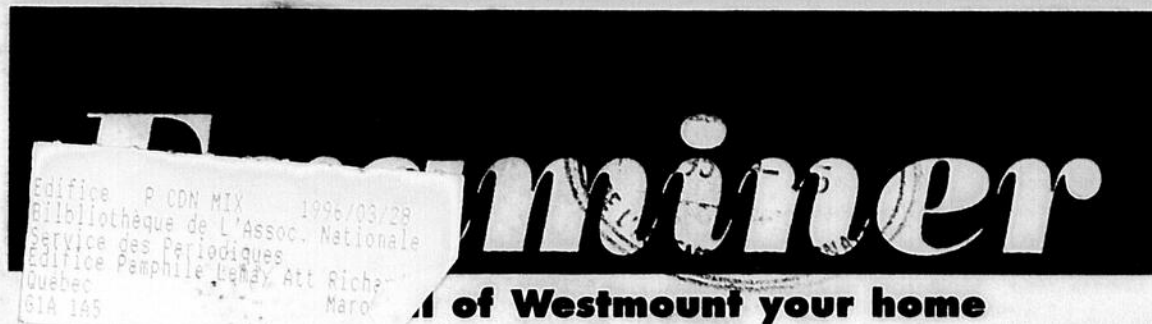

Reddy hopes 2-year delay will save hospital

By February 1997, Reddy Memorial Hospital director-general Réjean Plante hopes that recommendations made by the Montreal Regional Health Board to close seven regional hospitals to save \$190 million will prove a bad idea.

That's when the Reddy is slated to close, but Plante is hoping that by then, the fallout from the closures will allow the institution to stay open.

Quebec Health Minister Jean Rochon is expected to announce his final word on the fate of the hospitals on Sept. 19. That's the end of the 45-day period since the Parti Québécois published the law in the Official Gazette.

Plante said the hospital will continue to operate as usual even after the September date. The government's decision is already made, he added, thus the only hope lies in waiting for the consequences — which critics predict as disastrous.

No one, including himself, or even the CLSCs, knows what will happen or how anything will work if the minister forges ahead with his hospital plan, Plante said. He added that the

QE inaugurates CT scan despite threatened closure

Putting on a brave and defiant face in spite of pending closure by Health Minister Jean Rochon, the Queen Elizabeth Hospital inaugurated its recently installed CT scan Tuesday.

The event preceded a scheduled

march last night from Girouard Park to the hospital along Sherbrooke St. W., organized mainly by a community coalition to save the hospital.

Rochon is expected to make an announcement on the hospital's future on Sept. 19, based on recommendations by the Montreal

Regional Health Board and the government's order to cut \$190 million from its \$3.3 billion budget. The minister turned down an invitation to the inauguration.

While some say privately the minister won't change his mind, publicly, many are hoping that pressure tactics like the march,

threats of legal action by the hospital board and an 'observation' will show Rochon that he's making a mistake in telling the 100-year-old institution to close by 1996. The hospital plans to release the observation, an argument for the QE, this week.

Artist-run co-op folds quietly

Faced with high rent in Westmount, a local artists' group has quietly disbanded after being unable to find a new home.

According to painter Gary Bercovitch, the landlord decided to rent out the space to a new store on the premises in July, forcing Gallery S. Space Ensemble — which never signed a lease — to relocate.

In the end though, the roughly 25 members couldn't afford anything that they could all agree on, Bercovitch said. The disbanding that followed was by mutual agreement.

Disappointment is sharp among some artists.

"Absolutely we were forced out of business," said artist Carole Schnaiberg last week, declining to elaborate. Other artists didn't return calls. The building's owner could not be reached for comment.

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Reddy director calls for impact study and pilot project before closure

upcoming referendum on Quebec separation also casts a cloud of uncertainty over the whole issue.

Plante made the comments after a press conference last week announcing the creation of a patients/ citizens committee to save the hospital. The committee

includes community leaders as well as doctors and staff. Already, according to co-chairman Dr. Roopnarine Singh, the committee is up to 1,000 members.

In a bid to show that they're not giving up, the committee is holding a public information meeting Sept. 22 at 10 a.m. at the Erskine and American Church as well as a public protest rally in Cabot Park at 5 p.m. Sept. 28.

The events are after Sept. 19, but board chairman George Hendy said there's not enough time for Rochon to make his final announcement on the 19th. If, that is, he heeds requests for meetings

and submitted observations.

"All this before the 19th — it can't happen," Hendy added. "I think he'll want to look contemplative."

"We're not going to say, 'yes sir,' and go into closing mode," he said.

Hendy also called for an impact study and a pilot project first to determine the impact of a hospital's closure and to prove feasibility of the government's plan.

"Why not do it so that they can prove it," he added.

Singh is also urging the public to phone and write their MNAs to urge the government to keep the

hospital open and threaten not to vote for them if they fail.

Patients have 10 times more to lose than any hospital worker or doctor from the dislocation of services, said Singh. He added that the only way to save the Reddy is by its 'observation' and by educating the public as to what will happen if the hospital closes.

The observation, sent this week to Rochon, focuses on four main items: the hospital and impact of closure on the services, including long term care and psychiatry; how human resources will be dealt with in transfers; how the physicians will be affected and how they can be encouraged to stay until the end; and the result of the financial impact of the Regie's proposal, "which was not and is still not, clear," says Plante in the hospital newsletter.

Closing hospitals will affect women in particular because they're the ones that will be forced to take on the task of home care, said Vera Osidacz, a social worker at the Reddy, adding that low-income earners will be especially hard-hit. "It will set them back years and years," Osidacz said, arguing that while CLSCs are supposed to develop home care programs, they won't be able to provide 24-hour care.

Revamped library said 'coming alive'

After a year of renovation and expansion, the Westmount Public Library is "beginning to come alive," city councillor John Bridgman said last week, as he announced acceptance of a \$620,000 bid for landscaping work on the library property and neighbouring Victoria Hall.

Finishing touches are being done inside, he said, adding that most people will be very pleased with the result. The library will be open to the public on Nov. 13.

The landscaping work includes reconstruction of the parking area and various new sidewalks and paths; new lighting; new access stairs to the Findlay entrance; new water entrance and sewers and extensive landscaping in front of the library, greenhouse and Victoria Hall.

Under approval of purchases, city council also agreed to accept a bid of \$30,000 for the supply and installation of furniture, consisting primarily of office desks, filing cabinets and storage cabinets.

They also accepted another bid for \$40,000 for the supply of labour and materials for cabling in the library.

No trace of Victoria Ave. bank robber

A man held his hand to his mouth, walked into the Bank of Commerce on Victoria Avenue Tuesday morning and demanded the teller hand over money.

Witnesses told police that the man, about 30 to 40 years old, then fled south toward St. Catherine Street.

