

# TEST ICE ON NEW RINK

Nearing completion as one of the largest in the province, the City of Westmount's new out-door ice-rink is undergoing a series of tests this week and next to enable the men who will be in charge of running it to acquaint themselves with the working of the complicated mechanical set-ups.

On Wednesday, a rough coating of ice was being put down though the high temperatures didn't allow a true test of the capabilities of this equipment. Instead, the drains were being looked over for effective disposal of the water and it is proposed to give the icing apparatus a check-up next week.

The concrete base retains the heat for a long while and it's necessary to allow two days for the old ice to drain off before laying down a new coat.

The rink, due to be opened early November, measures 300 by 85 feet, with 100 feet at the north end reserved for children's skating and the other 200 for hockey games. The barrier at the north end can be removed to allow the whole area to be turned into a skating rink.

To keep everything going smoothly, three refrigeration engineers will run the icing equipment and another three will act as maintenance men, looking after the building, cleaning and keeping the ice clear.

There is much to look after. Separate dressing rooms for girls and their mothers and boys and their fathers are laid on and parents can watch their children from the rooms without having to venture out into the cold.

Also included are dressing rooms for two hockey teams, showers for each and a large room to hold the mass of equipment.

A hot water heating system has been installed, powered by an automatic oil-burner, which will serve the dressing rooms, showers and provide high temperature water for freezing the rink.

The liquid ammonia circulation system is operated by two 100 h.p. compressors and is pumped through 64 circuits with 6 pipes to a circuit. When the pipes have been cooled to freezing the water is sprayed on several times to get the thickness of ice required, usually 1/2 an inch to an inch.

No seating accommodation has been provided because the rink is intended for participation purposes, not for spectators. It's not a commercial project, there's no renting scheme in mind — in fact, it's for the citizens of Westmount and their children.

## Local fire fighters rehearse for action

"Don't give a fire a place start" is the slogan for this year's Fire Prevention Week and Westmount Fire Department is right in the thick of it trying to make as sure as they can that outbreaks are kept to a minimum in the city.

A heavy program of special events has been going on during the week in an effort to draw the public's attention to the serious loss of life and property fire brings.

Special drills have been conducted at city schools where inspectors have descended without warning to check the speed with which buildings are evacuated.

Afternoons, equipment has been taken to the Lookout and tested for efficient operation.

Finally, school children have been invited to the station to look over the equipment and see for themselves what happens when an alarm goes off and the amount of work required to maintain the machines at peak efficiency.

All this, of course, happens in one short week and there are plenty of short memories where fire-hazards and their prevention are concerned. Chief Harper warns them to keep in mind the

many hazards round the home which can cause fire at any time.

"Watch for rubbish, oily rags or waste and paints and polishes in the basement" he says. "Look out for curtains too near a stove, keep matches away from children and make sure that electric outlets aren't overloaded. Especially at this time of year, check that your furnace is working properly. A big danger is letting oil accumulate in a burner so that a faulty ignition sets it alight."

It all adds up to the slogan 'A tidy house seldom burns' and if you don't make a habit of gambling with fire you won't get your fingers burned.

Raoul Napoleon Trudeau, president of Savard and Hart Inc., died Tuesday at his residence, 3870 Northcliffe avenue, after a year's illness. He was 64. Funeral will be held tomorrow from the Urgel Bourgie Funeral Home, 3860 Decarie blvd with service at Notre Dame de Grace church.

President, general manager and partner in Savard and Hart Inc., Mr. Trudeau was a former governor of the Montreal Stock Exchange.

He was born in Drummondville, Que., and after his education at Sacred Heart College, St. Hyacinthe, joined the Bank of Montreal.

Afterwards he became a partner in Roberts and Trudeau, an import-export firm with head office in Paris. In 1927 he sold his interests and left France for Canada.

He then assumed a position in Ernest Savard Ltee., as salesman and was later appointed manager of the St. Hyacinthe branch, and afterwards institution salesman and sales manager of Savard and Hart Inc. In 1942 he became a partner in the firm.

He is survived by his wife, the former Blanche Roy.

