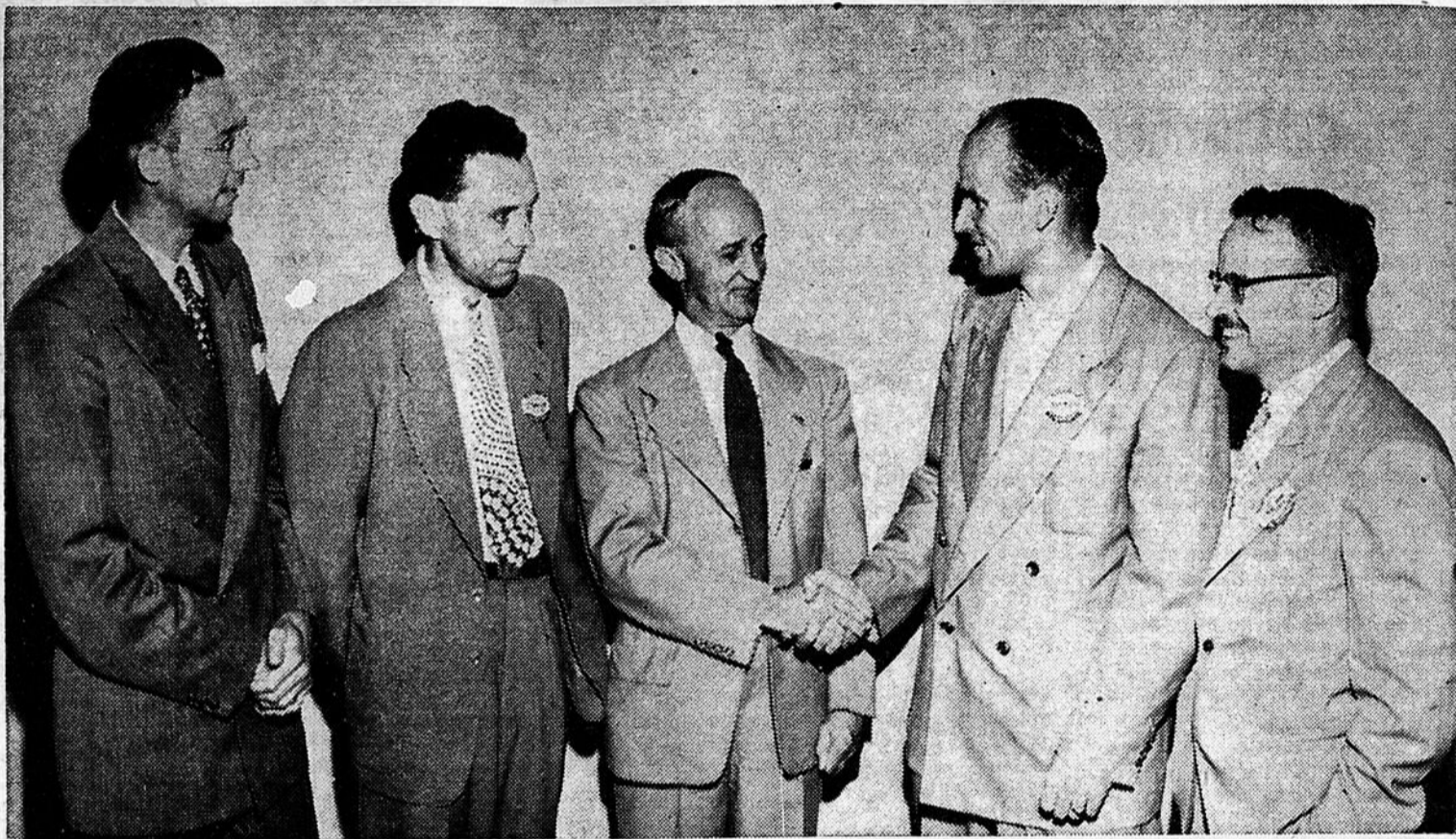

## RESERVOIR TENDERS CALLED



### Work To Begin Early In 1954 Near Lookout

The city of Montreal has called tenders for the construction of a 3,000,000 gallon water reservoir in Westmount, to serve the local area and bolster the reserve water supply of its system generally.

