This deficit spending," says Chairman Reece, "is the real fire under the boilers of inflation." Reduce government spending and controls and the threat of inflation would disappear, he believes.

"Democratic charges that the Republican program is reactionary and against the social gains of recent years are making no impression in the voters," Reece asserts flatly.

Customarily, the congressional elections held in years when there is no Presidential contest are supposed to be local political fights. In these off-years it is a political tradition that the records and merits of the candidates themselves are pitted against each other. In such contests candidates can't ride into office on the coattails of the Presidential candidate and the party platform.

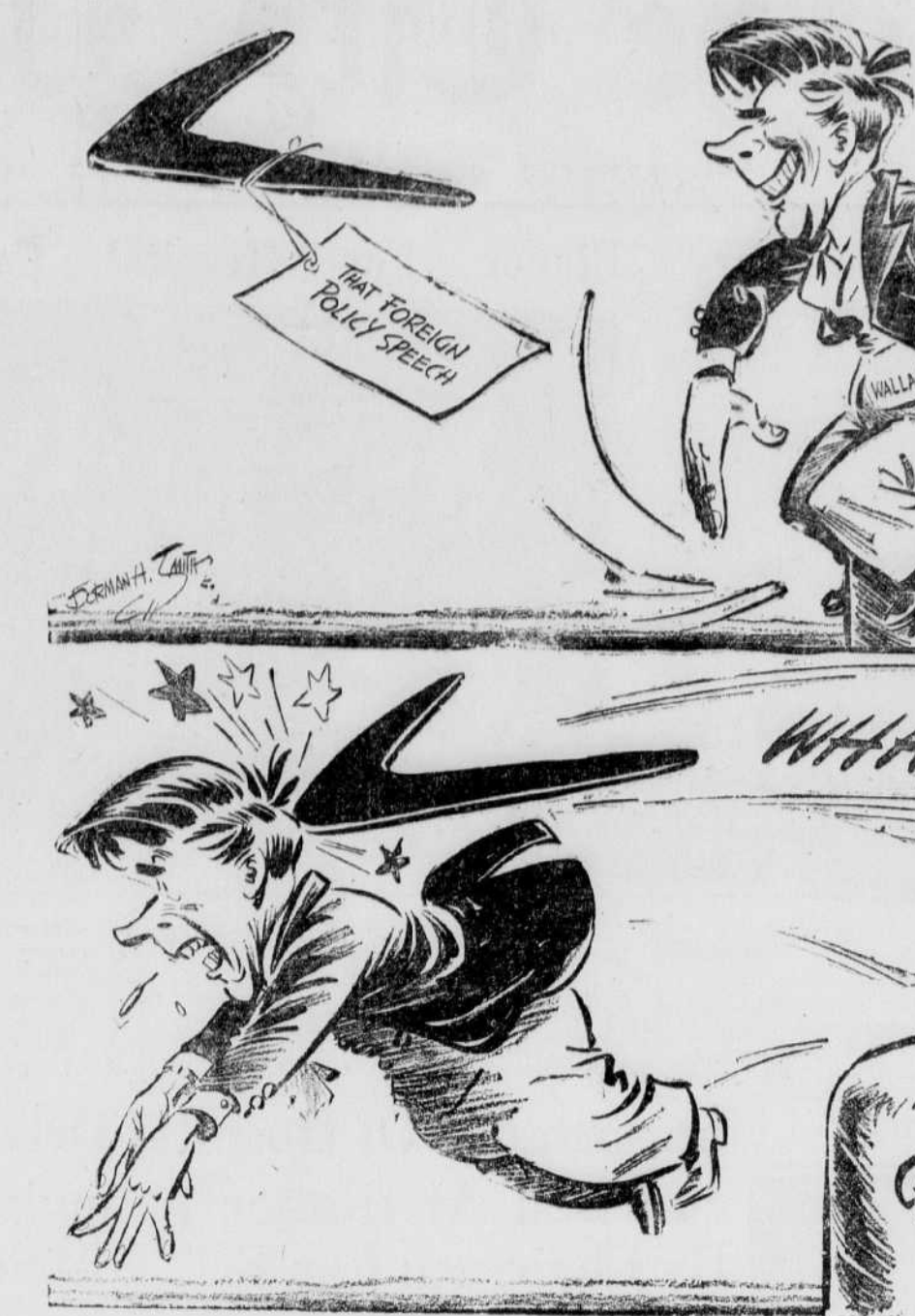
But this year, says Reece, the national issues are so important that they overshadow the local rivalries.

