The Pontiacs step up into International Hockey on Friday, December 8th when they will take on the Romanian National Hockey Team at the Lions Community Centre in Shawville.

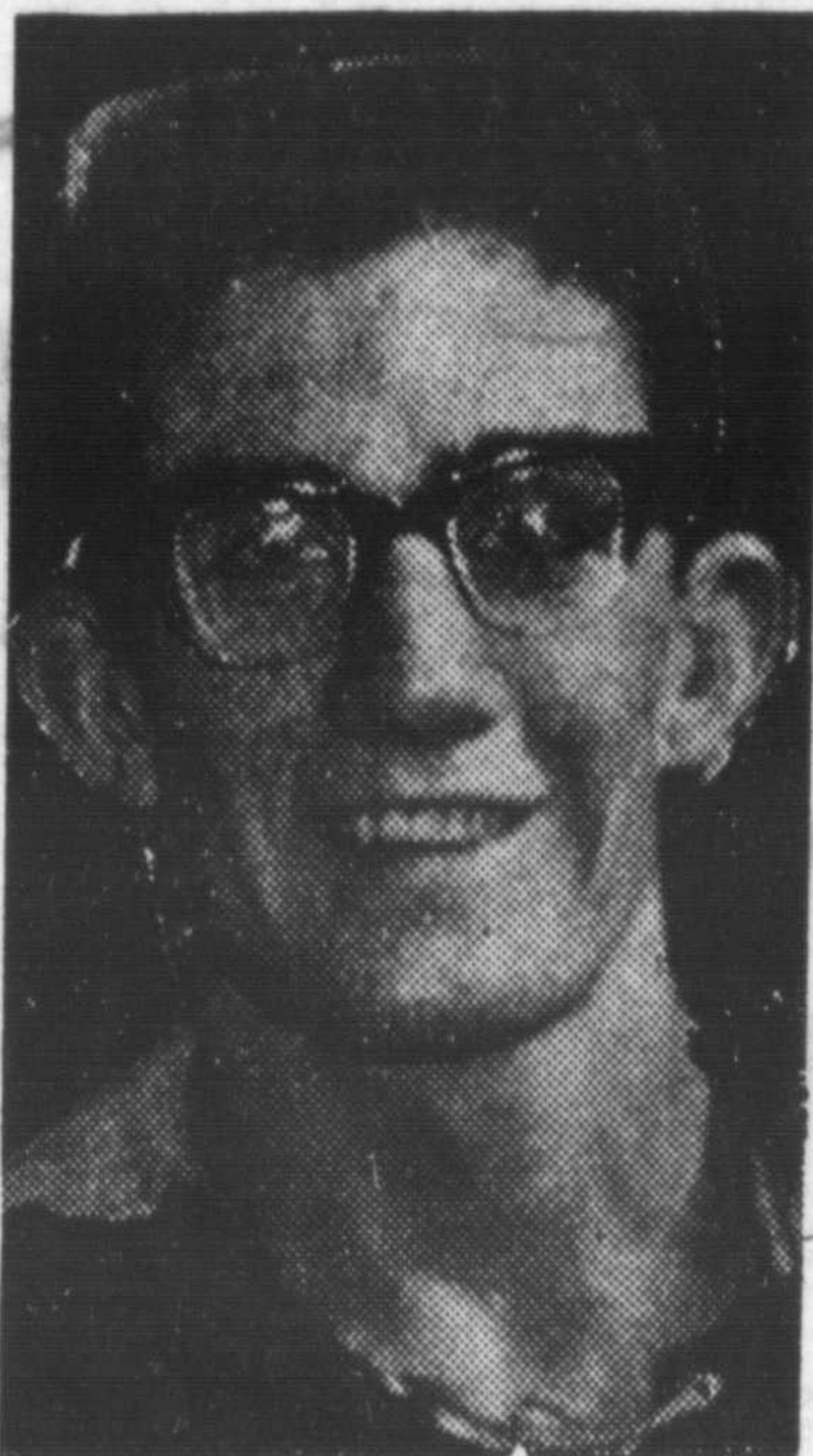
The Municipality of Shawville has invited the touring Romanian Team to play an exhibition game with our home team on that date. A six man committee made up of Councillors Dale Thomson and Allan Black, two members of the Lions Club and two members of the Pontiacs Hockey Club meets Wednesday night to finalize plans for this tremendous feature game.

The Shawville Pontiacs first home game will be played in the Lions Community Centre on Friday, November 17th against the highly regarded Morrisburg - Brockville Combines. The Combines were champions of the St Lawrence Senior League last year and their appearance in Renfrew in the League opener on Friday the tenth and then in Shawville on Friday the 17th assures large turn-outs for these two big starts. At Renfrew Herb Jordan, an outstanding performer with the famous Renfrew Millionaires, will drop the puck for the official opening face-off. On the Renfrew North Stars are players from Eganville, Foymount, Killaloe, Micksburg, Pembroke and Ottawa.

The Pontiacs will have Keith Horner who for many years has capably handled the team as manager for the 67-68 season. Royce Richardson and Brian Murray will be playing coaches.

## New bridge now in use earlier than expected!

Last weekend a heavy load of Pulp proved too much for the already weakened and outdated 10 ton capacity iron bridge that has been in existence since about 1898 at Portage du Fort almost causing an accident when it went through the flooring, resting on the supporters beneath. No one was injured.