Contracts will be allotted in a month and a half, it is believed, and with the approach of winter weather it is highly possible start of the work will be held over until the spring of '54.

The reservoir will be constructed in Summit Park, immediately behind the Westmount Lookout, and will be to the east and north of a 40,000 gallon reserve tank that is now located in that general area.

Westmount civic officials have approved of the plan in principle and negotiations with the city on matters of service pipe locations, etc., are still pending.

The reservoir will be completely underground, will cost about \$650,000 to complete and will probably be about a year and a half in the building.

The land on which the reservoir will be set is a natural plateau, fairly level, and while the terrain consists

### Westmount Rotary Hears W.A. Buckley

Rotary has become a potent force in developing international goodwill, a meeting of the Westmount Rotary Club was told Thursday by Wilfred A. Buckley, district governor.

"The fostering of understanding and friendship has grown throughout the year," Buckley pointed out, "so that now Rotary boasts 7,827 clubs in 23 different countries."

The speaker is general secretary of the Kingston YMCA, and has been a member of Rotary since 1930. He was a former president of the Westmount club, and held the same position with the Kingston club in 1949-50.

In his talk, he said that an informed and active Rotarian develops an informed and active club, and it is only through following the principles of Rotary that one

can foster this growth of true Rotarianism.

"One of the main reasons Rotary is so strong," Buckley continued, is because it seeks all that bring people together, and avoids those things that tend to separate."

"The thoughtfulness of others is the basis of service, and the form of its expression."

In going through the four phases of Rotary, Buckley declared that club service was the most important. The smooth efficient running of a club is always the forerunner of better service in the other three departments, vocational, community, and international service.

He concluded by saying that Rotary does not automatically do anything. "To promote service, the Rotarians themselves must work and do things; only in this way will the true idea of Rotary be found."

### Catholic Charities, St. Mary's Appeal Setting Sights on \$563,000 Figure

For the third consecutive year the Combined Appeal of the Federation of Catholic Charities and St. Mary's Hospital is setting its sights on \$563,000 as the figure necessary to maintain the services of the two organizations, it was announced today.

Alex Grant, president of Grant Mills Ltd., and general chairman of the drive which will take place between October 15-29, revealed the goal of the drive in a statement which also listed the officers who will be in charge of the various departments set up to co-ordinate the efforts of the thousands of volunteers who will strive to interest the public in support of the campaign.

Recalling the decision, over two years ago, to unite Federation and St. Mary's into one appeal, Mr. Grant pointed out that the last two campaigns had failed to reach their objectives.

#### Need Stressed

"While we have not curtailed any of our services to the general public we have had to postpone plans to modernize several of our departments and this postponement will, sooner or later, result in inadequate service to the public.

"I strongly call on all citizens to take notice of the fact that the 'Calling All Hearts' appeal will take place between Oct. 15-29 and request that they now make the mental pledge that they will be

ready, willing, and able to give and give generously when the time comes," Mr. Grant stated.

Like all organizations of this kind the organization which handles the appeal for Federation and St. Mary's is a purely voluntary one, Mr. Grant pointed out.

On that basis, he also appealed for those who helped in last year's campaign; for the new young businessmen and women; for the "newly-retired," and the "old-retired," and others, to turn out in numbers as "never-before" and volunteer their services "right now."

"Our canvassers, that volunteer body of men, women and children who devote their time in the interests of charity, are the people we rely on to carry the personal message of our appeal to the general public. The organization of a drive of this calibre would be much better if these volunteers would come forward now, so that we would know where we stand," he concluded.

## Third Generation 'Fighting' Green Is Injured

### Dodges Korea Fire; Hit By 6-Ton Truck

Talking about the vagaries of life, here's one for the book! Private Wm. 'Bill' Green, jr., aged 19, one of a long line of 'fighting' Greens, spent ten months in the front lines in Korea amid the bitterest fighting as a member of the famed Third Battalion, Princess Pats' Light Infantry. He came out without a scratch, only to be run over twice by a British Army six-ton truck a week after the truce signing, to end up in the Kure, Japan, Military Hospital with two broken legs and an injured spine!

