25 American bats migrate to Charteris

Science teacher John Sproviere has 25 bats, found at Charteris which had been banded at Washington, D.C. Numbers on the bands have been recorded to be mailed to the Department of Wild Life in Washington.

The bats are being kept alive in the laboratory at Victoria Avenue School in Shawville.

They were found by Roy Hanson and William Bell, amateur spellogists from Shawville who were exploring caves in the Charteris area. The bats were found sleeping about a mile into the cave. Mr Hanson and Mr Bell are students in an evening course

being taught by Mr Sproviere at Pontiac High School under the Manpower extension classes.

Cages are being built for the bats who will be well treated while their captors wait to hear from Washington. They are anxious to know what the purpose of the banding was and to compare their findings with those of others who may have found banded bats in other parts of the country. Bat migration habits could provide important information for Departments of Health and Agriculture as well as the Wild Life associations.

Bean supper planned for Trudeau visit to Maniwaki Sunday afternoon, June 1st

The Right Honourable Pierre Elliott Trudeau, the Prime Minister of Canada, plans to visit Maniwaki, on Sunday, June 1st, 1969.

The Prime Minister was scheduled to visit Maniwaki during the last election campaign. This visit to the riding of Pontiac was to have taken place on June 24th last.

However, due to adverse weather conditions caused by a heavy fog, the helicopter

carrying the Prime Minister was unable to make the trip. Mr Trudeau promised to make arrangements at a future date, to make the trip.

Tom Lefebvre, M.P., announced this to the thousands of persons present at the time, and the visit on Sunday, June 1st is in order to fulfill this promise.

The Prime Minister intends to be in the Maniwaki area in the afternoon to visit the district and meet the citizens. At 4:00 p.m. he will be at the Town Hall to meet the Mayor and other dignitaries, and to sign the visitors book.

He will then proceed to the arena where he will give a short informal talk, and then try to meet as many persons as possible.

Arrangements are not completed yet, but a committee is planning a bean supper for everyone in attendance, beginning at 4:30 p.m. in the arena.

It will be a picnic type of social gathering, and very informal.

In making this announcement, Mr Lefebvre said he believed it will be the first time a Prime Minister of Canada has ever visited Maniwaki!

This will also be the first visit of the present Prime Minister inside the new riding of Pontiac.

Now what?

At its last regular meeting on Monday, May 12, the Outaouais Regional School Board passed a motion to negotiate an agreement with the Ottawa Valley Protestant Regional School Board to accommodate the English speaking high school students under the jurisdiction of seven of the local Catholic Pontiac boards which had submitted resolutions to this effect as requested by the Outaouais Board.

However, two conditions were attached: (1) that the cost per student under the new agreement should not exceed the cost under the Outaouais Board;

(2) that the Outaouais Board would negotiate only for those boards which had paid up ALL debts to date owing to the

The hitch is that this second condition is virtually impossible to meet. At present, all seven boards are indebted to the Outaouais Board. Furthermore, all school boards are dependent on grants from the Department of Education in order to operate. This process sometimes takes more than a year before payment is received.

In Shawville on April 28, the Outaouais Board met with the local Pontiac Boards. At this meeting the Regional Board agreed to negotiate an agreement for those local boards which would submit **correctly worded** resolutions. The Regional Board placed no conditions on these requested motions at that meeting.

However, to many of the people who represent the English-speaking R.C. parents and students, this is just one more instance of the insincerity of the Outaouais Board—to promise, and then to find a way out by passing the buck attaching some ridiculous condition to a motion, or hanging up on the wording of a motion. One would have almost thought that their bag of tricks would have emptied by now, but apparently they have a plentiful supply of gimmicks.

We are thoroughly convinced that it is impossible to reach an honorable agreement with the men who are charged with the responsibility of the R.C. high school students of Pontiac. We believe that the time has come for the parents to make their own decisions to deal with this crisis in September 1969.

Dear Mrs D. R. Dickson,
My name is Young jae Koo aged 26.

From the start of this year I have had some interest in Canada, for my family had an intention to emigrate to a Canadian farm. I called at the British Embassy and they told me that I must have a sponsor if I was going to emigrate as a farming emigrant. So here I am.

I think that it is our natural desire to look forward to the betterment of living. I used to be an English Language teacher as a "WOP" (works without pay) for the poor students in a country school for years before my service in the Marine Corps. I was always concerned about my superficial knowledge of English.

