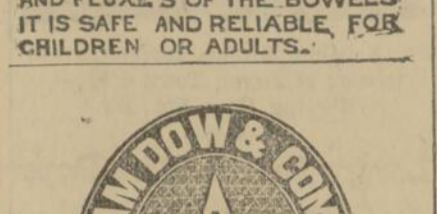

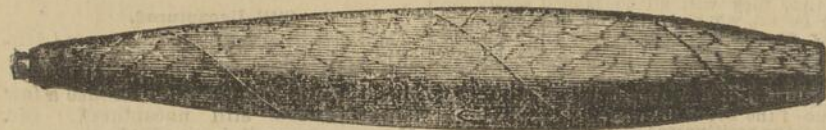

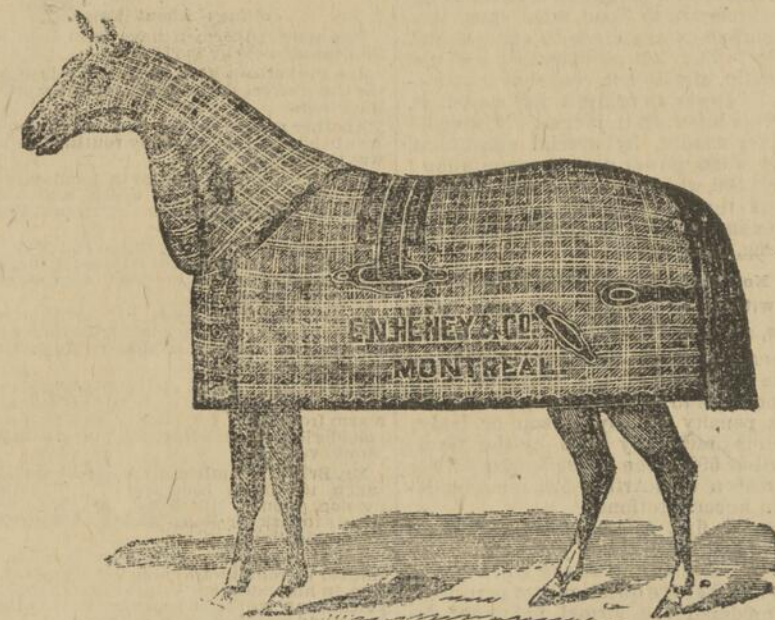

ROYAL COMMISSION

COLLAPSE OF THE BOODLE INVESTIGATION.

Whelan, Pacaud and Tarte Cannot Be Punished by the Commission for Refusing to Answer the Questions in Dispute.—The Judgment Delivered by Mr. Justice Wente.

Much interest had been manifested in the probable result of the refusal of Messrs. Whelan, Tarte and Pacaud to answer certain questions put to them by the Royal Commission and consequently there was a large attendance in the Practice Court yesterday to hear Judge Wente's decision on the writ of prohibition taken by the three above named gentlemen, to restrain the commission from punishing them for refusing to answer. At the outset the judge gave a resume of the case. He pointed out that the Messrs. Beique et al., the respondents, were appointed a Commission of Enquiry, to ascertain the truth of charges that certain members of the Provincial Legislature had accepted \$10,000 from Mr. Whelan, a public contractor, as compensation for services in securing the settlement of his claim against the Government. The commission was issued under authority of article 596 of the revised statutes of the Province of Quebec and prior to its coming upon the commission under article 598 of these statutes the same power to compel witnesses to give evidence as is vested in the courts of law in civil cases.

He then took up the case of Mr. Tarte, upon which he pronounced judgment which also applies to the cases of Messrs. Whelan and Pacaud. "Three questions," he said, "present themselves for adjudication."

Under the Issues Raised: 1st. Whether the matter to be investigated is contained in the category of subjects mentioned in Article 596 of the Revised Statutes, and consequently whether or not the commissioners have the power purported to be conferred by Article 598, to enforce the attendance of witnesses and compel them to give evidence.

2. Whether the Legislature had the power to enact the last mentioned article and to confer upon commissioners appointed to conduct enquiries concerning public matters and upon the boards and officers mentioned in Article 597, the same power as is vested in courts of law in civil cases to enforce the attendance of witnesses and to compel them to give evidence.

3. Whether, if the two previous questions be resolved in the affirmative, the question put to the complainant was pertinent to the enquiry and therefore one which the complainant could be compelled to answer.

Taking up the first point, he held that the Crown has a right to appoint a commission of enquiry on any public matter, and this commission has the right to take evidence from willing persons, but, according to Todd, "unless expressly empowered by act of Parliament."

