Canada Celebrates Apple Week

Salute Nature's Masterpiece

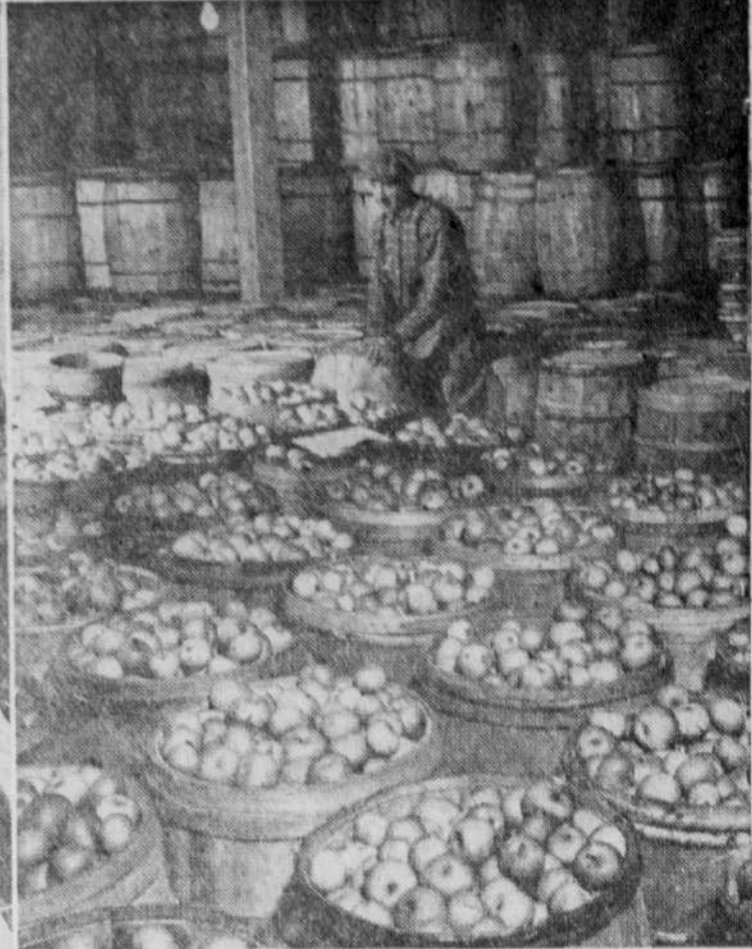


For real eating pleasure no fruit can equal the Canadian apple. In its nature has achieved a masterpiece . . . beauty of form and colour, appetizing aroma, crisp juicy texture, delicate flavour. Canada's climate is es-

pecially suited to the growing of apples, and to Canadians the apple is their national fruit. Above, a pretty picker displays a bough of the popular Macintosh apples grown in B.C.'s lush Okanagan Valley.



Careful pruning is an important part of orchard maintenance. Pruning permits sunlight (essential for bright colouring of fruit) to penetrate all parts of the tree. It also facilitates spraying, thinning and picking.