All traffic had to be rerouted on to the new 60 ton modern bridge that has been

under construction about 200 feet below the old structure since early 1966. The road approaches are not all completed, but passable. It is expected an official opening will take place when the contract is completed. This is the only Inter-provincial Bridge between Ottawa and Pembroke and traffic is heavy since the construction of the New Consolidated Kraft Mill near Portage du Fort.

## Agricultural land use in Pontiac County

A land use survey issued by the Census Division of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics for the year 1966 reveals that there were a thousand and twenty three farms listed for Pontiac County in the last year.

Of these 1023, one was less than three acres, eight were 3 to 9 acres, 43 were 10 to 69 acres, 240 were 70-129 acres, 136 were 130 to 179 acres, were 240 to 399 acres, 109 were 205 were 180 to 239 acres, 251 400 to 559 acres, 19 were 560 to 759 acres, eight were 760 to 1119 acres, two were 1120

to 1599 acres and one is over 1599 acres.

The total land area in Pontiac County is 6,118,000 acres of which 235,889 is used for farming so the average size farm is 230 acres.

The use of farm land in Pontiac is broken down into nine categories. The total area under crops, improved pasture, summer fallow and other improved lands is 123,569 acres or almost half the farm land.

Crops including field crops, fruits, vegetables, nursery and greenhouse products cover 75,487 acres of this improved land. Improved pasture accounts for 42,991 acres. This includes all lands used for pasture or grazing which has had some improvement made during recent years. The most usual type of improvements were seeding, fertilizing, weed and brush clearing, weed control, drainage and irrigation. Natural prairie or pasture land and hay land that was pastured after the hay was cut is not included in this figure of 42,991 acres of improved pasture.

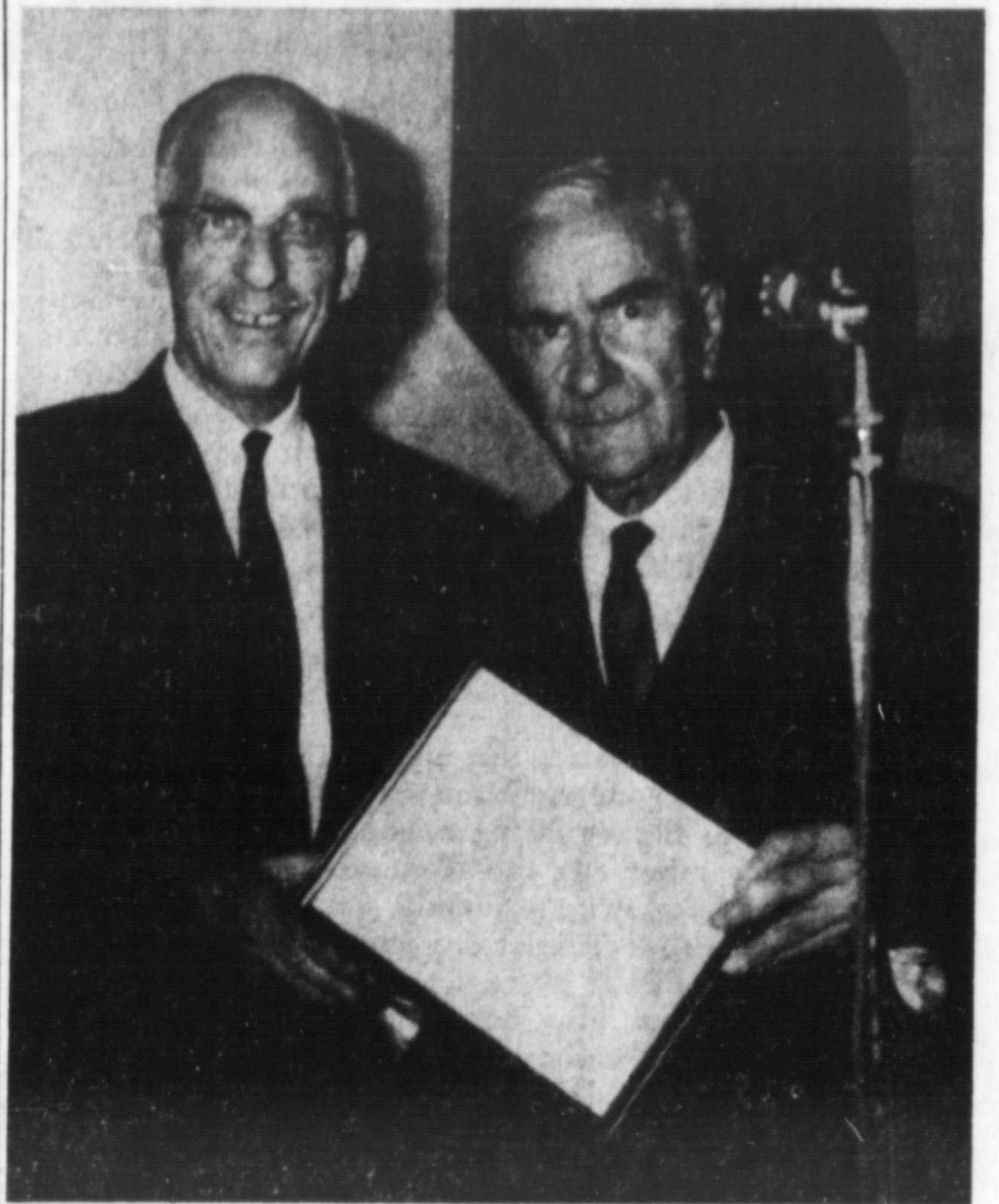
There were 998 acres unharvested in 1966. This summer fallow acreage was cultivated and worked during the year for weed control or moisture conservation, and also included in this figure is land which was sown to a crop and ploughed under as green manure. Land ploughed or cultivated after a crop such as hay or fall rye was listed as cropland.