NATIONAL INTEREST MUST RULE Windsor Star

Organized Labor, in its established principles, is not essentially selfish. Its aim is to raise the living standard of the whole community. This being so, sound union theory was expounded by Hon. Humphrey Mitchell to the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada in his speech here yesterday.

If Mr. Mitchell's message could be summed up in a few words, it was, "The interest of all Canadians is the highest interest of every section of the people."

If Labor has erred, it is in forgetting, at times, this fundamental truth. It has done so under temptation and provocation which have almost forced on unions the selfish viewpoint which they seem to adopt from time to time.

Mr. Mitchell called on Labor and management to put their own selfish laws aside. This means a recognition of their community of interest. In its final analysis, it means a meeting of their minds as partners instead of antagonists.

As the Minister said, the ideal method of settling disputes is to have it done in voluntary negotiation between the contending parties, not under the spur of mandatory laws. Though he urged compliance with decisions of Governmental agencies, he spoke almost longingly of a time when it may be possible to do away with the controls now in force, leaving both branches of industry to work out their own highest good.

There is, too, an even broader consideration which Labor cannot afford to overlook. This is the maintenance of the price level. It is important not only to Canada nationally, but to her position in international commerce.

Runaway prices could cripple this country in the world market, which is essential that we hold. They could rob us of our power to compete, driving us in upon our backs, to dwell miserably in an island of inflation. This must always be a paramount consideration in the setting of wage rates, their relation to the price structure.

Mr. Mitchell did not discuss in detail individual disputes and other troubled situations. Rather, he laid down general principles in the simplest possible form. His was an appeal to reason and broad thinking. Given such thinking, conscientiously exercised by all parties, industrial disputes can be eliminated, and Canada can be set on the highroad to her great destiny.

DUE FOR LONG STAY Buffalo Courier-Express

Because he is disgusted with post-war conditions, Robert Smith, a 23-year-old veteran of the Merchant Marine, is on his way to the famed South Sea Island of Tahiti, sailing alone in an 18-foot sloop. He says he's going to stay there until the world settles down.

If Smith had invited all the people who share his views to accompany him, his little vessel would be swarmed by would-be passengers. He'd need a transport or two to accommodate them. As it is, judging from the trend of news from various parts of the world, Smith had better plan his Tahitian residence on a fairly long-term basis. If he waits until the world settles down, he's due for quite a stay.

TOO SERIOUS TO JOKE ABOUT St. Thomas Times-Journal

One feature of nearly all the strikes that have lasted a long time in Canada and the United States is that when a vote of the strikers is suggested so that they may declare for or against acceptance of a company's terms, which are always less than the union demanded but more than the company originally offered, the union leaders oppose it.

The leaders of the United Steelworkers union at Hamilton have thought up a new one, however, in regard to the ballot proposed by the Steel Company of Canada. The company made certain proposals, which, according to union officials, the men almost unanimously rejected by a show of hands at an indoor meeting about two weeks ago. But as there are 4,891 men on strike, and as the hall in which that meeting was held has a capacity for less than 1,000 people, it is obvious that probably not more than one-fifth had the opportunity of voting—with the eyes of the leaders, who spoke against acceptance of the terms, upon them. Accordingly, the company has mailed ballot papers, to each employee on strike, reading as follows: "Are you in favor of accepting the proposals given in the company's letter of September 18th, 1946, and returning to work at once?"

That seems a fair procedure, giving every man an opportunity to decide for himself, without any pressure being put upon him one way or the other.

But union director, C. H. Willard, and his associates do not like that kind of vote, so they have issued instructions to every man to "make a laughing stock" of the ballot by answering "Yes."

If these "leaders" had any sense of responsibility; any genuine feeling for the hardships which they and their families are undergoing and will continue to undergo in increasing measure, they would instruct the men to vote "Yes" or "No" according to their feelings. There is tragedy in hundreds of homes in Hamilton, merchants are also losing a large amount of trade, housing and national recovery are being sadly held back, and the cumulative loss to the city and country is enormous.

Extraordinary to relate the union had no strike funds. The strikers receive nothing except a small allowance for food. It is like sending a crew out on a stormy sea with no life-saving equipment; making men jump from a burning building with no net to break their fall. Evidently the leaders thought they would win a brief strike. They have demonstrated their stupidity and their unworthiness to be called "leaders" and to have such power over the lives of thousands of people.

But that does not disturb the union officials. They do not want the men to vote at all because they are afraid the result would probably be acceptance of the terms and a blow to their own prestige. It is fear that makes them tell the men to "make a joke" of the ballot.

