Needs one reading, royal assent

Marketing bill edges closer

OTTAWA (CP) — The Senate banking committee Thursday gave sober second thought to national farm marketing legislation, then referred the bill back to the upper house without amendment for final passage, probably Tuesday.

It will end a two-year hassle over the legislation—Bill C-176—that has consumed 19 days of Commons debating time, 49 sessions in the Commons agriculture committee and countless hours in Canadian agriculture communities.

The bill would establish a national agency to regulate the production, sale and promotion of poultry products. But it also paves the way for similar agencies for any farm product, if the bulk of producers vote to set one up.

Under the bill—essentially enabling legislation—marketing agencies also could be set up provincially and regionally. All would be co-ordinated by a national council.

The bill passed the Commons after an all-night session Dec. 31. Passage by the Senate was expected the same day, but some senators balked and decided to take a detailed look at the bill Thursday.

HAVE LAST SAY

Four farm representatives, reiterating stands they had taken on the bill during Commons committee discussion, took the opportunity to have one last say before C-176 becomes law. Others sent letters and telegrams outlining their positions.

Of those who appeared, Joseph Hudson of Lynn, Ont., one of the province's biggest egg producers, remained adamantly opposed to the legislation. He decried the market regulations and quotas that would be imposed on his product.

But other poultry producers, represented by David Kirk, executive secretary of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture and secretary of the Canadian Egg Producers Council, are known to favor a regulated chicken, egg and turkey market.

Mr. Kirk said the federation always has favored the legislation, feeling it would lead to better management and development of Canadian agriculture.

The majority of poultry producers also favor the bill that would end the problems of over-supply and low prices.

The two other witnesses to appear, Roy Atkinson, president of the National Farmers' Union, and Charles Gracey, manager of the Canadian Cattlemen's Association, said the bill would hinder domestic farm trade.

Provincial marketing agencies should not be allowed where a national agency existed, Mr. Atkinson said. The two would tend to work at cross purposes.

Dump textiles?

OTTAWA (CP) — An investigation into alleged dumping of double-knit fabrics manufactured in the United Kingdom has been initiated by the national revenue department, it was announced Thursday.

The investigation follows a complaint by the Canadian Textile Institute that Canadian double-knit fabric producers have suffered injury due to a price decline attributed to dumping from the United Kingdom.

Dumping involves the sale of surplus foreign-made products at prices lower than the cost of production in the country in which the dumping occurs.

If the investigation by the revenue department reveals that dumping has been, or is, taking place, the importers of such goods would be required to pay a provisional duty, pending a decision by the federal anti-dumping tribunal as to whether the dumping has caused, or is likely to cause, material injury to the Canadian industry.

Raquel divorced

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (Reuter) — Film actress Raquel Welch wept silently into a handkerchief in the witness stand Thursday as she obtained a divorce from her husband-manager, Patrick Curtis, 36.

Superior Court Judge Goscoe Farley awarded the 30-year-old actress \$1 a month token support and custody of her two children by a former marriage who had been adopted by Curtis.

The pair were married in Paris in 1967 and separated last March 11. Miss Welch wept as she told the judge there were "irreconcilable differences" in her marriage and marriage counselling could not help.

Curtis, who boosted Miss Welch from a bit-part actress to Hollywood's leading sex symbol, was not in court for the two-minute hearing.

The joint property to be divided equally between them included a Beverly Hills home, a Rolls-Royce, a Datsun, and their two film production companies, Welch Productions and Curtwell Productions.

Littler verdict held to March

MONTREAL (CP) — Judge Henri-Maxime Lorranger of Sessions Court reserved his verdict until March 23 at the windup of testimony Thursday in the fraud trial of Edmund G. Littler Sr., former president of the Walter Lowney Co. Ltd., a Sherbrooke candy manufacturer.

Littler was tried on eight counts of fraud and false pretences involving purchases of Lowney stock just before a takeover of the firm by Standard Brands Ltd. of Montreal.

Six charges were laid in the \$1-million purchase by Littler of 13 per cent of outstanding Lowney shares from the McConnell Investment Trust and the J. W. McConnell Foundation Inc.

The purchase price was \$32.50 a share and the charges alleged he bought the stock in full knowledge of an offer from Standard Brands to pay twice that much to shareholders.

Littler testified he purchased the stock to ensure his family retained control of the firm at a time when his sister, who held 14 per cent, was proposing to sell.

He also testified he doubted the Standard Brands purchase would come off, because of problems involving distribution by Lowney's of O-Henry chocolate bars on contract to a Chicago firm which did not want Lowney's to change hands.

The distribution contract was a major source of earnings for the Sherbrooke firm, Littler said.

Despite his doubts, the sale to Standard Brands went through. The O-Henry contract was cancelled by the Chicago firm that manufactured the bar.

Auto pioneer McLaughlin, 100, dead

OSHAWA, Ont. (CP) — Col. Robert Samuel (Sam) McLaughlin, the man who put millions of Canadians into drivers' seats in a car-making career that reached into two centuries, died here early Thursday. He celebrated his 100th birthday last September.

Col. McLaughlin, board chairman of General Motors of Canada Ltd., died peacefully in his Parkwood Estates mansion in the centre of the city he helped build, only two miles from the giant GM assembly plant that now turns out 500,000 cars a year.

As tributes poured in from politicians, friends and the captains of North American industry, the family announced that funeral services will be held at St. Andrew's United Church here Saturday. This city of 90,000 has

declared Saturday a day of mourning.

