MOTHER'S TESTIMONY

SHE WOULD GIVE HER LIFE FOR HER UNFORTUNATE BOY.

SHORTIS DEFENCE BEGIN THEIR MEDICAL EVIDENCE.

Objected to by the Crown-The Point Argued by the Counsel.

Beauharnois, Que., Oct. 15.-Long before the hour for the opening of the court doors gathered in front of the Court House eager to gain admission to the scene of the trial. A man named Narcisse LePage had his leg badly twisted in the crash. He had to be driven home. The number of women anxious to hear the evidence and see the prisoner grows almost every day.

Mrs. Mulraby, the boarding house mistress with whom Shortis boarded, was the first witness of the day. Her evidence was of little importance save for the denial of the truth of the so-called interview with the Montreal Star. She told of the accused's eccentricities while he lived at her home.

A great wave of pity went over the assembly when Mr. Greenhills called Mrs. Shortis, and the grief-stricken parent slowly stepped into the witness box.

"My boy's care and education was," she said, "left entirely in my hands. He commenced to go to school when seven years old. Up to this time he had always been ailing, and was unable to articulate, though myself and his nurse could understand him. He was always a good loving boy at home, and I never knew a child who was so devoted to his religious duties."

"We could not teach him much, because his memory was so very bad. If he was sent on a message he would forget what he was sent for almost instantly."

Mrs. Shortis then told of his youth and of the few strange actions of his they were aware of. The people tried to keep the news of her son's madness from her. She was made aware of the Valleyfield tragedy by a cablegram from Mr. A. P. Gault, president of the Cotton Co. She came out to Canada during the latter week of April, and stayed at the Deaf and Dumb Institute, where the Herald representative called upon her.

She was ill while there and on recovery went to the jail to see her son. He showed no sign of recognition, but appeared perfectly natural. I told him afterwards that a plea of insanity was to be entered. He said he never heard of anything insane in the family.

Mr. Greenhills-"You devoted your whole life time to him."

Mrs. Shortis-"Yes, sir; and now I would give my life for him."

Mr. Greenhills-"That is all Mrs. Shortis," and as Mr. Macmaster did not even ask one question in cross-examination, the mother left the stand. She bore the strain remarkably well.

Dr. Anglin, late of the Protestant Hospital for the Insane at Verdun, was then called. After telling of his experience in insane hospitals the doctor said he had made a special study of disease of insanity.

He first visited Shortis on June 25 last and had seen him once or twice a week since that date. He had heard all the evidence given in the case, and when witness visited prisoner in the jail his object was to inquire into his mental condition and had made a study of his case.

"Before you heard the evidence and after seeing Shortis had you come to a conclusion as to his mental condition?" asked Mr. Greenhills.

Mr. Macmaster at once objected, on the ground that the question was altogether too broad. Data must be given; specific questions must be put.

His Honor overruled Mr. Macmaster's objection and Dr. Anglin said: "I concluded that he was a lad of unsound mind."

Mr. Greenhills asked for the different headings under which he came to this conclusion.

"His utter indifference and callousness; in view of the terrible charge against him; he is incurably vain; his self-importance is not in accordance with his accomplishments; his intense and careless dislikes for those with whom he comes in contact; his memory is deficient. I found him repeatedly suffering from neuritis (there is an intimate connection between neuritis and insanity) his want of affection; he has no proper conception of what is right or wrong."

Here Mr. Macmaster arose and objected on the grounds that the witness was not competent to form these opinions and he moved that the witness's replies be struck from the record.

Then commenced the great legal battle of the trial. It has been known from the review of medical authorities that would have the most important bearing on the case and it was for the purpose of throwing this out entirely that Mr. Macmaster continued his argument citing authorities and quoting statistics galore.
