Student loan statistics disclosed

OTTAWA (CP) — The default rate on loans under the Canada student loans plan is about four per cent, amounting to about \$5.4 million on the \$135 million in loans now due to be repaid, a finance department source said today.

More than \$300 million in loans has been made since the Canadian plan's inception in 1964. During that time, however, the federal government has only had to make good about \$5 million in loans it was unable eventually to collect.

The student loans program provides for government-guaranteed bank loans to students who need funds to continue full-time studies beyond the secondary school level.

The loans are interest-free to the students during full-time study and for six months afterwards. The loans are then repayable over a period of 9½ years and borrowers must pay interest during that time.

Loans may be authorized by

provincial authorities up to \$1,000 a student during each academic year with a maximum loan of \$5,000 for a student's entire post-secondary education.

If, during the six months after his studies are completed, a student with such a loan does not make arrangement with the bank for its repayment or provide proof that he is back in university, the loan goes technically into default, at the end of six months.

The bank then allows about three months to arrange for the repayment of the loan, but if it is unsuccessful after making the necessary effort, it may make a claim on the government.

The government will pay the claim and turn the account over to a collection agency. If the borrower is found to be gainfully employed and yet refuses to co-operate, the government may take legal action against him. Otherwise the government bides its time until the borrower takes a job.

Soviets present world disarmament proposal to UN

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The Soviet Union has handed the United Nations a proposal for a world disarmament conference which would include China and all other countries whether UN members or not.

In a memorandum made public Wednesday, Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko urged that the forthcoming General Assembly take the necessary steps to convene the conference.

Gromyko said "all countries of the world without exception" should take part.

The proposal is similar to one approved by the assembly in 1964 endorsing the idea of a world disarmament conference and calling for creation of a preparatory committee to make the arrangement. The plan was permitted to die after the Chinese government announced it would not participate. It had been approved unanimously.

Gromyko noted that limited disarmament agreements that have been reached during recent years, but he added: "Fundamental progress toward the dangerous practice of stockpiling and improving armaments has yet to be made."

He coupled the world disarmament proposal with an earlier Soviet initiative for a conference of the five nuclear powers, which he described as "the most realistic approach" to nuclear disarmament.

"At the same time," he said, "the course of events on the international scene makes it desirable to encourage more active efforts on the part of all countries in the world, both nuclear and non-nuclear, to solve the problems relating to disarmament."



Loubier not impressed

QUEBEC (CP) — If Marcel Masse confines his complaints about the Union Nationale to public gloom rather than constructive criticism in caucus, it might be better if he chose another party, UN leader Gabriel Loubier said in an interview published today.

Mr. Loubier was commenting on recent statements by Mr. Masse that the Union Nationale had no chance of surviving in Quebec unless it acquired a new perception of today's problems and created a new credibility with Quebecers.

Mr. Masse, defeated by Mr. Loubier in a June bid for the party leadership, said the UN was overly concerned with organization rather than ideas and its only hope would be to branch out into a "third avenue" somewhere between nationalism and federalism.

"If the Union Nationale no longer represents a valuable democratic instrument to him and he has no faith in its regeneration, it would be better if he soon considered another personal choice," said Mr. Loubier.

Appointed president

QUEBEC (CP) — The appointment of Yvon Saindon as president of the Civil Service Commission was announced Wednesday by Premier Bourassa's office.

Mr. Saindon, originally from Rivière du Loup, Que., was previously director of recruitment and selection for the commission. He succeeds Jean Fournier who was recently named Quebec general delegate to London.

Will patch up Vianney

CHICOUTIMI, Que. (CP) — Revenue Minister Gerald Harvey says the Quebec government will spend more than \$3.5 million to shore up land around the crater caused by the May 4 landslide in nearby St. Jean Vianney.

The landslide struck the village as its residents were preparing for bed, killing 31 persons and swallowing 40 buildings. Mr. Harvey said in an interview Tuesday that the cabinet has authorized the construction of retaining walls along the crater's sides to prevent further landslides.

Tetley willing to change

QUEBEC (CP) — William Tetley, Quebec minister of financial institutions, said today he will change the makeup of the province's Consumer Protection Council if the council proves ineffective after a reasonable trial period.

Mr. Tetley told the legislature committee on financial institutions he feels the consumer's best interests will be protected by the council, set up to advise the minister on problems affecting consumers.

He was replying to criticisms that the 15-member council, of which seven members are from industry, would not have the interests of the consumer at heart.

Economic crisis

Opposition blasts Trudeau for anti-U.S. statements

OTTAWA (CP) — The government came under fire from opposite sides in the Commons Wednesday as opposition MPs alternately charged that the Trudeau administration has been too soft and too hard on the Americans.

Debating government reaction to new U.S. trade restrictions, Max Saltzman (NDP-Waterloo) said Canada has displayed cowardice in accepting the U.S. action with little more than a whimper.

On the other hand, Eldon Woolliams (PC-Calgary North) suggested that Canada might have received kinder consideration from Washington if Mr. Trudeau had refrained from kicking the U.S. in the shins at every opportunity.

The Commons was in its second day of debate on a government bill that would subsidize industrial plants hit by 10-per-cent import surcharges introduced Aug. 16. Exporting firms that qualify would receive grants to offset up to two-thirds of the surcharge.

Mr. Saltzman, New Democrat financial critic, introduced a motion that would refer the legislation to the Commons finance committee for more thorough study.

He urged that the committee be instructed to consider also the impact on farmers, fishermen and small businesses, rather than confining the subsidy program to manufacturers and processors. That part of the motion was ruled out of order.

