Notes and News.

HERE AND THERE.

The death of Count Von Moltke would have been a very serious thing a few years ago, but it is now caused by the announcement of his sudden demise on the evening of Friday last. The young Emperor has learned to do without the counsel of the veterans who made Germany what it is today, in statecraft and in military renown. He has been getting rid, one by one, of his father's and grandfather's trusted advisers, and he is depending on younger heads for help. If he does not depend too much on himself, he will likely succeed. Instead of waiting for the old men of the Empire to die before striking out for himself, he has quietly relegated them to obscurity, and performed his military and military feats before their eyes. He practically banished Bismarck from his presence, while that once great Chancellor was in the full possession of all his powers. The Generals of the Franco-Prussian war have been slowly withdrawn from places where they might do harm to the Emperor's more modern plans, and now death has removed from the pathway of the young Kaiser the grand old soldier of the century. He passed away peacefully in his ninety-first year, leaving behind him one of the greatest names in arms that the world has ever seen. He was a true Prussian, and his country's future was ever before his eyes. The idol of the army, it may be long before his real successor will arise. Meanwhile, Germany mourns her distinguished hero, and though he asked to be buried beside his wife and child, without pomp, it is a question whether young WILLIAM will obey the request. His Majesty will likely order instead, a military funeral.

The rumour is again in circulation that the Hon. JOHN CARLING is to be made a Senator, and will remain a Minister. He has long been associated with Sir JOHN MACDONALD in the Government of the country, and the Premier has always felt loath to part with a colleague. It was said some time ago, that Mr. CARLING would succeed Sir ALEXANDER CAMPBELL as Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, and that Sir ALEXANDER would return to the Senate and rejoin the Cabinet. Either arrangement would be a good one for the country. Meanwhile, we hear that an Ontario man is to get the portfolio of Militia and Defence, and that Sir ADOLPH CARON will take another Cabinet position. In a few days, we presume, the truth of these reports will be known. Parliament opens on the 29th. Mr. PETER WETZEL will be chosen Speaker on that day. The grand opening will take place on Thursday, the 30th inst., when, headed by the First Commoner, the assembled wisdom of the country will flock into the Senate-room, and listen to His Excellency's Address from the Throne.

To-night the winter lecture course of the Young Men's Christian Association comes to a close. Viewed from almost any standpoint, it may be said, that the course has been a most excellent one. The Committee, with commendable enterprise and liberality, have secured for to-night, the valuable services of Mr. NICHOLAS FLOOD DAVIN, M.P., who will lecture at the Academy of Music, at eight o'clock, on his favorite subject, "The British House of Commons." It is a lecture in which Mr. DAVIN has made his mark. It is a fine literary and oratorical effort, the work of a keen intellect, an observing eye, and a nice critical judgment. Mr. DAVIN has had frequent opportunity of hearing Britain's most famous sons in debate. He has estimated their powers and gauged their abilities. To-night he will tell us what he saw and heard, and how the strong men of the Empire impressed him. The lecturer is well known to the people of Canada, not only as a lecturer and public man, but also as an editor and a literary man. He is the historian of the Irish race in Canada. He is also a graceful and tender poet. Eos, perhaps, is his most striking poem, but his shorter pieces have a charm, and sweetness and delicacy seldom arrived at by the singers of this country. To-night, our citizens may expect a rich treat. His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor has promised to be present. The chair will be occupied by the Hon. Judge MURRAY, who will introduce the lecturer, while on the stage, several of our citizens, in representative capacities, have been invited to take seats. A very large audience may, with confidence, be expected to attend.

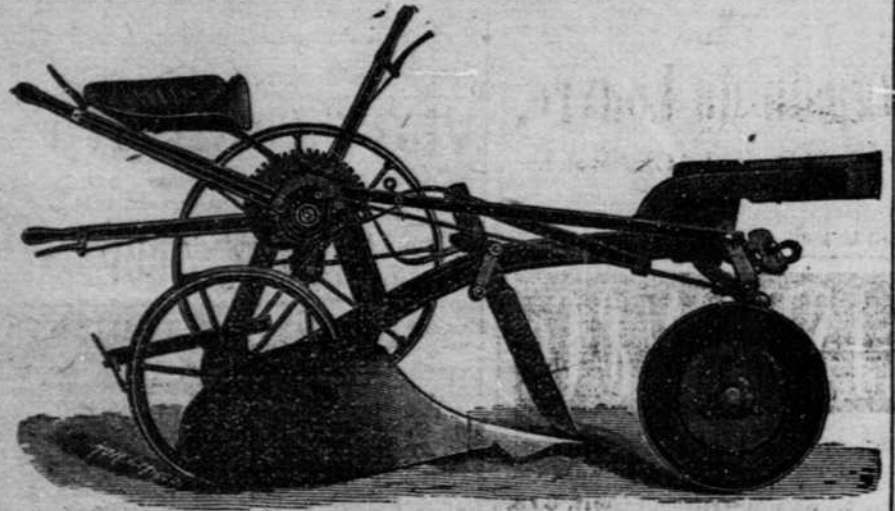
