Shawville Council Authorizes Sewerage And Water Survey

Shawville Council met on Friday, February 6 at a special meeting at Hynes Hall. Present Deputy Mayor Orla Young and Councillors Black, McTiernan, Dale, M. Hodgins and Armitage. Purpose of the meeting was a survey of the Village of Shawville, and firemen's meeting.

Mr. Les Richards of J. L. Richards and Associates Ltd., of Ottawa, met with Council and outlined the necessary procedure to be taken towards the survey. Motion Councillors Armitage and Dale that J. L. Richards & Associates be authorized to make a complete survey and to prepare a report on the Shawville sewerage problem. This report to include an aerial survey, study of the sewerage alternatives, and a recommended treatment plant, complete cost estimates figures, plus an examination of the water works, all to be supplied at a cost of \$1,000.

Kurt Luneburg Stricken In Church

Mr. Kurt Luneburg died Tuesday morning. He was attending a meeting of the Ottawa Presbytery United Church Ottawa.

In Clarendon his churches were four but his friends were legion. His smile and friendly handshake had become, in the short span of two and a half years, a part of the local scene, and will be sorely missed.

Preaching as a lay minister at Yarm, Wesley, Radford and St. Matthew United Churches, Mr. Luneburg has brought an energetic approach to his charge and organized a men's group without parallel in the area.

Mr. Luneburg had been in hospital for some time following a serious car accident last year. He underwent a brain operation during the summer but was recovering and had been living at the manse at Yarm.

He was a former elder of Chalmers United Church and was active in church and boys' work in Ottawa.

Mr. Luneburg had been sitting in one of the pews about halfway back in the church when he slumped and fell to the floor. He was taken to hospital and was dead on arrival.

Rev. Dr. Charles D. Donald, of Southminster Church, told the Presbytery that Mr. Luneburg was dead. He spoke of the work which Mr. Luneburg had done for the church and led in a prayer for him.

Surviving are his wife, Frances, whom Mr. Luneburg married at Farnham, Que., two sons, Terry and Rodney, both of Ottawa and a daughter, Mrs. R. W. (Sheila) Whitehead of Niagara Falls, Ont.

This Gun Will Travel Feb. 28

Last summer Capt. Winslow was approached towards obtaining a memorial gun for the Veterans' Park to take the place of one turned in during the last Great War for its metal. He agreed but requested that the request be official from the Town Council. This was done and he received a letter from the secretary to this effect dated September 20, 1958.

On receipt of this authority Capt. Winslow immediately wrote the Minister of Defence, making a request on behalf of this town. General Peakes was most kind and, appreciating the loyalty of the people of Shawville, immediately put the wheel in motion towards fulfilling this request, which was advised by his executive assistant in his letter of the 21st Oct. last.

The Minister then advised on November the 12th by letter stating that a 25 pounder would be available at some future time and that he would have it earmarked for Shawville as a gift, to be placed in the Memorial Park. He also advised that any movement of the gun would be the responsibility of the town. This information was immediately passed on to the Council who agreed to see to the transportation when it was made available.

On January 30th, 1959 Capt. Winslow again wrote the Minister regarding the gun and advised that the Council would see to the transportation when it was ready. He received a copy of a letter addressed to His Worship, the Mayor, dated February 3rd that the 25 Pounder would be available on February 28th of this year and would be at the 30th Field Regiment at that time, in Ottawa, under the command of Lieut. Col. H. T. Vergette. Winslow immediately wrote the Honourable Minister, thanking him for his courtesy and advised this would be picked up by someone authorized by our local Council.

Following a rash of break-ins over the past few months in Shawville, and expressed dissatisfaction with the lack of results obtained by the QPP Detachment in Campbell's Bay, a detective from the QPP in Montreal has been brought in from Montreal. Detective Lorne Mousseau, QPP Montreal, who arrived in Pontiac last Friday, is devoting full

time to the study of the series of break-ins in Shawville over the past few months. Since his arrival here, three persons have been taken into custody for questioning. Two of these were released without being charged, and as this paper goes to press, the third is still being held, but will be eligible for release, or must, alternatively, be charged late today.