The Commons debated the legislation for three hours Wednesday without reaching a vote on the Saltzman motion or the bill.

Earlier, Finance Minister E.J. Benson said that Canada would win exemption from the U.S. surcharges "in due course." He quickly added that other countries would also receive exemptions eventually when the surcharges are withdrawn.

But he said the U.S. is considering the Canadian argument "as being a quite different case." He was confident that the U.S. was giving serious consideration to the Canadian position.

Mr. Benson, speaking to reporters after the daily Commons question period, said talks are continuing between Canada and the U.S. and another meeting of officials has been scheduled. He would also be meeting Treasury Secretary John Connally at the forthcoming Group of 10 meeting in London.

In the debate, all opposition speakers agreed that the government subsidy bill was an in-

adequate response to the U.S. trade restrictions.

Mr. Saltzman called for a thorough examination of Canada's problems, is vague and is unlikely to help workers "a gigantic put-on."

Mr. Woolliams attacked the legislation as "a peanut program."

The government is trying to divert attention from the persistent unemployment in Canada, he said.

He attacked the government

Mr. Woolliams assailed the NDP demand for a tougher response, in particular a proposal Tuesday that Canada impose an export surtax on gas and oil needed by the U.S.

That would simply price Canadian petroleum products out of the U.S. market, he said.

"This winter we could have one million unemployed—the most serious situation since 1929."

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Commission says alcohol worse than marijuana

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal marijuana commission, still months away from its first formal report, is proceeding on the hypothesis that drunks are a far worse social problem than pot smokers.

"We do know this: the most severe ... abuse problem we've got in the United States is alcohol," says the commission executive director, Michael Sonnenreich.

"Does it (marijuana) turn you into a foaming maniac? No. Is it physically addicting? Well, all the indications we have right now is, no, it is not. We know that alcohol is. But that isn't the criterion of a danger. The danger is social impact."

"We know certain things about alcohol. We know about loss of time on the job, breakups of families, impact on our medical facilities. We know a greater range of the problems of alcoholism. Nobody's really tried to assess, effectively, the impact of marijuana."

Sonnenreich, former deputy general counsel in the justice department's bureau of narcotics and dangerous drugs, discussed in an interview the first seven months work of the national commission on marijuana and drug abuse, set up by Congress to recommend new laws as needed.

President Nixon has said he will ignore any recommendation to legalize marijuana use, but the commission chairman, Raymond P. Shafer, Republican former governor of Pennsylvania, says Nixon's views won't influence the commission.

In addition to holding public and closed hearings the 13-member commission has visited Holland, Belgium and Britain to study drug laws and leaves soon

for the Orient.

It has let contracts with pollsters to conduct a U.S.-wide survey of what 2,500 Americans think about marijuana. Other

researchers have contracted to study the medical effects of marijuana, the effects of jail terms on young pot smokers and other aspects of the problem.

Nixon will address Congress on economy

WASHINGTON (CP) — President Nixon makes an unusual appearance before the joint session of Congress today in an attempt to sell his proposals for jacking up the American economy.

Nixon's televised address will be only his third appearance before a joint session of the House of Representatives and the Senate. The other two were to deliver his State of the Union addresses.

As he prepared for his 12:30 p.m. EDT address, debated open in congress over the administration proposals, designed to get the economy moving.

The proposals, which call for income tax relief for individuals and an investment tax break for corporations are part of an over-all package announced Aug. 15 by Nixon.

The package also includes freeing the dollar from its international gold peg, a special duty on imports and a 90-day wage-price freeze.

Treasury Secretary John B. Connally went before the House ways and means committee Wednesday to explain Nixon's proposals to that tax-writing group, headed by powerful Wilbur D. Mills (Dem. Ark.).

Mills immediately called for more tax relief than the administration had proposed, saying that the economy needs some additional incentive for individuals to buy more.

But Connally said that Nixon's proposals, far from being a "bonanza for business" as charged by some, would mean a \$7-billion tax break for ordinary taxpayers.

He also said corporations would get a \$3.8-billion tax reduction through a tax credit for investment on equipment.

Connally said investment credit is "the key, the capstone of this whole (Nixon) program."

Commons roundup

Youth projects

OTTAWA (CP) — Quebec submitted the most projects and got the lion's share of the money under this summer's Opportunities - for - Youth program, the Commons was told Wednesday.

The information was in a written return by State Secretary Gerard Pelletier for Richard R. Southam (PC-Qu'Appelle-Moose Mountain). Figures provided were as of May 31.

They showed that Quebec youth submitted 4,276 projects, 3,474 were turned down, and the approved programs drew \$7,363,689 in federal grants.

Ontario was second with 3,276 projects submitted, 2,688 rejected and a grant total of \$4,627,904. Next was British Columbia with 943 submissions, 652 rejections and a grant total of \$1,280,025.

Only a regional grant breakdown was given for the rest of the country. Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick drew a total of \$2,552,586 and Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and the Northwest Territories collected \$3,558,990. Newfoundland youth submitted 205 projects and 153 were rejected. For Prince Edward Island the figures were 196 and 164, for Nova Scotia 662 and 553, for New Brunswick 471 and 404.

In the West, Manitoba submitted 539 projects and had 452 rejected, for Saskatchewan the figures were 214 and 109, for Alberta 503 and 363 and for the N.W.T. 18 and seven.

Mr. Pelletier was asked in the Commons when his department would make a final report on the program. He said he expected it would be about the beginning of October.

The program was set up to fund summer projects which the youths thought up and operated themselves.

