## Rotary awards five

Five students, four from Westmount High and one from St. Leo's Academy received \$500 scholarship cheques from Westmount Rotary at Wednesday's luncheon meeting in Victoria Hall.

They were: Brian Fisher of St. Leo's and Leoa Varvariouk, Fay McAfee, Shirley Baker and Robin Armstrong — all of Westmount High.

It was particularly noted that Shirley Baker is planning to enter architecture at McGill and Leoa Varvariouk will take music as a vocation.

Archie Callard, chairman of the club scholarship committee noted that in the years since 1945 when the scholarships were first made available — only one winner has failed to complete the planned university course for which the Rotary funds were made available. He paid tribute also to H. Giles, assistant chairman, who had, he said, "performed the bulk of the work over that period" in checking on the applications.

It was a double-barrelled feature day for the club with District Governor S. Gerald (Duke) Locknow making his first appearance before the club members in his official capacity.

## St. Leo's plan new north wing

The Catholic School Commission in Westmount has sought permission to erect a brand new north wing to St. Leo's Academy on Clarke avenue.

In announcing the plans M. Picard, chairman of the St-Léon de Westmount board, said that the new section will contain 6 classrooms, plus such new facilities as a language laboratory, audio-visual facilities, and a natural sciences lab.

Pupils in grades two and three who would normally be housed in the old wing are using classrooms in the "unimproved" section of Westmount Park School through a rental (Continued on page 4)

## New colours ready as regiment celebrates 50th anniversary

The Royal Montreal Regiment has confirmed that as part of its Fiftieth Anniversary this month His Excellency The Governor-General will present New Regimental and Queen's Colours to The Regiment.

The ceremony will take place on the afternoon of Sunday, September 20, at Westmount Park, and members of the public are invited to attend.

The Regiment was founded in 1914 as part of the 3rd Canadian Infantry Brigade for service in Europe. When it returned in 1919, it left behind 1,192 men who gave their lives in the cause of freedom. It is to these men, and others who paid the supreme sacrifice in the Second World War, that the Armory at 4625 St. Catherine street is dedicated.

All too few years later, The RMR was again mobilized as part of the 1st Canadian Division in 1939, and did not return home until almost six years had passed, seeing action at such places as the liberation of Calais, and in Northwest Europe. These names, with many others from two world conflicts, are emblazoned on the new colours that General Vanier will present.

## Red Feather seeks \$2,475,000

# Drive held vital for local agency

One of the largest financial drives in recent years gets under way officially on Monday night. The year's Red Feather campaign has an objective of \$2,475,000 which is 15% more than was collected in the 1963 drive. "Hundreds of your neighbors and friends will be out canvassing in practically every area of greater Montreal," said E. H. Heeneey, general chairman of the drive, in a recent statement. "We believe that if the neighbor canvasser and donor will do their part now as has the large corporations and individual donors in the advance gifts division then our campaign can go over the top."

### Community Implications

The success or failure of this year's campaign can have very serious implications to every community, large or small, in the metropolitan Montreal area. This was stressed by several agency directors at a luncheon last week, sponsored by the Church Liaison Committee of United Red Feather Services.

Mrs. Muriel McCrea, executive director of the Children's Service Centre in Westmount, said that if anyone asked what failure of the drive would mean the first thing she would worry about would be the other agencies. It was pointed out that needy and problem children are the result of broken homes. If the agencies which try to keep the homes intact are not fully

supported through the forthcoming campaign some of these agencies would have to cut back on service. The resulting increase in the number of children having to be helped by the Children's Service Centre in this case could run into many hundreds. "Any cut in money to any agency of Red Feather means disappointments and heartbreak for children," said Mrs. McCrea, emphasizing that last year her agency had 2,582 children in care and this number had been increased by another 136 by June of this year.

"How can you say no?" asked Mrs. McCrea, stressing the emergency services which her agency must give. For instance, "We got a call from the Montreal Children's Hospital. A child had 18 breaks in her arm and one eye was gouged out. She was 18 months old. Could you say no to that child?"

