FRENCH DEAD IN BED. Death attributed to Over Indulgence in Alcohol.

Odina Gendron, a dressmaker, residing at No. 23 Little Champlain Street, was found dead yesterday afternoon. There is good reason to believe that her death was due to indulging too freely in strong drink. The unfortunate woman was discovered lying across her bed without her clothing, and only partly covered by a sheet. A bottle of liquor was found near her, and it is supposed that in a drunken fit she threw herself on the bed, and passed away. No one resided with her. The deceased was about twenty-five or thirty years of age, and of medium size. Dr. A. G. Belleau was duly notified and will hold an inquest on Saturday afternoon, during which time Constable Thorne will gather any information he can in connection with the case. The body has been removed to the morgue, where a post mortem will be held at two o'clock this afternoon by Dr. Marcia, Professor of Medical Jurisprudence at Laval University.

LORD MINTO'S ARRIVAL.

Doubtful If He Can Reach Here By Saturday.

BAD WEATHER MAY DETAIN HIM.

Possibility That Lord Aberdeen May Not Greet His Successor.

Although preparations are being made for the reception here of Lord Minto, the new Governor-General, on Saturday, it is very doubtful if he will arrive in time. The Scotsman, on which the Vice-Regal party is crossing the Atlantic, left Liverpool on Thursday week last, and will have made fairly good time if she reaches here Saturday. But all the incoming vessels have been delayed by storms from two to three days. The Labrador, which brought out the domestic staff of the Governor-General, reached here Monday, two days late, after a very rough passage. The Lake Superior is reported two days behind. It is, therefore, hardly to be expected that the Scotsman will reach here on schedule time. It will not be surprising if, under the circumstances, she is not here till Monday next. There has as yet been no report and after the Scotsman passes Health Point, where she is thought to be sighted, she will have a run of 34 hours. Lord Aberdeen is, however, expected here to-morrow and in the evening he will receive a civic address. Lord Aberdeen is booked to sail on Saturday afternoon in the Labrador, after welcoming his successor and transferring his office to him. But, if Lord Minto is delayed till Monday, as seems more than likely, Lord Aberdeen may not be able to receive his successor. He may take passage on Saturday and pass Lord Minto on the St. Lawrence.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR TO-DAY. It is expected that Lord Aberdeen, accompanied by Lady Aberdeen and staff, will arrive here at 2.15 this afternoon by the Canadian Pacific Railway from Montreal. They will be received by Mayor Parent and the City Council at nine o'clock at the City Hall, where an official reception will be tendered them and a farewell address presented to them from the citizens of Quebec. The Eighth Royal Rifles band and a guard of honor from the Central Canadian Artillery will be posted at the main entrance of the City Hall to receive His Excellency, Lady Aberdeen and the civic authorities on their arrival. The Vice-regal party, after the presentation of the address, will hold a formal reception of Quebec's citizens in the Council Chamber, to which invitations have been issued only to those holding official positions, but as will be seen by the advertisement in another column all citizens are invited, as it is the especial wish of her Excellency, Lady Aberdeen, to receive the representatives of the Quebec branch of the National Council of Women will present an address to her Excellency as the organizer of that institution in the Dominion of Canada. The presentation will be made by Lady G. Tougnaux, wife of the Chief Justice, President of the Quebec branch. The City Hall will be decorated for the occasion.

MONTGOMERY RULED OUT. Quebec Historical Society also Protests Against a Monument.

At the monthly meeting of the Literary and Historical Society of Quebec, on Wednesday, Philippe Baby Casgrain, President, in the chair, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

Moved by Sir James McPherson LaMoine, Vice-President, seconded by the Very Rev. Dean Norman, Vice-President.

1. That the Literary and Historical Society is happy in seizing on the present occasion to add its protest to the energetic protests of several leading Historical Societies of Canada, against the recently mooted project of honoring by a public monument, at Quebec, the memory of the brigadier General Richard Montgomery, the leader of the invading host, who fell at Pres-de-Ville, Quebec, on the 31st December, 1775, in his abortive attempt to capture the city, which, according to the General Order promulgated by him to his army, on the 15th December, 1775, was to be taken, delivered to pillage.

2. That the idea of honoring the memory of a fallen, ruthless foe, invading unprovoked the territory of a friendly people, and using to that end the knowledge acquired by him whilst a British officer under the Royal Order, is nothing short of an insult to the hallowed memory of the patriotic and devoted defenders of our soil, our brave militiamen and regulars, who shed their blood to save their hearths and homes from devastation and pillage.

3. That whilst this Society rejoices with all Quebec at the present friendly feeling existing towards our neighbours across the border, nothing, in its opinion, would tend more to impair and destroy this friendly feeling than this attempt to recall from the dust of a dead past an unpalatable—a painful memory.

First Snow of the Season. The first snow storm of the season struck town yesterday afternoon, and the beautiful industriously piled itself upon the car tracks to such an extent that it created quite a small blockade of the street cars, necessitating the use of the sweepers about 7 o'clock this morning. There is on an average three or four inches of snow on the level. The probs indicate a continuation of the storm to-day with cold weather to-morrow, so that it is barely possible that the present flurry is laying the foundation for winter.