A search of the area turned up no trace of the thief.

Police believe the man could easily have escaped by the Vendome metro station.

French-speaking, about 20 to 30 years old, having short brown hair. One man was 5 ft. tall, the other was described as a thin 6 ft. tall man. In all cases, police believe the thief used a lock pick to gain entry.

A second break-in occurred in another Metcalfe Avenue apartment building later that day. Nothing appeared stolen.

Four break-ins also occurred on the 7th and 8th floors of an apartment building on St. Catherine Street during the day Monday. In all cases, front doors were forced with a lock pick, causing minor or no damage.

The apartments were searched and jewellery and money appeared to be the main objective of the thief since they were the only items stolen, police say.

Crime Prevention officer Lise Bergeron advised that one measure of preventing thieves from entering apartment buildings is to avoid indiscriminately buzzing strangers in through the front door.

Police believe the same person or persons broke into several apartments in Westmount buildings this Monday.

They have no leads, although two men were spotted standing in front of a Metcalfe Avenue building, where a break-in occurred sometime during the day in a 4th floor apartment.

Montreal Urban Community police at Station 23 are warning drivers that they will be holding an anti-drunk driving campaign in the early hours of Sept. 17.

The campaign will take place at the corner of Sherbrooke and Olivier.

Drivers, if stopped, will be asked to identify themselves.

Police will ask drivers to breathe into the Alert system, an alcohol-detecting device similar to, but not as specific as a breathalyzer.

Police will also ask drivers to take the breathalyzer test if they have reasonable cause for suspicion — such as a high reading on the Alert device.

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Poll says 94 per cent satisfied with services at Queen Elizabeth

Directors at the Queen E, which recently underwent renovations partially funded by the Quebec government, also point to the scan and to a poll released this week as proof that Rochon is on the wrong track. Closing the hospital will lead to a poorer quality of health care, they say.

According to the Léger and Léger poll of 320 users conducted between August 28 and 30, 92 per cent were opposed to the hospital closing. Most were also opposed to the reform of health care services.

The poll also found that 94 per cent were very satisfied with services, and about 13 per cent said they were quite satisfied. Most said they had some knowledge about the Rochon reform, while 11 per cent said they knew nothing and 24 per cent said they knew little.

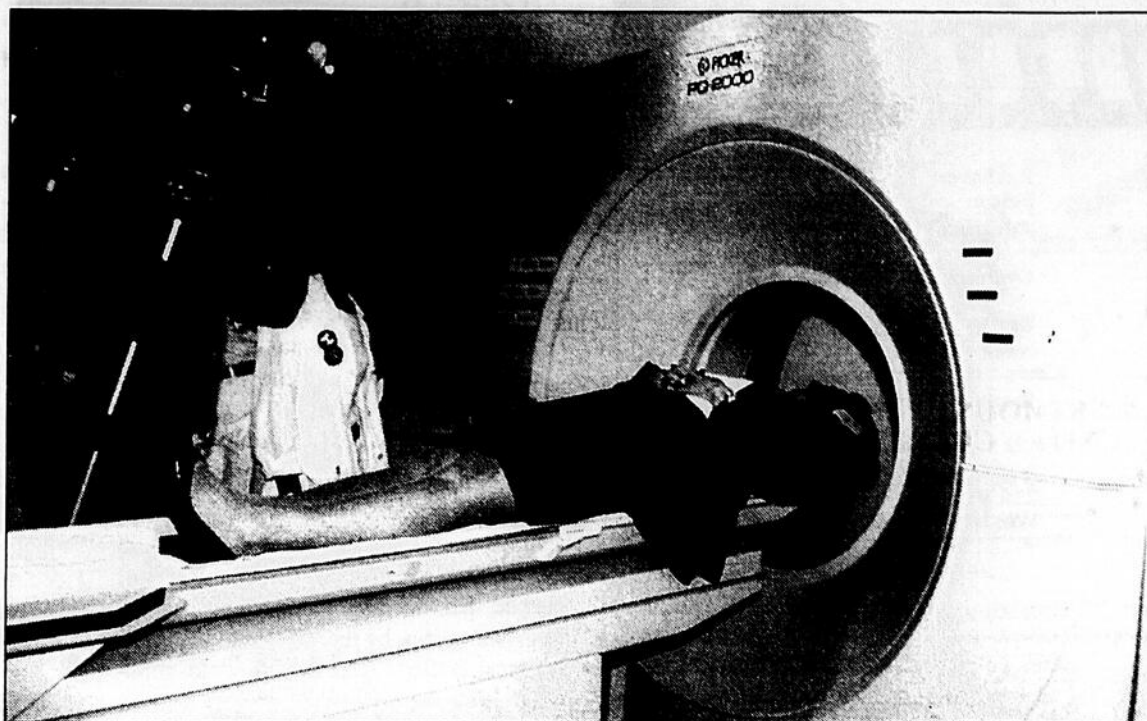
The poll was released by the Community Coalition on Health Care, chaired by NDG Community Council president Stephen Laudi. It's aimed at saving the hospital as well as assessing health needs of the community and how they can be integrated into health care reform.

Laudi echoed hospital officials in criticizing the government for not coming up with impact studies or transitional plan.

So far, the coalition, supported by 15 community organizations and local politicians, says 150,000 have signed a petition opposing the closing. It has collected about \$10,000 in pledges.

The QEH Action Committee also released its document produced for the health board during the August consultations after the announcement of closings of seven hospitals. The document analyzed the effect of the reform plan on health services.

The Queen E's proposal met the government's request for bed closures (215 to 125), says committee

co-chairman Dr. Lawrance Lincoln. It also decreased the operating budget from \$34 million to \$24 million — without as many job losses, which would be handled by attrition.

Seventy per cent of QE surgery patients go home the same day, exceeding the Régie's 45 per cent goal in its ambulatory care plan for CLSCs.

Care would have improved

The hospital would have been able to maintain all essential services and improved home care and CLSC services in the community, he said. Overall health care would have been improved at a lower cost and with less acute care beds, as the government had asked.

In a speech to supporters at the hospital, board chairman Jean Lapostolle, said the government hasn't considered the QE's plan seriously enough, nor has it given adequate public consultation. Both Quebec and the Régie haven't based their decision on valid or relevant criteria, he said.

Lapostolle appealed to the min-

ister to "open a real process of consultation with us, the process that the Régie refused us and will easily prove to you using all relevant criteria, the value of our proposals."

The hospital was already well on its way to improving its already excellent services, added foundation chairman Richard Riendeau, referring in the QE's finances, a \$3.3 million improvement to emergency services in 1993 and in buying the scan which cost a total of \$1.4 million, \$500,000 of which was paid for by Quebec and the rest by private donations.

Money promised by donors during the capital campaign hasn't all been advanced, including for the scan, he said, adding that if the minister goes ahead, liquidators won't get everything. "At least that money is intact."

