...  
(The Examiner Looks Back After  
Two Decades of Local Service)

More than a thousand issues ago this newspaper made its initial bow to the residents of the City of Westmount.

Today we are celebrating a full 20 years as the weekly newspaper serving this important residential section of Canada's metropolis.

On its first appearance The Examiner avowed that it was devoting itself to local news first — and to this principle it has resolutely adhered throughout the two intervening decades.

Of the 963 weekly newspapers in Canada with their combined circulation of 2,475,000 The Examiner perhaps serves the most difficult community to assess from an editor's chair.

Westmount has its heights and its depths, it has its assets and its liabilities. It is a city of people with large incomes, with medium incomes and with small incomes. It is a community that in part welcomes a staid, sometimes sober-appearing journal, and a community that in part welcomes a screaming tabloid.

It would be difficult indeed to coin the phrases to wrap up in words the 'average' Westmounter. In Westmount some shirts are stuffed, some are shredded.

Some time after its start in 1935 The Examiner decided to drop from a full size 8-column paper to a tabloid, but at the same time to adhere to its local news policy, and to scream only seldom, and then when a scream was justified.

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Since 1935 there have been myriad changes in this municipality and The Examiner has attempted to faithfully record them. Reflected in its pages too have been changes of a Canada-wide and a world-wide nature, changes that have been reflected in the municipality's economy or its citizens faces.

Flipping through the valuable pages of the files of The Examiner year by year, you can read the story of a great city — a city that has kept its housekeeping in order, a city that rose to the occasion of the greatest conflict the world has ever seen and sent its sons to do battle and to die, a city that has kept pace with progress and still retained much of its tradition, its charm and its prestige.

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The Examiner, down the years, has made every effort to avoid losing itself in political or other controversy. It has sought to bridge gaps, rather than to widen them; to explain and interpret rather than to rant and scold or point with scorn.

The Examiner has proved to be a good medium for reaching the people of Westmount quickly and thoroughly, and national advertisers have bought space in its columns with confidence, as have local merchants.

Modestly may we say that we try to mix a modicum of ability, diligence, care, learning, wit, humor, skill, versatility, duty, courage, conscientiousness and sheer hard work in these pages each week.

And we hope to be able to continue to do it

## Canon Oliver Prepares To Quit Local Parish

Canon Gilbert Oliver, for the past quarter of a century and more the beloved pastor of St. Matthias Anglican Church here, has tendered his resignation, to take effect at the end of January next year.

The annual vestry meeting accepted his resignation with reluctance.

Never one to talk of his accomplishments, though they have been many and varied, the Canon leaves with regret and looks back on a great growth within the parish.

Since 1928, when he was appointed to St. Matthias, the church has increased greatly in size and the congregation has quadrupled.

"We've added gradually to it", he explained. "There was no parish hall in those days. The upper and lower halls have been built and also the chapel. In 1928 we had 130

Last year's show, "Love Amiss" was one of the revue's all-time hits and this latest edition of the revue should be a worthy successor.

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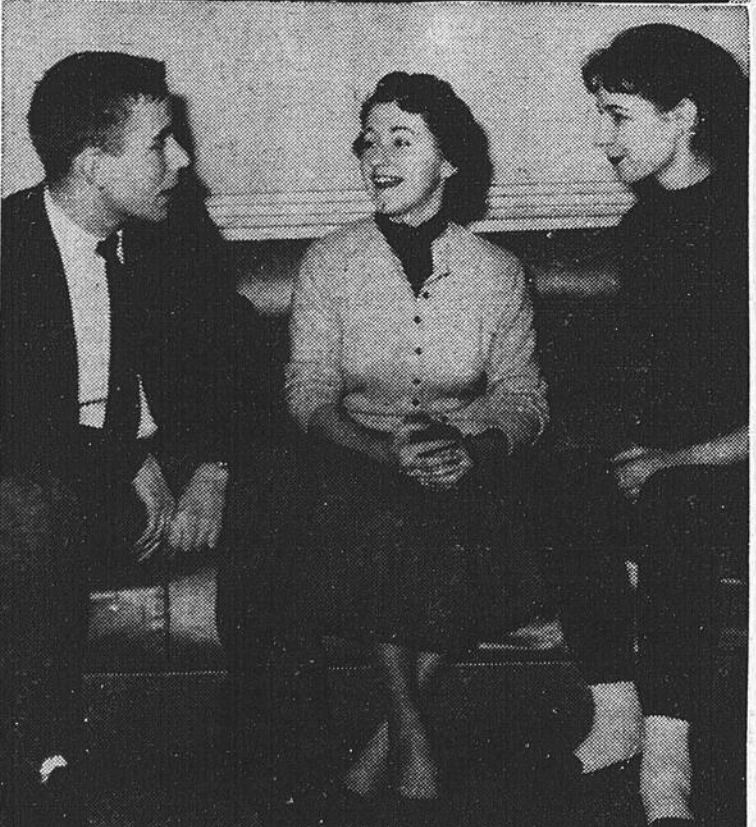
## Eggs 32 Cents A Dozen Said Examiner In '35

