COUNCIL NEWS

At last week's press conference Mayor Robert Cauchon announced that during the election campaign now getting under way he will be prepared, if asked to do so, to preside at one meeting of each party.

The Mayor also announced that he had a meeting with the Regional Senior Chamber of Commerce who want to develop Hebert Island for recreation and tourist purposes. Mr. Cauchon told the Chamber that the city would be prepared to cooperate if the provincial government would be prepared to pay part of the cost.

The Provincial Government has given the city of Valleyfield a delay in payment of a \$125,000 debt which was made by the previous administration for social welfare and public assistance. The city will refund the money in ten payments of \$12,500 per year without interest. Mr. Cauchon said that the Council greatly appreciated the provinces help in this matter.

In regards to welfare payments the city is now making it appears that the number of FAMILIES receiving assistance from the city has increased considerably. This is mainly due to the fact that unemployment insurance payments for many have now run out.

ployment in the Valleyfield area during the month of April is 5 per cent higher than at the same time last year. The increase is partly due to the layoff of some one hundred men who had been working on the Hydro Quebec dredges in the Beauharnois Canal. At the end of April of this year there were 3017 persons registered at the Valleyfield office as looking for work... 2265 male and 752 female. This is 144 more than in April 1959 but 162 fewer than in March of this year.

Mr. Laurent Boyer, manager of the Valleyfield office, does not expect a serious worsening of the situation despite the expected lay-offs at Merck.

"HONOUR THY MOTHER..."

One of the Ten Commandments tells us clearly to honour and respect our parents and while no doubt most of us remember mother on Mother's Day with gifts, flowers or breakfast in bed we feel Mother's Day can and should have real significance in every family as a means of creating respect and love in our children for the one person in their lives who will help them fight their battles from the day they are born till the day they die.

Motherhood, in our humble opinion, is one of the wonders of nature and therefore deserves to be honored and recognized not only on Mother's Day but every day of the year.

Although Mother's Day as we know it only dates back to 1908, man has for centuries shown his esteem for his mother in one way or another.

The Romans, for instance, showed their reverence through once-a-year celebrations in honor of Hilaria, their Mother-Goddess. In Mexico, more than 1,000 years ago, the Nahuatl Indians held flower festivals for Chicomehuatl, the Earth Mother Goddess. The people of Asia Minor also had a mother goddess — Rhea — and set aside a day to honor her.

Early 17th century England developed the practice of "going a mothering". This custom saw boys and girls, working away from home, going home to spend "Mothering Sunday" — still celebrated in some parts of England — with their families.

In Canada and the U.S., Mother's Day came into being as a result of the efforts of a Philadelphia Sunday school teacher, Anna M. Jarvis. Miss Jarvis talked Philadelphia officials into setting aside the second Sunday in May to honor mothers everywhere. This was done in 1908.

It didn't take long for the idea to catch on. Within a few years, it was celebrated in most cities across the U.S. and Canada. Now it is also observed in many parts of Europe, Japan, China and Mexico, each of which has adapted the idea to local customs and traditions.

WHAT OTHERS THINK AND WRITE

For the sake of road safety
new provisions of the highway code

The driver of a vehicle must give the right-of-way to a pedestrian who has begun to cross before him at an intersection where there are no stop signs.

A pedestrian must not leave the sidewalk or a safety zone to cross the street in front of a vehicle in motion or too close to him so as to give him the right-of-way.

When a vehicle stops or slows down to permit a pedestrian to cross the street, it is forbidden for the vehicle following to pass it.

Any pedestrian who crosses a public road elsewhere than at an intersection or a safety zone must give the right-of-way to all vehicles travelling on the road.

It is forbidden for a pedestrian to walk on a public road if there is a sidewalk.

If there is no sidewalk, the pedestrian must use the extreme left of the road so as to face oncoming traffic.

Pedestrians are forbidden to stand on the highway to hitchhike.

Pedestrians, as well as motorists, must strictly obey traffic signals.

The driver of a bicycle must remain seated while driving. He must not take on a passenger unless his bicycle is equipped with an additional permanent seat.

It is forbidden for a bicycle driver to hitch a ride on another moving vehicle.

Motorcycles and bicycles must travel on the extreme right of the road.

It is forbidden for several motorcycles or bicycles to ride in a horizontal line. They must ride in Indian file.

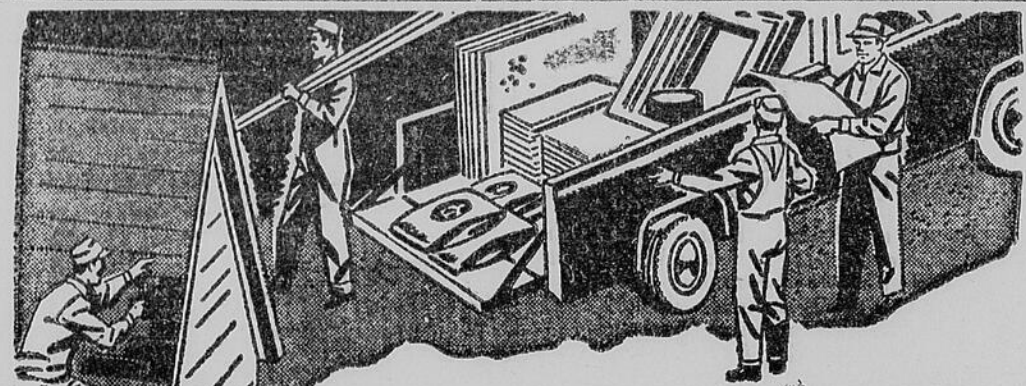
Every bicycle travelling at night on a public road must be equipped with a white light in front and a red light or reflector in the rear.

