## Boy Scout Drive Over Top Here

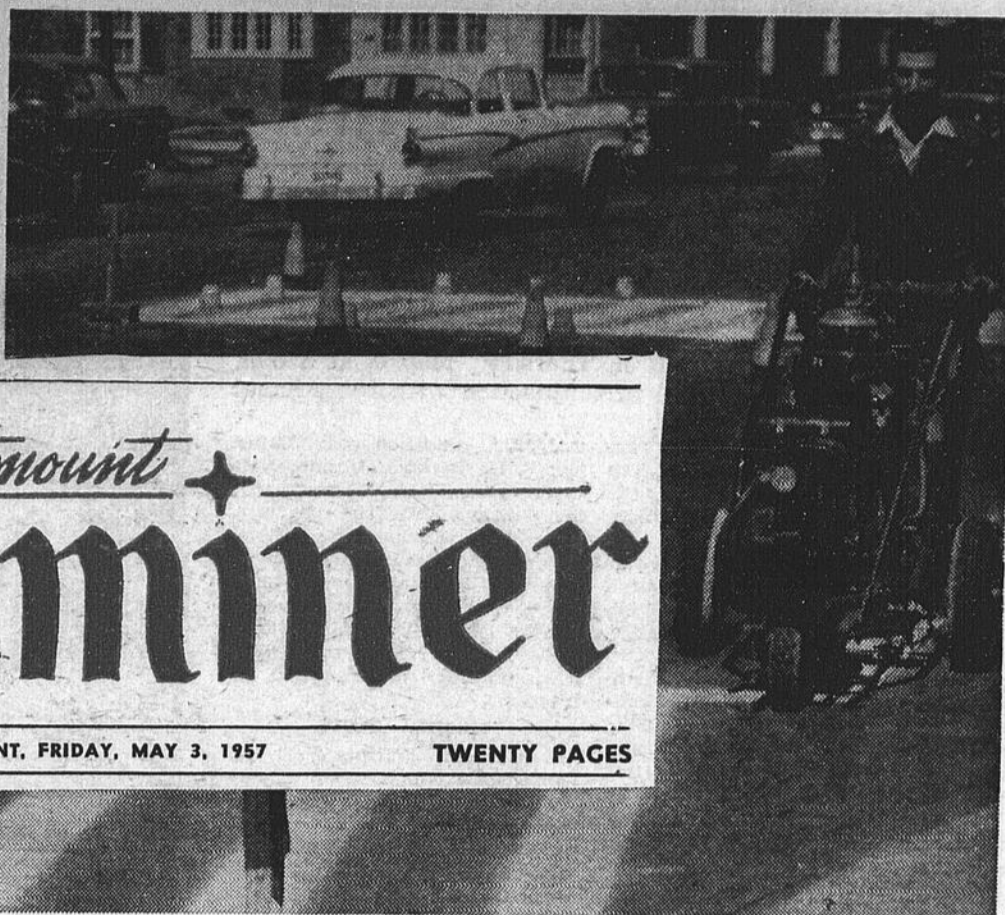
Collections in the Boy Scouts Association's financial campaign which was conducted in February are now over \$126,000, according to a statement made at a recent meeting of the Association's executive committee. The actual figure is \$126,408.87 on April 24 which compares with \$117,044.41 to the end of September, 1956, the Association's year-end. The objective in both years was the same, namely \$150,000.

Very gratifying were the results of most of the districts, nine of fourteen residential and ten of fourteen commercial districts having done better to date than they had done by the end of September last year.

In Westmount District the collections to date totalled \$4,805.95 which compares with \$4,532.55 to the end of last September.

In the absence of R. C. Stevenson, O.B.E., general chairman of

## Rotarians Visit Sub-Arctic

"Sky Watch on 55" — colorful film of the Mid-Canada Warning Line — opened 3,000 miles of Canadian sub-Arctic

to this week's meeting of Westmount Rotary Club.

The film, depicting men and machines in a series of intri-

cate detection stations along the 55th Parallel, was produced by Trans-Canada Telephone System, consisting of the country's seven major telephone companies.

