US PARACHUTISTS SEAL ESCAPE ROUTES

World News In Brief

Toulon, France, Oct. 20.—(Reuters)—Leading seaman Charles Heimburger of the French navy yesterday was convicted of sabotaging the French aircraft carrier Dixmude last February. He was sentenced to five years' imprisonment and loss of rank. Heimburger was said to have put metal filings in the carrier's propelling machinery just before she was due to sail to the United States.

Paris, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Princess Napoleon Bonaparte yesterday gave birth to twins—a boy and a girl—in Paris.

The boy, who Bonapartists will consider the heir to the imperial throne of France, is the first member of the Bonaparte family to be born in Paris since the restoration, permitting members of the French former reigning families to return to France.

Shawinigan Falls, Que., Oct. 20.—(AP)—Jean Jacques Derre, 34, of Ottawa and Emile Godin, 53, of Mount Carmel, Ont., killed yesterday when the car driven by Derre collided with a truck owned by the Bilodeau Company of Shawinigan Falls.

Yvon Bedard, 28, of Shawinigan Falls, the truck driver, was thrown from his vehicle and it is believed this saved his life.

London, Oct. 20.—(Reuters)—Immigration officers have been told to refuse admission to foreigners coming to Britain merely to get free treatment from the national health service. The new policy was announced yesterday by Health Minister Aneurin Bevan, who has often faced criticism that the taxpayer foots the bill if people visit Britain to get operations "on the cheap."

Kapuskasing, Ont., Oct. 20.—(AP)—Four persons are dead and a fifth is in hospital in critical condition following a head-on crash of two automobiles near here last night.

Dead are Allan Ross Fitzsimmons of Toronto and Leon Trotter, Ivan Cash and R. Zellard, all of Kapuskasing.

William Henry Johnson of Toronto is in hospital.

Lomax, Ill., Oct. 20.—(AP)—Four men were killed today when their automobile was struck by a Santa Fe railroad passenger train at the outskirts of Lomax.

The dead were William Renner, Vernon Halligan and John Heikes, all of Colchester, Ill., and Howard Brooks of Adair, Ill.

Canberra, Oct. 20.—(Reuters)—An injunction seeking to restrain the government from implementing the new anti-communist law was sought today in high court.

Hearing was adjourned until tomorrow on the application by the president of the federal communist party, Ralph Gibson, and secretary Ernest William Campbell.

The bill outlawing the party became law today when Governor-General William J. McKell gave assent.

Re-Election Of Solon Low By S.C. Party Expected

Regina, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Social Crediters today elect their first national president. They also elect a new national leader or re-elect Solon Low, member of Parliament for Peace River, who has been the party's national leader since 1944.

Because this is the first time that two national heads have to be chosen, there has been considerable speculation in Social Credit ranks as to their future leaders.

Premier Manning of Alberta was considered to be a logical choice to replace Mr. Low. But earlier this week it was learned from a reliable source that Mr. Manning had no intention of accepting this office. His stand on the national presidency, however, is not known.

It is generally considered that Mr. Low will again become national leader—this is the first national convention since he was re-elected in 1946—and some one in the party who is neither member of Parliament nor of a Legislature will assume the presidency.

The national leader is to be the political head of the party and also its spokesman while the national president is the party's administrative and organizational head.

The division of leadership of the national party was provided for in the new constitution adopted yesterday.

American Air Drop North Of Pyongyang Marks Start Of Final Phase Of Fighting

Layoffs Are Blamed On "Sabotage"

Windsor, Ont., Oct. 20.—(AP)—Some 3,000 Ford of Canada employees return to auto assembly lines today from a two-day layoff but many of them may be laid off again next week.

The shut-down of the assembly lines Wednesday was forced, the company said, by a rash of minor sabotage to cars.

Officials of the company and the big Ford local of United Automobile Workers (C.I.O.) met yesterday, and are scheduled to meet today, in an attempt to resolve differences over how employees will be laid off next week to enable the company to make an auto model changeover.

The company has not announced any details of the changeover but Roy England, local 200 president, said he believes 2,200 men will be laid off Monday, with another 500 following them a week later.

No announcement came out of yesterday's meeting, but it is believed that the point at issue is interpretation of seniority among Ford's 12,000 employees. The company feels it should be applied on a departmental basis.

Mr. England said that a controversy raised over this week's brief layoff was "not even discussed" yesterday.

Rhys M. Sale, company president, charged that auto assembly men wilfully damaged paint and trim on many cars, forcing a shut-down until the cars could be repaired.

The statement was termed "fantastic" by Mr. England. It was a "smoke screen" to divert attention from union wage demands, he said. Wage talks stalled recently when the union rejected a company five-year contract offer in favor of demands for straight wage increases.

703 Servicemen Reported A.W.L.

Ottawa, Oct. 20.—(AP)—A defence spokesman said yesterday 703 members of Canada's special United Nations force were absent without leave at the end of last week-end's four-day leave period from the various training camps.

He did not know the exact number of deserters—men absent without leave for more than 21 days—but said it would not be anywhere near the 703 figure.

The total was arrived at following a check with special force training camps early this week.

The spokesman said army authorities were not worried about the number of absentees. It was probable that many of the men had travelled to cities considerable distances from their training camps and probably now were on route back to camp after staying perhaps a day or two longer than they should or perhaps misjudging their travelling time.

MacArthur Watches Landing, Says War Is Coming To An End—Drop Comes 24 Hours After Fall Of Capital.

Tokyo, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Thousands of American parachute troops leaped to the kill in communist North Korea today.

Gen. MacArthur, who directed the spectacular aerial climax in a 15-hour on-the-spot flight, said on his return to Tokyo:

"The war is very definitely coming to an end today."

Less than 24 hours after United Nations troops seized the heart of Red North Korea—Pyongyang—the U. S. parachute battlers were writing the final pages of the United Nations' historic first armed police action.

The aerial operation, 80 miles south of the Manchurian border refuge for straggling Red remnants, was virtually unopposed.

The Americans sealed off two highway and two railroad escape routes.

Cruising over the area, MacArthur puffed on his corn-cob pipe and told correspondents: (The AP's Tokyo bureau chief, Russel Brines, accompanied MacArthur).

"Closing the trap should be the end of all organized resistance."

The parachute troops were moving by that time toward the towns of Sukchon and Sunchon, 23 miles north of Pyongyang.

"I don't see any opposition," he said. "It looks like it was a complete surprise."

