REFUSE TO PUBLISH CONTENTS OF DREW LETTER

Would Violate Secrecy Claims Prime Minister

Mackenzie King Changes Earlier Intention to Permit Publication of Letter in Which Ontario Conservative Leader Criticized Report of Hong Kong Inquiry—Claims Confidential Information Involved.

Ottawa, July 16.—(P)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King last night withheld from disclosure in the House of Commons a thirty-two-page letter from Lt.-Col. George A. Drew, criticizing the Hong Kong Commission report.

He told the House:

"That it was a violation of the undertaking to keep secret certain information obtained from the British Government.

"That it contained imputations upon the integrity and judgment of Chief Justice Sir Lyman Duff who sat as Royal Commissioner conducting the Hong Kong inquiry.

The decision provoked strong criticism from Conservative House Leader Hanson and some opposition from M. J. Coldwell, C.C.F. House Leader, and John Blackmore, leader of the New Democracy.

Col. Drew, who was one of the counsel to the Commission which investigated dispatch of some two thousand Canadians to Hong Kong last fall, sent a copy of his letter to all these party leaders.

(In Toronto, Col. Drew issued a statement last night in comment on the action of the Prime Minister.

Col. Drew's statement said: "It would be a fraud upon the people of Canada, who have paid for this inquiry and for whose benefit it was held, if they were denied the facts on the wholly unsupported and utterly unfounded statement that disclosure of the truth would help the enemy.")

Mr. King made his announcement after reading a legal opinion obtained from George A. Campbell, K.C., of Montreal, who was senior counsel to the Commission.

Mr. Campbell referred to the confidential information received by the Commission for disclosure only to the Commissioner and Commission Counsel.

The legal opinion said: Col. Drew's letter "purports to give the effect of" a number of these confidential communications.

"Any disclosure, therefore, even to the House of Commons, would, in my opinion, be a violation of the substance of that condition."

In view of that opinion Mr. King said: "I hope my Honorable Friend will not expect me to table the communication because I should feel that it would not be proper for me to do so in my position as Prime Minister."

The Prime Minister also refused the request of Mr. Hanson to remove censorship requests against publication of the letter before its tabling in the House.

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RECORD-MAKING TAX PROPOSALS BEFORE HOUSE

United States Congress to Hold Three-Day Debate on Measure Providing \$6,143,900,000 Revenues.

Washington, July 16.—(P)—The largest tax bill in the history of the United States—a \$6,143,900,000 wartime measure carrying heavy new income and corporation levies—went before the House of Representatives today for general debate.

As the Representatives gathered, an attempt was being made to get support for returning the bill to the Ways and Means Committee for revision of proposed new corporation rates.

The procedure arranged by the Rules Committee calls for three days of general debate on the bill and then a vote Monday without consideration of any changes in the Committee's work.

Thus, there will be automatic "yes" or "no" vote on approving the committee's decision to impose individual taxes beginning at nine percent of the first \$1 of taxable income and at forty-five percent on the first taxable profits of corporations.

Mr. Douglas, Member of Parliament for Weyburn, said that according to law, the coming year should be an election year in Saskatchewan.

He charged the Provincial Government had no mandate to administer the affairs of the Province beyond this year. "We are justified in demanding that they go to the country."

Earlier, the delegates were told that the C.C.F. planned to nominate a candidate in each of the forty-nine Provincial constituencies for the next election.

HEAVY JUMP IN DEATH RATE IN OCCUPIED AREA

Infant Mortality Mounts Sharply as Result of Near-Famine Condition in Many Parts of Europe.

London, July 16.—(P)—A forty-per-cent rise in infant mortality over normal in Nazi-occupied Europe was reported today by the British Famine Relief Committee, a fact-finding organization of churchmen.

Here is a country-by-country resume of its reports.

Belgium: "A special survey with respect to children attending school indicates that 63 per cent get no or scarcely any breakfast, 33.5 per cent get an inadequate noon meal and 56 per cent get insufficient supper."

It put the general death rate for adults and children so far this year at 21.5 per 1,000—compared with a normal 13—and added: "There is abundant reason to believe that the health of several generations may be irretrievably impaired."

France: The committee quoted a Quaker report describing children with "distended stomachs and thin spindly legs" and said the mortality rate in Unoccupied France has risen forty-five per cent. It cited the report of a French physician that the mortality of children up to nine years old in Nazi-occupied Paris has increased by 25 per cent.

Poland: Instead of a daily 2,400 calories necessary to maintain a healthy existence, food rations allowed to Poles provides them with no more than 680 calories and allowances for Jews yielded only 400. Citizens bread as a typical example of food discrimination, the committee report said Germans get a weekly allowance of 4 1-2 pounds, Poles 1-4 and Jews 1.

Finland: In Karelia, "70 per cent of the children under seven are dying of starvation." Its authority was John P. Thelen of the American Red Cross.

The Netherlands: The committee said 20 to 25 per cent of the children living in towns are undernourished and the adult population is near starvation.

Greece: Quoting what it called first-hand reports, the committee said:

"From August until the end of March 320,000 deaths were registered in Greece, exceeding over five times the normal death rate and being higher among infants."

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Roosevelt Studies Wage Control Plan To Maintain Price Ceiling

Washington, July 16.—(P)—Threatened with a partial collapse of the price control system in the United States, the Administration was reported today to be preparing a request for new legislation built around some form of wage stabilization.

President Roosevelt has discussed the situation with Congressional leaders several times in recent weeks. Informed Congressmen who declined quotation by name said the President is about ready to make known the remedial steps he and price control officials believe should be taken.

As a result, Congressmen who expect a recess of several weeks starting in about ten days are being told quietly they might have to revise their plans.

COMPROMISE IN STEEL DISPUTE

Washington, July 16.—(P)—The

United States War Labor Board is expected to announce today a wage increase of forty-four cents a day in "little steel," the most significant wage decision it has been called on to make so far.

The Congress of Industrial Organizations United Steelworkers, headed by Philip Murray, made a five-month fight for an increase of \$1 a day over the present basic common labor wage of \$5.80 for 157,000 workers of Bethlehem, Republic, and Inland Steel, and Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company. Employer and public members approved the forty-four cents, out-voting the four labor members who stood fast for a larger sum, authoritative sources who refused quotation by name said last night.

The Labor Board decision was said to give the union a maintenance of membership clause, the company check-off of union dues, and the minimum daily wage guarantee.

More Highway Robbery Cases

London, July 16.—(P)—Disclosure that highway robbery cases are on the increase in London brought a suggestion today that the crime be made punishable by death before a firing squad, but the Government refused to be alarmed by the situation.

Herbert Morrison, Home Secretary and Minister of Home Security, told the House of Commons that during the first six months of 1942 there were eighty-five cases of robbery or assault with intent to rob as compared with seventy-five for the corresponding period in 1941.

He said, however, that the police "are satisfied there is no ground for apprehension that there is a growing menace."

"My own opinion," he said, "is that the figures are a remarkable tribute to the character of the people of London in all circumstances of black-out and wartime conditions."