Other improved land such as barnyards, home gardens, lanes and roads on farms, land which had been cultivated at one time but had not in 1966 been either pastured, cropped or summer fallowed and areas of new breaking which had not yet been cropped altogether accounted for 4093 acres in Pontiac County.

Unimproved land totalled 112,320 acres of which 88,153 is woodlands and 24,480 is either natural pasture or hay land not cultivated, brush pasture, grazing or wasteland, sloughs, marsh and rocky land.

The woodlots covering 88,153 acres of farm lands included private land leased from others for wood cutting, sugar bush, and cut over land with seedlings or trees which have or will have value as timber, fuel wood, or Christmas trees. Areas of trees planted for windbreaks was

# All denominations join in Christian Education Convention

"Communicating the Gospel" was the theme at this year's Pontiac Christian Education Convention held in the new Bethel Pentecostal Church, Shawville on Wednesday afternoon and evening, November 1st.

In the theme address, the Rev'd E. N. McColl spoke on effective ways in which the Good News of Jesus is communicated from one person to another and from one group to another. Mr McColl said actions speak louder than words, that a neighborly good deed does more in communicating the Gospel than much talk.

"We must be Christian farmers, office workers, housewives, parents. We become a sphere of influence . . . The love of God within us will produce a new and deeper sense of life, in all corners . . . God has called us to extend humbly to others His love," he said.

A film strip, with recording was shown during the afternoon session called "What is communication?" In order for there to be effective communication, the Teacher and pupil must be on the same level. The teacher must be a good listener. There must be receptivity and response, back and forth, on the part of both the teacher and the pupil. The teacher, in his examples and language, should refer to the experiences of the pupils. Seeing and hearing are good ways of communicating, but the best way of learning is doing. These were the messages of the film.

During discussion, following the film, the following worthwhile ideas were expressed: The best time to prepare a lesson is just after a preceding lesson. Teachers must so teach that their pupils themselves become good teachers of the Faith. A good teacher keeps checking that his pupils are receiving the lesson. Children like to act out situations and, in this way, learn the meaning of a lesson.

The Intermediate Choir of the Pentecostal Church offered several action songs, enthusiastically given and received.

The member Sunday Schools presented their annual reports and an offering was taken for the work of the Pontiac Christian Education Council. A very worthwhile Book Display was introduced by the Rev'd John Pearce on behalf of Mr Bell of the new Christian Book Centre, Cowley Building, Shawville.

At the delicious supper given by the Ladies of the Pentecostal Church, a free-will collection was taken for the work of the Oxford Committee for Famine Relief (OXFAM).

The evening session began with a showing of the sound Film Strip, "The Communicators", presented by The Rev'd Frere Kennedy. The film showed the basic elements of effective communication. Christian Communication is not so much teaching or learning as "What shall we become together?" One important key is accepting the other person as a person. Good communication relates a person to God, to the Church, to other people and to his surroundings.

Mrs Fred McCagg, Secretary-Treasurer of the Council, presented the Minutes of last year's Convention, and also the Treasurer's report. The Chairman during the day, was Mrs Hillis Graham of Wyman, President of the Pontiac Christian Education Council.

One of the lighter moments in the proceedings was a completely unrehearsed Hymn-Sing by the Ministerial Choir. (This was a musical "Tour de force" to say the least.)

The highlight of the evening session was a Community Panel. The panel members were Mr Horner, grandfather, Mrs Marks, parent, Miss Sharon Lemay, a young person, and Mrs Henry McCord teacher. The efficient and diplomatic Moderator was The Rev'd Donald Smith of the Bristol Charge, the United Church.

A spontaneous discussion followed. It was felt that the key to Christian Communication was in the home. It is the example of parents which counts the most in communicating the Good News to young people. And it is the way a person lives which speaks louder than words in the community.