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SAFE DRIVING ON HIGHWAY 8

As a consequence of recent editorials on the subject of Highway No. 8 the suggestion has been made by several people that we are saying that the plowmen are not doing a good job. We repeat here that this is not our point, and never has been. We believe that the plowmen are doing an excellent job of snow removal from Highway No. 8, and are doing a virtually superhuman job of keeping the side roads open. This is not a startling revelation. Everyone knows it, but some, apparently, think we don't.

Our concern in the matter of Highway 8 has been to co-ordinate the dissatisfaction now felt by almost all users of the highway in such a way that necessary changes can be brought about and so make the highway safe for winter use.

Parts of No. 8 have from time to time this year been kept free of snow and ice. Other parts have been kept free of snow. But at no time has there been a consistently SAFE road along the length of Highway 8 into Aylmer. The trouble is the ice. There have been sporadic efforts made to remove it by the application of calcium. For each of these efforts the driving public is truly grateful, and we echo that feeling here. But much more than sporadic efforts are needed. What we look for is a highway which will be kept clear of snow AND ICE during the winter months. It is just as important to most users of the highway to have safe driving as it is to have driving at all. We do not have safe driving consistently along No. 8 and for this reason we are advocating that a concerted effort be made to have the province take over its winter maintenance. The province will not do a significantly better job of snow removal, but we are quite sure it will provide safe driving consistently throughout the length of the highway.

We have a gratifying response to our request that readers sign the petition we printed in this connection a couple of weeks ago. It is important however to have the maximum number of signatures possible before taking action. For this reason we are reprinting the petition, and ask everyone who has not already signed one, and who agrees with the wording of the petition, to now sign and return same to us.

We are in favour of the provincial government taking over the winter maintenance of Highway No. 8 throughout its length in Pontiac County and in Gatineau County from the border of Pontiac County to Aylmer and ensuring the safe driving condition of this highway at all times.