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WAR BULLETINS

Moscow—Red navy fliers attached to the Baltic fleet have destroyed three Axis gunboats, a patrol boat and an armed transport and damaged eight patrol boats, two gunboats and a torpedo boat, the Moscow radio announced today.

The operations, bringing concentrations of Axis naval vessels under bombing and machine-gunning attacks, were said to have been carried out "in the last few days."

London—German occupation authorities no longer issue visas permitting travellers to leave Poland, the Polish Telegraph Agency reports. The Agency quoted a report in the Swedish newspaper Aftonbladet which described how the Swedish manager of the Erickson factories in Poland was arrested by the Nazis shortly after he left Berlin for Stockholm on his holidays.

Chungking—The Chinese high command announced today re-occupation of Tsingtien in Chekiang Province Sunday, with five to six hundred Japanese killed or wounded and the remainder fleeing toward Wenchow, twenty-five miles to the Southeast.

(The Japanese took the port of Wenchow Saturday.)

A Chinese communique also said a Chinese force "penetrated into the Japanese barracks at Sinyang," an invasion base in Southern Honan province, and killed or wounded many Japanese soldiers and slaughtered one hundred horses.

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ESCAPEE FROM HONG KONG AT OTTAWA HOME

Sub-Lt. Ben Proulx Arrives in Capital from Captured City in Chinese Air Force Uniform.

Ottawa, July 16.—(P)—Sub-Lt. Ben Proulx of Ottawa, who escaped from Hong Kong several months ago, arrived in Ottawa last night in the uniform of a member of the Chinese air force.

Formerly representative in the Far East of a United States motion picture firm, Proulx was an officer of the Hong Kong unit of the Royal Naval Reserve.

For reasons of military secrecy, he could not say how he had outwitted the Japanese and escaped from Hong Kong after the British colony fell last December 25.

His first request on reaching Ottawa was: "Where can I get a milk shake?"

Sub-Lt. Proulx had acquired the Chinese air force uniform from friends in the course of his travels through Asia. He arrived in the United States this week after a 43-day sea voyage during which he touched India.

His wife, daughter of a British Government official, and two small sons, Michael and Roger, still are in a Japanese internment camp in Hong Kong.

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Two Nazi Footholds On Outskirts Of Caucasus Gained In Tough Fight

Russians Announce Withdrawals from Boguchar, Just Outside Northern Caucasian Territory, and Millerovo, Just Inside, Following Bitter Engagement—Soviets Gain on Voronezh Sector.

A German foothold some twenty miles inside the Northern Caucasus and another on the Northernmost rim were announced today by the Russians while the sanguinary struggle for Voronezh on the North flank of the enemy's menacing bulge along the Don river attained a new degree of ferocity.

In the Battle of Egypt, the Western world's other active war theatre, Axis troops had forced some rectification of their position before El Alamein, "partially" re-establishing themselves on a coastal height, the Hill of Jesus, as British headquarters reported it.

Since launching their latest effort in Russia June 28, the Germans have won effective control of an additional 25,000 square miles of Russian territory although not all Russian forces therein have been mopped up.

Pressing behind two spearheads Eastward from this bulge, the Germans threatened to crash on through to the Stalingrad elbow of the Volga river, less than two hundred miles away, effectively splitting the Caucasus and easing the way for direct penetrations of the oil-bearing region farther South.

These were the implications of the Russian communique announcing loss of Boguchar, just outside the Northern Caucasian Territory and Millerovo, seventy-five miles farther South and inside the territory, on the direct line of rail communications between Moscow and Rostov.

The North Caucasus is one of Russia's principal agricultural regions.

British quarters said today a German light infantry regiment flown to North Africa from the Greek island of Crete had been incorporated in the forces of Field Marshal Rommel before El Alamein, thus combining previous reports to this effect.

Rommel's qualified success at the Hill of Jesus—Tel el Eisa—on Tuesday night may have reflected this new strength. Hardly Australian troops, however, continued to hold elevated positions in the desert sector but were under steady pressure.

Evidently to relieve them, other forces pushed forward yesterday in the Central sector of the bottleneck front between the coast and the Qattara depression some thirty miles inland.

Even as the Rommel forces had won their Hill of Jesus positions, land and aerial bombardment continued and a number of Axis tanks were knocked out, Cairo headquarters announced.

Allied airmen are smashing day and night at Rommel's airfields, front line positions, and supply bases far to the rear. Targets last night included Bengasi and Tobruk.

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Vichy Government Protests U.S. Assistance To Fighting French

Vichy, July 16.—(P)—The Vichy Government protested today to Washington against assignment of military representatives to Gen. Charles de Gaulle, declaring this "constitutes an attack on the sovereignty of France."

An authorized source declared it was "inadmissible" that the United States Government, "which is maintaining normal relations with the French Government, also maintain relations with a rebel force."

(The United States State Department announced July 9 that Admiral Harold Stark and Brig. Gen. Charles Bolts had been assigned to consult in London with the National Committee of the Fighting French headed by Gen. de Gaulle "on all matters relating to the conduct of the war.")

The announcement and an accompanying memorandum stressed that the purpose was to strengthen military aid to the Fighting French, and did not refer to the controversy over diplomatic recognition, which the United States has not given the de Gaulle organization.)

The protest was announced pending publication of the French stand concerning French warships interned at Alexandria. The latter was understood to reject all proposals to

move the ships elsewhere than to French territory, on the grounds that to do so would not conform with French-German armistice terms.

The State Department announced in Washington two days ago that Vichy had already rejected two proposals by President Roosevelt for removal of the nine demilitarized French naval vessels from the Egyptian war zone through the Suez Canal under American custody to some American or neutral port for internment until after the war, when they would be returned to France.

When this plan was rejected, he suggested that the ships be sent under United States protective custody to Martinique French West Indian island, for demobilization.)

Vichy was warned that rejection would justify Britain ordering the ships moved or destroying them if removal orders were not heeded.

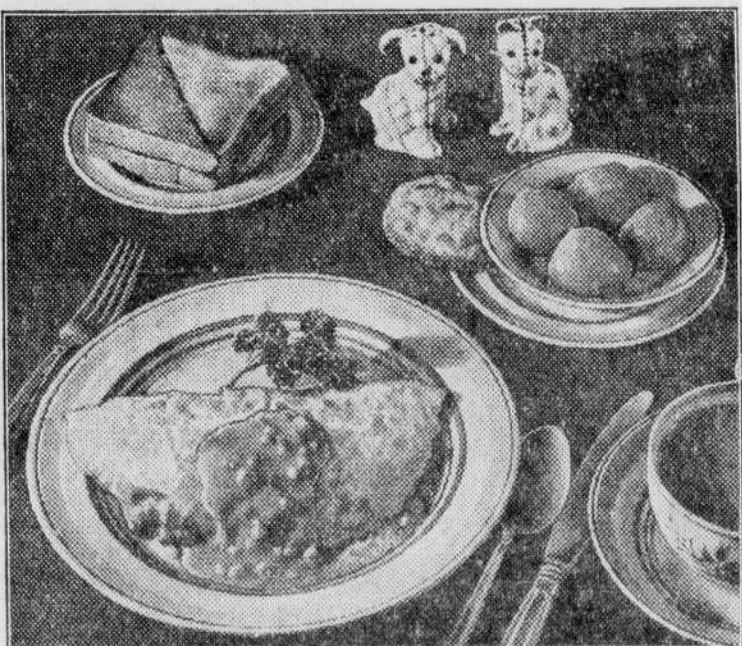

AVIATOR PLAYS BALL TO STAY IN AIR RANKS

Johnny Berardino Needs Money from Baseball to Take Course as Army Air Corps Instructor.

