THURSDAY SAW RECORD CROWD AT BIG SHOW

D. A. McCormick Won The \$100. Government Prize on Five Clydesdales - Get of Iron Signet.

Thursday saw Ormstown Show have the most favorable weather that might be desired for the holding of such an exhibition. Under favorable conditions all previous record attendances were smashed and the gate receipts up to Thursday evening have surpassed any previous year. It is estimated that between 5000 and 6000 people attended the show last evening.

During the afternoon the judging of cattle continued in the arena and the horse classes were judged out doors. Of the horse classes the most important class was No. 28 it being five animals, geldings or mares, the get of one pure bred stallion, year old and upwards. 25 horses were in the ring and this made a fine sight. The prize was \$100 and went to Mr. D. A. McCormick. The animals in the class were the get of Iron Signet owned by A. J. Ness, Woodside Farm, Howick.

This group of 5 made up one of the smoothest and most uniform groups of Clydesdale horses ever shown at Ormstown. This speaks well for the manner in which his get were reared.

The Clydesdale female championship was awarded yesterday to Woodside Alice, owned by Albert Ness, the runner up being Royal Mistress of the Briars, owned by D. A. McCormick.

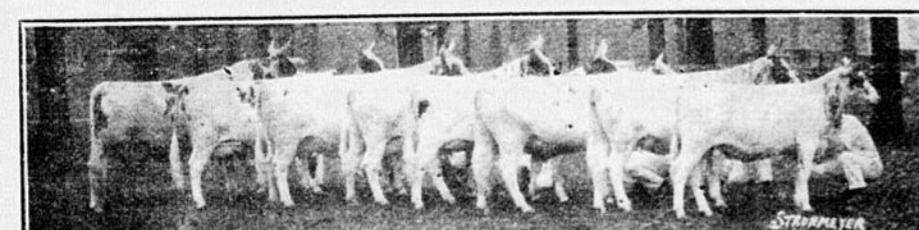

HERD OF THIRTY JERSEYS HERE

John Pringle, London, Ont. Makes First Trip to Ormstown Show Exhibiting Herd of Jersey Cattle.

Jersey cattle have never been exhibited to any great extent at Ormstown Show apart from the herd of Bull & Son of Brantford, Ont. This year John Pringle, Proprietor of the Woodview Farm Jerseys is exhibiting and the following report will undoubtedly be of interest to many visitors to the show:

The Woodview Farm, one of Canada's greatest Jersey herds, is exhibiting about thirty animals at the Ormstown Show.

Included in the lot are their senior herd bull, Rower's Golden Maids Prince, winner of junior championship at the Western Fair, London, 1920, and never shown since. His sire was Imported Champion Rower, one of the greatest breeding bulls that ever left the Island of Jersey, five of his daughters twice winning the Jersey Prize.

Another bull of note is Imported Rower's Volunteer, a young bull just out from the Island. His dam is a grand daughter of Rower and his sire is a son of You'll Do's Volunteer, a half brother of our great young sire, Woodview Jersey Volunteer, out of our famous cow, Seaside Lass, grand champion National Dairy Show, St. Paul, Minn., 1921. Seaside Lass is also the highest testing cow in Canada of her age and class.

Rower's Volunteer, a junior yearling bull, is by Volunteer, out of the last daughter of Imported Champion Rower.

Rower's Charming Volunteer, another young bull by Volunteer, is out of Rower's Charming Princess, second prize senior yearling at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto, 1926. Princess is out of Rower's Charm, first prize two year old, National Dairy Show, 1927. She was under test here for sixty-nine days, with her first calf, before being sold and gave 1649 pounds milk.

Rower's Viola's Volunteer, also a son of Volunteer. His dam is a beautiful daughter of Imported Champion Rower, not yet tested.

Rower's Oxford Flying Fox. Out of a daughter of Rower by Rower's Flying Seaside Lad, a son of Seaside Lass. His dam is now under test and in 263 days has given 5683 pounds milk as a three year old.

Jersey Volunteer's Sultan. By Volunteer out of a first prize winning daughter of Oxford Sultan of Oaklands, not yet tested.

Rower's Lass Volunteer and Rower's Princess Volunteer, are both sired by Volunteer and out of full sisters, daughters of Rower, and winners of the progeny of cow prize at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto, 1925 and 1926. They are also full sisters of our senior herd bull, Rower's Golden Maids Prince.

In females are Rower's Starlight, Rower's Golden Lass, Rower's Golden Princess and Rower's Oxford Bond, all daughters of Imported Champion Rower. Starlight is a full sister of Rower's Golden Starlight, recently sold by us for the highest price ever paid for a Canadian bred cow, and now held at \$7,500. Rower's Golden Starlight was 1st. prize cow at the last Royal Show and while still at Woodview will not be shown. Lass and Princess have many prizes to their credit.

West Lynn Princess (imp.) and Gids Golden Starlight will show as three year olds in milk. Princess was second prize two year old at the last Royal Show and Starlight is a daughter of the \$7,500 cow.