"Sky Watch on 55" pictured men and supplies pouring in from the south, the erection and placement of towers, air strips, administration buildings, warehouses, living quarters. The vital line in the defence of Canada pushes through forests, muskeg and lakes — through the land of the Indian, Eskimo, missionary and Mountie — to link up the furthest reaches of the continent.

Depicting both the technical side of the microwave setup and the problems encountered in moving a jungle of machinery before the spring breakup, the film clearly showed that the northern skies are no longer unknown. The way of life of the man who answered the challenge to build the Mid-Canada Warning Line was shown as strictly a life for rugged individuals.

Past president J. G. Lawson, who procured the documentary, was thanked by Bill Wray. Chairman at the session was club president William G. Moxley. J. L. Sladen welcomed visiting Rotarians.

## Naval Units Will Mark Atlantic Battles Sunday

The Royal Canadian Navy in the local area will observe 'Battle of the Atlantic Sunday' by parading to church in the forenoon on Sunday next.

The Protestant Church service will be held in Westmount Park Emmanuel Church, Lansdowne and Western avenues, and the Roman Catholic service at the Church of the Ascension, Sherbrooke street and Clarke avenue. Both services are at 11 a.m.

At conclusion of the services the church parties will march independently to Westmount school grounds on Western avenue, just west of Melville where they will form up for a march past. The salute will be taken at the Westmount War Memorial by Commodore Paul Earl, CBE., C.D., RCN(R), senior Naval Officer, Montreal area.

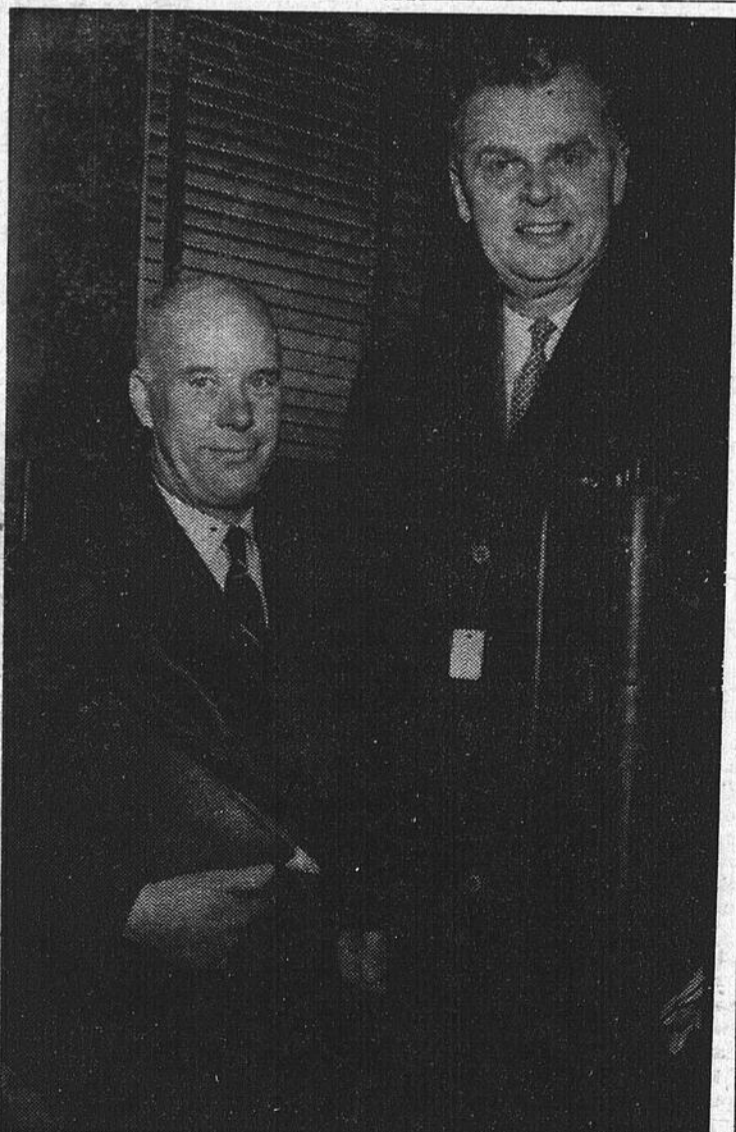
Battle of Britain Sunday commemorates the service of the Royal Canadian Navy and Canada's Merchant Navy in the Second World War.

