MANUFACTURE OF STRONG DRINK.

THE RIGHTS OF THE PROVINCES IN THAT CONNECTION.

They May Prohibit Manufacture for Use in the Province, but when the Liquor is Intended for Export, It May then be Made.

(By Cable from the Star's Special Correspondent in London.)

London, May 15.—From advices received here, it appears that in Canada there is some misunderstanding with reference to question three submitted to the Privy Council in the prohibition case. This question is as follows: 3. Has a Provincial Legislature jurisdiction to prohibit the manufacture of spirituous liquors within the province? The Supreme Court's answer, given at Ottawa, was, not unanimous.

Their Lordships of the Privy Council answered the question thus: In the absence of conflicting legislation by the Parliament of Canada, Their Lordships are of the opinion that the Provincial Legislatures would have the jurisdiction to that effect, if shown that the manufacture was carried on under conditions making the prohibition merely a local matter in the province.

From this reply it will be seen, as already stated in the Star, that manufacture for provincial consumption may be prohibited, but there does not appear to be any bar for manufacturing for export to points outside the province.

AGED CATHOLIC SISTER DEAD. Cincinnati, Ohio, May 15.—Sister Rosalia, the last of the eight sisters of Notre Dame, who came to this country from Belgium in 1810, died yesterday at the convent at Reading, Ohio. She is said to have been the oldest sister in the Roman Catholic Church. She was born in 1812 and came to this country through the influence of the late Archbishop Purcell. She retired from active service several years ago.

CONVICTS START A FIRE. Paducah, Ky., May 15.—The shoe factory, broom factory and spoke factory inside the walls of the penitentiary at Ettrville were burned last night. Loss \$100,000; insurance small. By reason of the fire 400 convicts will be idle until the shops are rebuilt. It is presumed the fire was started by convicts.

IMPROVING THE GRAND TRUNK. Toronto, May 15.—(Special)—It is said in railway circles that General Manager Hays contemplates making extensive improvements on the Chicago and Grand Trunk branch of the Grand Trunk System. A large portion of the track is to be relaid with the new heavy steel rails, recently adopted by the Grand Trunk.

and already this work has commenced. Plans have been prepared also for a double track from Battle Creek to Port Huron, which will be laid shortly.

SPAIN UTTERS A REMONSTRANCE. Against the American Attitude in Regard to Cuba. Madrid, May 15.—At a Cabinet Council held yesterday, the Duke of Tetuan, Minister of Foreign Affairs, was authorized to draft a formal remonstrance against the attitude of the United States in regard to Cuba, which will be presented to the Government at Washington, and it is probable that Signor Dupuy de Lome, the Spanish Minister at Washington, will also be instructed to protest personally against the policy being pursued by the American Government.

It was also decided that the Government shall send 40,000 troops to Cuba in September. The Spanish Minister, Dupuy de Lome, being shown this morning a despatch from Madrid concerning that the Spanish Government had authorized a formal remonstrance to be presented against the attitude of the United States in regard to Cuba, replied that this was directly contrary to all his information and to the explicit statements contained in the Queen's speech. He said his Government had warned him to pay no attention to disturbing despatches in the press, as they were not to be considered on any points. The relations between Spain and the United States, he added, were cordial, and there was no friction of any kind.

SAY IT IS A LOTTERY. (Special to the Star.) Toronto, May 15.—The police here have begun a test case against the Society of Arts of Canada, of 1666 Notre Dame street, Montreal, which they allege to be a lottery. Daniel Laurin, the Toronto agent, was summoned before the Magistrate today, and the case was adjourned for a week. The company issues a circular that it has come into possession of pictures worth from \$20 to \$2000 each, selling one hundred tickets therefor at 25 cents each. The winner can have either the picture or half its value in cash.

THREE RIVERS SCHOOL. Three Rivers May 15.—(Special)—Rev. Father Fiamon, visitor-general of the Priests, is expected here to confer with the Catholic school commissioners of this city with a view of establishing an English academy here, of the nature of the Mount St. Louis Academy of Montreal.

Mr. Francis Bernet, a locomotive engineer on the Canadian Pacific Railway, who died at Quebec recently, was buried in St. Charles Cemetery by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, who wore their regalia at the funeral. Railway men and officials generally attended the funeral.

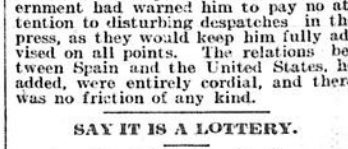

A WILL ANNULLED. Mr. Justice Pagnuelo has rendered judgment in the case of Miss Corinne Lenoir, dite Roland, against Gustave Hugues Lenoir, dit Roland, and there by annulled the will of the late Jean Baptiste Lenoir, dit Roland, fils.

The late Mr. Roland had made a will on the 15th of October, 1890. It appeared from the evidence in the case that he had been unable to speak, and had been almost dying, at the time of the making of the will. Mr. G. H. Roland had acted as his interpreter, and the will had been made on questions put by the notary and on signs of assent or dissent by Mr. J. P. Roland, the testator, who did not explain his wishes in words; nor did he sign his will, being unable to do so.

The court declared that a solemn will and testament cannot be dictated by means of signs; and those who cannot express their last wishes orally must do so by means of instructions in their own handwriting, transmitted to the notary before or during the drawing up of the will. The will in the present case was therefore declared null and void, and Mr. G. H. Roland was ordered by the court to account to Miss Roland for the property of the late J. B. Roland, of which he was in possession as universal legatee in virtue of the will in question.