### Burlington - Station Joins T-V Network

Burlington — The American Telephone and Telegraph Company today announced that a new micro-wave system has been placed in operation, linking television station WMVT with the TV network of the Columbia Broadcasting System.

The system brings the first direct network programs to Vermont's only television station. The only "live" network programs that have been carried by WMVT since it went on the air have been those the station has picked up off the air from WRGB in Schenectady and re-broadcast.

Three intermediate radio relay stations were built in the new micro-wave system to carry the programs 137 miles from Rotterdam, N. Y., in the CBS network, to the WMVT transmitter station atop Mt. Mansfield. The relay station were erected at North Hebron, at Orwell and at Bristol to pass the signals along the edge of the Green Mountains for the pick-up by a dish antenna on the WMVT transmitter building.

### File Copy Check Reveals Data Of Old Days Here

The first issue of The Examiner made its debut Feb. 1, 1935, 20 years ago, bringing to the City of Westmount a full size weekly paper of its own.

In outlining the policy of the newspaper the editor wrote that The Examiner would "tell the news, attack, defend, praise, teach and advertise legitimate business enterprise."

The editorial brought home the fact that The Examiner sought to be a clean, independent paper for the home, devoted to public service. It pointed out that before embarking on this venture the publishers of The Examiner made a thorough examination of the various cross sections of life in the community and were pleased but not surprised to learn that the residents were particular about the type of reading matter that entered their homes.

The first issue of The Examiner was an eight page, eight column full size journal covering the news of the community from sports to social events.

Reading through the advertisements of local merchants in the first issue it is interesting to note that new-laid eggs were selling for 32 cents a dozen and that potatoes were only nine cents for 10 pounds. "Tall tins" of evaporated milk were 10 cents each.

Local as well as professional sports received adequate coverage. Some of the same teams covered in 1935 are still represented today.

**Local Sports**

At that time Westmount High School held a firm grip on first place in the Montreal Inter-school Hockey League, and that week turned back Montreal High to consolidate their first place standing. A Westmount YMCA Gym team in 1933 won the P.Q. Senior Amateur Gymnastic championship and were for the second straight year defending their laurels. Members of the Westmount High School Ski team dominated all four events in a scholastic ski meet, winning the jumping events in Montreal and walking off with honors in the races which were held at Shawbridge.

Front page news covered local happenings from the Rotary Club to various church association meetings. A front page story in the first issue brought news of the 58th anniversary of Calvary United Church.

A column entitled "Motor Gossip" told readers that shopping for cars was a fascinating sport that season with all the new models

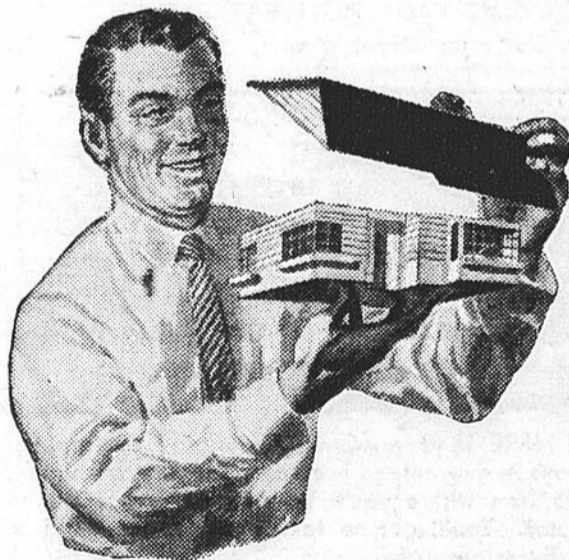

And now The Examiner is 20 years old. It has seen the years upheld the policy as laid down in the first editorial and is ready for the future.

## Canadian Scenes Shown to Americans Through CPR Films

If so, then accept my thanks most sincere.  
If not, then I pray, do grant my request  
And please me by placing a line with the rest.

"The rest" proved most engrossing. Samples herewith:  
To Tina—When you are old and cannot see  
Put on your glasses and think of me—Melvyn.