By BURTON BENJAMIN, NEA Service Staff Correspondent. New York, July 16.—Washed out of the Army Air Corps after completing four months and 26 days of training, Johnny Berardino is back with the St. Louis Browns—so that he can keep on flying.

He wants to earn enough money to pay for a Civilian Pilot Training course which will give him an instructor's rating and an entree to the Ferry Command.

"If I had the dough," says the former Southern California athlete, "I wouldn't have come back at all. But I need 80 hours of solo and the

school charges twenty bucks an hour. That's \$1,600. So I'm playing baseball to keep flying."

When the Browns are at home, Berardino, 25, plans to commute between a flying school and Sportsman's Park. He is determined to have his hours in by the end of the season.

"I'm not the only ball player who's flying," he points out. "Joe Gordon of the Yankees tells me he has 90 hours in the air. He may be working for the same thing."

Berardino has a compunction about his Army failure. It was not a case of fear or lack of intelligence but simply an inability to fly the Army way.

"They called it 'insufficient progress,'" he explains, with unashamed candor. "That covers a lot of ground. I guess I just reached a certain stage of development and stayed there."

"They check you every 25 hours. If you're not moving right along—goodbye. They may have lowered the entrance requirements but they certainly haven't lowered the graduation standards."

The young infielder, who hit .271 for the Browns last season and socked across a commendable 89 runs, volunteered for flying service before Pearl Harbor. He was not threatened by the draft at the time. The flying bug bit him—and in he went.

He kissed the wife goodbye in January and reported to the Chandler, Ariz., Air Corps Replacement Center. Five weeks of drill and military courtesies, and he was off for Cal-Aero Flying Academy at Ontario, Calif. He accumulated 80 solo hours before washing out in his upper basic training.

Berardino was at shortstop for the Browns last year, but the fine play of rookie Yogi Berra probably will make him a second baseman again this season. He played this position in the minors and alternated there his first two years with the Browns.

Is he in shape? "Physically, I'm in great shape. My batting eye is dull, and my legs are a little below baseball standards. I didn't play any ball in the Air Corps, but I'll be ready in a couple of weeks."

To reverse the usual question: How does it feel to be out of the Army? "I hated to wash out. The life was great, and I'm crazy about flying."

"There's an old Army saying that you've got to be able to fly by the

BIG RESPONSE TO APPEAL FOR AFRICAN ARMY

Polish Soldiers and Belgian Airmen Take Their Training Alongside South African Forces.

Cape Town, July 16.—Men of South Africa flocked to the recruiting stations following the Union's losses in the North African campaign. Recent enlistments were the highest since Japan entered the war.

Prime Minister Jan C. Smuts made an appeal to racegoers for more recruits to "avenge Tobruk" at the last wartime running of the July Handicap. He asked the people of the Union to join now in the greatest race of all, the stakes of which were the future of South Africa and the future of man.

Responding to the Prime Minister's appeal, many businessmen throughout the country have given their staffs permission to enlist, and many other firms have closed down altogether in order to release employees.

Thousands of Polish soldiers who were formerly prisoners of Russia have been released by the Soviet, and have proceeded to South Africa where they are now training at Maritzburg under the command of Colonel Alexander Idzik.

Belgian air cadets, in training with South African fliers, will receive their wings on July 17 from Mrs. Jan C. Smuts, wife of the Prime Minister. This will be the first time in the Union's military history for a woman.

The South African Red Cross has

issued an urgent appeal for \$100,000 (\$4,470,000) to supplement the rationing of supplies of the war from the Union. Arrangements are being completed with the war supplies directorate to purchase and dispatch adequate supplies of foodstuffs to the German and Italian fronts.

Approximately 100 Vidy-French supporters are to be interested here following complaints made to Minister of Justice Lawrence regarding their expression of pro-Union anti-Allied sentiment.

Re-allocation of seats in the House of Assembly for the various provinces has been made by the Delimitation Commission. The Transvaal gains four seats to have a representation of 64 members; Orange Free State loses one to be left with 14; the Cape of Good Hope was reduced from 59 to 56; and Natal remained unchanged with 16.

The Government has decided to introduce legislation enabling soldiers in the Union as well as beyond it to vote for party rather than candidate.

Basic mileage for gasoline rationing will be reduced from 400 to 300 miles a month beginning August 1.

Trial by speed court of three men charged with the homicide and dynamiting outrages resulted in the death sentence for John David Laid Vase and Hendrik Steyn van der Merwe. The third accused was discharged.

London, July 16.—(P)—Drop around to a tiny two-room Longacre Street office and you'll meet the men who publish a newspaper that tries to avoid profits, rejects hosts of would-be subscribers and boasts a "million dollar staff" which costs it nothing.

(Canadian servicemen overseas read The Canadian Press News, a four-page weekly tabloid which publishes Canadian news and is distributed free. Prepared by The Canadian Press, which makes no charge for its news, the publication is financed by the Canadian Government.)

Publishers of "The Stars and Stripes" have one big aim—to produce a thoroughly American newspaper that United States troops in Great Britain will want and need. And they are achieving it with what they call that "million dollar staff"—the United States news agencies, the soldiers themselves, the entire corps of American correspondents in London.

The original "Stars and Stripes" was born in Paris in 1918 because a few soldiers convinced General Pershing and the War Department that the American Expeditionary Force needed its own newspaper. It was profitable and poured 3,500,000 francs into the United States Treasury.

The new "Stars and Stripes" is following the same path. Within a few weeks after the second AEF began pouring into the British Isles, an enlisted men's staff was being assembled with the help of two officers borrowed from the Army Press Relations Office.

The War Department provided \$4,000 for purchases of newsprint all the financial help necessary because the five-cent-a-copy price makes the venture self-supporting. From the start it has given the troops news from home that appears in no British newspapers.

Here is some of what a soldier's five cents bought in a typical recent issue:

A special Associated Press cable from Washington on the progress of legislation to increase allowances for service men's dependents, a second Associated Press special cable gave a column-long review of the major-league races, a third outlined the United States price control programme.

American correspondents in London contributed concise interpretive accounts of significant war and international developments with emphasis on the American point of view.