The observance this year falls 15 years almost to the day when Nazi U-Boats first pressed the sea war up the St. Lawrence and Canadian sailors fought and died within sight of the shores of their homeland.

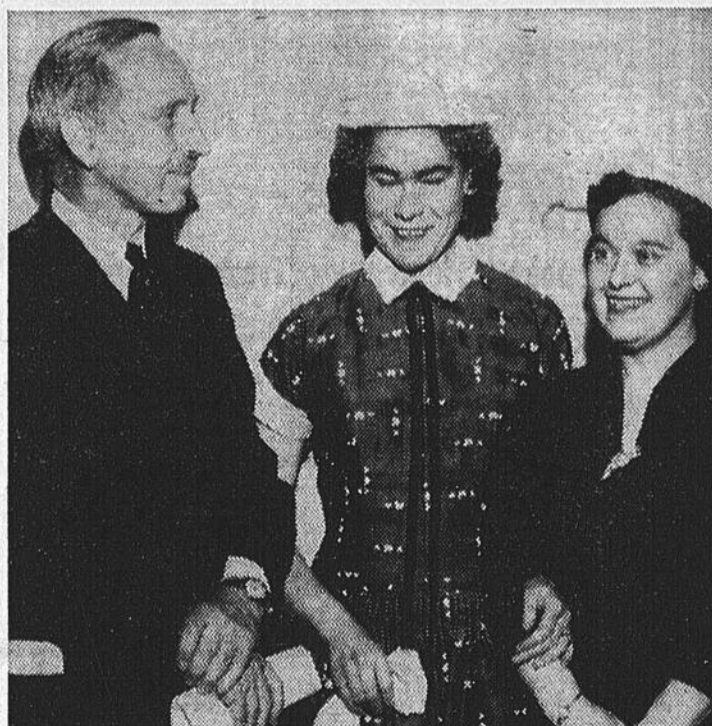
The first attack occurred on the night of May 11-12, 1942, off Cap des Rosiers off the Gaspé

Coast. The British Freighter Nicoya and the Dutch freighter Leto were sunk. The survivors, wounded, shocked and coated with oil, landed on the hitherto peaceful shores of the St. Lawrence. Later the same summer an enemy torpedo shook the surrounding district when it ran