Mrs. McCrea concluded "it is our responsibility, your responsibility, the community's responsibility to provide the money for continued service."

Miss Elinor Barnstead, executive director of the Family Service Association, backed up Mrs. McCrea's plea, noting that a cut in budget of any agency

means a cut in staff and "that means a cut in service."

C. E. R. Thompson, executive director of the Society for the Protection of Women and Children, noted that "our agency refuses to believe that child protection should be curtailed due to lack of funds. We believe it is not a frill — but an essential service."

The work among children and families are only two aspects of the multiple services given by the 36 health and welfare agencies in the Red Feather family serving the Protestant and non-sectarian community in all parts of greater Montreal.

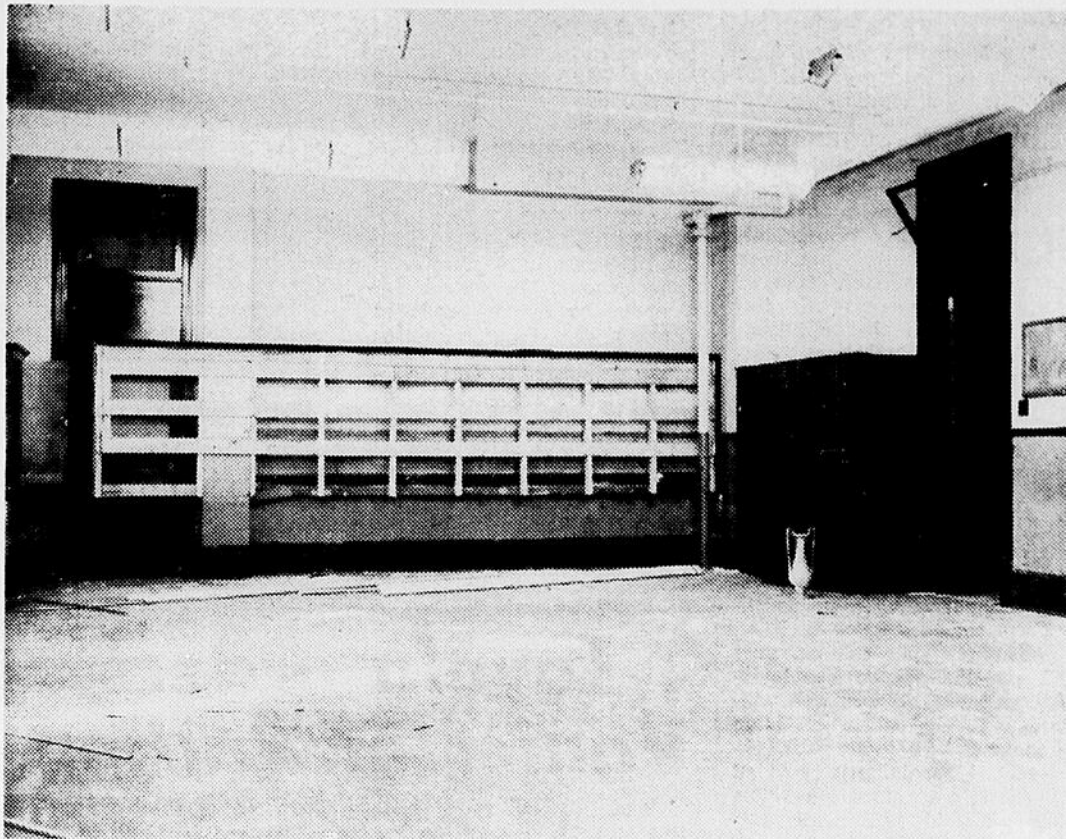

**History of RMR Colours given**

Military Colors have been in use for many centuries, and from the outset fulfilled two practical needs. First, they were a rallying point in battle and second, a mark of distinction between families. Early man fixed his family badge to a pole, while medieval knights placed armourial bearings on their banners. As armies adopted a system of regiments at the beginning of the 17th. century, each company was allotted a colour. This custom prevailed for a hundred years. Since 1751, regiments have been limited

to a Regional Colour and a Sovereign's Color.

