Ladies and Gentlemen who propose to attend are requested to bring with them two cards each, with their names legibly written thereon, one to be left at the door of the Presence Chamber, the other to be handed to the Aide-de-Camp in waiting.

REGULATIONS FOR DRAWING-ROOM.

His Excellency, Her Royal Highness and suite will enter by the main entrance and will proceed to the Legislative Council Chamber.

The private entrance which will consist of as follows:—

1. Lieutenant-Governors of Provinces.
2. Archbishops and Bishops according to seniority.
3. Members of the Cabinet according to seniority.
4. Speaker of the Senate.
5. Judges of the Supreme Court.
6. Chief Judges of the Courts of Law and Equity according to seniority.
7. Members of the Privy Council, not of the Cabinet.
8. Members of the Senate.
9. Speaker of the House of Commons.
10. Puisne Judges of the Courts of Law and Equity, according to seniority.
11. Members of Executive Council within their Province.
12. Speaker of Legislative Council within his Province.
13. Members of Legislative Council within their Province.
14. Speaker of Legislative Assembly within his Province, with their wives and daughters will enter by the door leading to the Legislative Council offices, and will assemble in the Reading Room.

All other ladies and gentlemen who propose to attend will enter by the speaker's entrance, and will assemble in the Legislative Assembly Chamber.

The private entrance will enter first, and will be followed by those in the Assembly Chamber.

After passing the Throne, those who desire to remain will be afforded accommodation in the galleries.

The following special cable appears in to-day's Toronto Globe:—

"London, June 6.—It is understood on good authority that the Letellier affair is not yet decided. Messrs. Langevin and Abbott still remain here, and will possibly await the arrival of Sir John Macdonald and Sir Samuel Tilley."

The *Eclair* has answered the *Canadien* in terms which, for polished sarcasm, can hardly be exceeded. It has produced, however, no perceptible effect on the dull malignity of the *Canadien*, which has since resumed its insolence to the Marquis of Lorne mingled with manifestly seditious and threatening language to the Government of England and a scarcely disguised attack on British connection. Again he reproduces the cuckoo cry of the *Bleus* about being the majority! Surely the most ordinary prudence ought to guard that party against an expression so full of danger to all their pretensions as that of a majority. Why do they insist on hastening the advent of Legislative Union and raising the ghost of "Representation based on Population?"

The rash declaration of Sir John A. Macdonald that the defeat of the Ontario section of the *Bleu* party would be taken as a condemnation of the "National Policy," will probably cause considerable embarrassment to himself and his friends in the next session of the Dominion Parliament. He will be told that he is the Minister whose policy, by his own admission, has been condemned by about two-thirds of the constituencies of his own Province, the most populous of the Provinces of the Dominion, and the one in whose interests, above all others, that policy was inaugurated; that, above all men, he sought to conciliate the farmers of Ontario, and that they have repudiated him and disapproved of his course. This he will doubtless be told in trenchant

terms. Would not a little less mouthing and blustering over their own majority be wise on the part of the Quebec *Bleus*? They were very confident over the elections of Quebec, which followed the dismissal of DeBoucherville and his followers; the result did not justify their confidence. They counted with confidence on Ontario up to now, and the result should teach them caution. Other people will remember the word "majority," when they will wish it forgotten.

The London *Times* says the failure of the Australian and European Bank, of Melbourne, is supposed to have been due to the lock up of its capital in land. Further difficulties are reported involving the suspension of another local bank. The assets are stated at £650,000. The associated Australian banks have arranged to pay the outstanding notes of the broken bank, which amount to £30,000. It is thought the creditors will be paid in full.

TO-NIGHT'S RECEPTION.—The drawing-room in the Parliament Buildings to be held by their Excellencies this evening, promises to be a very brilliant affair. The rules for the guidance of those attending it appear again to-day in another column over the signature of Major DeWinton. The Legislative Council Chamber has been turned into a beautiful garden where are gathered all the tropical and exotic plants and flowers known to the eye of the connoisseur, which have been lent by Colonel Rhodes.