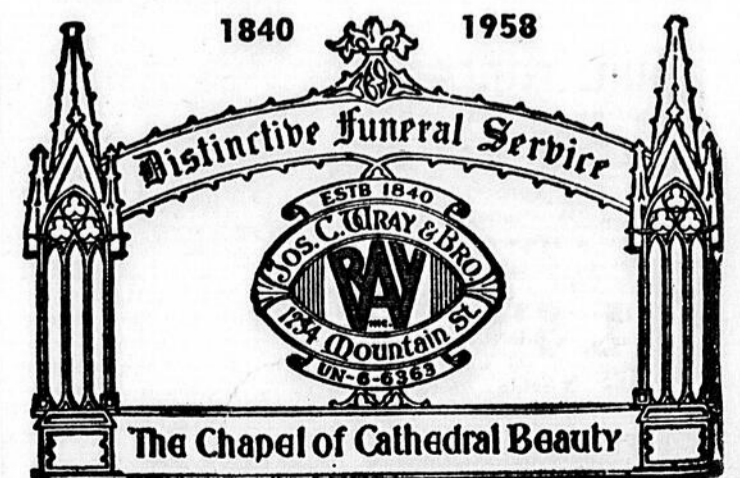

## Zoning by-law allows offices in city now

A draft of amendments of By-law 555 was approved by Council at their meeting Monday night, the amendments to cover minor changes to Article 10 of the By-law establishing the professions which are permitted to have offices on Sherbrooke street for purposes of office work and consultation only.

The amendment will now read "medical doctors, dentists, advocates, notaries, architects, landscape architects and chartered accountants and also professional engineers and land surveyors for the purposes of consultations and office work only" may establish their professional offices in any building having a frontage on the part of Sherbrooke street between its eastern end and the east side of Subdivision Lots 36 and 135 of Official Lot 219, if such offices do not have show windows or signs other than one sign only for each office, such sign to be placed on the Sherbrooke street frontage of such building and not to exceed one hundred and fifty (150) square inches in area and to indicate only the name or names and the profession of the occupant or occupants.

In addition, a definition of the term Bakery has been added to the By-law, to clarify this type of commercial enterprise.

A meeting of the elector-proprietors for the purpose of hearing any protests to these amendments is scheduled for Friday, October 17 at 9 a.m.

## Cargo line problems are told to Rotary

Some of the problems of a shipping line cargo agent were outlined to Westmount Rotarians at their weekly meeting, Wednesday, by Phil Gosling of Kerr Shipping Lines.

Booking space ahead, loading, stowing and receiving cargo were just some of the points he touched on as he traced the history of ship transportation from Greek and Phoenician times to the present day.

Booking required looking ahead and in some cases developing a sixth sense when it came to anticipating demand and supply. A ship may be sailing in three weeks time and filling slowly and if, for example 500 tons of low paying cargo came along, it was the agent's responsibility to make a decision whether to take this cargo or take a chance and wait for something better to come along. Sometimes, commented Gosling, it was just a matter of luck.

Then there was the problem of loading the ship, a process which had changed somewhat from the days before the Plimsoll line when ships were stuffed with cargo anyhow and sometimes never reached their destination. This was more the responsibility

## WE SAY

### He has done what he could

NO more fitting epitaph perhaps could be coined for Pius XII, spiritual head of the Catholic Church who died Wednesday, than the six words above.

Coming to the Throne of Peter in 1939 on the eve of the bloodiest war the world has ever known, this Godly man who was 82 at the time of his death, became a saint in his lifetime largely through his continuing crusade for peace.

His passing at a time when the world sorely needs a strong voice continually raised against carnage and oppression, weakens the forces of Christendom.

While the line of religious monarchs at the Vatican will go on following the selection of a successor by the Sacred College of Cardinals and the post of Pontiff will be filled — the man to don the mantle of Pius XII will face a task as taxing as that ever undertaken by a head of the Catholic Church.

Everywhere, in all denominations there is a call to a religious revival and response from mankind, sick with the horror of war, fearful under the threat of atomic catastrophe.

Such revival, such response requires a meek man, mild in manner and meek, yet with the strength of great courage and such was the Pope whose death yesterday plunges men of God everywhere into mourning, whatever their denomination.

The Pope is dead, but there is today a greater need than ever for the peace for which he fought as long as life flickered in his frail body.

As the only municipality on the Island to have adopted this practice, Dorval certainly presents a contrast to this community where Council procedures are shrouded in a vague mystic secrecy.

The public service spirit and responsibility to the electorate obviously felt by John Pratt and his Councillors might well be worthy of emulation here.

DESPITE the fact that 25 volunteer leaders have again signed up for duties at the Unity Boys Club here, more are needed, the club officials indicate.