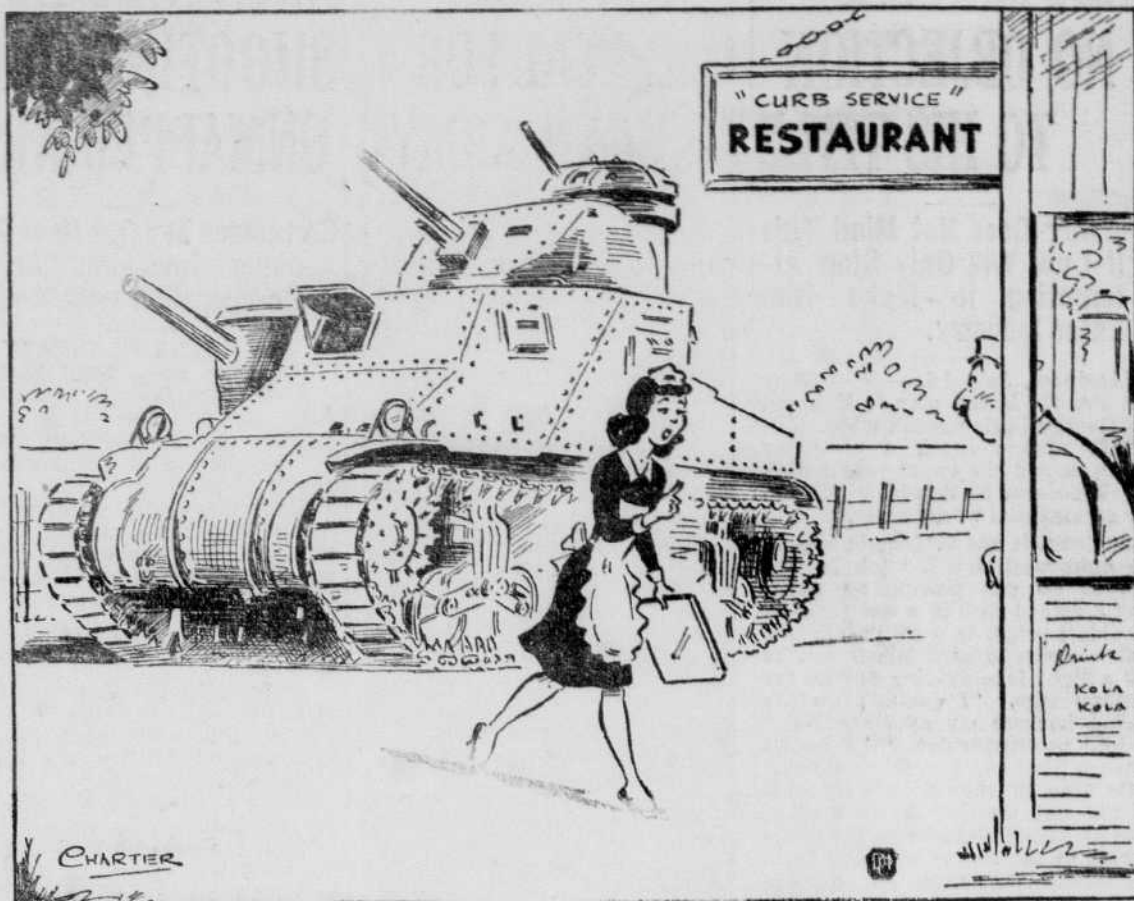
There were two pages of sports news, the Army life panel "Strictly Private," a couple of comic strips, a column of poetry from soldiers' pens. The entire back page was devoted to pictures (this particular issue had a "scoop" of which the staff was especially proud—an AP radiophoto from Washington showing President Roosevelt registering for selective service).

There was and is much news of the troops themselves. The "Stars and Stripes" gave the troops their first published word that they could draw their pay every two weeks and were permitted to visit London on leave.

"IRISH" AMERICA

ROMAN FRIEZE TO UNIVERSITY FROM PRAIRIES

University of Alberta Enriched by Presentation of Antique from Estate of Prairie Farmer.

Edmonton, July 16.—(P)—An authentic, 2,000-year-old Roman frieze was discovered recently among a collection of antiques on the estate of a prairie farmer and was presented to the University of Alberta by Dr. Erich Mueller, professor of German.

The frieze is probably the only specimen of Roman art of this type in Canada. The farmer acquired it years ago in Italy and brought it home as a souvenir. It is presumed to have been excavated from the buried city of Pompeii, destroyed by the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 A.D.

An expert of the Chicago Art Institute examined the three pieces which make up the frieze and declared it to be genuine Roman art. The figures represent a two-horse chariot team in full gallop with the charioteer leaning well over the front of his chariot holding the reins in his left hand and flogging the horses with his right.

The piece is about eleven inches square and one inch thick at the lowest points. The whole design is in bas-relief which at the highest point stands about three-quarters of an inch from the base. Along the top is a moulding which suggests that this was a section of a continuous border running around the wall of a room, just below the ceiling.

The frieze is made of terra-cotta

and is covered by a white, claylike substance, the result of the action of water on the ashes of the volcano lava. The material is well preserved except where at high points in the relief, the outer layer has been chipped off.

The whole thing evidently was fastened to the wall by means of two large-headed nails, one of which is imbedded in the material exactly along the line where the upper right-hand corner of the frieze was broken off.

MERIT TO FIX PROMOTION IN NEW DIVISION

Seniority Abolished to Give Troops of Armored Units Best Possible Leadership.

My FRANK FLAHERTY, (Canadian Press Staff Writer)

An Eastern Canada Army Camp, July 16.—(P)—Special tests for candidates from the ranks and for promotion in the commissioned ranks have been introduced in the 4th (Armored) Division, commanded by Maj.-Gen. F. F. Worthington.

"Seniority in this division is abolished," said the general in an interview.

Promotion is by merit. If he wants a lieutenant-colonel and doesn't find the man he wants among the majors, he looks around among the captains and finds him.

When a soldier is recommended for commissioned rank the unit commander making the recommendation must express a willingness to accept the man as a commissioned officer in his unit, if the man makes the grade. That, said the general, ensures responsible recommendations.

When the recommendation comes to headquarters the soldier is transferred to another unit and set to work there so that an independent report on him is obtained from the commanding officer of the second unit. If that report is favorable the man then gets a chance at the officers' training course.

He has thus demonstrated his fitness in two different units.

In order to test officers' qualifications for promotion they are also required to work with new men. An officer is given a group of men from a unit other than his own, men whom he does not know and asked to prepare an exercise for the men and get them to execute it.

If he succeeds he has shown ability to plan, in preparing the exercise; to teach, in instructing the men in what is required of them; and to command in directing the execution of the plan.

The way a commissioned rank has been opened to the soldier in the medical corps who cannot become officers in their own unit because they are not medical doctors. When a man in a medical unit looks good he is taken out of the unit and given

CAREER BEGAN
IN THIS AREA

Daniel Willard Who Rose to Be Chairman of the Board of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, Was Fireman and Later Engineer Between Newport and Sherbrooke.

While there may be few people now living throughout the Eastern Townships who will recall Mr. Daniel Willard, for many years one of the most prominent railway executives in the United States and Chairman of the Board of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, his passing recently in Baltimore, Maryland, at the age of eighty-two years, may be of local interest. There is every reason to be proud of the fact that such an honorable and outstanding career should have had its beginning and should have been so closely associated with this section and particularly on the route South of Sherbrooke to Newport, Vermont.

