

NOMINATIONS MONDAY

Three nominees, unanimously approved by the Westmount Municipal Association at its December 9th meeting, will present themselves on Monday at City Hall for what will probably be an 'election by acclamation'.

They are: Alderman J. C. Cushing for Mayor, to succeed the retiring Mayor A. Sidney Bruneau; and Frank B. Common, Jr. and Laird W. Bovard to succeed to Council seats 3 and 4, vacated by Aldermen Cushing and H. G. Seybold.

There have been no other nominations received by Secretary-Treasurer A. W. D. Swan but in the unlikely event of a poll becoming necessary an election would take place on January 19th from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. with polling booths located in various parts of the City.

Period for receiving alternative nominations on Monday is from noon to 2 p.m.

Brief biographies of the three nominees follow.

ALDMN. J. C. CUSHING

Born in Westmount in 1907 he graduated from Westmount High School. He went to the Royal Military College, Kingston, where he was awarded the Sword of Honor as top cadet of the class of 1928. Afterwards he joined the firm of McDonald, Currie with whom he graduated as a chartered accountant. He was Executive Vice-President of National Breweries until 1951 when he joined A. C. Leslie, distributors of steel and non-ferrous metals. He is president of the company. Mr. Cushing is President of the Boys' Clubs of Canada, a governor of the Montreal General and Verdun Protestant Hospitals, a former director of the Welfare Federation and a member of the Council of Saint George's Anglican Church.

FRANK B. COMMON, JR.

Born in Westmount in 1920, attended Roslyn and Westmount High Schools, graduated from the Royal Military College, Kingston, in 1940. Served in UK and North-west Europe with the Royal Canadian Engineers and returned in 1945 to study law at McGill. He graduated in 1958 and has been practising with the firm of Common, Howard, Cate, Ogilvy, Bishop, Cope, Porteous and Hansard since then. He is on the Council of the Canadian Bar Association, a lecturer on the Law Faculty at McGill, Chairman and President of the Verdun Protestant Hospital and a Governor of the Montreal General. He is on the Committee of Stewards of Dominion-Douglas Church. He was the first President of the Westmount-Hobby Show which started in 1937.

LAIRD W. BOVARD

Born in London, Ont., in 1918 he graduated from the University of Western Ontario with Honors in Economics in 1940. During the war, he rose to the rank of Major in the Canadian Armoured Corps and served for a period as ADC to General A. G. L. McNaughton. After the war he returned to Toronto where he joined an advertising agency. In 1947 he came to Montreal to the Bell Telephone where he is Advertising Supervisor for Customer Relations. He is Treasurer of Dominion - Douglas Church Men's Club, an Executive of the District Boys' Scouts' Association and a past president of Roslyn Home and School Association.

By-law meeting slated Monday

A meeting will be held Monday at City Hall of the elector-proprietors of Westmount to agree to, or demand a poll concerning, Council's decision to approve By-law 634 'to provide for the sale of part of the Westmount Athletic Grounds to the School Commissioners of the Municipality of the City of Westmount'.

The By-law also provides for the sale of the club house and the landscaped area known as Redfern Park. It has been emphasized by Council that the area to be sold will not materially affect use of the grounds as an athletic field.

The School Commissioners will also purchase the existing private property fronting on the south side of Saint Catherine street between Hallowell avenue and the landscaped property on the south-east corner of Hillside avenue and Saint Catherine street.

Westmount's population up

Two healthy twin boys, born to Mr. and Mrs. Gary Kelly, 4273 Dorchester, comprised Westmount's contribution to Montreal's first arrivals for 1959.

First-born was Daniel James Kelly, who preceded his brother, Dean Clifford, into the world within the space of one half hour. The twins were born at the Catherine Booth Maternity Hospital between 9.47 and 10.15 a.m. on New Year's Day.