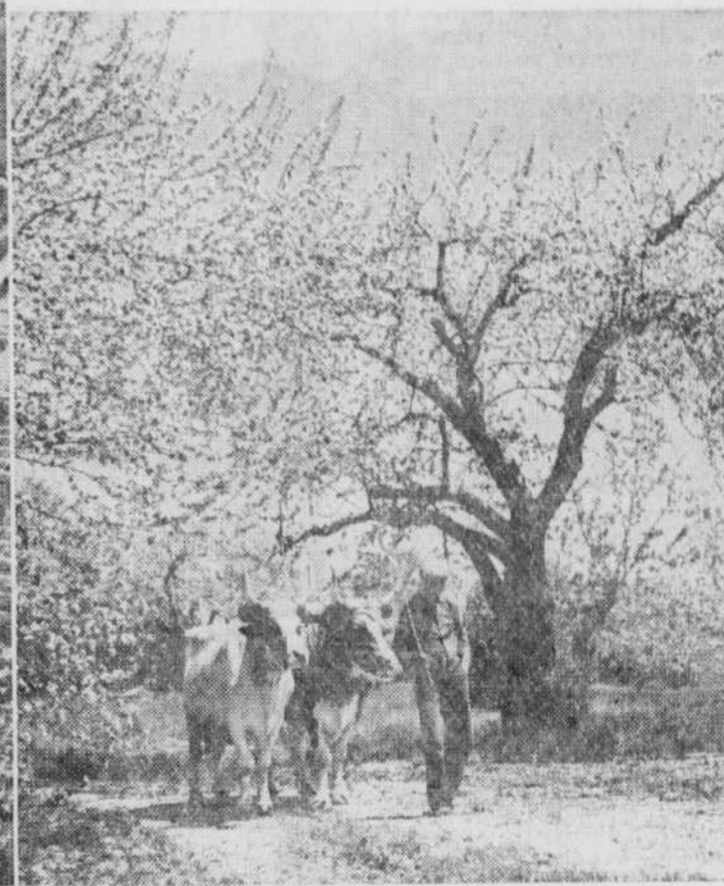


Apples are grown in all provinces of Canada but only 5 provinces grow them commercially. British Columbia leads as an apple producing area followed by Ontario, Nova Scotia, Quebec and New Brunswick.



Apple trees require large quantities of moisture, bright bouts of sunshine and a temperate climate. The picturesque orchard above near Kamloops, B.C. is favoured by the ideal conditions prevailing in the Okanagan

Valley. To maintain and improve Canada's prosperous fruit industry requires constant research into soil and fertilizer problems, insect and disease control, as well as the continuing search for new varieties.

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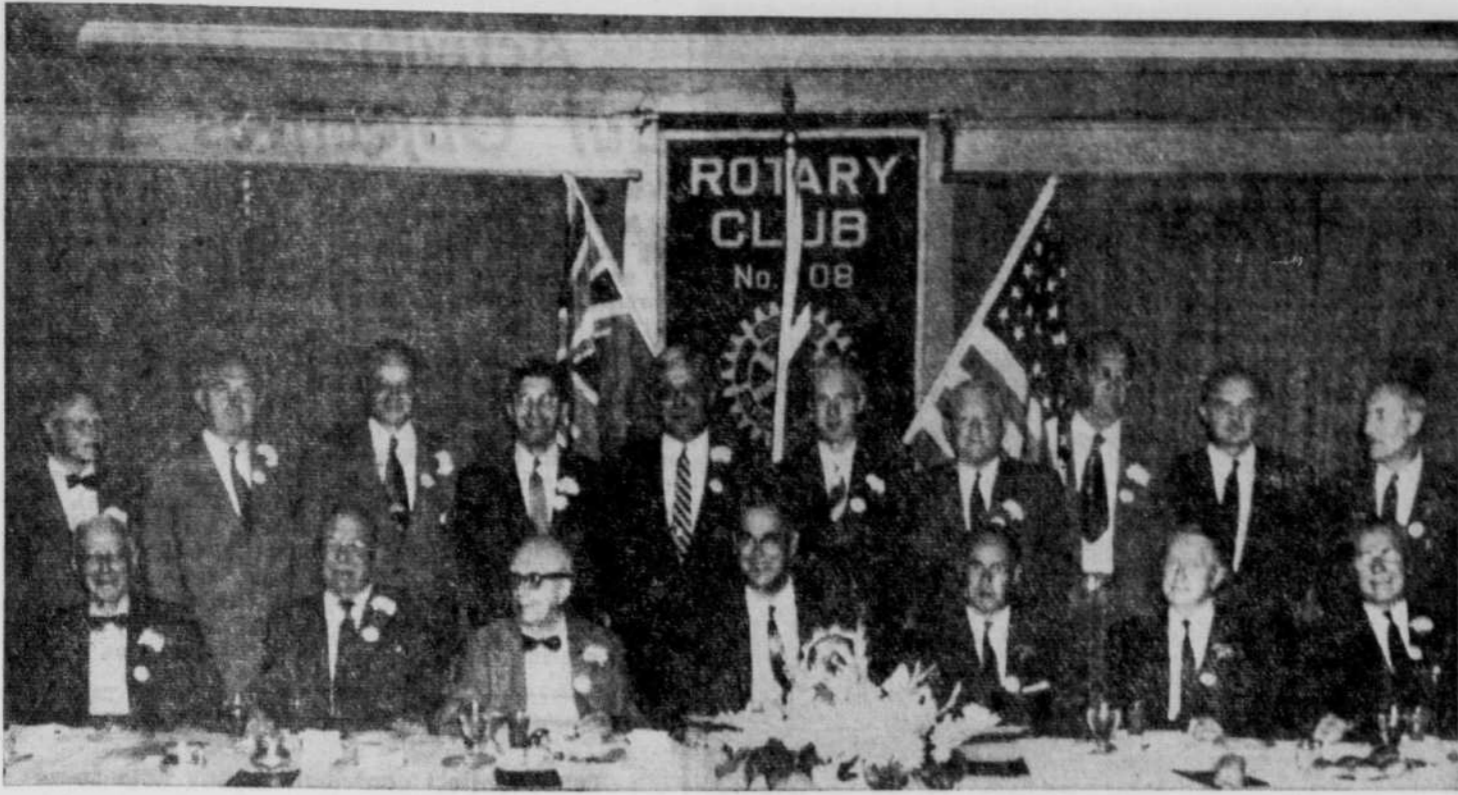