The son of 'Bill' Green, gregarious custodian of Westmount High School, Billy 'minor', is a Westmount lad from birth.

Bill jr. was educated at Queen's School in Westmount. At this point as many youngsters do, he got the wanderlust and hitched his way to Canada's west coast where he jobbed about for awhile before returning to Westmount to settle down to a job with Frank Kenwood's Westmount Moving and Storage.

Soon after the Korean conflict flared Billy decided he'd like to join the Navy. The Green clan being Army school since his grandfather's day, Junior was soon persuaded that this was the career for him.

#### Likes Fighting

Voluntarily enlisting, Bill jr. was sent to camp for a total of six months training, presumably to be attached to some outfit occupying Germany, etc. Then he decided to join the Princess Patricia Light Infantry, because as he said, "I'd like to go where there's fighting!" This he did, being shipped to the Korean front late last September, without the benefit of a promised two months field training in Japan, going 'cold' to the front lines.

Bill's father, Bill Sr., served in both the first and second World Wars coming through both unscathed although two brothers, also in the active army, lost their lives in the first conflict. Bill's sister did a stint in the Canadian Women's Army Corps during the Second War.

Bill's favourite peace-time past-



time is duck hunting, and he is a crack shot.

Although not too sure of what will happen when he gets out of hospital, 'Junior' is quite chipper as is evidenced by a cheerful letter to his family. Bill is married and his wife lives with his parents at their St. Catherine Street West residence.

He is survived by his widow, six sons and daughters, six grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren.

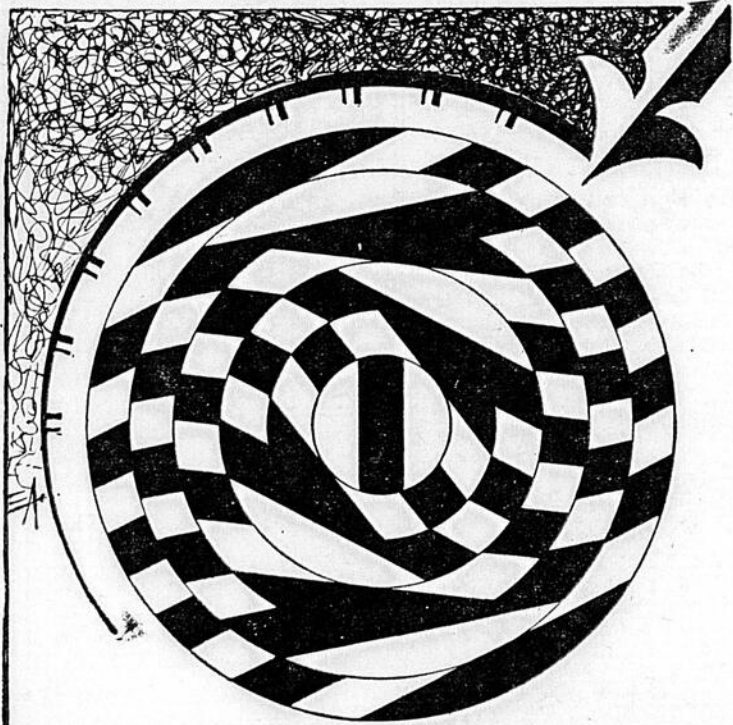

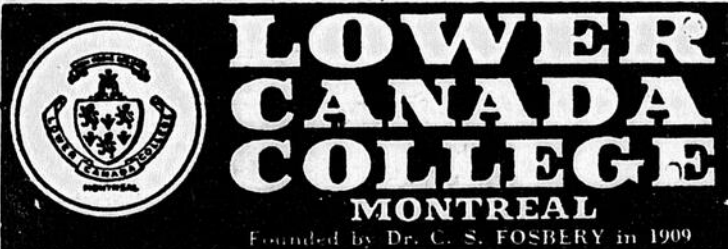

## Thy Will Be Done

(Rector of Trinity Memorial Church)

We have been considering this petition of the Lord's Prayer, not in a spirit of resignation, but as a challenge flung out at the various problems of our daily life; and we may well ask the question: If this is our desire and the power of God is behind us, why are there so many failures?