This was the apparent climax of the historic United Nations campaign, born in blood with the June 25 communist invasion of the Korean republic.

Red Premier Kim Il Sung and his government were believed today to be either in far North Korea, Manchuria or Soviet Siberia.

Before the parachute troops took off for combat, MacArthur landed in Pyongyang at an airstrip in the centre of the city.

He ordered Lt. Gen. Walton H. Walker, the American Eighth Army commander, to send South Korean troops to the Manchurian border as fast as they could move.

Staff officers said conclusion of the organized fighting will be followed by an extensive mop-up campaign which will continue until all evidence of resistance is gone. American troops will remain in Korea until that time.

MacArthur has indicated he will keep American and Commonwealth troops short of the politically explosive Manchurian and Siberian boundaries. But South Korean forces will operate there, he has indicated, wherever resistance may crop up.

The big paratrooper jump started at 2 p.m. (midnight EST) after a six-hour delay because of bad weather.

The "chutists" landed without opposition, except for scattered mortar fire during the first half hour they were on the ground.

The Red mortars were silenced quickly.

American artillery, dropped by air in the first combat attack involving the parachuting of such equipment as heavy 105-millimetre howitzers, opened up on the Reds right away.

The landed Americans fanned out over the brown-and-green rice lands around Sukchon and Sunchon.

The dramatic air drop and lightning thrusts by the U.N. troops inside Pyongyang overshadowed developments in the other sectors.

Maj. Gen. Edward E. Almond, the liberator of Seoul, was named commander of all U.N. forces in northeast Korea, were South Korean troops are continuing to drive the Reds toward Russia's Siberian border.

South Korean units fanned out today in three directions from the key northeast Korean city Hamhung. They drove 20 miles east, 18 north, and 15 southwest, and were only 92 miles south of the Manchurian border.

The immediate purpose of the parachuters was three-fold:

1. To seal off the avenues of escape for Red troops seeking to make their way north from Pyongyang.

2. To cut off the highway and rail line running through Sunchon and Sukchon. Captured Reds said the North Korean military headquarters has been moved to Sunchon.

3. To release any N. soldiers the Reds may have been holding in the area.

The drop was made in ideal terrain—on flatlands ringing a base of ridges running north of Pyongyang. It was commanded by Col. W. S. Bowers of the 187th regiment of the 11th airborne division. The division was the first to enter Japan.

Weekly Rent Of 15 Cents Is Proposed

London, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Members of Parliament today received blueprints of a single-story, aluminum house which sponsors claim could be rented at a shilling a week under government subsidy.

The dwelling would be factory-built and would have 600 square feet of floor space.

Plans and information on the proposed house were mailed yesterday to parliamentarians, town councils, county councils, church leaders and building trades-union officials. Sponsor of the idea is Robert Tarran, former Yorkshire builder, who hopes to produce 10,000 of the new houses annually at a factory in Perth, Scotland.

Tarran said last night at a press conference in Perth that the house could be let at a subsidized rental of one shilling (15 cents) a week.

(Persons renting houses or apartments today pay anywhere from £5 (\$15) to £12 a week, although those who obtained accommodation before or during the war sometimes pay as little as £2).

Tarran's solution for the housing problem has some novel features. There is no bath, but a small, cupboard-like structure just off the kitchen has a shower. The toilet is outside.

Quints Steal Show At Memorial Foundation Dinner In New York

New York, Oct. 20.—(AP)—The Dionne quintuplets, who sang and sparkled last night to steal the show from a bevy of celebrities, will go quietly to St. Patrick's Cathedral today to attend a mass celebrated by Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York.

The 16-year-old sisters, smiling graciously in the reception line and entertaining with old-time favorite songs, outshone the multitude of civic leaders and politicians at the sixth annual Alfred E. Smith Memorial Foundation dinner at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel.

After mass at the towering cathedral on Fifth Avenue, the quints will sight-see or rest until evening when they will return to the cathedral for an hour-long special teen-age mass.

The dinner—a \$100-a-plate affair, attended by 2,500—was the highlight of the quints' five-day visit in New York and the reason they made the long trip from their home in Callander, Ont.

Before the dinner itself, the quints joined with Cardinal Spellman who arranged the trip, Vice-President Alben Barkley, and Governor Thomas E. Dewey to receive the honored guests.

Story Of Death March By 283 American Prisoners Is Told By Three Survivors

Fire Takes Six Lives In St. John's

St. John's, Nfld., Oct. 20.—(AP)—Six persons, including a mother and her three children, died in flames that ravaged a three-story tenement in the west business-residential section of this old capital early today.

The dead: Mrs. Jack Raines, 18; John Raines, 19; Gordon Raines, 7; Fred Raines, Mrs. Raines' brother-in-law; Fred Raines Jr., 31, a son.

The injured: Jack Raines, husband of the dead mother, and two other children; Ruby Raines; Aileen Raines, Bride Dolansky.

The fire was discovered by Michael Jackman and Ralph Reid, both of Prince Street. Jackman said he ran to the nearest alarm box and within 10 minutes all city appliances were on the scene.

Reid said he got an axe and started beating down the front door of the house which was already in flames. The fire had not

Swinging down the main street the bearded and long-haired captives were found by a group of correspondents as the prisoners marched arm in arm with three North Korean students who had befriended them. The Americans told of buddies being "beaten and murdered" on a torture march from Seoul.

The three Americans, found by a group of correspondents, had been hiding since Saturday under a school. They had been fed by the students.

The three are Capt. William Locke of the U.S. air force, army Lieut. Alexander Makaromsky and army Sgt. Takeshi Kumai.

They said they were the only survivors of a group of 283 prisoners marched here from Seoul in late September and early October. The trio said the Red Koreans told them they were being moved from Seoul to Pyongyang for "safety."

Locke said he pleaded with North Korean officials not to move the men, and to give medical attention to the wounded. But the North Koreans replied:

"We already have enough atrocities listed against us so a few more won't make any difference!" Locke said that during the death march Americans "died like flies from starvation, cold, pneumonia and dysentery."

Seventeen in the group were wounded when an American plane strafed their column, mistaking them for Reds.

The three survived because they had hidden under the school. They said others of the group were marched north as the United Nations forces approached Pyongyang. Their fate was not known.

Trygve Lie Election Is In Balance

Lake Success, N.Y., Oct. 20.—(AP)—The United Nations Security Council meets this afternoon to try again to decide whether or not Trygve Lie keeps his job as Secretary-General.

