A large business is done here in the rafting of square timber for the Quebec and other markets, great quantities being brought down the river Trent for this purpose from an immense range intersected by it. The manufactories are 4 grist mills, 2 steam saw mills, 1 stove and barrel factory, paper mill, tannery, plaster mill and foundry. There is an office of the Montreal Telegraph Co., also of the Dominion Telegraph Co., and a station of the Grand Trunk railway. The Montreal and Bay of Quinté steamers call here regularly. Distant from Montreal 252 miles, fare \$5.55; from Toronto 101 miles, fare \$3.35; from Belleville 12 miles, fare 40c. Mail daily. Population about 2000.