This double blessing is also in the nature of double-trouble for Mr. Kelly, a 20-year-old sheet metal worker apprentice who is at present unemployed. The Kellys have another son, Richard, aged one and a half.

Unaware that he was to be the father of twins, Mr. Kelly said that his wife "had an idea" but that he "wouldn't believe her."

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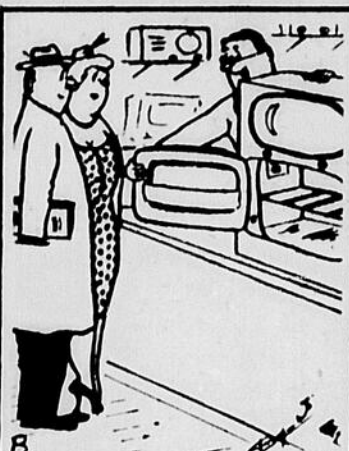

Obituaries**MRS. WILLIAM WREN**

Mrs. William Wren, a resident of N.D.G. for 55 years, and wife of William Wren, Police and Fire Chief of Westmount from 1898 to 1939, died Saturday in her 85th year.

Born Selinda Lillie Farrow in London, England, September 29, 1874, Mrs. Wren met and married her husband there, coming to Canada with him in the 1890's.

During the First World War, Mrs. Wren was president of the Red Cross group here. She was among the first members of St. Luke's Church, and for many years a member of the Dickens Fellowship. Active in charitable work throughout her life, she was a charter member of the Karnak Ladies' Club.

Mrs. Wren has been an invalid since an accident in her home some six years ago.

Services were held in St. Luke's Church, with Rev. B. B. Brown, a family friend for over 50 years, officiating, assisted by Rev. A. G. Moore.

Mrs. Wren is survived by her husband; a daughter, Lillie Mary (Polly); a brother, Frederick, of Oakville, Ont.; two sisters in England; two grandchildren, and five great grandchildren. A daughter, Margaraet, and a son, George, predeceased her.

H. ROUTH

Services were held Tuesday for Haviland Routh, 368 Kensington avenue, of the Merchants Coal Co. Ltd., who died Saturday at the age of 87.

A member of the first M.A.A.A. Stanley Cup team in 1893, Mr. Routh was born in Montreal, and was employed with the Dominion Bridge Co. until 1921. Shortly after, he entered the service of the Merchants Coal Co. Ltd.

A member of the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club, and the Royal Montreal Curling Club, Mr. Routh was also a life member of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association.

Predeceased by his first wife, the former Edith Elliott, he is survived by their daughter, Miss Marguerite Routh. He is survived also by his second wife, the former Lydia Acheson.

The project has been designed by Greenspoon, Freedlander and Dunne and the general contract for construction has been awarded to A. Janin and Co. Ltd.

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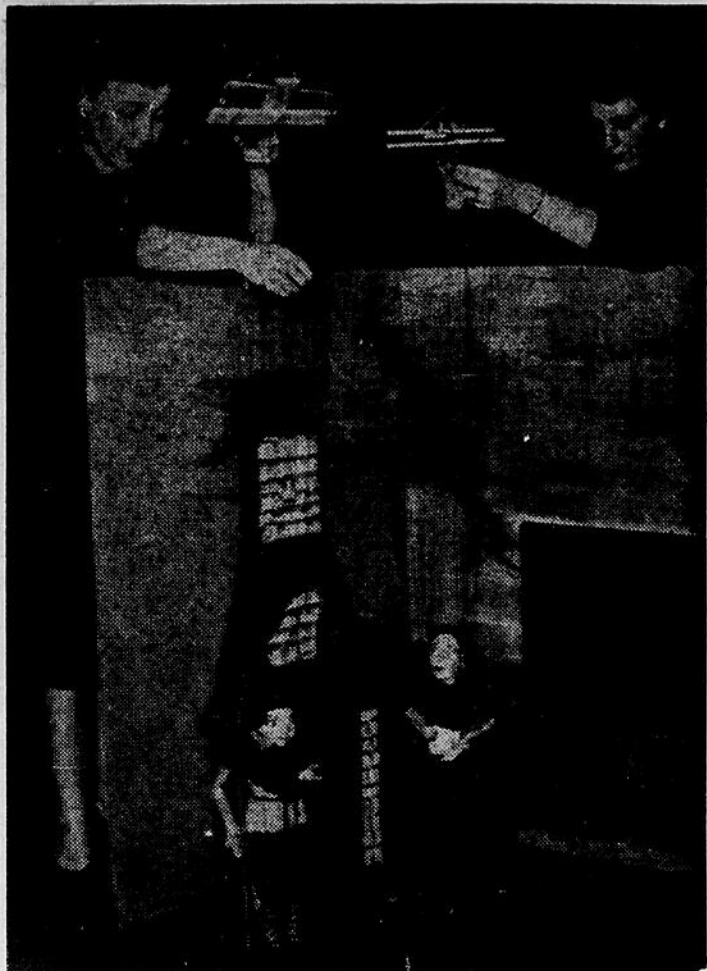