Liberal health critic Pierre Marsan told the gathering that the Liberals would do everything they could to keep the hospital open.

Marsan added that closing hospitals was never an intention of previous health ministers Lucienne

CT scan stats

The diagnostic spiral CT scanner, approved by the Régie in November 1994, can complete in 20 seconds an x-ray that conventional models take up to 30 minutes to do. Combining x-ray and computer technology, it produces more accurate and complete results.

The QEH previously sent 800 patients a year to St. Mary's for CT scans and another 400 to the Montreal Neurological Institute, the Royal Victoria and the Montreal General before getting its own.

downtown Montreal less than a year ago.

The artists co-op was a movement, Bercovitch said, and "sometimes a movement dies down."

"We were starting to feel as if we were adding to the cultural life of the milieu, but circumstances entered that couldn't allow us to continue.

"We are scattered to the wind."

He said the art market in Montreal is extremely depressed,

whereas it's easier to sell and market works in other cities.

His contemporaries — many of whom are no longer in Quebec — are more likely to buy his work. Here he says the market is geared more to francophone Quebecers.

He said he will be having a show in Toronto this fall and may head to Calgary afterward. The artist added that he may even leave Montreal for good and head for the United States.

The gallery was run by the artists

and originally intended to be a community-oriented space, he said. No one was there to make a living.

"Our purpose was not necessarily to sell our work but to show our work," he said.

Bercovitch said some members may get together occasionally for temporary shows. Already, some of the artists have regrouped. Artist Ross Schorer will be opening a new gallery in N.D.G. on Monkland Avenue in October.

Getting non-Quebecers to vote is dirty pool

One has to question how ethical or wise it is for a group of predominantly anglo Quebecers, headed by Montreal lawyer Casper Bloom, to be sending out forms to former Quebec residents now in other provinces or even other countries, so that they can vote by mail in the referendum, even though they have no intention of returning to Quebec.

While there are legitimate Quebec voters outside the province — students, for instance — a news report last week said phone operators for the "Committee to Register Voters Outside Quebec" and the Council for Canadian Unity were encouraging other presumed federalists outside the province to register, even if they have no intention of returning. This practice was earlier pointed out to THE EXAMINER by a Westmounter involved with the group.

Frankly, it sounds like dirty pool. It's one of those tactics that could turn the expected

No victory into a hollow victory if the separatists can portray their side as being cheated by the electoral process.

While the legality of the referendum may be in question, and while other Canadians must ultimately have a say in the country's future, someone who has pulled up stakes and given up on Quebec as much as two years ago has no right to vote in the Quebec referendum of 1995. Those who have seen the problems but who have chosen to stay have kept their voting right, as have those who intend to return. Others have not.

Meanwhile, the real task, the way to win the referendum solidly, by a healthy margin and for the sake of future generations, is to convince *Quebecers* of the virtues of Quebec within Canada. If the Council for Canadian Unity would devote as much energy to this task as it does to what seem like electoral high jinks, we might all be decades ahead on Oct. 31

Clarifying position on rezoning of Westmount Train Station site

(From city councillor Karin Marks)

I should like to clarify my thoughts and my position on the rezoning of the CP station site for use for a protective services facility.

If I seem ambivalent about the location of the project, it is because I am. There are convincing arguments both for and against this project on the Westmount Station site.

When City Council first discussed the use of the station site, I was opposed to it because I felt that the delicate balance between residential and commercial/institutional in the Victoria village area and that the heritage value of our station could be compromised by this project.

I have long felt that the residential aspects of Victoria village are in constant danger of commercial encroachment. In attempting to protect the area, I actively promoted the moratorium on new restaurants on Sherbrooke Street, the elimination of rear commercial terraces which abutted to residential areas, the new parking policy favouring local residents, the insistence in our negotiations with CP on low density development in the Glen Yards. These efforts were to preserve and protect the residential nature of Victoria village as it faces both the challenges and the benefits of coexisting in close proximity with its com-

mercial neighbours.

My immediate opposition to the protective services building being built on the Westmount Station site was tempered somewhat as I listened to the residents and studied the data. Much to my surprise, I heard some positive comments like: "It might make this area safer. Since the arrival of the Métro crime has increased," and, "At least the community can have some input into a project being carried out by the City of Westmount." There were also comments opposing the project. Most opponents feared increased noise and traffic. Some openly acknowledged it as a NIMBY issue. (Not in my backyard.)

As a result of this input, I felt that it made sense to go ahead with the proposed rezoning because it would throw open the doors to a democratic process of citizen choice. It would allow for a two-way flow of information in the form of public consultation meetings. During these proceedings, the city could explain the MUC police reorganization, community policing, the other feasible sites, the federal infrastructure grant, thereby allowing the residents to debate the issue with full knowledge and to make their views known. These proceedings would conclude with the registration signing which would be the ultimate voice of the residents.

We are now at that stage. Let me share with you some of the pros and the cons of the project.

Advantages of the project:

1. Westmount Station will be restored as part of the project for community use and will not cost taxpayers additional monies.

2. Even though police and public security vehicles patrol throughout Westmount during their shift, their begin and end of shift comings and goings will increase police presence in the neighbourhood and could improve the overall security there.

3. If we do not use this site for the station, CP will likely sell it to a developer. With current zoning, 2/3 of the site can have a dense coverage of 3-storey residential and 1/3 can have 4 or 5 storey commercial or residential. This could greatly increase the size of the Victoria village population with proportionate increase in traffic and parking problems.

4. By building our own facility the land will be developed in an architectural style appropriate to the site and will not add the tremendous population which a dense project might add.

Disadvantages of the project:

1. If new additions to the area are non-residential or large residential complexes it would be the ultimate voice of the residents.

NEW STUDY UNDERWAY

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Over the years Westmount's high school has had many homes

At the turn of the century, with Westmount's school population expanding rapidly, its schools began a game of musical chairs.

King's, Queen's and Roslyn were approaching capacity. Soon graduates from these schools would need to move on to higher grades but Westmount Academy, the only school in the district offering such classes, was already overextended.

Moreover, the Academy had grown up in a part of town with very early roots, a nucleus which had clustered around the Simon Clarke house and St. Matthias' church.

But with the coming of public transport, the town's centre had shifted south of Sherbrooke Street and east to Greene Avenue.

Now that it was time to consider building a new high school it was planned to be placed closer to the greatest density of population.

The site chosen was the south side of Westmount Park, the budget was a generous \$500,000 and the school's projected capacity was for 1,200 to 1,500 students, twice the complement of the old

Academy. In the year the high school opened, 1914, the Westmount Academy sent its last class of graduates to sit for McGill University's Entrance Examination and then began a new life as 'Argyle School.'

Several residents have recorded their memories of the high school in its early decades.