"Mr. Sam," as he was known affectionately throughout the automotive industry, had spent most of his time at home since undergoing abdominal surgery in Toronto last June. He ventured out for two or three drives a week around Oshawa and also was a delighted participant in a huge birthday party the city gave him Sept. 8.

Wheels are the fulcrum of Col. McLaughlin's life story—the wooden wheels on the horse-drawn carriages his company produced prior to 1900, the wire-spoked wheels of the McLaughlin-Buick automotive classics, and the modern chrome hubcapped sports cars and sedans the plant here now produces.

The broad-shouldered pipe-smoking automobile pioneer with the bow tie and wire-rimmed glasses was much more than just a multi-millionaire. He was a philanthropist on a scale approached by few other Canadians of comparable wealth, a yachtsman, horse-fancier, fisherman and a connoisseur of chrysanthemums.

ESTATE DONATED

Nobody knows for sure how much money he gave away in his lifetime. Some say it ran to more than \$20 million. Even in death he is giving. Parkwood, one of the great passions of his life, is being donated to Oshawa General Hospital along with enough cash to convert the 50-room home and grounds to

whatever use the hospital wishes.

Col. McLaughlin started his career as an apprentice upholsterer in 1887 earning \$3 a week. Seventy-nine years later he sold off \$15 million worth of GM stock.

The massive GM enterprise dates back to Col. McLaughlin's birth Sept. 8, 1871, in Enniskillen, a tiny crossroads village north of Oshawa, where his father Robert was a farmer and part-time carriage-maker.

Five years later the elder McLaughlin went into carriage-making on a full-time basis and moved his operation into Oshawa. Young Sam was at first hesitant about the carriage business but the elder McLaughlin brought him into it at the age of 16.

Access road takes heavy life toll

COWANSVILLE — A nine-mile section of road in Brome County has become the bane of Cowansville QPF officers. Roughly 65 per cent of all 1971 highway fatalities occurred between Cowansville town limits and the limit of Brome County on the St. Alphonse de Granby access road to the Eastern Townships Autoroute, representing 7 per cent of total mileage under the aegis of the Cowansville detachment.

There are 1205 road miles in Brome-Missisquoi counties covered by the QPF.

These statistics do not include fatalities within municipalities who have their own police force.

Sixteen persons were killed in accidents in the two counties during 1971. Two of these were accidents involving farm tractors when

the drivers were killed as the machines tipped and crushed them. They were Fred Wilson at Sutton Junction, June 26, and George Irina in East Dunham, October 17.

Nine of the remaining 14 were killed in the aforementioned section of Brome City. They were: Miss Helene Laporte in East Farnham June 13; Mrs. Raymonde Deschamps, and her son, Jean, St. Alphonse road July 4; Miss Therese Ducloux, Highway 13 at Adamsville, September 10; Rene Pelletier, St. Alphonse road, September 5; Michel and Jacques Rocheleau, St. Alphonse road, October 26; Armand Chouinard on Rte. 13 at East Farnham, December 4, and Mrs. Carol Katten, December 26, on the St. Alphonse road.

Killed elsewhere in the two counties in 1971 car accidents included Miss Dale Bockus,

Bondville road, May 24; Paul Latour, Rte. 7, Pike River, August 27; Mrs. Grace Cota, Rte. 39, South Bolton, September 28; Achille Bissonette, Rte. 52, Stanbridge East, November 20; and Andreas Werner in a school bus mishap between Notre Dame de Stanbridge and St. Alexandre, December 14.

Sergeant Pierre Bois, officer commanding Cowansville QPF, said his men have become increasingly concerned about the number of automobile fatalities within the limited area. He said completion of the ETA access road from Cowansville to the ETA should decrease the death toll.

The Missisquoi section of the access road is completed, and only a short section in Brome remains to be finished. Former leader of the opposition, Jean-Jacques Bertrand, said, on a Granby radio show late

last autumn, the access road should be ready for travel in the late summer of 1972.

Mr. Bertrand said he had made representations to the Hon. Bernard Pinard, Minister of Public Works, stressing the urgent need for completion of the road. He suggested Mr. Pinard was in agreement.

"Remember these are only the fatalities," said Constable Garry Budge. "We didn't include accidents where persons were severely injured. One accident between Adamsville and St. Alphonse, involving two cars, saw 10 persons injured."

The Adamsville-St. Alphonse road saw 55 per cent of the accidents occur between September and the end of the year.

CJAD radio's Sidney Margolese said he was nearly a victim of an accident on that stretch of road last weekend. Safe driving.



Thieves rob airport

MONTREAL (CP) — A mailtruck robber at Montreal International Airport Dec. 21 netted thieves more than \$600,000, police said Thursday.

Earlier estimates were that only \$10,000 was involved but police said Thursday they have discovered another \$622,000 in negotiable bonds was contained in the 83 mailbags taken by five armed men who hijacked the truck.

The bonds originated with the Chase Manhattan Bank in New York and were bound for the Bank of Montreal here, police said.

Police said they believe they know who has the bonds, although they haven't located them yet. They also said all banks and similar business firms have been given the serial numbers.

Break Star talks

MONTREAL (CP) — Spokesmen for unionized workers at The Star pledged their support Thursday night for 200 delivery and maintenance personnel deadlocked in a contract dispute with the newspaper.