1st Baptist puppeteers present famous opera

Victoria Hall, usually associated with teen age dances, political speeches, or wedding receptions, was on Friday the scene of a very different type of performance; a puppet show by amateur enthusiasts of 1st Baptist Church and presented for the N.D.G. Women's Club.

The performance was "Amahl and the Night Visitors", preceded by a short curtain opener, "Alice and the Egg".

Playing "Amahl" was a nostalgic experience for the puppeteers; the American opera by Carlos Menotti had been one of their first shows over three years ago, when they played before their own congregation at the old 1st Baptist Church on Dorchester street.

To stage the play, the group employs a movable aluminum stage that provides them with a set six feet high, four feet wide and four feet deep, designed and built by Tom Mill and Bill Brady.

Black drapes hide the performers who stand on a raised wooden platform to manipulate the puppets; included in the cast of Amahl were: Eleanor Brady, Amahl; Lois Mill, Amahl's mother; Tom Mill, Shepherds; Ruby Harper, Margaret Mills and Netta Geddy, the Three Kings.

Mrs. Theo Dunn, wife of 1st Baptist minister Rev. R. S. Dunn and founder of the group, cooperated with her husband in "Alice and the Egg"; Mrs. Dunn played Alice while Mr. Dunn manipulated the Egg.

The husband and wife team spoke their lines while manipulating the puppets, a fairly difficult feat. Usually a taped voice is used with marionettes, enabling the puppeteers to give their full attention to handling the strings.

Also in "Alice and the Egg" were the silent but active Butterfly and Toad played by Eleanor Brady and Lois Mill.

Ruth and Steve Woronka handled properties, which included such doll house furniture as a little pot arranged to swing over the cardboard fireplace on a long hinge and tiny electric bulb candles which could be switched off when apparently blown out.

Plans are being prepared and soil tests have been made for construction of a 10-storey office building on the extension of Saint Catherine street west. Architect is Grattan D. Thompson, 4135 Sherbrooke street west.

Mackay school principal tells Rotary deaf story

Principal of the Mackay School for the Deaf, Mel Blanchard, said Wednesday that public opinion of a handicap which Helen Keller had described as being 'worse than blindness' was far less informed than it was over more spectacular afflictions.

Mr. Blanchard, head of the School for the past 17 years, was speaking at the Westmount Rotary Club's weekly meeting.

He said there were three main areas in which lay information was sadly lacking.

"First, people don't realize the severity of a handicap which prevents transference of thoughts into words. Second, there's a good deal of confusion about definition of the terms deaf and hard-of-hearing. Third, hearing aids are not the universal panacea people think they are. They are aids to deafness, not a cure."

These problems are all being tackled at the School, which started with nine pupils in 1869 on the initiative of local clergymen and philanthropists.