OTTAWA (CP) — Quebec Premier Robert Bourassa's contention that the federal government should pay for all military costs during last fall's Quebec crisis will be studied in cabinet, Prime Minister Trudeau said Wednesday.

Mr. Trudeau was answering a reporter's question over his shoulder after he hustled out of the Commons question period.

Mr. Bourassa said in a letter to Mr. Trudeau made public last week that the Quebec FLQ crisis had been a national concern, and the cost of bringing the army to Quebec at the time should be a national expenditure.

Under the National Defence Act the federal government must send troops to a province if the provincial government requests them, but the onus is on the provincial government to pay the cost.

Bail

OTTAWA (CP) — The government hopes its revised bill on bail procedures will be proclaimed by next Jan. 1, Justice Minister John Turner told the Commons Wednesday.

He was replying to a question by John Gilbert (NDP-Toronto-Broadview), who noted that the bill was passed by Parliament last March but still has not been put into effect.

Mr. Turner said the government has been working with provincial authorities since parliamentary passage to work out details in each province.

The bill would eliminate cash or property bail in many arrests. The person involved would instead undertake to appear to face his charge at the proper time.

Paul Rose to face kidnap charge

MONTREAL (CP) — Paul Rose, convicted Front de Liberation du Quebec murderer of labor minister Pierre Laporte, has been deprived of the right to prepare a defence for his kidnapping trial, his lawyer Robert Lemieux said Wednesday.

Mr. Lemieux told a news conference that Rose has been transferred from the maximum security Archambault Institute to an isolation cell at St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary and deprived of all the books and writing materials he was using to prepare his defence.

Both the murder conviction and the kidnapping charge stem from the abduction of Mr. Laporte last Oct. 10 and his subsequent murder Oct. 17.

Rose is being held "in the special detention unit behind the penitentiary—that's where misbehaving prisoners are put as punishment," Mr. Lemieux explained.

But Rose has been a model prisoner, with duties as a clerk in one of the prison shops, and his record shows no indication of bad behaviour, the lawyer said.

He said Rose is being held in a six-by-eight-foot cell, with a window in the ceiling through which a guard with a rifle watches 24 hours a day.

Rose is to stand trial Oct. 18 on kidnapping charges arising from events last October.

An official at the Archambault Institute confirmed the move but refused to disclose why the transfer had been made.

Mr. Lemieux said that at the same time Rose was transferred to St. Vincent de Paul, other convicted FLQ terrorists including Francis Simard were moved to isolation quarters within Archambault.

Simard, like Rose, has already been convicted of murder and still faces charges of kidnapping.

Claims RCMP harassment

OTTAWA (CP) — A 21-year-old Cornwall man claimed Wednesday that the Royal Canadian Mounted Police threatened to send him to prison if he did not act as an informer.

Robert Wayne Eadie said he was paid about \$305 over 2½ years dating from 1968 when he was 18, for information supplied to the Long Sault, Ont., branch of the RCMP.

He said police threatened to plant drugs on him, then arrest him and send him to prison if he did not provide them with information.

He said during a CBC television interview shown here Wednesday night that he stopped informing after he was beaten by six men and left for dead in a ditch.

Mr. Eadie said he has since been threatened for aiding the police and that the police laughed at his requests for protection.

He stated on the television program Something Else that he had been picked up by city police "regarding intoxication and they called in the RCMP because they were aware that I knew people in this drug scene, and forced me by threatening that they would send me back to prison if I did not give them information regarding drugs."

Mr. Eadie, now married and the father of one child, said he had been in the reformatory at Guelph and that he was "very frightened because I didn't want to go back, so therefore I did do as they asked."

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Rock Island Council

ROCK ISLAND (IH) — Rock Island Council made a notice of motion at their meeting this week concerning their building bylaws in the town by proposing amendments to prevent the construction of school and public buildings on dead-end streets which create a traffic problem.

It was further proposed to make a slight charge for the permit, to be based on a percentage of the approximate costs of the building, which must also be stated on the application form.

Shortly after this resolution had been made, a delegation of Jehovah Witnesses arrived at the meeting. Their previous application to build a church on Stevens Street had been turned down as this is a dead-end street.

The delegation asked why the application was denied, and also requested a copy of the building bylaws including the new notice of motion.

It was proposed that traffic fines be increased to help meet the needs of increasing police department costs; however, the proposal was turned down and fines for traffic violations will remain as before.

Chimney inspection also came up for discussion, and it was agreed that only chimneys where wood is burned for fuel will be inspected. This probably amounts to fewer than 10 homes. However, the fire chief Wilfred Cuerrier, said he was not in agreement with this as periodic inspection also serves as a fire prevention measure.

A sum of \$25.00 was voted to be donated to the Stanstead County Ploughmen's Association in support of the provincial match in the county this year.

It was noted that George McLaren has set up a law office in Rock Island and Council said they will support him as much as possible.

The police report was the same for Rock Island and Stanstead. In August, there were 236 calls made to the control centre, of which 36 were emergency, four accidents, one break-in and entry, one magistrate court case, four welfare, 28 investigations, 51 tickets for traffic violations issued, 53 were paid and 1,959 miles were patrolled.

Stanstead Council

STANSTEAD (IH) — With a total figure of \$3,529,490 as taxable property in the municipality of Stanstead, Council at its last meeting recently set a mill rate of 10 general plus the specials which were cut in half from that of last year due to complete revaluation, but will average same as last year.

The general mill rate was raised by one mill due to rising costs.

