



The Billot Bill was read a second time last night: the division being 75 to 55. Not a few members stated in effect that though they believed the bill to be a mistake, they would vote for it on the ground that it was the best way to prove its fallacy was by actual trial.

We had hoped that the men of Canada would never acknowledge the existence of such a "new" moral feeling as the adoption of a secret voting machine. The people of Nova Scotia soon tired of such self-imposed manacles; it remains to be seen how they will view the prospect of being again fettered.

A work purporting to be a history of the Washington Treaty has been published by Mr. Caleb Cushing, who, it will be remembered, was counsel for the American Government at the Geneva High Court of Arbitration. In noticing this volume a New York paper writes: "Cushing's foolish old man."

The critic goes on to say that a history of the treaty was desirable, but stoutly denies that Mr. Cushing's book can be held to supply the want. It is maintained that, "instead of being an impartial history, it is a special plea or argument after the event for the side by which he was employed."

It is the work of an advocate and not of a just and impartial historian. It is quite proper for him to assume this position before the High Court, and to present to it such a work as would be most advantageous to his own side of the case; but when he undertook the task of making a contribution to literature on the subject, which is not a trusty and authoritative, it was his duty to give up the role of prosecutor, and try to obtain those comprehensive views which would enable him to do equal justice to all parties. In reviewing the dissenting opinions of Sir Alexander Cockburn, he is particularly spiteful in his bias, and offensive in his language.

He remarks the British newspapers to find something that will help him to write his own opinions of inconsequential people, and tries to "corner" the adversary in ways which are familiar in London to "Old Bailey lawyers," and in New York to "Columbian" style.

The review concludes as follows: "We are sorry that such a work should be put forth as a history of this treaty, and as a diplomatic manual. The High Court was a court of peaceful arbitration, and it was supposed it would not only settle the American claims, but do away with the ill-feeling between the two countries. Now, here comes Caleb Cushing, trying again to stir up ill will, and to rake up the embers of misapprehension."

There have a very ill-savored Emigration Department scandal in Ontario. In 1871, when Mr. Carling was Commissioner of Agriculture, the expenditure for emigration purposes amounted to \$15,000. The settlement of \$15,000 emigrants in the Province. Last year, Mr. McKellar being at the head of the Department, \$57,678 was spent and 28,129 emigrants were reported at the various agencies. That is to say, there was spent in 1872 \$27,668 more than in 1871, and yet the number of emigrants was only increased by 2,257. For the current year the appropriation amounts to \$135,824. Now, it is alleged that the Ontario Government had been coaxed by two persons, one of whom writes himself down as the "Rev. Horrocks Cooks," and the other as "Lieut. Creasy John Whellams." Some of our readers may remember that the former personage addressed a meeting on the subject of emigration in the St. Patrick's Hall, in this city, in the fall of 1871. It will be remembered that he was, in appearance, a man calculated to inspire confidence, and a fluent speaker. It appears that he passed on to Toronto, and when the Standard McDonald Government was defeated, he secured from the British position of Chief Commissioner of Emigration for Great Britain, at a salary of \$1,000 a year and an annual allowance of \$1,400 for travelling expenses, besides an appropriation of \$4,000 for rent of lecture halls. Just previous to his appointment, the Commissioner of Agriculture, Mr. McKellar, was warned by Mr. Haigh, Emigration Agent at Quebec, to beware of Cooks. Mr. Haigh sent in a report setting out that Cooks was a man of a rascally, a swindler, a drunkard, and the pseudo-representative of an Emigration League which was dissolved in 1871. On the simple denial of Mr. Cooks, it is stated that the Commissioner ordered Mr. Haigh to withdraw his report, and Mr. Cooks was officially appointed. Shortly after, it appears, "Lieut. Creasy John Whellams" was appointed Assistant Commissioner of Emigration, at a salary of \$1,000 and \$688 travelling expenses. Cooks and Whellams returned to England in December 1872. Now it is alleged that inquiries at the Head Office of the Metropolitan Police, Scotland Yard, London, have more than proved all that Mr. Haigh had concerning Mr. Cooks, and that Whellams had been his accomplice throughout. It seems that Mr. Cooks visited Canada representing himself as deputy by the National Emigration League of Great Britain, a body which had been dissolved long before he set foot on Canadian soil; that after his return to England he sent in a claim for about £250 to Mr. Pope, Minister of Agriculture, at Ottawa, in respect of the expiation tax charged on emigrants, whom he said had been sent out by the League in the spring of that year; that the money was remitted to Mr. Dixon, Dominion Emigration Agent, with instructions to inquire into the circumstances, and that Mr. Dixon discovered that the League had been dissolved, and that Mr. Cooks had no authority to make any claim. The money was accordingly returned to Ottawa. It is further stated that the Charity Organisation Society of England has an account to settle with Mr. Cooks, and that it is likely he will be prosecuted for fraud. Respecting Whellams, it is affirmed that the records of Scotland Yard show him to be "a first-class villain." On the 23d November, 1870, he was tried at the Old Bailey for having robbed the Society for the Relief of the Sick and Wounded of the Franco-German war of £200, and escaped conviction on a technical point of law. It is further recorded that he left for Canada in October, 1872, immediately after having swindled his landlady, Miss Pine, of Ross Cottage, Pall Mall, of £1,000. Cooks and Whellams sailed for England in 1872, having drawn from the Provincial Treasury \$1,000 on account of a claim of \$1,200 they put in for the National Emigration League which a year before Mr. Dixon had reported defunct. They had before this received \$2,021 for "services." Horrocks also received \$100 from the Treasury to pay