St. Paul provides a partial answer — "The good that I would I do not, but the evil that I would not yet I do," for even "when I would do good evil is present with me," for "with the flesh" I serve "the law of sin." Even though we are transformed by the renewing of our mind, we still have not eradicated the tendency to sin; and every action in which we try to do the will of God is still infected by sin.

Consider the points at which we might expect that God's will would most consistently be done — in the little groups within the Church. Even there the spirit of self-will is at work, and therefore the will of God is not effective. You find groups in every church in which there is wrangling. Even St. Paul and St. John knew of it. Take St. Paul's appeal in his letter to the Philippians, "I beseech Eudodias, and beseech Syntyche, that they be of the same mind;" you can just hear Eudodias saying: "I absolutely refuse to be a church worker as long as Syntyche is the head of the Ladies' Aid." Or take St. John's denunciation of Diotrephes "who loveth to have the pre-eminence among them." In that case, apparently, Diotrephes wanted to set up a little church of his own, for he refused to receive the Apostle. And if that was true in the early days of Church, with the Apostle's eye upon them, the modern Church is not likely to be free from examples of self-seeking, and where there is self-seeking God's will is not done.

St. Peter enjoins mutual forbearance upon us in the words, "All of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility." How many men driving cars last Sunday on the Laurentian Highway were ready to show forbearance and to be ready to defer to one another; and how many accidents might be prevented and how many valuable lives saved, if we did defer to one another? And further, God's will would in some degree be done.

We spoke of playgrounds and

other facilities for children and youth, as one of the means by which God's will for them might be done. But the best playgrounds and gymnasiums and halls are of little use unless we find more people to give voluntary leadership. And leadership is lacking because there are not enough men and women ready to give up their time and talents for the work. It would interfere with badminton and bridge, with tennis and teas, and all sorts of things. It would mean the sacrifice of self, but there are few good things in the world which have not meant sacrifice. If God's will is to be done, and if we are to be co-operators with Him in the doing of it, there must be that same sacrifice of self which was the very mark of the Lord Jesus.

## Problems in Korea

U.N. Likely To See Much Trouble Before Conferences End

The Korean War is not necessarily ended. Peace terms must still be worked out, with the U.S. and South Korea likely to quit the conference unless the Communists show good faith. War in that case could start up all over again, with the U.N. staying out, the U.S. and ROK doing the fighting.

Certainly the U.S. cannot tolerate any settlement which puts South Korea in the slightest jeopardy, since that country is a stepping-stone to Japan. This is why the Korean War had to be fought in the first place. If the Communists had been allowed to take over South Korea, they would have been in a good position to take over Japanese industry and manpower.

Next task for the U.S. however the peace conference turns out, is to rearm Japan, whose present weakness, like Germany's creates a dangerous power vacuum between the Communists and non-Communists worlds.

U.N. will see plenty of trouble if the U.K. and India press for the seating of Red China as part of the peace settlement. Apart from the question whether Red China is a "peace-loving" nation as specified in the U. N. Charter, there is the absurdity of letting her in while keeping such countries as Italy, Spain and Portugal out. Governments of these countries are quite as legitimate as Mao's, and have a far cleaner foreign and domestic record.