The School soon ran into financial difficulties, however, and in 1877 Mr. Joseph Mackay came forward with a deed of land on Decarie boulevard on which he erected the present building. It was opened by Lord Dufferin, the then Governor-General of Canada.

The School now has 91 children, 15 of whom are from Newfoundland which has no school of its own. Eighty-eight children live in the school.

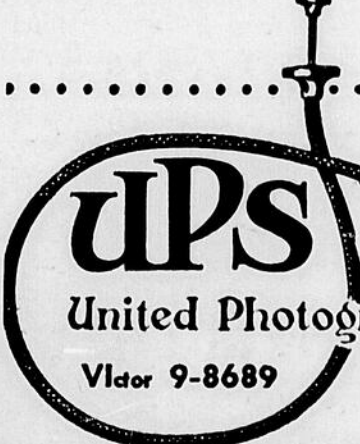
"A deaf child," went on Mr. Blanchard, "must learn a language he has never heard. He has to learn it from its printed form, from pictures and from lip-reading. Subjects must be taught in different ways."

The child learns words, builds them up into sentences, then fills in with numbers, colors, prepositions, etc.

"This is where the difference between the deaf and hard-of-hearing comes in," Mr. Blanchard said. "The deaf child has never heard a spoken word before he starts learning. The hard-of-hearing person has been able to build up a vocabulary before the affliction overtakes him."

Mr. Blanchard said that after school, more deaf children were being accepted into industry which had changed its attitude towards handicapped people and was now assessing them for jobs which they could do.

The institution is supported by a grant of \$8,000 from the provincial government, private donations and fees charged to pupils who live in Montreal. However, this is not enough to keep the school going and an annual campaign is conducted which will get under way this year sometime in February.



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WE SAY

Referendum is required

THE Westmount Municipal Council should be congratulated for their determined effort, through notices and press releases, to inform the citizens of their democratic rights and privileges in connection with the proposed sale of the Westmount Grounds and Redfern Park to the Westmount, Protestant School Commission.

We regret the meeting is not to be held in Victoria Hall in the evening when citizens would be free to attend and obtain a full explanation of the project.

However the council

have fulfilled the letter if not the spirit of the law in calling the meeting at 9 a.m.-10 a.m., Monday January 12th, at the City Hall. If ten or more elector-proprietors register objections to the bylaw approving the sale, then it will be necessary to hold a referendum.

There are two sound reasons why the elector-proprietors should turn out and vote on Monday for a referendum.

(1) This is one rare occasion on which citizens have been given advanced notice of an opportunity to express their wishes. This opportunity should be seized upon to show the council that the elec-