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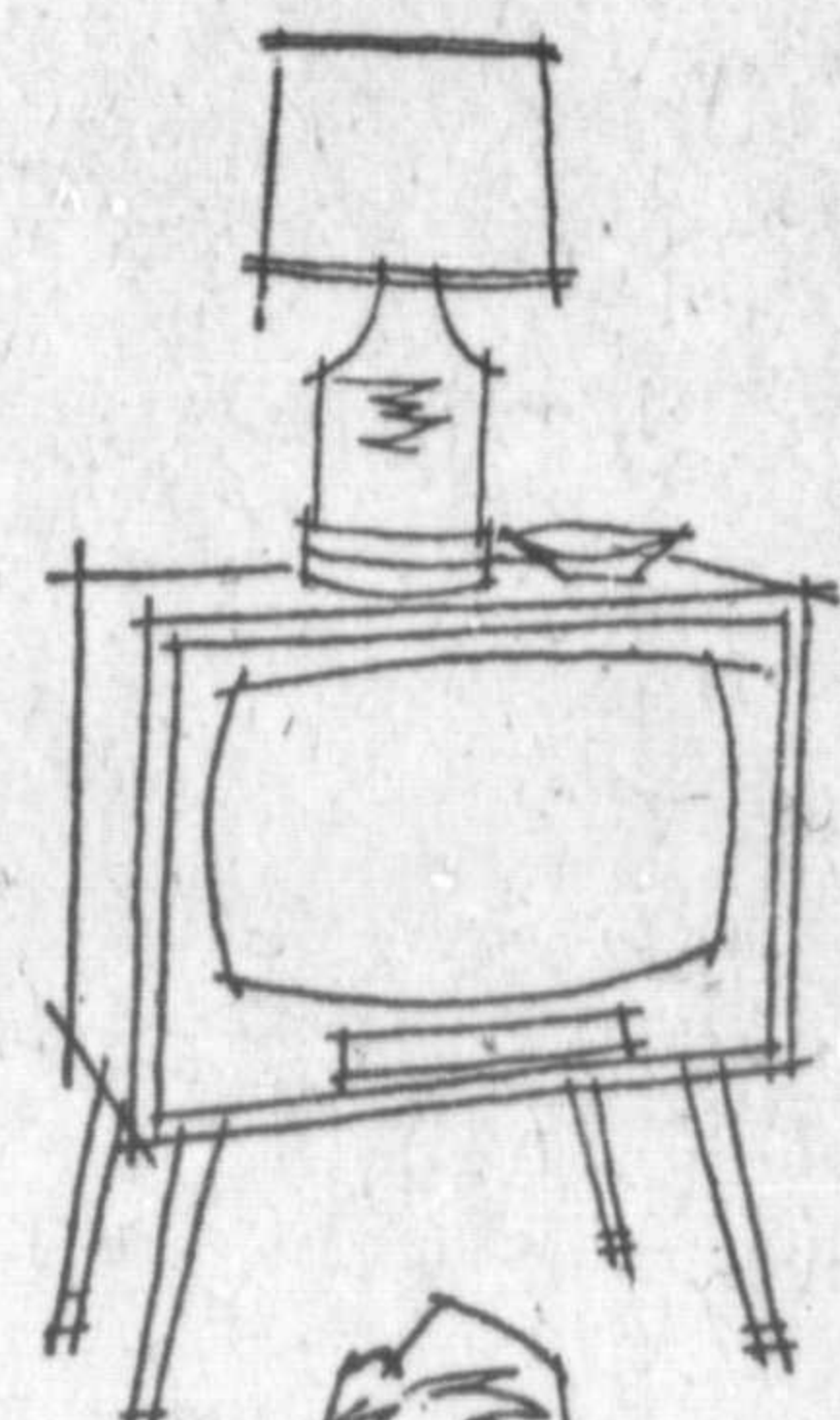
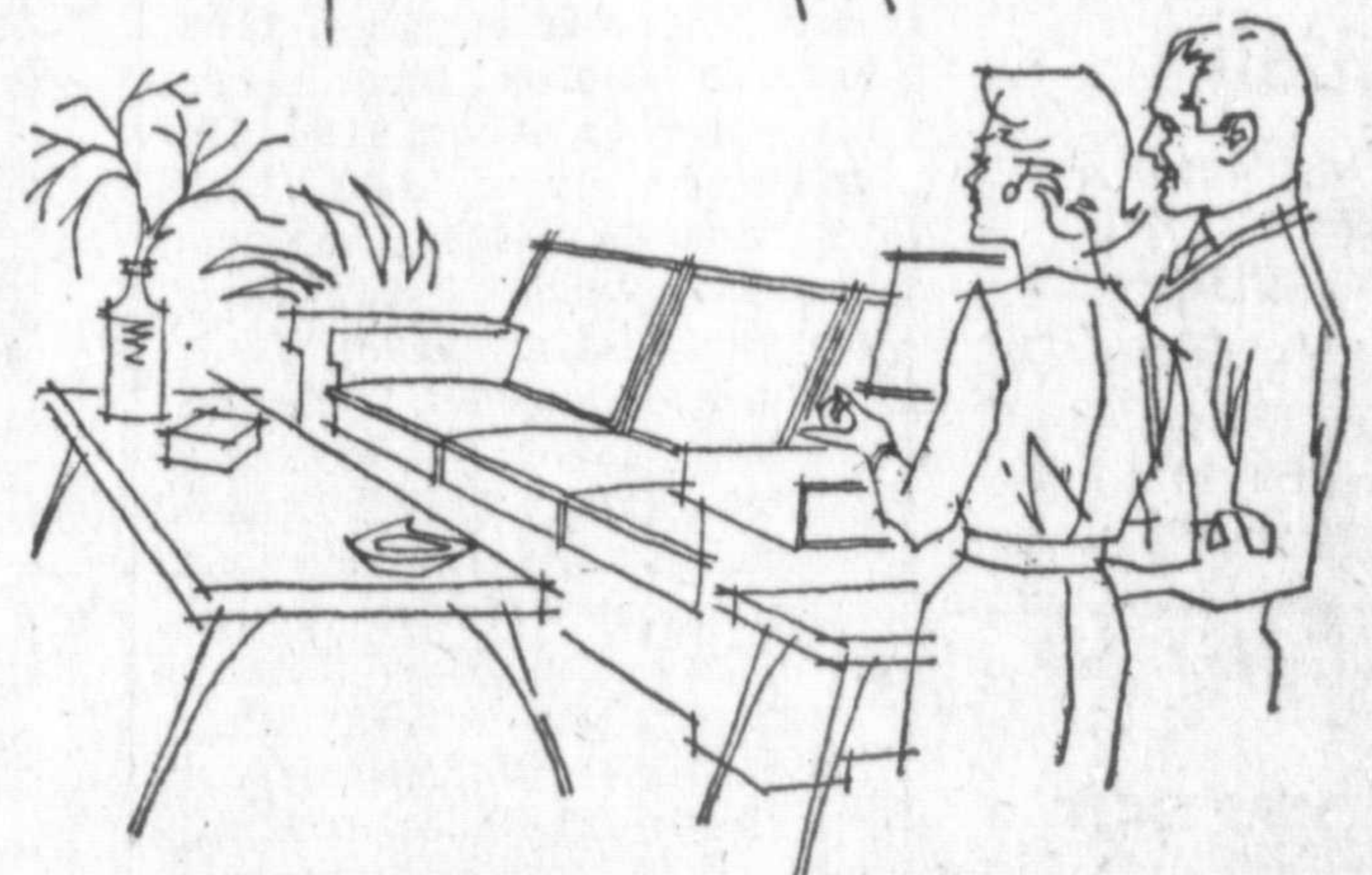
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"Dirty Work At The Crossroads" Ablly Presented By S. H. S.