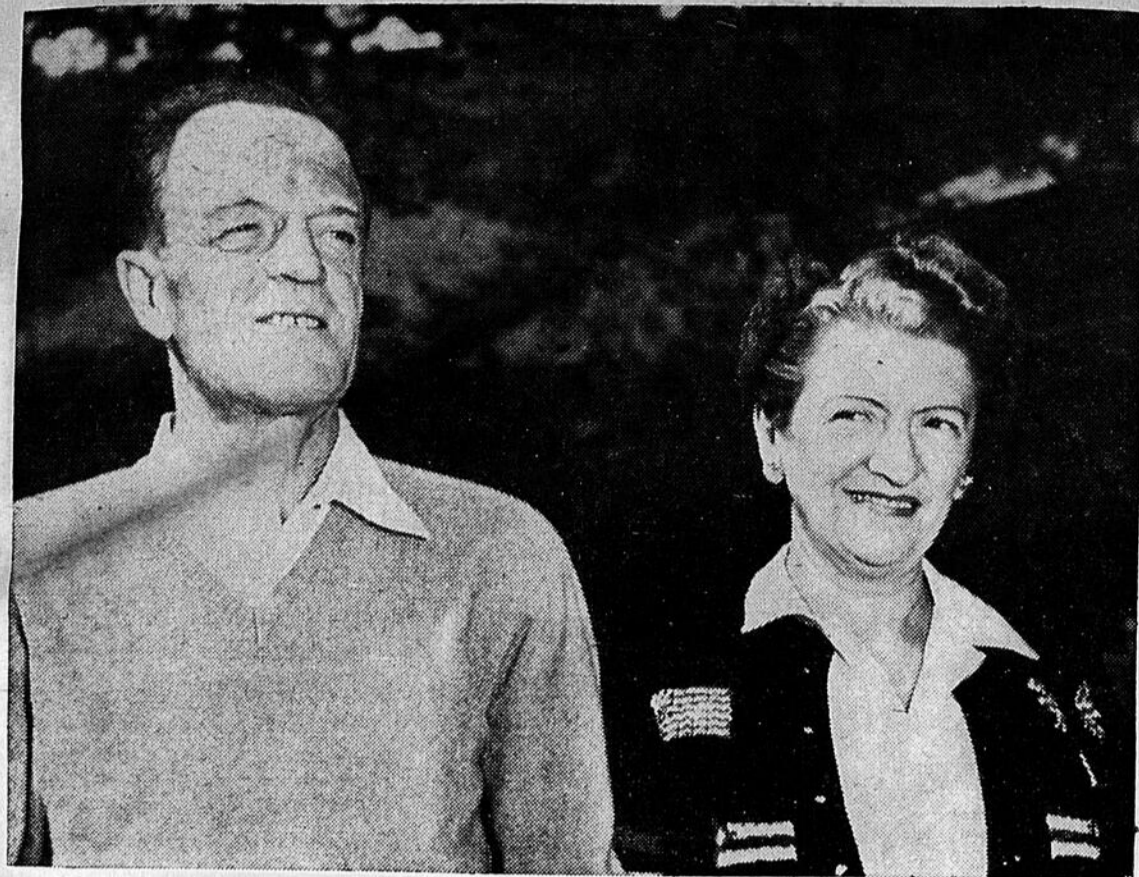

**Decoratively Speaking**

Non Repeating Wallpapers

By Frances James

They are not new but are currently being used in many homes, restaurants and offices. They are the big non-repeat scenic wallpapers. These papers are designed to fit any height or width of wall. In very high ceilinged rooms there will be more sky showing as compared with low ceilinged rooms.

Each panel of the scenic wall is one roll of wallpaper. If the room is small and the wall space limited, the panels at either end are eliminated, but for a wide expanse of wall additional panels can be added increasing the scope of the scene. They are so designed that to remove or add one or two sections from either end will not disrupt the main line and form of the pattern.

For a smart executive office there is no wall covering quite so appropriate. The big wall behind his desk can become a beautiful pastoral scene. It softens the severe straight lines of office desk, file cabinet and swivel chair.

In a home we suggest you try a non-repeat scenic wallpaper in your dining room. A conventionalized design forming a dado will serve as a buffer against chairs knocking the wall, then the scenic paper can be placed above the dado where it will not be obstructed by the furniture. By the way, when planning a dado remember that generally speaking, it creates a much more pleasing division if it is low. We would suggest 32 to 36 inches from the floor.