Mr. Willard, during the early eighties, handled trains as fireman and later as engineer between Newport and Sherbrooke on the old Connecticut and Passumpsic Rivers Railroad, the line being later taken over by the Boston and Maine Railroad and is now under lease to the Quebec Central Railway Company.

He was born on a farm near North Hartland, Vermont, in 1861. A railway now known as the Central Vermont Railway ran through his father's farm and Willard as a boy watching the trains as they travelled to and fro was fired with the ambition to become a railroader. After a country school education and still in his teens he carried out his boyhood dream and entered the employment of the local railway as section laborer, and it having come to his knowledge that the Connecticut and Passumpsic Rivers Railroad operating up the Connecticut River valley from White River Junction through to Sherbrooke was looking for men, he engaged with that line at Lyndonville, Vermont, as a laborer, transferring to the engine service as fireman being later promoted to engineer.

Mr. Willard was a great student and made an intensive study of railway operation in all its branches and there being a great impetus in railway expansion in the middle Western United States in the late eighties he took employment on one of the newly-constructed lines with the hope of bettering his position, gradually rising through sheer merit to various positions of responsibility, terminating with the Presidency of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad which he held for over thirty years. He was a man with a wonderful

LAZY MAN HAS
NO OBJECTION
TO HIS TITLE

Britisher Does Not Mind Title if Law Will Only Stop Attempting to Make Him Enter Industry.

Liverpool, July 16. — (C) — They call him the laziest man in England but George Imrie doesn't mind. He's almost always tired, a condition which earned him twenty-eight days in jail because he refused a job under an essential works order.

In Court it was said Imrie was fit for light work and the job he was told to do was picking up paper with a spiked stick in a war factory. He didn't refuse to work in jail (the sentence was to hard labor) but he had a light job—folding canvas for mailbags. "I couldn't do the sewing because my eyes are bad," he told newspapermen. "We hadn't to work hard and I could sit down."

On May 19 when he was sentenced for not working Imrie was so tired he had to sit twice on the stairs to rest in the course of going from the dock to the nearby jail. He was tired twenty-eight days later when the warden in Walton jail awakened him at 6.30 a.m. to discharge him and an hour later he was even more tired when he walked slowly into the Discharged Prisoners Aid Society hut opposite the jail gates and sat down.

"I've been out of work so long I've lost the habit," said Imrie. "I get tired and dizzy so quickly. I don't mind being called the laziest man in Britain. People can say what they like so long as they leave me alone."

ADOPTING U.S.
GYM APPARATUS

New Training Device Dubbed "Monkey-Bars" by Hard Muscled Soldiers of Fourth Division.

An Eastern Canada Army Camp, July 16. — (C) — Outside the officers' mess of the 4th (Armored) Division stands a skeleton-like structure about 15 feet high and 30 feet long, the result of an idea borrowed from the United States Army. From time to time soldiers, ranging in rank from private to major-general, can be seen climbing over it for a quick workout.

The structure is officially called a "training ladder" but Maj.-Gen. F. F. Worthington, the divisional commander calls it the "rack" and many of the soldiers call it the "monkey bars."

It consists of horizontal bars about three feet apart. At the starting end of the ladder they are set in upright posts. Then they are set across the top on a slight slope and at the other end at a steep slope to the ground.

A full set of exercises on the ladder takes half an hour, in which time a man passes over the ladder six times, following a different routine each time, sometimes crawling around alternate bars, sometimes swinging from one to another of the top bars, sometimes walking across them.

The ladder is believed to be just the thing to keep the busy headquarters staff man who hasn't time for games or drill, in condition.

Capt. J. M. Savage of Montreal, saw the ladder at Fort Knox, Tex., when he was taking a course with the United States army and had his own version built when he came back.

The army carpenter made it out of odd pieces of pipe and plank with out a cent of cost.

Plans are on foot for the erection of a ladder for each unit in the division so that every man in the division will have the apparatus for a quick workout handy to his quarters.

ARTILLERY NOW
SHOOTING OVER
UNMAPPED AREA

Canadians Try Out New Technique Involving Artillery Co-operation with Aircraft.

(Canadian Press Staff Writer)

An Eastern Canada Army Camp, July 16. — (C) — New techniques in artillery shooting are being tried out by the gunners of a Canadian armored division.

While they cannot be described in detail for military reasons the first tests in actual operations with the guns have been considered so encouraging that further work is to be carried on.

One of the new techniques is an application of principles applied for some years by the Dominion Geological Survey. It is designed to make possible reasonably accurate firing in unmapped country and involves co-operation of aircraft.

Using it an artillery officer can lay his guns on an unseen target without the aid of a map and place his shot close enough to the target to enable him to correct with the assistance of aerial observation.

Brig. E. L. M. Burns who, in his days at the national defence headquarters, did a lot of original work on mapping worked out the new system and recently watched its first test by gunners of a battery from Calgary.

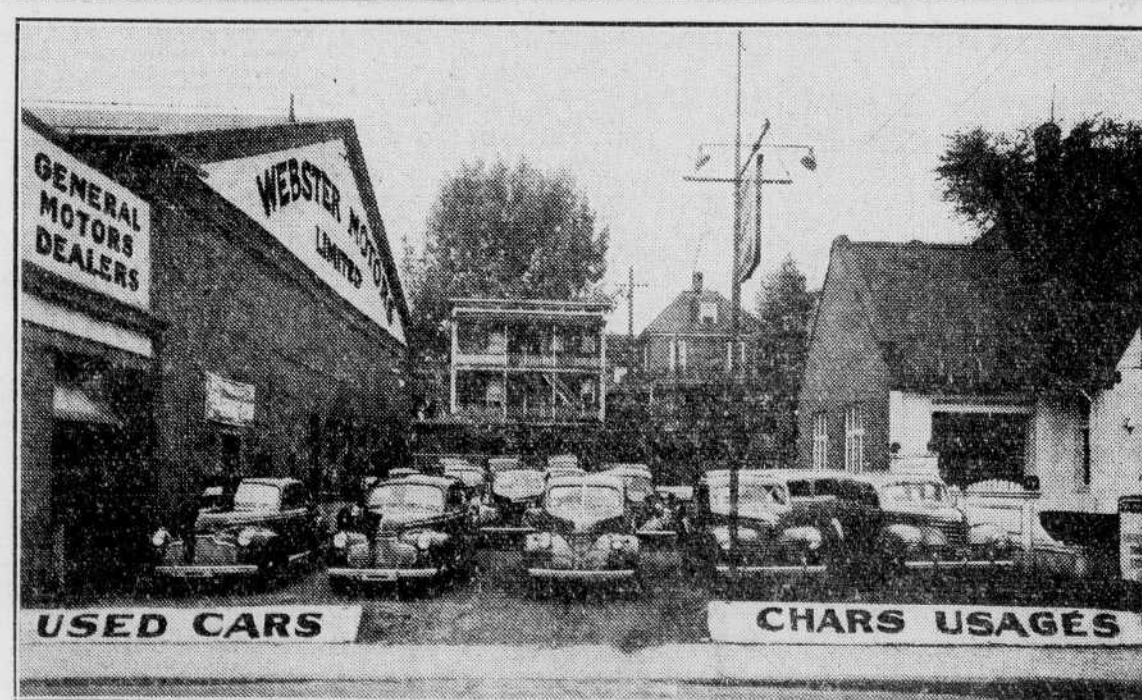

WHIRLAWAY BECOMES GREATEST WINNER

Breaks Track Records In Massachusetts Race

Trainer Points Horse to \$500,000 Winning Mark as Victory at Suffolk Downs Brings Earnings to \$454,366 or \$16,636 More Than Income of Seabiscuit.