The outcome, key delegations say, is a toss-up.

Russia is determined to throw Lie out because he supported wholeheartedly United Nations action to combat aggression in Korea. Russia maintains that the North Koreans were innocent victims of American and South Korean aggression.

The Soviet Union is supported in its campaign against Lie by nationalist China—usually her bitterest enemy in the U.N. Chiang Kai-Shek's representative resents the fact that Lie favors seating the Chinese communist government in the U.N.

The United States strongly favors another term for the former Norwegian foreign minister.

India, following her usual policy of trying to conciliate east and west, has introduced a resolution calling on the Big Five to find an alternative to Lie. Strong doubt was expressed last night that such a compromise nominee could be found.

The British delegation insisted that they had no instructions from London as to whom to support. They let it be known, however,

Cripps Retires As British Chancellor Of Exchequer

London, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Britons braced themselves today for a continued diet of austerity despite the resignation of Sir Stafford Cripps, chief architect of the current belt-tightening policy.

Sir Stafford, who headed the country's drive for economic recovery, resigned yesterday as Chancellor of the Exchequer because of ill health.

Prime Minister Attlee promptly named Economics Minister Hugh Gaiskell, who had been acting as Sir Stafford's chief deputy, to succeed him.

Political observers predicted that the appointment of the 44-year-old Gaiskell, former Oxford University teacher, would mean little if any change in government economic policies.

As firm a believer in the necessity for austerity as Sir Stafford himself, Gaiskell has been associated with the former Chancellor in recovery planning for several years.

Sir Stafford, tall, spare socialist son of a British Peer, also gave up his seat in the House of Commons, although he expressed hope he might be able to return to public service after a year's rest.

He has been a member of Parliament for 19 years. His resignation reduced Labor's effective majority in the House of Commons to eight.

Farm Group Opposes Conscription

Quebec, Oct. 20.—(AP)—L'Union Catholique des Cultivateurs—a farm co-operative—yesterday pronounced itself against peacetime conscription in Canada and asked that in the event of war farm needs in manpower be taken into consideration.

L'Union represents some 40,000 farmers grouped into co-operatives throughout the province. It took this stand in a resolution adopted at its 26th annual convention which closed yesterday.

The farmers' group also asked that the communist party be banned in Canada and that it be prevented from conducting, "on the radio or otherwise," open or under-cover propaganda campaigns.

Other resolutions asked the provincial government to authorize collective bargaining with buyers in the sale of farm products; a \$300 grant for young farmers starting out; an active colonization policy; a larger number of agronomists to assist farmers; maintenance of the anti-margarine Quebec laws; a subsidy for high quality cheese.

The union asked the federal government to choose a national flag and to name a Canadian ambassador to the Vatican.

Rev. Leopold Plante, chaplain of the federation, said farm groups waste too much time in "recriminations against foreigners."

The chaplain urged members of farm unions to work intensively for the development of their associations and their various services.

Much of the time used in recriminations could be used to develop local farm institutions and promote professional associations beneficial "for the whole race," he said.

Abel Marion of St. Edwidge, Que., in the Eastern Townships, was re-elected for a 15th term president of the union.

Death Claims Sen. Ballantyne

Montreal, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Senator Charles C. Ballantyne, 83, former Progressive Conservative party leader in the Senate, died last night after a lengthy illness.

He was appointed to the Senate in 1932 after many years as a Conservative Member of Parliament.

He was first elected to the House of Commons in 1917 for Montreal St. George, and served as minister of marine and fisheries in the 1917 Borden government and in the 1920 Meighen government.

Senator Ballantyne was born in Colquhoun, Ont., a prominent businessman, he was director of several companies and was chairman of the Canadian Investment Fund, Ltd.

Senator Ballantyne is survived by his widow, the former Ethel Maude Trenholme of Montreal, and three sons, Charles T. James R., and Murray G. Ballantyne, all of Montreal.

Senator Ballantyne's death left the strength of the Progressive Conservative party in the house at 11 members.

Present standing in the 102-seat chamber is: Liberals, 77; Progressive Conservatives, 11; vacancies, 14.

Many London morning newspapers ignored political ties to pay tribute to the 61-year-old former Chancellor who guided the country's economic policy through some of its most critical post-war difficulties.

Cripps went to West Bristol, the west of England seaport which sent him to Parliament, to announce his retirement from politics.

He said he is doing so on the advice of doctors. His stomach complaint has been aggravated by overwork.

An executive member of the constituency Labor party said Cripps told them the doctors thought he "might not be alive in three or four months" if he continued in his job.

In his letter of resignation to Attlee, released at 10 Downing Street, Cripps expressed the hope and expectation he would "resume public work" at the end of his year's rest.

Attlee, in his letter of acceptance, told Cripps he had probably borne a greater burden than any previous Chancellor of the Exchequer and added:

"I hope a year's rest will restore you to full vigor and that we shall then be able to welcome you back for a further period of service to the country and to the Labor movement."

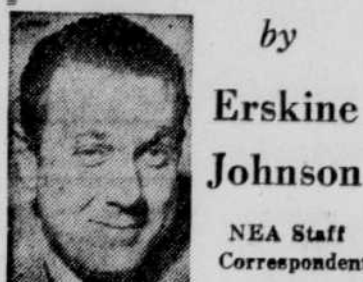

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In War And Peace St. John Ambulance Works For The Welfare Of Mankind

The Order of St. John is the oldest order of Chivalry with a history dating back to the year 1066. In Canada, it began functioning in 1891, primarily the Association, which is the teaching body, and later the Brigade which is a uniformed body of qualified volunteers ready and available at all times to carry out First Aid and allied duties.

In Sherbrooke, the Order was first established in 1915, and under the efficient supervision of the late Mrs. Sarah Ann Jones the little band of 15 members, in all, rendered invaluable service during the first world war.

Again, in 1940, under the capable leadership of Miss Juliette Trudeau, then District Officer, the work of the Order expanded tremendously — new divisions were formed, courses in First Aid and

Home Nursing increased in numbers and a new type of activity, "Blood Grouping," was undertaken by the Order.

But St. John is not active only in time of war, for its peacetime demands are many. Membership was steadily increased and Sherbrooke now has two nursing divisions, one cadet nursing division, two men's brigades, and one cadet brigade. The work of these members is entirely voluntary and during the past year they were on constant duty during "National Health Week," rendering first aid and giving demonstrations of their work and blood grouped almost 100 people. All demands for St. John attendants at picnics were met and the "Youth Festival" also saw these volunteers at their posts.