NO RELIGIOUS ISSUE Windsor Star

Barring the Union Jack from one church in Quebec should not be made an excuse for further religious bitterness, though that will, unfortunately, be one result. This action is not an expression of the view of the Roman Catholic Church. It is merely the product of an intolerant attitude by an individual priest.

Though it exercises rigid discipline, the Roman Catholic Church gives to its parishes a large measure of autonomy. The clergy are permitted to wield great authority and the Quebec priest is probably within his canonical rights in barring the flag. He speaks, however, for himself alone, not for the great faith he represents.

We wonder if all these monetary benefits set out in this pamphlet, representing vast charges and mortgages on New Zealand's treasury, aren't in some way connected with that depressed New Zealand pound?

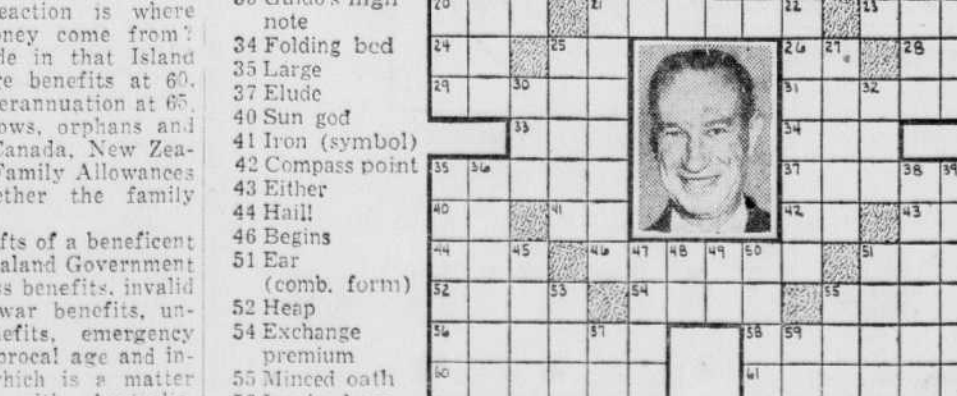

Winners Of Twenty Scholarships Given By Agric Institute

Twenty scholarships, each valued at \$800, awarded to Canadian scientists for advanced training in the field of agriculture, have been announced by the Agricultural Institute of Canada. The winners are all graduates of Canadian universities, and most provinces are represented in the list.

Fourteen of the winners will do advanced training at various institutions in the United States where special facilities exist for particular types of post-graduate work. The University of Illinois, Iowa State College, Virginia Polytechnic Institute, University of California, University of Minnesota, and the University of Wisconsin will all receive one or more of these candidates for periods ranging from one to three years. On completion of this work, all of these men will return to Canada to assume more important posts in the field of scientific agriculture.

Among the winners are nine veterans of World War II, whose academic careers were interrupted for varying periods owing to their service in the armed forces.

In announcing these awards, C. Gordon O'Brien, general secretary of the Agricultural Institute at Ottawa, states that it is anticipated an equal number will be allocated next year. The funds are provided by industrial firms interested in the future of agriculture.

The project would be a long-term one and these organizations are doing a valuable service to Canada by their generous investment in Canadian agricultural scientists.

Fall Shipment Eggs Begin To Britain

For the first time, a shipment of eggs held in refrigeration from storage until fall delivery to Britain was loaded at Montreal aboard S.S. Corralles, September 3 to 10.

Consisted of 58,000 cases of 30 dozen each brought to Montreal in railway refrigerator cars from as far west as Alberta.

Bought and stored for the British Ministry of Food last spring by the Special Products Board, this is the first of fall shipments to Britain expected to total 462,000 cases. With British as well as Canadian hens now in their period of lowest production, these eggs will reach Britain at the season when they are needed most.

When eggs that have been stored at 80 degrees Fahrenheit are subjected to regrading and shipping the sudden rise in temperature causes condensation on their shells and increases spoilage risk. To obviate this danger, the Special Products Board has arranged for carlot shippers to crush ice and salt to 32-33 degrees and to have these temperatures maintained to seaboard where the eggs are loaded into refrigerator space on ships with a temperature of 32-35 degrees.

This extra care will ensure delivery of finer quality storage eggs than ever before, say officials of the Dominion Department of Agriculture.

Will Be More Fruit Says New Estimate

Some encouraging figures are given in the latest estimates of the 1946 crops of tree fruits and grapes in Canada. The official estimate made at the end of August shows considerable improvement over the former estimate made in July. The apple crop is now estimated at 15,940,000 bushels compared with the July estimate of 15,644,000 bushels. This year's apple crop is 109 per cent greater than that of 1945 and 14 per cent larger than the 10-year-1935-44 average.

