POLES FOR SALE

MAYOR EXPLAINS COUNCIL STAND

POSSIBLE TAX INCREASE IF POLES NOT SOLD.

"I think the objections are unfortunately on political grounds, not economic", stated Mayor Cauchon in a speech before the Valleyfield Rotary Club on Tuesday of this week. Mr. Cauchon was defending the position of the city in regards to the proposed sale of street light poles to the Shawinigan Water and Power Company, rather than borrow

as business men and tax payers you can and will, I hope, understand why your City administration seeks your authorization on the sale of part ownership in Valleyfield's street lighting system.

First, what does the City have to sell?

For how much will it be sold?

What do we expect to do with the money?

And finally, why should we sell?

VALLEYFIELD HAS:

Sole ownership of 7 poles.
 1/4 ownership of 97 poles.
 1/3 ownership of 276 poles.
 63 miles of old 6 W.P. wire, unsuitable for use with the Mercury-Vapour lamps now so much in demand.

The City has too, in view of its ownership, a certain nuisance value.

Now I know that the Mayor himself is, according to certain persons, seen as a sort of a nuisance. If there's value in that, however, I am not yet aware of its worth. I can assure you that it's not for sale!

Perhaps Mr. Spenard's Company has, at times, considered the Mayor a nuisance.

These then — nuisance value, poles or part of poles and wire are what we hope to sell — with your authorization.

Why do we wish to sell? Today citizens are demanding better lighting and with reason. This means changing to mercury-vapour lamps. Well lighted streets have proved to be actually safer for women and children at night.

Moreover, an inquiry made among 1800 U.S. municipalities showed, in December 1960, a direct relation between modern street lighting and a favourable

Mayor ROBERT CAUCHON

Mayor Cauchon stated that under the proposed sale the city would receive \$87,000 for 316 poles, of which it only owns 7 completely, and would also be released of a debt to the Shawinigan Water and Power Company of \$63,200.

Following is a verbatim report of Mr. Cauchon's speech on the matter. He spoke in English:

Today I am here to give you information — facts, figures, to which you are entitled. Moreover

climate for industrial development or expansion.

As well lighted streets are an asset, as even those who oppose the sale will concede, Valleyfield must modernize its lighting. A City administration has the same responsibility in this matter as it has for street maintenance.

Let us look for a moment at what happens when the S.W.P. Co. installs a Mercury-Vapour lamp in place of those presently used.

The City pays \$200.00 to retain ownership of each pole. The company then pays \$16.00 annual rent on that pole. The actual cost to the City, yearly, is, however, \$20.00. We pay \$20.00 to earn \$16.00.

How many of you gentlemen operate that way, and how long could you continue to so operate?

In 1961, although City Hall was not generous in granting requests for new lighting, it had to install 125 Mercury-Vapour lamps. That means that the City lost the incandescent lamps with their poles. At that yearly rate (a low one) we shall have, by 1967 nothing either to rent or to sell.

Should we have paid \$200.00

Fatal Accident At Standard Chemicals

Mr. Hermas Bergevin employee of Standard Chemical Ltd. in Beauharnois suffered a fatal accident on Fri., February 5th. He was immediately transported to the Hotel Dieu Hospital in Valleyfield but he died later in the day.

According to Standard Chemical officials Mr. Bergevin was apparently struck by a moving Hopper-Car. A coroners inquest will be held on February 20th. Mr. Bergevin had been with Standard Chemical for 23 years and had been performing the task of salt-handler for almost three years.

Mr. Bergevin, 46 years old, is survived by his wife, a 19 year old son and 2 daughters ages 13 and 16. Dr. Gustave Dubuc was the attending physician. Funeral was held from the St. Clement Parish church on Monday of this week with entombment at the Beauharnois cemetery.

KILLED IN ACCIDENT



Romuald Theoret, well known Valleyfield Citizen, was killed last Sunday evening on the highway between St. Barbe and Valleyfield, when the car in which he was a passenger apparently went out of control and turned over several times.

Driver of the car, a 1961 Cadillac, was Mr. Emile Perron. According to information available at time of writing Mr. Perron was driving along the highway and was approaching the intersection with the highway from Ormstown at which time the road curves rather sharply before reaching the Larocque Road Seaway Bridge. It is assumed that at the intersection the car hit a very deep hole, causing something to go wrong with the steering as indicated by the shimmy-type tire mark on the pavement.

At this point Mr. Perron is thought to have lost control, with the car going over the snow bank and into the ditch. According to the SUN's informant Mr. Perron was not able to relate what caused the car to go out of control. Mr. Perron himself only received minor injuries and was released from hospital the same evening.

Mr. Theoret was, 58 years old. He is survived by his wife (nee Helen Duffy), a daughter Noemi, three sisters: Mrs. J. (Getrude) Blais, Mrs. Gordon (Claire) Kirby of B'nois and Miss Dionara Theoret and two brothers Rolland and Normand.