During Exhibition week, the members treated 84 cases and gave 382 hours of service. St. John Ambulance workers attend every annual Pilgrimage to St. Joseph's Oratory, Cap de la Madeleine and Ste. Anne de Beaupre.

Members from N/Division No. 184 are on hand weekly at the Sherbrooke Hospital, where they assist in the preparation of compresses and swabs. During the war and since then, the St. John's Nursing Sisters have given valued assistance at St. Vincent de Paul Hospital where they serve as nurses' aides. This year, a first aid post was established at the Vacation Colony where the members served throughout the months of July and August, treating 528 cases and undertaking a total of 1,533 hours of service.

During the session of the "Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic," St. John's girls were on duty and the Cadets attended the annual picnic for the Blind and assisted very helpfully there.

This is just an inkling into what valuable service is rendered our city by the St. John Ambulance Brigade and through the Red Feather Drive citizens are urged

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McGill Divinity Dean Will Preach At Trinity Anniversary Service

The Rev. James S. Thomson, M.A., D.D., LL.D., F.R.S.C., Dean of Divinity at McGill University, will be in Sherbrooke on Sunday when he will be guest preacher at the 104th anniversary of Trinity United Church. Dr. Thomson's morning sermon will be "The Gospel of the Kingdom of God" and in the evening his topic will be "The Mind of Christ."

Music for the day will be under the direction of Prof. R. Hayward, assisted by Mrs. R. J. Bell, organist, and will include: the chorus, "Roseate hues of early morn" by Slater and the solo "Hallelujah" by Mozart. Miss Jean Scarth will be soloist.

In the evening, the first chorus will be: "Jesus, joy of man's desiring" by Bach and Mendelssohn's "Hear My Prayer" with Miss Scarth in the solo part. Malcolm Brown will be heard in the Schubert solo, "To the Infinite God."

The congregations of Plymouth United, St. Andrew's Presbyterian and the Sherbrooke Baptist congregations will unite with Trinity Church at the evening service.

Dr. Thomson was born in Stirling, Scotland, and was graduated from the University of Glasgow in 1914, with first class honors in Philosophy. At the same time, he was a prizeman of Moral Philosophy, Political Economy and Political Philosophy. In 1915, Dr. Thomson interrupted his study of theology to serve in Flanders and

France with the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders and the Rifle Brigade. During his war service, he attained the rank of Captain and is now an Honorary Colonel in the Canadian Officers Training Corps. Returning to the studies of Theology, he graduated with honors in 1920 and was elected John Patterson Fellow in Theology.

From 1920-24, Dr. Thomson was minister of Middle Church in Coatbridge, Scotland and from 1926 to 1930, he was secretary for Education, Church of Scotland. After this, he came to Canada where he was Professor of Systematic Theology and Philosophy at Pine Hill Divinity Hall, one of Canada's oldest Theological Colleges of the United Church of Canada. In 1937, he was elected to the presidency of the University of Saskatchewan, a position held until he was appointed to the Divinity Faculty at McGill.

Dr. Thomson is an outstanding preacher, teacher and author. His interests are not completely held within these fields, however, and he is a member of the CBC's board of governors, president of the National Council of Canadian Universities, United Nations Society of Canada, and the Student Christian Movement of Canada.

He holds honorary degrees from the State College of Washington, Queen's, McGill, McMaster, Toronto, Manitoba and Alberta Universities.

City Action In Classon Case Is Defended

Replying to charges by Laurent L. Hardy, secretary of the Central Council of the National Catholic

Syndicates of Sherbrooke and business agent of the Federation of Clothing Workers of Sherbrooke, that the City had engaged in strike-breaking actions at the Classon Knitting Mills, Ald. Leo Cadorette today declared that the City Council had only done its legal duty — that of providing protection to those employees who desired to return to work.

Ald. Cadorette said that the decision to provide police protection was reached by the Council after a delegation of the strikers had indicated their willingness to return to work provided the management of the plant was ready to open the gates. He continued that Mr. Reinhardt, the president of the company, had informed the Council that he was ready to take action in this respect and that he gave a written undertaking that he would allow nobody but striking employees to enter the plant.

"I explained to Mr. Hardy," Mr. Cadorette continued, "that the Council could not refuse protection to anyone and that we are under obligation to furnish this protection to any individual or group legitimately demanding it, as we do for sporting events, hockey, baseball, wrestling, boxing, etc., and for reunions and meetings."

"The Council did nothing more than its duty to these strikers who had asked our intervention with Mr. Reinhardt last June. At that time, they were perfectly satisfied with the intervention of the Council, and did not cry 'undue influence.'"

As proof that the Council was not opposed to labor organizations, Mr. Cadorette said that the municipal employees were strongly organized. In closing he said:

"We are equally able to appreciate why communism is progressing in the world today. We know their method is to raise up the masses by inciting and exploiting discontent with established order."

"It would be regrettable if in our city men who say they are well-intentioned adopted these methods, causing disorders and unrest among the workers."

Five dollars was voted for the British Bible Society.

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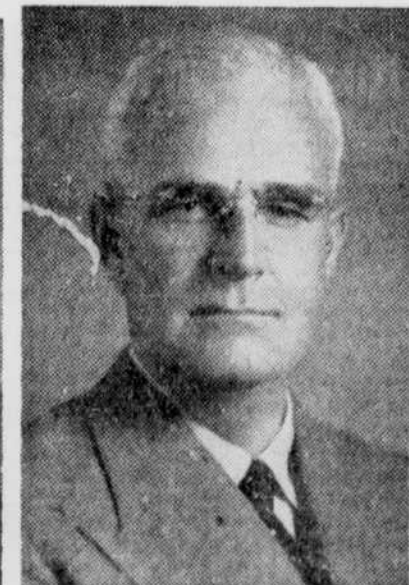

THE WRONG TARGET

C. H. Millard, vice-president of the Canadian Congress of Labor, neither flattered his own memory nor the intelligence of his audience when he suggested that the cost of financing was a major factor behind today's record house prices. He was speaking at the annual C.C.L. convention in Winnipeg.