A section of sidewalk costing \$1,000 should be finished by September 11. Although there are more sidewalks to be built to correct water on lawns and so forth, they will have to wait until another spring, Council decided.

It was noted tenders have been requested by the department of highways to pave Terrill Drive.

Mayor E. J. Struthers was asked to arrange for a dog tax collector to collect the unpaid 1971 tax. Previously the dog tax has been billed with property tax. This new arrangement will be more satisfactory to the dog owners, it is believed.

The question of closing the McShane road for three tenths of a mile was again discussed, and will be brought up by Mayor Struthers at the County Council meeting on Sept. 8 for their discussion and views.

Three building permits were approved, one to repair and renovate into a two-tenement dwelling; another to build a garage; and the third to allow repairs.

Council voted in favor of election of councillors in November, on Monday, not Sunday. Nominations will be received the last Monday in October.

Donald Prangley reported that snow equipment is nearly ready for the coming season. A sum of \$40 was voted to be donated to the Stanstead County Ploughmen's Association who are hosting the provincial match this year.

A motion was made to send a resolution to the minister of justice and other government officials to seek to retain the municipal court here at Rock Island.

It's back to school all around the E.T.

SHERBROOKE (WD) — Yesterday was back to school for approximately 21,000 students as school boards in Sherbrooke and the surrounding area opened their doors for the new year. For the most part, all went smoothly, with only the normal problems of schedule changes causing any confusion.

The Sherbrooke Catholic School Commission has the highest enrollment this year, with 15,486 students. This was an increase of 286 over the 1970 academic year. They also increased their teaching staff to 560 full-time teachers, 30 more than last year.

Sherbrooke Elementary School, of the Protestant School Commission, reported the same enrollment as last year, 380 students. They also added one new teacher to their staff, bringing their teaching staff up to 31.

Lennoxville Elementary School registered 654 as compared to last year's total of 648. There was also an increase in staff but at present time it is not known how many, as all teachers for this academic year have not yet been hired.

The Eastern Townships Regional School Board, which administers Alexander Galt Regional High School and Richmond Regional High School in Richmond, reported a slight increase in attendance. Richmond Regional High had an opening day student body of 920, while Alexander Galt reported 3,050 in attendance.

There were two new appointments on the Eastern Townships Regional School Board. Frank Boushel has been appointed principal, while Ian MacLeay is the new director-general.

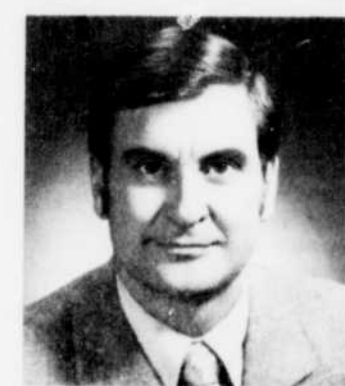

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Arabs federate

The Times of London reported last week that there has been a burst of social and economic activity among the west bank Arabs, now freed of fear of assassination by the defeated Jordanian guerrillas. These activities are "often in partnership with Israeli Jews," writes The Times. At the same time news agencies have reported the formation of the new Arab federation of Libya, Egypt, Syria and now Sudan.

The federation has proclaimed that it will never negotiate peace with Israel, abandon Arab territory or give up the rights of the Palestinians.

The third part of the story is last week's statement by the Israeli ambassador to Washington in which he said that the United States has stopped the supply of aircraft to Israel. At the same time, Cairo is making every effort to repair its breach with Moscow occasioned by the present treason trial of Egyptian politicians who were, in fact, Moscow's stooges.

As a little seasoning, one may add to this mixture reports that an Israeli emissary has met Soviet emissaries in northern Finland, the same area where Premier Golda Meir was said to have journeyed during her attendance at the Stockholm conference of the socialist international earlier this year. The two meetings were aimed at paving the way toward resumption of Israeli-Soviet diplomatic relations.

The individual ingredients of this stew may make little sense, but the whole has a pungent smell of power politics.

The Times report shows that, if left alone, Arabs and Jews can get along extremely well. But as H.G. Wells pointed out some 40 years ago, nations which choose to live on the world's main crossroads can hardly hope to be left alone.

President Nixon's embargo on aircraft for Israel is arm-twisting to make the Israelis accept the Rogers plan for the reopening of the Suez Canal. The president, having just "cleaned up" the Berlin situation, and hoping to disentangle himself from Vietnam, would now like to clean up the Middle East tangle in time for next year's election. The trouble is that the Israelis will not accept even a token force of Egyptians on the canal's east bank. Having been burned once after the armistice, with Soviet missiles pushed to the edge of the canal, they are not inclined to put much faith in further promises. The Egyptians, for their part, would not be satisfied with a token force anyhow. They insist on their right to full military occupation of the east bank. This would enable President Sadat to repeat the late Col. Nasser's gamble that led to the 1967 war, but do it under far more favorable conditions.

The federation is an umpteenth attempt by the Arabs to achieve unity. However, merely because the earlier attempts failed, one should not underrate the prospects of the present move. First, despite the trappings - still in planning stage - of one capital, one flag, one anthem, it is not a federation in the accepted sense but a close alliance, not unlike NATO. Second, the men who lead it, Col. Moammar al-Gaddafi of Libya, President Anwar el-Sadat of Egypt and Major-General Ja'afar al-Nimeiry of the Sudan, are ruthless men who have to keep moving to stay where they are. Of course, they may fall out among themselves. Gen. Nimeiry was none too happy about joining the federation in that it will make him highly unpopular in Southern Sudan, where he has a serious rebellion on his hands. The black population of Southern Sudan, which hates the Arabs with an intensity unmatched in Africa, may yet cause surprises.