No Commission Can Compel the giving of evidence." As to the subject matter of enquiry, in a legal sense, it did not come within the scope of article 596, as matters relating to members of the Legislature have nothing to do with good government.

The constitution provides for three powers—the Legislature, which makes the laws; the Executive which puts them into force; and the Judiciary which constrains them. The members of the Legislature, in this instance, had nothing to do beyond enacting the law which authorized the payment of a certain sum to Mr. Whelan, and any act on their part outside of this cannot be said to refer to the Government of the Province. Consequently, the commission was without effect as a statutory commission, and could not exercise the power conferred upon commissioners by article 598, even if such article were within the power of the Legislature. It had no more power than a royal commission, and could not commit a witness for contempt for refusing to answer a question.

On the second point, the learned judge again referred to Todd, who says that "Commissions are made to enquire and report. They act ministerially and not judicially, and do not, consequently, possess the power to punish for contempt, which is inherent in judges. Now could the Legislature, by special enactment, confer such power upon a commission? Article 596, which gives to royal commissioners the power to summon witnesses and examine them, is constitutional and binding, but there is

No Penalty Provided for Refusal of a witness to comply with such summons, and the Legislature has no power to decree that the punishment shall be at the discretion of the commission; it has no right to delegate its power of fixing a penalty to any person or body, which is practically done by the terms of Article 598 of the revised statutes. For this reason said Article 598 must be declared unconstitutional.

The two first points having thus been disposed of, the learned judge abstained from adjudicating upon the third point as to whether the question was pertinent, and rendered the formal judgment declaring the writ of prohibition absolute.

Annexed to the judgment were the following remarks: "It is desired to obtain a full investigation of the subject of enquiry in the present case, the proper course will be for the commission to make a special report to the Provincial Government of their proceedings and of the circumstances which have interrupted the enquiry, and for the Government to submit the report to the Legislative Assembly, which could then order a Parliamentary investigation to be made, and could compel the witnesses summoned to give evidence either before the House itself or before a special committee appointed to make the enquiry. The complainant has, by refusing to answer a question put to him by the respondents, committed, if the question be a pertinent one, a willful violation of law of the Legislature of this province, that is of the rule of conduct laid down in article 596 of the Revised Statutes. Now any violation of an act of the legislature of any province which is not made an offence of some other kind is constituted a misdemeanor by section 26 of chapter 173 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, and is punishable accordingly. Although, therefore, the respondents cannot themselves be convicted and punished the complainant if he disobeyed the law, he is liable to be indicted for misdemeanor before the Court or Queen's Bench, and if convicted, punished accordingly.

The Attorney-General will, it appears, appeal from the judgment as far as the constitutionality of the law is concerned.

POLICE PICKINGS.

Another Mountain Park Episode.—A Disreputable House Raided.

Captain James Macdonald, of the sailing vessel "George Gordon," was ordered in the Police Court yesterday to pay \$15.40 back wages and costs to a sailor named Christian Tokelsen.

Willie Patterson, a little boy, was arrested for setting fire to a barn while engaged in smoking cigarettes with some young chums of his, and Judge Desnoyers let him off with a sound lecture yesterday.

A saloon keeper of Chaboulier Square has been fined \$50 and costs for selling liquor to an Indian from Okla.

Mrs. Eliza Whitley, through her attorney, Mr. J. M. Ferguson, has entered an hypothecary judgment for \$2750 against Dame Caroline Brunce, wife of J. A. Quintal, notary.

Sergeants Leggett and Paradis, on Thursday night, made a raid on a house of ill-fame on Elizabeth street and arrested Mme. Lavrin and a number of the inmates. Mme. Lavrin's trial was postponed till Tuesday next, but Celina Mathieu, Dolly Smith, Ida Court and Emma Brown were fined \$25, or in case of non-payment, to be confined to the house, while Marie Millette, for being a frequenter, was let off with a fine of \$10. Another girl found in the house was acquitted.

A laborer residing on St. Henry street together with a friend, imbibed a little bit too freely on Thursday afternoon and in order to recover from the effects of their numerous potations paid a visit to the Mountain Park. Here the laborer in question could not keep quiet. It was broad daylight (about three o'clock in the afternoon) and there was a little picnic party of respectable French-Canadian young ladies being held in the vicinity of the elevator leading at the time. The little pleasure party had divided itself into groups when the half-drunken rascal and his friend noticed two of the party strolling together and undertook to take advantage of them by squeezing them. The ladies yelled for help and special constable McNulty rushed to the scene. He seized the offender, while his chum escaped. The prisoner was brought before the Recorder yesterday, and after being fined \$20 or two months.