Before colors are taken into use they are consecrated during a ceremony that was standardised in 1867. This is the service we will witness today. This is a tradition that dates from the sacred standards of the Maccabees and the legions of Rome. Pope Alexander II consecrated the banner carried by William the Conqueror.

The reverence shown to the Colors during their active life assures them of a sacred resting place upon retirement, with due regard for their historic associations. In times gone by it was the

custom for the regimental colors to match the facing on an infantryman's uniform, to provide a simple yet efficient rallying point. The regimental color was paraded through the ranks, so that every man could identify it. In battle, the men moved where the color flew. To lose a color to the enemy was more than a disgrace; it usually meant defeat in battle, for without its rallying point a unit was most liable to disintegrate. The color, as now, was always saluted, guarded and escorted wherever it went.

The Royal Montreal Regiment has the distinction of receiving three sets of Colors. In 1919, the first occasion was unique in the annals of British and Canadian history. This was the first time that a Regiment had been presented with Colors on foreign soil at the end of a victorious campaign. It was at Unter Eschbach, Germany, on January 4th, 1919, that Prince Arthur of Connaught presented the Regiment with its first set of Colors.

Another set of Colors were to have been presented to The Regiment in 1939. This ceremony was postponed until the cessation of hostilities. It was at Amersfoort, Holland, that General H. D. G. Crerar presented the second set of Colors on July 10, 1945. These however were not the Colors that the City of Westmount had planned to give. The original set was destroyed by enemy bombing in London, and it was a replacement set that the RMR received on foreign liberated soil.

**McGill awards 12**

Twelve students from Westmount will enter McGill this Fall under terms of special entrance scholarships, it was announced this week.

Winners of scholarships worth a minimum of \$100 which may also extend to tuition fees, board and residence were: Charles Beach, Courtney Pratt and Steven Vittoratos, Stephen Abbott, Colin Anderson, Jeffrey Bacal, Richard M. Beardmore and Judith Spice.

A Sir William Macdonald scholarship of \$150 for one year restricted to male students entering Arts and Science went to Marc de Man of St. Leo's.

Michael Kaplan and Courtney Pratt were winners of the Sidney J. Hodgson scholarships of \$200 for engineering and \$175 for Arts, restricted to students of Westmount High.

The Grace Fairley Trafalgar Scholarship of \$100 for one year was won by Nancy McFarlane. Altogether 295 students from all parts of Canada won awards. More than 200 came from Quebec.

Some of the awards were made in June, before the results of Provincial Matriculation Examinations were released. These winners were selected from among a large number of students who were granted early provisional acceptances at that time.

Two 30 year-old Toronto residents pleaded guilty in municipal court Wednesday to charges of purse snatching from two elderly ladies on Atwater avenue and the theft of articles from cars parked on Dorchester boulevard.

Remanded for sentence later today were Gerald Jones and John Briscoe. They were arrested Tuesday for loitering, but a search of their Atwater avenue rooming house by Westmount Police turned up some of the contents of the purses and of the cars.

Police also recovered identification papers belonging to Mrs. Marshall Field, a director of the well-known Chicago department store. She lost the papers along with a mink stole and a movie camera during a visit here on September 10.

Sir: That picture of the lagoon and spillways in revamped Westmount Park, lacked only one thing — the facts just ain't so.

The fire hydrant-fed spillway at the library is, alas, by no means complete, the lovely green sward of the dell is gone. There are nothing but mounds of earth and straggling weeds, a miserable representation of what was, and now unhappy is not.

A whole summer has been lost to Westmount people who loved the Park and were, for the most part, happy with it and its surroundings. It will take years for the Park to recover a semblance of itself, for anybody familiar with the habits of flowers and grasses knows how long it takes to replace and permanently restore in new locations, their original beauty.

In six weeks or less the snow will fly. Even now, sowing of grass seed is a waste of money. It will be late summer of 1965, at least, before any measure of permanence will be visible.