The Shawville High School presentation early this week of "Dirty Work at the Crossroads" provided two night's entertainment for large audiences and many months of enjoyment for a number of students who took part.

The scenery for the play was designed by Mr. Blair Brown and gets first mention here because it was the most outstandingly successful part of the production. Bill Campbell and Benson Elliott added sound effects which, as the program stated, were the "greatest ever seen on any stage"—well, here anyway.

Mrs. Dorothy Lough Addresses Coulonge W.I.

Fort Coulonge—At the regular monthly (Feb.) meeting of the Fort Coulonge Women's Institute held at the home of Mrs. Geo. E. Colton. Guest speaker was Mrs. Dorothy Lough, R. N.

Nurse Lough is on the staff of the Pontiac Health Clinic, established in Fort Coulonge in 1943. Dr. H. Rabb also of Fort Coulonge is in charge of the clinic.

National Medical Health Week, sponsored annually by the Health League of Canada, now in vogue is celebrating its 15th year. Facts and figures disclosed by the speaker in their general routine of service to the public, to encourage early ground methods of the clinic towards promotion of a healthy Canada was intelligently narrated.

Quoting a few extracts from her address—

No Public Health Program can hope for success unless it at first wins the confidence and support of the beneficiaries."

"Unfortunately adults of the present generation received very little advice on health education, in elementary schools.

"Scientific knowledge is limited, and ideas relative hygiene are peculiar in some respects, and more or less guided by or on superstition, tradition or fiction pure and simple.

"Adults are slow to accept modern ideas, still set in their habitual way of living, not an easy task to alter their established prejudices.

"Our job is to penetrate and break down these ideas of long ago, visit homes and schools in the community and stress the importance of Child Training in early years and live in accordance with the rules of hygiene and prepare the younger growing generation for Healthful Living"

Under order of business 'Current Events' an address prepared by Mrs. E. G. MacDonald was read by Mrs. H. Rabb, in the absence (unavoidable) of original listed speaker. The paper was titled, "Looking Ahead" and here "The Push Button Era" and space travel was predominant and possibly could happen here someday.

In this age says the speaker of "Population Soaring", "Time and distance are shrinking", living standards higher, good health and longer life, Country more educational minded, and the ultra modern "short cuts" in electrical devices about the household, anything might happen. We might meet up with the situation, already asked about. Our house wife as we know her today (might be out of a job); where will they fit in? These and other interesting hard to believe facts were brought to the attention of the meeting in Mrs. MacDonald's address.

Mrs. Ira Whelan, President was in charge of meeting and thanked the speakers for their very interesting and timely remarks.

The food table sale in charge of Mrs. W. E. Sharpe, convenor was in operation. Meeting closed and refreshments were served by hostess.