Actually, the Financial Post maintains, the cost of financing the purchase of a home is the one item that has shown a very substantial reduction in the last ten years. Mortgage interest rates are down twenty to twenty-five per cent since 1939. If other house costs had been reduced in the same proportion, the house buyer instead of paying at least \$10,000 for a standard five or six roomed house, would be getting it for well under \$5,000.

The reason they are not getting it for such a price is not the long-term, low-interest mortgages which Mr. Millard condemns, but the enormous advances in wages coupled with lower output per worker in the building and allied trades. It costs almost as much to get the brickwork and other masonry done today as it did to build the whole house in 1939.

If Mr. Millard is sincere in wanting cheaper housing, there is plenty of scope for missionary work right among his own unions.

CONVENTION NOT ENOUGH

Without in the least questioning the sincerity of Professor Rafael Lemkin, Polish-born Yale professor, in his successful campaign for the completion of an international convention outlawing genocide—or mass murder—it is doubtful if any such agreement will serve to prevent the wholesale slaughter engaged in by totalitarian states in their efforts to wipe out cultural and political opposition.

The unfortunate factor in the situation is that men such as Hitler and other Fascist leaders do not feel themselves bound by any such agreements, especially if the latter tend to curb their activities. For instance, Germany had signed a solemn agreement outlawing war as a instrument of national policy. But this did not prevent the Germans from attacking Poland and other neighboring nations when their fifth column activities failed to produce the desired results.

Of course, the existence of such an agreement would serve to place the perpetrators of these crimes in the position of criminals and subject to trial before some international tribunal. But the effect of this as a deterrent to genocide or similar crimes would be only effective if the aggressors were convinced they would ultimately lose the war they started. And, unfortunately, they generally start their campaign convinced of their final victory.

THE LAW FLOUTED

When one law is flouted, all law is flouted and freedom can possibly be destroyed by its friends as well as its enemies. This fact is pointed out by Joseph Lister Rutledge, Toronto writer, who, while praising the declaration of the president of the Trades and Labor Congress that Communists must be exposed and their influence in trade unions wiped out, points to cases where the friends of labor may seriously undermine the position of the unions.

After pointing out that democratic theory assumes that laws formulated by the majority are binding on all, he cites the case of a Toronto labor leader, upholding striking pickets, who boldly stated: "There is no law when there is a strike on." Not many labor leaders would as honestly present their own attitude, but their actions speak for them. The great mass of sober-minded organized workers who are sincerely concerned over the threat of Communism must realize that the real peril is that it does not matter so much who flouts the law, the danger is that the law is flouted.

The recent railway strike was a direct challenge to the government, at the instance of men who thought themselves more powerful than the government. Can anyone argue that such thinking is not dangerous, the St. Catharines Standard asks, continuing that these men organized pickets to prevent the

government, among others, from operating government property for the benefit of the whole people. They challenged the right of the Canadian army to unload essential materials. They refused permission for citizens to enter the public property of the government.

In the strike of the Hamilton Outdoor Workers pickets resorted to physical violence and intimidation to prevent citizens from the necessary disposal of garbage in the only way open to them. It might be urged that these were irresponsible and excited participants. Mr. C. H. Millard, Union official and member of the provincial legislature could be called neither irresponsible nor excited, yet in a strike at Long Branch, he championed the actions of pickets who forcibly prevented the plant manager from reaching his office, where he had every lawful right to be.

The conclusion is reached, and it is a sound one, that when there is failure to defend and respect the law it is the twilight of democracy. That does not rule out, of course, the inalienable right to amend and correct the law by due constitutional process.

Washington Column

SERVICES MANPOWER MUDDLE IS DEFEATING 3 MILLION GOAL

Washington—(NEA)—Far and away the most fouled up operation in the capital today is the effort to bring the armed services up to President Truman's 3,000,000-man goal.

It out-snafus any World War II manpower problem. The red tape involved is fabulous even for Washington. More than a half-dozen top officials are involved in a bitter fight for manpower control. And the confusion is getting worse every day.

Pentagon experts admit that it reveals the most glaring weakness of Defense Marshall's first major headache, and a real lulu, too.

A Pentagon spokesman frankly puts his finger on the crux of the problem. All the planning and laws covering mobilization are based on all-out war, he says. The big peacetime mobilization now being cooked up—Korea is a police action—caught the defense experts legally flat-footed and with no plans. The gross inequities which are resulting are becoming more apparent every day.

All over the country the cry of protest is getting louder against such things as a veteran of two or three years of combat being forced to leave his job, home and family for active duty, while a young non-veteran, just married, is exempt from service. This is only a sample of the unfairness caused by the muddle.

TOO MANY COUNCILS

Unbelievable as it sounds there are approximately 159 admirals, generals, top executives and other side consultants with a finger in the pie actively taking part in the making of manpower policy, in the Pentagon alone. This number does not include staff workers and experts. It does not include the secretary of defense himself.

The picture looks something like this: The Civilian Components Policy Board of the Defense Department has 18 members. Its title is self-explanatory. There are six committees of the board charged with fixing policy for various parts of the program. Each committee averages 12 members. Typical committee is one headed by Brig.-Gen. M. J. Maas, the Joint Committee on Employee-Employer Relations Under the Current Expansion Program.

On the same organizational level as the CCPB is the Personnel Policy Board. It has three members with 18 subcommittees each averaging three members, each determining bits of policy. Some of these committees are working on personnel problems of employees inside the Pentagon. It is the job of the Munitions Board (four members) and the National Security Resources Board (eight members) to co-ordinate the policies of the CCPB and the PPB. Then it is the job of the Joint Chiefs of Staff (three members and a chairman) to work with the NSRB and MB for further co-ordination.

And of course General Marshall is charged with co-ordinating the whole she-bang.

But manpower policy making doesn't begin to end at the Pentagon. Across the Potomac you find the Labor Department charged with fixing policy on what kinds of workers are so essential to industry that they should be excused from duty, and the Commerce Department fixing policy on just what industries are so essential that their key employees should be deferred. Each of these two departments has a policy committee keeping policy up to date. And there is an inter-agency policy committee keeping those two committees co-ordinated, with representatives from the Departments of Agriculture and Interior, as well as Defense, Commerce and Labor.

HERSHEY HAS NO POLICY-MAKING AUTHORITY

When you get over to Selective Service headquarters the brew gets to thickening, if that's possible. Draft Director Hershey is raging at the Pentagon policies and vocally airing his theories on policies. The weird part of this is the fact that he is not supposed to have anything to do with policy. And he is the man in the whole city who has had more experience with manpower problems than anyone else, as draft director for two wars. He's just supposed to be an operating official, furnishing men at the orders of the Munitions Board.

