Little Belt affair.—We believe Government has received by the Holly, from Halifax, official accounts from Capt. Bingham, of the action with the American frigate President.

London, July 2.—On Saturday, about 150 sail of merchantmen arrived from the Baltic and Norway with cargoes, consisting of 90,000 quarters of wheat, tar, hemp, and other commodities. We are informed, that the saving in the duty on the timber by this fleet, which is augmented from the commencement of the present month, will amount to 150,000l. in favor of the importers.

July 3.—Lord Stanhope's Bill for preventing guineas from being received for more than 21 shillings, and for preventing bank-notes from being received for less than the sum expressed in them as payable to bearer on demand, was read a second time yesterday, after a very interesting debate, closed by a division, in which 36 were for the measure and 12 against it.

The following fresh order on the subject of Licences was issued yesterday by the Board of Trade:—

OFFICE FOR TRADE.
Present, Earl Bathurst, and Mr. Ross.
Minute, 2d July.

"Vessels clearing outwards to ports in the Baltic or White Sea, must clear out from the ports of landing on or before the first September next."

"Vessels proceeding with cargoes to the ports in the Baltic, will not be restricted as to the time of clearing; but if such vessels bring back return cargoes to this kingdom, they must arrive in the ports of the United Kingdom within the time limited by the Licence; it being clearly understood, that the voyage is to be completed in the time limited by the licence, as no further indulgence will be granted."

July 4.—The Board of Trade yesterday signified to the Brokers, that they had altered their intentions regarding licences from the Baltic, and that in future they would be issued in the old form, remaining in force until the 1st of January, 1812.

July 6.—A number of American vessels were yesterday condemned in the Admiralty Court, on the safe ground as the ship Fox.

PORTSMOUTH, July 5.—This morning sailed the Vengeur 74 guns, Admiral Sir J. S. York, Capt. Brown; Danmarke 74 guns, Capt. Bassett; Edinburgh 74 guns, Capt. Rolles; Pyramus 36 guns, Capt. Dashiwood, and Rover 18 guns, Capt. Finley, for the coast of America.

The Turkish government in Egypt has exterminated the Mamelukes, by a general assassination; and sold their families for slaves. 1200, with 25 Beyas, were sacrificed.—Of the latter were Schaker Bey, and the whole family of El-Bey.

Notwithstanding the war emigrations, the new Census gives a very considerable increase of the population of Great-Britain. The Spanish and Portuguese Patriots have both sent Ambassadors to Russia.

July 16.—Our accounts from Lisbon state that Lord Wellington had sent Blake with 10,000 men to make a diversion in the Canadão, in the rear of Soult's army. He is to co-operate with Gen Graham from Cadix.

According to official accounts, at the last dates from Elvas, Lord Wellington had 45,000 left after detaching Blake; and reinforcements were continually arriving at Lisbon. The French army was estimated at 58,000; but it is reported that a body of these had been sent to look after Blake.

Two mails have arrived from Anhalt. The following are extracts from the letters received by it:—

"Gottsbarg, July 6.—Again we have to announce the likelihood of a war between Russia and France, which is a matter that occupies the public attention now very much; indeed it is spoken of by some persons well informed with more certainty than ever. A war must inevitably break out, whether sooner or later, time must determine."

WINDSOR, July 13.—The following bulletin has been published. "His Majesty has had a fresh accession of his disorder."—[Signed by Physicians.]—This last paroxysm has been seriously severe and alarming; his Majesty was cupped; and has since been more composed.

July 15.—The report this morning is, "The King is a little better."

All hopes that His Majesty will ever be able to resume the royal authority, are at an end.

Eighteen additional troops of dragoons and dragoon guards are under immediate orders for embarkation.

COPENHAGEN (DENMARK), July 2.
On the 22d ult. there passed before Spotsberg, coming from the north, an English convoy, composed of 77 ships, 67 brigs, 45 galleons, and 4 schrs. Another convoy, coming from the Baltic, has passed the Isle of Faar, June 28. It consisted of 120 sail.

(French Paper.)

SPAIN. BATALES DEL DOURO, May 29, 1811.

The Supreme Junta (Provincial Congress) has received, and communicated by a Commissioner, the following particulars of an action near Vittoria, between the French and that intrepid partisan chief Don Francisco Espoz y Mina.