Or . . .  
Sam day we to marrie get!  
Me mak good mon to you.  
Bot eef from you come cold response,  
You love me not, I die—Alphonse

Or . . .  
Writing in albums is such silly stuff.  
I'll sign my name and that's enough—Archie.

Or . . .  
Dear Tina—When you are wash-in the tub  
Remember me at every rub.  
If the water is too hot  
Remember me and forget-me-not.—Mary Shearer.

Albums 50 years ago, as now, were repositories for great philosophy. Somebody named H. G. Allan paused 'way back in 1905 to fill a page with this:  
In the elder days of art  
Builders wrought with greatest care  
Each minute and unseen part  
For the gods see everywhere.  
Let us do our part as well,  
Both the unseen and the seen,  
Make the house where gods may dwell  
Beautiful, entire and clean.

I say this in deep sincerity, and I am in no way influenced by the fact that my birthday is approaching and his gift has not yet arrived. At my rate, several years after Mother got her album she met my father, and in 1913 he took pen in hand to inscribe:

In doing each day that goes by  
Some little good—not in the dreaming

For whatever men say in blindness,

## 'Fifth Freedom'

St. Mary's Hospital Needs,  
Deserves Support

St. Mary's Hospital will carry out an appeal of \$5,500,000 this spring.

Why is this money needed?

It is needed so that the hospital may meet the greatly-increased demand upon its 234 beds and its specialized, technical services through a program of expansion.

The history of St. Mary's in Montreal has been one of progress. From the days of 50 beds in the home of the late Lord Shaughnessy on Dorchester street to the present building on Lacombe avenue in the Cote des Neiges district, the hospital's administrators have never looked back.

Now St. Mary's, looking to the future needs the help of a Montreal which it has

served so well for so many years. It needs the help to continue to give to Montreal a "fifth freedom" — the freedom to live longer, healthier lives because of the progress of medical science in its ability to heal the sick.

St. Mary's is serving the sick of the city without distinction to race, creed or color, although it is, in Quebec province, the only English-language general hospital of more than 30 beds operated under Roman Catholic auspices.

But for every 15 English-speaking Roman Catholics who may be patients, you can also count seven Protestant patients and five French-speaking Roman Catholics. Hebrews and other religions are there, too, and St. Mary's attracts a wide variety of nationality groups.

Truly, this hospital is performing a service for the entire community. Now that the hospital needs help, the entire community which it has helped should respond, and respond generously.

The kind of money that buys food and clothes is made by tending strictly to one's business.

When the president presides at Cabinet meetings, we wonder if he asks the secretary to resent the "unfinished business" — or does he have a sense of humor in such matters?

## A National Problem III

by REV. CANON R. KENNETH NAYLOR,  
Rector of Trinity Memorial Church

Alderman Leo McKenna deserves commendation for his proposal in the Montreal City Council that steps be taken to lay a tunnel across the St. Lawrence River before the Seaway is completed, and also to proceed with a tunnel through Mount Royal; The Star comes out with the useful suggestion that the two ideas be coordinated, though they are not necessarily connected. I should like to emphasize the ideas from another angle—in fact, from two or three angles.

It would seem obvious that a tunnel is to be preferred to a lift bridge—we have had enough of those over the Lachine Canal for too many years, and we are replacing them by tunnels. But there are many ways of going around the Lachine Canal. There is no way of going around the St. Lawrence River. A tunnel is more needed under the River than it could possibly be under the Canal. And it would be simpler to deal with it before the Seaway is finished. If we wait we shall have a situation like the extension of Burnside.

In regard to the tunnel under the Mountain the advantages are threefold: in the first place it emphasizes the fact that the Mountain should not be spoiled; in the second place it provides a speedway where a winding surface road would not; in the third place it would provide the best natural bomb-proof shelter that we could have. I do not expect war, but it is folly not to make what provision we can against it. I do not forget that it was unpreparedness that led to Munich.

But the point which appeals to me most in both projects is that they would provide work for thousands, and food for thousands more. I wish the Alderman had included that in his argument.

It is a very easy thing to overlook a small recession in business; especially easy for Government officials who do not come into contact with misery. But from the Christian point of view it is as serious a matter to deny one man the right to work as it is to deny a thousand. It is foolish and wicked to close one's eyes to the fact that there is suffering in our community at the present time. It is equally wicked to say that that suffering cannot be relieved by the simple method of putting necessary public works in operation. Yes, it would cost money; it might even unbalance the budget, but if we can budget for war, and even unbalance the budget for war, surely we can do the same to maintain the morale and the life of our fellow-citizens.