Pear prospects improved 9 per cent since July to bring the 1946 estimate to 816,000 bushels. The crop in 1945 amounted to only 600,000 bushels.

In the outlook for plums and prunes, an increase of 7 per cent brings the crop to 642,000 bushels. The 10-year average is 339,000 bushels.

Peaches also showed an improvement since July to bring the estimate to 2,086,000 bushels or 69 per cent above the 10-year average.

Apricot production is set at 166,000 bushels, or 1 per cent above the July level.

The cherry crop is now set at 237,000 bushels or an increase of 8 per cent over the July outlook of 248,000 bushels.

Grapes also show an increase since the July report. The present estimate of 72,182,000 lb. is 9 per cent above that estimate and 43 per cent greater than the 10-year average.

The Voice From Down Under : 2

Aussie Role As Little Nations' Champ Is At Stake In Their National Election

Editor's Note: Who are these Australians whose voice is so earnestly and insistently heard in today's world councils as they champion their way of living and speak out for the little nations? For a clearer understanding of these people, here is the story of why, "The Voice from Down Under" is so strong, so confident. This is the second of three dispatches.

Australians go to the polls this week-end to decide whether their country will continue to be the spokesman for the little nations at the peace conferences and in the United Nations or whether it will draw further into the shells of the British Commonwealth.

Leaders of both opposition parties, the Liberals and the Country party, feel that Australia should move slower in international politics, taking its guidance from over-all British policy.

LABOR PARTY STILL STRONG

Robert G. Menzies, Liberal Party leader, has said flatly that "Australia should not become the leader of the smaller powers."

Menzies feels that "the most powerful contribution to world peace and security lies in a closer integration of the countries of the British Commonwealth."

The Country Party objects most strongly to what it feels is the exclusion of Parliament from a proper voice in the proposals that Dr. Herbert V. Evatt, Minister of External Affairs and one of the country's leading Laborites, has placed before the Paris Conference.

The Labor Party, which has controlled the government throughout the war and thus far into the post-war era, has pledged itself to "enthusiastic and sustained support of the United Nations." Although the Party leader and Prime Minister, Joseph B. Chifley, does not exclude continued collaboration with Britain he has indicated he feels Australia should exercise a certain amount of initiative in international affairs.

There are domestic issues at stake too, but the election gives Australian voters their first opportunity in three years to ap-

prove or disapprove the Labor Party's foreign policies. Observers who have been watching the nation's political leanings believe that the final count will return the Labor Party to power, but perhaps not with the overwhelming majority it now has.

In any case, every eligible Australian voter goes to the polls and votes—either that or pays a fine for not voting. Australians, who take their democracy seriously, are required by law to vote.

Australia's government is a hybrid of the U.S. and British Constitutional Systems. From the U.S. it borrowed a Senate composed of an equal number of representatives from each of the six Australian states and a House of Representatives whose members are elected on the basis of population. Members of the House stand for re-election every three years. Senators are elected for six years, with half the members being elected every third year.

CONSERVATIVE LIBERALS

From Britain, Australia borrowed the system of parliamentary responsibility of the executive branch of the Government. The Prime Minister is leader of the dominant party in Parliament and his cabinet ministers must be members of the legislature.

Under Australia's constitution, the federal government is empowered to handle matters of defence, foreign affairs and commerce, and internal affairs affecting matters between states. State governments have much the same right as state governments in the United States.

Today, the Labor Party, which represents the strong Australian trade movements, is the most liberal of the three political parties. Both the Liberal Party and the Country Party tend towards conservatism, with the Country Party concentrating its basic appeal to agrarian elements. There is some Communist Party activity but that organization has found little popular support.

generously of their space in advance and carried stories during the fair.

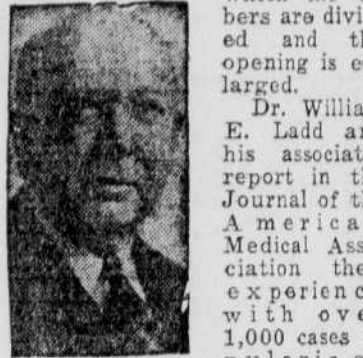

The Doctor Says

NEW-BORN BABIES MAY REQUIRE OPERATION

which this surgical operation is done with excellent results. In spite of the feeble condition of the infants, special preparation for the operation, careful anesthesia, and good nursing care resulted in restoration to health of all except 1 to 2 per cent of the little patients.