"We Can But Do Our Best And There Leave The Matter"

About Poles And Politics

True to good old tradition in Valleyfield politics has reared its ugly head in the cities' municipal affairs.

In the name of "rights of the people" more fuss is being made over 316 electric light poles, the value of which is of little interest to the average citizen than would be made over many matters of a real serious nature in a Federal or Provincial election.

The City has sole ownership of only 7 poles; half ownership of 97 poles and one third ownership of 276 poles. In other word the city owns really only 147 and a half poles.

For these, the Shawinigan Water and Power company has offered the city \$87,000, ridding the city of maintenance and other nuisances and on top of that a debt of \$63,200 . . . caused by the purchase of 316 Mercury-Vapour lamps by the former administration . . . will be wiped off. To pay this debt the city would have to borrow money for a term of some twenty years at a sizeable interest rate.

Why should a city own street light poles? Leave this to those who are equipped to look

after them. So when one aldermen of the council votes against the sale on the pretext that the city has no right to sell what belongs to the people, and then goes on the radio to further defend his cause it can only be concluded that either he is obstructing the administration for the sake of obstruction or he is being used.

It would seem the latter is the case. Furthermore alderman Pilon is not only being used as a political tool by a group of behind the scene would be politicians but it is our guess that their would be no issue at all if the Mayor of Valleyfield Was anyone else but Robert Cauchon. And finally we wouldn't be a bit surprised if alderman Pilon wakes up one morning in the not too distant future and wonders what he let himself in for. Politics often aren't what they seems to be, especially when seen in broad daylight, first thing in the morning.

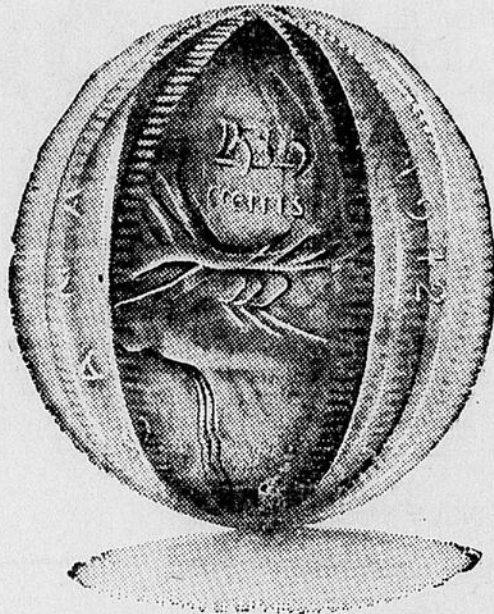

each to retain ownership? In my opinion, NO.

Let us consider for a moment the cost of retaining ownership.

For example, by December 31st, 1959, Valleyfield owed the S.L.S. & W. Company \$63,200.00 to retain ownership of the 316 poles represented by this figure we have to pay \$63,200.00 and borrow to do it, for it remains to be paid.

True, the obligations is a "big-hearted" bequest from my predecessor — a bequest that brought no joy to the present administration.

To obtain \$63,200. we must go to the market to borrow that amount for a term of at least 20 years.

The cost of the loan, the interest on the loan and the yearly reimbursement on the loan and depreciation, will according to chartered accountants amount to a rate of at least 10%.

So you see, I am conservative — for once in my political life, Conservative in my estimate, I hasten to assure you. I don't wish to be misunderstood or misquoted!

\$63,200.00 will then, cost at least \$6,320.00. But the Shawinigan Co. will, by its contract, pay the City % .056.00 that means the City loses \$1,264.00 yearly on the transaction.

Sound business, isn't it? How many of you administer your business this way. If you do, I invite you to do business with the City. We shall invite you

Now, we must discharge that debt, or lose ownership of the poles.

By 1967, unless we pay \$200.00 for all lamps replaced, we shall have nothing to sell. No referendum will be necessary. Why can we not sell at \$100,000. or \$200,000.

On April 25th, 1959 the assessed value of the City's share of the poles was \$101,000. That was a figure arrived at without argument and did not take into consideration the depreciation for twenty years. Most of the poles, etc., we own are 20 years old.

At this point, I wish to make it plain that the \$87,000.00 will be clear — quite apart from the \$63,200.00.

Sod Turning Zinc Plant In Spring

At last Mondays' Press Conference Mayor Robert Cauchon announced that he had received word from the Public Relations Dept. of Noranda Mines Co. Ltd. that a sod turning ceremony for the new Zinc Refinery in Valleyfield will be held early in the Spring when weather conditions are more favourable for such an event.

In other words, the City, will not borrow to retain ownership of the poles, represented by that sum. In addition the City will receive \$87,000. It has been insinuated that opposition to the sale by certain citizens is due to the fear that the money will not be used "prudently".