And what will we have then that we had not before the heavy expenditures of 1964 incurred in the so-called "re-modelling"? A maze of concrete footpaths to aggravate the feet of those who would seek the green sod and the cool of the shade trees, plus a miserable trickling ditch and a couple of artificial spillways that a summer thundershower, and its resultant flood, would put to shame on any of the avenues bordering the Park on the mountain side.

Those interested in preserving the natural beauty of King George Park (Murray Park) should get busy to form a Protection Committee to guard the natural beauty of this park, one of the most lovely on the Island of Montreal, and block all squandering of monies on so-called modernizing.

Much has happened in the Guide movement since the days of black stockings and turned-up hat brims, but the fundamentals have always remained the same. Our girls are preparing themselves to lead happy useful lives and to become good citizens. In Westmount, we have over 250 Roman Catholic, Jewish and Protestant children, mixed together or in groups of their own (usually depending upon proximity to meeting place), all enjoying Guiding together.

## Loyola orders Vanier medallion

The award of a commission to French-Canadian artist Sylvia Daoust to sculpt a medallion bearing the head of the Governor-General of Canada to be placed in the George P. Vanier Library has been announced by Very Rev. P. G. Malone, SJ, president of Loyola.

Unveiling of the medallion will form part of the Library opening ceremonies set for Tuesday, October 27, at 3:30 p.m. His Excellency the Governor-General will officiate.

A well-known Quebec artist, Miss Daoust has produced medals bearing the heads of several lieutenant governors of this province in addition to many well-known sculptures, some of which are in the National Gallery of Canada.

### Extensive career

Born in Montreal, Mlle. Daoust studied art at the Ecole des Beaux Arts here. She taught

art, modelling and anatomy at the Ecole des Beaux arts in Quebec City from 1930 to 1943 when she returned to become an instructor at the Montreal Art institution, teaching sculpture.

In 1929 she won first prize exaequo in sculpture in the Willingdon Competition, and in the same year was awarded a Quebec Provincial Government Scholarship to study in France. In 1955-56 she was awarded a Royal Society of Canada Scholarship, also for study in France. She has also studied in Italy, Spain, Greece, Belgium, Germany and England.

Miss Daoust, whose works include busts, medallions of the lieutenant-governors of Quebec, religious art and sculpture in wood, has participated in exhibitions of the Royal Academy of the Sculptors' Society of Canada. She has had exhibitions of her work in Montreal and Quebec, Rome and in the Tate Gallery, London.

The Vanier Library, begun in the fall of 1963, will be open for the 1964-65 academic year at Loyola. Built to house 150,000 volumes, it will provide additional study and research space for 520 students at a time.

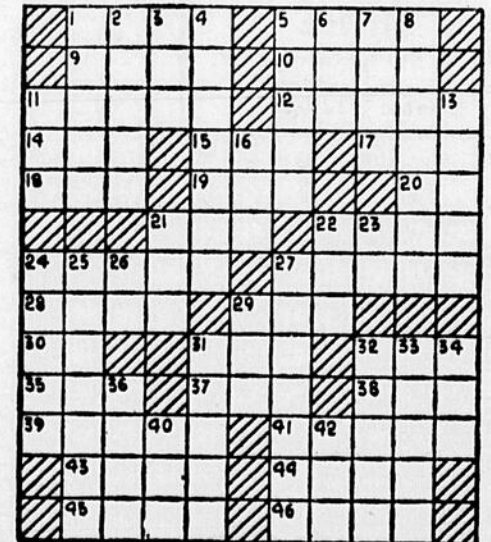
The new section will also contain general offices for the St-Léon School Board as well as school offices.

## Local sendoff given British 2-storey bus

Westmount, which has often been accused of appearing more British than Britain itself, looked perhaps a little more so Tuesday with the appearance of a London double-decker bus on its streets.

Off on a 3,500 mile six-week goodwill tour of Canada, the bus spent most of the evening at the residence of the Acting Principle British Trade Commissioner Basil Harries, 7 Lorane avenue.

Britain's High Commissioner to Canada, Sir Henry Lintott, and Mayor Jean Drapeau "launched" the expedition in Dominion Square Monday.