Archdeacon recalls adventurous youth

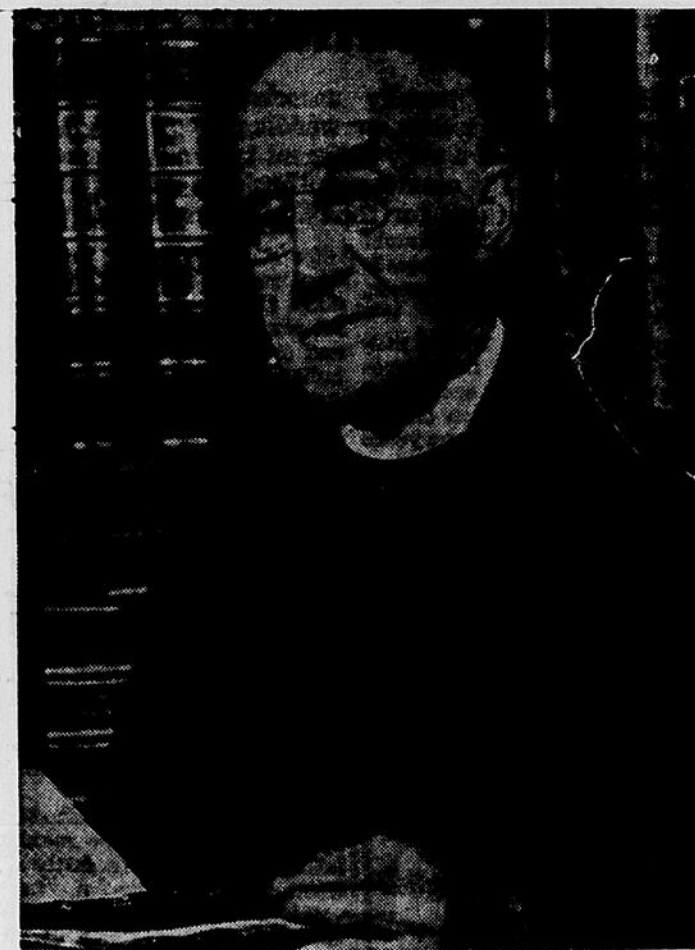

For 18 years Archdeacon Reuben Kenneth Naylor has been rector of N.D.G.'s historic Trinity Memorial Church. For about the same length of time he has been

faithful columnist on religious affairs

Neither parishioner nor reader of the Archdeacon could fail to learn something from his sermons and articles. The twinkling brown-eyed rector is a scholar, former professor, and in a somewhat more adventure-some vein, a founder and still very active executive member of the Fellowship of the West, an organization which since 1928 has been sending priests to the outskirts of civilization in Western Canada.

In the latter connection the Archdeacon spent the summer of 1930 as an Anglican missionary "pushing a car" with Rev. Selwyn Willis, the present rector of Grace Church at Pointe St. Charles, to Notikewin, 400 miles north of Edmonton, Alberta, and onwards to Fort St. John, B. C. The pair held services and conducted 55 baptisms, including seven in one family on one day. That next summer Archdeacon Naylor married Mary Barton, of Quebec City, daughter of the late Maj. Rev. William Barton and Marion

Pope Barton, and took her on a mission honeymoon to the same outposts.

"That same summer I walked from Fort St. John to Hudson's Hope, a matter of 70 miles in two days," said Archdeacon Naylor in nostalgic mood during an interview in his book-lined church study which boasts a painting of the first Trinity Church of 1840 in

Bonsecours Market and portraits of all Trinity's rectors but one, including the first, Rec. Mark Willoughby. "My first summer out West was in 1928 when I assisted a parson with a 20,000 square mile territory in the north end of the Fraser Valley in British Columbia," he reminisced.

Light

As the Christmas Season closes with Little Christmas my mind harks back to the Gospel for Christmas Day, and the word "Light" in particular. John came to bear witness to the Light. "He was not the true Light, but came to bear witness of the Light, that all men through him might believe. "I am reminded that in the creation story "darkness was upon the face of the deep;" and the first word of creation was "Let there be light." Light was the essential that the great evolutionary work of creation might go forward. Now in the fulness of time there was to be a new creation and again the essential was Light; John "came for a witness, to bear witness of the Light, that all men through him might believe."

In the beginning the light was for material creation. In the new beginning "that was the true Light that lighteth every man that cometh into the world." And that true Light lighteth every man by casting light on every subject that man is concerned in. It is perfectly true that He is the Light of the world. He casts His Light on the world and we see it as a new place. Philosophers and religious people have tended to think of the material world as an unworthy thing. But Our Lord shows by His acceptance of it that it is worthy to house God Himself. The whole creation is ennobled by the Incarnation. The same elements that provide an earthly home for you and me provided exactly the same kind of earthly home for Him.

He casts His Light on mankind and discloses a natural nobility in human nature which is not unworthy of Him. The old philosophers ennobled the soul and thought little of the body. To them the body was a tomb for the soul and the soul was glad to be released from its tomb. But by His Incarnation He ennobled the body. "The Word became Flesh and dwell among us, and we beheld His Glory," and what we beheld was His body, "which we have looked upon, and our hands have handled of the Word of Life." The human body has been so ennobled by the Incarnation that human nature can never be complete without body. The Resurrection of the Body became the necessary result of Incarnation.