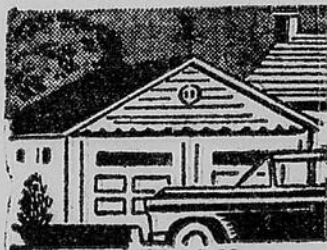

New Mercier Bridge Work to Start in June

Chatting with MPP Maurice Laberge Monday about this and that and he tells us that work on the second span of the Mercier Bridge is to start in June. Dominion Bridge Company has all the necessary steel, and all that has held things up so far has been the necessary Ottawa approval of the work (The St. Lawrence River is federal property).

Mr. Laberge said he has seen the plans, which call for demolishing of the service stations, motel and other property between the bridge and Centre Street, and that when completed in 1961 the approaches to Mercier Bridge should rank with the finest on the continent. The plans include approaches to the bridge from Lafleur, Newman and the Lakeshore.

Some slight idea of the cost may be gathered from the fact that expropriation alone will cost somewhere in the region of a million dollars.

FOOTNOTES

I promised to give some information on the so-called Hudson Bay House, a name which is often used erroneously for the large field stone house which is set back from the road just after passing Danis' Garage on the way to the Basin. This was originally put up by the British Govt. as a store house for grain around 1760 and is one of the oldest, if not the oldest house, in the vicinity. Grain was actually stored upstairs. The floors are of hand hewn pine with the spaces between the planks filled in with small stones and mortar. The British Govt. apparently sold it to a family named LePailleur but during the rebellion of 1837 they commandeered the front two rooms as a barracks, the troops being under the command of a Capt. Clare Brown. This was ideal for the soldiers with the well being in the cellar and slots for the rifles in the cellar walls. The Lapailleur family lived there for three generations but sold out to Mr. Thos. Clark in 1876. Mr. Clark was the great uncle of Miss Rhoda McFarlane who still lives in Chateaugay and who is also a great fountain of information when it comes to the history of Chateaugay. It might be of interest to say that when Mr. Clark bought the house, the location was in the centre of the En-

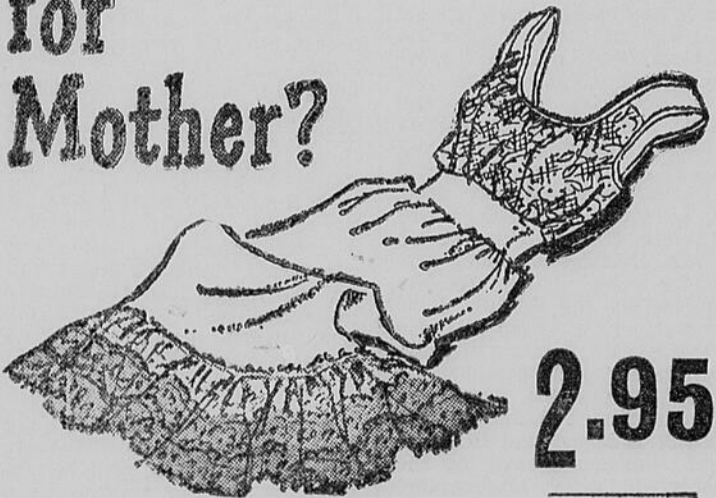
glish speaking population of the district. Mr. Clark was the first to bring asparagus seed into Chateaugay, a product for which the farms here were famous for many years.

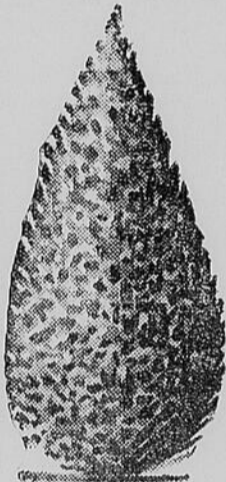

Chat'y Council Passes Bylaws For Mains, Road Paving And Polling Booths. Floods Discussed

The

town will ask permission from Quebec to float a loan to raise the afore mentioned amount of \$67,500.

Alderman and Mayor held a lengthy discussion on the cause and results of the recent flooding and listened to what some residents of Dunver road and Colonia had to say.

The Council passed a resolution changing the time in Chateauguay from EST to DST. (This was two days after actual change over in time had already taken place.)

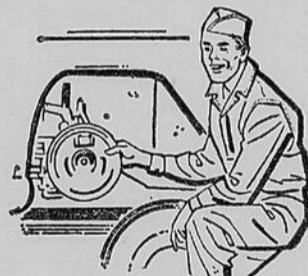