There are 7 members in my family. Father is an educational official. He shall leave the educational circles for the age limit this year (56 years old) with some prizes of our president for his continuous service for 20 years.

Mother is a housewife. She is also a deacon of Chinhae Presbyterian Church. A sister, who is a pianist, married to a young Reverend-to-be last January. 2nd sister is an elementary school teacher and the others are in school. Soon father will be confronted with a difficulty of living and expenses for education of my brothers and a sister.

I feel that I stand at a turning point in my life, so I would like to go to Canada, stay for a few months, feel it, test the adaptability of myself to the Western Civilization and study the possibility of emigration of my family. I am sincere and will work without pay during this period. It is my natural duty to support my family as a 1st son. I beseech you to help me to find some ways.

If you will hear my request I'll be more than glad and moreover if you will publish this letter it would be still better. If not, then please pass this to some farms in your neighborhood at least.

For reference, I am fond of walking in the wilderness, hearing music. I personally

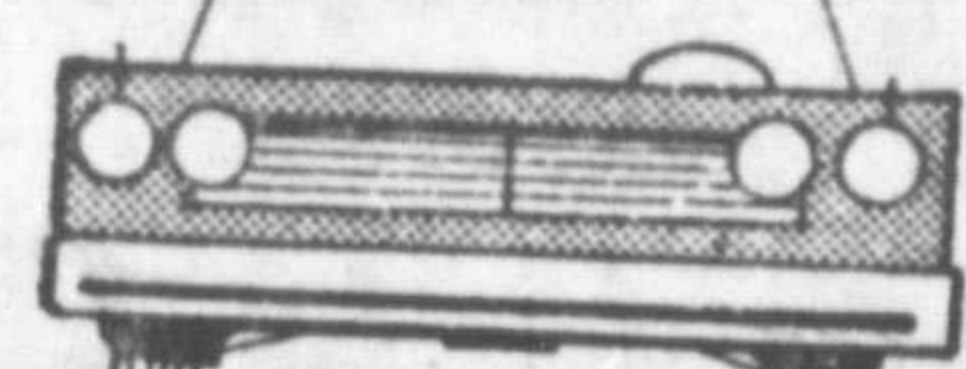

May 9, 1889

A cricket club was organized by the citizens of Shawville on Tuesday evening. The following officers were elected: Andrew Hodgins, Pres. J H Shaw, Vice-President, J A Cowan, Sec-Treas. About 25 names were placed on the membership roll. It was decided among other business done, that the members assemble on Mr Shaw's field on Thursday evening at 6 o'clock sharp for the purpose of preparing a crease.

While in Bryson one day last week an EQUITY representative visited the newly-discovered phosphate mine on the property of Mr Wm McVeigh. A short distance down the hill overlooking the river north-westward, the deposit is situated. It is probably 100 ft above the level of the river, and scarcely that number of yards from the waters edge.

A young lady arrested in Chicago for smuggling had the following articles concealed in her bustle, two pairs of pantaloons, a vest, two coats, suit of woolen underwear, half a dozen pairs of ladies hose, silk herchiefs, and a number of other smaller trinkets.

The postal rate increases authorized by Parliament went into effect yesterday. In cities where there is a delivery system, drop letters will be two cents in place of one as heretofore. The limit of weight for letters is raised from a half ounce to one ounce to be carried for the single rate of two or three cents.

50 Years Ago in The Equity

The building known as the Temperance Hall, at Bristol Corners, used for several years past as a place of worship by the Presbyterian congregation was destroyed by fire on Monday of last week, as the result of burning off the dead grass around the structure.

The week April 14 to 19 inclusive was a hummer in the local egg circle. Values considered, it eclipsed all transactions in hen fruit hitherto known here within a similar period of time. The number of eggs shipped on the 19th is given out as 3,444 dozen. The price to the producers averaged about 43 cents.

The news that the CPR Co intend putting another daily passenger train on the Pontiac branch shortly, will be hailed with satisfaction by people generally, living along the line, as well as commercial representatives who periodically visit our business centres. It is said that the new daily train will run on faster time than that which governed the tri-weekly it will replace.

Quyon — On Easter Day there was a large congregation in St John the Evangelist Church. The offertory was the largest in the history of this Parish, being \$135.