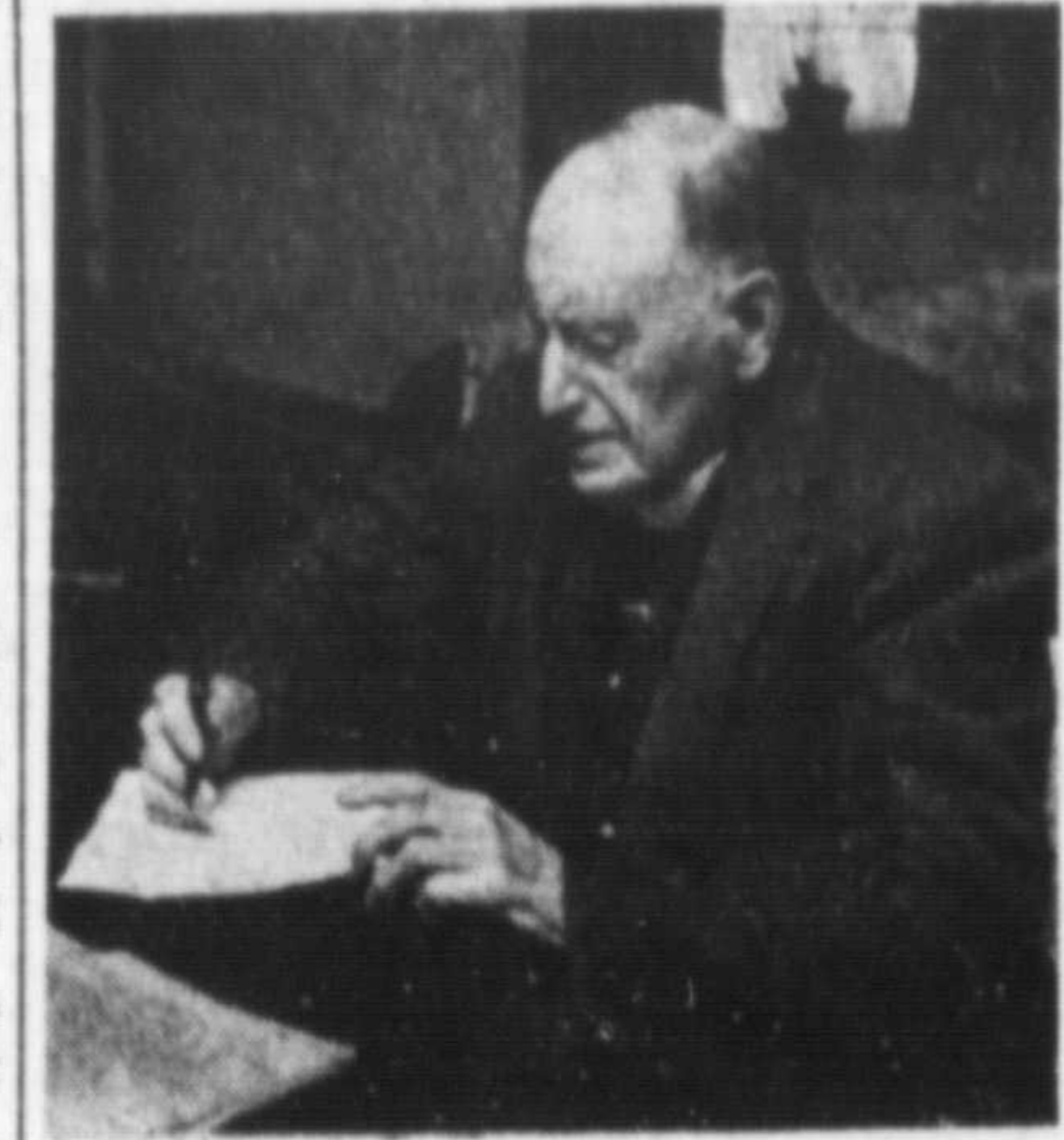
A lively open discussion followed. Much of this centred on the matter of getting time for family worship together. It was felt that greater effort was needed to bridge the gap between daily life and worship.

Te Rev'd George Atkinson, who, as host minister offered opening devotions in the afternoon and evening, mentioned during discussion that it was Jesus, Himself who is the true Communicator, seeking to communicate through human beings.

The Nominating Committee gave its report and a report was offered on the Older Boys' Parliament. This year, the Council will again help to sponsor any boys attending the Parliament at McMaster University, during the Christmas holidays, from the Pontiac.

The evening concluded with a rousing rendition of "Mine Eyes Have Seen The Coming OF THE LORD" by the Ministerial Choir (now better rehearsed-) with Convention delegates joining in the chorus.

Some 90 persons attended the meetings. It was commonly felt that the Convention had been one of the most spirited and successful in recent years. Next year's Convention will be at St Paul's Church, Shawville.

This recent photo presents the late Canon Baugh at the studies which were a part of his life to the end. The obituary of the Rev'd Canon Baugh appeared in last week's EQUITY. At 95 years of age, he was the oldest practicing Anglican minister in Canada. His son, the Rev'd Horace G. Baugh conducted the committal at the burial in Mille Isles, and his father, also an Anglican minister served in the pulpit in England until he was 92. His brothers also, the Rev'd Horace Baugh and the Rev'd William Baugh, entered the Anglican ministry and it is said that the late Canon Cyrus W. P. Baugh never took a vacation in 60 years of ministry and only missed two services because of illness. His first call in Canada was at Campbell's Bay and he also served Portage du Fort and North Clarendon. His widow is the former Ella Judd of Greer Mount.

### The man who made the West "golden"

An event to remember which happened in 1867 is the birth of Sir Charles Edward Saunders, knighted at the age of 64 for his contribution to agriculture. Saunders produced the famous Marquis wheat and added more wealth to Canada than any other man.

It was February 2, in the year of Canadian Confederation, that Charles was born, the third of five sons of Wil-