Then on Capitol Hill you get the climax of the whole sad story. Aggressive Carl Vinson (D., Ga.), chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, has let it be known in no uncertain terms that it is he and his committee who will make manpower policies as soon as Congress reconvenes.

The one solid fact in the whole jumbled picture is that, although the services may be short of men, there's no scarcity of manpower policy.

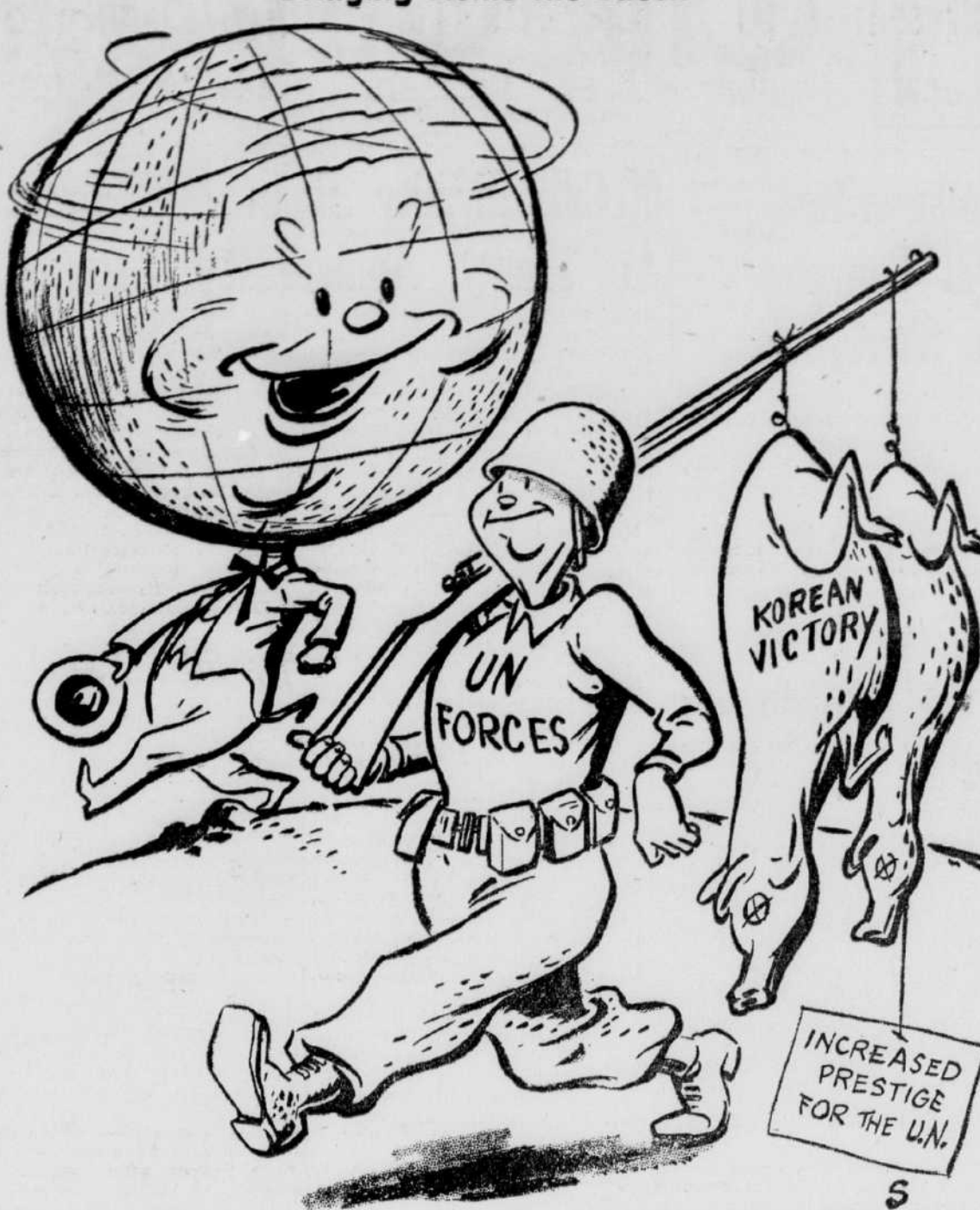

Glimpses Into The Past

LOST IN THE WOODS

How often—all too often—do our newspapers and radios bring us the heart stirring news of some one lost in the woods? Children, just tiny tots little more than out of the cradle; grown up and old people who have surely learned that at certain times and places our land of woods and waters are dangerous, have been and still are victims of the strange wanderlust that takes them away from their homes to cause much suffering and cost millions of dollars. During the past year in and near the Eastern Townships tragedy has stalked our hills and valleys, and men in thousands have formed search parties to scour many acres then found the poor lost ones within a mile from their homes; sometimes alive, sometimes not.

Here arises a question: When people are lost who do they go around in circles? Also we might ask if our pioneers learned the Indian's art of making contact with their far-off neighbours when in trouble? We could wish that some historian might have recorded the answer to the latter, if not the first query. There were no telephones a hundred years ago, no electric flash lights, but men in the primeval forests used the compass and had common sense.

We will glimpse into a countryside, some sixty-five years ago to emphasize the point of going in a circle, also institution needed by searchers. A mother with her 2½-year-old son went to visit her sister on a farm between Eaton Corner and Sand Hill. It was a fine autumn day and the little lad played outside until he was called to come in. There was no little boy and a hectic search began. Had he gone to the road? To the orchard where two men were working? The

hayfield, roadway and pastureland were easy to search, but fear had arisen and the two men got on their horses and started out to ask for help and before six o'clock some twenty men were on hand; the father and a few men came from Cookshire and others from round about. Search was begun, groups going out in fan shape. The roadway was covered for a mile or so, the fields, orchard, a large hay barn a long way from the house with no result. In the meantime the farm women came, one who came a little late carrying a milk pail filled with doughnuts, another an armful of homemade bread (no bakers in those days) butter, etc., while a basket of ready-to-eat food from the village store gave the women folk something to do. The mother said, afterwards: "I couldn't have borne it without the work of feeding the searchers."

