Terrible Disaster in New York.

Over 100 Persons Killed or Injured. NEW YORK, Aug. 22--At 12.30 this afternoon an explosion occurred in the five story building on 85 and 70 Park Place, occupied by Jno. Ceberl, manufacturer of mats.

At one o'clock the fire was under control. Half of the Greenwich street building had been burned, while the Taylor building was a complete wreck.

Among the concerns interested were Hudson's Restaurant, Lindsay's Type Foundry, and the office of the New York Herald.

The building was originally erected by a man named Taylor and it was known as the Taylor building. It had a frontage of about 150 feet on Park Place and 30 feet on Broadway.

At eight o'clock to-night a steady down-pour of rain set in, which was of great assistance in the removal of the debris.

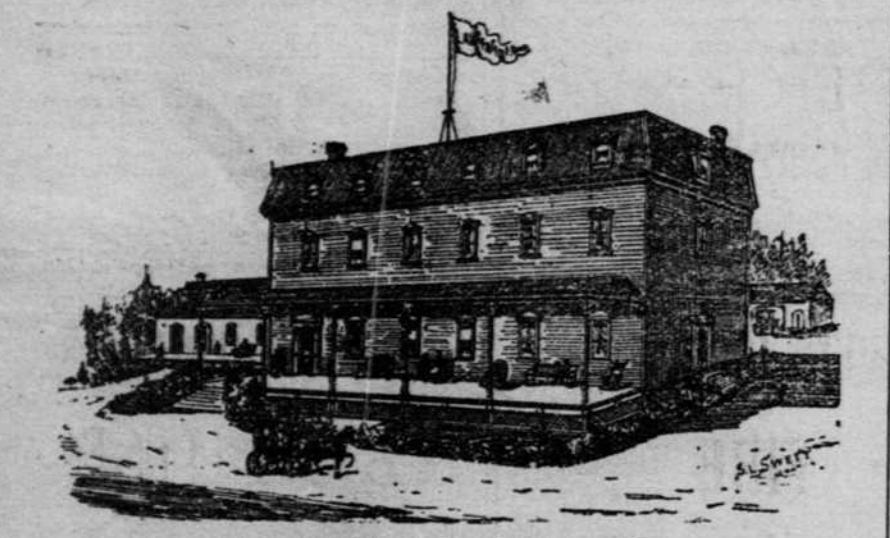

The crops he reports to be full of promise, though the gathering in of the hay contractors of the new Baie des Chaleurs Railway are pushing the work with great rapidity and pass on the ground a very large staff of men.

SETTLEMENT OF DAMAGES. Mr. E. A. Howe, C.E., who has been appointed by the Federal Government to report on the damages sustained by the farmers of Riviere-du-Sud caused by the Interoceanic Railway bridge at that locality, will leave for Montmagny to-morrow to commence his work.

EASTERN TOWNSHIP CROPS. The Sherbrooke Gazette says: "From all parts of the Eastern Townships, almost without exception, comes the welcome intelligence of abundant crops. Harvesting operations are pretty general throughout the Townships, and returns, especially in barley, are reported."

POLITICAL REMOVS. The Canadian Press that the appointment of a Legislative Committee to fill the seat vacated by the death of the late Hon. N. LaRoche will be made early in September and that Mr. F. X. Lemieux is likely to get it, in which case Mr. O. Olivier will be the Government candidate for Lewis.

THE FERRY CONTRACT. Alderman Leonard presented a report of the Ferry Committee on Friday last at the City Council meeting, which submitted a by-law to fix a new date for the sale of the ferry contract. The new date is September 15th. If the sale falls through on that date, the contract will be offered again on the 22nd.

PICK-POCKETS. For some time past complaints have been laid at the police office of persons having their pockets picked by sneak thieves in this city and the detective force has been keeping a sharp look out for the thieves. In the Champlain market on Saturday morning a woman named Legare, of the Upper Town, had her purse, which contained \$5, taken from a pocket of her dress.

FOUND DEAD IN BED. On Friday morning at the Sacred Heart Hospital an English citizen of Quebec named F. X. Bois, was found dead in his bed. He was a brother of the Rev. Mr. Bois, Curé of Maskinonge, and was aged 78 years. An inquest was held on his remains on Saturday and a verdict of death from apoplexy returned. Deceased was apparently in good health on his retirement the previous night.

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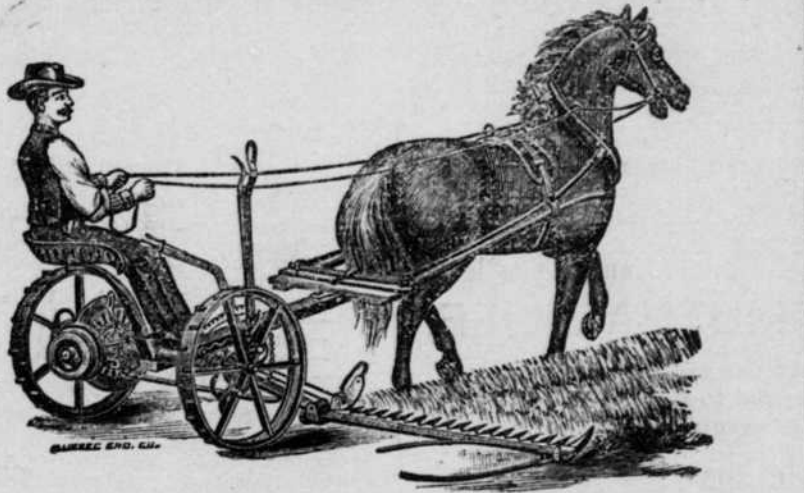

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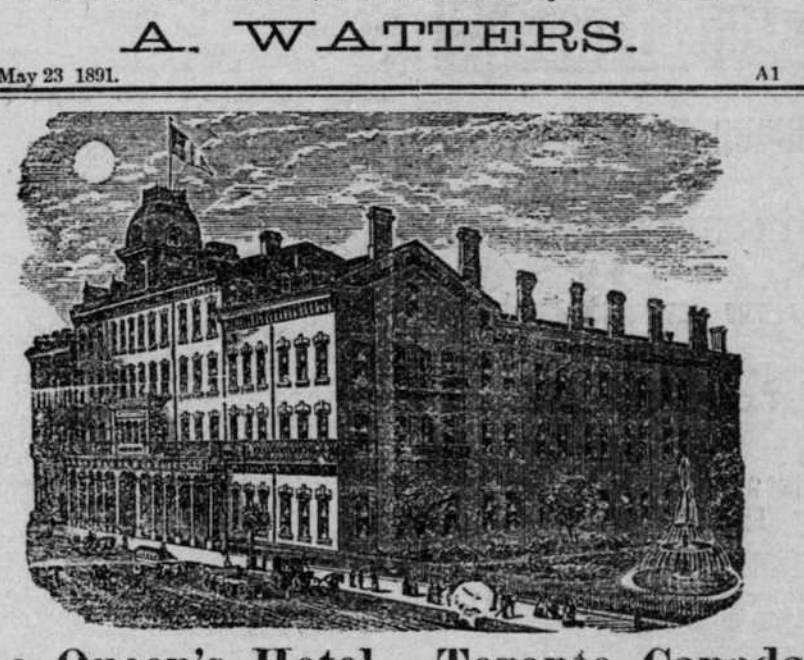