Judge for yourselves.
WE PROPOSE TO USE IT TO:

1. — Improve the municipal beach.
2. — Improve the bridge, work on which is already begun.
3. — Purification plant for zinc refinery.

I think the objections are unfortunately on political grounds, not economic.

I contend that the City will be getting a fair price of \$87,000, and challenges anyone to obtain more. Mr. Spenard is an able negotiator. You can ask his opinion as to the mayor's ability. We both remember our conversations.

After considering all aspects of the matter, the administration decided to request authorization to sell.

If we obtain it by winning the referendum, I can guarantee that a tax increase will not be necessary. If, on other hand, the referendum is lost, I am not prepared to give such guarantee for we shall have to borrow to retain the poles. If property owners wish us to do that, we must borrow and pay interest costs that can be met only by increased taxes. You know whether or not this is a good time for a tax increase.

The decision, however, is yours to make. Voting is between the hours of 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. on February 16th and 17th.

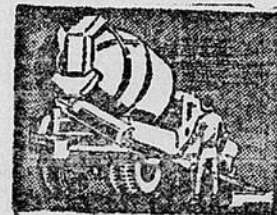

LEGION MAKES BIG STRIDES

Membership in the Royal Canadians Legion continues to increase, Jean St. Germain, president of the Legion's Quebec Command, told the quarterly conference 2 weeks ago.

In Quebec membership increased by 600 last year, while national membership grew from 235,000 to more than 250,000.

Organizers of the Poppy Fund reported their most successful campaign in recent years, while the Legion's Christmas Tree collected 4,751 gifts for distribution to veterans in hospitals.

Results of the March of Dimes campaign are not final, but indications are that the total will exceed last year's collection.

Fourteen members were presented with service medals for outstanding work over the last several years and a special presentation of a watch was made to Harry Aronovitch for his 10 years work with the executive.

What Valleyfield has to sell to the Shawinigan L. H. & W. Co. ?

- 1—Sole ownership of 7 poles.
- 2—½ ownership of 97 poles.
- 3—½ ownership of 276 poles.
- 4—63 miles of old 6 W.P. wire unsuitable for use with the new Mercury-Vapour lamps now in demand.
- 5—A certain "nuisance" value in so far as the Company is concerned.

For how much will the City ownership rights be sold? The Company has agreed to pay \$87,000, a fair price in view of the depreciation on the City's poles etc . . . over the twenty year period they have been in use.

For what will the City use the money ?

- 1—For the water purification plant required by law for the zinc refinery.
- 2—For improvements of the Municipal Beach.
- 3—For widening of the bridge on Chaussee Street.

Why does the administration consider it wise to sell its ownership of poles and wire ?

- 1—Citizens demand better lighting as provided by Mercury-Vapour lights.
- 2—Each incandescent light and pole replaced cost the City \$200. to retain ownership.
- 3—On December 31st, 1959, Valleyfield owed the Company \$63,200. for new lights; it still owes that amount which must be borrowed at an interest rate of 6% and 4% for the depreciation of the equipment during during 20 years.
- 4—The company would pay as rental under its contract with the City, \$5,056. yearly as against the City's interest and depreciation of \$6,320.00 a loss to the city of \$1,264.00 yearly.
- 5—125 new lights installed in 1961 at that rate, the City would, by 1964 have nothing to sell.
- 6—If property owners vote to retain ownership of the poles, they are asking that money be borrowed at the risk of tax increases to pay the interest.

In short, the City will receive :

\$87,000. CASH.

In addition, it will not borrow to pay the \$63,200 it has owed since 1959. It will let its ownership rights lapse.

It will spend the money obtained from the sale to finance to widening of the M.C. bridge, to improve the Municipal beach and to build a kiosk at the beach and to build the required purification plant.

When and where will the property owner vote ?

At the City Hall, February 16th and 17th, 1962, between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m.