Negotiations broke off Tuesday between management and the 200 workers, represented by the Montreal Newspaper Guild. Their last contract expired Aug. 28, 1971, and a strike has been legal since Dec. 24.

Emergency averted

MONTREAL (CP) — Emergency ground crews were called out at Montreal International Airport Thursday night but were not needed after an Air Canada DC-9 pilot was finally able to get his stuck landing gear to work.

Captain B. Lacroix got his wheels to retract while he was approaching Montreal on a flight from New York.

He had reported after takeoff that lights which monitor the retraction system did not indicate the wheels were up.

He flew the plane with 94 passengers and five other crew members to Montreal, twice attempting to get the wheels to retract, an Air Canada spokesman said. Until the wheels are up completely, they cannot be lowered for landing.

Marconi future murky

OTTAWA (CP) — The future of the Canadian Marconi broadcasting interests in Montreal is still uncertain.

The Canadian Radio-Television Commission two weeks ago approved sale of an 80-per-cent interest in the radio and television holdings of the British-owned company.

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Mini arena expands city sports scene

By LEWIS HARRIS

SHERBROOKE — "The construction of a pocket arena in Sherbrooke responds to a need we've had for a long time. I've been trying to have one built for five or six years now. But I'm convinced that a capacity of 300 is too small."

Alderman Antonio (Tony) Pinard, whose own athletic career in the Eastern Townships spans several decades, said yesterday that the construction of the arena in Sangster Park might lead to the development of a sports complex in this part of the city.

The arena, he said, will be built near the municipal ski run and be close to a swimming pool, also slated for construction under the city's winter works program.

"There is a chance we might be able to rent the Racine School from the French School Commission for the nominal sum of \$1.00 per year. If the school commission doesn't need the school anymore, they may let us have it. We'll approach them soon to see what the situation is. If we get it, we'll be able to centralize sports activities in Sherbrooke. The scouts, the Red Cross, many sports groups in Sherbrooke can use this building."

"But we aren't certain as yet whether we can get it," he said.

Racine School is located immediately adjacent to Sangster Park.

"The arenas I saw in Ontario, similar to the one we're building, cost about \$250,000. But that was a few years ago."

"The one we're building will cost \$400,000. Yes, it's a lot of money, but we've needed this kind of an arena for a long time," Pinard told The Record yesterday.

"It won't be perfect, but we're hoping to benefit from the experience other people in Drummondville and Laval have had in building their arena," Pinard explained.

"But the arena should hold at least 1,000 people. If they start playing Lacrosse there over the summer, a capacity of 300 will definitely not be enough," he added.

The plans for the arena, revealed at last Tuesday's council meeting, indicate a capacity of 300 spectators for the arena. According to the plans, the 1,400 square feet of floor space allocated for players dressing rooms and showers is greater by 100 square feet, than the area allocated for spectators.

"The city may have to close a few outdoor arenas to help pay for it. But there aren't that many good skating days in Sherbrooke. Quite often it's too cold, and this morning, I passed a rink that was almost deserted," Pinard explained.

The \$25 an hour the city plans to charge for rental of the new rink is not too much, he said. "Not for an indoor rink, with artificial ice and not if two teams rent it and it only costs each one \$12.50 an hour."

Y reaches to all citizens

SHERBROOKE (LH) — "You just can't translate 'Y' into French, it just doesn't mean anything", Dick Haffenden, the Sherbrooke YMCA's 21-year-old program director said yesterday.

"So we've decided on 'centre de recreation cultural'. It's about as close as we can get," he said.

The Sherbrooke YMCA has traditionally been identified with the English population in Sherbrooke but has been going "very very bilingual lately," Haffenden said yesterday.

"We're trying to reach the whole community, and it's working", he explained. "I'd say about 80 per cent of the kids who come in here are bilingual."

About 1,000 people a week use the Y's facilities and about half this number are "enrolled" members of the YMCA. Language courses are being offered in English, French, German, Spanish and Russian. Physical fitness courses for men and women are also very

popular, Haffenden said yesterday.

The Y also recently started sponsoring a nursery school for pre-kindergarten age youngsters, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, at the synagogue on Montreal St.

Two parents attend each nursery school session, ostensibly to watch the school supervisor at work with the children and learn from the supervisor's experiences with them.

The Sherbrooke YMCA's winter program starts on Monday Jan. 17, which coincides with Y week being celebrated across Canada from January 17 to January 23.

Good move

The decision by the provincial government to reduce the value of final examinations to 50 per cent in establishing a high school student's level of performance has been roundly applauded by teachers' groups in Quebec. Student acceptance, one must believe, was never in doubt, leaving parents as the only possible holdouts in welcoming the new plan.

The Provincial Association of Protestant Teachers has long campaigned for the gradual replacing of exams by teacher evaluation of a student's performance, and the secretary-treasurer of the Provincial Association of Catholic Teachers said the change will mean "students will be encouraged to work all year instead of just at the end."

The president of the French-language Montreal Teachers' Alliance called the decision "excellent" and said the new policy was a "welcome departure" from "the tendency of the education department to centralize its procedures."

If the new system is conscientiously followed by teachers and, thus, by necessity, by students, it should prove to be vastly superior to the former one, wherein a one- or two-week period of "cramming" was very often sufficient to gain passing grades for otherwise unmotivated students.

High price

The lowering of the drinking age in Ontario has resulted in more young people experimenting with alcohol than with marijuana, the director of the Ontario Addiction Research Foundation said yesterday.