Bryson Native Alex MacLean Passes At Haileybury

Haileybury — One of the grand old men of the north country, Alex MacLean of Haileybury died suddenly Friday night. Mr MacLean was attending the weekly meeting of the Haileybury Chess Club. Playing against George Hamilton, a mining student, he collapsed across the board and died within a few minutes. Cause of death was not immediately determined but he had complained of heartburn a few minutes before dying.

Dr. W. C. Arnold, an old friend and fellow chess player, was summoned, but Mr. MacLean was dead when he arrived. He was in his 79th year and had been in business in Haileybury for 52 years. Mr. MacLean was still actively engaged in his photographic business and was generally regarded as the dean of northern photographers. He was famous for the quality of his landscapes while in the field of portraiture he had commissions from many parts of the United States as well as every province in Canada. He was born in Bryson, Que., where his father operated a furniture factory. It was there that he gained his early skill at woodworking, which was reflected in later years when he constructed many of his own cameras down to the last part except the lens.

The exceptional quality of his work was drawn to the attention of the Canadian Pacific Railway which engaged him in 1903 to take photographs throughout the west. One of the greatest regrets of his life was that the 1922 fire destroyed his collection of early photographs.

Mr. MacLean was one of the first travelling photographers and later established a business at Buckingham, Que. He came north to Haileybury in 1907 and for many years also ran a second business in Cobalt.

Through the years he was engaged by nearly every important mining company in the Cobalt, Kirkland Lake, Timmins Noranda camps to take photographs of the underground and surface installations. He also had many connections in the Temagami area, where he photographed some of his most outstanding landscapes. Mr MacLean developed a technique of coloring photographs with oils which won wide acclaim prior to development of color photography.

One of his proudest memories was photographing the Prince of Wales at the O'Brien mine in Cobalt in 1919. The photograph was chosen by the Prince as his favorite of his Canadian tour and hung at the Wembley Exposition.

As well as operating his photographic business Mr. MacLean ran one of the largest music stores in the north from 1912 until 1922 when he lost some \$20,000 in equipment and supplies in the fire that swept Haileybury.

He was a keen stamp and coin collector but was particularly well known as a chess player. In past years he was recognized as an outstanding player in the north and when the Haileybury Chess Club was recently reorganized, he was elected treasurer. He was also a charter member of the Haileybury Rotary Club.

Mr. MacLean was married to the former Ann Huntington who survives, a daughter Joyce MacLean in Hamilton, two brothers, George MacLean, Campbell's Bay, Que., and Archie MacLean, Rockton, Ont. Two sisters, Mrs. Wm MacFarlane Whithy and Mrs Grant Guest of Galt, Ont.

The funeral took place Monday. Interment in United Church Cemetery, Haileybury.