The four men arrested by Detective Robinson for being implicated in robberies from the steamships of the Dominion Line were up for trial yesterday morning. Judge Desnoyers was on the bench. They all pleaded guilty. T. Vesic and George Trudel received a month apiece, the first on account of previous good character, the second because he has a young wife and a dying mother. Joseph Floret and Thomas Gravel received three months each, and John Arthur an additional month for an additional robbery on the "Sardinian."

The City Railway is under obligation in this matter, and the civic authorities, in the interest of the humble classes in the city, should see that these obligations are observed. The aged, and women carrying children, wending their weary way to get to the mountain, is an unpleasant and unnecessary sight. And it is not easy to understand why shelter is not provided on the mountain. It rains there as elsewhere, and Mr. Villeneuve may some day say that when the railway is ready shelter should be provided. Some of the money expended on the Mountain Park might well go in this direction.

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EASTERN TOWNSHIPS.

Crop Prospects.—The Recent Storms.—Exhibitions.—Political Notes.

(SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE HERALD.)

CATCOCKE, July 24, 1890.

The harvest has fairly opened in the townships, having been well advanced, although it has received something of a setback the past few days from wind-storms which have prevailed. There will be a falling off in this year's harvest of hay by at least 20 per cent from the average crop. This is due chiefly to the exposure of the fields during the past winter through an insufficiency of snow. The other cereals and vegetable crops are looking very well, and the promise of a good yield in these is excellent. No damage of any amount was done by the crop by the recent terrific storm which swept over here, although considerable loss was sustained by the blowing down of buildings and the sad havoc it played, in many cases, with sugar orchards. One man recently told me that out of a fine orchard of his consisting of 1,000 trees, only six hundred of the best of them were laid flat. Many others have sustained great loss. The wind played havoc with the trees during its ravages. In one case it took the roof of a house, lifted a bedstead out of the upper room, sheltered by the roof, carried it away and dropped it where it has not yet been discovered.

The townships have been justly celebrated for the excellent quality and some of their exhibitors, which in the past have redounded with credit to the farming community. Already preparations on a scale more or less extensive are being made for the coming fall exhibition. I have read the catalogues of the Independent Agricultural Society of Stanstead and Compton Counties, which is to be held in Catcocke the 30th and 31st of Orleans County. Exhibition to be held at next month, and of the Stanstead and Stanstead the 27th and 28th of the same month. The prize list of both these societies exceeds \$2,000, and they offer attractions surpassing even the features of former years. The other township exhibitions will without doubt be fully up to their standard of previous shows.

Political indications point to the possible, indeed, as many say, the probable defeat of Mr. Colby if he should see fit to contest the county at the next election. Not because of any special fault of his in the House, but rather out of it. Many of his political friends feel that his personal conduct in the House, in the "lapse" of Mr. A. W. T. Smith, in the late Provincial contest, was altogether too unwelcome; that if he had come out and worked with his old time energy they would have carried the county; while, on the other hand, he offended many of the Liberals in the county who supported him in his last election by his meddling in the election at all. Many of his former staunch supporters do not disguise their chagrin at the defeat of their candidate, and threaten to revolt against him when opportunely offers. It will be remembered that Hon. Mr. Colby was reported to have expressed the conviction to a newspaper man in Quebec a few days ago, that Mr. Lovell, the newly elected member for Stanstead, would not vote a vote of confidence in Mr. Mercer when opportunity offered. Mr. Lovell will take his seat upon the Government side of the House when Parliament re-assembles, and will give Mr. Mercer his support. He, of course, will not vote on that side no matter what measures are before the House, but as long as those measures are in his opinion a vote of want of confidence in Mr. Mercer is not warranted, he said he would do in his address to his constituents when he was a candidate for their votes.

THE WATER RATES.

A Readjustment of the Present Assessments Decided On.

The regular weekly meeting of the Finance Committee was held yesterday afternoon. It was a quiet and short meeting. They met for a specific purpose, which they disposed of as well as a few other items. There were present Ald. Rolland (in the chair) Farrell, Martineau, Clendinning, McBride and Stevenson.

Ald. Farrell asked the City Treasurer how many of the special assessment accounts for drains for 1889 were outstanding.

Mr. Robb said very few, but that the difficulty was in getting the necessary measurements to send out the accounts.

Ald. Clendinning then asked what had been done with reference to the adjustment of the water rates, as mentioned by the Trades and Labor Council. The present tariff, he said, had been made about thirty years ago, and was, he thought, based on the cost of the old aqueduct. Mr. Robb, however, did not think that the tariff had been altogether based on the cost of the aqueduct.

Ald. Clendinning then moved that a sub-committee be appointed to revise the system, and to stick to it until they got into shape.