David Archibald said this was the first impression gained from a study conducted since the drinking age was lowered to 18 from 21 in July last year. "The other impression they are reporting is that parents are generally relieved about it," he said.

"We are hearing many parents say: 'I'm glad to hear my kid is out boozing. I thought he might have been at a pot party,' or some remark like that."

Although there was no such overt intention in lowering the legal drinking age, the findings of the study are entirely credible. Youths evidently, and reasonably enough, are generally contenting themselves with indulging their investigative drug-taking through alcohol rather than illegal substances.

While parents condone and virtually welcome the development, since, Mr. Archibald says, it demonstrates that the young are "staying in the fold," the news is, by no means, to be received with unquestioning delight.

Alcohol has long proved what price it imposes upon society for its dubious rewards — and that price is high enough that no one can responsibly hail the adoption of alcoholic consumption by the young as a boon.

In terms of the current situation, however, wherein there exists an urge to experiment with some form of intoxicant and wherein the alternatives to alcohol are a variety of illegal substances of varying strengths and debilitating effects, the development outlined in Ontario must, it seems, be welcomed, with that qualifier.

The choice is for the lesser of two evils — both of which are expensive.

Opinion from the French press

Montreal Le Devoir: Will 1972 see the reappearance of a minority government in Ottawa?

Served by the Quebec terrorist crisis and the apparent success of the struggle against inflation, the head of the government had achieved an unusual measure of popularity by the end of 1970. He had so outdistanced his opponents that they appeared, by comparison, dwarfs with no future.

Against this high-water mark, 1971 has been a year of disenchantment or, if you will, a tough return to reality.

While unemployment mounted to alarming levels across the country, one could see in the Maritimes and in the West a real psychological breaking away from the Trudeau government.

Called to submit to the repercussions of American economic difficulties and the capricious evolution of the international economic situation, the government seriously underestimated the social costs of its anti-inflationary policy and its leader, involuntarily no doubt, but with a good dose of complacent histrionics, let people build around him expectations that no politician could reasonably satisfy.

Quebec, by a paradox which is nothing new, will remain faithful to Mr. Trudeau.

Nationalist elements today are more numerous and more spread out than ever through various sectors of Quebec life (including, for the first time, the union sector). However, the vast majority of the nationalist elements show no interest in mounting a real opposition to Mr. Trudeau on the federal level.

The business, finance and industry group, whose support

played an important role in Mr. Trudeau's 1968 victories in the Liberal leadership convention and general election, now is hesitating about the choice it will make in 1972. If it withdraws its support from the Liberals, Canada faces the risk of having a minority government again.

The popular vote will go largely to the Conservatives in the Maritimes and be split between the Conservatives and New Democrats in the West. How will Ontario vote? There perhaps is the most interesting question of the new year. — Claude Ryan (Jan. 3)

Sherbrooke La Tribune: At a time when federal and provincial legislatures were adopting bills on fiscal reform, new family allowance systems, free social and medical services and other matters, one could also see that unemployment was reaching an alarming, if not to say unacceptable, level, that the proportion of people living within the threshold of poverty refused to diminish, that misery was coexisting along with abundance and that Robert Bourassa had created only 50,000 of the 100,000 jobs solemnly promised in 1970.

Means were created to make inequalities disappear but these inequalities resisted everything.

This situation sparked an unprecedented radicalization of opinions during 1971.

Quebec's union executives, for example, now have gone beyond the level of their members' demands to take on the capitalist system itself and steer action to political commitment. The Confederation of National Trade Unions and the Quebec Federation of Labor affirm that the solution to current problems rests in

full socialism.

The misfortune of the radicalization of opinions is that one cannot take everything into consideration to find a happy medium.

This was shown up particularly at the constitutional conference at Victoria. A renovated constitution recognizing two nations, two communities and two distinct nationalisms would probably be the solution allowing Canada to survive, to breathe into the country a new dynamism.

But the refusal to recognize this situation, despite the repeated demonstrations by Quebec, obliges the citizens to adopt a more extreme solution, in one sense or the other. In this context, one can well ask if the intransigent position of Prime Minister Trudeau is beneficial as such to the Canadian collectivity and to the Quebec nation. It is doubtful.

A more positive note in closing: The head of the Front de libération du Québec, Pierre Vallières, recognized during 1971 that revolutionary violence was sterile in the struggle for the liberation of Quebec. And if Vallières's disciples accept this new direction, one can hope for a more serene social, political and economic climate for Quebec in 1972 and believe that the efforts started in 1971 will produce concrete results in 1972. — Alain Gilbert (Dec. 30)

Trois-Rivières Le Nouvelliste: A former prime minister of France, Maurice Couve de Murville, has devoted six pages to the problem of Quebec in his book *Une politique étrangère 1958-1969* — Foreign Policy, 1958-1969.

Commenting on the famous incident on the Montreal city hall balcony where General Charles de Gaulle made his

thereafter celebrated cry "Vive le Québec libre", Mr. Couve de Murville writes:

"The dust has settled. The sentiments and resentments have been appeased. . . . The French in Canada . . . continue to exist without the help or complicity of anyone, by the sole fact that they are finally at peace."

He places the problem in a historical context, saying that until recently the French in Canada lived in total isolation, playing no political or economic role . . . and nothing much happened until the 1969-1970 period.