Col. Gaddafi is said to object to the presence in the Mediterranean of any super-power, including the Soviet Union, and this will not go down too well with either Egypt or Syria, both Moscow's client states - despite President Sadat's occasional show of independence. Syria seldom keeps a government in power for longer than 18 months, and it is difficult to foresee developments there. Nonetheless, the hatred of Israel is a powerful cement, as is the hatred of the conservative monarchies, the Saudis, the Hasehemites in Jordan, King Hassan of Morocco. Indeed, the federation may succeed largely because the West has, or believes it has, an interest in supporting the views of Col. Gaddafi, who controls a substantial part of Western oil supplies.

Hussanein Heikal, the confidant of Egypt's presidents, writing in the Cairo daily Al-Ahram, says that the federation, with its huge military power, its command of areas vital to both super-powers and its large cash reserves, will first make Israel realize that the Arabs will not accept Israeli conditions of peace. The stage after that will be to make Israel accept the Arab conditions.

To commit suicide? A somewhat unlikely prospect in a vigorous, healthy body.

The Trudeauocrats' false front

OTTAWA — When things go wrong, a foxy politician always finds a scapegoat. Should none be readily available, he invents one. Hitler used the Jews as his all-purpose scapegoat. Stalin and his successors assigned the same role to the Marxist "class enemy" invention.

Pierre Elliot Trudeau, in unison with but not as crudely as our nationalists and the international liberal-left fraternity, blames the Americans for every difficulty, including those of his own making.

Having badly mismanaged the economy, our peerless leader badly needed a scapegoat for the consequences of his regime's wrong diagnosis and treatment of the unprecedented problem of simultaneous rise in prices and unemployment.

Mindful of his image of alleged intellectual brilliance, Mr. Trudeau could not simply embrace or endorse the primitive anti-American emotionalism of the nationalists, or the crude ideological messianism of the socialists. He needed some semblance of rationality and fairness for pointing an accusing finger across the border to make it look both regretful and convincing to the less emotional and gullible segments of the electorate.

Presumably, the cabinet had been hard at work on shaping the long-delayed foreign ownership report by Revenue Minister Herb Gray into such a sophisticated anti-American stance when President Nixon's drastic economic measures provided an instant and better alternative.

It did not take the holidaying Prime Minister long to see and seize the opportunity.

After instructing his ministers to make a manoeuvre in Washington with sufficient noise and publicity to assure its doom, Mr. Trudeau hurried back from the yacht in the Adriatic and took personal charge of the scheme to put the blame for Canada's dismal economic prospects on the Americans.

It must have been a painful decision for Mr. Trudeau to make, for apart from holidaying in the Adriatic he was planning to strike one more of his blows for freedom by visiting yet another of the communist dictators on his foreign-policy reorientation list. But Mr. Trudeau obviously knows when to make a personal sacrifice.

Besides, there will be other opportunities for shaking Tito's blood-stained hands, while the chance for an elegantly restrained (and for that very reason domestically effective) berating of Washington for our economic woes may not come his way again before the next election.

So Mr. Trudeau came rushing home and in contrast to his ministers, who undoubtedly consulted with the PM about every

word they had uttered in public while he was away, eschewed the bluster of injured innocence and struck the note of calm, slightly sorrowful reasoning that most Canadians admire and expect from their leaders, especially when they are dealing with grave matters under stress or provocation.

While Mr. Trudeau had nothing new to say in his brief address to the nation recently, he created the impression of restoring order in a chaotic situation with a calm, masterly grasp of the essentials.

He even managed to convey deep understanding and sympathy for the U.S. problems that prompted the Nixon measures.

Yet, the real burden of his message was the underlying, almost subliminal but mind-penetrating scapegoat theme: If there is more unemployment in Canada this fall and winter, it will be the fault of the United States. For no matter what Ottawa may try to do now, Canada, though innocent of any monetary and trade aggravation of the American difficulties, will be severely affected by the Nixon program unless Washington realizes that a surcharge on our exports to the U.S. is self-defeating.

This was the message of the higher unemployment warning and the "unemployed Canadians cannot afford to buy U.S. goods" bit in the Trudeau speech.

Contemplating the latter self-evident truth in conjunction with the \$22 billion worth of goods we trade annually with the U.S., people will tend to forget that tens of thousands of Canadians had been thrown out of work while none of the Nixon measures were anywhere in sight, let alone in effect.

Since our trade with the U.S., and with the rest of the world for that matter, kept on growing during the period of rising unemployment under the Trudeau regime, the cause of the phenomenon must have been largely internal, not external.

Searching for the reasons of the trouble, more and more people began to see mismanagement of the economy by the Trudeauocrats who in 1968 set out to fight a non-existent "demand inflation." The spreading realization of mismanagement started to pose a political problem to the Trudeau regime. So it reversed its misconceived monetary and fiscal policies and hoped for a corresponding reversal of the unemployment rate this summer.

When this proved to be a vain hope and the spectre of worse to come this fall and winter gave the Trudeauocrats political nightmares, the Nixon move came like manna from heaven.

Mr. Trudeau certainly knows how to make the best of it. But he should bear in mind that this particular scapegoat is not likely to live very long.

Emergency tactics discussed

OTTAWA (CP) — The government took steps Tuesday to offset in large part the effects of the new United States import surcharge on Canadian exporters.

Although presented as a measure to combat unemployment, legislation introduced by Jean-Luc Pepin, trade and industry minister, amounts to retaliation by Canada against the restrictions on trade announced Aug. 15 by President Nixon.

