THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS.

We are enabled this morning to place before our readers a tolerably complete report of the result of the Ontario elections. It would appear that Mr. Mowat has been sustained by a very small majority.

THE TALK OF THE DAY. From Washington, we hear that President Cleveland is being closely guarded, lest some crank, fired by the success of the slayer of M. Carnot, may imitate the Anarchist, and kill the President.

Today, the Senate and Chamber of Deputies will meet at one o'clock, at Versailles, to elect a President, in the room of the lamented victim of SANTO's brutal knife.

“Marie Francois Sadi Carnot, fourth President of the French Republic, was born at Limoges, France, August 11, 1837. He was the eldest son of the ex-Minister Hippolyte Sadi Carnot, of 1848, who died in 1888, and was the grandson of Lazare Carnot, known as the “organizer of victory.”

Naturally enough, French feeling against the Italians in Paris, has arisen very high, and open violence has been threatened. The Italian King and his Ministers, and Legislature, have behaved very well, under all this, and Italy has joined the other nations in sending messages of sympathy and condolence to France, and to the wife and family of the murdered President. It is to be hoped that the work of a madman will not add to any bitterness of feeling which existed between France and Italy before the assassination took place.

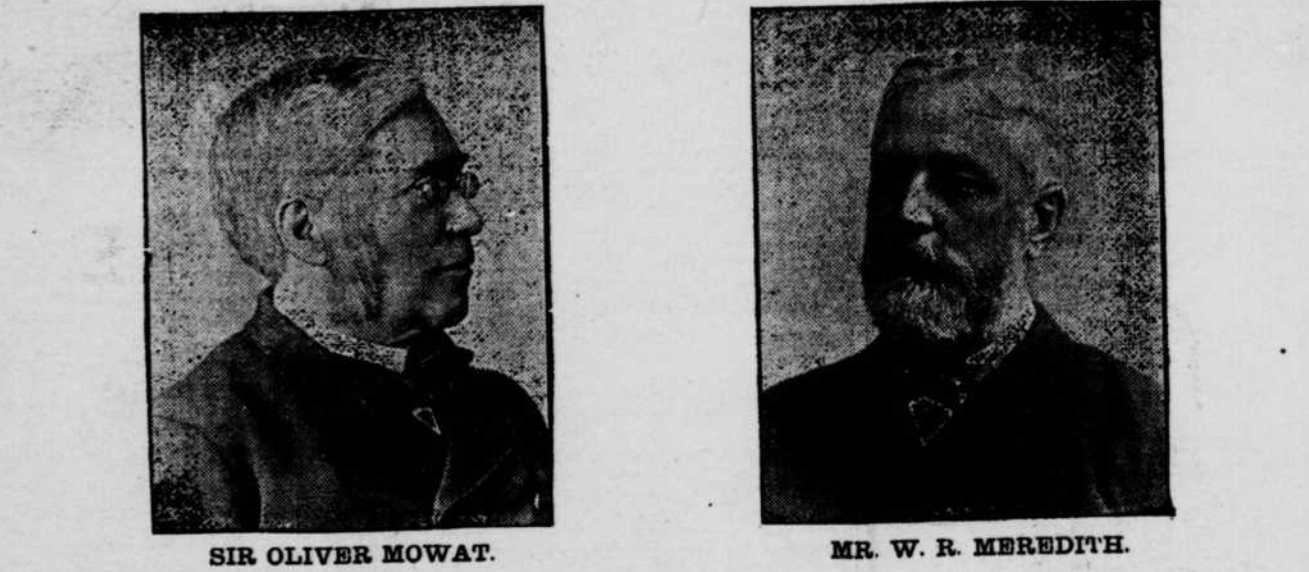