PERSONAL.—The Rev. Henry Roe, Professor of Divinity at Bishop's College, arrived in town to-day and is the guest of the Lord Bishop. Dr. R. H. Russell left on a trip to Europe by to-day's mail steamer.

CARELESS WORKMEN.—Either through carelessness or incapability the workmen in charge of a winch in operation at the Young Men's Christian Association building, St. John street, lost control of the machine while hauling up a piece of wood yesterday, which came within an ace of falling on a lady who was passing at the time. Many persons too have been injured by the openings in their temporary sidewalks.

BOY DROWNED.—A young son of Marjorie Bilodeau, verging on seven years of age, named Joseph, residing at New Liverpool, left his home yesterday morning to go and gather chips. His body was found in the afternoon in the river at Benson's booms.

ST. PETER'S CHURCH.—The Rev. Henry Roe, Professor of Divinity of Bishop's College, will preach in St. Peter's Free Church on Sunday evening at seven o'clock. The offertory will be devoted to Bishop's College, Lennoxville. Services 8 a.m., 10.30 a.m. and 7 p.m.

ENGLISH CATHEDRAL.—Morning prayer will be said in the Church of Holy Trinity at 9 o'clock to-morrow. It is the intention of the Lord Bishop to hold an ordination at 11 o'clock. The sermon on this occasion will be preached by the Bishop, and there will be a celebration of the Holy Communion. The offertory will be given to Bishop's College, Lennoxville.

MUSIC HALL.—This is the last evening of H. M. S. Pinafore, the performance of which has received great praise from all who have seen it.

MERCURY BUILDINGS.—During the week of festivities attending the public reception of Their Excellencies, the Mercury Buildings will be decorated with the national flags of England, Ireland, Scotland, Canada, France, United States, Germany, Belgium, Italy, Spain, Norway, &c.

LECTURE ON MANITOBA.—The Rev. Canon O'Meara, M.A., Professor in St. John's College, Manitoba, will deliver a lecture in National School Hall, on Tuesday, 10th June, at 8 p.m., the Lord Bishop of Quebec in the chair. The subject of the lecture will be "The New Canada" or, the history, resources and prospects of Manitoba and the North-West. The reverend gentleman has been seven years in that country and has travelled extensively over its surface, and should therefore be able to give an interesting and reliable account of Canada's Western possessions. At the close of the lecture a collection will be taken up in aid of the work of the Church of England amongst the new settlements springing up so rapidly in all parts of the prairie province. We trust a large audience may gather on that occasion to welcome our visitor from the far West.

VICE REGAL VISIT TO LAVAL UNIVERSITY.

About four o'clock yesterday, after leaving the Art Exhibition, His Excellency and Her Royal Highness drove direct to the Laval University. The Vice-regal party was received at the door of the main building by the Very Revd. Father Hamel, V.G. the Superior of the Seminary, and the Professors, who were presented to the distinguished visitors in the reception room. From the parlor, the party was conducted to the Convocation Hall, the band of the Seminary playing the National Anthem as Her Royal Highness and His Excellency entered. The room was beautifully decorated and manifestations of a hearty welcome were visible on all sides. The professors and students were all present in their academical robes and gowns. The Vice-regal party present consisted of Her Royal Highness, His Excellency, Major and Mrs. DeWinton, Hon. Richard Moreton, Miss Montalda, Captain Harbord, A.D.C., and Mr. John Kidd. After the National Anthem, Father Hamel, Rector of the University, in the name of his council, presented His Excellency with a beautifully worded French address:

