He said he was insured for \$15,000 and once dead his family would be provided for. Mr. Forget disclaimed Hubbell. He denies that he bought the stock on the Street Exchange owned by the firm of Rogers & Hubbell...

THE OTTAWA AND NEW YORK RAILWAY. CORNWALL, July 23.—The contract for the building of the Ottawa and New York Railway from Cornwall to Ottawa, by the Ontario and Quebec Railway Company and the Northern New York Railway Company, will be completed by the Ontario and Quebec Railway Company and give a short through line from Ottawa to the American metropolis, has been let to a strong construction company which will begin work at once, as soon as the line is finally located. Two parties of engineers have been at work from both ends of the line and have nearly completed their survey.