"Mr. Howe was principal in my time. The teachers were very individual characters and in spite of large classes they managed to hold interest. Mr. Woodsworth, the Latin teacher, was an enthusiastic climber and would bring in pictures and tell us about his climbs in Europe and South America."

"I remember there was a Mr.

French who taught English which we thought very funny."

"Mr. Anderson was the history teacher. He would wave his tie about and announce in a rolling Scottish burr, 'This is the Anderson plaid me boys, the Anderson plaid.'"

"Then there was Mr. Wells. We all called him 'Bombardier' after a famous fighter of the day. Our Mr. Wells kept bees in his garden in Notre Dame de Grace and would invite us out to see the hives and learn how to take care of them."

A big attraction after school was the Canada Bread bakery, in a lane off Melville Avenue. "That wonderful aroma of fresh baked bread drew us in. We would buy a loaf for ten cents but it was so hot you had to toss it about in the air to cool it off."

In the years following World War II, there was another shift in the school population. Westmount High became a junior high school, handling grades 7, 8 and 9. Argyle

School (a new building) took over as the high school, offering grades 10, 11 and 12. (Later, Grade 12 was dropped as graduates were found to be competent to enter University following Grade 11.)

In the 1970s came a traumatic change. Westmount lost control of its schools when Bill 62 integrated the Montreal Protestant School Board island-wide. Westmount was assigned to a ward which included half of Notre Dame de Grace to the west and most of the district of St. Henri to the south.

Westmount schools were no longer "local" but the standard they set over the years had been a fine one, establishing a pattern for the new order to follow.

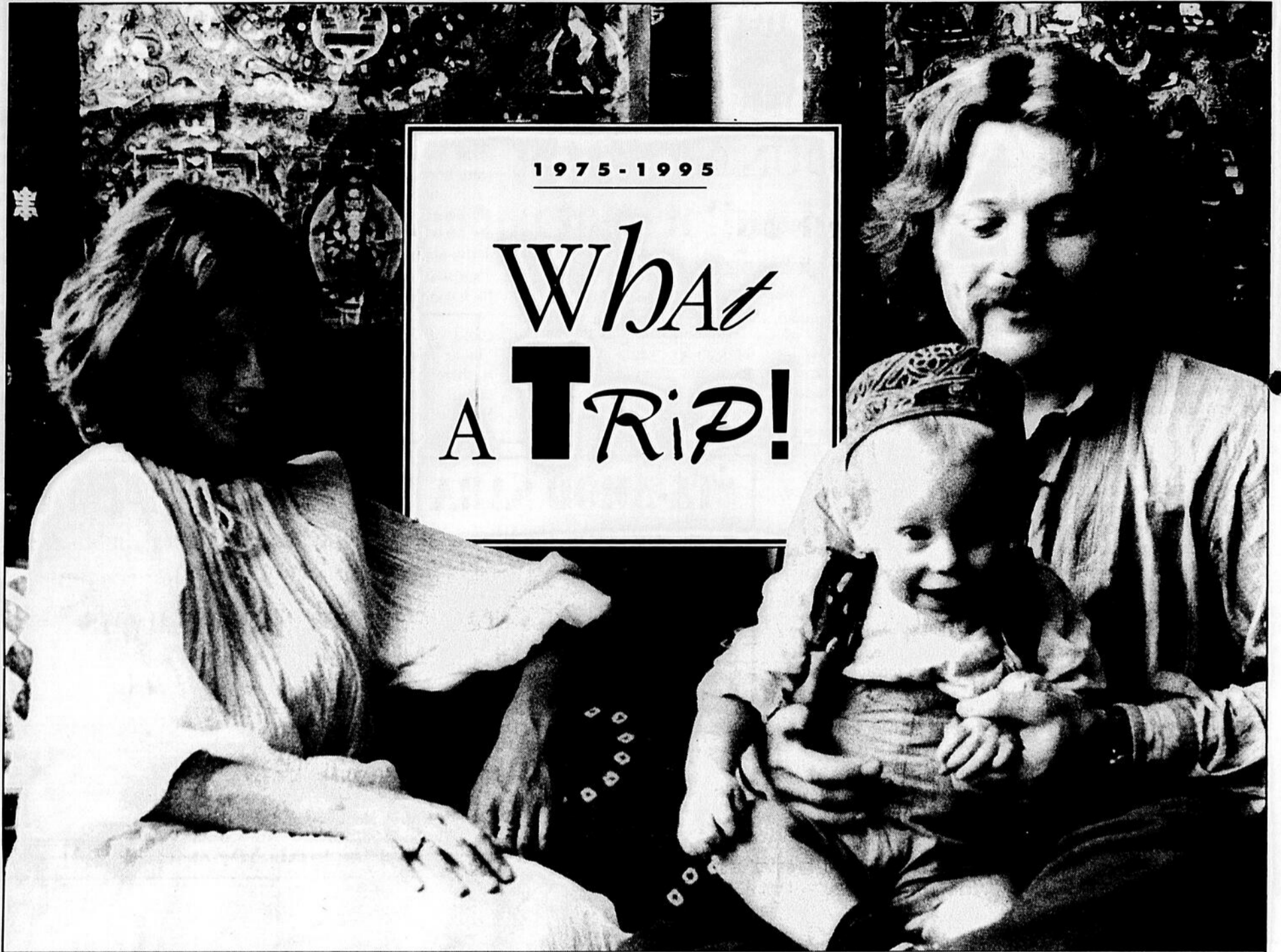

Ungrounded electrical outlets not uncommon in Westmount

Homeowners are often surprised to hear that although all of the electrical outlets in the house appear to be the "grounded type," they may not actually be grounded.

Grounded wiring was introduced in the 1960s. In the life of the average Westmount home, grounded wiring is a modern concept. Even though the house wiring may have been upgraded, most Westmount homes have at least some ungrounded electrical wiring remaining.

There is nothing wrong with ungrounded circuits as long as they are used as they were intended. Connecting a "grounded style" outlet to an ungrounded cable is a common misuse of ungrounded wiring. When painting or renovating, a do-it-yourself electrician will often replace the "old" outlets and connect modern grounded style outlets to an ungrounded cable.

What is the significance?

Any appliance, that has a three-prong plug at the end of the cord, requires a properly grounded outlet. This includes such appliances as refrigerators, microwave ovens, computers and some power tools. In a grounded appliance, the ground connection is an important safety feature.

How can a homeowner test the outlets?

A homeowner can easily and safely determine whether the electrical outlets in the home are grounded or not. A simple testing device (less than \$10) is available at most hardware stores. The tester has a three-prong plug at one side and three small lights at the other side. You simply plug the device into the outlet in question and the lights on the other side indicate whether the outlet is grounded (the device will also test if the outlet has been connected properly — correct polarity). You can then direct your electrician to the outlets in question. The wiring in a home tends to be older as you get further from the circuit breaker of fuse panel. Most often you will find ungrounded outlets in these areas.