Boston, July 16.—(AP)—A stretch-running flash of lightning known as Whirlaway today loomed as the first half-million-dollar winning prospect in the history of the turf.

Fresh from his record-smashing triumph yesterday in the Massachusetts \$50,000-added Handicap, Whirlaway was pointed today by his trainer, Ben Jones, for the \$25,000 added Arlington Handicap at Chicago's Arlington Park on August 1.

The smashing victory that Whirlaway, owned by Warren Wright, scored in the Suffolk Downs feature boosted the horse's winnings to \$454,366—or \$16,636 more than the previous top earnings mark, amassed by Seabiscuit.

Whirlaway broke well and then gave his supporters, who had backed him down to even money, a taste of the jitters by trailing the field by a good ten lengths for at least half the journey.

Then Woolf gave him the nod and he showed why he rates among the all-time greats. With one burst he jumped up to fourth place and in another moment he was out in front.

He roared down the stretch like a runaway locomotive and flashed across the wire in 1:48 1/5 to crack the track record for the mile and one-eighth distance, previously held by War Relic, by two-fifths of a second.

Whirlaway paid \$4, \$3 and \$2.20. Rounders \$6.60 and \$3.80, and Mrs. Parker Corning's Attention, which finished third, \$3.40.

Wide Variety of Entertainment Provided in Shows Presented by United States Army and Navy Units.

New York, July 16.—Army has its hands in a lot of miscellany these days. Irving Berlin's "This Is the Army" is a current Broadway smash. Khaki athletes are giving service teams a just reminder of World War I. Football will accentuate that. But the Army show we like best is a tremendously thrilling extravaganza fittingly called the "Army War Show."

It's neither terpsichorean, thespian nor athletic. It's a show in a business the Army knows best—soldiering. It is outdrawing any type of service show ever conceived, will net Army Emergency Relief \$2,000,000 by the time it closes in November.

It started as a vague sort of travelling side show to display Army equipment. It has matured into a full-fledged fighting force of 1671 men with every arm represented except ski and paratroops. Its fine fighting men—those former crowd-chested clerks that Fascism snored at so derisively—play war with all of its stark realism.

War show is educational as well as profitable for the Army. It is taking the war to the people, showing them what the bonds are buying, illustrating how each arm operates, what a war of mobility means and the vital role modern equipment plays.

Its three-hour version lacks only blood and death.

Does the public like it? They love it. Spacious football stadia have been inadequate to hold audiences. More than 180,000 jam-packed Municipal Stadium in Baltimore in four nights and thousands were turned away each performance. Franklin Field, Philadelphia, held 360,000 in five nights with a 10,000 overflow each time. In Pittsburgh they mobbed huge Pitt Stadium.

Dimout regulations have kept the show out of New York, where it would even impress Brooklyn baseball fans, but a section of it may be included in conjunction with the annual benefit All-Star football game, Sept. 12.

It is essentially a night show, the dramatic effects of the lighting, the searing flame-throwers and the flash of big guns giving it a whole of a lot of impact.

Army War Show is a breathtaking three hours, replete with the cacophony of war—plus the powder, dust, grime and sweat that make the Army tick.

DIZZY DEAN VICTIM OF ALL-STAR GAME

Pittsburgh, July 16.—The All-Star Game usually has a victim. Dizzy Dean was a notable example. A liner off Earl Averill's bat struck the then Cardinal right-hander on the foot. He injured his arm favoring it, never was the same. This year's victim turned out to be Pete Reiser. He banged a bat against his right ankle and it puffed up so badly in Cincinnati that Brooklyn's young National League batting champion was forced to the sidelines.

Nearco, Only Horse to Have Private Air Raid Shelter, Changes Hands for \$275,000.

The famed racing silks of Lord Glanely, Welsh sportsman killed in a recent air raid, no more will be seen on British tracks. His horses in training, plus stallions and brood mares, which he left his nephew, George Gibson, are to be sold at public auction.

The animals include some of the finest bloodstock in Britain. Stallions are the St. Leger winners, Singapore and Chumlight, the 2,000 guinea winner, Colombo, and the Ascot gold cup champion, Tiberius. There's also Feberion, which ran third in this season's Oaks.

Austerity note: Goslings have replaced motor mowers at the Norwich Greyhound track for the duration. The mowers are precious gasoline while trimming the grass. The goslings trim the grass and satisfy their appetite in the same gulps.

Dodgers And Cubs Show Fresh Signs Of Hatred

Dodgers Won Bizarre Contest at Chicago by Ten to Five as Pitchers Exchange Beautiful Demonstration of Bean Balls.

Bad blood has been flowing between Brooklyn Dodgers and Chicago Cubs for two or more years in one of the most vicious feuds in baseball annals and the situation is getting more serious.

Yesterday the boys were so busy throwing bean balls at each other that the ball game got out of control and the Dodgers, operating in their element, captured a ten to five verdict from the confused Cubs, who made five errors and used five pitchers to give thirteen hits.

One version of the trouble between the clubs is that it started when Hugh Casey, of the Dodgers, threw at Pitcher Claude Passeau, of the Cubs a couple of years ago.

The contest was such a comedown that one Chicago paper said today the Dodgers could have won thirty to five if they had not chosen to

have more of their curious fun keeping the Cubs in a panic.

This encounter dwarfed all the other developments of the day in the major leagues, although Chet Laabs, of St. Louis Browns, currently on a batting spree, attracted attention to himself at Philadelphia by driving in five runs as the Browns beat the Athletics seven to four in a night game. He hit a homer, his thirteenth of the year, with the bases loaded in the second inning and then in the third frame drove a liner to the corner of center field in Shibe Park and was thrown out at the plate trying to get four bases on it.

New York Yankees extended their American League lead to 6½ games by scoring their second straight shut-out four to nothing against Cleveland Indians on the four-hit hurling of Atley Donald. Buddy Hassett made three hits and Joe DiMaggio stretched his modest hitting streak to twelve games.

Boston Red Sox split with Chicago White Sox. Tex Hughson beat unluckily Ed Smith in the opener ten to one for Smith's fifteenth setback. Then the Chisox took the nightcap eleven to six although Ted Williams hit his nineteenth homer.

Washington nosed out Detroit Tigers four to three in eleven innings in a night game when Jimmy Pofahl singled with two on for the winning marker.

Rip Sewell pitched six-hit ball and Vince DiMaggio hit a three-run double to spark Pittsburgh to a six to two triumph over New York Giants.