He makes an excessively severe and, to us, profoundly unjust judgment of the Duplessis regime.

"At the time of a first visit to Quebec in 1960," he writes, "the Union Nationale, the archaic, abusive party of Maurice Duplessis, was still in power. It contented itself with just being there, unshakable in its maintenance of language and religion, indifferent to everything else, particularly to whatever would rock the community it had so long identified with and would make that community anything more than something desperately behind a flourishing and dominant English community."

Mr. Couve de Murville then eulogizes Jean Lesage . . . and later . . . Daniel Johnson . . .

We agree with Mr. Couve de Murville's view of Messrs. Lesage and Johnson. But we contend that the French of France have shown a gross ignorance about the Duplessis regime.

We freely admit that regime, when compared with those of Lesage and Johnson, could appear archaic, especially in the last years. However, we must have the hon-

esty to recognize that Mr. Lesage's Quiet Revolution could not have come about if Mr. Duplessis had not prepared the way by instilling in French-Canadians a real feeling of pride by his autonomous stand in the face of central authority. — Sylvio Saint-Amant (Dec. 30)

Ottawa Le Droit: Decidedly there is not a Quebec government capable of democratizing Montreal Island school board structures. . . . The leadership is lacking. . . .

That a premier bends backward under the scope of a task, the complexity of the question, the vitality of opposition, happens every day. That one delivers his education minister bound hand and foot after putting his own head on the block is certainly a curious way to govern, if

not the most eccentric seen for a long time.

Mr. Bourassa knew full well that Bill 28 did not meet the religious and linguistic requirements of Montreal's two communities, but it was not until after he had endured a bitter procedural crisis sparked by the Parti Québécois that he finally, it seemed, took into account opposition to the bill and modified his aim.

This is called improvisation. In voting for Bill 28, the legislature members reaffirmed their faith in the suicide Law 63 and sanctioned this instrument of assimilation, given to the minorities by the good will of a government which wanted to give an example to the rest of Canada — by forgetting itself.

I note, as others have done with great disappointment, that two months have gone by since we triggered a nuclear explosion in Amchitka, and a) a tidal wave has not engulfed Hawaii, b) a flood has not devastated the happy people of Polynesia, and c) the seal population in Alaska is reported up, not down. All of which reminds us what twaddle the experts speak when ideology takes hold of their minds and shapes their behavior.

Insufficient attention has been given to one of the few systematic efforts to discipline scientists who zoom about like Hell's Angels in the world of controversy. What happened is that Mr. Albert Wohlstetter, an associate of RAND Foundation and the University of Chicago, having carefully analyzed Safeguard when it was being debated in the spring of 1969, gave testimony concerning it. He was startled not that his recommendations were opposed by men of large reputation in the scientific world but that some of the arguments they were using were arguments which he knew to be utterly irresponsible.

So he approached the Operations Research Society of America (ORSA), a small professional group which concerns itself with "professional quantitative analysis of interactions within systems susceptible of such analysis" and asked it to put together a committee to study some of the testimony that had been given about Safeguard. An ad hoc committee on professional standards was set up, and in September the journal released the results of researches conducted by six eminently qualified men, four of them former presidents of ORSA.

Concerning Safeguard itself, members of the tribunal were divided. Concerning the behavior of some of the academic critics of Safeguard, the tribunal was absolutely unanimous.

The committee's prose is not very taut, but the "summary of findings" is pretty straightforward: "The evidence supports the disturbing conclusion that when prominent experts outside the Administration supported their opinions on Safeguard deployment with arguments or results of an operations research nature these analyses were often inappropriate, misleading, or factually in error. Moreover, in many instances, elementary standards for proper presentation of results to permit verification and meaningful dialogue were not met."

An independent expert translates the above passage as follows: "A careful reading discloses that George Rathjens, professor of political science at MIT, systematically exhibited behavior that could conservatively be called slippery, and some would describe as simply dishonest. That Jerome Wiesner, president of MIT, is given to shooting from the hip in regard to such matters as whether official Department of Defence spokesmen did or did not change their threat estimates. And that Ralph Lapp, a prominent technical publicist of the antimilitary complex, is constructively unintelligent."

Rathjens and Wiesner tired off an omnibus complaint which centres on the charge that the ORSA group had no business passing judgment on their performance, because after all they are not members of ORSA. That point was neatly handled by Mr. Alain Enthoven, who was an Assistant Secretary of Defence for Systems Analysis in the Johnson Administration.

"I thought that the Rathjens - Wiesner letter objecting to the committee was extremely arrogant," he wrote in a letter to the New York Times. "Imagine Linus Pauling objecting to a critical examination of his theories on Vitamin C by the medical profession on the grounds, that he isn't a member."

No one has any right to expect that a scientist has any particularly useful views on, say, music. But a scientist, and even a political scientist, has been trained to think, has been trained in the scientific method, and has been trained to know how evidence is accumulated, and what it is that one can say with certitude, and how much more there is that cannot be said with certitude.

The trouble is obvious. These men are politicized, and they come first to a conclusion, and then they harness their discipline in support of it.

I espied a grownup professor of history, would you believe it, instructing a gathering of thousands the other day on developments in Red China by quoting from the works of Felix Green! He might as well have been reporting on the history of the Third Reich by quoting from the work of Joseph Goebbels.

One wonders that the whole class should labor so effectively to undermine the prestige of the profession they labored so hard to join.