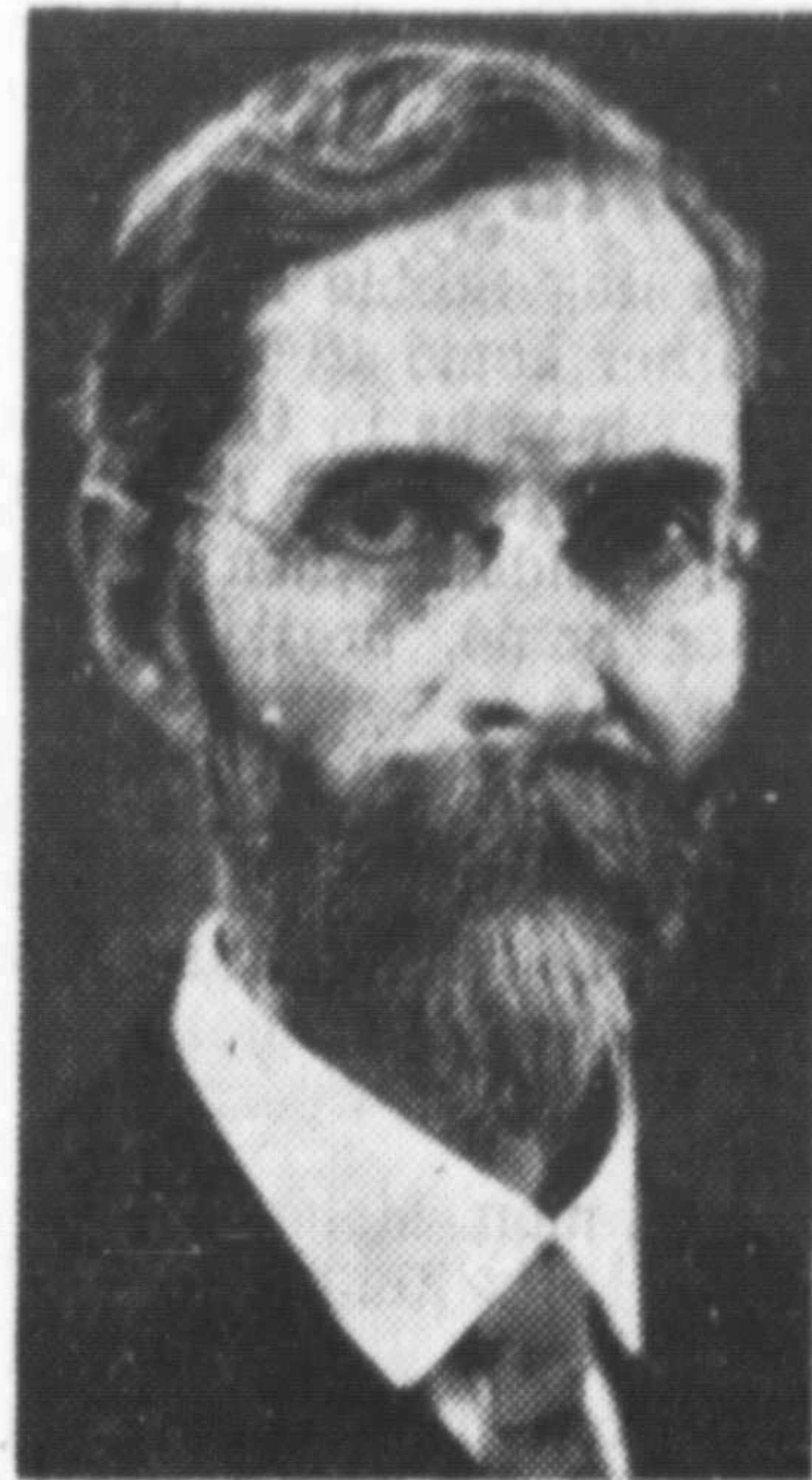
liam Saunders, a self-educated chemist who became a professor at the University of Western Ontario and carried out agricultural experimental work on his own farm which contained orchards, vineyards, cereal test plots and a small laboratory. William was asked by the federal government to set up and head an experimental farms service across Canada and his sons carried on his interest in

agricultural improvement, especially through chemistry and with grain.

To bring everything possible to their work, the Saunders boys intermittently studied and taught at various Universities and spent many long years in practical experimentation.

The Marquis strain which Charles Saunders eventually developed ripened ten days earlier than previous varieties and had superior quality to all others so as to command the highest prices in Europe which was an important factor in offsetting the cost of shipping wheat from western Canada.

Even though more recent developments have brought better types of wheat, Marquis is still grown on about a hundred thousand acres of

Sir Charles Edward Saunders, who developed Marquis wheat and helped make the Canadian prairies one of the world's great wheat growing areas, was born 100 years ago—on February 2, 1867.

Saskatchewan and Alberta and it is still considered the standard of milling and baking quality for hard red spring wheat in Canada.

In 1928 this miracle wheat yielded 500 million bushels and was credited with making the west "golden".

