MONDAY MORNING, JUNE 2nd.

The C. P. R. have just issued a new map showing their main line branches and connections. All parts of the continent seem to be reached by them.

The station known as "Beattie" on the Atlantic Division, the C. P. R. is now called "Lowelltown," and the station on the Ontario Division known as "Pike Falls," is now "Eimsley."

CHICAGO MAIL: Major McKinley and his bill are heartily damned in England and Washington and should be so in Chicago. Everybody in this city owes the ingenious Mr. McKinley a large and ineradicable grudge for getting up and lobbying through the house of representatives a measure calculated to hurt the world's fair very seriously.

If the bill becomes law it will hurt a good many more things than the world's fair, and, anathematizing it will become so wide-spread and general that some miscalculation will be called on to soliloquise "because of swearing the land mourneth." McKinley and his bill will have a serious account to render.

A remarkable illustration of the influence of red tape has been brought to light at Washington. A good many years ago, the Czar of Russia, as a mark of personal esteem, sent a gold and diamond snuff box to the United States to be presented to Rear-Admiral Baldwin. For reasons of State set forth in American laws, the Admiral could not accept this evidence of a monarch's favor except through special permission given by act of Congress, and Congress with its usual promptness and despatch in matters pertaining to individuals who have no "political pull," delayed action until the Admiral had gone to that bourne whence no traveller returneth. Now, however, Congress has enacted the requisite permission and the heirs of the dead Admiral are permitted to receive the snuff-box. It is to be presumed they are thankful on behalf of their deceased ancestor.

ARRIVAL OF THE PRINCE.

The Royal Party are to arrive at the Windsor street depot this morning at 10.10. On alighting, His Worship Acting Mayor Stephens will present the Duke with a civic address of welcome which His Highness will reply to. The station will be open to the public with the exception of a portion which will be roped up. The Royal visitors will drive to the residence of Sir George Stephen on Drummond street by way of Osborne, Windsor, and Dorchester streets. Leaving about 2 o'clock the distinguished visitors will drive round the city by way of Windsor street, St. James (west) round the G. T. R. depot into Chabouilles square where they will inspect no. 4 Fire station. Resuming they will proceed along Notre Dame, through McGill and by way of St. James street to the Champ de Mars where there will be a review of the Fire Brigade. This concluded, the party will drive along Craig up St. Denis to Sherbrooke and up Park avenue, and thence round the mountain. They will take the regular route and go to the M. A. A. grounds.

THE RIFLE RANGES.

The second of the Canadian Military Rifle League matches took place on Saturday all over the Dominion. The local men shot at Cote St. Luc. They had to contend with a troublesome wind and a bright light. Capt. Bossie, of the 65th Battalion was the Range officer and it is to be regretted that he is not vested with sufficient power to order a man off the ground for misdemeanor. An instance of this occurred on Saturday which fortunately was not as bad as it might have been. A youth belonging to a local corps was entrusted with a rifle and while waiting with the others at the 600 yards butts, he deliberately fired. Some people were quite close to him at the time but escaped with a good fright. Others were in the cars when the bullet went whistling past. Captain Hood gave him a severe handling but did not go to far.

DOMINION BANK. GENERAL ANNUAL MEETING OF SHAREHOLDERS.

The Annual General Meeting of the Dominion Bank was held at the banking house of the institution on Wednesday, May 28th, 1890.