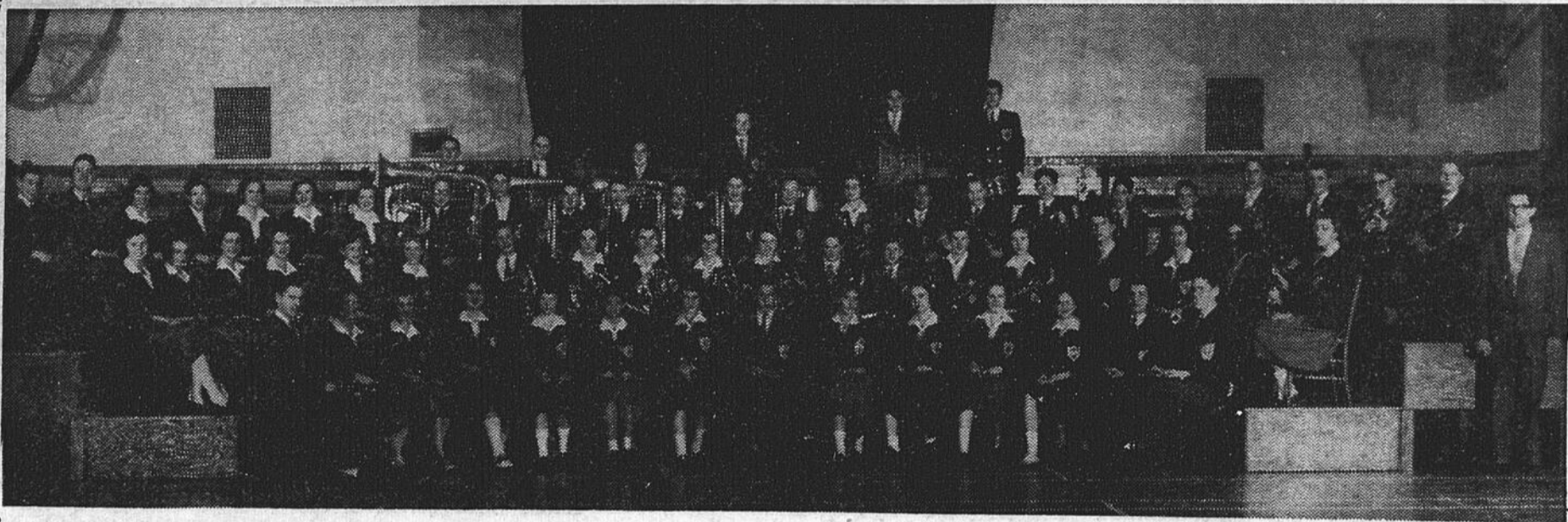

## High School Band Of 40 Plans Ambitious Program

Westmount High Schools Band is composed of 40 instrumentalists from the Senior and Junior High Schools. During the three years of Junior high, those pupils electing to take and who are chosen for the Instrumental Music course study their musical instrument as part of the school curriculum. In each of the three grades, there is a class of thirty-five players, with an instrumentation similar to that of a complete band, learning to play an instrument by class instruction method. Only the best players in the school have the opportunity to perform at school concerts as members of the Junior High School Band.

In the Senior High School, all instruction is presently done extra-curricularly, with the instrumentalists of that school rehearsing only one noon hour per week. The best instrumentalists of both schools form the Westmount High Schools Band, which performs two regular public concerts during the year, travels out of town and visits other schools to perform, and who will be heard at the Westmount Municipal Association meeting. The students who formed the first instrumental class five years ago graduate from high school this year, and will be making their final appearances with the band on this current programme and at the May Melodies of 1957 to be held in the Gymnasium of the Junior High School on Academy Rd., on the evening of May 15.

The band's director, Morley Calvert is a graduate of McGill University in Music, in Education, and also holds the LRSM diploma from the Royal Schools, London, in pianoforte, and an A. Mus. diploma from McGill as a trumpet player. He has been instrumental instructor in the Westmount Schools for seven years, and was asked to start the present instrumental course there five years ago. Mr. Calvert's other musical activities include Director of Bands at McGill University, a post he has held since his own college days, and Solo-Cornet player with the Montreal Citadel Band, Salvation Army. He has also led various city choirs, and has directed and taught at summer music camps in Quebec, Ontario and New York. He has appeared as guest conductor, soloist, and clinician in several centres in this country and across the border, and has adjudicated at the United Church

Junior Choir Festival and the Westmount Hobby Show. He also finds time to write and arrange music for his bands, and has had several compositions and arrangements published and recorded.

Their program Tuesday night at Victoria Hall includes: Washington Post March (John Philip Sousa); Ode for Trumpet (Alfred Reed) soloist: David Binmore; A Walking Tune (Clare Grundman); Sandpaper Ballet (Leroy Anderson) soloist: Margaret Boake; Pavane (Maurice Ravel); and River Jordan (Maurice Whitney).

## Bicycles Are Vehicles

Should Be Handled as Such and  
 Riders Should Observe Laws

Inconsiderate young people on bicycles are fast becoming a major problem in the West End.

They appear to be ignorant of even the most elementary safety and traffic regulations.

They ride in shoals the wrong way, on one way streets, swerve in front of automobiles, and even tear along the sidewalks.