This is a worthwhile work, and residents who feel they have the qualifications for handicraft teaching, or supervision in the junior games room are urged to get in touch with the club.

The Community Council of Notre Dame de Grace, operating immediately to the west of this city, in a report on juvenile delinquency and vandalism recently, stated that one of the most vital requirements to cut down the incidence of these evils was more trained leadership.

A similar cry is going up on all sides.

Here is a task many citizens can undertake, and achieve personal and immediate results.

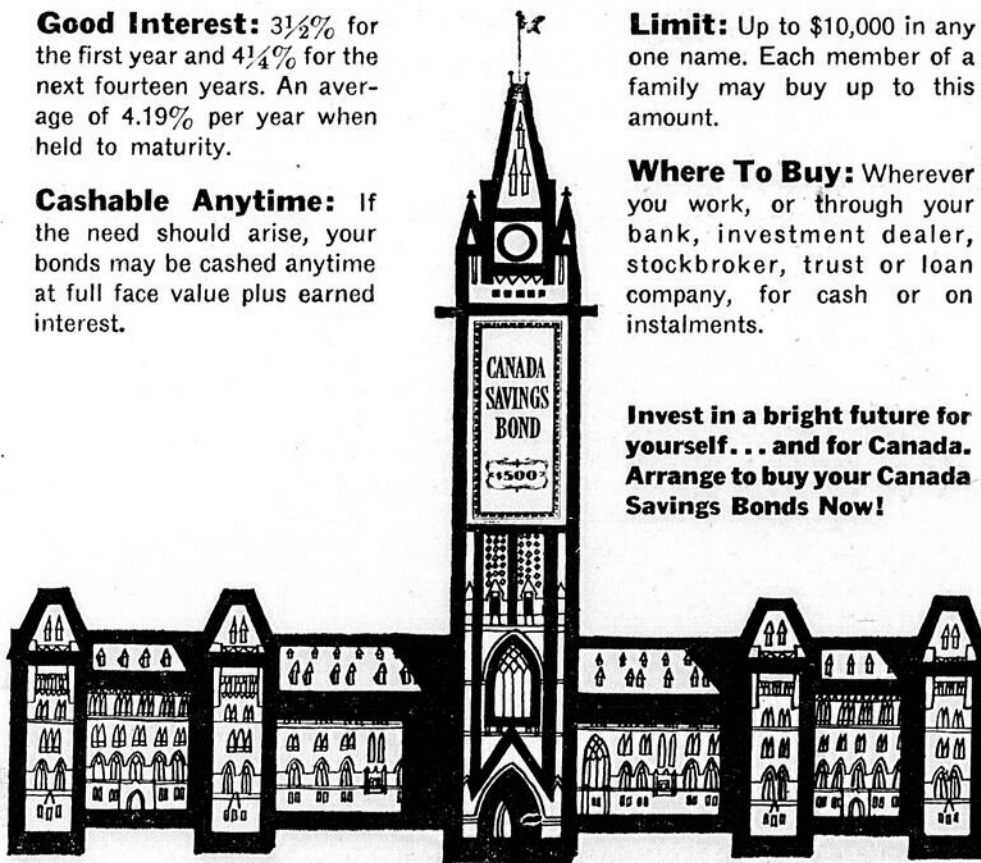

### City continues study of soil

Replacement of a truck, an addition to the library building and a temporary loan were among matters discussed at Monday's Council meeting.

The purchase of one heavy duty truck was authorised to replace a vehicle now in service due to its age and condition. \$9,442 were authorised for purchase of the truck and \$1,125 was committed for the removal, overhaul and re-installation of the snow removal equipment carried by this truck.

\$700 was committed to cover the cost of additional borings to study the soil conditions in the area of the Library Extension foundation. The City will be calling for tenders for the construction of this addition in the near future, a possible date being October 22.

In accordance with previous practice, Council authorised the borrowing of \$100,000 to a firm of investment dealers at an interest rate of not more than 3% per annum for the period October to December 1958.



My correspondent's next point is a delicate one and some people will say it has nothing to do with religion at all. But I believe that everything that concerns men and women has a religious side to it. Food and drink are religious, clothing and shelter, wages and security all have to do with religion. So does politics, both national and international. And when my correspondent speaks of the failure of the West and the winning of the cold war by the Communists I am not going to dodge the issue by saying that international politics has nothing to do with religion. "The Lord God omnipotent reigneth," even though it is hard for us to realize it.