"From Vittoria we learn, that on the 25 May, a French detachment of 1200 infantry and cavalry, left that city to escort a large convoy, composed of 159 French and country wagons, laden with money and other spoils, and the camp equipment of General Massena, and others, which had been left in Vittoria;—there were also in the convoy about 1000 Spanish and English prisoners. They had been on the road only about two hours, when Espoz, who had previously posted his troops in ambush on both sides the road, permitted the French advanced guard to pass by, and suddenly attacked the main body of the convoy.—After some resistance on the part of the French, the General who commanded, erected a white handkerchief, and cried out, they had surrendered. The fire of the Patriots was then immediately suspended, and Espoz sent an officer in good faith to receive the enemy's surrender; but when the officer, unsuspecting any foul play, had advanced on the enemy, he was killed by a pistol. Enraged at this treachery, our warriors renewed the attack with such fury, that many of the enemy were killed, and the rest compelled to an unconditional surrender. The perfidious General, was immediately dragged out, and shot by a file of musketeers;—the prisoners were set at liberty, and in a minute were armed with the muskets of their oppressors, on whom they took ample vengeance. The combat continued four hours during which not less than 300 French were killed;—the rest were made prisoners;—among whom was a General officer who was wounded. It is calculated the booty captured is worth more than four millions reals. On our side we lost but 25 men, including peasants and some of the prisoners killed by our fire. At the last date Espoz maintained his position in expectation of intercepting and seizing some more of the spoils of the mob (cateruas) of French Generals who have passed Vittoria, among whom they enumerate Marshal Massena; Major-Generals Caffarelli, Loison, Solignac, Laboussaye, and Marchand; and Brigadiers-General Thoyonet, Bucquet, Grandjean, Barthelemy, Lapierre and Gratien."

The celebrated Castilian hero, Don Francisco Rovira, (the conqueror of Figueras), has arrived in this city. The Council of Regency have promoted him to the rank of Brigadier-General. The heroes of Ocho and Castelfolito (Don Joao Antonio Martinez, and the Baron de Eroles) have been promoted to be Marshals de Camp (Major Generals).

CADIZ, June 16.—The garrison of Figueras has made a sortie on Macdonald, surprised his camp, and killed upwards 1000 of his troops.

GIBRALTAR, July 13.—Blake is concentrating his forces near Ayamonte. The enemy's force opposed to him is from 11 to 12,000.—One of their detachments entered Huelva the 5th, and another was seen on the 7th passing through Lepz, shortly after BALLESTEROS had passed there on his way to Ayamonte.

Tarragona was carried by storm the 29th June. The two regiments which sailed from this bay on the 20th, had not landed.

On the 29th June, the Count of Montalivet, Minister of the Interior, made to the Legislative body an *Exposé* of the situation of the Empire. The following relates to a great object of the Emperor.

THE MARINE.

"We have lost Guadaloupe and the Isle of France.—The wish to assist those colonies was not so great as to cause us to risk our fleets in their relative inferior state. Since the reunion of Holland, that country has furnished us with ten thousand sailors and thirteen ships of the line. We have considerable fleets in the Scheldt, and at Toulon. Divisions of ships of the line, more or less strong, lie in our different ports, and fifteen

ships in the docks of Antwerp. Every thing is arranged so as to add each year a great number of vessels of war to our fleet of the Scheldt. Two ships of the line are building at Cherbourg; and the supplies of timber and materials of every sort are so plentiful in that port, that we may have five more on the stocks before the close of the year 1811. L'Orient, Rochefort, Toulon, have all their docks occupied. Numerous vessels are building at Venice. According to treaty, Naples was this year to have six ships of the line, and six frigates. That kingdom has not fulfilled this engagement. The government of that country will be convinced of the necessity of repairing that failure.—Our resources, our interior navigation, are sufficient to raise the material part of our navy, in a few years, to the same degree of elevation, as that of our enemies. Our experiments on the maritime conscription have succeeded; the young men of 18, 19 and 20 years of age, put on board of our ships, show the best dispositions and are rapidly progressing. The frequent excursions of our fleets, the coasting navigation, the evolutions of our squadrons and flotillas in the Zuyder Zee, the Scheldt, and our roads, have so far improved our young conscripts, as to excite the highest hopes."

New-York, Aug. 28.—We have conversed with a gentleman who left the Havana 12th inst; he informs that a British brig had arrived there which fell in with a fleet of merchantmen from Jamaica, July 26, for England, and was informed there had been no insurrection at Jamaica at that date.