Surely, too, the fact that the "Word was God," and "the Word became Flesh," sheds a flood of light on the nature of God. No longer were men to say that God was so far removed from our human earthly life that we could not even approach Him. They were to realize that it was no longer necessary to make elaborate and costly animal sacrifices. Rather, because God has taken our human form and our nature

So now we're going to wax our skis. Okay? (Or maybe just change a typewriter ribbon.)

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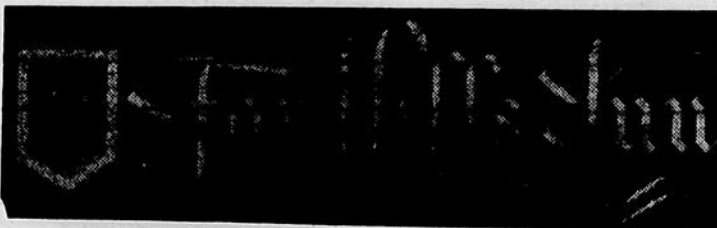

Archdeacon Naylor explained, was inspired by Miss Eva F. M. Hazel, OBE, of Sunday School caravan fame in the West. "Rev. Elton Scott who is now assistant rector at Grace Church-on-the-Hills, Geoffrey Guiton who died in missionary work in India, in the 40's, and I thought that if a woman could do that sort of work, men could," said Archdeacon Naylor. "We got the idea to send a priest and layman to work on the outskirts of settlement wherever a team was needed. We got the support of the bishop and clergy and off went Elton and Bill Sprenger, who was killed overseas during the second world war, on the first mission in the summer of 1929."

The Fellowship, with a membership of 600, very largely laymen, is still one of the Archdeacon's major interests, still thriving, maintaining always one and sometimes two priests in the field and holding weekly executive meetings in Herbert Simonds Parish House. "We send men out to get first hand knowledge of missionary work, to give help to isolated people and to come back and tell about it," said Archdeacon Naylor.

As a member of the General Synod of the Anglican Church of Canada since 1927, and incidentally its senior member now, the Archdeacon has attended meetings in the West. "Whenever I get out there I slip north to see how the Fellowship work is developing," he said.

As for matters nearer at hand, Archdeacon Naylor said that Trinity is the brightest church in the city. "We are most proud of our organ and our choir of 10 men and 30 boys," said the Archdeacon. "The boys join the choir of their own free will and it has a most interesting effect on them. They are never completely happy with any other choir."

Did Archdeacon Naylor as a boy ever sing in a choir? "No, I pumped the organ in my father's country church at Shawville," he laughed. His father was the late Archdeacon W. H. Naylor whose first parish was Phillipsburgh, then St. Paul's at Shawville for 31 years, and lastly at Farnham for 10 years. "Father died a year after his retirement 40 years ago," he said.

Archdeacon Naylor was the youngest of six brothers. His oldest brother, Rev. Henry Alfred Naylor, the first rector of Dawson City, died two years ago. "My brother went to the Klondike in 1896 as a missionary to the Indians and stayed there through the Gold Rush," he said. "In 1907 he came to Chelsea, Quebec, went on to take parishes at Arundel, Freligsburg, St. Lambert, St. Cyprian's, Maisonneuve, and lastly Valleyfield. All my brothers died within five years of each other."

Archdeacon Naylor was educated at Shawville Academy, "very much the country school, where you got Greek rather than physics." At the age of 16 in 1902 the Archdeacon matriculated and went on to take his BA at McGill University in 1906. While taking theology at the Diocesan College Archdeacon Naylor served as junior lecturer in classes at McGill. He graduated in theology in 1912 and taught for six years.