(Warning: It is possible for a crafty person to rig up the outlet so that your tester is fooled into indicating that the outlet is grounded when in fact it is not. However, this is very uncommon.)

Solutions

On the bright side, the problem is not always difficult to solve. There is no need to replace all ungrounded cable in the house.

Again, ungrounded cable is perfectly adequate if used as intended.

- One easy solution is to fill the ground slots of all ungrounded outlets with epoxy. This would ensure that only ungrounded appliances can be plugged into the ungrounded circuit.
- If you have an appliance that

needs a ground, such as in a workshop or garage or outside, your electrician can simply replace the existing outlets with a "Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter" outlet (about \$15 for the part). This is one of those outlets that has the test buttons on it (often seen in bathrooms). The "GFCI" is now

accepted by most electrical authorities as an alternative to grounding.

- The GFCI is not recommended on all appliances. In the past, the (See GROUNDED, page 12)

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

Real estate forum planned to address Quebec industry's concerns, problems

A Forum on Real Estate this month to discuss a number of problems facing real estate owners in the province.

"For the last five years, more than 25 per cent of real estate owners have had their property seized by creditors," said Denis Roy, president of the association. "It's often their only nest egg. The value of properties has dramati-

ly declined for the past four years and the situation is critical. All parties involved have to sit down and work together."

Roy recently met with Housing Minister Guy Chevrette to outline some of the association's concerns: the high vacancy rate (35,000 empty dwellings in Quebec), the implementation of new taxes, unpaid rent (which

accounts for 75 per cent of all appearances before the Rental Board) and sub-leasing are a few of them.

"We want all parties involved, the owners, the tenants, the government and even academics to sit down and discuss the state of the industry," Roy said. "We want to create a consultative committee on housing to implement self-regulation, the reduction of the role of the Rental Board and the establishment of a policy on social housing."

The Real Estate Owners Association of Quebec was created in February 1994. It counts about 650 members. It publishes a bi-monthly bulletin, and offers its members information on real estate management.

Meanwhile, if you decide to take the opportunity to "start from scratch" when moving and buy that furniture or stereo system you've had your eye on for months, make sure you keep all proofs of purchase and, above all, add these new purchases to your inventory.

It's important to check with your insurer that the coverage in your insurance contract corresponds to the true value of the property you own. This is a simple procedure,

but it greatly facilitates settlement of your claim should you suffer a loss.

If you have access to your new home before moving day, to do some repair work or painting, or to move some items in ahead of time, make sure that your home insurance contract covers your personal effects in both locations: the dwelling you currently occupy as well as the one you are moving into.

 GFCI was known to trip for no apparent reason. As you can imagine, this made them undesirable for a refrigerator or freezer. The GFCIs manufactured today are much more reliable, but the reputation remains and so they are not recommended for critical appliances. The only option available in this case is to individually ground

these outlets by either running a ground wire to an appropriate ground (should only be done by an electrician) or replacing the cable entirely.

• A personal computer must have a dedicated ground to operate properly. A GFCI is not sufficient.

Extensive renovations and updating over the past few years make this a "must see" property. With approximately 2,900 square feet divided into comfortable office units over 3 floors, this property is offered for sale at \$239,000. This has to be better than paying rent. Exterior parking for 9 cars is an added bonus.

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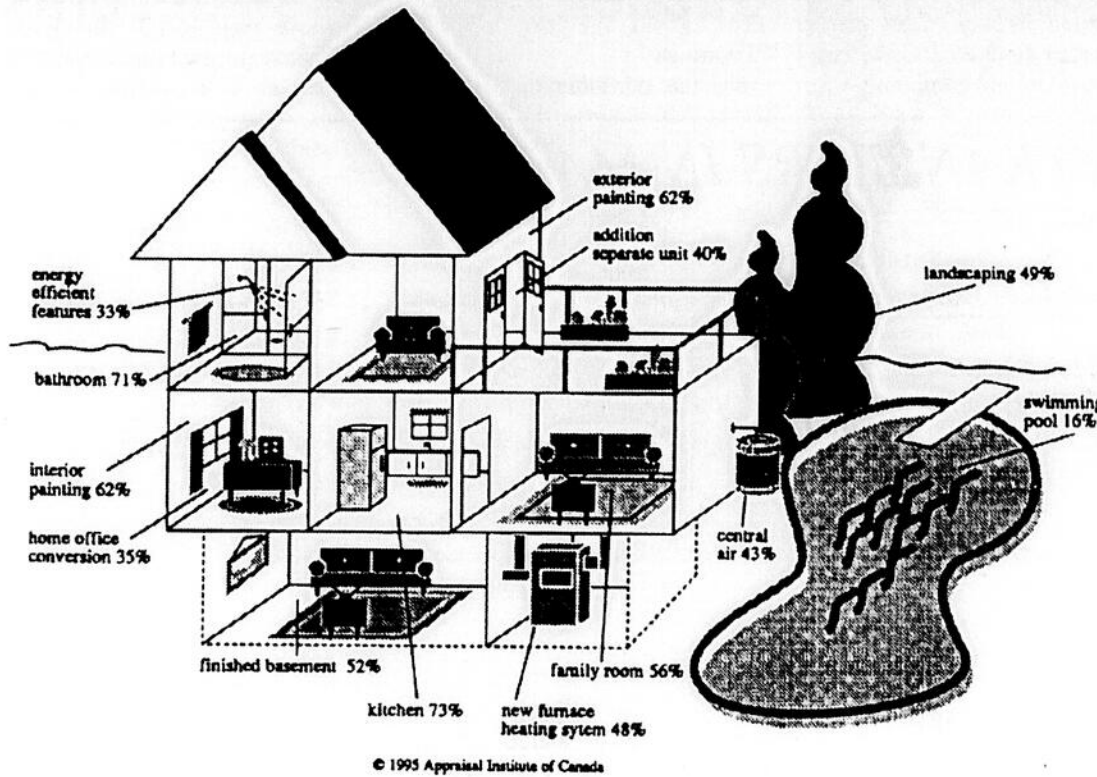
Kitchens and bathrooms top the list of renovation projects with the highest potential to add or maintain value in a home in Canada, according to the results of the 1995 Renovations and Home Value Survey conducted by the Appraisal Institute of Canada.

Member appraisers surveyed across Canada listed the "top 10" home renovation projects in order of their potential to enhance value: kitchen; bathroom; interior painting; finished basement; exterior painting; main floor family room addition; new furnace or heating system; landscaping; addition of separate living unit; and energy efficient features.

Slower market

Average "payback" in terms of dollars returned at time of sale ranged from a low of 16 per cent for the addition of a swimming pool to a high 73 per cent for a quality kitchen renovation, according to the appraisers.