JAMAICA.—We are happy to have been able to trace the report of the insurrection of the blacks in Jamaica, in such a manner, and to make such comparisons of dates and circumstances, as to warrant us in saying that no credit whatever is to be attached to it.—*Ed. Post, Aug. 26.*

BOSTON, August 28.

The Herald arrived in New-York on Saturday, left Liverpool the 9th July.—She brings despatches from Mr. Smith, in London, to the Secretary of State; and also despatches for Mr. Foster, the British Envoy. The following note to Capt. Price, of the Herald, shows the state of the public mind in England:—

"American Consulate, Liverpool, 8th July, 1811.
"Sir.—You have two despatches for the Department of State, No. 1 and No. 2.—In case of War, and you be brought to by a British cruiser, you will sink No. 1.

"JAMES MAURY."

The Exchange Coffee-House correspondent writes:—"The opinion in England was, that there would be war; and that our Government would make it." The London papers are not so late as those received here.

Extract of a Letter—Liverpool, July 9, 1811.

Boston Post Ashes, such as are free from crust or damage, now sell at 40s. to 42s. New-York at 38s. to 40s. and Pearl Ashes at 43s. to 45s. per cwt.—There is still a large stock of crushed Pot Ashes in the market, from which the consumers in general continue to supply themselves at 28s. to 35s. per cwt.

The prices of American produce have not advanced in this market, in anticipation of a war taking place. The American 6 per cent. stock fell in London at 105, the 3 per cent. at 67, and Louisiana 6 per cent. at 106. The premium of insurance from the United States to this country is three guineas per cent. Dollars 5s. 11d per ounce.

Yesterday we had a report, by a coaster, that six or seven sail of men of war were seen a few days since off Seguin, district of Maine, steering E. N. E. Probably Ad. York's squadron.

AUGUST 31.

London papers to the 16th July were received yesterday in the Packet from Liverpool.

We learn that the Packet spoke on the Banks, a British cruising vessel, and was informed from her that Admiral York's squadron was cruising in those latitudes, waiting the return of a despatch vessel, which he had sent to Mr. Foster, to regulate his future proceedings.—The report that the Admiral's squadron contained four sail of the line, probably arose from the Antelope, of 50 guns, bound to Newfoundland, being in company.

The passengers in the Packet say, the irritation which the first account of the battle between the President and Little Belt had excited in the English people, had abated; and at the last dates the expectation of an immediate war had subsided.

The new (double) duties on timber, lumber, staves, &c. took place on the first July; when the stamp duty on hats ceased.

We have received by the frigate, French papers to the 14th July.—They are unusually barren of any events worth translation. The articles copied into them from the Russian papers did not indicate any interruption of the amity existing between France and Russia.

The war, and preparations for it, between Russia and Turkey, continued with unabated spirit; and all the prognostics, of events in the Paris papers are in favor of the ultimate success of the Ottomans.

Sch. Ann. Kelly, as a cartel [see ship news], arrived yesterday, 4 days from Halifax. Sir Joseph S. York's squadron had not arrived there. Sir John T. Duckworth, the new Governor of Newfoundland, had arrived at St. Johns in the Antelope.—Sir George Prevost sailed 15th Aug. in the Melampus, for Quebec, as Governor General of his B. M.'s possessions in N. America; and the Commissary-General took passage in the Rattler.—Judge Groke was sworn in as President.—Gen. Hunter, had just arrived in the Indian from N. Brunswick, to take command of the troops at Halifax. 67 The Antelope, of 50 guns, sailed from England in company with Sir Joseph York's squadron.

FROM CARRACAS, July 14.

"This day the Junta came to a solemn Resolution, renouncing all allegiance to Spain, and FERDINAND 7th; and declaring the Republic of Venezuela to be a free, sovereign and independent Commonwealth; which has been proclaimed with all due formality. The Republic is composed of the provinces of Carracas, Cumana, Varidas, Margarita, Barcelona, Merida and Truxillo. The territory is not extensive, but very rich and fertile. MIRANDA was the writer of the declaration of Independence."

An account of the Court of Inquiry at Halifax on Capt. Bingham, appears to have reached England about the 11th of July, accompanied by a letter from Admiral Sawyer, commending the conduct of Capt. B. as understood by his own statement, and the opinion of the Court. Of the result of the Court, information was published some time since. They believed, from their investigation, that the frigate President fired first. Capt. Bingham himself sailed from Halifax about the middle of July for England.