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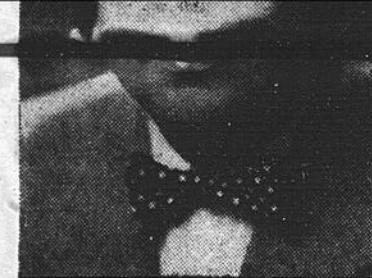

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## Hadassah Organization Of Canada To Hold Membership Campaign

A vital increase in enrolment is noted in the progress report of Montreal Hadassah's Membership Campaign which is taking precedence in importance this month over all other projects. Under the chairmanship of Mrs. S. Warshaw and Mrs. Cecil Vineberg, and with the additional impetus of the presence of Mrs. Regina Kissman, of London, England, whose lectures to various groups on Hadassah aims and ideals, stressing the importance of local effort in the overall picture of Wizo (World International Zionist Organization), of which Canadian Hadassah is a member, have resulted in bringing additional hundreds into Hadassah ranks.

The highlight of the campaign is the formation of a new chapter of professional women who have had no previous membership in other charitable organization. Composed of representatives with

professional affiliations with the Montreal Council of Social Agencies, the American Association of Medical Social Workers and the Canadian Association of Social Workers, the group will include graduate workers with degrees in psychiatric work, family and child welfare, speech therapy, psychology and allied medical fields. The leading spirit in the organization of this group is Mrs. Esther Spector, director of the social service department of the Jewish General Hospital, who has been affiliated with the McGill School of Social Work for ten years. The enthusiasm injected through the personal effort of Mrs. Spector has created a group whose potentiality for leadership will increase the scope of Hadassah undertakings by focusing its activities in an entirely new educational and cultural area. With an age group of twenty-three to thirty-eight, plans are being formulated by Mrs. Spector and her colleagues to have a closed membership of sixty whose professional affiliations and identical interests will be fused into an active body by utilizing the coming months, as a period of orientation into Hadassah work through the medium of seminars, research, films, guest speakers, etc. Announcement has been made that enrolment has now reached sixty with an additional waiting list eager to join.

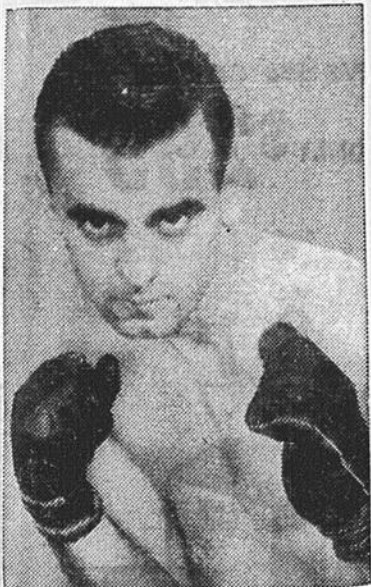

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
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# Unity Tied For First, Points to Northern Win

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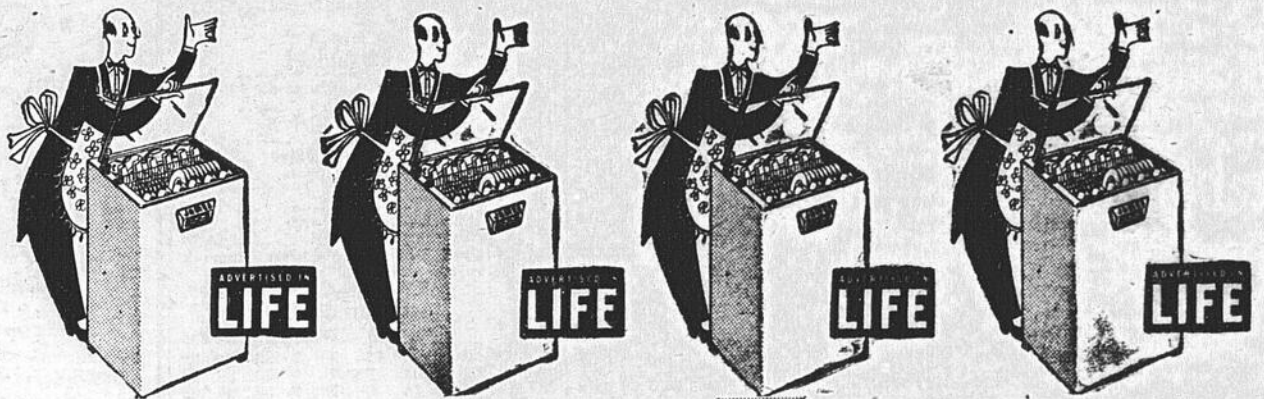
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