In today's slow real estate market, however, the appraisers cautioned, the wise homeowner renovates to maintain the appearance of the house, not to add luxury features.

"Anything you do to the house should be to maintain its value, not to try to add to it," says Harold Moore of Fredericton, president of the Appraisal Institute. "From the perspective of the purchaser, anything that needs fixing in a house

is going to be a cost to them." "I would say that in this market, your goal should be to have a house that is spanking clean with no signs of outstanding repairs. That's the smart thing to do," adds appraiser Susan Hubbard of

Toronto.

Homeowners who are planning to sell in the future, or who want their house to remain competitive in the market should they have to sell, are advised to look at the cosmetics. "By the time a buyer gets

to your door they have already looked at the price and the neighbourhood. You want to have curb appeal to get them in the door, and you don't want to show them a lot of little things that need fixing."

The potential for landscaping to enhance value rose in this year's survey results, partly because it is seen as a cost by buyers, and partly due to Canadians' growing interest in gardening.

Although the home office trend is growing, the appraisers were lukewarm about the potential of renovations to add a home office. They advised that any renovation to create an office in the house should be very basic. Keep it flexible, so that when you sell, the buyer can change the room back to a bedroom or family room easily.

The appraisers differed in opinions on the role of energy efficient features across the country. In Central Canada, features such as new windows and doors were not seen to be as important as they were in the West.

Adding extra living space was seen as important in markets where houses are typically smaller, in the 1,200 to 1,400 square foot range.

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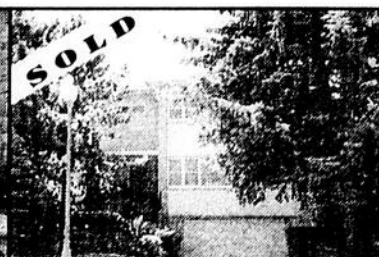

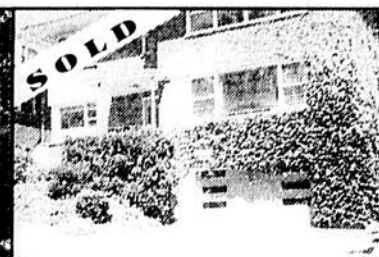

Prices, volume stay even in May real estate transfers

Prices of single- and two-family dwellings in the middle price

range continued to hold in Westmount in May of this year, at least when compared to the latest Montreal Urban Community valu-

ation roll, which saw valuations drop about 14 per cent in Westmount.
For the third month in a row

many transfers were registered at or above their MUC valuations, well above in some cases. Most of these were in the \$300,000 and

\$400,000 brackets. However, two homes valued at \$700,000 plus by the MUC, sold for about \$200,000 less than their valuations.

"That's what's happening at the high end of the market," local real estate appraiser Andy Dodge said.

The average price (45 Holton was excluded) was \$411,375. The typical price, reached by applying the average adjusted markup to the average price of a Westmount home (calculated by the city of Westmount to be \$521,300) was \$528,138, the highest figure it has been in some time.

While these mid-range sales looked good price-wise, Dodge cautioned that these are spring sales, when there are more buyers in the market.

Otherwise it was a typical May in terms of volume. There were 17 single- and two-family dwellings transferred in May 1995, compared to 18 in May 1994, and 16 in May 1993. Also, three condominiums changed hands.

The highest priced transfer was 4299 Montrose, which sold for \$1,055,000 or just slightly less (about one per cent) than its MUC valuation of \$1,066,900.

Some do's and don'ts of recycling program in Westmount

Part of Westmount's attractiveness to potential home-buyers may be its reputation as a leader in Montreal the area of environmental protection.

Services available in Westmount

include subsidized composters, household hazardous waste collection, community gardens, leaf collection, and CFC collection.

There is also the city's advanced recycling program. Curbside col-

lection of paper, cardboard, glass, metal and plastic is available to all Westmount residents.

The program is easy to follow by observing a few simple rules.

For residences up to eight units, blue boxes should be placed behind the sidewalk every

Wednesday by 8 a.m.

For buildings with nine or more units, tenants may bring materials at any time to the blue and orange bins in or next to their building. Collection is on Wednesday.

• Keep paper and cardboard (newspapers, magazines, fine

paper, envelopes, flat or corrugated cardboard) dry; tie in bundles or put into paper bags; flatten boxes.

Do not include food-contaminated paper and cardboard (e.g. pizza boxes); paper towels and tissues; disposable diapers.

• Rinse glass (bottles and jars in clear and coloured glass); do not include lids. Do not include light bulbs, window panes, crystal, mirrors, porcelain, china or ceramics.

• Rinse metal (cans made of aluminum and tin; aluminum pans and pie plates). Do not include lids. Do not include aluminum foil; toys or appliances.

• Rinse plastic (food and drink containers; detergent and shampoo bottles; milk or juice cartons); do not include lids. Do not include plastic bags; cellophane, toys or appliances.

• Bring batteries and used clothing to Westmount Depots.

Leave batteries (carbon, alkaline, lithium [button batteries] and NiCad) in yellow box at Corporation Yard, Arena or Stanton St. Fire Station. Do not include car batteries (bring to household hazardous waste collection).

• Leave used clothing (clothing, rags and leather items in any condition) in containers at Corporation Yard or across from Westmount Arena. Virtually everything is accepted. If in doubt, phone City Hall or pick up a list.

Keep materials clean and sorted to ensure they will be accepted by the collector. If you have not received a blue box or a blue bag, please phone Public Works at 989-5268.

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Dig's artifacts offer tool to teach history, Westmount archeologist says

 site of Leach-Hall House. All training and equipment is provided. "You don't have to be Hercules," says Elliott, adding that even if someone has bad knees, there's always something to do.

Elliott says the chances are excellent that excavators will find something. "You can see exactly where the house was," she said,

adding that the site lies in an open field. "It's not a complicated process." Archeologists will be relocating the foundations and any artifacts as well as trying to get an idea of the lifestyle of the day.

While they know who owned the house, what isn't known is how or why Archdeacon William Turnbull Leach, also a lawyer, managed to build the then luxurious home.

The house was built on what was still farmland in Montreal West in the beginning of the last century, so it also isn't known if the house was Leach's main or country home. In 1917, the property was sold and the residence became Hall Florists with adjacent greenhouses connected by a tunnel to the shop. Since 1968, the property has belonged to the Protestant

School Board. The project is an integrated component of the museum's educational program and is funded by the Ministry of Culture of Quebec and Montreal West to the tune of \$25,000.

Unlike most archeological digs, this one is right in our backyard, says Elliott, giving the public a chance to see for themselves what many only read about.

Hopes are that the project will be allowed to continue next year.