Maginot dies

Andre Maginot, for whom the Maginot Line was named, died 40 years ago today — in 1932 — at age 55. The French undersecretary for war in 1914, he joined the army as a private and was crippled for life in action. He went back into politics in 1916 and was a minister in six successive cabinets. His name became the symbol for the tendency to absorb hard lessons of the last war without looking forward to differences there might be in the next.

1965 — President Sukarno announced Indonesia's withdrawal from the United Nations.

1955 — Marian Anderson became the first Negro ever to sing at the Metropolitan Opera in New York.

1914 — The first steamboat passed through the Panama Canal.

In need of an image

OTTAWA (CP) — Scientists who spend up to \$255 million a year in unfettered pursuit of new knowledge for its own sake do a poor job of telling about it to the taxpayers who foot the bill, suggests a study done for the Science Council of Canada.

They need to find better ways of communicating or the day may come when public and politicians will opt to spend the money for parks, art centres, Hockey Canada or the CBC, says Dr. Peeter Kruus, author of the study.

He sees signs, in things like increased attendance at museums, of considerable and growing public interest in science as a cultural pursuit.

The interest would be far greater "if scientists could communicate better with the public and transmit to the people the exhilaration that discovery of new, timeless knowledge can bring."

"Perhaps basic researchers have been too hesitant in attempting to communicate with the public and share with it the excitement of their activity."

Dr. Kruus, a physical chemist at Carleton University here, quotes with approval the statement of one scientist that "if you cannot explain science in simple terms to the layman, you have not understood it yourself."

ATTITUDES CHANGING

He warns that public attitudes are changing from the days when neither the man in the street nor the politician really questioned the desirability of increases in science.

At a news conference Wednesday, Dr. Kruus said this growing questioning of science spending makes some basic scientists feel threatened.

The "religious fanaticism" with which they seek to defend spending on research for its own sake, not for utilitarian values, may reflect an effort to impress the public with the importance of basic research.

Dr. Kruus identifies a variety of benefits from the basic re-

search that is undertaken solely to discover new knowledge, which he defines as "free basic research."

He says current levels must be maintained in universities where it is an essential to higher education.

However, he suggests more funds be supplied for basic research intended to fill in knowledge gaps hampering achievement of specific missions such as improved health care.

He estimates that support for this "oriented basic research" in universities now is slightly less than the amount of support for "free basic research," the type of research that has no relationship to any mission or problem.

SHOULD BE SUPPORTED

In government laboratories, "free basic research" should be supported almost entirely in highly-qualified research groups such as that assembled around Dr. Gerhard Herzberg, the National Research Council

scientist awarded a Nobel Prize for chemistry this year.

Discussing scientists' communications problems, Dr. Kruus says a main reason is that science education has been "a very insular kind of education."

Until recently scientists seemed almost totally unaware of such matters as science policy. Their initial antagonism to it was fading now, due partly to a greater social sense among the younger scientists.

The "fanaticism" about basic research remaining unfettered by public policy considerations may have been more "polarized" in Canada because of the powerful influence exerted by a former president of NRC, Dr. E. W. R. Steacie, whose strong views had set the tone of research training in universities.

NRC wielded such influence through research grants that some scientists felt they worked for two bosses—NRC which supplied research funds and prestige and the university that paid their salaries.

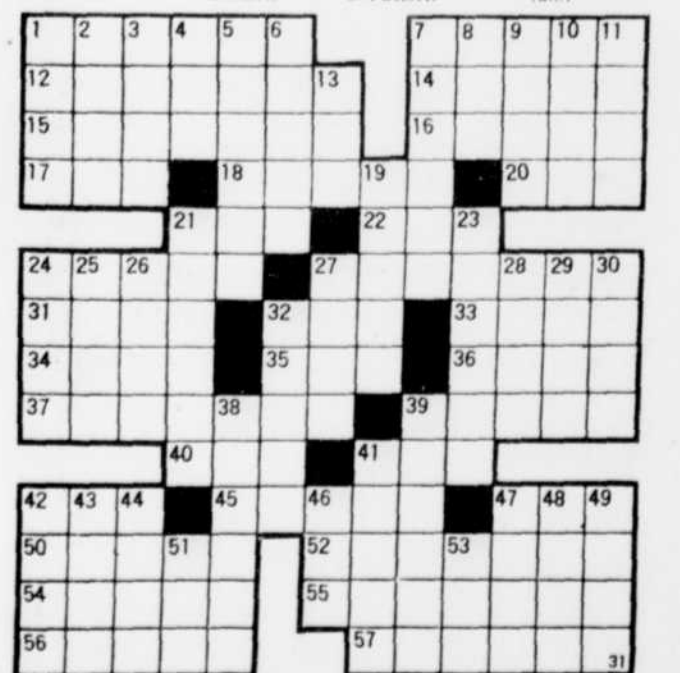

Raw carrots help clear up acne

Dear Dr. Lamb—Remember that article you wrote about carrots helping a problem face. Well, I tried your idea and it worked. My face has cleared up so much that I couldn't even tell I had acne. I am 12 years old and in the seventh grade.

Dear Reader—Thanks for your report. I have had a few other letters from readers who have stated that eating fresh carrots, without scraping them, has helped their complexion problems. The original suggestion came from a reader who stated she had cured many people with this simple method. It may be that carrots help only people who have complexion problems of a particular type, possibly related to a deficiency in vitamin A.