If it works out as planned, the new Canadian program would largely undo President Nixon's attempt—in Canada-U.S. trade—to reduce U.S. reliance on imports and stimulate domestic U.S. production.

Mr. Pepin led a delegation of Canadians to Washington last month in an unsuccessful attempt to win dispensation for Canada from the new 10-percent

surtax being imposed on many goods entering the U.S.

Canada and the U.S. are each other's best customers. Mr. Pepin estimates that about \$2.5 billion worth of the \$12 billion in annual Canadian exports to the United States would be affected.

The \$80 million in anti-unemployment grants provided for in the new Canadian legislation really amount to a subsidy to manufacturers to offset the U.S. surcharge. Manufacturers affected by the surcharge would be eligible for grants amounting to up to two-thirds of the surtax that would be applied to their exports.

In simple arithmetic, a manufacturer who exported products selling normally for \$100 in the United States would have found that the selling price had risen to a less-competitive \$110 after Aug. 16, if the manufacturer

wanted to maintain previous profit margins.

Under the new federal program, if the U.S. move threatens to reduce the manufacturer's export sales and production, he could receive a grant of \$6.66. That would enable him to keep his U.S. selling price down to a maximum \$103.33 instead of \$110.

If he were able to cut corners and increase efficiency, the manufacturer might absorb the additional \$3.33, thus maintaining his old U.S. selling price.

Thus, the effect of the new surcharge in the U.S. would be largely or completely offset by the Canadian action.

By international arrangement under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, member governments are supposed to be dedicated to the elimination of impediments to free international trade.

That means that GATT theoretically outlaws both special import charges such as the United States imposed last month and subsidies for exports.

Some experts would interpret the Canadian anti-unemployment program as a subsidy system for exports.

Canada, in the early 1960s, and Britain in the middle 1960s, both violated the GATT aims by imposing surcharges on imports.

Canada's action in seeking to offset the impact of the U.S. surcharges might prompt other trading partners of the United States to do likewise.

That, in turn, might prompt the United States to introduce even more strict restrictions on trade, leading ultimately to the unravelling of the laboriously-constructed systems of free trade built up among Western nations since the Second World War.

Opposes legalization

Sir: The Canadian Federation on Alcohol Problems strongly opposes the recommendation of the special committee on youth which states:

"That the cultivation, sale, possession and use of cannabis be legalized."

"That the age of eligibility for purchase and use of cannabis be 18 years for men and women."

"That distribution and marketing of cannabis be Government regulated and controlled."

We question the competence of the youth committee to make such a recommendation. We feel that it is irresponsible to recommend that youth be given unrestricted access to the destructive forces inherent in marijuana.

Preliminary research indicates that the use of marijuana on a long-term basis results in delusions, perceptual difficulties, and emotional problems. By creating an imbalance in the electrochemical functioning of the brain cells, marijuana causes hallucinations; these "highs" often occur long after the use of the drug is discontinued, and lead to loss of mental control.

Marijuana creates apathy, which, because of the sense of satisfaction and accomplishment characteristic of the "highs", is actually unknown to the user; he becomes a victim of "the subjective illusion of accomplishment," (Lehmann).

In experiments, pregnant mice injected with marijuana produce stillborn or defective offspring. While it is not yet known whether the drug will cause genetic damage in human beings, these results are frightening.

We would suggest that individuals opposed to the legalization of cannabis as recommended in the Youth Committee report state such opposition in writing to The Hon. Gerard Pelletier, Secretary of State, 130 Slater St., Ottawa 4; the Hon. John C. Munro, Brooke Claxton Bldg., Tunney's Pasture, Ottawa; to the Hon. John N. Turner, Dept. of Justice, Justice Building, Wellington St., Ottawa and to the local member representing the constituency from which the protest is sent.

Should we be rolling down the streets soiling our heads? Or should we be drunk on the fruits of our labor, which should be gaining us an enthusiastic response from all our very local youth, each of whom see their worlds in so many years.

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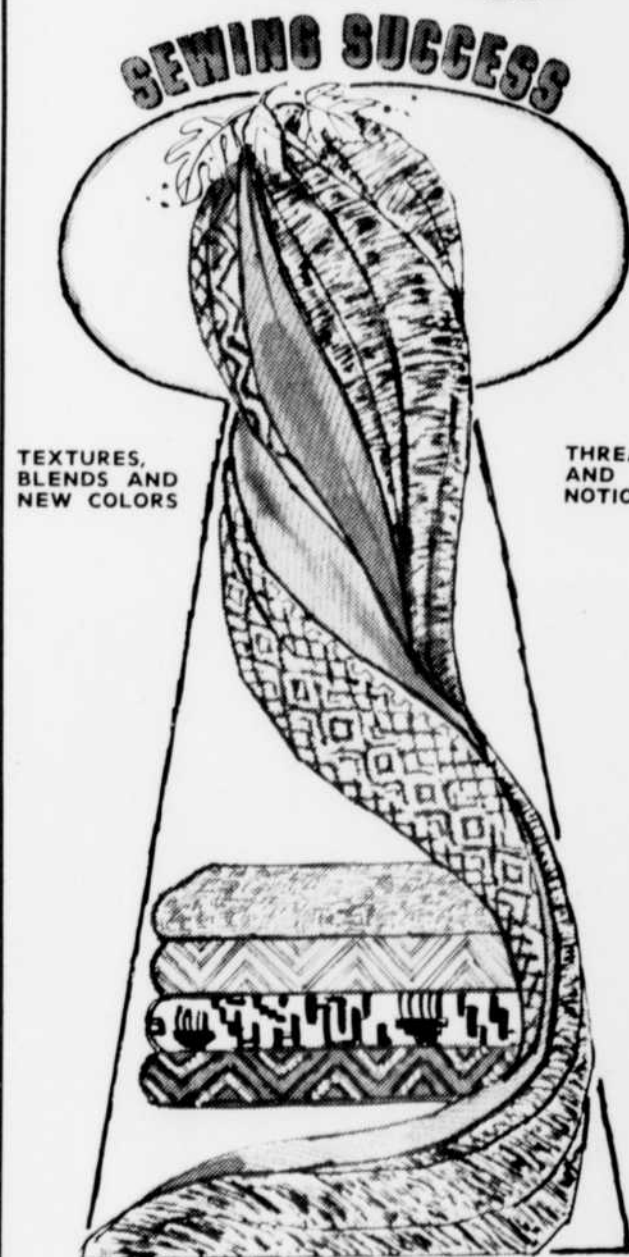