Police have had to warn teenagers for riding misdemeanors and during the past few weeks a number of infants and elderly persons have been knocked down and injured by cyclists.

The bicycle is defined in the dictionary as "a vehicle propelled by the feet of the rider."

"Vehicle" is the operative word. As a vehicle it comes under the motor vehicles act and is subject to the same traffic code as an automobile.

It is an admirable mode of conveyance, safe, silent and ideally suited for young people.

It can, however, be driven dangerously and recklessly and thus become a hazard to the life and limb of the rider and to the person it strikes.

All that is required is elementary courtesy and common sense, and it is the duty of parents to impress this upon their children.

If they are not taught now, what will

they be like when they graduate to automobiles?

In some cities of the United States bicycle licenses are not issued until the rider has passed a test in traffic regulations, hand signals and road courtesy.

We are not advocating increased regulations, but perhaps one of our admirable service clubs might sponsor lessons in road behavior.

## A Community Registered

Enumerators Do Good Job of  
 Listing for Elections

This community, like all others right across the country, went through the experience last week of having its collective self registered for voting purposes.

Not everyone was registered, of course. To do a perfect job would have required much longer than the five days allowed by law. But election officials believe that a very high percentage of those qualified were duly entered on the lists. The odd residence was missed, and there were citizens here and there who weren't home when the enumerators made their visits. But all things considered the enumerators did a good job. Complaints have been few.

For those who were missed, offices will be opened later where they can have their names added to the lists. The enumeration just concluded compiled the "preliminary" lists. The official lists, to be used in the polls on election day, will be those prepared by the revising officers after they have made the additions, corrections and deletions on the preliminaries.

The procedure in having your name added is quite simple. You appear before the revising officer for your locality and identify yourself. Names of these officers and the addresses at which they will sit will be widely publicized — by poster, in the press, on the lists shortly to be mailed to electors throughout the riding, and by information supplied by the committee rooms of the political parties.

For the benefit of those who believe the enumerators are bound by law to register every qualified voter, no matter how many return visits they might have to make, it should be pointed out that the onus to have his name included rests finally with the elector. It is up to him to give the enumerators every co-operation possible. And if he is missed by them, it is up to him to visit a revising officer.

# Local Potters Puttering Successfully Work In Fine Arts Exhibit Will Prove

The West End may be going to pot.

Members of the local Potters' Club and other local sculptors are well represented in the 1957 Canadian Ceramics exhibition which will be held at the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts May 11 to 28.

ning sculpture, a stoneware cookie jar with incised decoration and a green earthenware bowl by Virginia McClure are included in the show.

Among other local residents who have displays in the show is Hilda Bolte, a member of the Potters' Club who is represented by a portrait head called Claude in terra cotta and a terra cotta racoon. M. Caya, another member of the Potters' Club, has a grey-green earthenware covered jar in the exhibition.

Elizabeth and Charles Delafield, 65 Holton, have a work of enamel on copper called The Family in the show. Margaret Friend, 4595 Ridgevale avenue, a member of the Potters' Club is represented in the exhibition by a green earthenware jug set with six beakers and an earthenware candlestick with joined figures in an underglaze design.

A Hampstead husband and wife, Eileen and J. J. Harold, 5613 Queen Mary road, have nine displays in the show. Mrs. Harold is represented by two stoneware plates, a stoneware bowl and bottle vase, and an earthenware bowl. Mr. Harold's displays are a stoneware bowl and bottle vase, a branch vase, and a turquoise and

brown stoneware vase and budvase.

Grace Pickering, 4859 Westmore, has two earthenware bowls, one green and one blue, in the exhibition. Jadwiga Ramza, 639 Cote St. Luc, is represented by a blue and white earthenware plate and a green and white earthenware bottle. Eileen Reed, 574 Cote St. Antoine, has a vase, a brown jug, and a turquoise and brown casserole in the show. These three exhibitors also are members of the Potters' Club.