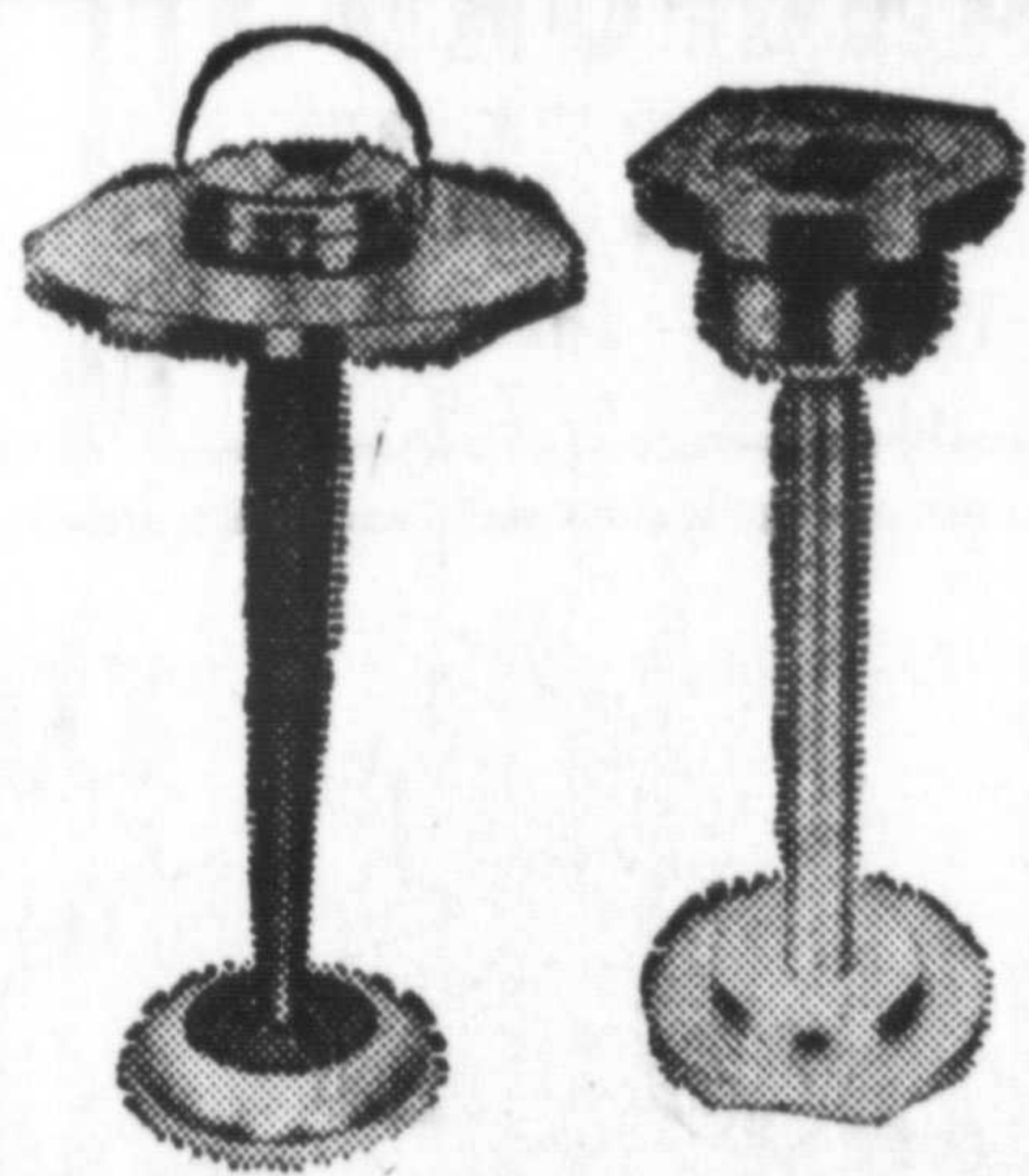

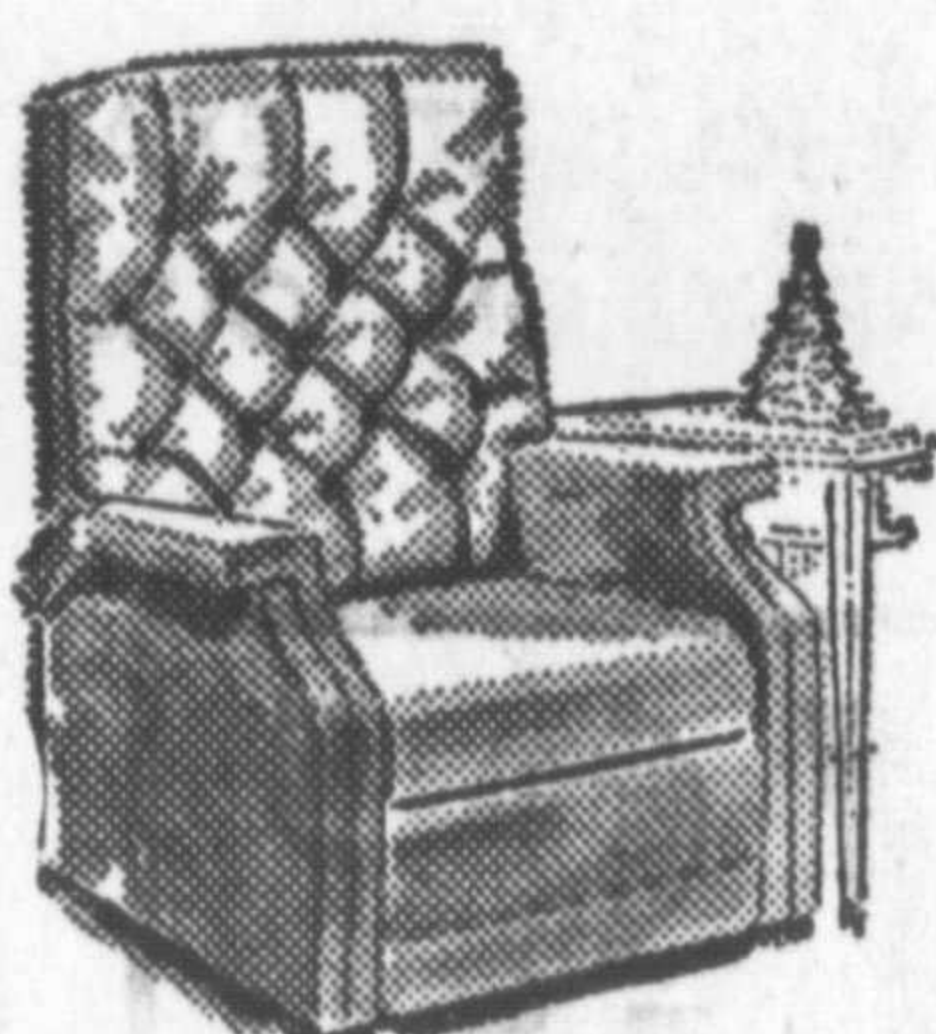

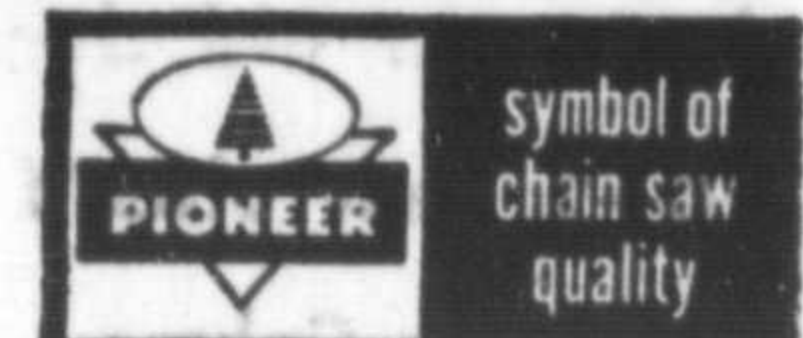

Three amusing recollections have been contributed by Norval Kilgour. The first relates how Portage William Hodgins went visiting one evening at the home of Richard Hodgins of the Hill, staying until after dark, and who on the way home saw what he was sure was a ghost near the farm of C. Caldwell. It turned out to be a white bull in a field of black cows which only goes to prove that things are seldom what they seem.

The second of Norval's stories is of a Miss Lizzie Kennedy who was bothered by noises in the upstairs of her home near Charteris. She asked Mr. Sly who had a woodlot nearby to come and investigate and he found a black snake looping across the loose boards to get mice. This story proves, according to the teller, that it is better to investigate than to move out and say the house is haunted.

Fear, loneliness, poverty, prejudice, crime, war, ignorance, anxiety, man has yet to learn how to exercise dominion over his own spirit, from which these evils come.

"Thou has put all things in subjection under his feet", Expo '67 seems to say. "But now we see not yet ALL things put under him", the Christian Pavilion adds. The challenge that Expo leaves us with is to make known the truth which follows, in the Epistle to the Hebrews, "we see Jesus . . . crowned with glory and honour." The challenge is to make HIM known, in our family, our congregation, our community, our nation, our world. Jesus, being the "express image" of God, is the image of man as he was meant to be. When HIS dominion is made known and acknowledged, then and only then is there hope for the future of "Man and his World."

## Country Notes

By Walker Riley,

Macdonald College, Agricultural Extension

Overseas during the war, we Canadians used to tell the British chaps about our Rocky Mountain goats which had shorter legs on the left side than on the right side. For

generations, we solemnly explained these animals had grazed into wind on the same side of the mountain. I don't know to this day if they believed us or not.

Well, the dairy cows around Richmond and Melbourne in the Eastern Townships are not so well equipped for hillside grazing, but it would sure help. In three days of judging pastures for the local competition, tramping over eighteen farms, we walked forty miles horizontally and sixty vertically. But it was beautiful from the tops of those hills, with the leaves turning colour and a fifty-mile view in all directions. So beautiful, that Jacques Martin, the Richmond County Agronomer, and I had a hard time putting our full attention to the business of pasture management. Perhaps the last week of September seems late to be judging pastures, but we found it ideal. Anyone can show you a good field of grass in June, and you will be hard put to say whether it will produce more pounds milk per acre than the neighbor's across the fence. But, when September comes, bad management stands out