At the age of 26 Archdeacon Naylor was appointed deacon at Rawdon, Quebec, charged with a mission of 300 souls. He stayed there 13 years and hated to leave. "I came back to the Diocesan college in 1925 as a lecturer in theology, a professor of the New Testament," said Archdeacon Naylor. "I love teaching and spent until 1940 at the college. I had some brilliant students. The two things I consider most important for any-

one entering my vocation are a real care for people and a real faith in God."

In 1939 Archdeacon Naylor was appointed to the Montreal School Board to succeed the late Bishop Carlisle. "Those were interesting years," said the Archdeacon. "My main interest has been mentally retarded children who require very specialised teachers. I regret that not enough is being done for them."

Archdeacon Naylor was appointed rector of Trinity in 1940 and two years later he became Canon of Christ Church Cathedral and in the fall of 1955, Archdeacon of Montreal.

The Naylor's live on Northcliffe avenue and have four children. One married son, Ronald, is a salesman. Three daughters are Penelope, a pilot instructor and employee of the Bell Telephone Company; Rachel, who is in her third year nursing at Montreal General Hospital, and Gillian Mary, 12, a Westmount Junior High School student.

How does he feel about his sermons? "I like to think I teach rather than preach," concluded the Archdeacon.

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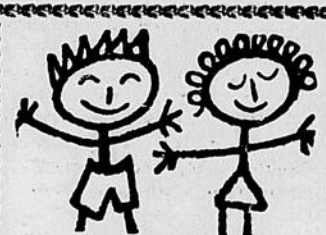

A touch of Hawaii on Peel street

Wintry blasts of snow and wind notwithstanding, the new and exotic Kon-Tiki (meaning Sun God) room of the Sheraton-Mt. Royal hotel joins the galaxy of fine restaurants coming within the purview of dining-out Montrealsers.

This fascinating peregrine establishment, with all the Hawaiian atmosphere and culinary delights of the Islands artfully incorporated, is the brain child of Steve Crane and the hotel's general manager, Garner A. Havers.

Crane, a former Hollywood producer-writer, stepped into a field usually invaded (sometimes not too successfully) by retired prizefighters, hockey and baseball players, shortly following his separation from the armed services after World War II, with some pretty glamorous aplomb and triumph.

Together with Alfred Mathes, who has the rare distinction of having been both born and raised in Los Angeles, he formed the Macrane Corporation, and the new company's first restaurant venture, Lucey's, is now a long and well established Hollywood eating and drinking spot.

In 1952, Crane's vivid imagination and creative talent brought forth the prototype of Montreal's Kon-Tiki room when Mathes and he unveiled the Luau restaurant in Beverly Hills, and offered movieland's denizens and visiting "mouth agapers" something different and very pleasing in the way of décor, eating and surroundings.

Good looking and personable, the Indiana-born Crane graduated from Wabash University with a degree in Business Administration; headed for California in 1940 with a bunch of scripts under his arm, and landed with Columbia Studios.

Saved from such mundane and everlasting high paid serfdom (although he's not exactly starving now) by a yen for the restaurant business and by the war, Crane has over the ensuing years developed a keen sense of interior design and a quick "savvy" of what appeals to the public. The Kon-Tiki, his latest masterpiece, has the full benefit of his good taste and excellent supervisory abilities.

In his conversations with your observer, the ex-producer-writer's easy manner in explaining such menu items as Bali Miki (Monkey on a Stick—heaven forbid!) an appetizer made of broiled tenderloin of beef basted with ginger; Kon-Tiki Chicken, morsels of chicken dipped in egg batter and cooked in peanut oil to a golden crispness, then sautéed with green peppers and fresh pineapple; or another little Hawaiian concoction of fresh pineapple with shredded coconut served in a half coconut shell, one gets the impression that our host Steve Crane has just flown in from the South Pacific with a lei around his neck.

And, as Uncle Beauregard remarked, if the cigarette and checkroom girls were dressed in hula skirts you'd never know it's winter outside.