Rotary Club Sponsors Air Cadets

Since 1940 the Sherbrooke Rotary Club has been successfully sponsoring an Air Cadet Squadron and the value of this work during and since the war has been tremendous. Within a few short months of the time the Rotary Club began its Air Cadet Squadron, 150 boys were in uniform. Under good and careful instruction, they underwent the training laid out in the R.C.A.F. syllabus. The squadron compiled an outstanding record during the war years and while at that time its work was of vital importance to the war effort, its accomplishments in the training of young men since the war ended has been of no little significance. Not only does the Air Cadet League produce young men capable of maintaining this country's air strength, but it teaches them the fundamentals of good citizenship so important to their successful taking their place as adults in our society.

years the squadron has become noted for its marksmanship. In 1952, a picked team captured the Venis Trophy, denoting marksmanship supremacy in this province, at Montreal, and again in 1954.

Proficiency in training, too has always been one of the trademarks of the 67th Squadron. 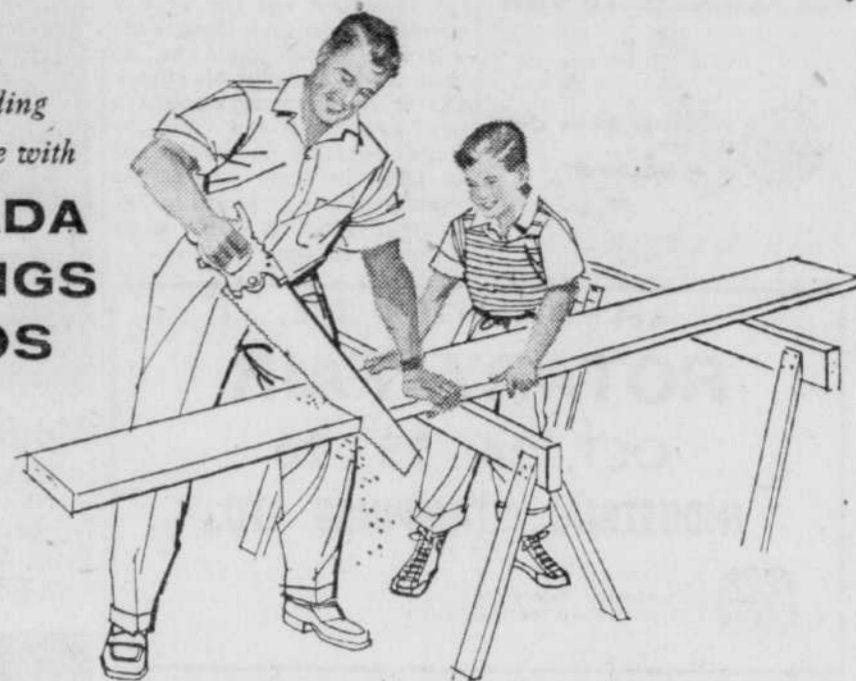