When we speak of the failure of the West, I suppose we mean that the English-speaking countries and their European allies have allowed the world to get into a state of chaos; and when we say that the Communists are winning the cold war, I suppose we mean first that Communist has spread over vast areas of the world, and that the U.S.A. in particular is thoroughly unpopular outside its own area.

Let us admit at once that in a troubled country a totalitarianism like Communism of-

fers a very appealing way out from chaos. So did Nazism and Fascism. They failed, and Communism survived with the help of the democratic West. Then in one country after another Communism seized control by most undemocratic methods and Democracy died. Czechoslovakia was the most tragic example. There was a real Democracy destroyed. When Democracy came to life again in Hungary it too was crushed - brutally and treacherously - by the Soviets.

On the other hand the U.S.A. freed the Philippine Islands; Great Britain set free India, Burma, Ceylon, Malaya, and has turned one African colony after another into a self-governing dominion. It does not

read like a record of failure, but it is a record of calculated risk. There is nothing in the Soviet record to match it. Cyprus is a different and tragic case. Britain cannot leave Cyprus without breaking faith with the twenty per cent of Turkish inhabitants. Britain received Cyprus from Turkey by agreement.

On the whole the Communists seem to have the advantage in the cold war, for there is something overwhelming in their cold brutality. We soon forget the tragedy of Hungary.

But the real reason for the failure of the West lies in our own distrust of Democracy. One of my friends expressed it 20 years ago when Hitler was climbing to the hegemony of Europe: "Democracy," he said, "I'm tired of Democracy." And that in spite of the extermination of the Jews. We worship success and we feel that Democracy is not a success at present. It has lost its punch. It is not only our distrust of Democracy; it is our refusal to put it to work. Governor Faubus and the Notting Hill riots and the Government of South Africa have done more to discredit

Democracy than we shall be able to make up in many years. Governor Faubus' attitude to the Negro is exactly the same as Hitler's. They both stirred up hatred for their personal ends.

In all this has the Church had any part? With shame we must confess that there are many Christian people who approved of Apartheid in South Africa and of segregation in the United States. But on the whole it is the Churches which have opposed racial intolerance most strongly. They have not come through with entirely clean skirts, but they can say in Africa at least that it was the Churches first which opened up the Dark Continent. It was they which provided schools and hospitals. The forward movement of the African races owes more to Christianity than to any other agency. The present is troubled and the future is dark, but the problems of the world will not be best solved unless the West recovers its faith in God and in itself.

There is one more point to make in this connection but it will have to wait for next week.

## Former Westmount pastor sees religious upsurge

Regretting the passing of certain traditional features of church life, Rev. Dr. J. A. Johnston noted an upsurge of religious interest among young people that made him feel optimistic about the future of the Christian church.

Dr. Johnston who participated in the annual meeting of the Eastern Association of Baptist Churches is perhaps best known to Montrealeers for his many years service as pastor of Westmount Baptist Church, from which he retired in 1956 after serving for twenty-five years.

Speaking reminiscently, he said that when he returned from

overseas after the first world war he became pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in Toronto. It was a small church and the attendance became so large that they had to move to Malvern Collegiate assembly hall where around 700 people would turn out for service. His next pastorate was at Talbot Baptist Church, in London, Ont. The evening congregation averaged 700 to 750. The Sunday evening service was broadcast for six years. This church had two young people's organizations with an average attendance of 150.

In recent years there has been a radical change in attendance at

the Sunday evening services which do not draw the crowds they used to, he said. He spoke with a touch of sadness of the decline in the mid-week church prayer meeting. In earlier years almost every church had its Wednesday or Friday evening prayer meeting; now it is the exceptional church that continues this practice.

He felt encouraged by the large and increasing number of high school and university students showing an intelligent and sincere interest in the vital things of the Christian faith. He has seen a considerable number of young people going into the Christian ministry and foreign mission service. When he left Westmount Baptist, that church had nine members, including the wives of two, engaged in foreign fields: two in Ethiopia, two in Hawaii, three in Bolivia and two in India.

He found an increased willingness on the part of people to give resulting in larged amounts being contributed to church and philanthropic enterprises.

He felt a great satisfaction in

being able to say that he has always had the good support of wonderful and competent Christian gentlemen.

Although officially retired, Dr. Johnston is still busy and active in field work for the Baptist denomination.