If any more readers have tried eating carrots for bad complexion, I'd like to hear what results they have had. If enough people have tried this to provide meaningful information on its value, I'll report the results in the column later. Or do you have a better suggestion for complexion problems that has worked for you?

Dear Dr. Lamb—I am not able to drink milk for calcium deficiency and have been advised that there are side effects to calcium tablets and one has to be checked for them. What are the side effects and how are they checked?

Dear Reader—I have heard a lot of comments about problems in taking calcium tablets. Most of them are unfounded. After all, a quart of milk contains about the maximum amount of calcium most healthy people need and calcium in milk seldom causes trouble.

If you have a medical problem that leads to retention of calcium or increased levels of calcium in the blood because of a problem in bone metabolism, then calcium could aggravate the problem. There is indeed such a thing as too much calcium in the blood, but unless you have a significant medical problem this won't happen to you.

People taking digitalis for their heart need to be careful about taking excess calcium. The calcium may increase the strength of the digitalis action and cause trouble.

About the only problem is failure to absorb the calcium from the digestive tract. This, too, usually occurs only with certain diseases and with some calcium tablets.

from a lack of acid in the stomach. But for most people the usual dosage of calcium, by mouth, either as calcium carbonate or calcium gluconate has no significant side effects. One of these should be taken regularly if you don't get the equivalent of 1.2 grams of calcium from your diet daily, the amount in a quart of milk.

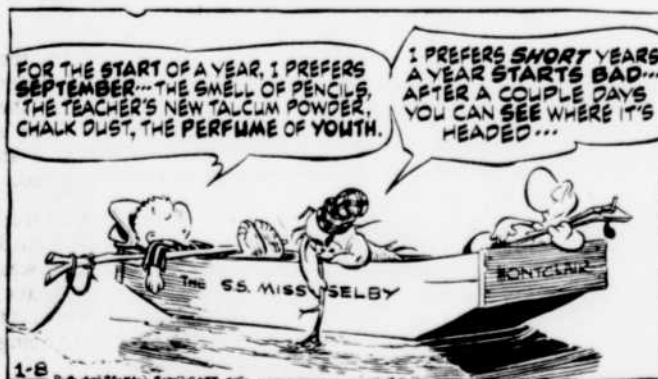

Canada boasts 51-member contingent for Sapporo

MONTREAL (CP) — Canada will send a 51-athlete contingent to the 11th Winter Olympic Games at Sapporo, Japan, Feb. 3-13, with the possibility of medals looming in some sports and improved performances emerging in others.

That is the opinion of Frank Shaughnessy of Montreal, chief de mission of the team made up of 32 men and 19 women.

Shaughnessy looks to Alpine skiing and figure skating as this country's best prospects for medals, based on current performances in international competition.

However, he does not rule out surprises in several other sports. His main task at the moment appears to be getting his final list of names complete—to put names with the figure quotas allowed each sport.

For example, Ian Ross of Montreal, coach of the eightman bobsled team, leaves Vancouver today for Sapporo. Ross and veteran drivers Bob Storey of Ottawa and Hans Gehrig of Montreal, believe their early arrival at Sapporo and subsequent on-site practice runs, will enhance their medal chances.

HOPE TO REPEAT
The bobsledders hope to repeat the gold medal performance the Canadian team under Vic Emery put on at Innsbruck, Austria, in the 1964 Games.

At the other end of the spectrum, the figure skaters must go through the Canadian championships at London, Ont., starting Jan. 10, before the exact makeup of the team will be known.

In between the two extremes, the Alpine skiers, the jumpers and the speedskaters have been involved in constant European competition, while the cross-country group completed their Olympic trials at Prince George, B.C. Wednesday.

The Alpine team leaves for Sapporo from Zurich, Switzerland.

Vikings' Page selected MVP

NEW YORK (AP) — Alan Page of Minnesota Vikings is the first defensive player ever to be named Most Valuable Player in the National Football League. He was accorded that honor today by The Associated Press.

Page, the Vikings' six-foot-four, 245-pound defensive tackle, grabbed the award with 16 votes of the special panel of 60 sports writers and broadcasters in every league city, outdistancing quarterback Roger Staubach of Dallas Cowboys and wide receiver Otis Taylor of Kansas City Chiefs.

Taylor, the top vote-getter among American Conference players, and Staubach each received 10 votes. Miami Dolphin quarterback Bob Griese collected nine and quarterback Bill Kilmer of Washington Redskins was named on four ballots. No other player received more than two.

Notified of the award, Page found himself at a loss to explain just how he accomplishes what he does.

"I never paid much attention to what the other tackles did," said Page. "I don't exactly do it—whatever I'm supposed to do—picture perfect. I play it by ear and go from there."

The others receiving votes were running back Larry Csonka and wide receiver Paul Warfield of Miami, Kansas City quarterback Len Dawson, defensive tackle Bob Lilly of Dallas, quarterback John Hadl of San Diego Chargers, defensive end Carl Eller of Minnesota, quarterback John Brodie of San Francisco 49ers and quarterback Greg Landry of Detroit Lions.

"Alan Page is the best football player I've ever seen," says team-mate Lonnie Warwick. "And I'm sure I'll never see a better one. It is impossible for one man to play him."

Coach Bud Grant, former coach of Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, said:

"There are people with something extra."

A's Odom shot

MACON, Ga. (AP) — "I was thinking I would never pitch again after the first shot. After the second shot I thought it was all over."