To the address His Excellency made the following reply in French:—

"MONSEIGNEUR ET MESSIEURS,—

"The rivalry to which you have made allusion in your eloquent and kindly address as still existing among the subjects of Her Majesty in Canada should never be extinguished in that form which leads to a rivalry in obedience to laws in their just and free development, and in generous efforts to make each Province the foremost in representing our country, and in leading Canada on the paths of prosperity and order. This University, dominating thought among your people, as your fine building dominates your city, is the agent to which men look in the hope that the rivalry which must exist shall be well directed, and shaped to worthy ends. We enter with the greatest interest the halls where you undertake this task, and we reciprocate with warmth the wishes to which you have given utterance, in our prayers for your welfare. We rejoiced to see the authorities of this great Foundation at the Quay, where we landed two days ago, among a people who showed in the most emphatic manner, and with a noble generosity the confidence they place in the representative of the Queen. Believe me, this confidence is not misinterpreted by me. It is to no individual that this respect is paid, but to the exponent of a system of government, under which a freedom undreamed of in other lands is united to the ancient forms and the temperate rule under which the people of our Empire have found their happiness, their power, and their unity.

Let me thank you for the kindness of your welcome, and express the hope that I may have some share in the appreciation accorded to your labours by the public, in continuing the grant of the prizes instituted by Lord Dufferin who valued so well your University, and knew, as an accomplished scholar, how to appreciate its learning. Here the students partake from your teaching, of honey gathered from many beautiful growths from many lands; for travel is as great an educator as the reading of books, and among your professors are those who have seen "many men and cities," and who have followed the practice of the Fathers of Christianity in America, and have learned to know foreign tongues, the old world and its living men, as well as the undying literature. The authors of this seat of learning have provided the means by which the study of medicine can be pursued in an ample manner open to few, for here the healing arts are taught in a way worthy of the race which produced Broussais, Bichat, Corvisart and Pinel. The natural sciences are taught to men who in taking their share in the development and discovery of the natural wealth of this vast continent, will continue the work begun by their ancestors, the first explorers of Canada. In this part of the country alone there are natural riches which are insufficiently known, and only need enterprise for their working. It is a land where gold and precious and beautiful marbles and precious stones should add by their treasures to aid the people whose chief reliance must always be on the thrifty cultivation of the soil, and who, in raising cattle, will provide for their own prosperity by feeding the markets of Europe.

I esteem it an honour to be received by you, and my sincerest desire is that the University of Laval may ever be permitted by Providence to hold aloft the lamp of learning among the noble and generous people of Quebec."

At the conclusion of His Excellency's reply, the distinguished party were shown through the University, and

accorded to take particular interest in the museum, in which they spent upwards of an hour. They also visited the library, and inscribed their names in the Visiting Book—a new one, being headed by their signatures. Both His Excellency and Her Royal Highness appeared delighted with their visit, and only left the institution at 6 o'clock.

STORM AT RIMOUSKI LAST NIGHT.

Wharf and Houses Demolished—Loss \$30,000.

Rimouski, June 7.

A storm of north-east wind commenced at 10 p.m. yesterday, blowing 35 miles an hour and at 5 a.m. blew 66 miles. It is now diminishing. The schooners Marie Luce, Shamrock, St. Lawrence, and the batteau Levis, were blown ashore here. A great amount of damage is done to the wharves and buildings, several of which were blown down and carried away. The sea rolled on to the street and carried away sidewalks, &c. The shore is strewn with smashed boats, wood, &c. The lighthouse at the long wharf was washed away. The railway track on the wharf was torn up. The loss is estimated at about \$30,000.

This Afternoon's Cablegrams.

Liverpool, June 7.

The Canadian cattle, ex City of Bristol, arrived in the Mersey on Wednesday. They were detained on account of suspected pleuro-pneumonia and one of them was slaughtered on the same day. The lungs exhibited signs of congestion, probably from exposure, and were sent to the Privy Council office, London. Some more of the cattle were slaughtered last night, and as there was not the slightest trace of disease discovered, the remainder were released to-day. The cattle from Windsor also passed. The cargo, ex Dominion, appears healthy, and probably will be allowed to enter alive to-morrow.

London, June 7.

The Rev. Jerring has received a note signed by the Nihilist Commune, ordering him to stop preaching. The Russian Consulate has received a threatening letter.