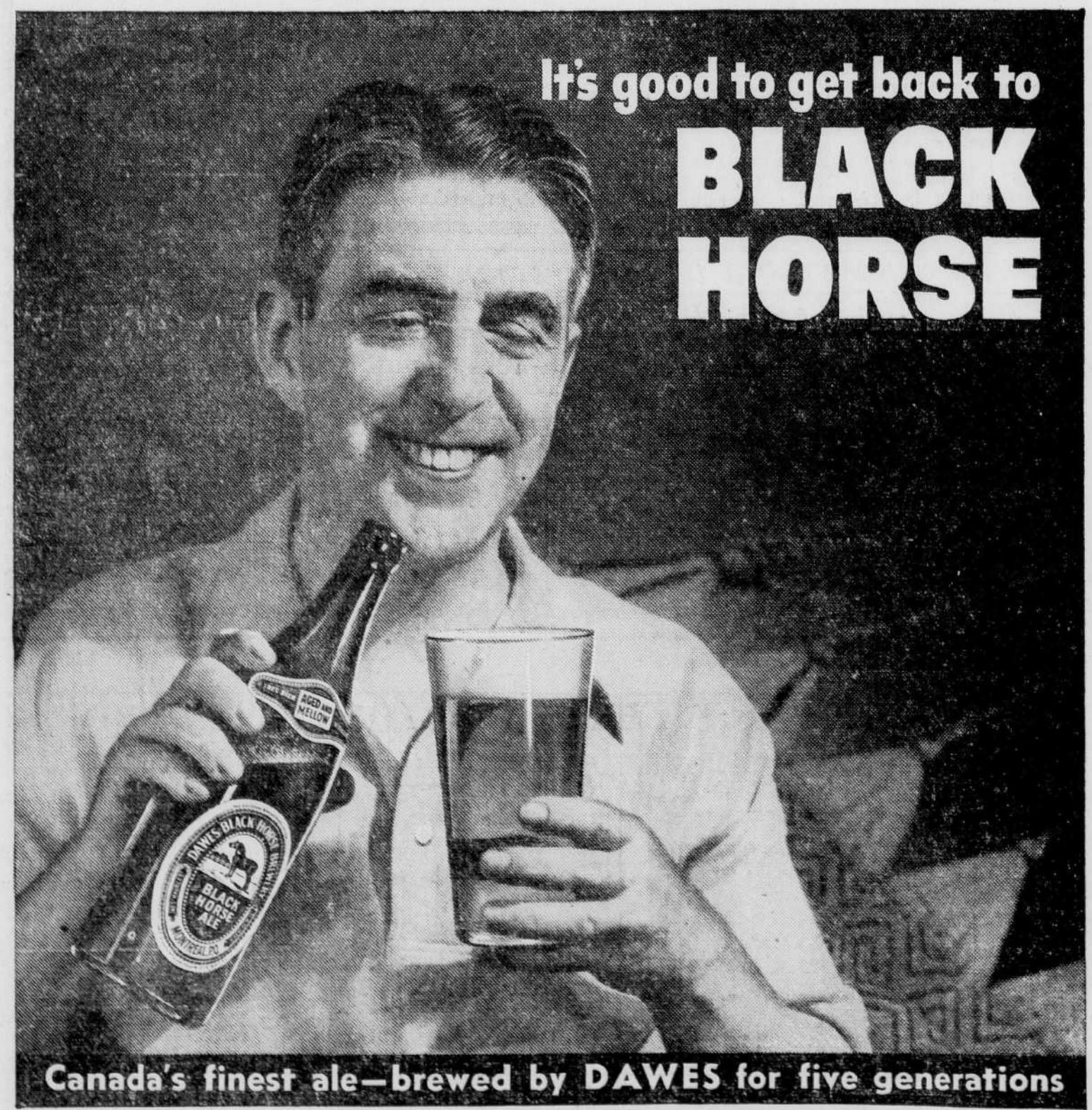

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CORRESPONDENT MAKES BID FOR GREATER UNITY

United States Writer Backs
British War Effort—Con-
demns Careless Thinking
and Selfishness in America.

New York, July 16.—(U.S.A.)—A red-headed young foreign correspondent who saw the fire of Nazi bombs forge a new British spirit has taken time off to tell America that we are going to lose the war "unless we clear out of our minds fundamental illusions which are minimizing our effort."

In an admitted "outburst of temper," James B. Reston says that America has underestimated the price it must pay for freedom. He aims his anger at careless thinking; bureaucratic officials; selfish "special groups"; irresponsible citizens; newspapers and politicians; people who want to "get back to normal"; people who think time and money are on our side; and people who are afraid to win because of post-war problems.

For most of four years in London, "Scotty" Reston was with The Associated Press. He joined the London staff of the New York Times in 1940—after seeing the worst of the "blitz"—was transferred to the Washington staff. In his early newspaper days he was noted as a "news-digger"; now the foreign correspondents rate him as one of the most penetrating reporters among them—a research expert

who can write fresh, clear copy.

This thirty-two-year-old American writer says the British have not done too little but have tried to do too much.

He criticizes the illusion that the United States, doing little for themselves and giving nothing in return and the charge that the British are keeping all their men and equipment at home and letting the Dominions do the fighting. He quotes a few facts to back his arguments.

In his first book, "Prelude to Victory," Reston writes a plea for national and international unity:

"The prelude to victory lies in our ability to remove those differences which divide us from each other and from our Allies and to concentrate on those great and fundamental things that unite us. We are united in our desire to win this war, in our love of true democracy, and in our desire to bring about a wise and lasting peace. We are divided by our personal selfishness, by our lack of faith, by our politics, by our bureaucratic inefficiency, by our fear of the future. Promote those things that unite us and you help win this great conflict, promote or even condone those things which divide us and you prolong the war and jeopardize our cause."

Reston cites chapter and verse for saying the U.S. Government "is the best democratic government in the world," but says the administration is hampered by these factors: (1) by a hangover from peace-time procedure and personnel; (2) by the fear of the revolutionary spirit of the world; and (3) by "departmentalism." "It is less efficient than it might be because it is administering the war instead of fighting the war."

Here are some of his complaints: "We have fallen for more non-sense about our unconquerable

strength and perpetual peace than any other great nation in the world; we have debunked everything from hard work to Christianity; we have been too slick, selfish and materialistic and we haven't got away with it."

"Our early failures in this war have been due mainly to faulty political thinking; we have not been outfought so much as we have been outthought. Our war effort is still being hampered by political thinking on military strategy, and we are still failing to take fully co-ordinated action with our Allies in the major theatres of the war."

"If we are not strong enough to win this war our enemies will certainly write a lasting peace. It may not be a wise peace, and it certainly will not be fair, but it will last."

"For the Germans and the Japanese and the Italians have this great advantage over us; they want to run the world and we don't."

Reston denies the idea that the occupied nations will rise in some mysterious mighty way. "It is the most dangerous kind of wishful thinking to believe that all nations will risk manslaughter for the kind of democracy they have had in recent years." Norway would—Norway had political and economic democracy. But France's democracy was irresponsible and selfish; the Burmese fled Rangoon at the first bomb; the people of India nursed their grievances against the British with the Japanese at their borders.