It is manned by a crew brought especially to Canada — London busmen Ken Warnes, driver, and Stan Marshall, conductor. A mobile exhibition and information centre on the lower deck will be staffed by two smartly uniformed

B.T.A. travel information girls.

Every section of its 3,500 mile, six-week journey has been checked to confirm overhead clearances of at least 14' 10" and detours will be frequent because of low bridges or hanging cables. A special floating crane was necessary to unload the mammoth vehicle from a Cunard freighter in Montreal.

The bus, is a No. 11 taken off its route through London's world-renowned streets to give Canadians a taste of life in the British Capital.

## Electric Co. picks nearby Quebec site

Mayor Gilles Brouillard of the Town of Vaudreuil has announced that Northern Electric Company Limited has exercised options to purchase a 235-acre tract of land fronting on the new Trans-Canada Highway.

Company President R. H. Keebler said that the acquisition of this site reflects his company's belief in Quebec as one of the nation's great industrial provinces and in the Montreal district as one of Northern Electric's important manufacturing locations.

This new site, some 25 miles west of downtown Montreal will permit the development of a new improved industrial complex over the years to supplement other Northern Electric plants in the greater Montreal district. No immediate construction plans have been made.

Situated at the entrance to Canada's metropolis, the site in Vaudreuil is served by major highways and rail. Furthermore, located near the intersection of the Toronto and Ottawa Highways, it is ideally situated in relation to Northern Electric's other plants and its Research and Development Laboratories.

McGill welcomes over 400 graduates to the campus at a special half-day conference Monday, September 21.

The graduates, who serve in the capacity of class agents for the Alma Mater Fund, will attend a number of sessions designed to bring them into closer touch with the present operation of the University and with their role in its future plans.

Some of McGill's top administrators will speak to the graduates at the various sessions. Members of the University Board of Governors and Senate will also be present. Representatives of the groups, including the McGill Associates and Parents' Committee will attend.

The annual fund, sponsored in 1948 by the Graduates' Society of McGill University, last year collected over \$400,000 from 14,518 graduates. The next immediate objective set by Fund officials is \$500,000.

Monday's events are being held under the auspices of the McGill Fund Council.

Howard I. Ross, Chancellor, will open the conference at a buffet luncheon in the Redpath Museum at 12:30 p.m. The second and third floors of the Museum, with its permanent and special

exhibits, has been turned over to the Fund Conference for the luncheon.

Colin M. McDougall, Registrar, will explain to the graduates how the University functions as an educational complex, immediately following the luncheon. This part of the program will take place in the main auditorium of the new Humanities and Social Sciences Building.

This will mark the first such meeting in the new structure, which goes into partial operation the same day.

Preceding Mr. McDougall's address, D. Lorne Gales, Executive Director of the McGill Fund Council, and Elizabeth B. McNab, Associate Director, will give a complete report on the University's new "Co-ordinated Fund-Raising Program".

Following a tour of the completed portion of the Humanities Building, the graduate will return to the auditorium to hear an address dealing with the University's plans to strengthen student-faculty relationships. The speaker will be Professor H. D. Woods, Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences.



## Musical Sharps, Flats & Naturals By FRANCES GOLTMAN

### THE RETURN (To School And Music)

A long absence from any routine causes one to forget. When the work, occupation, study or whatever type of toil it happens to be, is resumed, what is the first thing that should be done? Since this column is devoted to all subjects relating to music, naturally a long summer holiday from the routine of practise should be begun again with a careful review of fundamentals. The same applies to school classes.

Many people do not think of music as a physical activity. The hands are part of our body and those who play the piano (or any other musical instrument) and leave it for a prolonged period find that the fingers are out of practice and cannot go as fast or easily as before the summer vacation.

Two things are essential for anyone resuming practise. First, the rules (theoretical) must be reviewed and fingers must exercise. A fighter, who uses his whole body, trains intensely before a match and when he begins his strenuous program, he commences with a small amount and gradually increases daily. This way one does not strain or overtax the muscles.

Both music and school teachers not only "SHOULD"

but "MUST" review in order to facilitate the work for the student. Things they have forgotten must be learned anew.