Boston, June 7.

Owen Monaghan, aged 13, quarrelled with a school mate, Walter Deegan, aged 12, and fatally stabbed him with a jack-knife. Monaghan was jailed.

Elizabeth, N.J., June 7.

Suits have been begun against the city by the Singer Manufacturing Co. and others, for city bonds held by them, aggregating \$1,500,000.

Woburn, Mass., June 7.

Five hundred tons of vitriol let loose by the burning of the Merrimac chemical works, on Monday, ran into Richardson's pond, poisoning large quantities of fish which floated in the stream, choking the water-wheel of the mill, and the distant waters of this stream eventually reached the pond supplying Charleston water works. It is feared poison will affect that supply.

New York, June 7.

A mass meeting will be held in Cooper Institute on Monday, in aid of negroes fleeing from the South.

Seven cases of small-pox were reported yesterday.

Arrived, the ss. Mosel, from Bremen, State of Alabama, from Glasgow, and Rheubina, from Cardiff.

Watertown, N.Y., June 7.

A heavy frost occurred last night. It is thought not considerable damage is done.

Washington, June 7.

A special to the *Tribune* says it is understood Indian Commissioner Hoyt has tendered his resignation. The Society of Friends claim they have suffered a great injustice from Hoyt's actions and from broken promises made by him and Schurz. The delegation of prominent orthodox friends called on the President last week, and formally withdrew from any further connection with and responsibility for the administration of Indian Affairs, and it is said told the President that they believed Hoyt to be a rascal. The President was greatly surprised and said he asked for written specification, which friends declined to give, not desiring to become a party to further controversy.

By-Law concerning ships or vessels loading and unloading opposite Margaret Island.

All ships or vessels discharging ballast, within the depth of water fixed by law, for the purpose of taking in cargo, at or near to Crane Island, or Crane Island Spit, or between Crane Island Spit and Margaret Island, shall, as soon as their ballast shall have been discharged, at once move to a distance of not less than half a mile from the low water mark on the said Crane Island, or to the westward of the said Crane Island Spit, as near to and along Madame Island bank as possible, and any Pilot, Master or other person, in charge of any ship or vessel, who shall contravene this regulation, will incur a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, to be recoverable from any such Pilot, Master or other person.

From Montreal this Evening

William F. Peterson, a St. Louis, Mo., defaulter for \$22,000, was arrested here by a detective from St. Louis. Peterson gave up the greater portion of the money and went back to St. Louis with the detective.

Seven thousand, two-hundred and sixty cattle have been exported from Canada since the 1st of January last to England. The number for the same period last year was 19,000, the greater portion being from the United States.

From Toronto this Evening.

An official declaration of the polling in East Toronto was made to-day, as follows:—Mowat, 2,075; Morris, 2,122; majority for the latter, 75, 14 more than when he ran against John Leys last fall.

At the Police Court to-day, F. S. Spence, a teacher at Niagara-street school, was fined three dollars and costs for too severely beating Lottie Wright, one of his pupils, who stated that the master tied her up and whipped her.

Mr. Marks, who was seriously injured the other day by the falling of a sign which was protruding over the sidewalk in contravention of the law, intends to bring an action for damages against the city.

This constituency, on the 17th Sept., elected a Conservative representative for the House of Commons, giving him a majority of six votes. The anti-Letellier men claimed that the constituency thus pronounced against Joly; others said it was a great National Policy victory.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES. Toronto, June 7. Decreasing north-westerly to south-westerly winds; partly cloudy to clear cool weather, followed to-morrow by generally clear and warmer weather.

An Italian despatch says the whole course of the Mincio below Mantua is lined with vast lagoons. The greatest damage is at Malaria, 15 miles below Mantua, where the Po formed a lake 30 kilometres long and 15 wide.

The men employed on the Chaudiere railway bridge are still on strike. The Dragoon Guards have decided on going to Brooklyn for the 4th of July celebration. On the way to that city they intend stepping off at Utica for six or seven hours.