## Sound Film Sunday At Calvary Church

"ON THIS ROCK" is a story of the United Church at work on the frontier — on the border between Quebec and Labrador in the centre of the tremendous new iron-ore development. The specific location is Knob Lake, at the end of steel, 350 miles north of Seven Islands, the north shore terminus on the Gulf of St. Lawrence. It is a story with the slow rhythm of an experience in introspection. A pit foreman reveals many of the things that he experienced mentally and emotionally as some servants of the church came into contact with him. Through these musings of Pete Stallings we discovered the significance of the church in the frontier area.

In the opening scenes you see something of the country, and a montage of the complete mine operation from blasting to ore train on its way to the St. Lawrence.

The music was specially written for the film. The instrumentalists were members of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. The recording was done in the Berkeley Studio.

Although the central figure — the pit foreman — is the professional actor, the three churchmen in the story are the three actual people who took part in this portion of church history that we report. This is important in a documentary.

The following comment has been received from one of our ministers in the area who formerly worked with the National Film Board.

"It was a pleasure to find none of the factual errors which often mar a film for people who know its background and setting. The deliberate pace and emotional context were in marked contrast to the brassy news-reel type of film previously done on Iron Ore operations."

### Old And New Bills And Coins Displayed At Redpath Museum

West End residents with a hope of making a fortune from old bills or coins in their possession will be making their way to McGill's Redpath Museum, where an exhibition of currency is in progress.

The currency on display includes the bills of several continents and the question posed by the exhibition is "How do you think the current Canadian dollar measures up?"

The problem isn't one for the foreign exchange expert, who can but quote the latest rates, but for the Museum visitor who wants his eyes opened to bank note design as a branch of the engraving art, officials point out.

The exhibit offers a colorful array of bank notes from different parts of the Commonwealth, and foreign lands, including a French colonial bill and the Israeli pound, considered among the most attractive. The puzzling question is how the Canadian dollar can be considered to rate. The Museum, in providing ballots, isn't at all sure how the public will react.

The display is on loan from the collection of H. D. Allen, a Montreal numismatist, and has been arranged to mark National Coin Week, May 6 to 12. Coin Week is observed annually under the sponsorship of the American Numismatic Association, a fraternal organization of over 11,000 collectors and students of coins, tokens, medals and monetary notes.

A feature designed to attract younger visitors to the Museum will be a grab bag, from which each will be invited to draw a souvenir coin from an interesting foreign assortment. This feature will be available to children under 12 who come accompanied by an adult during National Coin Week. The Museum reports that a great number of current exhibits in history and nature study also should prove of benefit to such an age group.

Included in the paper money display are sections dealing with historic scenes of bank notes, famous people on bills and notes honouring important industries. Included in the last category are a group of early Canadian bills, pointing up the significance of lumbering, fishing and farming at the turn of the century.

Redpath Museum is open to the public, free of charge, daily except Sunday, from 9 to 5.

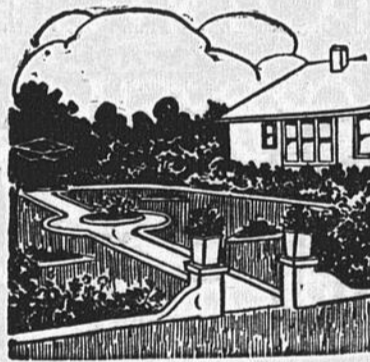

## Small, Slender Woman In Pink Silk Sari Speaks Of Spiritual Atom To Baha'i Here

"We are just like different colored flowers in a garden where you find unity in diversity," Mme. Meherangiz Munsiff remarked.

A member of the Baha'i World Faith, born in India, and now residing in Washington, D.C., where her husband is posted as Second Secretary in the Embassy of India, Mrs. Munsiff visited Montreal this week. She spoke on "The Spiritual Atom" at a public meeting sponsored by the Westmount and Verdun Baha'is, appeared on radio and television, and attended several receptions and press conferences during her three day visit.

Mme. Munsiff is a small, slender, dark-haired woman who wore a pink silk sari Tuesday afternoon when I talked to her and Mrs. H. Raginsky of Westmount and Dorothy Walsh of Verdun about their international religion.