The inspiration for the Second French Revolution, says Reston, must come from the United States. The British have tried too often to solve the European problem and have failed. But the United States must sell itself to Europe. "Either you believe in liberty, justice and right, or you do not. If you do, then an appeal to the revolutionary spirit of the world will be heard, but if you do not, all the Atlantic charters in the world will not inspire the conquered nations to fight for principles which we proclaim but do not follow."

Time is not on our side because geography is against us. "There is only one way we can get time back on our side. And that is by concentrating now on the vital theatres of the war, by backing up the Russians directly with equipment, and by helping the British create a diversion by invasion in the West." . . . So long as we divert planes and tanks to minor theatres of war, time will never be on our side."

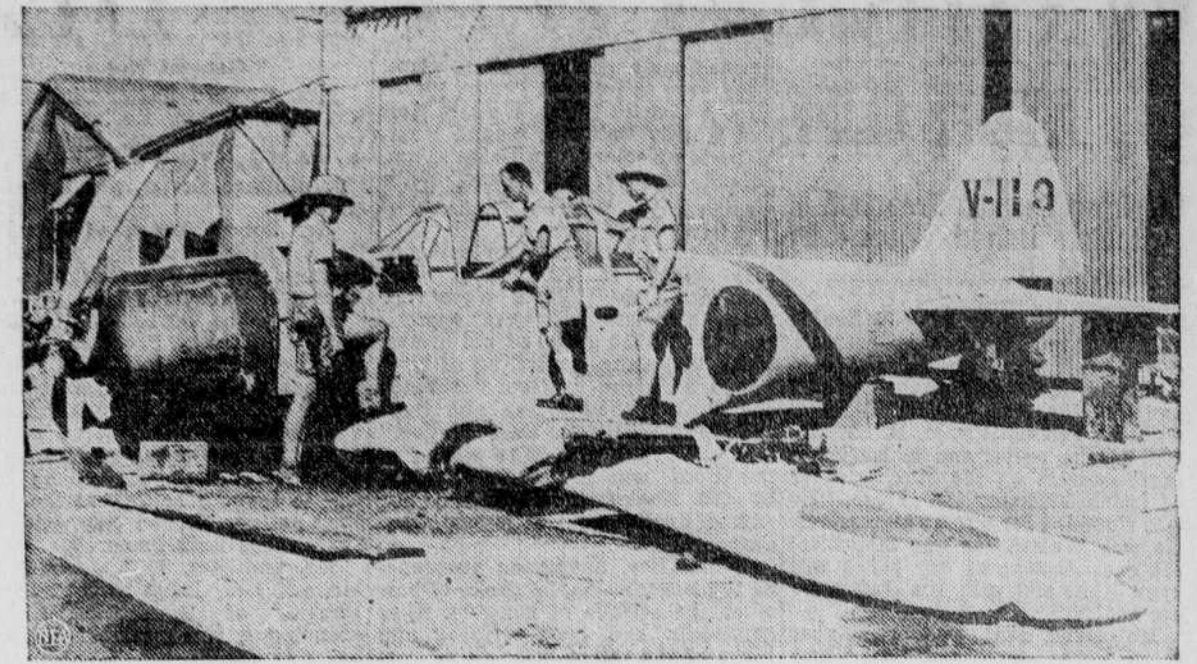

SONG SERVICE WAS HELD AT AYER'S CLIFF

Inspiring Sermon Preached in
Beulah United Church by
Rev. M. H. Sanderson.

Ayer's Cliff, July 16.—In Beulah United Church on Sunday evening, a very fine song service was held under the leadership of the organist and director, Mrs. Willard Rexford, with the Pastor, Rev. M. H. Sanderson, in the pulpit and delivering a short address on the 53rd Chapter of Isaiah, stressing the phrase, "He was wounded for our transgressions; He was bruised for our iniquities; the chastisement of our peace was upon Him; and with His stripes we are healed."

He asked that they remember these words, then no matter how difficult life may be, or how hard things are to face, when we remember that He died and suffered for us and was wounded for our transgressions, then we could be able to face

life in the most difficult places. He recited a poem in closing which was most suitable.

The impressive service opened with an organ prelude and the professional hymn followed, when the gowned male choir took its place. They were as follows: Tenor, Alfred Keeler, Charles Libby, William Moir and Murray Baldwin; second tenor, Winston Keeler, John Beamish and Leland Mosher; first bass, Willis Dustin, Fred Wyman, E. P. Lyon and A. F. Emberley.

The choir rendered two anthems, "He Plans It All" and "The Shepherd Care." These were very pretty numbers and were appreciated as was the group of old hymns, which they sang, consisting of "I've Found a Friend in Jesus," "Watch and Pray," "Sweet Bye and Bye" and "God Will Take Care of You." The old hymn "He Was Nailed to the Cross" was sung as a duet and by the Keeler brothers and Mr. Alfred Keeler sang a solo, "My Cathedral."

Before Rev. Sanderson pronounced the Benediction, he spoke of how much the service of song by these gentlemen had been enjoyed and spoke saying that the age of the choir members ranged from thirteen to over eighty, Mr. Libby being the oldest gentleman, and he expressed the hope of the entire large congregation that they would soon again arrange an evening for them.

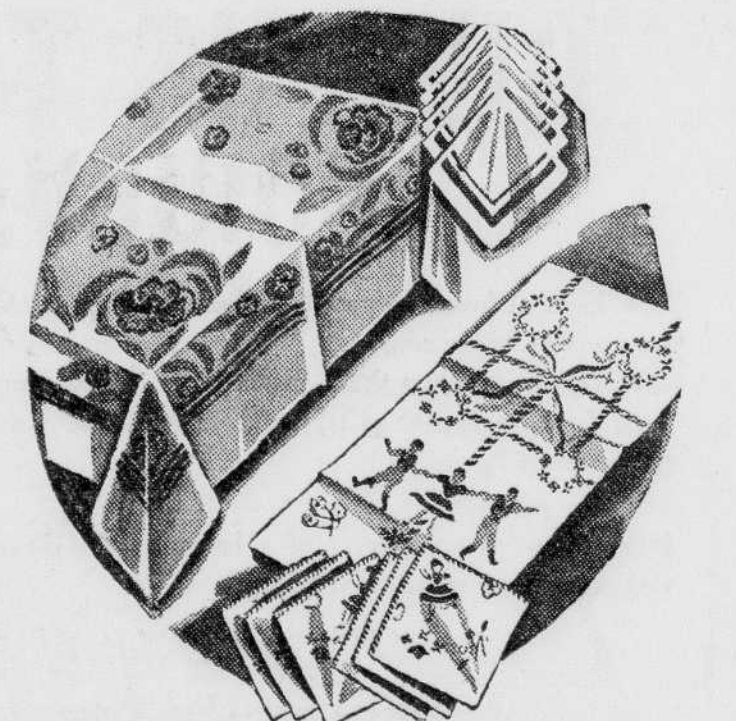