Those were the words of Oakland Athletics pitcher Johnny (Blue Moon) Odom, recounting the incident Thursday in which he was wounded by a would-be burglar.

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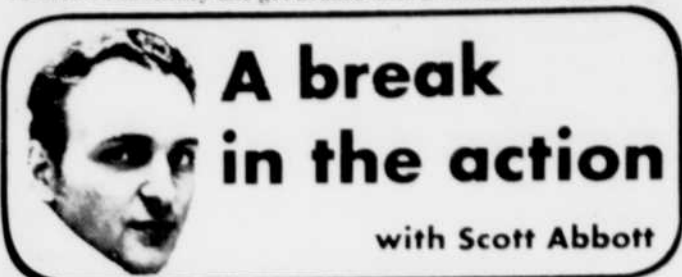
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Several injured in Flyers-Blues tilt

The local squad entertains its Eastern Townships rivals, the Drummondville Rangers, at the Sports Palace tonight, while on Sunday it's the defending Canadian Junior and Memorial Cup champion Quebec City Ramparts who provide the opposition.

The Ramparts, of course, will be without the QMJHL's top attraction of last season, Guy Lafleur, who is now threatening to graduate Juniors this summer. With expansion popping up its ugly head again, of course, so would Mickey Mouse if he hadn't signed a long-term contract with Disneyworld.

The Ramparts will be here as Memorial Cup champions for one of the precious few times they will fill that role. The Ramparts, you see, haven't the slightest ghost of a chance of repeating. Without Lafleur, they don't even have the proverbial wing and a prayer.

All of which season-after-the-year-before considerations help explain why the Quebec City crew is currently just another hockey club battling for a playoff position. Lafleur, apparently, will never know the anguish he is causing his erstwhile teammates, having lifted them to Olympian heights last season before skipping out on the continent alone this year and leaving them to fend for themselves against vengeful opponents.

It is ample testimony to the role Lafleur played in the emergence of the QMJHL, as a serious Junior hockey force on the national level that that satisfaction will in no way be approximated Sunday if the Beavers should down the Quebec City squad again, even by a 10-3 score.

Lafleur is gone, gone so far from Sherbrooke that the Beavers can never exact retribution from him for his performances in a Ramparts uniform last year. But then, he did something for them at the same time.

The atmosphere in the St. Louis dressing room between periods became more tense when police sergeant Lou d'Angele yelled: "You're all under arrest."

NOBODY NAILED

No arrests resulted but four of the Blues — the two Arbours and forwards Phil Roberto and Floyd Thompson — were interrogated following the game about the near riot in which four spectators were also injured.

A cordon of police surrounded the St. Louis players' bench when the third period started and the Blues responded with goals by Garry Unger, Roberto and Gary Sabourin, within a span of less than six minutes, to turn the game around.

Despite the protection, Sidney Salomon Jr., president and chairman of the board of the St. Louis hockey club, declared after the game he will file suit against the Philadelphia police department for "the worst case of police brutality I have ever seen."

The air was cooler in Buffalo where Sabres coach Punch Imlach accepted defeat by the Boston machine with grace.

"They had everything going for them. This was the game they had to win," he observed outside the Buffalo dressing room after watching Phil Esposito and Bobby Orr engineer the Bruin victory.

BRUINS JUST GO

Esposito's 32nd goal of the year and Orr's 19th gave the Boston club a 2-0 cushion at the end of the first period and they padded it with three more in the middle session after Sabres' Gil Perreault had made it 2-1 in the second minute of play.

"We had a big incentive," admitted Boston coach Tom Johnson. "After all, first place was in sight."

"We expect to stay on top but it's going to be a tough struggle."

His sentiments were echoed by defenceman Orr.

"It's probably going to be tougher to stay on top than it was to get here," said the 23-year-old superstar after the Bruins won off their 11th straight game without a loss.

The Boston rise, which has seen them lose only once in 24 games, gave them 59 points to 58 for New York Rangers. Both teams have played 38 games.

Meanwhile, Minnesota North Stars learned Wednesday that defenceman Barry Gibbs, who suffered a broken jaw in Wednesday's 4-2 loss to Detroit, will be out of the lineup for at least two weeks.

To fill Gibbs' spot on the roster, the Stars recalled Bob Paradise, a Minneapolis native, from Seattle of the Western Hockey League.

Buffey accepts new WHA post

EDMONTON (CP) — Vern Buffey has been appointed referee-in-chief of the World Hockey Association, it was announced today.

Bill Hunter, director of playing activities for the WHA, said the former National Hockey League referee has signed a three-year contract, but would not say how much money was involved.

Hunter said Buffey "assured world hockey of top-notch officiating" and added that Buffey will have power to sign the refereeing staff for the league.

The WHA has awarded franchises to 10 cities, including Edmonton, Calgary and Winnipeg.

Buffey, 41, spent 11 years in the NHL and since leaving the league last year has been Eastern Canada scout for Vancouver Canucks of the NHL.

He received his release Thursday from the Canucks to take the WHA job. When he retired from the NHL in June, 1970, he said he felt he was becoming injury-prone and found it was getting difficult "to get ready for a game."

Hunter said it is expected that Buffey will start immediately to scout all professional and amateur leagues in Canada and the United States to acquire "a top team of referees for World Hockey."

Buffey, a native of Toronto who started officiating there while in his teens, will hold a special training camp for officials before the scheduled start of the WHA season next October.