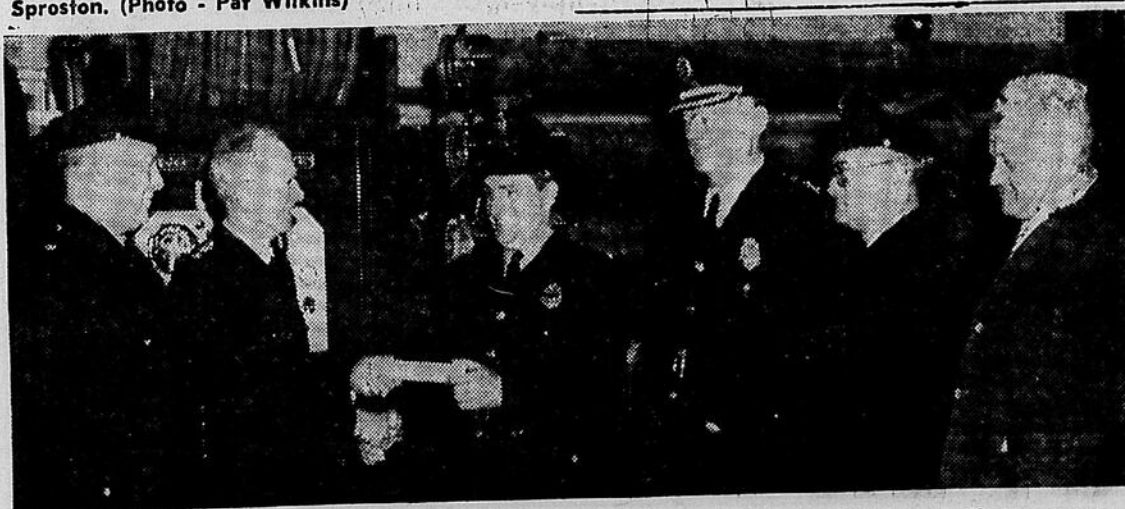

Fed. Estimates Contain \$430,000 for Beauharnois and Melocheville Works

In the appropriations of the Federal Department of Public Works tabled in the House of Commons this week over \$10,600,000 are contained in the 1962-63 estimates for the Province of Quebec.

Of this amount \$30,000 has been allotted to complete the Federal Building on St. Laurent street in Beauharnois which is to house the new Post Office and the U.I.C. offices and \$400,000 towards the building of wharfs and harbor facilities in Melocheville.

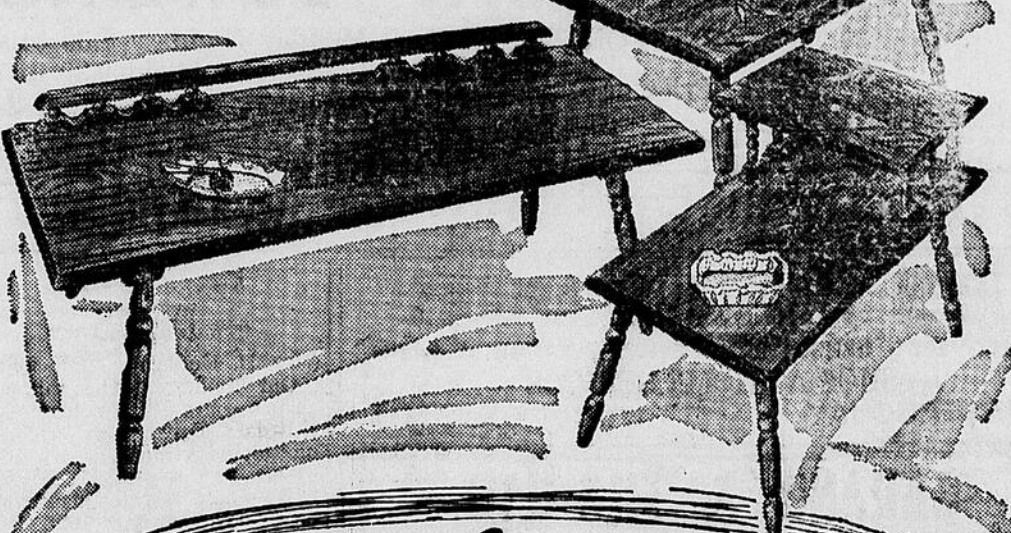

homologated" land, bounded by Adam, Sullivan and St. Ferdinand, for playground purposes. The delegation was notified by Mr. Poupart, lawyer for the Centre, that the homologation had been dropped about a year ago and had not been renewed. Council then decided to re-homologate the land, which according to Mr. Poupart, would take about 6 weeks.

The capacity attendance awaited the report of town manager, Claude Mongeau, in answer to charges of incompetence brought forward at the January

17th public meeting, but were informed by Mr. Poupart "that an individual cannot speak for the group he represents unless it has been duly proposed, seconded and carried in the form of a by-law". Instead Mr. Mongeau submitted reports to the heads of various home-owner associations and copies to the editors

of local newspapers.

A by-law costing \$19,400 for the paving of Jack Circle and Oxford Crescent was passed and this plus a few other by-laws, advertised in last week's edition of the SUN, will wait for public approval at the public assembly between 7 and 9 p.m., on Wednesday, February 14th.

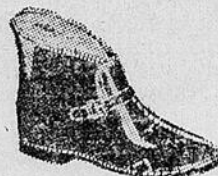

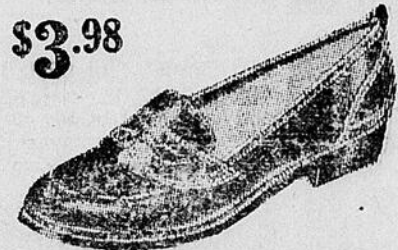