SEPTEMBER 2.

From Portugal.—The report of a severe battle having been fought in Portugal, on the 18th July, is without foundation. Our latest accounts direct from Lisbon, are to the 24th of July, received at New-York, by the Brig Alliance, Capt. Brumley, who states, that there had not been any recent battles either in Spain or Portugal; that the French armies had not made any disposition of their force since their late junction. Capt. B. further adds, that a few days before he sailed, 4000 British troops, destined for Malta, touched at Lisbon, and was ordered to land and join Lord Wellington's army.

Extract from a Letter from an American gentleman in France—dated Paris, July 2, 1811.

"No decision has taken place on vessels captured since November; in short every thing seems to be suspended at present concerning American vessels before the Council of Prizes."

The letter from which the above is extracted is from a person now employed in claiming at Paris an American vessel taken under the Berlin decree since November last.

The last Baltimore Federal Republican, has the following article:—"The President having, at the demand of the British Minister, disavowed any orders as having occasioned the chase and battle with the Little Belt, and agreed to call a naval court upon the conduct of Capt. Rodgers, as we intimated some time ago, upon the authority of accurate letters from Washington, the apprehensions of war excited in England by that conflict, and the sailing of Admiral York with a reinforcement for the Halifax fleet, in consequence, do not indicate the approach of hostilities."

By a letter from the seat of government, we learn, that it is expected that a proclamation, laying an embargo on all vessels in the ports and harbors of the United States, in consequence of advices received by late despatches from the United States charge des affaires in London.—[Aurora.]

The editor of this Gazette has received satisfactory proof of the genuineness of the letter ascribed to Capt. Bingham, respecting the Little-Belt. Though the authority upon which we called in question the authenticity of that letter was highly respectable, and deserving of credit, it proves to be erroneous. The letter was certainly written by Capt. Bingham.—[U. S. G.]

The Wilmington (Delaware) Statesman says, that the night previous to the sailing of the Marengo French privateer, 23 additional recruits were put on board her by a sloop.

QUEBEC.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 12, 1811.

On Wednesday night, 4th inst. about twelve o'clock, the large store in the ship-yard of Messrs. Linthorne and Joliffe, at William Henry, was discovered to be on fire, which was in a short time consumed.

The inhabitants and troops from the garrison, with the fire Engines, immediately were on the spot, and by their great exertions preserved the other buildings in the yard, and the ships from the flames. Fortunately the wind was from the south, at the time, or the loss would have been greater.

The entire rigging of a large ship was removed from the store that was burnt down, only the day before, preparatory to the launching.

Property to a considerable amount was however, consumed; but the loss will not retard the extensive operations going on there; and, we understand, it is insured at Montreal, with the Phoenix-Office.

THE WAR IN SPAIN.

Portions of the Country occupied by the Contending parties.

Frontier towards France. Barcelona, Figueras, Pampeluna, St. Sebastian and Guente-Arbaia, given up to the French by the old Government before the war, and still held by the them; excepting Figueras.

Catalonia.—Lrida, Gerona, Tortosa and Tarragona, taken by the French after Sieges. The mountainous posts still held by the Spaniards.

Navarre, Biscaye, St. Ander and Asturias, all excepting the latter, occupied by the French. The whole of them are however occasionally infested by Spanish war parties; the chief of which is Espoz y Mina.

Gilicia—entirely occupied by the Spaniards, under Mahy. Kingdom of Arragon.—Sarragossa, the capital, taken by the French after a memorable siege. The Spaniards have still parties on foot in the Kingdom, and some regulars under Villacampa.

Old and New Castile and Leon, occupied by the French; but the Spaniards have strong parties in the mountainous parts, under the chiefs El Empeinado, Francisquete and Julian.

Kingdom of Valencia, never occupied by the French. The Kingdom of Murcia, is in the same predicament.

The Kingdom of Granada, occupied entirely by the French, but partly recovered since the movement of the French armies in Andalusia, towards Portugal.

Andalusia, excepting Cadix, occupied by the French; Spanish parties however still maintain themselves in the mountains.

Extremadura—occupied partly by the French and partly by Spaniards.

Total French force which has entered Spain from 1807 to January 1811. — 514,796