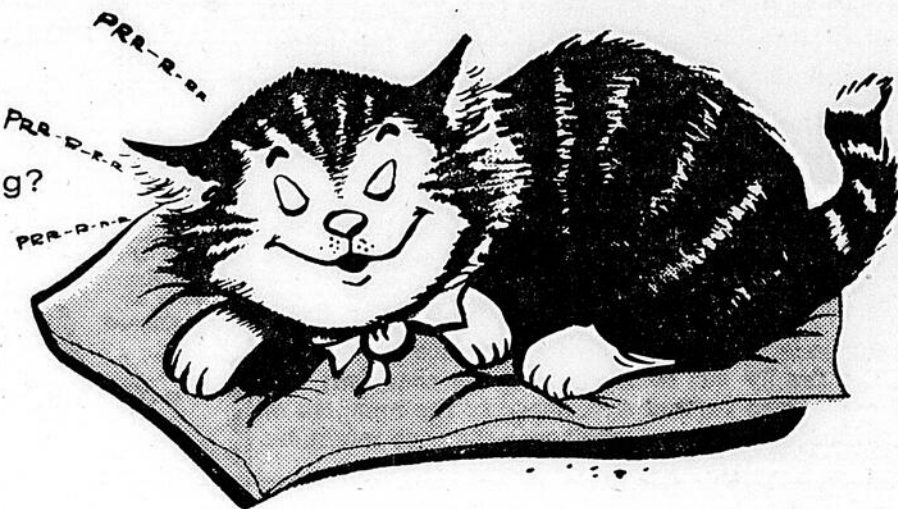

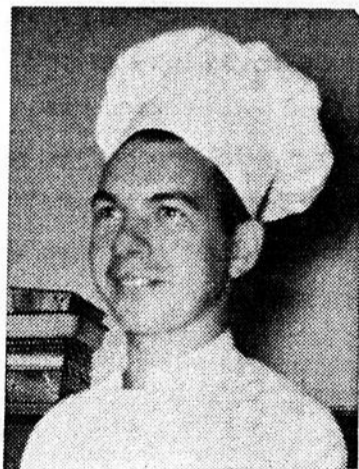
On this Thanksgiving day, as we mentioned, the restaurant proprietors and their cohorts are almost impatiently ardent in their desire to help with one's gratitude.