Fern Marie, a very beautiful heifer, and a winner at the Canadian National, will show as a two year old in milk, while Rower's Starlight's Fluffy, another daughter of the \$7,500 cow, will be in the dry two year old class.

In senior yearlings will be an imported heifer, a daughter of Rower's Golden Lass, a daughter of Rower's Glory and one sired by our Volunteer bull. These are four very high class heifers.

In the younger classes are half a dozen calves that have never been shown but old enough to show their quality.

We expect to have something in all the classes at Ormstown except sections, 216, 217 and 227.

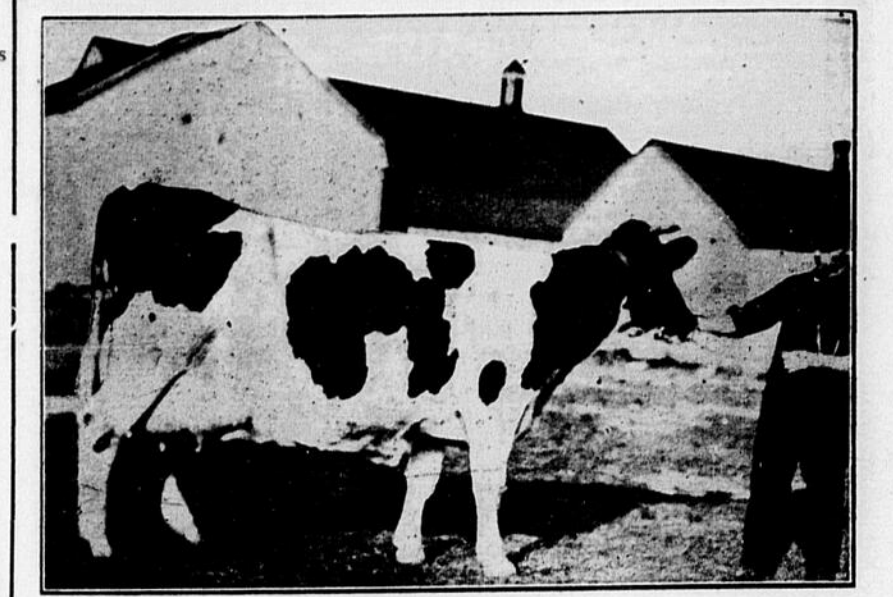

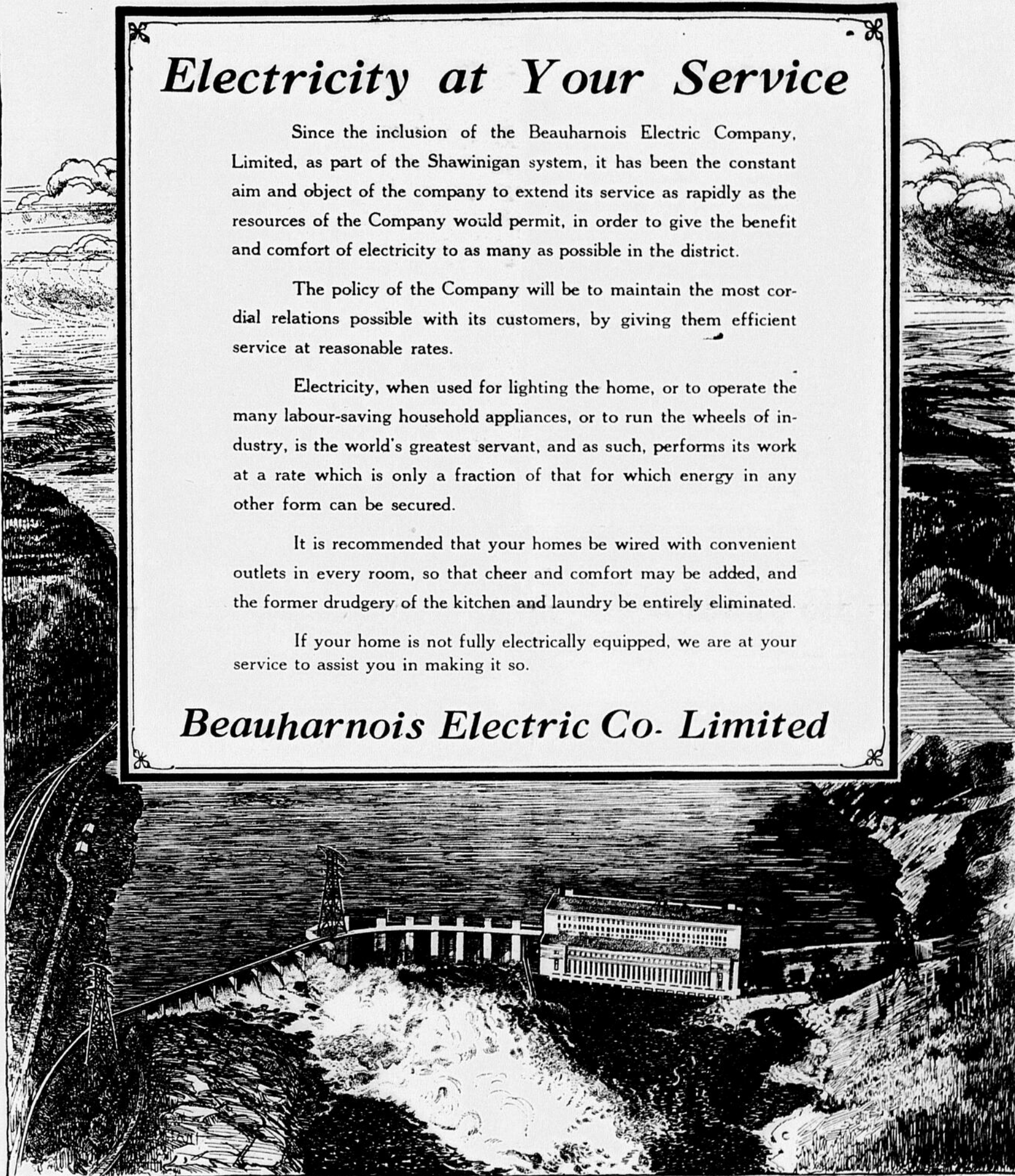

FIRST CONTEST MEDAL STRUCK BY MRS. J. A. ROBB

Monday forenoon the Royal Mint at Ottawa struck the first of the special medals which are to be offered by the schools and universities as prizes in the contests which are being arranged in connection with the Diamond Jubilee celebration of the Dominion. The ceremony of striking the first medal was performed by Mrs. Jas. A. Robb, who was then presented with the medal as a souvenir. The medals are of gold silver and bronze, the one cast by Mrs. Robb being of gold.

The number to be issued is limited, about 3000 all together. The medal presented to Mrs. Robb was larger than the remainder and on its edge was inscribed wording giving the date and Mrs. Robb's name.

The Royal Mint is now completing the large order of bronze medals which are being distributed throughout Canada, one being given to each school boy and girl in the Dominion. There are of copper and the first one was struck some days ago by Lady Willingdon, wife of the Governor-General.

Mr. Mercroft's aim is to produce pure certified milk for the use of infants and children, and incidentally, of course, also adults, but mainly for the former. The milk is obtained from a herd of around forty-five pure-bred registered cows, in connection with which a certificate from the Department of Agriculture, Health of Animals Branch, hangs on the wall of the stables to the effect that it is a tuberculosis-free accredited herd. As to the stables themselves, another certificate from the Department of Health, City of Montreal, Division of Food Inspection (Milk) attests that they have been awarded 98 points out of a possible hundred for having fulfilled practically all requirements in a very thorough and searching inspection by that department.

An average of a hundred and fifty gallons of pure milk is produced daily at Mercroft Farms and of this quantity about one-half is certified. The certificate is supplied by the Montreal Certified Milk Commission and is shown on a standard hood seal closed about the neck of the bottle containing the milk with a ring which can easily be loosened and the cap removed but which protects the public fully by the fact that it cannot be resealed except by the dairy itself. This certificate means that the milk is up to a very high standard which no milk in the city betters and which no milk in the province even equals. It means that the cows are non-tuberculous, that their stables are light, airy, well ventilated, free of moisture and with no accumulation of impurities such as manure, etc.