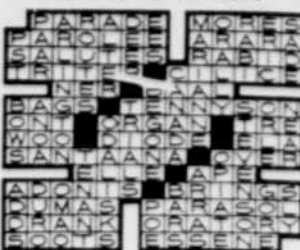

Hockey's superstar aging

Gordie Howe confirms his retirement

DETROIT (AP) — Gordie Howe, a legendary sports hero who has dominated hockey as much as Ty Cobb did baseball or Joe Louis did boxing in their day, confirmed Wednesday night his plans to retire.

Bruce Norris, owner of Detroit Red Wings, had invited newsmen to a news conference Thursday afternoon.

But Howe said he "couldn't hack it once they sent out the

His league tenure is a record and in recent years every time he scored, assisted or did practically anything else on the ice it extended a record he already held. He won the Hart Memorial Trophy as the most valuable player and the Art Ross Trophy as the top scorer in the NHL six times each.

There have been three low points in Howe's career, compared with an almost endless string of highlights.

One black spot was back in Winnipeg, Man., when as a 16-year-old teen-ager from Floral, Sask., the 6-foot, 205-pound Howe was told after a 10-day stay at a New York Ranger NHL tryout camp.

"You'd better go back home, sonny, you'll never be a major leaguer."

In 1945-46 he spent his only year in the minor leagues, at Omaha of the then U.S. Hockey League. After that it was Detroit and stardom.

In 1950 Howe and Toronto's Teeder Kennedy smashed into the boards at Detroit's Olympia Stadium in a late March playoff game. Howe suffered a gash on his right eyebrow, a fractured nose, facial lacerations and a severe brain concussion.

The hockey world held its collective breath, first for his life then his sight. An early morning hour and a half operation was performed to relieve the pressure at the base of the skull.

Howe came into the 1951-52 season wearing a helmet, but the injury, if anything, appeared to have improved his game. That proved to be his first 40-goal season and it won him his first scoring championship.

Then there was last season, one of a string in which Howe had suffered from an arthritic left wrist and right elbow. Early in the going he fell and a skateboot caught him in the ribs and tore cartilage loose.

He missed 15 games.

After that, he confided: "I felt like I was cheating. It seemed like I was making excuses all the time for the way I was playing."

"I wasn't kidding myself," he continued. "I only got 23 goals because of one hot streak. I didn't play very well."

"I could still execute the big play, but I couldn't do it as often."

Mild mannered, almost shy, Howe was a deceptive figure on the ice, one of the roughest, toughest players of all time in the NHL. He participated in some of the game's more memorable fights.

Often a new player who had slammed him and gotten away with it for the time being, found himself hanging on the boards from a locomotive-like collision after the play and officials had moved elsewhere on the rink.

Carlos signed by Als

MONTREAL (CP) — John Carlos, former United States Olympic sprint star and co-holder of the world record for the 100-yard dash, was signed today by Montreal Alouettes of the Eastern Football Conference.

Carlos was signed as a non-import wide receiver by the Canadian Football League club after CFL commissioner Jake Gaudaur ruled that the speedster could be listed as a non-import because he had never played football at high school or college.

Terms of the one-year contract were not disclosed.

Each CFL team is allowed a 32-man roster, made up of 14 imports and 18 Canadians. Rule 8-10 of the CFL constitution says import or non-import status is based on where a player plays his high school and college football.

Carlos' only previous football experience came when he received a tryout with Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football Conference. He was cut one month ago.

Carlos was a bronze medal-winner in the 100-metre dash at the 1968 Mexico Olympics.

Penguins announce signings

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Pittsburgh Penguins of the National Hockey League announced Wednesday the signing of veteran goalie Roy Edwards, defenseman Dave Burrows and center Rene Robert.

Edwards, 34, was claimed on waivers from Detroit Redwings during the inter-league draft in June.

Burrows, 22, came from Chicago Black Hawks farm system. Robert, 22, played for Toronto Maple Leafs' minor league team. Both he and Burrows were picked up in the intra-league draft.

Negro group wants franchise

BOSTON (AP) — A group of blacks, including several prominent in entertainment, are planning to ask for an expansion franchise in the National Football League, the Record American said Wednesday.

The paper said the group is planning to locate the team in Memphis, Tenn., and to call it Memphis Kings, in honor of the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The backers include Sammy Davis Jr. and Sidney Poitier of the entertainment world, and black-owned enterprises such as Parks Sausage of Baltimore, Ebony magazine and Johnson Cosmetics of Chicago.