Dining rooms require interesting wall treatments because of the quantity of square wooden furniture necessary. A striking non-repeat scenic wallpaper will serve to set your dining room above the humdrum everyday variety.

We all enjoy scenic wallpapers in restaurants, cocktail bars and theatre lobbys. There is no reason why we can't use them quite as effectively in offices and homes.

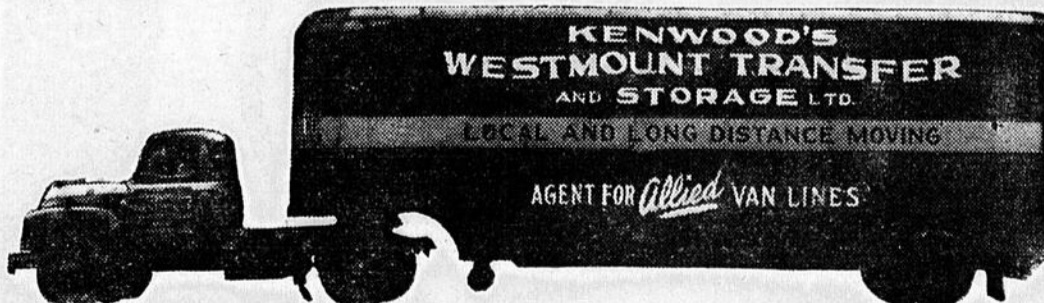

**Let's Eat**

"Welcome to the test-kitchen, madame," said the chef. "I have a half-dozen ways with cucumbers ready to taste-test. Regard first the cold dishes:

"Here is shimmering cucumber aspic. Here are thin-sliced raw cucumbers jelled in a perfection salad base. This is cold cream of cucumber soup, with a garnish of soured cream. Very good with devilled ham finger sandwiches oui?"

**Three Hot Dishes**

"Now, if you will be seated madame, I would like to present three hot cucumber dishes:

"Here are three slices of cucumber dipped in egg and crumbs and deep-fried. In this serving dish are steamed diced cucumbers in cream sauce seasoned with mayonnaise.

And last I have cucumber boats, stuffed like green peppers and baked."

"Bravo, chef!" I applauded. "You've made wonderful use of a vegetable that's often unappreciated. I'd like to add to the collection. Excuse me a moment."

Into the dooryard and back with a handful of crisp nasturtium leaves and some golden blossoms. "Let's make round cucumber bread and butter sandwiches, chef, and insert in each one a nasturtium leaf, enjoy them with a glass of iced tea."

**Tomorrow's Dinner**

- Stuffed Cucumber Saladettes
- Spanish Chicken Casserole
- Flaky Rice Summer Squash
- Southern Banana Float
- Hot or Iced Coffee or Tea Milk
- All Measurements Are Level
- Recipes Serve Four
- Spanish Chicken Casserole

In a frying pan heat 2 tbsp. olive oil and saute 1 c. diced celery, 1 chopped peeled medium-sized onion, 1 crushed peeled section garlic, 1 (4-oz.) can sliced mushroom pieces and 1 chopped green pepper. When the vegetables turn color, add 2 c. diced cooked chicken, 1 c. canned tomato, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper, 1/2 tsp. monosodium glutamate, 1/4 tsp. basil and 2 tbsp. minced parsley.

Transfer to an oiled 3-pt. casserole. Pour in chicken broth or tomato juice to moisten. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake 35 min. in a moderate oven 375 deg. F.

**Southern Banana Float**

In a bowl mix together 2 egg yolks, 3 tbsp. enriched flour, 1/2 c. sugar and 1/4 tsp. salt. Gradually stir in 4 c. heated milk. Cook and stir in a double boiler until the mixture coats the spoon. Add 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Cover, refrigerate.

Just before serving, thin-slice 4 ripe bananas into a chilled serving bowl. Stir in the custard. Fold in the 2 egg whites whipped stiff and combine with one-half cup whipped cream.

**Trick of the Chef**

To add the touch de luxe to banana float, spoon 3/4 c. apricot-apple puree into the serving bowl, then top with the custard.