A very rigid and uncompromisingly scientific method has been adopted by the Farms to ensure so remarkable a result. In conversation with Andrew Gray, farm manager there, this was fully brought to light.

Every cow is clipped of hair in a wide swath around the flanks and udders, again with a view to minimizing the harboring of dust, and the animal is carefully groomed every day before milking, its udder and flanks being washed.

In selecting his herd Mr. Mercroft was at first inclined to choose Holstein or Jersey cows. But after experiments and tests it was found that Ayrshire cattle were most suitable. Holsteins were found to have too low a proportion of butter fat; Jerseys too high a proportion and Ayrshires the more desirable medium proportion.

It has taken about a year and a half to attain the high degree of excellence in milk production achieved by Mercroft Farms. At first difficulties were found, but they were analyzed and surmounted. On the whole it has been seen that at the back of this success there was only needed a firm basis of common sense. Pasteurizing has of course obvious merits, but apart from the fact that pasteurized milk shows a loss of vitamins and therefore nourishing properties for infants, it has been shown that all the purity associated with that process can be equally well attained by care and scientific methods, while it is only a question of organization to cut down to the limit the extra time that is taken up. "A raw food with guaranteed purity is what I am out to give the public, and I believe I am achieving my ambition," is Mr. Mercroft's opinion.

That it is easily within the power of any farmer to attain this degree of perfection in his product is a further opinion of Mr. Mercroft and one that is shared by his farm manager, Mr. Gray.

The Guaranteed Pure Milk Company of the city distributes the certified milk supplied by Mercroft Farms. For the past year or so, not a morning has been missed by that a truck-load has left Dorval for the Montreal market. Of the thousands of bottles of milk thus despatched every one bears the seal of the Montreal Certified Milk Commission and all of them live right up to this implication. There is a growing demand for this product, but if Mr. Mercroft depended upon his milk for a livelihood, he would be a poor man. He deserves the thanks of the province for the way in which he has pioneered the path and blazed the way for the purest milk possible for the rising generation.