like a sore thumb. If fertility was short, you can see it from a mile off. If the legumes, alfalfa, trefoil and ladino didn't get their "rest" in the critical month of September, you can't hide it.

If the rotational grazing system was forgotten under pressure of other work, the cows will be wandering over acres of bare pasture. If the chain harrows stayed behind the barns all summer, the best ladino-timothy field will be as hummocky as a bull-grass swamp.

Best of all, by the end of September, you can get a fairly close estimate of milk per acre. This is the proof of the pudding. If results are there in dollars and cents production, you can't argue too much with the fine details of how to get there.

In Richmond County, we found pastures producing from less than 2000 lbs milk per acre to a few over 5000 lbs per acre. Or, in terms of dollars from \$80 to \$200.

Dennis Keenan, Wales Home Farm, Ernie Wilkins, Roderick Morrison and Donald Johnston were at the top end of this comfortable scale.

Without exception, these men were spending a lot of money on fertilizers.

This, we are convinced, is the real key to production. It costs money, but it comes back many times over. And in less than six months.

The Wales Home Farm gave us a striking example of this. This spring, Elmer Crack turned the bulldozer loose on 12 acres of rough, shrub-covered hillside pasture that couldn't support a goat. For the next month, his crew picked tons of stones, limed, fertilized, disced and seeded it to a pasture mix, mainly ladino and timothy, and oats. Elmer says the soil tested called for 400 lbs 4-24-20 per acre. He used 500 lbs. Nearly twenty-five dollars worth.

You will have to see it to believe it now. The ladino is in there solid. Elmer says his 50 cows fed most of the summer on those 12 acres. Even including the old pastures, he thus carried two animal-units per acre all summer.

Dennis Keenan can show you the same thing. He has been working at his several years now. With 23 big Holsteins on 14 acres of ladino-grass, he had a score of 2.3 animal units per acre. His fertilizer rate, we noted was 300 lbs per acre each year.

Nowhere have we seen ladino grow the way it does in those Eastern Township hills. They say its the high summer rainfall. But the ones who are cashing in on this gift, are those who are feeding it. Elmer's and Dennis' will take away 150 lbs potash. What it can't get out of the soil, or back in the manure, must come out of the fertilizer bag.

For ladino pastures that are already established, 300-500 lbs of 0-20-20 or 0-15-30 seems to give best results, top-dressed on the pasture in the fall. Where the phosphorous level is high, a potash fertilizer may be all that is needed.