If the franchise is granted, the proposed new team would be the first black-owned major sports team in the United States.

The NFL now has two conferences of 13 teams each and plans for 16 teams in each conference during the 1970s.

The Record American said the group did not plan an all-black team, but planned to have ownership and management positions such as head coach held by blacks.

The paper said that Jimmy Brown, former Cleveland running back who was inducted into the pro football Hall of Fame recently, and John Mackey, veteran tight end at Baltimore, are being considered for top jobs.

'Sore arm' Morton fools Mets

Staub drives in four as Expos top Mets 10-2

MONTREAL (CP) — For a guy with a sore arm, Carl Morton sure fooled the New York Mets.

And for a guy who was having batting problems earlier this season because of a bad wrist, Rusty Staub sure added the knockout punch.

All Morton did was silence the Mets bats, holding them to only four hits before giving way to reliever Mike Marshall in the eighth as Montreal Expos rolled to an easy 10-2 National League win before a country-wide television audience Wednesday night.

All Staub did was bat in four runs for the second straight game with a three-run homer, his 16th of the year, and a fielder's choice.

Montreal scored one run in the second inning when Bob Bailey beat out an infield single and moved to second when Gary Sutherland walked.

It seemed, however, that the Mets and starter Ray Sadecki might escape from the inning unscathed when Sutherland was caught napping and picked off first by catcher Jerry Grote.

But Bailey stole third as Sadecki was delivering a fourth ball to John Bateman and scored when John Boccabella lofted a sacrifice fly to deep centre field.

Montreal came back with three more in the third when Staub blasted Sadecki's first offering over the right-field fence after singles by Morton and Ron Woods.

Morton, who helped his own cause with two base hits, scored again in the fifth as Montreal moved ahead on a 6-0 count.

"I've always considered myself to be a pretty fair hitting pitcher," a smiling Morton said after the game.

The converted outfielder obtained from the Atlanta Braves chain in the expansion draft also helped himself with several sparkling defensive plays on sharp ground balls hit back through the box.

New York threatened mildly in the first and second innings as Morton seemed to be experiencing control problems.

"I was pitching them a little too fine," Morton said, "and I was getting behind the batters."

"I was just missing and the umpire didn't help too much by not calling low fastballs."

"I finally convinced him when I kept throwing the ball in the same place," the Montreal pitcher added.

The win, Morton's second in his last six decisions and first home win since mid-June, was "gratifying" for the right-hander who has struggled with an elbow injury since mid-season. His record now is 10-4.

"The arm feels stronger now and the elbow hardly hurts anymore," he said.

Asked why he was pulled after the seventh inning he said: "The arm was just a little tired."

Manager Gene Mauch agreed with his pitcher that the umpire

was not too lenient "in the early going."

"I'll tell you though, Carl looked like the winning pitcher. I'm used to seeing pretty regularly," Mauch said after the game.

Meanwhile Staub, who has been batting at a .391 clip since mid-August, confessed that he was only trying to "meet the ball."

"I'm not trying to do anything special," he said.

Not doing "anything special," Staub has belted seven homers, five doubles and three triples and has produced 28 runs in that stretch.

In the last two games of the three-game set with the Mets he hit two homers, a triple and a single and drove in eight runs.

And the Expos have been winning ball games with this newfound power-15 out of the last 23 for a stronger grip on the Eastern Division's fifth spot.

Wood misses bid for 20th as Twins down White Sox

Wilbur Wood said that going for his 20th victory felt no different than going for No. 19 or No. 18. But getting that magic No. 20 was another matter.

While all eyes were on Wilbur, Jim Kaat stole the show. Wood, the veteran knuckle-balling, reliever-turned-starter of Chicago White Sox, was stymied in his bid to become the American League's third 20-game winner by Kaat, who hurled a nifty four-hitter as Minnesota Twins defeated Chicago 3-1 Wednesday night.

The big left-hander, at 11-12, having a sub-par season, held the White Sox hitless until the fifth inning.

"No game is easy to win,"

sighed Wood, 19-11, denied in his bid to join Oakland's Vida Blue and Detroit's Mickey Lolich in the 20-game circle.

Elsewhere in the American League, New York Yankees edged Boston Red Sox 2-1 in 11 innings in the day's only afternoon contest, while Detroit Tigers beat Washington Senators 5-3. Milwaukee Brewers outscored Kansas City Royals 7-6 and Oakland Athletics trimmed California Angels 1-0 in night games.

Kaat, a 6-foot-4 southpaw, did not walk a batter and the White Sox reached him for their only run of the game in the ninth inning.

Wood, denied his major goal, raised his total of innings pitched this season to 283, the most by a White Sox pitcher since Thornton Lee hurled 300 innings in 1941.

John Ellis hit a sacrifice fly to drive in Roy White with the Yanks' winning run.

Aids

The market suddenly is crowded with new visual teaching aids that can help you understand your swing and improve it. There are movie outfits, videotape rigs, stop-action cameras, and in principle I recommend them.

I do think you should have the help of a qualified professional. I film my swing and study it with the assistance of my father, who's the best teacher I know and the only one I listen to.

Many home professionals are purchasing the equipment, although some of it is quite expensive. They know the best angles from which to photograph the swing, and they know how to interpret your strengths and weaknesses.

I would make a further point. I suggest that you insist that the photographing be done under "game con-

ditions." That is, out on the course. Don't just do it on the practice range, where there's always another dozen range balls to tee up if you miss a shot. We all swing a little differently under pressure, and that's the swing you want to analyze.