The Chairman at this stage said that he had a letter from Mr. Bourke, Secretary to the Commissioners, asking for the appointment of witnesses for the continued expropriations on St. Catherine street east. Messrs. Brown & Vainer were appointed at \$5 each per foot.

Ald. Clendinning now moved for the appointment of a sub-committee to revise the water rates. His proposition was agreed to with the result that Ald. Rolland, Clendinning and Martineau will represent the Finance and Ald. Conroy and Thompson the Water Committee.

A communication was read from Mr. J. S. Hall, asking that a bonus be granted to Mrs. Black, widow of the deceased City Treasurer.

Ald. Clendinning thought they would require to get a special act of Parliament to enable them to grant all the bonuses asked for.

Ald. Stevenson held that the case of ex-Chief Patton should have been considered before now.

Ald. Farrell wanted to know who had blocked it at the time when it was brought up.

Ald. Stevenson replied that he did not know, but he knew that a majority of the Council had promised to allow him (Mr. Patton) between \$6,000 and \$7,000. He also stated that the City Treasurer had informed him that there was a sum of \$60,000 at the disposal of the committee and he asked that it be devoted to the erection of new fire stations.

The chairman said that they would consider this in September after the vacations.

Ald. McBride and Stevenson both held out that the wants of the West ward were urgent and that it should be considered before September.

The committee then rose.

THE STRANDED IDAHO

Still Lying on the Rocks on the Coast of Ancoast.

The stranded Dominion Line steamship Idaho still lies on the rocks on the coast of Ancoast, but there is no change in the state of affairs of any importance to record. Since the storm which proved so disastrous to the steamer and shattered all hopes of ever getting her off, the weather has been moderately fine and there are hopes, should the present weather continue, that a goodly portion of her cargo will be successfully transhipped to the lighters and schooners which are now at the scene of the wreck. Since the unfortunate blow which washed the steamer inside the reef, every possible effort has been made to save her valuable cargo. While the swell, following in the wake of the storm, continued to cause the Idaho to labor heavily on the rocks, it was a hazardous occupation for the crews of the steamers and schooners who attempted to get out the cargo. In fact, so dangerous was it that the work had to be abandoned for the time being, until the well ceased. The fact that the water, which it was apparent, must come out, submerged the cargo in the holds, was raising the water on the junks, spurred the crews on to greater effort. The cargo and crew were naturally the first portion of the cargo which it was desirable to land, but the heavy sea rendered this a task of no small magnitude. The work of unloading the cargo was commenced. The schooners Florence, Snow Queen, Diver and Belleau were at once put at work and land was sock at Shrew Creek. It is a difficult undertaking under the circumstances, but it is likely that they will all be landed safely on the island, when provisions can be made later on for reloading them on the Black Diamond steamer, if possible.

Nothing positive was known about the state of the weather when the Idaho went out on Wednesday morning, but it was generally believed that the weather was foggy at the time, otherwise the accident would not have happened. The latest despatches received shatter that argument, however, as "the weather was clear with light southwest winds at the time of stranding."

SCARCITY OF CARGO

COMPLAINTS MADE BY SHIPPING COMPANIES.

Not So Much Trade from English Ports as Usual.—A Case of Supply and Demand.—Great Dulness in the Lumber Trade with South America.

There was a dullness about the wharves yesterday which has not been noticeable for many days and it is doubtful whether the present quietness has been exceeded since the opening of navigation. This morning there will only be nine ocean steamships in port, six of which are regular liners. While the absence of steam vessels is marked, it is also noticeable that there is a falling off in the number of sailing vessels usually in port at this season of the year. This is largely due, no doubt, to the stagnation in the South America lumber trade. So far there have been only two cargoes of lumber dispatched to South America, and so complete is the stagnation in this trade, that it is said that if the two vessels referred to had not been chartered in advance of the season, there would not have been a single cargo shipped.

There are a few cargoes of sugar and molasses which are discharged at present and several ships and barges are loading deals and timber for the United Kingdom, but every season sees a significant decrease in the sailing tonnage visiting this port. The first of the week there was considerable stir around the wharves which was as noticeable as is the present dullness. Some ten steamers arrived on Sunday and Monday with cargoes of coal and the first three days of the week generally sees the arrival of the regular liners from Liverpool as well as the departure of the previous week's arrivals with full cargoes. But while the steamers go out have their full complement of cargo, the incoming steamers are noticed to be generally not loaded down to their full capacity. When the reason of this is asked the officers of the steamers, if they will say anything, reply that cargo is scarce on the other side. It is said that the steamship companies feel this scarcity of cargo from English ports considerably, but