Roderick Morrison has a rough pasture he renovated with chemicals and seeded to ladino. It is exciting, but that story will have to wait.

### COULONGE W I

The November meeting of the Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs Anne Fummerton, Ft Coulonge.

The President, Mrs Ted Colton was in the chair. The members answered Roll Call with an item of local interest. The business meeting centered around plans for Christmas and the future meetings.

Mrs Fummerton, had the President introduce the Rev Robert D. Bhe, local Minister of the Presbyterian Church, as the speaker for the occasion. The topic was on Publicity. Rev Mr Bhe had chosen as his subject the idea of the Jews and the Arabs.

By way of introducing the subject, Mr Bhe mentioned that the conflict and difficulties between the Jews and Arabs dated back many centuries. From the Genesis account it was pointed out that both groups sprung from Abraham. The Jews come from the promised son of Abraham and Sarah, whereas the Arabs from the bond woman, Hagar. Genesis also tells us that the one group would persecute the other.

Both groups of these people hold the city of Jerusalem very sacred since their early history centres around that city. It is believed that Abraham sacrificed Isaac on the Rock that was in the center of Solomon's Temple and then from about 700 A.D. the Mosque of Omar now stands and is presided over by the Arabs.

To illustrate a visit made by Rev Mr Bhe, pictures were projected upon the wall, showing some of the interesting churches which were built over the historical sights. Following the illustrated talk several questions were asked and answered. A collection of foreign money was also shown and enjoyed by the group. The Rev R D Bhe was thanked by Mrs H R Rabb.

Following the close of the meeting delicious refreshments were served by the hostess, Mrs Fummerton.

**Who has seen Pontiac's biggest tree?**

Edgar Mulligan of Luskville is looking for the biggest tree in the Ottawa Valley. He has a tricky way of figuring what he calls bigness in a tree and all he needs is its height, breast and crown measurements. The height is measured in feet, the circumference at breast height in inches, and the crown diameter in feet. You add the feet high to the inches around at breast height to one quarter of the foot distance across the crown. The resultant number is nei-

ther feet nor inches but merely a number which represents bigness.

A pine tree with a bigness of 237 has been found in North Onslow and a cottonwood with a bigness of 252 grows in South Onslow. Ottawa South can boast of a white pine with a bigness of 271 and Britannia has a cottonwood whose bigness figure is 275. Surely we can do better than that! If you've forgotten how to measure the height of a tree ask any school boy or teacher. As for getting a quarter of the diameter of the crown, would the shade at high noon help? Just a suggestion.

**With Confederation came help for the farmers of the new nation**

Here, in the farming communities of Pontiac County, the happening of Confederation a hundred years ago took on a special meaning because of the simultaneous organization of the Department of Agriculture. But in those early days, that Department might truly be said to have bitten off more than it could chew.

To begin with, when the Department of Agriculture was conceived in the year of Confederation it was given responsibility for Immigration, Emigration, Public Health, Quarantine, the Marine and Emigrant Hospital at Quebec, Arts and Manufactures, Census, Statistics, Patents of Invention, Copyright, Industrial Design and Trade Marks!

The total staff at the outset included twenty seven civil servants!

Their involvement with farming was limited to occasional reports on district agricultural conditions by the immigration officers and some early legislation on control of animal diseases.

But they were active in other fields. In 1870, on the arrival at Saint John, N.B., of a ship from Trinidad, the Department reported that six days after sailing, yellow fever broke out on board with nine cases and three deaths occurred during the passage. The vessel was detained in quarantine nine days under rigid purification and discharged free from infection, the crew in good health, every precaution having been used with both the ship and the ballast.

In 1873 the Department took part in the Great Industrial Exhibition in Vienna, and in 1874 a hundred thousand dollars was voted for the purpose of bringing Canadian products before the eyes of the whole world at the Universal Exhibition at Philadelphia, all under the auspices of the Department of Agriculture. A few years later two hundred and eight cubic tons of exhibits were sent to an exhibit in Australia.

The Department's statistics compilers discovered early that "delays, extra labour and annoyance created by the negligence and supineness of many assignees has rendered the task of compiling very arduous."

The Department's involvement in health included the collection of statistics on bubonic plague, smallpox, dysteria, leprosy and beri beri and another part of their work was the collection and arrangement of Historical Archives.

Accounts of the activities of Immigration Agents both in Canada and abroad under jurisdiction of the Department of Agriculture accounted for ninety per cent of the early

reports of the Department to Parliament, and even as late as 1885 the only money voted for the general purposes of agriculture was in the matter of cattle quarantine and inspection, gathering of statistics and grants to exhibitions.

Gradually though, the non-agricultural activities of this overloaded Department were removed to the Departments of Marine and Fisheries, the Interior, Trade and Commerce, Immigration and Colonization and so forth and eventually, by 1918, the Department of Agriculture became solely concerned with farming matters, but even still, fifty years later, the Department receives occasional enquiries about copyrights

and other non-agricultural matters.

At present, there are some activities of the Department which do not strictly apply to farming as such, for instance the supervision of betting at racetracks. The Criminal Code restricts betting at race tracks and responsibility for supervision is assigned to an officer appointed by the Minister of Agriculture whose Department is equipped to

provide a photo-finish camera service, film patrol and saliva and urine tests.

But for the most part the Department has become a goldmine of experimentation and information and assistance in every aspect of agriculture as practiced in Canada today. From 27 employees in 1867 it has grown to thousands as farming continues to be the major industry in our one hundred year old nation.