Any artifacts found remain the property of the PSBGM, but some may go on display at Montreal West town hall or go to Quebec for preservation.

Elliott is enthusiastic about archeological action on the local scene, especially as Montreal hasn't had a public dig since 1992 when the city closed the Old Montreal sites, which had gotten an "overwhelming response."

"If City of Westmount wanted a dig, I'd be more than happy to do it," she said, when asked about what might lie under the city. "I'm sure there's tons of stuff under Westmount."

Hochelaga, a precursor to Montreal, is thought to have been in what is now Westmount. However, many artifacts may have been lost due to development.

may marginalize what is now the Victoria village residential sector.

2. Fire trucks will add noise to the area — not necessarily from sirens but just from the moving trucks themselves.
3. There is still the possibility, although remote, that the land could be sold by CP and be used for a small townhouse development which would increase the housing stock in that neighbourhood thereby maintaining the single-family residential character.
4. Even with the city's architectural review, private developers may not be as sensitive to the architectural integrity of the neighbourhood.

Should the residents and the city decide to build the protective services facility on the Westmount Station site, there are two things that I would undertake to lighten the impact on the immediate area. Firstly, I would certainly demand that City Council exclude the municipal court from the complex, thereby removing some of the additional traffic and potential parking problems. Secondly, if a cut is made in the median at Grosvenor and St. Catherine, I would ask that we restrict use of this passage to emergency vehicles so that we do not increase the volume of general traffic on that street.

As debate on the issue continues, there are factors that could preclude any relocation of protective service facilities to the Westmount Station site. They are the sale of the Stanton Street site and the purchase of the Westmount Station site, both at acceptable prices. However, as these points remain unresolved, it is prudent to continue debate on the topic, assuming that these factors will not be impediments.

This is a tough issue for all of us who live in this area. I hope you will consider all of the factors and make your desires known to me or express them through the zoning procedure available to you. I will listen and be guided by them.

Hounds, horses and cocktails

Lake of Two Mountains hunter trials draw Westmounters

An out-of-town event that is a highlight of the social season for many Westmounters — and their horses — takes place this Sunday when the 1995 Lake of Two Mountains Hunter Trials get under way at the Peggy Jacobsen Field at Harwood Farm in St. Lazare.

Westmounter Eric Jacobsen, who has been riding for 72 of his 77 years, will be field master in the event.

There will be a demonstration of carriage horses, ponies and large farm horses. Spectators will be invited to participate in the traditional picnic contest and the ladies hat contest.

"It's like a glorious outdoor cocktail party," says Jacobsen, who splits his time between the farm and his Westmount home.

The day starts with the Captain Adam Trophy for teams of three young riders. The class is open to young riders representing their hunt, stable, pony club or family.

The show continues with the members of the Lake of Two Mountains Hunt team and visiting hunts competing individually, in pairs, and in teams of three over fixed obstacles.

The highlight of the day, says Jacobsen, is expected to be the parade of hounds followed by members of the hunt in their traditional hunt attire. The horses and riders will follow the hounds at full cry over the jumps, carrying out a tradition established in Canada since the arrival of the United Empire Loyalists after the American Revolution.

Unlike their predecessors, the hounds won't be following a fox, said Jacobsen, who says hunts now use fox scent instead.

"The pleasure is in the chase," he said, adding that "even humans know that it's much more fun to chase a girl than to catch her."

Hounds hunt the line of the drag by smell.

As for the parade of the hounds, six hounds from the pack will be

paraded and spectators will be asked to test their judging skills by rating the hounds. The person coming closest to the official judges' order will be awarded the prize.

Entry forms can be filed on the day of the trials, Jacobsen says, however any club planning to compete must advise the organizer immediately.

Rules of the LTMH stipulate that competitors over their Hunter

Farce squared equals good fun in Centaur Theatre's Noises Off

The world of farce is a comforting place to be. The child in us responds to the horseplay, the physicality, while the adult is amused by the absurdity, titillated by the marital infidelities which dominate the modern version of the genre. For the ideal farce,

think of a talking Chaplin or Keaton caught in a cheating spouse's bedroom...with a dog under the bed, and you're ready to go.

British playwright Michael Frayn's *Noises Off*, a critical and popular success first produced in the early '80s, is a farce that easily amuses for its entire two and a

quarter hours. A hilarious parody of the theatrical scene, it uses a clever scenic device in Act 2, reversing the set so we see the backstage action. The play provides an eminently comfortable world for theatre patrons wishing to forget their daily woes — while still managing to satisfy an itch for a little more.

As Goliath Productions, a small local company working with young actors has risen to the heady logistical/technical if not the stylistic challenges of *Noises Off*, which depicts the staging of a vacuous farce entitled (not sur-

herself in her employers' house while they supposedly hide out (from the tax collectors) in Spain, the typical farce fare unfolds around her. Mismatched entrances, the constant slamming of doors, a half-naked woman in

prisingly) "Nothing On." Frayn's play is tightly written; from the first act, a dress rehearsal to the backstage second act and the degenerative finale. The Goliath cast and director Jeremy Hechtman, especially rise to the challenge in the difficult second act, where the actors' personal jealousies have them playing out a backstage drama far more interesting than the "onstage" one.

One of *Noises Off*'s strengths is its innocence, despite its being a critique of a dramatic genre. At its centre is Dotty Otley (played with finesse by comedian Janis Kirshner), a slipper-clad domestic who needs nothing more than a plate of sardines and a colour telly to make her day. As Dotty (Mrs. Clackett in *Nothing On*) amuses

high-high nylons... don't faze the absent-minded but emotionally-grounded Dotty, nor any of her fellow characters, of whom the smooth taxman Roger Tramplemain (Stephen Beauregard) and the spirited Flavia Brent (Alison Muir) are the most interesting.

Compare *Noises Off*, however, with a script like Woody Allen's *Bullets Over Broadway*, a satirical send-up of Broadway theatre, and you start to see where Frayn came up short. His attempt to go beyond creating artful dualities between the "off" and "on" plays is obvious in Act One, where the lordly director Lloyd Dallas (Antoine Duchastel de Montrouge) pontificates one minute and pops Valium the next. But the final scene, where the results of the backstage mayhem are seen in their entirety from the front of the floodlights, doesn't quite manage to tie up the initial premises, on a serious level or on an artistic one.

Add to this Hechtman's uneven direction, as evidenced, for example, by Dallas's overacting and by Westmounter Tommy Schnurmacher's more clueless than elderly performance as Selsdon Mowbray, the golden-age thief of *Nothing On*. While Muir and Beauregard turn in lively performances, the problems with the minor characters take some important wind out of the Goliath Production sails.

Still, if you're in the mood for some non-challenging fun, *Noises Off* is a good bet. Still sliding out of light summer theatre mode myself, I'll give it a cheery thumbs-up.