Thickening of the pyloric muscles is more apt to be present at birth in boys, especially the first-born of the family. There is no particular race in which the condition is most common, but certain families seem to have more cases of it than do others.

Vomiting Is First Sign

The first symptom of obstruction is vomiting, which appears between the second and the fifth week of life. The infant is hungry and takes his feeding eagerly; at first the food is gently returned, while later it is explosively rejected (projectile vomiting).

Vomiting rapidly reduces the child to a serious condition, as he becomes thin and wizened, loses weight and salt, and has scanty stools and urine. A lump is felt through the abdominal wall at the stomach opening, and the muscular contractions of the stomach are seen trying to force the food through the narrowed opening.

The first consideration in treatment is to restore the infant's lost water, salt, and sugar by injections in the vein and tissues. Blood or plasma transfusions help to restore protein loss. An immediate attempt to relieve the obstruction might be too much for the weakened infant, who must be put in the best possible shape for surgery.

The infant is kept warm during the operation, and special anesthesia is carefully administered. Following the division of the tight muscles, the abdominal incision is closed and special feeding to rebuild the infant's body is started.

When infants who have had a pyloric obstruction are back on schedule, they gain and do as well as other infants. (Babies are born with the condition, which is made worse by feeding.)

Infants born prematurely have been operated on successfully and have recovered before they reached the age at which they should have been born.

Other Vomiting Causes

Pyloric spasms, infections, improper feeding, and other conditions are causes of vomiting in recently born infants, but spasm cases are milder and are relieved by medicine and feeding.

Stomach spasms are as common in girls as in boys. No operation is necessary for their relief.

Recent success in surgical operation in the first few weeks of life is dependent on proper preparation, expert anesthesia, exact surgical technique, and good post-operative care. In the last 225 patients with pyloric obstruction whose cases are reported by Dr. Ladd and his associates, there was not a single fatality.

Question: My 18-year-old daughter is very nervous and cries a great deal. Could this be due to an over-active thyroid?

Answer: It could. An examination would determine the exact cause. Other possible causes are hysteria and certain forms of nervous trouble.

Pollet, a 20-game winner with the Cards this season and Brecheen, with a 14-15 record, pitch with the left hand. Hatten and Lombardi, winner of 13 apiece with the Brooks, also are southpaws.

The Sox also own a pretty fair pitcher with one of the best curve balls in the business in Joe Dobson, who has won 13 and lost six. The Cards can count on George (Red) Mungler, who has won two out of three since returning from the Army in late August.

BROOKLYN DODGERS CUT CARDS' LEAD TO HALF GAME

Dodgers' Victory Proves Costly Owing To Peter Reiser's Injury

New York, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Baseball, Ont., and one at the expense of the "war of nerves"—the National League pennant race—still raged today, with difference separating the front-running St. Louis Cardinals and the oncoming Brooklyn Dodgers once more at half a game.

Dodgers narrowed the gap yesterday when they defeated Philadelphia, 8-2, while the Cardinals were idle, the Brooks, idle today, still have two games to play as compared to three for the Redbirds. The Dodgers meet Boston twice in Brooklyn and the Cards clash with Chicago in St. Louis.

The key to the pennant race may lay in the fact that Boston and Chicago are battling for larger share of the world series money that goes to the team that finishes in third place. The Cubs hold third place by a half game margin over the Braves.

Hank Greenberg, Detroit's hard-hitting first baseman, who yesterday collected his 43rd and 44th home runs, needs only one in each of the Tigers' last three games to break Rudy York's single month record of 18 established in August, 1937.

Hank already has slammed 16 home runs this month, although he has played in only 23 of the Tigers' 28 September games.

During the last month, Greenberg has swatted 29 hits in 82 trips to the plate for a .354 average to boost his season's total to .280. Greenberg's pair of round trippers helped Tigers defeat St. Louis Browns, 6-3. It was the 27th triumph for Detroit in their last 36 games.

The battling Brooklyn Dodgers cut St. Louis Cardinals' National League lead to a mere half-game when they defeated Philadelphia 8-2 before a capacity crowd of 31,708 at Ebbets Field.

The Cards, idle yesterday, have three games left to play compared to only two for the Brooks. Each team plays its remaining games at home, the Cards taking on Chicago Cubs in all three games and the Dodgers clashing with Boston Braves.

The Dodgers victory proved costly, however, since outfielder Pete Reiser suffered a broken fibula in his left leg sliding back to first base in the first inning. He was taken to hospital for X-rays.

Dodgers got off to a one-run lead in the first inning, knocked out Charlie Schanz in the fourth with four-run outburst and added two more against Oscar Judd of Ingersoll.