### Comparison

There are a few high schools in the city which have a special class of the smartest students in each particular grade. Personally, I do not approve of this procedure because in the end it serves no purpose except causing disappointments and does not necessarily prove that these pupils are the smartest later on. It does however, make it easier for the teacher, who has an intelligent group and none that would hold the class back.

One of my high school students, now in her matriculation year, who has maintained a high standard throughout, is in one of these "brain" classes. (It does make a parent proud but it also gives the student a slight feeling of superiority over other classes. This is another reason why I think it is not good. The students of other classes in the same grade resent the class because many teachers hold them up as an example, not realizing the effect it has on the students.)

This student, who is continuing piano lessons in her last year of high school, told me last week at her first lesson this season that the mathematics instructor asked the class a question (at their first lesson) and not one of the pupils (the smart class) knew the answer.

She said, "It was so easy, Miss Goltman, but none of us remembered." The teacher proved to them that even the brightest people forget. Then he proceeded to review.

It takes time to learn the rules for keeps. As examples—some children forget their arithmetic tables for the first two, three or even four years until the tables are securely planted in their heads for good. If a music pupil is taught the basic rules—lines spaces, note-values, keys scales, arpeggios and reviewed properly, they should remain for life after a certain period. Parents do not realize how hard a teacher has to work in order to produce results—therefore it is up to them to co-operate with school and music teachers and see that their children do daily and weekly assignments. Results will show.

Romans 8:2, when correct-  
ly read, is a most blessed  
passage of Scripture. To get  
the sense we should place a  
dash between the words  
"Spirit" and "of". Thus it  
would read: "For the law  
of the Spirit — of life in  
Christ Jesus, hath made me  
free from the law of sin and  
death."

When a sinner places his  
trust in Christ as Savior he  
is justified before the bar of  
God, because Christ's death  
and righteousness are im-  
puted to him. This is a judi-  
cial matter.

But at the same moment  
something else happens: the  
Spirit regenerates and gives

new life Tit. 3:5). Now this  
is a law, an inexorable, un-  
changeable law. The sinner  
who sincerely places his trust  
in Christ as Savior is given  
life by the Holy Spirit. It is  
always so; it is never other-  
wise. I John 5:12 says: "He  
that hath the Son hath life . . ."  
John 3:36 says that  
"He that believeth on the  
Son hath everlasting life"  
and Col. 3:4 declares that the  
believer's life is "hid with  
Christ in God."

Thus the apostle could say:  
"The Law of the Spirit, (that  
of) life in Christ, hath made  
me free from the law of sin  
and death." Adam forfeited  
his life by sin, but the be-  
liever's new life can never  
be forfeited, for this life is  
nothing less than the life of  
Christ, in whom the sinner  
has already died and paid  
for his sins — and in whom  
he now stands perfect and  
complete before God.

It is a law, a fixed un-  
changeable law, that sin  
brings forth death (Rom.  
5:12; 6:23; et. al). This is  
called "the law of sin and  
death," but the believer has  
already died for sin in Christ  
and has been given a new  
life by the Spirit. Thus "The  
law of the Spirit," that of  
"life in Christ," has made  
the simplest believer free  
from "the law of sin and  
death."

Thank God for "the law  
of the Spirit," everlasting life  
through the Lord Jesus  
Christ, who died for our sins.

## Resident to lecture at Theological College

Principal George Johnston of United Theological College, Mrs. R. Douglas Smith of Westmount and Professor J. C. McLelland will be among the lecturers at the Montreal Lay School of Theology this season.

Registrations are now being accepted for the school which starts its fifth year on Thursday evening October 8, at 8 p.m. in Divinity Hall, McGill University.