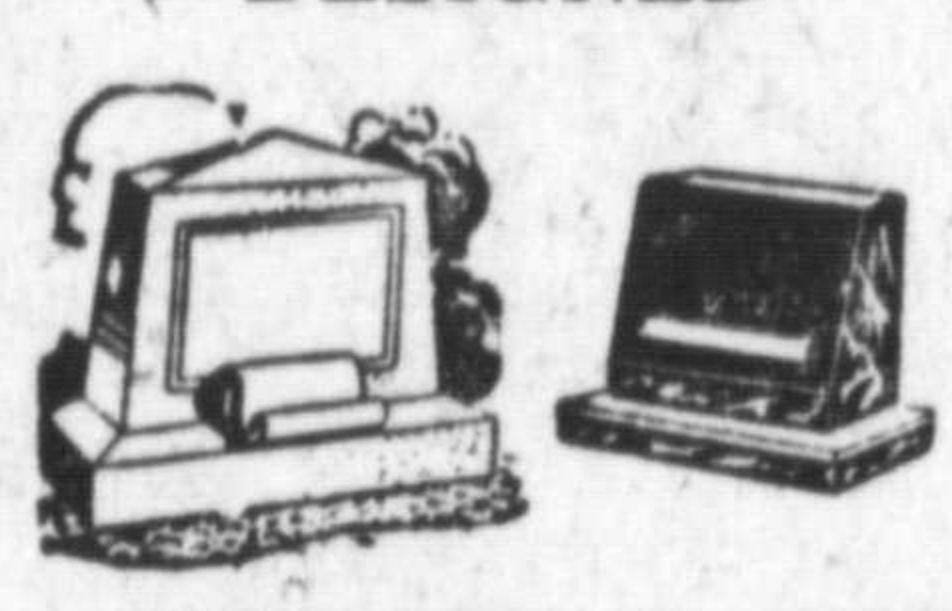
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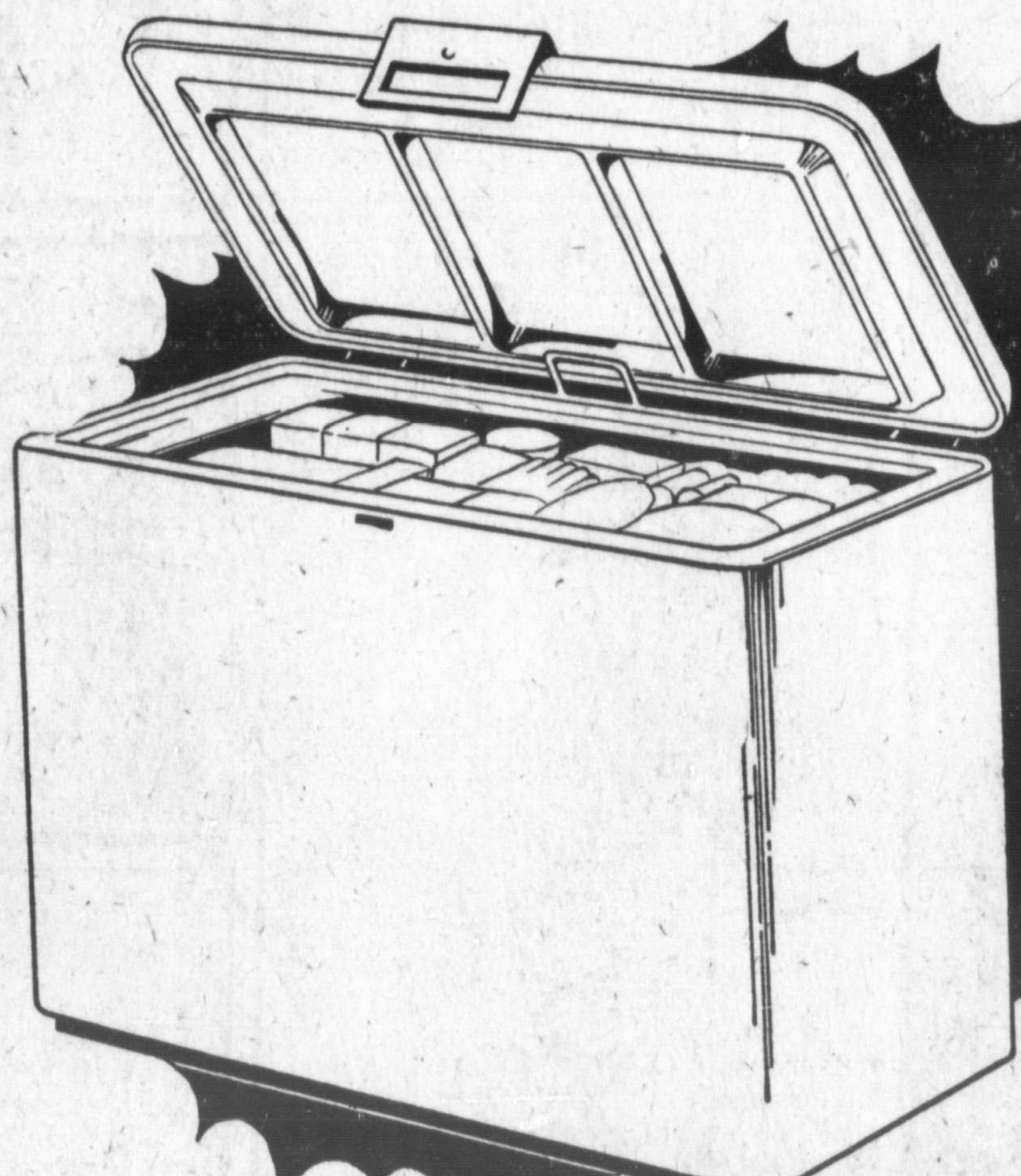
