A permanent Committee of citizens to defend the Fenians has been formed in Portland, Me.

Representative Ladd (Greenbacker) of Maine, is quoted as saying that Eugene Hale will be elected United States Senator from that State.

An Armenian journal publishes an account of a sanguinary fight between the inhabitants of a village in Turkish Armenia and some Turkish troops. The Russian Consul at Van has gone to the scene of the disturbance.

The marriage of the Crown Prince Rudolph of Austria with the Princess Stephanie of Belgium, which was fixed for February, has been postponed until warmer weather, out of consideration for the state of the bride's health.

The present attitude of Guatemala toward America and Americans is cordial in the extreme, and the desire is openly expressed to establish the most intimate social and commercial relations with the United States. Conditional arrangements have been made to form a strong American company, including prominent business men of San Francisco, to carry out the enterprise of the Guatemala Central Railroad. This involves the completion of the road from Escuintla to Guatemala City. The Government has granted a subsidy of \$125,000 per annum for twenty-five years, and has given \$500,000 in advance to hasten the work.

THE SEIZURE OF GOODS. Mr. Casey, M.P., made a request in Parliament Thursday last for a statement respecting all seizures of goods by the Customs authorities since the introduction of the existing tariff. When these papers are brought down they should contain every detail connected with the seizures, otherwise they will be useless. The course of the Department of Trade has been most unjustifiable, and it has been half as well elsewhere. Mr. Casey will deserve the least thanks of the mercantile men of the Dominion in demanding this information. In Montreal it has simply been monstrous to be obliged to submit to the high-handed and imperious course which has generally been adopted in treating the involved value of goods and their passage from bond. We know of cases which would not be tolerated were it not that legal proceedings cause delay and operate injuriously to the importer. But it is not a fact that the grievances complained of are the result of incompetent Appraisers or over-zealous Collectors. Not at all. The whole trouble is in Ottawa where they seem to appreciate nothing but the essence of red tape; and the quality of that article has been much enhanced by the recent appointment of the gentlemen who are styled "Dominion Appraisers," all of whom, we may add, are not sufficiently experienced in their respective departments to efficiently supervise the local officers. It will not come Mr. Mackenzie Bowell because he admits that the Customs Department is difficult to manage. If the Minister finds his portfolio too heavy for him he ought to give it up. So far as the commercial capital is concerned, the complaints of the trade have been so numerous that we are astonished some steps have not been taken to protest against the system of treatment. It is referred to last Mr. Bowell, in his explanation to the House, speak of the

honest importer. Montreal merchants have been treated as though there were none known in the community. But we must not blame the Minister altogether. The Commission would be the passage of Job, as it seems to be the first duty of that functionary to give all the annoyance he can, and it is in that branch of the Customs service where, we believe, all the trouble arises.