There are Baha'i centers in Verdun and Westmount where believers gather for a holy day every 19 days. Baha'is all over the world, in 4,000 centers, meet for prayer, meditation and organization of their activities at this time. Some of their activities involve teaching free of charge practical subjects such as French and public speaking. Last year the Westmount group gave free French classes to local residents. "We had more applicants than we could register," Mrs. Raginsky recalled. A member of the Verdun group gives a public speaking course at the YMCA and another member gives a class in dressmaking. Baha'is are also available for free talks to other organizations.

The Verdun Baha'is meet at 4631 Wellington for a study class every Friday evening. They have recently finished discuss-

ing a book on the faith entitled Baha'u'llah and the New Era. Study classes for Westmount Baha'is are held every Sunday evening at 1548 Pine avenue west, a home donated to the faith by Mary Maxwell, a sister of the famous Canadian architect Maxwell-Sutherland. Anywhere from 15 to 50 people attend these weekly meetings which are open to the public.

### PRAY FOR PEACE

Although teaching activities are an essential part of the Baha'is religion, their primary mission is to spread the faith which they believe will promote world order and lasting peace. Modern communications have brought the world closer together, but "we are not closer in our hearts," Mme. Munsiff mentioned as she explained her religious belief. "Prophets of all religions predicted the coming of One to unite the world," she said. A Baha'i, meaning follower of the Glory of God, believes that Baha'u'llah, founder of the Baha'i World Faith, is that chosen one.

Baha'is believe that their faith is a progression of other religions of the world. They view founders of other religions such as Moses, Jesus Christ and Mohammed, as divine revelators who preached the manifestations of an infinite God according to their own age. In the present age, they believe, Baha'u'llah is the divine revelator who has shown the way to worldly harmony

## Self Defence Course Is Arranged By 'Y'

A course in self defence is being planned by the Westmount Y.M.C.A., which will commence on May 8th at 8:00 p.m. Here's something for everyone from sixteen to sixty! Just as everybody should know how to swim so, everybody should learn the art of self defence.

The course is for men, women, young and old. Strength or size is not a factor in learning self defence, as students are shown how to anticipate and be ready to avoid a hold before it is put on. No mats are needed as the students are not required to wrestle or roll on the ground. No special clothes are needed for this work, just the same equipment for light exercises such as volleyball or badminton . . . sport shorts or slacks, shirt and gym shoes.

Ten lessons of two hours each will be given by Peter Neufeld, a specialist in self defence and hand to hand combat. Mr. Neufeld is holder of 2nd degree Black Belt in Judo and is at present the judo instructor of the Westmount Y.M.C.A. Included in the classes will be exercises to increase reflexes and develop speed and precision. Methods of breaking attack holds, defence against arm holds, neck holds, fists, weapons such as sticks, bottles, knives or daggers, even the technique of defence against savage dogs will be taught.

Pointers will be given on how to avoid an attack, psychology of hand to hand combat, sensitive areas of the human body, the laws of leverage, and knowledge of the muscular structure for self defence.

Registrations are now being taken by Lew Waller at the Westmount "Y" for the series of lessons. Classes will be limited to 30 people, 15 men and 15 girls or women as it is found that best results are obtained with a group of this size.

through one common faith and one order.

### PRINCIPLES

The one common faith includes such principles of Baha'u'llah as the following: Men must seek for truth in spite of custom, prejudice and tradition; men and women must have equal opportunities, rights and privileges; the nations must choose an international language to be used along with the mother tongue; all children must receive a basic education; men must recognize that religion should go hand-in-hand with science; and men must work to abolish extreme wealth and extreme poverty.

The pattern of world order Baha'u'llah outlined would begin with a House of Justice elected by each community. Each nation would also have a House of Justice whose members would elect an international House of Justice which would make the laws for a federalized world.