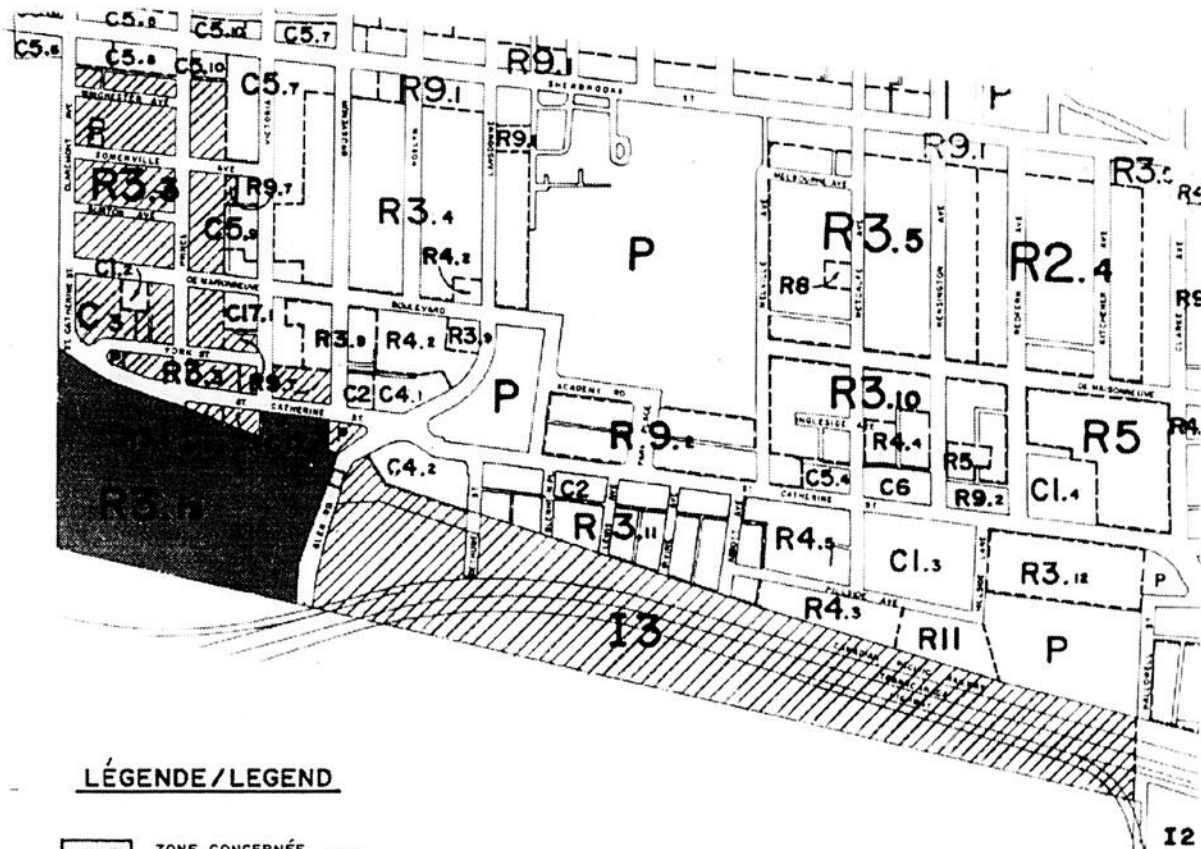

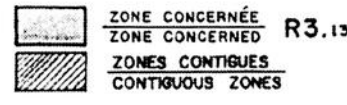

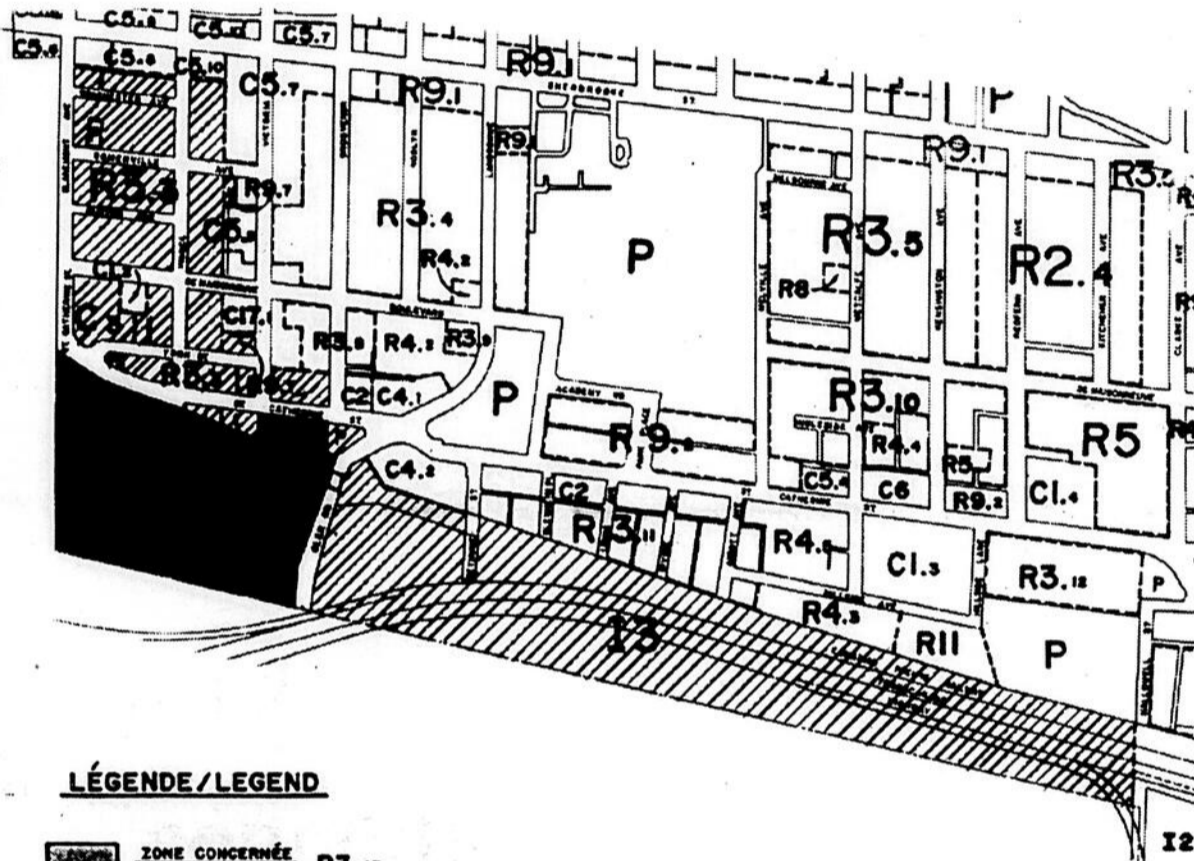