At nightfall a drizzling rain set in, but the search went on. One man said, "We must now try the sugar bush," while another said, "He couldn't have climbed over or gone through that high fence, but we'll try it." At day break a slight noise brought them to a standstill where the little lad was found crawling around in a circle some ten feet across. He had crawled in this circle until the grass and leaves were worn away and his knees were bruised. Moaning, but conscious he said to his Daddy who clasped him in his arms: "Birdie come, birdie—" and every heart was thankful that it was a part-ridge, rather than an animal.

The little lad was unarmed except for fright and exposure, but it was over a year before he was back to a sturdy Canadian child. He is now a grandfather living in Vancouver, son of Henry and Gertrude Weston, natives of the Eastern Townships. In this little glimpse we can see reference to the "circle," the gathering of

who visited the school.

All three accused the North Koreans of starving American prisoners and failing to give them necessary medical treatment.

Locke said 373 Americans were moved out of Seoul Sept. 20 as the Americans advanced on the city. He said many of the prisoners were suffering from hunger.

When the Americans arrived in Pyongyang they were placed in the school. Some civilians, including the three students who marched down the street with them today, were allowed to visit them. Some brought them cigarettes.

The students told the trio of a trap door in the school building. The trio dropped through the trap door Saturday shortly before the other prisoners headed north.

Since then the three students had been feeding them with rice and water smuggled underneath the building.

Locke said while they were in Seoul three or four Russians visited them but didn't speak — "they just kind of smiled."

It was after allied troops took over Pyongyang today that the trio decided to emerge from beneath the school building.

reached the two upper flats. He heard someone screaming for help and looking up saw Fire Rains.

"I shouted for him to jump," Reid said, "but he didn't. He disappeared from the window. I guess he must have gone back to rescue the children. I didn't see him alive any more. He was dead when he was brought out of the house by the firemen."

Jack Raines, whose wife and three sons died in the fire and whose two small daughters are in hospital, escaped from the blaze by jumping from a second-storey window at the back of the wooden house.

When the firemen arrived on the scene flames were shooting high in the air as the second and third storeys had caught alight and billowing smoke clouded the neighborhood.

Equipped with smoke masks the firemen beat their way through the flames to the rescue of the people in the burning house. They brought out 11—three dead and six badly injured. Of the six, two younger Raines boys died on the way to hospital. Neighbors rushed to the aid of the injured pending the arrival of the ambulances.

They were laid on blankets which had been hastily snatched from the still-warm beds of neighbors.

Latest report from the hospital states that Eileen Raines' condition is "only fair" but her sister Ruby and Bride Delaney are out of danger.

The U.S. 1st Cavalry knifed into Pyongyang from the south at 11:02 a.m., Thursday (9:02 p.m. Wednesday, EST). Advance armored units of the South Korean 1st division entered from the east 18 minutes later.

Both forces swept through the east industrial district, across the Taedong river and into the business section Thursday night.

While they cleaned up resisting Reds in west-side streets, the South Korean 7th Division drove into the capital from the north. It seized Him Il Sung University, and then aided the other two divisions in the cleaning up.

Elements of the allied Commonwealth brigade also poured into the city. They had been recalled from their Thursday operation along the Kyompo-Chinnampo road to the south.

The lightning thrusts of the U. N. forces prevented the Reds from making an anticipated fight-to-the-death stand. Some 6,202 surrendered. That boosted the U.N. total of North Korean prisoners to 80. About 5,900 were taken in the U.S. 24th Division's advance to near Chinnampo, port city 27 miles southwest of Pyongyang.

U.S. intelligence officers said 12 enemy units totalling a possible 28,000 soldiers still might be in the Pyongyang area. However, a spokesman said such estimates usually ran higher than actual figures.

The escape gaps from Red Korea were plugged also by heavy-hitting bombers. A Far East air force summary said 49 rail and highway bridges were blasted "to seal off every route out of Sinanju to the north."

Allied fighters didn't waste any time shortening their range. They began using the former communist airstrip at Pyongyang less than 24 hours after its seizure by South Korean forces.

Elsewhere on the fighting front, the most important sectors had been by-passed, knotted off or overrun.

As some of the aldermen are inclined to think that it would be better to complete the installation services within the present limits of the city, as much is still to be done at St. Pierre, where almost a million dollars has already been spent in the past few years for water services, sewerage systems and side-walks etc. As Drummondville West includes the boundaries between the limits of Drummondville, the Black River, Bernard Blvd., and The St. Francis, with a population of 1,140, the taxable property is estimated at \$827,000 has no debts but lacks all public services such as water works, sewerage and side-walks, etc., would mean quite a liability at the present time on top of the city improvement program, which is still in progress for some time to come.

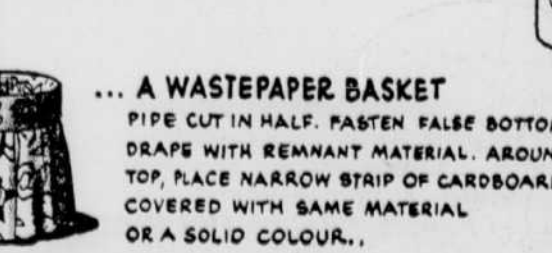

Tom Gard's Note Book

One thing common to good gardeners is the ability to plan for the future. Now is the time to prepare for those harbingers of a new gardening year—spring bulbs. There is still time to plant some. If you didn't place your order early, you will likely still find some available at the stores. The planting chart and instructions given will prove helpful to the uninitiated.

Forcing Bulbs

While on the subject of bulbs, why not resolve to try your hand at forcing some for winter bloom. It isn't as difficult as it would sound and information on the subject is usually abundant at this time of year. The simple instructions given here will get you started, but check planting guides before you select your varieties—some will force better than others and rigid forcing dates should be followed.

Stovepipes

With cooler weather, we begin the annual tussle with stoves and stovepipes. I am reminded of my first ordeal—back in the days when I thought all stovepipes were the same. Instead of buying six-inch pipe, I bought some seven inches in diameter. Before it was time to use it the bill was lost and, rather than face the clerk again, I have better trying to think up uses for it ever since. Two of the best I have hit upon are illustrated. They sound rather "screwy" but they have proven satisfactory.