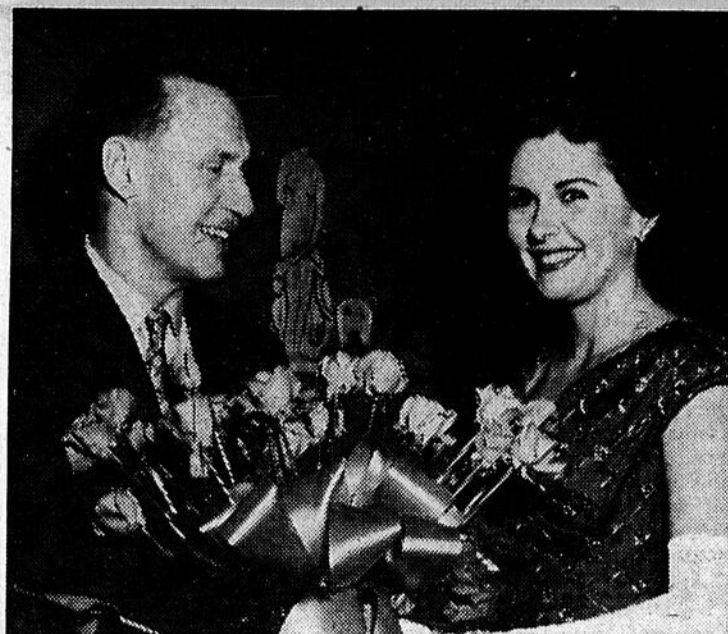

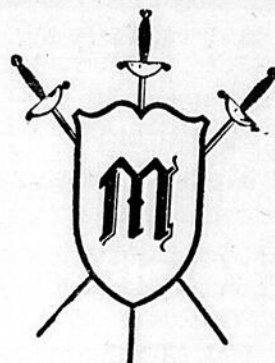

## Local artist's work is chosen in three U.S.A. Art Exhibitions

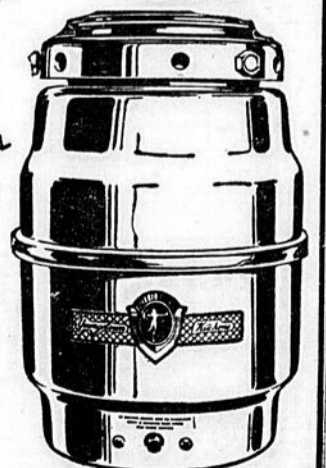

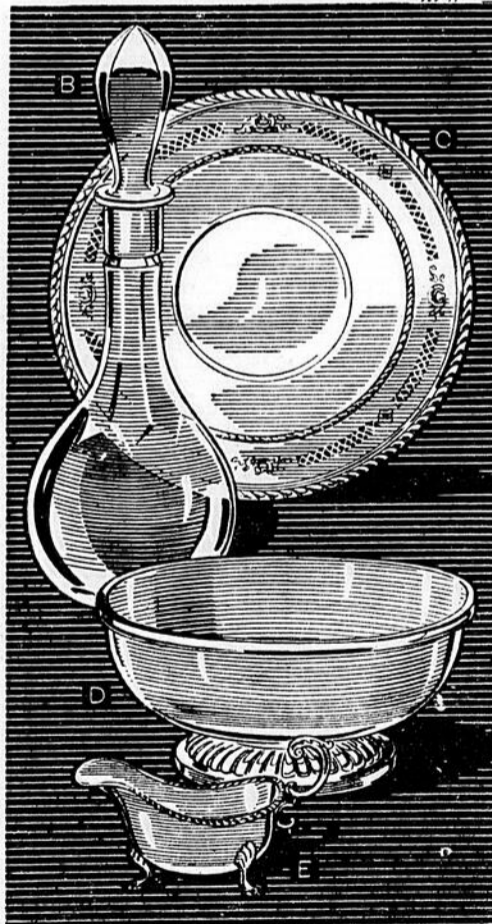

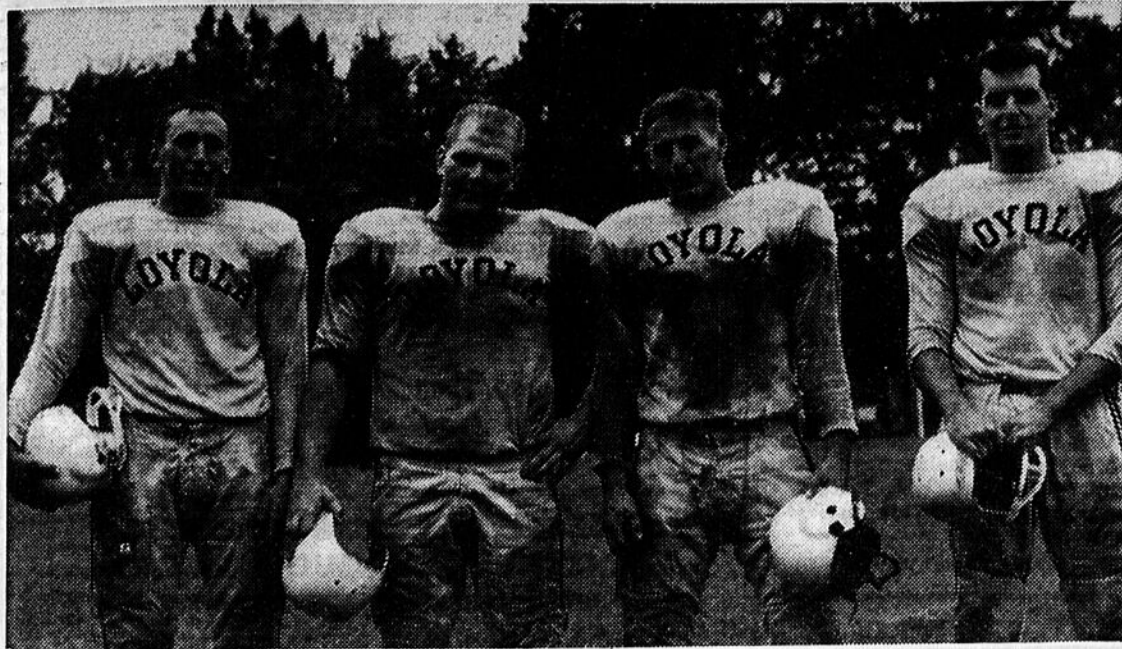
