PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT

OF
LOWER CANADA.

QUEBEC, WEDNESDAY, 15th JANUARY, 1817.

This day at Two o'clock, His Excellency the GOVERNOR IN CHIEF came down in State to the Legislative Council, and being seated on the Throne, the Gentleman Usher of the black Rod was sent down to the House of Assembly to command their attendance before His Excellency; and the Members being come up, the Honorable Speaker of the Legislative Council signified His Excellency's pleasure that they should return to the usual place of their sitting, and there choose a fit person to be their Speaker, and present him for His Excellency's approbation, to-morrow at two o'clock.

The Members of the House being returned, J. L. PAPIREAU, Esquire, Member for the West Ward of the city of Montreal, was proposed for the Speaker and elected unanimously.

THURSDAY, January 16.—His Excellency the Governor in Chief having again come down to the Legislative Council, and being seated on the Throne, and the Members of the Assembly, with Mr. PAPIREAU, their Speaker Elect, being in attendance below the Bar, the Honourable the Speaker of the Legislative Council enquired His Excellency's allowance of the choice of the House of Assembly; and then His Excellency was pleased to deliver the following SPEECH:—

"Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

"Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

"His Royal Highness the Prince Regent having been pleased in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty most graciously to appoint me Governor in Chief of the British Provinces in North America, and to commit to my charge the Administration of the Government of Lower-Canada, I have been induced to assemble the Legislature at an earlier period of the year than usual, not only from the desire I feel to assure you personally that my best endeavours shall be used to promote the welfare of this extensive and valuable Colony, for the prosperity of which I feel the most anxious solicitude; but also to call the immediate attention of the Provincial Parliament to a most grievous calamity which can only be properly remedied by the Legislative interference. I allude to the failure of the crops in different parts of the Province, but more particularly in the parishes below Quebec, where it has been represented to me that the inhabitants have been reduced to a state of absolute want.

"Having ascertained that this evil really did exist to an alarming extent, I lost no time in making such temporary arrangements as would secure the lower orders from the dreadful effects of famine, until the Legislature could be convened. The information on which I acted, together with a statement of the steps I have taken in consequence, shall be laid before both Houses with as little delay as possible, when I shall leave it to the Provincial Parliament to take such further measures as the nature of the case may appear to require.

"Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

"I rely upon your liberality to make the necessary provision for defraying the expences already incurred for the purpose of supplying the immediate and more pressing wants of the distressed parts of

the community, and I feel assured that you will likewise grant such farther aid as necessities may require. I shall order a statement of the Province Revenue of the Crown, and of expenditures for the last year to be laid before you as usual.

"Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

"Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

"The failure of the last years harvest, is, I find generally attributed to an unpropitious season. It however, may be a subject worthy of investigation, whether other circumstances may not have had a share in producing the present scarcity, and if any such causes exist, to consider how far it may be in the power of the Legislature to prevent their future influence.

"I feel it my duty to call your early attention to the renewal of the Militia Act, and of several other Acts, which are of the utmost importance to the Province, and which have already expired, or will do so very shortly.—You are too well acquainted with the advantages which must result from every improvement in the internal communications of this Province, and from the encouragement of its agriculture and commerce to make it necessary for me to do more than recommend these most important subjects to your attention.

"The duties you are now entering upon, are arduous and laborious;—But I venture to anticipate your assiduity in the performance of them; And with the earnest hope that your deliberations will have for their object the promotion of the best interests of the Province, I offer you my most cordial assistance and support in carrying into effect such beneficial measures as may be suggested in the course of the present session.

"Any further communications I may find it necessary to make, shall be signified to you by Message."

His Excellency the GOVERNOR IN CHIEF has been pleased to make the following appointments, viz.:

George Symes, Esq. to be Master of the Trinity House of Quebec, in the room of M. Bell, esq. resigned.

Thomas Wilson, esq. to be Deputy Master of do. do.

Thomas White, esq. to be a Warden of do. do. by Commission dated 23d Oct. last, and

Pierre Perrault, to be Assistant Examiner of Pilots for and above the Harbour of Quebec, in the room of Fras. Bellet, esq. resigned, by Commission dated 3d instant.

On Tuesday evening last a Micmac Indian of the name of *Pierre Quatre Pattes*, perished on the ice, between Beauport and this city, from the severity of the weather. It appears that he resided at Chateau Richer; and set off, with another Indian on Tuesday morning from thence to go to Quebec. About sun-set they left Beauport. The deceased was unfortunately lame in one of his knees, which prevented his being able to keep pace with his comrade, whom he desired to make the best of his way, and he would follow him. His companion, when he reached the town, was almost frozen.—As *Quatre Pattes* did not arrive that evening, his friend went to look for him very early on Wednesday morning. He found him on the ice, about a

mile from the town; and not far from one of the little huts erected on the ice for fishing. He was in a kneeling position, with his face upon the ice, and his hands upon his forehead and eyes. He was a young man of 23 years of age; and has left a wife, but no children. He is said to have been perfectly sober when he left Beauport. His unfortunate fate is to be ascribed solely to his lameness; to his being very thinly clothed, from his extreme indigence; and from the extreme severity of the season.

This morning, between six and seven o'clock, a fire broke out in the lower story of the house of Messrs. Langlois & Quin, in Buade street, upper town. It is said to have been occasioned by burnt coffee which was left in one of the rooms. No one slept in the house. It was soon checked and extinguished after its discovery, with little injury.—Part of the floor is burnt.

Communications being frequently thrown into the editor's passage, where they are liable to be picked up by strangers constantly coming in and going out; and others put into the Post-office, which occasions delay; an aperture is made in a window shutter the nearest to the door on the left hand, in entering the editor's house, in St. Anne street; where communications can be dropped at all times, except in the day on Wednesdays and Saturdays, when the shutter is open.