### LITTLE RITUAL

One aspect of the Baha'i World Faith is its lack of priests and ritual. There are, however, special prayers for marriage and death. Another aspect is its unwillingness to solicit public funds. It was through voluntary private contributions that the Baha'i World Faith built their four million dollar House of Worship near Chicago, Illinois. At present the faith has a library in Geneva, Switzerland, and a temple and international council at Haifa, Israel.

In explaining the message of her religion, Mme. Munsiff called it a "spiritual atom which the prophets have developed for us to use as a control for the atomic age the scientists have developed."

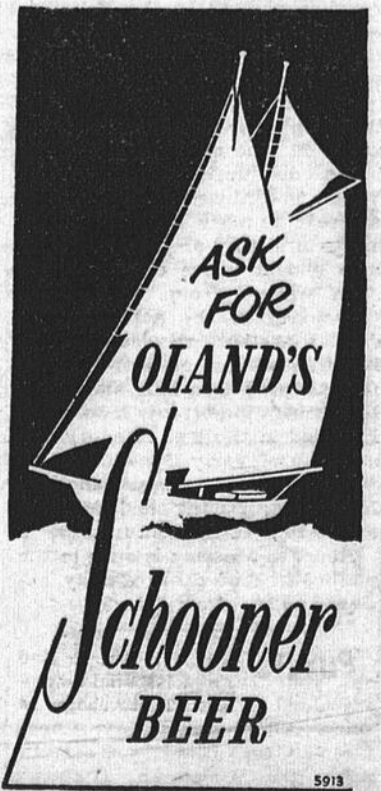

## The Unity Of The Faith

Last week we emphasized the Oneness of God. There can be only one God. It cannot be said that a plurality of gods is unthinkable, because many clever people have believed in many gods; but it is true that when one really tries to think of the nature of God one is forced to see that there can be only one Divine Power. Yet that Power whom we call God has made Himself known in Three Persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. He made Himself known to the Patriarchs and the Prophets of the Old Testament as God pure and simple; He led His disciples in the Gospel story to confess Him as the Christ, the Son of God; He came to the disciples and infused the Church as the Holy Spirit; and yet the result was that they saw more clearly than ever that there is but One God. A mystery beyond our un-

derstanding! Yes, but so is man a mystery beyond our understanding. Actually, if we could understand the nature of the Godhead, we should be as gods ourselves, and our religion would not be worth while.

When we think of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, we think of the particular work of each Person, Creation, Redemption, Sanctification; then we

realize that though the Father is Creator, yet the Son is the Agent through whom the Creation was effected: "Through Him were all things made; without Him was not anything made that was made." When we think of Redemption we realize that it is the work of the Son: He is our Redeemer; and then we are aware that "God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself." And when we think of the Holy Spirit we realize that God has given the Holy Spirit to interpret Christ to the world and yet that it is the Spirit who "searcheth all things, yea, the deep things of God." There is unity of action in Father, Son and Holy Spirit: there is personality but not individualism.

We find the Trinity in action in the Gospel story and also in the Story of the Church; and also in our own lives. We do not have one faith for Christmas and another for Easter, and yet another for Pentecost. We do not believe in one way — or in one kind of God — in times of prosperity, and in another in adversity. In our health and strength we believe in God the Father who made me, in God the Son who redeemed me; and in God the Holy Ghost, who from day to day enables me to grow in holiness. But so we believe in days of weakness and sickness; and yes, and in the days of the loss of our loved ones. We believe in ages; in Jesus Christ the same God, unchangeable through the yesterday, today and forever; and in the Holy Spirit of God creation, and who from day to who brooded over the waters of day guides us into all the truth.

McWhinnie, Mrs. C. Whitman, Mrs. W. Williams; Trustees (four years), Messrs. E. Daniel and J. Forsythe.

Rev. E. J. Bailey expressed his appreciation of the warm welcome extended by the membership to him and his family and the pleasure they had enjoyed since the commencement of his new pastorate at Westmount Baptist Church last Fall. He commented on the maturity of leadership he had found in the Church and indicated his confidence in the future progress of the Church.