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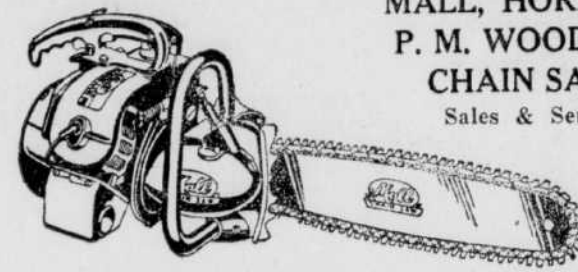
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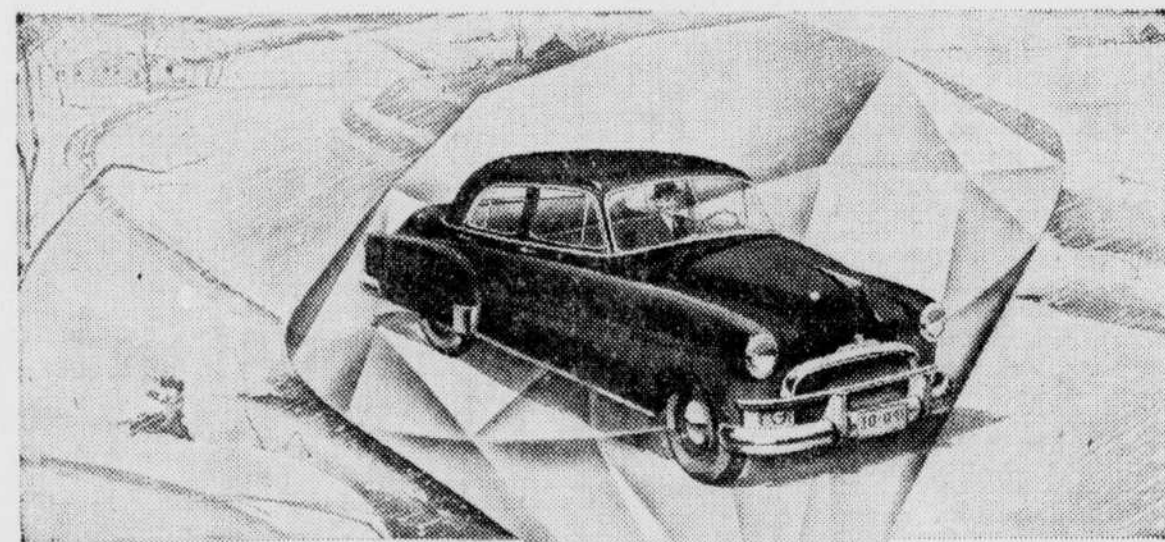

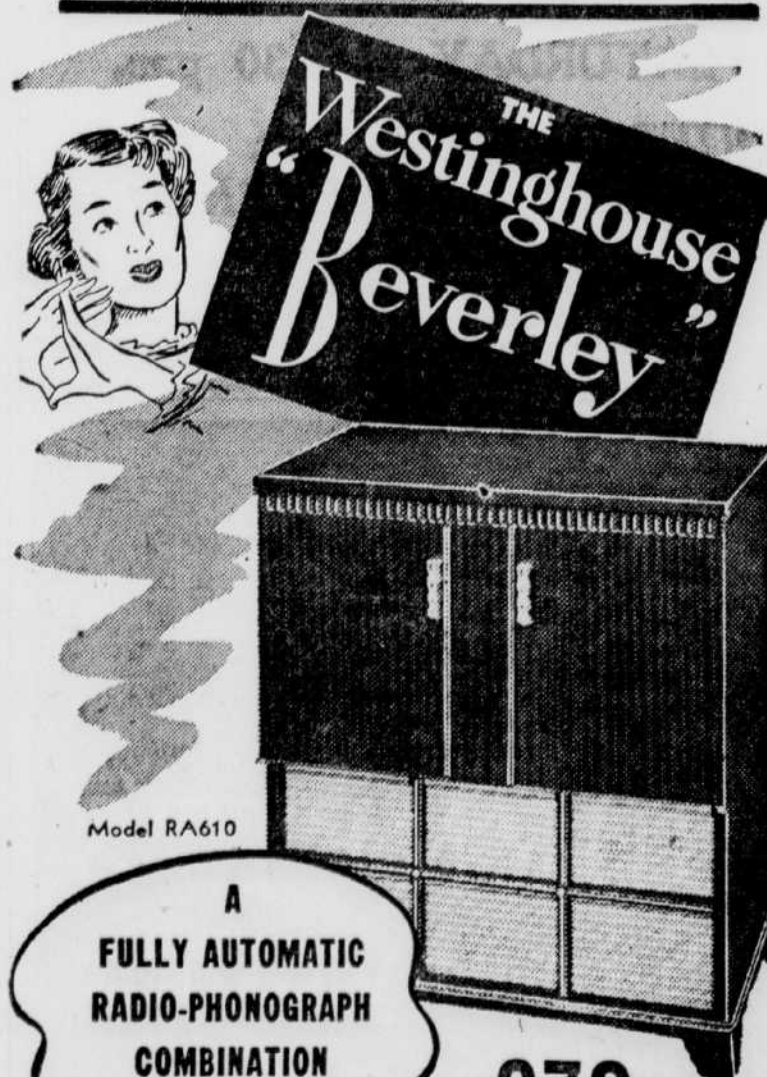

Baseball's Bonus Rule May Take Powder At Meeting Next Month As Owners Meet Commissioner Chandler

New York, Oct. 20.—(P)—Baseball's bonus rule, long a headache to major league moguls, appears doomed if the owners' actions at their meeting next month speak as loud as their words.

Summoned by Commissioner A. B. Chandler to convene in Cincinnati Nov. 16, the owners are expected to discuss distribution of the 1951 World Series television and radio money in addition to the possible elimination or alteration of the player bonus rule.

Jimmy Gallagher, general manager of Chicago Cubs, long a booster of the controversial rule, appears to have changed his mind along with other former bonus backers.

"The bonus rule is a good rule," he said. "But it is not enforced and should be dropped."

Vice president Chuck Comiskey of Chicago White Sox said: "The bonus rule is not fair to the owners or to the kids who have become bonus conscious. . . . We will vote to repeal the rule."

An Associated Press survey among big league club owners showed a strong majority are in favor of repeal. With few exceptions, all condemned the bonus law.

Even Cincinnati's Warren Giles and the St. Louis Cardinals' Fred Saigh, last year's leaders in the victorious battle for retention of the rule, indicated a change of mind.

Dublin, Oct. 20.—(P)—North Americans scored heavily today in the draw for major prizes in the richest Irish Hospital sweepstakes since 1947.