Basic course in the first term, which runs Thursday evenings from October 8 to December 10, will be "Church History" by Dr. McLelland, who is Professor of Religion at McGill University. 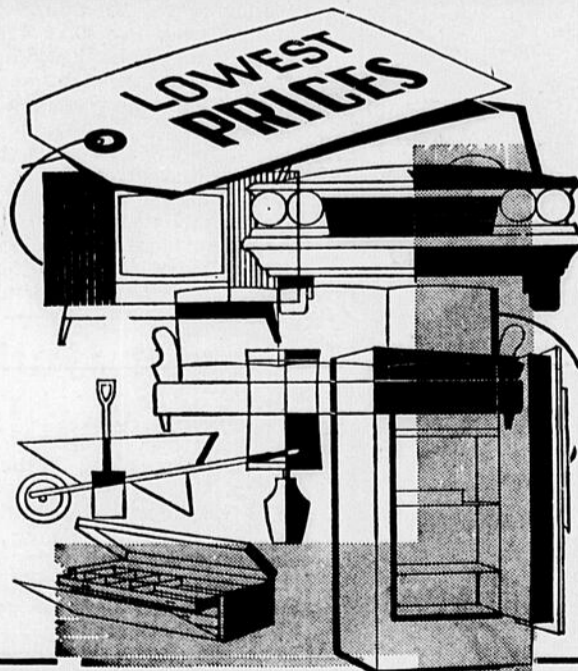

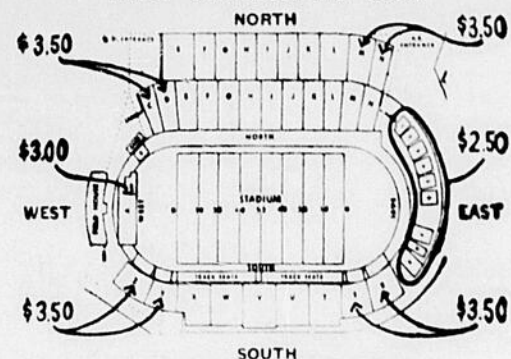

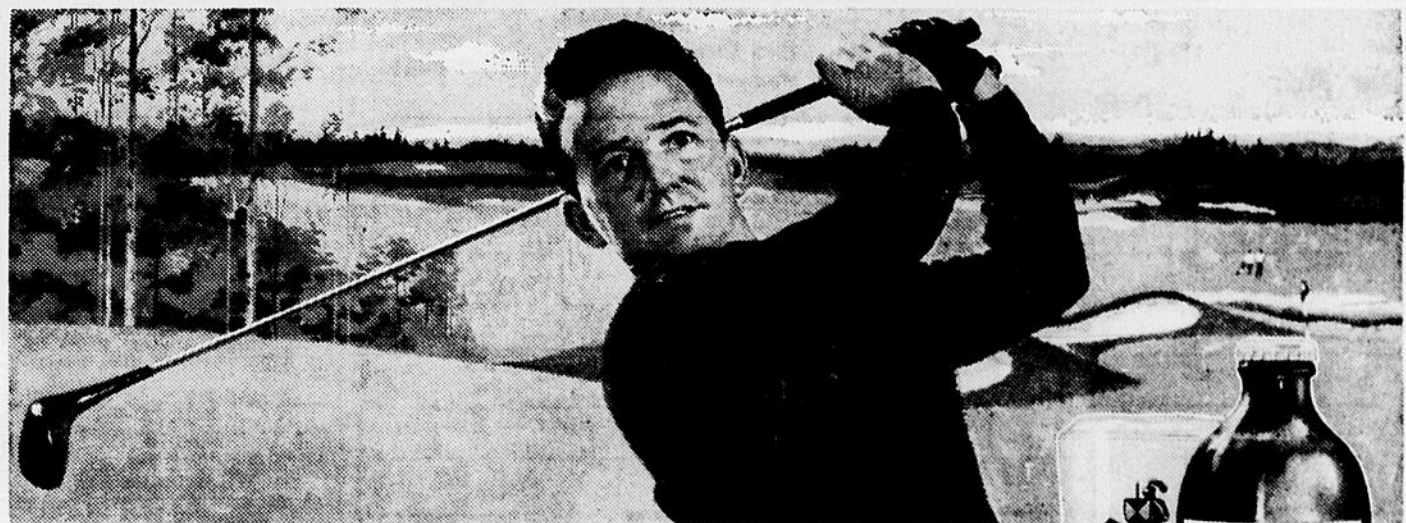