Do you like cucumbers? Try soaking cucumber slices in sour cream. It gives them a delightful flavour.

**How One City Handled Teenage Gang Rule**

In the spring of 1945, the upper West side of Manhattan was terrorized by gang warfare. Armed teen-agers battled fiercely with each other, stoned mothers with small children, shattered windows in public busses, and pommelled innocent youngsters. This was New York at it's toughest and roughest . . . because of teen-age vandalism.

According to the Public Affairs feature in September Ladies' Home Journal, things were so bad that the Mayor's Committee for Unity challenged City College to do something about it. The world's biggest city college surely had a responsibility in its own neighborhood, at least.

City College answered by organizing a Community Service Division. They recruited a volunteer corps of 30 coaches and recreation teachers. City college students became social workers and psychologists. At a series of meetings the youngsters were invited to form teams for basketball, softball and other sports. After a suspicious beginning, the idea took hold and soon rival gangs were playing together at Jasper Oval and trying out for leagues and tournaments in the Park Department's city-wide athletic program. The September Ladies' Home Journal points out that this program can be used in any community where teen-age activities result in destruction or terror. It's a common sense approach to a nationwide problem and it has been completely successful because it directs pent-up energy into useful channels.

## Youngster Surprises In Golf Tournaments

A young local resident, Dave Pemberton-Smith, is rapidly disproving the theory that years and years of tournament play are needed before one is ready to hold his own in the nerve-straining game of tournament golf.

This young lad, only 17 years old, entered two competitions last week which experts said could only be won by battle-hardened veterans, the Canadian Junior championships and the Canadian Amateur Open tourney.

They were the biggest tournaments he had entered in four years of golf, practically all of it spent on the rolling course of Montreal Hampstead under the tutelage of Buddy Clarke, club pro.

When he finished the junior competition tied for second place with Ted Homeniuk, the Saskatchewan youngster everyone raved about, the home folks thought Dave had arrived. But the competitor himself, though he had played as well as he had expected, was only mad because he had not held a two stroke lead over the field which he enjoyed as late as the 33rd hole.

#### Bogies Costly

Double bogies on both the 34th and 36th cost Dave his chance for the title, as he shot a 74-80 for a 154 total, two strokes behind winner Gordon MacKenzie of Vancouver.

Most of the juniors, just as a matter of form, entered the Canadian Open being held at Kanawaki immediately after, but none of them were considered as real serious threats to the more experienced veterans.

Pemberton-Smith won his first match by default, then walloped Bob Grey of Prince Edward Island 5 and 4 in the second round.

His third round pitted him against Phil Farley of Toronto, one of the outstanding amateur players in Casada and a former winner of both the Ontario and Quebec Opens. Farley had just finished tuning up for the Open by playing on the victorious Ontario Willing-

don Cup Team, and was now ready to advance in this play.

The match started out as expected, with Farley winning the first two holes. Westmount's pride fought back, though, to even the match and then go one up at the 7th. He was two down again at the 12th, but won both the 13th and 14th holes to tie the match.

#### Missed Putt

The two halved each hole until the 18th where Pemberton-Smith missed a putt that gave Farley the match 1 up.

It was a great exhibition of golf by one of the youngest players in the tourney.

Dave really started to find himself this year in tournament golf when he won the Provincial Junior title. He himself thinks this was a harder feat than the Canadian junior, for it was all at match play, and there was always a good chance of elimination against a hot golfer. In the Dominion Junior, it was possible to recover from a bad round.

He was born in Montreal and attended St. Leo's for elementary and high school. He is presently preparing for a return to Loyola, where he is entering second year college.

#### Engineering Career

Dave plans to become an engineer, but naturally will continue with his golf, or as much as he can get in without interfering with business or school.

Right now he will devote the rest of the season to a few small local tournaments, and practice up some of the shots that double-crossed him this year. One thing is definite, if he continues to improve the way he has, he will be a definite threat in next year's big competitions, with a good chance of winning the coveted junior crown.

The post is a newly-created one, and he will assume duties formerly handled by ailing President Jack Latter.