COURT REPORT

John Fox of 181 Peter St., Pembroke appeared May 6th before Justice of the Peace, Jean-Louis Muir at Campbell's Bay on charges of fishing pickerel out of season and for spear fishing. He was fined a total of \$50 plus court costs of 6.10. His 36 pickerel seized by the Game Warden as well as a lantern and spear were confiscated. Two other persons arrested by the Game Warden and accompanying Fox were also fined \$25 each plus court costs of 6.10. They were Mrs Thomas Berrigan and her son John both of Sheenboro, P.Q.

Court was held at Campbell's Bay on May 7.

Edward Gary Culleton, 21, a member of the Canadian Armed Forces, Camp Petawawa and residing at Pembroke had his trial before District Judge Avila Labelle and was found guilty on four charges laid against him: for causing a disturbance in a public place, joy riding, causing damages to private property and for impaired driving. 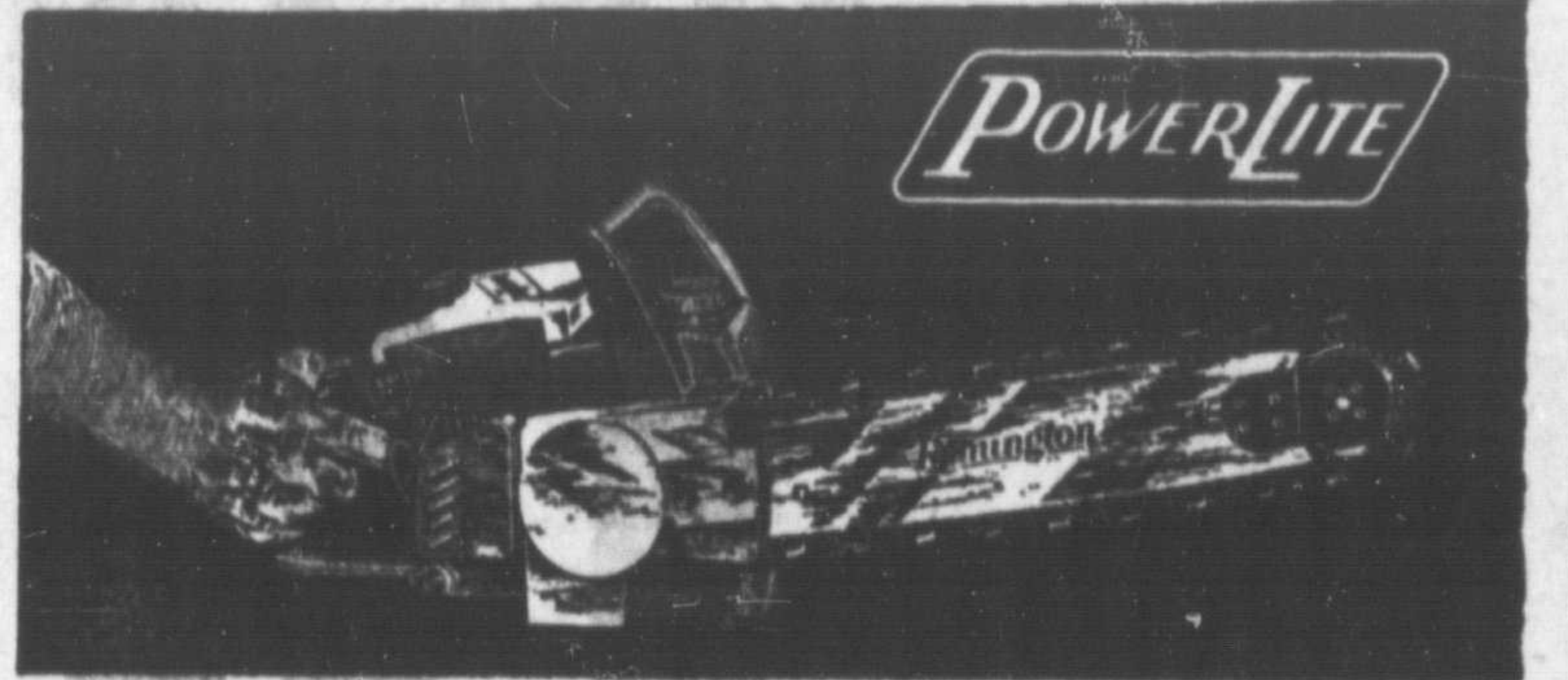
